Preface

These records are the legacy of our Yarbrough family researchers, to whom much is owed. The known family researchers include Jean Baker, Ann Y. Broadbent, Mary Y. Daniel, Frances (Rea) Donohue, Betty Humrighouse, Pauline Gray, Evelyn Goble, Nelle Morris Jenkins, Ophelia Kessler, Frances Lockwood, Karen Mazock Renee Smelley, Dorothy Svec, Jeanette Wilson, Cleveland "Cy" Yarbrough, Edna Yarbrough, George A. Yarbrough, and Robert Price Yarbrough.

The originals of these volumes are being kept for the benefit of future generations by the Williamson County Library, Franklin, Tennessee.

No claims of accuracy or authentication of the material herein are made or may be assumed. Many of these records have been superseded by subsequent research. Hence, there are records which are erroneous and unreliable; it would have been a Herculean task to attempt to correct all of them. Fortunately, there are only a few critical genealogical facts that are involved, and which are correctly stated here:

- Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough was never married to Frances Proctor;
- Ambrose Yarbrough did not immigrant from Yorkshire; he is now believed to be a descendant of Richard the Immigrant;
- There are so far only two proven sons of Old Richard John and Richard II;
- There is so far no evidence proving Joshua Yarborough I to be a descendant of Old Richard.
- The "Old Country" referred to in old documents and letters is the Colony of Virginia, not England or the Old World.
- There were not seven brothers who immigrated from "the old country"; in fact, it now appears there were three brothers and four sons of the brothers. Which were the fathers and which were the sons are so far unknown.

In spite of these inaccuracies, these records comprise much of our history and some of our accomplishments. There are pages whose print quality is so poor that word recognition was not possible. In spite of that, at least partial capability for searching these volumes is provided, as well as an index to each volume. Nonetheless, the viewer is cautioned to perform his/her own due diligence in connection with any use of this material.

The various spellings of the Yarbrough surname have never been applied consistently, even within a given family. To the extent possible, the names in the index reflect the names used on the source pages; where it wasn't clear as to which might be the proper spelling, the spelling used is "Yarbrough".

Panoramic Portrait of Texas

A 45-foot mural that traces Texas history from the time of the Spanish

conquistadors to the discovery of oil and the beginning of modern, industrial Texas dominates the foyer of the Lorenzo de Zavala State Archives and Library Building to the east of the Capitol. Executed by Peter Rogers according to plans developed by him in collaboration with Peter Hurd, the mural provides a dramatic introduction to Texas history. To the far left are In-

dians living as they did before the arrival of the Spaniards with their horses. A small ship in the distance symbolizes the first Spaniards who sailed along the coast of Texas. Large figures in the mural include a Spanish conquistador, a frontiersman, a cowboy, and a mother and child who represent the mother United States and child Texas. In the foreground are the faces of Stephen F.

The idea of a library for Texas was proposed in 1835, even before the Declaration of Independence was signed. In 1839 President Mirabeau B. Lamar signed a joint resolution of Congress establishing a national library. Apparently, however, the only purchase for this library was an 18-volume set of the Edinburgh Encyclopedia. For a time a small collection of books was housed in the Secretary of State's office. Later the responsibility for the library was transferred to the Superintendent of Grounds. Finally in 1876 a new officer known as the Commissioner of Agriculture, Insurance, Statistics, and History was appointed.

Meanwhile others in government were concerned with the records of State government. In 1842 some Texans decided that Austin was too likely to be attacked by the Indians or the Mexicans to be safe for the archives or records and proceeded to start moving them out of town toward Houston. Austinites set out in pursuit, and the brief skirmish—which the Austin residents won—has

become known as the Archives War.

By the end of the nineteenth century a good many Texans were becoming interested in the history of their state. At the same time government offices were finding that they were housing many records that we no longer used but were valuable historical source material. Establishing a State archives and appointing an historical clerk in the office of the Commissioner of Agriculture, Insurance, Statistics and History helped solve the problems of both the historians who needed records and the government officials who did not have the facilities to store them.

By 1900 something else that would affect the State Library was also happening. A law passed in 1874 gave cities the authority to use tax money to support public libraries, but few took advantage of it until about 1900. Other states were establishing library commissions, and librarians felt that there should be such a commission in Texas.

The Texas Library and Historical Commission that was established in Austin, to the left; James Bowie, David Crockett, William B. Travis, and Sam Houston, in the center; and presidents of the Republic Mirabeau B. Lamar and Anson Jones. The guide in the foyer explains the significance of the elements of the mural to visitors.

Display cases in the foyer provide a sample of the manuscripts, books, maps, and other documents in the collection of the Archives Division. These include a treaty with the Republic of Texas signed by Queen Victoria, documents related to the provincial government at Nacogdoches when Texas was a part of Mexico, and a manuscript copy of the Constitution of 1845. On permanent display are the Texas Declaration of Independence and William B. Travis' Letter from the Alamo.

1909 brought together three functions. The State Library was responsible for serving as a library for State government, for maintaining and making available historical archives, and for encouraging public library development.

Through the years other responsibilities have been added and the original ones expanded. In 1919 the State Library began providing braille and other embossed materials to blind persons. In 1931 it was designated a depository for Library of Congress materials for the blind. In 1966 this program was extended to include persons with other physical handicaps that prevent their reading ordinary books.

Legislation in 1953 extended the Library's responsibility for State records to include management of semi-active records of agencies. The Regional Historical Resources Depository program in 1971 gave the Library responsibility for overseeing the establishment and maintenance of regional archival facilities for the inactive records of cities, counties, and other governmental units.

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The letter that William Barret Travis wrote from the Alamo is on permanent display in the Lorenzo de Zavala State Archives and Library Building. Recently acquired by the State Library is the letter that James B. Bonham, who also died at the Alamo, wrote to tell Sam Houston that he wanted to join the Texans in their fight.

Jones Prairie

Little River Baptist Church and its adjoining cemetery is located on Jones Prairie on the northeast side of Farm Road #2347, about 3.5 miles north of its junction with U.S. #190 (5.8 miles NW of Maysfield and due north of Cameron, Texas). (Copied November, 1963.)

History of Milam County, Texas published in 1956 by Mrs. Lelia M. Batte states that it is the oldest organized Baptist Church in the county. (The first Baptist church is said to have been at Smyrna, but no records are available.) It was organized on the first Sunday in July, 1849, at the home of Josiah Lester, near Belmena. There were 8 charter members: Elder Zachariah N. Morrell and Mrs. Morrell, Josiah Lester and Mrs.

Lester, Elizabeth White, W. H. M. Lester, Amanda Dobbins and Cyrus Harlan, a Negro. A church was soon built near Jones Prairie, and in 1855 it held an outstanding revival at Block House Springs.

Every effort has been made to copy all tombstones in the cemetery; however, many graves are marked with only metal markers (no longer readable), footstones, wooden stobs, rocks, or clumps of iris. It is said that the oldest grave in the cemetery lies unmarked under a huge cedar tree on the southeast side of the cemetery. A man was buried by the cedar which was then a rather small plant, and a wooden peg was wedged into the trunk to mark his grave. Many years ago the sexton of the cemetery trimmed the huge tree and found the peg still driven into the tree but in a rotten condition.

All graves have been noted - both those with or without tombstones; however, due to the size of the cemetery full dates were copied only for those who were born prior to 1881.





THE PROVIDENCE CHRUCH:

THE PROVIDENCE BAPTIST CHURCH WAS ORGANIZED IN 1841. IN THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS, BY JAMES A. PREWETT, FIRST DEACON, UNTIL THE CALLING OF THE FIRST PASTOR. 32 MEMBERS MET 3 OR 4 TIMES A YEAR WITH PLANTERS FROM THE BRAZOS BOTTOMS AND THEIR HOUSEHOLDS. (INCLUDING THEIR SLAVES) IN ATTENDANCE. BY 1875 THIS WAS ONE OF THE MOST INFLUENTIAL CHURCH IN THE AREA. KNOWN FOR IT'S 2-WEEK BRUSH ARBOR OR TABERNACLE MEETINGS: IT HAS HAD 25 PASTORS. THE ORIGINAL CHURCH WAS MADE OF SPLIT LOGS. THE PRESENT BUILDING IS THE FOURTH BUILDING. IN 1841 WHEN THE CHURCH WAS ORGANIZED A SEALED CAPSULE WAS PLANTED. TO BE OPENED ON THE CENTENIAL OF THE CHURCH. A HISTORY OF THE CHURCH WAS ENTERED IN THE CAPSULE WITH OTHER OBJECTS. ALL THE OLD RECORDS WERE DISTROYED IN 1941, WHEN THE CAPSULE WAS OPENED. ANOTHER CAPSULE WAS SEALED AT THAT TIME. IT CONTAINED LETTERS AND OTHER OBJECTS WRITTEN BY THE MEMBERS OT THAT TIME. IT IS TO BE OPENED IN 2041. DADDY WAS BAPTISED IN THAT CHURCH. IT IS STILL ACTIVE AT THIS DATE. OCTOBER 6, 1976.
