#### **Preface**

These records are the legacy of our Yarbrough family researchers, to whom much is owed. The known family researchers include Jean Baker, Ann Y. Broadbent, Mary Y. Daniel, Frances (Rea) Donohue, Betty Humrighouse, Pauline Gray, Evelyn Goble, Nelle Morris Jenkins, Ophelia Kessler, Frances Lockwood, Karen Mazock Renee Smelley, Dorothy Svec, Jeanette Wilson, Cleveland "Cy" Yarbrough, Edna Yarbrough, George A. Yarbrough, and Robert Price Yarbrough.

The originals of these volumes are being kept for the benefit of future generations by the Williamson County Library, Franklin, Tennessee.

No claims of accuracy or authentication of the material herein are made or may be assumed. Many of these records have been superseded by subsequent research. Hence, there are records which are erroneous and unreliable; it would have been a Herculean task to attempt to correct all of them. Fortunately, there are only a few critical genealogical facts that are involved, and which are correctly stated here:

- Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough was never married to Frances Proctor;
- Ambrose Yarbrough did not immigrant from Yorkshire; he is now believed to be a descendant of Richard the Immigrant;
- There are so far only two proven sons of Old Richard John and Richard II;
- There is so far no evidence proving Joshua Yarborough I to be a descendant of Old Richard.
- The "Old Country" referred to in old documents and letters is the Colony of Virginia, not England or the Old World.
- There were not seven brothers who immigrated from "the old country"; in fact, it now appears there were three brothers and four sons of the brothers. Which were the fathers and which were the sons are so far unknown.

In spite of these inaccuracies, these records comprise much of our history and some of our accomplishments. There are pages whose print quality is so poor that word recognition was not possible. In spite of that, at least partial capability for searching these volumes is provided, as well as an index to each volume. Nonetheless, the viewer is cautioned to perform his/her own due diligence in connection with any use of this material.

The various spellings of the Yarbrough surname have never been applied consistently, even within a given family. To the extent possible, the names in the index reflect the names used on the source pages; where it wasn't clear as to which might be the proper spelling, the spelling used is "Yarbrough".

I, ALFRED YARBOROUGH of Sumter County, State of Alabama, being sorely afflicted in body but sound and clear of mind do make this my last will and testament, revoking all other. Viz I give unto my youngest son NEAL S. YARBOROUGH the following negroes, DICK, DRUE, MILTON, WASHINGTON, SOPHIA, PEARCY, EASTER, NATHAN, EMA, ARY, ZACHARIA, GABRELL and BOB.

I give to my youngest daughter SAMANDTHA ANN YARBOROUGH, BETSY and five children JOHN, FANNY, MORGAN, NICY, FLORA, HANSEL, LIZA, NED and LITTLE JOHN. These two special legacies are intended to equalize my two youngest with my three oldest children, they having received theirs.

I wish the negroes kept together and the plantation on which I reside worked for the present year for the joint benefit of myself, JAMES O. YARBOROUGH, NEAL S. YARBOROUGH and SAMANTHA A. YARBOROUGH, on the following rates, viz, NEAL S. YARBOROUGH and SAMANTHA AND TARBOROUGH to have jointly one fourth of the proceeds, the remaining three fourths to be equally divided between myself and JAMES O. YARBOROUGH. At the end of the present year, if I should not then be living, I wish all the property I may die possessed of both personal and real estate to be sold and after paying all my just debts, the proceeds arising from such sale to be equally divided amongst my five children. Please turn to page 62-Vol. 1 and you will see that Ambrose born 1801 and Stephen (lines 11 and 12) were in Sumpter County Alabama, at exactly the same time and place. (Chile's Mill Township) where Richard Y arbrough lived in the late 1830's and where Richard was J.P. This Ambrose Yarbrough was the son of Humphrey who married a Miss Layton. Humphrey's father was Ambrose Yarbrough who was born 1710 in Yorkshire England, of the Yarbrough de Batson family-and came to the Colonies, Amelia County, Va. (17h6) and is said to have married a distant cousin-probably and aunt of my Manoah Yarbrough-that is where Manoah's father Zachariah was from. Ambrose's children or those named in the will-were Ambrose Jr., (RWS); Burley(please note on preceeding page that Ambrose Yarbrough born 1801-do not confuse him with Ambrose Yarbrough the son of Jonathan who was also a son

The head of this family was ALFRED YARBROUGH. He lived in Marengo County prior to his removal to Sampter in the 1830's. He was in Marengo County as early as 1821.

The appears in the Tract Book on 18 May 1821. He sold land to Elisha Yarbrough in 1825. Flisha Yarbrough deeded property to Lydia Yarbrough "for love and affection I have for her." Lydia married John M.R. Smith in Marengo County, and moved to Sampter and Alfred) Mr. Smith lost his mind temporarially; he had a child and the sample of the guardian. Mr. Smith became better at a later date—probably smalleria fever as the misquitoes were said to be horrible where the people

The inscription reads;

cleared land, and mesquitoes fred in the rotting stumps—so the people thought that foul air from the decaying vegetation caused maleria. He is buried at Boney Cemetery (see your Sumpter Co. map, between pages 50 and 51 in Vol. 1.

ALFRED YARBROUGH, born 12 December 1792, died 26 February 1857.

By the side of Alfred Yarbrough lies sleeping, his wife Mary. Her Tombstone reads; MARY, WIFE OF ALFRED YARBROUGH, born 31 November 1798, died 27 June 1853. ( The Bethel Presbyterian Church minutes show that Mary Yarbrough, wife of Alfred Yarbrough was admitted from Millenium Hope Church by letter, 23 July 1837. No mention of Alfred having joined the church, but he must have as on 9 April 1846 a committee was sent to find out way Alfred Yarbrough did not go to church. He told the committee that as long as the present minister ( Rev. Isaac Hadden) was preaching there that he would not attend services. Several of the Yarbrough slaves belonged to this church. Son Neil Smith Yarbrough, is buried in the Yarbrough loy-he is Alfred's son. NEIL SMITH YARBROUGH, son of Alfred and Mary Yarbrough, born 6 March 1835, died 17 January 1861. (He married Sarah S. Manley on 19 June 1857, by a Catholic Priest After the death of her husband, Neil S. Yarbrough she married George W. Bates, by a Baptist Minister. D.P. Bester. He died intestate and his wife was Administrator. They had two children-minors-Neil S. Jr., and Mary Yarbrough. Neil left a lot of property and-slaves; also stock worth \$100,000 a, share in the Gainesville-Market Railroad which went near the lower end of his place. Samantha Ann was a daughter of Alfred and Mary Yarbrough. She married George W. Wrenn. They Iived near the Yarbrough's. "My son, Tom Jenkins, owns this land where they lived. George Wrenn was the son of James and Eliza Wrenn of Sumpterville. No issue) SAMANTHA A. -wife of george M. Wrenn and DAUTHTER OF ALFRED AND MARY YARBROUGH born 24, March 1826, died 26 October 1863.

A daughter-in-law- Mary Ann Yarbrough lies sleeping by the side of her Husband's mother. Mary Yarbrough. Her tombstone inscription reads: ANN YARBROUGH. daughter of Matthew and Elizabeth Parham, and wife of James Q. Tarbrough, died 27 May 1852 aged 19 years. (Matthew Parham and his wife Nancy are buried at the Old Side Cemetery about 7 miles east of Boney Cemetery. His second wife, or we think she was a second wife- was named Nancy. Nancy was related to a Day faily. Matthew Parham's gravestone states that he was born 1792, and died 10 January 1859. Matthew left his estate, or the bulk of it to his grandson, Parham Tarbrough. There 77 slaves who were sold. I knew one of these Negroes who was 7 years old when Matthew Parham died. His name was Hilliard Bryant. Hilliard lived . . to be almost 100 years old. He told me about his old master and the little master. Farham Yarbrough. The Parham land is now owned by Mrs. Know Elliott; those who were the first owners were; Martin Simms, Malachi Nettles, William H. Lacy, Henry J. Darnell, Benj. Talliafarro. James Q. Yarbrough's land lay just west and adjoining my land, between me and Boney Cemetery, and is now owned by Mr. Phil willingham. My late husband's great Aunt was with these Yarbroughs when their people died. She promised this family that she would see that their family graves would be attended to; she carried out her promise, now my children have those graves cleaned in the abandoned graveyard. My husband had it done for thirty years, His father had it done for forty years and my children have had the lots cleaned since 1986. James Q. wrote my husband's gread aunt that they had so many cows in east Texas where they went, that they had to churn in a hogshead. I wondered why they did and skin the milk, but my husband did not know. Dorothy Svec wrote me about a James I Tarbrough she found in a Texas Census. I am wondering if Alfred's wife were a Domlar or Quinley. Does anyone know? There were people by that name who lived Tarbrough's. I found in the settlement of the Matthew Parham estate that Frances T. Morton and Arnold Walkings of N.C. clained to be legatees of the Parham estate. James Q. Yarbrough was made guardian of Parham Yarbrough's property.





# JAMES QUINCY YARBOROUGH.

### GRIMES COUNTY.

Col. James Quincy Yarborough, son of Alfred and Mary Yarborough, was born in Coosa County, Ala., September 8, 1827, and was reared in Marengo and Sumter counties in that State, growing up on his father's farm, where his boyhood and youth word divided between the duties and sports of the farm and his attendance at the local schools. His upportunities for obtaining an education were good and he availed himself of them. At about the age of twenty-one he married and began life as a planter upon his own account. He engaged in planting in his native State until the death of his wife in 1852, when, unsettled by that event and filled with a desire to try his fortunes in the new West, he went to California in 1849 where, huwever, he remained only a short time, returning thence to Alabama. In 1859 be came to Texas, settling at Apolonia, in Grimes County, where he was residing at the opening of the late war. He entered the Confederate army as a member of Company II., Carter's Regiment, with which he served in Texas, Arkaneas and Louisiana until the close of the struggle. His services were rendered in the especity of s private, but the title of "Colonel," which he subsequently bore, was not a purely honorary dis- ters much of the same spirit, energy, and enterprise

tigotion, as he was Colonel of the State Militia in Alabama previous to his removal to Texas, and took au active part in military matters in that State.

After the war, in 1869, Col. Yarborough became associated with Lewis J. Wilson and W. R. Howell, under the firm name of Wilson, Yarborough & Co... and embarked in the mercantile business at Anderson, Apolonia, and Navasota, in Grimes County. and at Madisonville, in Madison County. This partnership lasted until 1875, when Col. Yarborough disposed of his interest, and subsequently engaged in business on his own account in Navasota. Later he moved his business to the present cation of Yarborough, on the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway, ten milea from Navasala, and there followed merchandising and farming until his death. He met with more than ordinary succoss both as a merchant and planter and left a handsome estate He was south as an inbusiness, never booking any public positions and taking only such interest in politics as good critisme ship required. When occasion demanded, lowever, he never hesitated to go to the front in every movement and he always displayed in public mat-

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which brought such pronounced success in his own undertakings. He was especially active in securing the extension of the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Rallway through Grimes County and gave to the contracy the grounds on which the station of Yarborough is situated to which he added a bonus of and in the construction of the Toma . W natever tended in any way to atimulate industry, to increase the value of property or build up the community, found in him an intelligent and ordial supporter. In politics he was a staunch Demograt, adhering strictly to the principles and trad tons of the party. He never asked office for himself but always stood ready to assist with his means and personal efforts those who were honored as standard bearers of the party, and in his quiet but vigorous way did good service for the men and measures of his choice. Col. Yarborough was a man of strong likes and dislikes. There was not the slightest trace of the compromise element in his nature. He always took sides and sought in every legitimate way to carry his point. If he professed friendship for one he was ready to testify to that friendship in a substantial way, and if any one incurred his displeasure he did not besitate to let the fact be known. He was of a retiring disposition but did his own thinking, acting vigorously and promptly as occasion demanded. He was of genial nature, affable to his friends and easily approached

by strangers. Persistent in what he believed to be right or expedient, he never abandoned his matured opinions at the suggestion, or as the result of the of any one. He joined the Masons in-A aleson previous to his removal to Texas, and was a liberal contributor to every worthy purpose.

Yarborough was three times married and left surviving him ten children. His first marriage occurred in Alabama and was to Miss Mary A. Parham, a native of that State and a daughter of Mathew Parham, a respectable and well-to-do planter. The issue of this union was one son, the present Mathew Parham Yarborough, of Navasota. His second marriage occurred in Texas and was to Miss Alice Scott, a daughter of Judge James Scott, of Grimes County. Three children were born of this union, viz., Mant, now Mrs. Tom Owen, Alfred. and Jas. L. Yarborough. His last marriage took place in Florida and was to Miss Fannie A. Milton, a native of Marianna, that State, and a daughter of Governor John A. Milton, who served in the Florida Indian wars and was Governor of the State during the war between the States. The six children of this union are: Earle H , J. Milton, Martha E., Virgil H., Guy and Hunter.

Col. Tarborough's death occurred December 23. 1890, and called forth many expressions of sorrow from the people of Grimes County, to whom he was well known and by whom he was greatly respected.

Yarboro, Texas. Yarboro, in south central Grimes County on the Gulf, Colorado, and Santa Fe Railroad, was first spelled Yarborough and named for J. Q. Yarborough, who established a gristmill and gin at the site prior to 1880. The railroad reached the area in 1885 and Yarboro replaced Groce's Retreat \*\* as post office in 1890; population was seventy-five. The village had a store, a church, and a population of fifty in 1947.

Yarboro Creek. Yarboro Creek rises in southern Grimes County and flows west about six miles to Walker Creek. The stream was named for J. Q. Yarborough, who established a gristmill and gin on the stream prior to 1880. The stream has been dammed to form Yarboro Lake about seven miles

east of the town of Navasota.

Yard, Texas. Yard, in northwestern Anderson
County on the Trinity River, was originally a part
of Tennessee Colony. The first store in the community was kept by Bruce Gray, who is said to
have named the settlement by including a request
by a customer for a yard of cloth, on a list of names
prepared for the post office department. In 1940
one store and a population of ten were reported.

Yarrellton, Texas. Yarrellton, agricultural, school, and church community in northwestern Milam County, was settled in 1868 and was named for Tom Yarrell, who opened a store in 1870. Population was fifty-eight in 1940.

Yatasi Indians. The Yatasi was a tribe of the Caddo "confederacy, closely affiliated in language with the Natchitoch." In order to escape Chickasaw "attacks in Louisiana, parts of the tribe took refuge with the Caddo and with the Nasoni "in

Yates, Andrew Janeway. Andrew Janeway Yates, son of Andrew and Mary (Austin) Yates, was born in Hartford, Connecticut, on April 20, 1803. Yates was an M.A. graduate of Union College and a member of Phi Beta Kappa. Before he came to Texas in 1835, he had won recognition as a lawyer, college professor, and author and had acquired a considerable fortune. Upon arriving in Texas, he applied for a headright in Lorenzo de Zavala's " colony and located near the town of Liberty. He soon had won the confidence of Stephen F. Austin, Sam Houston, John A. and William H. Wharton, "and other leaders of the coun-

When the Texas Revolution broke out, Yates immediately joined the army, but late in December, 1835, he was appointed loan commissioner and served under Austin, Branch T. Archer, and William H. Wharton in their efforts to raise funds and supplies in the United States for the Texas Army. Yates' special business was to attend to the legal and clerical details of the loan negotiations and to purchase boats, munitions, and other supplies for the newly declared Republic of Texas. When the revolution was over, he returned to Texas and

lived at Liberty until 1841 when he removed to Galveston, where he published the Daily Advertiser and practiced law. He took an active part in enterprises of city and county. Had he so desired, he might have been the leading educator in Texas, being probably the best informed and best trained man in the educational field. He did, however, present to President M. B. Lamar an elaborate but sensible plan for a complete system of schools to be directed by trustees and financed by public lands of the Republic. His plan also provided for the training and certification of teachers and outlined a course of study. Yates was also the first signer of a memorial petitioning Congress to establish a system of popular education.

In 1840, Yates and Sam Houston became involved in a law suit over a league of land at Cedar Point. Two persons had claimed ownership of the land, one selling it to Houston, and the other to Yates. Court records of the case are voluminous, and the Texas Supreme Court did not render its decision in Houston's favor until 1848.

In January, 1851, Yates and his family moved to San José, California, where he established an office and practiced law until his death on August 8, 1856. He was buried with Masonic rites in the cemetery at San José.

Yates, Texas. Yates, on the Llano River in eastern Kimble County, was settled about 1900 and in 1910 had a general store operated by T. J. Land and reported a population of thirty-five. No

report has been made since that date.

Yates Oil Field. On his birthday, October 29, / 1926, Ira G. Yates, a Pecos County rancher, was handed an estimated \$15,000,000 present when the Mid-Kansas and Transcontinental Oil Company's No. 1 Yates blew in a 70,824-barrel producer. The Yates field became the most spectacular in the West Texas area. The second well was a 3,440-barrel producer, and as operations expanded, the daily potential from the Yates field grew to 2,500,000 barrels by the middle of 1928. The field consisted of about 20,000 proved acres, with a potential of 40,000 barrels to the acre, and contained several wells that, if unrestricted, might have had a flow of up to 100,000 barrels a day. The Standard Oil Company of Texas' No. 3 Bob Reid was accounted the greatest oil well in the nation, having a potential rating of 170,000 barrels a day. The tremendous capacity of the field alarmed the oil industry, and effective on January 1, 1928, a system of voluntary proration was instituted by the operators in the field. The maximum production from the Yates field was 41,905,000 barrels for 1929. The production for 1947 was 15,559,000 barrels from 579 wells, 90 per cent of which were still flowing in

## YARBORO

The town of Yarboro was named for Colonel James Quincy Yarborough who owned a large tract of land which included the townsite. Col. Yarborough came to the area sometime after the Civil War. At the peak of its existence Yarboro boasted three stores, a post office, a liquor store, a cotton gin, a train depot, two schools and a church.

The stores consisted of a general store owned and operated by Ferdinand August Meineke, a grocery and dry goods store owned and operated by two brothers, John and Bob McGinty, and a dry goods store owned by Vance Campbell and operated by Baker McGinty. The first post office was located in the store owned and operated by the McGinty brothers but was later moved to the store owned by August Meineke. The post office remained in Meineke's store for many years until blindness compelled Mr. Meineke to retire as postmaster. His daughter-in-law, Mrs. George Meineke (Mary Mitchell), succeeded him, serving from 1938 until 1953, when the postal service was discontinued.

The liquor store was one in which alcoholic beverages were sold in bottles and which was called a "Hiawatha Joint" by the local people. The cotton gin was owned by Erla Yarborough, a son of Colonel Yarborough's, who also owned large tracts of land in and around Yarboro and who used the land for farming and ranching.

The Santa Fe depot was a structure which housed two waiting rooms, a ticket office, a loading rack and living

Brenham, and then took the train from there to Galveston.

From the very early days of the town there was a school for the white students. The black children attended school in the church house used by the black citizens, and eventually a school was built for them north of the townsite on Highway # 105. The white citizens did not have a church building, but they did hold church services and Sunday School in their school building.

Early settlers and citizens would include names such as the Yarborough families. Vance Campbell and wife Mattie (formerly Mattie McGinty), Santa Fe Section Foreman Abby Loftin and his wife Ida (formerly Ida McGinty), Baker McGinty and wife Lucille (formerly Lucille Kelly), F.A. Meineke and wife Bessie Lawther Meineke, Crowder Stoneham and wife Belle Martin Stoneham: Austin Prestwood and family, Rev. W.H. Jones and family, Dr. Hunter Clark. and family, Ples and Toonie Sullivan Mask, Lawrence and Margaret Stewart, Anna Smart, and Richard and Mandy Mitchell. Northeast of the north end of Bois 'd Arc Lane David White and his wife Lucy A. Lawson and family lived about 1870. Sometime around 1900 or later Jeff Haynie and his wife Myrtle Holderby occupied this house. Haynie died and Miss Myrt married W.C. Mims. The house burned and the Mimses built a two-story structure near the main road, using the lower floor for a store and the upper floor for their residence.



They were received by letter in April, 1827, into Bethel Church from a church in Telfair County; Mrs. Wooten died a member, and Mr. Wooten was granted a letter of dismission in February, 1853, and placed his membership in another church nearer to his home, the identity of which has not been learned. He died a member of that church.

William Yarbrough (name spelled sometimes as "Yarbrough" on the public records) was born in 1802 in Montgomery County, a son of his father of the same name. The father moved with his family to Montgomery County about 1800, and became a Justice of Peace there in 1803, and in 1818 was among the first settlers of Appling County, and is listed in the Appling County census of 1820. William Yarbrough, Sr., and his brother, Benjamin, of Laurens County, were both Revolutionary soldiers.



After marriage, James L. Wilcox made his home in Irwin County. His large plantation was located about ten miles south of Abbeville. When Wilcox county was formed in 1858 partly out of Irwin County he was included in it, and he took a leading part in the creation of the new county.

Mr. Wilcox served as Captain in the 433rd district militia. 1833-38. He was State Senator from Irwin County in the 1829, 1830 and 1832 sessions of the legislature. He was County Treasurer of Irwin, 1830-38, also a Justice of Irwin Inferior Court, 1829-1833 and again 1841-1849. He was listed in the 1860 Census of Wilcox county as a merchant. He and most of his family were members of the Methodist Church, and his membership was at Mt. Zion Church near his home. In the legislative act approved Jan. 26, 1850, incorporating the church, he was named as a trustee of the church, and he held that office and that of steward in his church for several years prior to his death.

Mr. Wilcox died July 14, 1861. His wife survived and died Nov. 8, 1887. They were buried at Mount Zion Church about 15 miles north of present Fitzgerald. Mrs. Wilcox died in Hawkinsville at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Watson, with whom she spent her latter years.

Rev. James Monroe Wilcox, a prominent citizen and Methodist minister of Coffee County, was born Oct. 25, 1832, in Telfair (now Coffee) County, son of John and Elizabeth Wilcox (Vol.IV). He spent his entire life in the same community or section of the county where he was born. He was married twice. His first marriage was on Oct. 25, 1857, to Mary Wooten, daughter of Simon Wooten. She was born in Telfair (now Coffee) County, Feb. 28, 1835, and died June 16, 1878, They had six children:
