# Preface

These records are the legacy of our Yarbrough family researchers, to whom much is owed. The known family researchers include Jean Baker, Ann Y. Broadbent, Mary Y. Daniel, Frances (Rea) Donohue, Betty Humrighouse, Pauline Gray, Evelyn Goble, Nelle Morris Jenkins, Ophelia Kessler, Frances Lockwood, Karen Mazock Renee Smelley, Dorothy Svec, Jeanette Wilson, Cleveland "Cy" Yarborough, Edna Yarbrough, George A. Yarbrough, and Robert Price Yarbrough.

The originals of these volumes are being kept for the benefit of future generations by the Williamson County Library, Franklin, Tennessee.

No claims of accuracy or authentication of the material herein are made or may be assumed. Many of these records have been superseded by subsequent research. Hence, there are records which are erroneous and unreliable; it would have been a Herculean task to attempt to correct all of them. Fortunately, there are only a few critical genealogical facts that are involved, and which are correctly stated here:

- Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough was never married to Frances Proctor;
- Ambrose Yarbrough did not immigrant from Yorkshire; he is now believed to be a descendant of Richard the Immigrant;
- There are so far only two proven sons of Old Richard John and Richard II;
- There is so far no evidence proving Joshua Yarborough I to be a descendant of Old Richard.
- The "Old Country" referred to in old documents and letters is the Colony of Virginia, not England or the Old World.
- There were not seven brothers who immigrated from "the old country"; in fact, it now appears there were three brothers and four sons of the brothers. Which were the fathers and which were the sons are so far unknown.

In spite of these inaccuracies, these records comprise much of our history and some of our accomplishments. There are pages whose print quality is so poor that word recognition was not possible. In spite of that, at least partial capability for searching these volumes is provided, as well as an index to each volume. Nonetheless, the viewer is cautioned to perform his/her own due diligence in connection with any use of this material.

The various spellings of the Yarbrough surname have never been applied consistently, even within a given family. To the extent possible, the names in the index reflect the names used on the source pages; where it wasn't clear as to which might be the proper spelling, the spelling used is "Yarbrough".







Comment: Moses and Nimrod, sons of Flizabeth Yarbrough of

Cumberland County, N.C., are found in 1820 Census of Warren County, Georgia. (See attached index)<sup>1</sup> Littleton Yarbrough m. Elizabeth Beal in Richmond County, Georgia on 29 Apr 1788.<sup>2</sup> On 27 Nov-1793, Littleton Yarbrough and wife Flizabeth deeded land to Benjamin Finney, all of Columbia County, Ga.<sup>3</sup> Their son Beal Yarbrough m. Rebecca Walton in Columbia County, Ga. on 12 July 1814.<sup>4</sup>

There are three Littleton Yarbrough's in early records. (a) Littleton Yarbrough who married Elizabeth Beal in Richmond County, Georgia in 1788, and later resided Columbia County, Ga. (b) Littleton Yarbrough who married Nancy Ashcraft, resided St. Clair County, Alabama, buried St. Clair County, and a son of Manoah Yarbrough and wife Mary. (c) Littleton Yarbrough, M.D.

direct descendants of Richard<sup>1</sup> Wright, Gent., father of Major Francis<sup>2</sup> Wright, is so sound a fact that a universal unanimity of judgment thereon must ensue. Various records hereinbefore quoted in the course of this present narrative so unavoidably prove that the only son of Anne<sup>2</sup> (Washington) Wright, by her only husband

#### JOHN WEIGHT, THE PLANTER, OF WESTMORELAND, 1097-1711.

This worthy man is of frequent record as a "planter," several items of which will suffice to identify him. At the Virginia state land office in Richmond, on page 275 of book No. 2, of Northern Neck Grants, there is recorded a grant of two hundred and twenty-nine acres of land in Westmoreland county, made on August 16, 1697, by "Margaret, Lady Culpeper and Thomas Lord Fairfax" to "John Wright, Pltr." On October 30, 1700, he acknowledged a deed of sale of a large part of this land to John Clement, and the grantor's wife. Hannah Wright, then waived her right of dower. Westmoreland court Order Book 1698-1705, page 96 dorso.] This John Wright died before August 24, 1711, without issue; whereupon his widow Hannah applied to the proprietors of the Northern Neck for a confirmation to her of the then remaining part of the original grant to her husband, which confirmation reads In part, to-wit: "The Right Honorable Catherine, Lady fairfax, Dutchess Dowager of Thomas late Lord & Marguritte Late Lady Culpeper, Dec'd &c. . . . . Hannah Wright of ye County of Westmoreland hath sett forth to my Office yt John Wright her Husband Dyed Seized of Seventy One Acres of Land in yo sd County, part of One thousand Acres of Land formerly Granted to John Earle & left no heirs behind him, nor did dispose thereof by Will. Whereupon ye same Escheats to me ye said Propriator . . . . And ye sd Hannuh being in possession of ye sd Land, having moved to be preferred to a Grant of yo sd Escheut, Know Yee . . . . that I have Granted . . . . Confirmed ye sd seventyone acres Unto ye sd Hannah Wright," etc . . . "24 August, 1711," etc . . . . [Northern Neck Grants, Book No. 4, page 42, Land Office, Richmond, Virginia.]

On September 24, 1712, John Garner by a power of attorney from Hannah Wright acknowledged before the <u>Sounty court of Westmoreland</u> her <u>deed of sale of this land to Samuel Earle</u>. [Westmoreland court Orders & 1705 to 1721, page 198; and deed book No. 5, page 74.] The deed describes her as of Cople parish and three thousand pounds of Major Francis' Wright, was John' Wright, Gent., that further comment upon the subject would be superfluous. It is equally clear that it was this same John' Wright, Gent., who in 1723 sold all of his "manour plantation" in Westmoreland and removed with his wife Dorothy and their two known young sons, Francis'

tobacco as the price she received, she having rented the land to William Wigginton, prior to selling it to Samuel Earle.

Among other records identifying this John Wright, planter, occurs: "27 May, 1702, Ellenor Mugmoreshea servi to John Wright planter, of Copely parish, had a . . . . child in his house. He assumed to pay her fine and save the parish harmless rather than lose her services, giving a bond therefor. The child, Mary Mugmoreshea, was bound to him until aged twenty-one, and the mother to serve him extra time to save her from corporal punishment. [Westmoreland Order Book 1698-1705, page 160.]

#### JOHN WRIGHT, THE OVERSEER, OF WESTMORELAND, 1659-1734.

He petitioned the court of Westmoreland, 25 January, 1691, to know "the bounds of his land on upper Mochotik and also that his father in law Rice Williams Thirds may be said out." [Court "Order Book 1090-1698," page 26.] At the same session (on the next page of the record), in the case of the King vs. Wright, he was charged to wit: "John Wright, overseer to Mr. Gawin Corbin for rideing abt, drinking & revelling in tyme of Divine Service," On pages 6 and 7 of Westmoreland Order Book 1690-1698; at the court of Jan. 29 and 30, 1690, this John Wright was brought before the court, by Francis<sup>2</sup> Wright, sherlff, for beating to death a horse. At that time Sherlff Francis2 Wright's son, John3, was aged about eight years. On March 21, 1691-2, the proprietary of the Northern Neck granted to him, "John Wright of Washington parish," one hundred and seven acres of land upon "Machotick dam," etc. formerly held by Joseph Hadnutt, deceased, escheated to said Wright. [Northern Neck Grants, volume 1, page 142, Land Office, Richmond, Virginia.] He deposed on November 26, 1701, that he was "aged about forty-two." [Westmoreland Deeds and Wills No. 3, page 15.] On June 30, 1709: "Ordered Virlandoe Wright, daughter of John Wright of Upper Machotique, mark of Cattle & Hoggs be Record-[Westmoreland Orders &c. 1705 to 1721, page 126.] On July 23, 1715, "Robert Hammett & John Wright both of Washington parish presented by the grand Jury for Retailing Liqr Contrary to Law," etc. [Westmoreland court Orders &c. 1705 to 1721, page 272 dorso.] The unhappy end of this John Wright is indicated by the entry, on March 28, 1734, on page 136 dorso of the said book, to wit: "John Wright a very ancient man petitioning this Court to be levy free, and it appearing that he was an Object of Pitty, It is therefore considered that he be hereafter Exempt from paying any future public tax or levy." The names of all of his children are not recorded in direct connection with his name; but the records of Aaron and William Wright, some of which are too unfortunate for further reference, leave little or no doubt as to their parentage. Charles Wright of Westmoreland, late of Prince William county, against whom nothing discreditable is found recorded, may have been an estimable son of John Wright the overseer, though recorded proof thereof is lacking; so one may accord to this Charles Wright the benefit of any doubt.

the Sum of fifty shillings for every hundred acres paid in to our treasury by John Wright have given and granted and by these presents do give and grant unto the said John Wright a tract of land containing 640 acres lying and being in our County of Surry on a branch of Hunting Creek" [the bounds given in the survey are recited] "together with all Woods, Waters, mines, minerals, Hereditaments and appurtenances thereunto belonging or appertaining to hold to the said John Wright his heirs and assigns for Ever Yielding and paying to us Such Sums of Money Yearly or otherwise as our General Assembly from time to time may direct provided always that the said John Wright shall cause this pact to be Registered in the Register's Office of our said County of Surry within 12 Months from the date Whereof, Otherwise the same shall be Void and of no effect in Testimony Whereof we have caused our great seal to be hereunto affixed.

#### Richard Caswell"

This grant was not a bounty awarded for services in the War of the Revolution, but purely by virtue of the fact that Captain Wright had previously settled upon and claimed the land, and upon request he paid the merely nominal sum of \$77.80 to the state, the law being that an original settler upon land previously unoccupied was entitled to that inducement and privilege whatever might have been the value of the land. The fact that this grant is recorded in book A at Dobson on the page preceding the grant to John Elsberry suggests that he and his next neighbor. Capt. Wright, journeyed together to the county court on the same day for the same purpose, unless one took the other's deed along. The Captain's daughter, Agatha, and John Elsberry's son, Isaac, had married five years before. Several other acquisitions of land by Capt. John<sup>5</sup> Wright were made, probably with a view to development by some members of his large family of eighteen children.

It was over three years before the county surveyor surveyed this land, and four-and-a-half years ere the full titular grant was. signed by the governor. Capt. Wright's son-in-law, Isaac Elsberry, and son, John<sup>6</sup> Wright, assisted Deputy-surveyor Speer in the survey as chain carriers:

Aged about sixty years Capt. Johns Wright died and was buried, if not in his own land, in the churchyard of either the Flat Rock V Creek Baptist chapel, more than a mile easterly of the Wright estate, or in the yard of the much closer Elsberry Chapel founded by his neighbor and his daughter Agatha's father-in-law, John Elsberry, and located where both still remain-near the ford of a branch of the North fork of Hunting Creek. The record of his death appears on a page of the family Bible of his son, Thomas" Wright, whose heirs when applying for the arrears due on Thomas's pension in 1853, tore out that page and sent it to the pension office as bearing evidence of their legitimate births and of the marriage of the said Thomas, the Bible page being now preserved among the pension papers of the said son Thomas' in file number 11899 at the U.S. pension office, Washington, D.C., and bearing among the eleven entries thereon the record, to-wit: "Father departed this life October 30, 1789." In that peaceful spot in the shadow of the forest are small old headstones from which any inscriptions they may have borne have disappeared.

Twenty-two days previous to his death Capt. Wright dictated and signed his will, now existing and recorded in the Surry will book for 1790, at Dobson.

The will of John Wright. Filed Paper.

"As it is Necessary Men should settle their affairs of Life before they Leave this Mortal Life, therefore I Make this my Last will and Testament." I give to My Daughters Lezebeth Arnold—Nancy Elliott, Agatha Elsbury, Amelia Martain, Lucrecia Petty and Frances Reiley all of them twenty Shillings Each—I give to my son Thomas Wright thirty acres of Land which is part of his plantation.

I give to My son Daniel Wright twenty Shillings.

I give to My son John Wright two hundred acres of Land Joining Lewis Elliott & Christian Williams Land Including the Field he now has a crop on & fether bead.

I give to My Daughter Sally Wright one bey Mair and saddle.

I give to my son William Wright & James Wright four hundred Acres of Land Lying on Deep Creek Joyning Tho<sup>®</sup> Jacks Land to be Equally Divided between them.

I give to my son Williams Wright two hundred and seventy acres of Land on which I Now Live but not to purcess\* but

\*possess.

one hundred during My wife's Life and that to Include the field on the South side of the Muster ground Branch that Runs thro the plantation—bounded on Sam<sup>1</sup>. Arnold's Land.

My will is that the surveyer Instruments be sold to buy a hors for uset of Estate.

it is my will and desire that my Loving wife Anne Should have and possess all the Rest of my Estate together with the plantation I Now Live on—save the one hundred acres Mentioned and Left to son Williams During his Life, and after to be Divided amongst my Children whose Names are under written Namly Sally Sukkey Peggey Polley William James Williams Rosey and Patsy Wright.

I Appoint my beloved Wife and son John Executor to this my Last will and Testament.

Given under my hand and seal in the year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and Eighty Nine and the Eight Day of October.

Though the original Wright house has been replaced by a different structure, the general aspect of the estate remains nearly as it was a century ago save for the enlargement of the rich cultivated area on which tobacco, maize and some cotton are produced. <u>Ann</u> (Williams) Wright, the widow and mother of Capt. John<sup>5</sup> Wright's eighteen children (alive at his death), is of further record, but the date of her death in her ninetieth year in 1825 is unknown; interment, however, is judged to have been beside that of her patriotic husband in a spot in the cemetery now indeterminate.

A brief but interesting account of John<sup>5</sup> Wright, reciting an experience of his in the War of the American Revolution, written in 1849 by the daughter of his daughter Frances, is extant. This Frances Wright, as will be established, married Gerrard Riley who removed from North Carolina, via Kentucky, to Bethel in Clermont county, Ohio. Zachariah Riley, his son, gave an interview on some family history in the 1870's. Nancy Riley, sister of Zachariah, and daughter of the said Frances' (Wright) Riley, kept a diary, and in it she wrote entries about her maternal grandparents, John<sup>5</sup> and Ann<sup>s</sup> (Williams) Wright. These entries are all continuous in the diary as one connected account. They not only confirm from an old and independent source, some of our facts about John<sup>5</sup> and Ann<sup>3</sup> (Williams) Wright, but add some intimate knowledge. However, one of the dates given by the diarist, Nancy (Riley) Clark, is subject to amendment when compared with the official records which we have gathered. The alteration, while not of great importance, must be accepted, and it is probable that the diarist trusted to her memory as to the date, unless an error has been made in making extracts from the diary. The following copy of the diary-entry is here presented through the courtesy of Miss Vessie Riley, of 513 N. Franklin St., Greensburg, Indiana, who

writes, under date of August 25, 1920, that the account sent us is a true copy of the entry as made by her in December, 1907, from a copy of the diary then in the possession of another descendant, the late <u>A. M. Sinke</u>, formerly of Bethel, Ohio, who had stated to <u>Miss Vessie Riley</u> in 1907 that he had personally known his grandmother, the said Nancy (Riley) Clark; Mr. Sinke's daughter, May, is the wife of Francis E. Crane, of 1335 Herschel Ave., Cincinnati, Ohio, principal of the Columbian school in that city. Miss Vessie Riley's extract from the diary of Nancy (Riley) Clark reads:

"Indian Hill, Clermont County, Ohio, February 14, 1849.

This book contains the genealogy of Houton Clark and his ancestors; also of Nancy Riley and her ancestors, which I have commenced to copy off from old books I have had many years; wherein I noted many things obtained from my grandfather, Ninnian Riley, my father Gerrard Riley and my mother Frances Wright-Riley.

#### [signed] Nancy Riley-Clark.

Gerrard Riley was a lad of seventeen when he with his parents moved to North Carolina.\* Soon after their arrival there was a call for volunteers to guard the settlement against the Tories or refugees as they were called. John Wright was the lesder and they mustered at his place. Wright led his little band out and guarded the settlement.

Some time afterwards, Mrs. Lucretia Whitlock, wife of one of his [John<sup>5</sup> Wright's] neighbors, fell in a trance. When she awoke she said the Tories would gain the day. She persuaded her husband and some of her neighbors to go join the Tories.

As soon as John Wright heard that some of his neighbors had started to join the Tories, and that his brother Babtist [Baptist], William Cook, had also gone he caught his horse

\*Gerard Riley went to North Carolina from Maryland with his father Ninian Sr. and grandfather Solomon Riley. It was James Riley of Montgomery county, Maryland, who on November 25, 1784, purchased 250 acres of land in North Carolina of Benjamin<sup>2</sup> Elsberry when the latter removed therefrom to Georgia. Gerard Riley was converted at the mammoth camp-meeting at Cane Ridge, Kentucky, where twenty thousand people assembled in 1799 or 1800. He and his uncle, John Riley (who married Sarah daughter of our ancestor Isaac<sup>4</sup> Elsberry) both became Baptist preachers. Gerard's gravestone at Bloomfield, Illinois, reads: "Gerard Riley, a Baptist Minister of the Gospel who died December 26, 1832." His widow, Frances<sup>6</sup> (Wright) Riley died in 1835 at Bethel, Ohio, where resided her son Zachariah Riley who died there in 1877. and rode all night after them. He overtook them at daylight after riding nearly forty miles through the dark night.

He tried to get them to come back, but they refused. Finally Cook returned with him, but Whitlock went on, joined the Tories, and was killed in a few days afterwards. So his wife's trance proved the loss of her husband.

While serving his country John Wright took a violent cold that settled on his lungs and caused his death, six or seven years afterwards. But he lived to see the end of the war, peace proclaimed and the eagle with her thirteen arrows and stripes over the free land of Columbia. This he desired and lived to see.

He had married Ann Williams in Farquier Co. Va., where they both were raised. They had eighteen children, six sons and twelve daughters. Several of them were married before they moved to North Carolina. They settled on Deep Creek, waters of the Yadkin River, where they both lived on the same farm until death; but their children moved to different states.

John Wright drew near his end, and while on his death bed he suffered much, but bore it all with Christian patience and was perfectly resigned to the will of God. When dying, and gone to all appearance, had ceased to breathe, his wife screamed out in the anguish of her heart. She could not give him up. He opened his eyes and said, 'my dear, it is you that keeps me here.' His oldest son took his mother out of the room and begged her not to make a noise. He then closed his eyes in death in his fiftieth\* year.

His wife was left with nine children living with her, and nine more that were married. Some lived near. Her oldest son, Thomas, was a Babtist and lived on an adjoining farm. She had a good farm and two old negroes. She lived on the same farm until her death, and raised her children. Some of them were very small when their father died. They all married and moved away,—some to Kentucky, some to Missouri, some to Alabama. Daniel a great farmer lives in Alabama now; James and family in South Carolina. John died in Florida, leaving two sons and one daughter. He had left his wife and daughter in Carolina. He divided his property giving half to his wife, took his two sons and moved to Florida. He died there leaving his two sons very rich.

Thomas represented Surrey Co. in the legislature. His mother wrote a letter with her own hand to one of her daughters\* in Ohio, six or eight months before her death, and it was well written. She died in her ninetieth year, and was a Babtist with her husband many years before his death. The most of her children were Babtists."

As twelve of the eighteen children of Captain John<sup>5</sup> and Ann (Williams) Wright were daughters the most of the descendants bore surnames other than Wright; the records of these children and some of their descendants are reserved for later publication, reference being made, at this moment to the daughter Agatha.

Agatha<sup>6</sup> Wright, daughter of Capt. John<sup>8</sup> and Ann (Williams) Wright (John<sup>4</sup>, John<sup>3</sup>, Francis<sup>2</sup>, Richard<sup>1</sup>) was born in Fauquier county, Virginia, about 1756, probably in the house of her grandmother Honour Williams, whose estate was then under the management of Agatha's father, and adjoining the "Pine View" estate of her grandfather, John' Wright, the "Gentleman justice." Agatha married Isaac Elsberry of Buck Shoal township, Surry county, N. C., in 1775, soon after she arrived there, the Elsberry estate therein adjoining that of her father. So seldom was she, like other good wives of good men, of public record that her character and life, like theirs, can be only perceived through the events recorded of her parents, husband and children. Hers may have been the heavier burden, hers the wiser counsel. Nine in number were her children who lived to maturity. In the year 1803, with them and her husband Isaac Elsberry, she made the great journey over the Blue Ridge to Ashe county, North Carolina; thence over the Appalachian mountains to the vicinity of Winchester, Kentucky, following Daniel Boone's trail; thence in 1805 or 1806 to Moscow and Bethel, Ohio. Burying there her husband in 1813 she ere long afterward, according to a formal written statement by the late George Washington Ellsberry, of Mason City, Illinois, 21 April,

<sup>\*</sup>Inasmuch as he was the father of eighteen children, and his death is recorded in the Bible of his son Thomas<sup>6</sup> Wright as on October 30, 1789, his will proved in May, 1790, and his own affidavit declares that he was married in 1753, it is evident that he was about ten years older at death. Also, as "he lived to see the end of the war, peace proclaimed," he could not have died in 1779 as has been imagined, for the war did not end until late in the year 1781 and the peace was not signed and proclaimed until September, 1783.

<sup>•</sup>This daughter was either Agatha<sup>6</sup>, then widow of Isaac<sup>4</sup> Elsberry, or Frances<sup>6</sup> wife of Gerrard Riley, both of whom were then (about 1824) in Ohio.

1902, reposed for the balance of her life in the home at Xenia, Ohio, of her eminent son, Hon. William Elsberry, who repeated, as a lawyer, judge, state legislator and congressional candidate, the successful predilection for public affairs that had made conspicuous her Virginian forebears. The U. S. censuses of 1830 and 1840 for Xenia both confirm her presence there as a member of her said son's household, and her age was given to the enumerator in 1830 as "between seventy and eighty" years, and in 1840 as "between eighty and ninety." She is understood to have died in 1845 or '46 aged eighty-five. She was the last, in our own line, of a long strong chain of Wrights, of whom the living descendants have reason to be proud, and doubly to feel warranted in making known, at large, the recoverable history of them as hereinbefore writ.

Such tax rolls as remain show Isaac Elsberry to have been in as comfortable circumstances as almost any other young man in Surry county, and there can be no doubt but what his early marriage to Agatha Wright was propitious and happy. So few records were made in Surry of men of private station like Isaac Elsberry, in his time, and not all of those that were made being now extant, what one does find preserved calls for exhibition, and all the more so because some of these tax records are the only existing official evidence of the presence in Surry of Isaac Elsberry for the periods which they cover.

Seven of the ten children of Isaac and Agatha<sup>6</sup> (Wright) Elsberry, living at the time of his death, were born in Surry county before the United States assistant marshal for the Salisbury district called upon Isaac for the enumeration of his family for the United States census of 1790. This visit was on or before the first day of June in that year. His eldest son, John, was then thirteen or fourteen years of age.

Seven years after Isaac Elsberry's father, John, had sold out in Surry for the removal to the north fork of the New river in Ashe county, Isaac still is revealed as residing in Surry; but the census of 1800 shows that two of his children were not then residing under his roof, one being John the eldest who had left after marrying Pamelia Husbands on 26 February, 1799, and appears in Ashe county in 1800 with his grandfather, John<sup>3</sup> Elsberry. The Surry census of 1800 is of particular interest at this moment as showing that on the first day of June, 1800, Isaac Elsberry had not reached his forty-sixth birthday, nor had his wife Agatha. This fixes the year of his birth as 1755 and is the only known record thereon as definite:

What shall be inscribed in honor and memory of Agetha, daughter of a "first family of Virginia," who brought to the religious Elsberry's that strain of refinement and intellectual force inherited from generations of gentlemen, justices, legislators and military and social leaders of the Northern Neck of Virginia, that strain that seems to have inclined so many of her descendants towards professional careers? Was she merely the mother of Isaac's children? Almost recordless though her long life was one pauses at the thought of the adventures she shared-from Fauquier to Surry, from Surry to Ashe, from Ashe to near Winchester, Kentucky, from there to Bethel and from Bethel to Xenia on the banks of the Little Miami. It has been observed that public records disclose little or nothing of the noble part played by women in the first two centuries of this country. One lady in referring to the settling by the Pilgrims "on a stern and rockbound coast" (as the poetess Hemans has it, though the shores of Cape Cod are quite flat and well-nigh rockless) remarked that "the women in the earlier days had a good deal to put up with." "Yes," added another, "they had to put up with the Pilgrim Fathers." Agatha put up with departing from her widowed mother, and seventeen brothers and sisters because Isaac was called to follow the trail of his son and father over the Appalachians to the New river. Three months after the marriage to Pamelia Husbands of his eldest son, John Elsberry, Isaac sold the unimproved one-half of his real estate preparatory to the removal, but it was

<sup>\*</sup>The alleged copy of this MS. printed by the state of North Carolina is very erroneous, and gives only two females in Isaac Elsberry's family, whereas the original MS. gives three.

more than four years later ere he sold the other "improved" half upon which stood his dwelling-house. The assertion\* that he removed to near Lexington, Kentucky, in the year 1799 cannot be true for he signed the final deed on September 26, 1803, as a resident of Surry county, and his deed then was there witnessed by his wife's brother Thomas<sup>6</sup> Wright. It will be noticed that the deed of May 4, 1799, bore the autograph of Isaac's eldest son, John Elsberry, as a witness then present in Surry, and also recalled that this son and his wife, Pamelia, absent from the Surry census of 1800, appear, as has been cited, with their grandfather John Elsberry on the New river. Thither they journeyed either after the month of May, 1799, or the following spring; and the inaccurate conception or tradition that Isaac Elsberry removed from Surry to Kentucky in 1799 may have arisen from this movement towards Kentucky by his son. The desire of Isaac, if not the decision, to depart from Surry may have been entertained at the time of the execution of the first of the two following deeds by which he sold for \$650, the land for which he originally paid the state of North Carolina about \$50:

#### [Witnesses] T. Wright Henry Hampton Proved in court at the February term, 1804.

Isaac Elsberry's father had died on the north fork of the New river six to nine months before the date, September 26, 1803, of this last deed. The event may have occurred in the winter, for it was not until after the time of ploughing and planting in the following spring of 1803 that Isaac is of record as having come over the mountains (difficult of crossing in winter) to Clifton on the north fork of the New river from Surry. He came to close up his father's estate, and remained there with his sisters, Elizabeth (Elsberry) Latham and Catherine (Elsberry) Maxwell, at least twenty-five days, then returned to his home in Surry, where four months later he had garnered the crops for that year and sold the last of his unmovable estate in that county. The two deeds of sale of the Ashe estate of his father have a genealogical value of the first importance, and were signed by John Elsberry's two sons-inlaw acting in behalf of their wives. The advisability of having absolute official record evidences of pedigree, wherever possible or convenient, prompts the presentation of these deeds in full. The copies are not of the original deeds, which Isaac Elsberry delivered to Robert King, but from the copies thereof made and entered in the county deed book by John McMillan, clerk of the circuit court of North Carolina for the county of Ashe. The odd spelling in these deeds of the surname of Elsberry must have been attributable to the conveyancer or lawyer who drew up the original documents, if not to the clerk who copied them later. The first deed is of land upon which the village of Creston now stands at the mouth

<sup>\*</sup>Stated by the late George Washington Ellsberry of Mason City, Illinois, great-grandson of Isaac Elsberry, and later repeated, as from him, by others.

Honor Williams. The marriage and parentage is proved by the plaintiff's filed "Bill of Complaint" by John Wright, Jr., in his suit in chancery against his mother-in-law, Honor Williams, et al, for the fulfillment by her of the marrage stipulation of a gift to him of some of her personal property, her husband Jonas having died, testate, in 1749. [Fauquier county court minute book, volume 2, page 9, etc., session of March 24, 1763]. This John<sup>5</sup> Wright, Jr., Gent., was commissioned as Captain of the Fauquier Militia and on July 29, 1763, "took the usual Oaths to his Majesties Person & Government and subscribed the Teste" before the justices of the county. [Fauquier court minute book, volume 2, page 152.] On April 17, 1771, this John<sup>5</sup> Wright, Jr., Gent., was commissioned by "the President and Masters of the College of William and Mary" as "Surveyor of the County of Fauquier." [Fauquier deed book No. 4, page 165.]

The removal of Capt. John<sup>5</sup> Wright, Jun<sup>r</sup>., Gent., from Fauquier county to Buck Shoal township, Surry (now Yadkin) county, North Carolina, is proven by various indications, among which are:

- (1) He disappears completely from Fauquier records (except in his father's will) immediately after his sale to Peter Grant of the last of his property in Fauquier county, 21 September, 1774, and his wife Ann's waiver of dower rights therein, October 10, and his acknowledgment of the deed in court on October 24 following.
- (2) He first appears of record in Surry county, North Carolina, in February, 1775, as defendant in an action at law brought by Joseph Crouch, in which John<sup>5</sup> Wright's son-in-law, Samuel Arnold, became one of the "sureties" named on the defendant's bond. [Surry county, North Carolina. filed court papers for February term, 1775; also, in "A Civil Docket for the County of Surry," book 1 (unpaged), "New Actions to Feb. Term 1775."]
- (3) In his will [recorded in office of clerk of the court at Dobson. North Carolinal. proved at the May term of court, 1790, of Surry county, North Carolina, he bequeaths to "my son Thomas Wright" of said county. This

son's deposition proving his own services in detail in the War of the Revolution and his right to a pension, dated 12 February, 1833, made before the justices of the court of Surry county, North Carolina, states, "I was born in Faquier County State of Virginia on the 18th day of Feby 1758," and filed with this affidavit now in the United States Pension Office is the original leaf of his family Bible bearing records of births, marriages and deaths, among which is the entry, "Father Departed this Life October 30, 1789." [See Pension Papers, file No. 11,899, at United States Pension Office.]

(4) In his said will John<sup>5</sup> Wright, Gent., and surveyor, directs that his "surveyor Instruments be sold to buy a horse"; also, he names therein "my loving wife Ann" (Williams) and their sons "Williams" Wright and William Wright" and daughter "Lezebeth Arnold" and her husband "Saml Arnold," who were married in Fauquier county, Virginia, September 5, 1771, before her parents removed to North Carolina. [See record of their marriage license bond in county clerk's office, Warrenton, Virginia.] This Elizabeth was the eldest daughter and probably named for her grandmother Elizabeth Wright.

This will of Capt. John<sup>5</sup> Wright, Gent., also names his eighteen children, all by wife Ann (Williams) Wright. Thus he and his brother William Wright, who died in Fauquier county, Virginia, in 1805, left between them thirty-two children. John's children named in the will are Lezebeth Arnold, Nancy Elliott, Agatha Elsbury, Amelia Martain, Lucretia Petty, Frances Reiley, Thomas, Daniel, Sally, William, James, Williams, Rosey, Patsy, Sukky, Peggey, Polley and John, Jr.

AGATHA<sup>6</sup> WRIGHT, the fourth-named child, was born in Fauquier county, Virginia, about 1756. She married Isaac Elsberry, son of John Elsberry, who resided upon an estate in Buck Shoal township, Surry (now Yadkin) county, North Carolina, soon after her arrival there from Fauquier county, Virginia, as her first son John was born in Surry county in 1776. The records of the Elsberrys are too numerous for present citation. Isaac and Agatha

# History Of Colonial Caroline 1/2.

Captain John Smith was the first white man to explore the territory which became Caroline County. He passed down the Pamunkey as a prisoner after his capture in 1607 while exploring the headwaters of the Chickahominy on the way to face iudgment before Opechancanough. He sailed on the "Discovery" up the Rappahannock in 1608 and later the same year visited Doguetown, the Indian village on the Mattapony near Milford.

Caroline's Rappahannock River Valley became the Virginia colony's frontier about 1665. Pirates more than Indians plagued the early settle:s. On one occasion irate frontiersmen chased a pirate named Peuman up a small stream and killed him by blows from the oars of Their boats. The stream since that time has been known as Peumansend.

Indians gave more trouble in the Mattapony valley. The Crown hired (William Merryeday) to build Ft. Mattapony near Bagby in 1678 to protect the settlers from the savages. Col. Nathaniel Bacon, Sr. commanded the garrison at the fort.

Many of Caroline's early settlers were fiercely independent in political thought. When the House of Burgesses expelled William Ryrd, Burgess from King and Queen, for refusing to take the oath of allegiance to Queen Anne in 1703, Byrd led his most ardent partisans to a new settlement in the great forks of the Mattapony beyond the frontier.

Robert Beverley, the historian, maintained a summer place on Beverley's run from 1705 until his death in 1720. Here he rewrote and prepared the second edition of his "History and Present State of Virginia", the first important critical work produced by a Virginian. The publication of this book broke the feudalist hold of the great landlords on the colony, and in the end kept Virginia from becoming another Haiti.

Governor Alexander Spotswood reached Robert Beverley's summer place by coach from Williamsburg late in the summer of 1716. From there the governor, Beverley and a group of other gentlemen made the celebrated ride on horseback across the Blue Ridge, which has become known in history as the Expedition of the Knights of the Golden Horseshoe.

In the winter of <u>1727 Francis Thornton presented a petition in</u> <u>Williamsburg</u> which asked the royal government to create a county by joining the western ends of Essex, Kinz and Queen, and King William The House of Burgesses and Council acted favorably on the petition and March 12 the governor signed the law which created Caroline County, named for Carcline the new queen of Britain.

A large colony of Quakers headed by John Cheadle arrived in Caroline, from Pennsylvania in 1739 and settled around Golansville. This was the largest Quaker settlement south of the Mason-Dixon line. It reached its zenith between 1760 and 1795 under the leadership of Samuel Hargrayc, a native of Caroline County.

Chesterfield, located between present day Ruther Glen and Carmel Church, was the trade c ntcr of Caroline's St. Margaret's Parish. Settlers from all sections of the upper end of the parish met here to take the ridge road to the Courthouse when St. Margaret's was a part of King William. The settlement remained the chief commercial center of the parish long after Caroline became a county.

Caroline Courthouse, located between present day Kidd's Fork and Collins' pond, was the commercial center of Drysdale Parish The Crown ordered the Courthouse built in 1731 after William Woodford, the sheriff, let a debtor escape from the basement of his manor, which the county used as a jail. Charles Bridges painted the king's arms on the Courthouse walls in 1739. This mainting was considered the finest mural in Virginia Betty Wyath Coleman upon request of the court, designed and made a standard for Caroline County. This flag flew from a flagpole on top of the Courthouse. Caroline is the only county known to ha e a flag or standard.

Port Royal was the metrorclis and the only chartered town in Colonial Caroline. John Buckner had a chartered tobacco warehouse on the site prior to 1700. This warehouse passed to John Roy and in time to John Roy's widow, Dorothy. Dorothy Roy was the only woman to have the franchise for a chartered tobacco warehouse in her name in Britain's American colonies. When the settlement which grew up about the warehouse was chartered a town in 1744, the Crown named it Port Royal in her honor.

Carcline through colonial times was closely tied to Britain. These ships made regular voyages between Port Royal and British ports; The Priscilla (1730-45), The Christian (1730-45), The Elizabeth and Anne (1730-50), The Virginia (1750-65), The Port Royal (1755-71), The Beverley (1760-75), The Molly (1765-76), The Favorite (1765-76), and The Olive (1765-76).

The stage line was the chief means of overland communication and transportation in colonial Caroline County. Head Lynch secured the charter to carry the mail from New Post in Spotsylvania to Norman's ferry across the Pamunkey when mail service from Boston to Charleston, South Carolina was inaugurated in 1737, and shortly thereafter Lynch began to carry passengers as well as mail. He made Needwood Tavern his headquarters and there established Caroline's first postoffice. Shortly before the Berolution, Robert Woolfolk purchased, Needwood Tavern and with the tavern secured the right to operate the stage and carry passengers and mail.

The merchants of Port Royal formed a guild to promote commerce in 1745. This was perhaps the first chamber of commerce in Virginia.

The most infamous crime ring in Colonial Virginia was uncovered in Port Royal in 1747. A gang headed by Patrick Welsh broke into churches as far away as Southampton and Surrey counties, stole the communion plate, brought the plate to Port Royal, broke it up and made it into counterfeit coinage. A few years earlier Alexander Sweeney passed through Caroline and sold base metal as gold bricks.

Caroline people played a leading nart in the settlement of the west. Residents of the county were stockholders in the four great, land companies formed for western development between 1747 and the Chesterfield, located between present day Ruther Glen and Carmel Church, was the trade c ntcr of Caroline's St. Margaret's Parish. Settlers from all sections of the upper end of the parish met here to take the ridge road to the Courthouse when St. Margaret's was a part of King William. The settlement remained the chief commercial center of the parish long after Caroline became a county.

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Caroline people played a leading part in the settlement of the west. Residents of the county were stockholders in the four great, land companies formed for western development between 1747 and the French and Indian War. Francis Thornton of Ormesby was among the 13 Virginians with stock in the Ohio Company. Benjamin Hubbard and Duncan Graham were among the 10 proprietors of a company chartered to develop 10,000 acres along the New River in southwest Virginia. John Bayler, Francis Thornton, Francis Thornton, Jr., John Dixcn, John Thornton and Charles Dix were shareholders in a company chartered to develop 800,000 acres along the North Carolina (now Tennessee) horder. Samuel Redd owned one-firth of a company chartered to develop 50,000 acres weat of the Ohio.

The Grand Lodge of Scotland chartered a Masonic Lodge at Port Royal in 1755. This was the second Masonic Lodge to be chartered in Virginia.

At least three Caroline men, William Woodford, II, Henry Wyatt and John Cge'trie, tought with Washington at P<sup>4</sup>. Necessity during the French and indian War. Wyatt was killed in battle. He was the first soldier of record from Caroline to give his life for his country.

During the major portion of the French and Indian War the Caroline militia. under the command of William Woodford, garrisoned Ft. Mindenhall in Frederick County on the frontier.

Caroline is the cradle of horse racing in America. Thomas Hoomes had a race track at the Bowling Green (Old Mansion) as early as 1675. John Baylor imported Fearnaught, the first thoroughbred to be brought to America in 1764 and ten years later John Hoomes imported another thoroughbred Sterling.

Rev. John Brunskill of St Margaret's Parish. addressed a petition tr. the king in 1757, which asked the Virginia law providing that parsons be paid in maper money rather than in tobacco, be annulled. This netition led to the Parson's Case tried in Hanover County five years later.

Caroline people took the taxation without representation issue, raised by the Stamp Act, literally in 1765 small planters, traders and artesans under the leadership of John Penn and Francis Coleman refused to let the court lay a tax levy. Penn and Coleman argued that since the Court was appointed by the Crown rather than elected by the neorle that any tax the court levied was taxation without representation.

Four hundred and sixty-six Negroes, the only shipload of Negroes brought to Virginia from Madagascar, arrived in Caroline in the 1730s. The bulk of Caroline Negroes came from the Guinea Ccast and the Gold Coast, but many mulattoes were brought into the county from the West Indies. These West Indians had five or six generations of civiliration behind them when they reached Caroline.

Caroline's first free Negro of record was in 1760 when John Gillison freed his Negro slave Daniel. Later Daniel sued a white man for assault and battery and the jury rendered a verdict in favor of the Negro. Hannah, a slare of Samuel Sutton, was the only person in Caroline County, white or Negro, to receive the king's pardon for a crime.

Rev. Jonathan Poucher of St. Mary's Parish led in the Christianization of Caroline Negroes On November 24, 1765 he baptized 115 Negro adults and on March 31, 1766, he bantized 313. Boucher also established Sunday Schools for Negroes and taught scores of Negroes to read and write. The fight for freedom of worship came to a climax in Caroline County hetween 1768 and 1774. Numerous Baptists of the county were imprisoned for teaching and preaching the Bosnel, without Episcopal ordination or a license. In 1772 the Bantists petitioned the House of Burgesses to be included with the Quakers and Presbyterians under the Toleration Act.

Edmund Pendleton of Caroline was president of the Virginia Committee of Public Safety prior to the Revolution and thus the first chief of state of Virginia independent of Britain. Pendleton was later president of the State Chancery Court. He presided over the convention at which Virginia ratified the Federal constitution and by his rulings from the chair forced Virginia into the union. This made possible the formation of the United States.

The Commonwealth of Virginia kept John Tayloe Corbin confined at the Reed's plantation in Caroline County for the duration of the Revolution because Corbin carried messages between Richard Corbin president of the council and last acting royal governor of Virginia, and Lord Dunmore the last royal governor, who had fled Williamsburg.

General William Woodford of Caroline defeated the British at the Battle of Great Bridges in 1775. This was the first decisive victory for American troops over the British regular army.

John Penn, a native of Caroline and a resident from 1741-74, signed the Declaration of Independence as a delegate to the Continental Congress from North Carolina. Penn left Caroline after a jury Tound him cullty and fined him one penny for making disparaging remarks about the king.

George Rogers Clark came to live in Caroline in 1757 when he was five years old, and Caroline was his home until 1784. After a series of brilliant victories in 1778 he drove the British from the Ohio Valley and saved the mid-west for the United States. Many of the men in Clark's small force were his Caroline neighbors.

William Clark, younger brother of George Regers Clark, was born in Caroline in 1770 and lived in the county until 1784. In 1803-06 in joint command with Merjwether Lewis he led an expedition from St. Louis to the mouth of the Ohio River and return. This was the first expedition to cross the continent under the American flag.

John Taylor was born in Caroline. in 1754 and lived in the county through his long eventful life. The served with distinction as an officer in the army during the Revolution and held many positions of trust. For many years he represented Virginia in the United States Senate and gained a national reputation as an advocate of states rights. In addition to politics he experimented with crops and became known as the father of modern American agriculture. His books on both politics and agriculture were widely read.

Caroline men largely manned the warship Mcsquito which preyed on British commerce in the West Indies in 1776 and 1777 until captured by the British man-of-war Adreadne and its crew sent to prison in England. Some of the crew escaped, crossed the English channel and joined John Paul Jones. Two of John Paul Jones' brothers lived for a time in Port Royal.

Caroline was the first Virginia county to cut her ties with Great Britain. Pendleton called the court fogether, and the justices and other county officials renounced the Crown and swore allegiance to the Commonwealth on July 11, 1776, when a messenger passed the county on the way from Philadelphia to Williamsburg with the news of the Declaration of Independence

It I Give to the poor of James City parrish ten pounds Sterl. to be Disposed of by my Loving wife Rachel and my Good friends W<sup>m</sup> Edwards and Capt. George Marrable or any two of them.

It I Give to Eliz the Daughter of John Jarrett fifty  $p^{ds}$  Sterl to be deposited in the hands of M<sup>r</sup> Micajah Perry of London mercht. till the said Eliz attain the age of Sixteen years or be married but if the said Eliz shall Die before she attain the aforesaid age or marriage then I Give the aforesaid fifty pounds sterl. to Johannah the wife of John Jarrett to be paid her or any other person by an order under her hand.

RELIGIOUS PREDILECTIONS.—That the Flournoy who settled in the city of Calvin was a Calvinist is true.

The immigrant Flournoys, in common with the other Huguenot refugees, conformed to the Episcopal Church, as by law established in the Colony, as the "Huguenot Emigration" shows.

The following extracts from the records of Briery Presbyterian Church, Prince Edward county, show that this branch early reverted to a more stalwart form of Calvinism than was to be found within the fold of the Established Church, and to this they have ever since adhered, it is thought.

"A Sketch of the History of Briery Presbyterian Church."

\* \* \* "Between 1755 and 1760, most probably, the church of Briery was organized by the Rev. Robert Henry." Accounts of various irregular supplies, then: "In 1766, a plan was adopted for establishing a permanent fund for the support of the Gospel. About three hundred pounds was obtained by subscription, and appropriated to the purchase of servants." (Evidently negro mechanics to hire out).

"In the appropriation of their funds many will think they erred, but it was the error of the age in which they lived, and their names and motives should be respected by their descendants."

Their names are as follows: "Mathias Flournoy, \* \* each £10; Thomas Flournoy, \* \* each 5 pounds; William Booker, \* \* £3 each; William Rivers, Richard Rivers, \* \* £1 each."

In the account of the ministers, trustees, elders, etc., appears: "In January, 1828, Mr. James W. Douglas began to preach, as stated supply, engaged for six months."

A list of the officers and private members of Briery Church:

#### " MINISTERS."

"Rev. Robert Henry settled about 1760, died about 1766."

The ninth minister is "James Walter Douglas, settled January 1, 1828, served all the Sabbaths per month, died December 28th, 1828."

Among the Trustees appears, "6th William Booker, died "-no date. Among the members is No. "45 Matthews Flournoy, withdrew, died "no dates. No. "46, Eliz. Flournoy, wife of Matthews, died "-no dates.

Evidently she died a member of that Church; he had withdrawn, probably to go "West" to Kentucky. This coincides with the idea of her death having occurred before he went west, as she did not sign the deeds he made in selling his lands.

No. "64" is "Col. Thomas Flournoy, died "-no date. "65, Anne Flournoy, wife of Thomas, died June 1814."

No. "219, Ann C. Flournoy, wife of John J. 241. Received Apl. 1811." No. "241, John J. Flournoy, son of Thomas, received July 7th, 1822,

#### VIRGINIA HISTORICAL MAGAZINE.

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MARY FLOURNOV (Booker): She was the 8th child of Jean Jacques Flournoy, born Feby. 23d, 1735. Married William Booker, of Prince Edward county. Died between Sept. 8th, 1798, the date of her will, and April 21st, 1800, the date of its record in the clerk's office at Farmville, Va.

The will of Wm. Booker, her husband, is dated Aug. 20th, 1783, and was recorded Oct. 20th, 1783, in county court clerk's office, Farmville, Va. This will mentions the following children: (1) Gideon Booker; (2) Jane Davis Booker, the wife of Jacob Morton; (3) Mary W. Booker; (4) William Flournoy Booker; (5) John Booker; (6) Thomas Booker; (7) Elizabeth Julia Booker; (8) Frances Booker; (9) Rebecca Booker; (10) Nancy Booker.

The will of Mary Booker, his widow, mentions the following children: (1) Gideon Booker; (2) Jane Davis Morton; (3) Mary W. Booker; (4) William Flournoy Booker; (5) John Booker; (6) Elizabeth Julia Green; (7) Rebecca Smith.

Booker: The "Huguenot Emigration to Virginia," page 48, mentions among those who came "In ye fourth Shipp," "John Leroy booker, and his wife and one Child." It is reliably stated that since 1757 the Booker family has had representatives in Amelia and Prince Edward counties.

THOMAS FLOURNOY: Was the 6th son and youngest child of Jean Jacques, born Nov. 28, 1738.

From this one of the brothers can be traced the descent of the present generation of the Prince Edward-Brunswick Flournoys. He married Ann Martin. Who she was or where she came from cannot be ascertained from the records.

Thomas Flournoy's will was recorded Feb. 16th, 1801, in Will Book 3, page 204. From it it appears that his wife Ann survived him. They were the parents of: (1) David Flournoy; (2) John James Flournoy; (3) Elizabeth Julia Flournoy; (4) Mary Flournoy: (5) Ann Flournoy; (6) Lucy Faris Flournoy; (7) Marcia Martin Flournoy, and possibly another son. No copy of his will was furnished for publication.

The tracing of the descendants of these will be deferred for the present, as the information is as yet too general and lacks minuteness in many essentials.

For the greater part of the foregoing information concerning the Prince Edward-Brunswick Flournoys, the compiler is indebted to Col. J. P. Fitzgerald, of Farmville, Va., whose wife is of the descent. Col. Fitzgerald is yet at work on this matter, and care will be taken to compile with such minute accuracy as to dates, localities, etc., as will obviate the confusion that would otherwise arise from the recurrence of the same names, John James, David, Mathews, Julia, Josiah, Francis, etc. The Brunswick county, Va., Flournoys are of the Prince Edward branch.



The above will of Jonathon Davis was probated Wake County, N.C. in 1819, where there was a John Yarborough Whose will was signed and probated in 1785 (YFM 3/7) He was the John Yarborough which named his wife as Verer, and had sons John, Meredith, Charles, Jeriah and a dau. Agga. Is it possible that Yarborough's of Wake County, N.C. and the Davis family are inter-related? And, that the Yarborough's of Fairfield County, S.C. and the Havis family are allied, and that these are two separate lines? One in N.C. and the other in S.C. but with similar names.

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#### YFM Format

Because of a few comments regarding the small type size in Vol. 2, Nos. 5 and 6, I had the type increased to this size beginning with Vol. 3, No. 1. This is just about as big as I can use and leave a left margin adequate for binding. If this is still too small for comfortable reading, let me know, and I can try different spacing between the lines (as on pages 95 and 96, Vol. 2). However, if I use the wider spacing it will reduce the amount of material I can print by about one-third (40 lines per page, as opposed to 60 lines per page), meaning that it will take a third more pages to publish the same volume of material now being published.

### NORTH CAROLINA YARBOROUGH WILLS

You may have noticed that in the last several issues only North Carolina wills have been given. I still have several N.C. wills in my file, and intend to use all of them (one per issue) before giving wills from other states. This will aid in the discussion of our elusive North Carolina and Tennessce ancestors.

WESTERN TENNESSEE AND NORTH CAROLINA YARBOROUGHS

In the last number I was discussing north-central North Carolina families (Orange, Caswell, Person, Granville, Warren, and Franklin Cos.). Wake Co. is in the same general area of the state. Notice that the 1785 Wake Co. will of John Y. (YFM 3/7) names son "Merady" (a phonetic spelling of Meredith), and that Meredith appears in the 1790 Wake Co. federal census (YFM 3/5). Of further interest is the appearance in Stewart Co., Tenn. of a 47 year old Meridith Y., born in N.C., in the household of Thomas

Wyatt (Tennessee Pederal Census of 1850, household \$17). As we know, many Yarborough families in North Carolina and Tennessee during this period had Williams, Samuels and Jameses, but probably there was just one family using Meredith, the name being unique. Therefore, I think that it is safe to conclude that the Meridith who turned up in Stewart Co. is a descendant of John Y. of Wake Co. So we can see that we have Yarboroughs in Montgomery and Stewart Counties from Halifax Co., N.C. (George, Moses, James & William); from Wake Co., N.C. (Meridith); and from Anson Co., N.C. (Joel & Davis). This brings us down to Richard, William, Samuel & James of Stewart Co.

Anson Co. had a Richard Y., who was deeded and deeded property there from 1757 to 1786 (YFM  $3/12 \le 13$ ), and is associated in the Anson Co. deed records with Joel, Humphrey & William, who were apparently, as I will show later, members of the Ambrose Y. clan.

Halifax Co. had a Richard Y., who was listed in its 1790 federal census (YFM 3/6).

A Richard Y. is first found in Stewart Co. records in 1808 (YFM 2/91). No Richard is listed the Anson Co. Federal Census of 1800, although his contemporaries, Humphrey, Jonathan and Davis are listed, which indicates that the Richard of Anson Co. had passed on to his reward before that year. Assuming that Richard of Anson Co. was at least 21 years old when he first decded property in 1757, then he would have been at least 50 years old as of 1786 (the year of his last recorded Anson Co. transaction), and if he was the Richard Y. who appears in the Stewart Co. records of 1808, he would have been at least 72 years old at that time. This leads me to believe that Richard Y. in Anson Co. and Richard Y. in Stewart Co. are different persons.

The Richard Y. in Halifax Co. is listed in the 1786 state census as being 21-60; is listed in the 1790 federal census as being over 16; is listed in the 1800 federal census as being 45 up; and is finally listed in the 1810 state census as being 45 up. If he was residing in Halifax Co. in 1808, would he have been involved in a lawsuit over a still in Stewart Co., Tennessee (YFM 2/91)? Perhaps. I suppose that we should try to get some additional details on this lawsuit. Maybe the court records give his residence. I might add that I did not find any Stewart Co. tax enumerations or land deed records on Richard in Stewart Co., which may be an indication that he did not actually live there.

Another interesting note: in the 1800 federal census of Halifax Co. we find a James Y., George's widow, Elizabeth, a William, Daniel, and John, Sr., along with Richard, while in the adjoining county, Warren Co., 3 Williams and a Jesse are listed.

In the next issue I will discuss the 3 1800 Warren Co. William Yarboroughs, and will identify each of the 4 1790 North Carolina federal census Williams and the 2 1790 South Carolina federal census Williams.

**Ends Search Here** 

By Ray McAllister Times-Dispatch Staff Writer Benjamin Pranklin Yarborough was 34 year's old, with a wile and a year-old son, when he left **Banardown** N.C., on July 18, o 1862. He joised Company A. 14th North Carolina Infantry Regient of the Confederate army.

His family never heard from him again. Neither his wife nor

his son stor learned what happened to him. 1. Indeed, what happened to Y arborough after he left home on that surpror day more than a contury ago ramained a mystery to generations of his family.

Each generation that visited the family grave site in Gray's Creek could see his grave, next to those of his wife, his son and his son's wife, Yarborough's grave was empty, waiting for him.

The soldier, it had been assumed, was killed in the Civil War. But no notification had ever been received, no records seen and to body found.

IN APRIL 1977, Curtis Bowen took his parents home to Gray's Creek. They then lived in Baltimore and had not been back in 15

years. His father was old and not moving well any longer. His mother had thyroid cancer and was soon to die. They would not get another chance.

Once there, of course, they visited the cemetery, which was on land donated by the family. Bowen and others in the Yarborough family saw the grave of

Benjamin Franklin Yarborough, his great-grandiather who had disappeared nearly 115 years before. They talked pf the countiest searches, all unsuccessful, for information about

With that in mind, Bowen asked if he could go through the family's old papers, which had been stored in a trunk and virtually lorgotten.

He found a letter written in August 1891 - more than 29 years after the soldier left home - by a son of a friend of Yarborough's widow. The letter offered some information to Sarah Blake Yarboroug

HER HUSBAND, the letter writer had said, bad been reported to have been near Winchester, VA., hundred of miles north of her home. Apparently he was killed there.

There wasn't much more for Bowen to go on. Returning to his home in Frederick, Md., he stopped in Winchester to talk to a friend about the missing soldier. The friend couldn't help. But he gave him the name of a Winchester historian who might be able

Bowen reformed a few weeks later.

In desperation, Bowen went to the National Archives in Washington. He spent several hours going through microfilmed records.

Yarborough, the records showed, had survived the Battle of Antietam, But two weeks later, after Lee's Army of Northern Virginia had retreated into Virginia, Yarborough contracted typhoid fever.

The company commander's report listed Yarborough as ab-sent from duty for health reasons. He was believed to have been sent to a Winchester hospital.

But a later report indicated that Yarborough had been sent by train to St. Charles Hospital in Richmond.

The pospital is long since gone, but records confirmed that (arborough was admitted Oct. 3, 1862. He died any 1601 typhold and acute dysentery, according to a report from the medical literator's office Yarborough was admitted Oct. 3, 1862. He died director's office. -

BUT THERE WAS NO INDICATION of what happened to the body.

Logically, Bowen assumed, he would have been buried in Richmond, probably with other war dead: He checked the archives here for cemeteries containing Civil War dead. Then be checked the records of two cemeteries without finding any

The historian said there had been no major battles in Winchester, shortly after the time Yarborough enlisted. But he suggested that, If Yarborough had entered the Confederate army in mld-July 1862, he may well have been involved two months later in the Battle of Antietam, fought just inside the Maryland line near Sharpsburg.

That battle, the bloodiest day in the war, resulted in about 23.-000 casualties. It also marked Gen. Robert E. Lee's first setback

In Northern territory. The historian suggested that Bowen try the library at the Antletam National Battlefield Site Center.

BOWEN DID, and learned that the 14th North Cerolina fought at what was called Bloody Lane. The ominous name was wellearned. Half of the regiment was killed or wounded there repelling Union attacks.

Bowen checked local cemeteries. The graves of men from the 14th North Carolina were plentiful. But none had Yarborough's name. Of course, many from the regiment had been buried together, without names on the makers,

There was no way to tell.

I In the records of the third, Oakwood Cemetery, he learned that a B.F. Yarborough of Company A. Ifth North Carolina, was burled in the cemetery.

To be sure that he had found the correct man, Bowen went to North Carolina to check the state's archives. Only one B.F. Yar-

borough, he found, had ever served in the 14th North Carolina. In fact, only one B.F. Yarborough from the state had ever served in the Confederate army.

Bowen found another tidbit of identifying information, written by hand in the margin of a page. Mrs. Yarborough had received a small pension in the 1890s, 30 years or more after ber husband died. ----

THIS, IT SEEMS, was the correct man. The detective work was done.

Yarborough could be brought home to be buried next to his wife.

Whether he will be - or even whether he can be - is a matter that will have to be decided in Richmond Circuit Court. Richmond has said it will need a court order before it will exiume the body.

In fact, the city is not sure the body can be found or exhumed. It has no records on whether Yarborough's body was buried in a casket or just put in the ground, buried alone or with others.

Bowen and seven others in the family - five of Yarborough's grandchildren and three great-grandchildren - went to Rich-mond Circuit Judge Marvin F. Cole Friday for the order. Cole said he will issue it if the family's lawyer can prove he has the legal authority to do so and if "probing" devices can prove that the body can be found and removed.

"We're a close-knit family," said one of the greatgrandchildren, Norma B. Moran, whose husband, Roanoke lawyer Leroy Moran, is handling the court work.

The family, she said, knows how her brother, Curtis, felt as he did the detective work that led to finding how Yarborough died.

"He just sensed what it must have been like [for Yarborough] to be lying there in that hospital bed, dying and having no way to tell his family where he was or what was happening to him. ...

"We all just want to bring him home where we think he belongs."

Cousin Curtis Bowen of Frederick, Maryland, is the "Civil War 'Detective'" here, and an ardent Yarbrough Family researcher. Cousin Curtis is almost a permanent fixture in the research room of National Yarbrough Conferences. Studious in his own family line search, he is always ready to lend a hand to other family members. Additional material on the "Bejamin Yarborough Story" will presented as space permits. Curtis is seeking and would appreciate any information on the parents of John and Verer and their connection to the immigrant. Editor's note.

THE MONTGOMERY COUNTY NORTH CAROLINA YARBOROUGHS.

As there has been several books written on the Yarboroughs in general we will only give you a brief outline of emigrent Yarboroughs coming into this County.

1

I will attempt to discuss the Yarboroughs who came to Montgomery County North Carolina and either stayed here or ventured on to other states.

A brief history of the Yarboroughs before North Carolina and Montgomery County. The Emigrent Richard Yarborough came to this country and settled in the area in and around Petersburg Virginia. From this early 1635 imigration to Virginia from Lincolnshire, England the imigration to the Carolinas began to take place somewhere around the early 1700's. Early settlements in North Carolina were Halifax, Franklin, Orange, Wake and Chatham Counties.

The first Yarboroughs to come to Montgomery County settled in the Loving Hill section on Indian Branch and the earliest graves are located on this property. John Yarborough who married Joanna Chambers in Wake County in 1777 was the son of John Yarborough and Verer Yarborough who we have been unable to find anything about.

17.74 bebre John came to Montgomery County, and After the death of his Father John in Wake County on or about the earlier 1785 his younger brother Charles came to live with him until about 1794 when he married a Disnie Cochran who lived in the same general area but a little closer to the present day town of Candor. He and his wife being buried on the old homeplace which at present has no markers.

We will attempt at this time to give you a census year by year account with a breakdown an explanation of each.

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

As an interesting feature I would like to relate a few of the interesting stories told by different family members. The first story relates to David B. Yarborough as told to me by Mrs Bertha Poole of Jackson Springs, North Carolina.

It seems that Mr Yarborough was a Constable in the Thickety Creek area of Montgomery County. One night at kind of a late hour a man came to the door of Mr. Yarborough and told him he had something to show him and wanted him to tell him what to do with it. When he opened the bag there was the decapitated head of a Colored man. It is not known what he advised him to do with it other than maybe, bury it.

Another story that has been handed down through the family relates to another family member named Elisha Yarborough.

It seems that the family was sitting around the house late one evening after darkness had arrived and it seems that someone said something about they would like a watermelon. The watermelon patch was not too far from the house and Elisha volunteered to go to the patch and get a watermelon. After a considerable length of time Elisha did not return with the watermelon and the family became disturbed and decided to go looking for him. There being no means of any bright artifical lights they were unable to locate him in the darkness. After a considerable length of time the search was abandoned to be resumed the next morning. At first light the next morning, the family members was back to the patch where they found Elisha lieing in the field dead. He had been mauled by a Bear. The family was deaply greived and Elisha was laid to rest the next day. The family lived near the McCallum graveyard near Candor, North Carolina where he is buried.

Mrs. Mollie McDonald of Route #1, Candor, North Carolina related the following story along with many others we will try to print.

The Yarborough family first arrived in the Montgomery County area in the later part of the 1700's and were prosperous by the standards of that day. However, there was a severe drought about the year 1848 and thing were so bad that the family did not make a crop that year and were unable to feed themselves and had to make other arrangement for the Winter. The Family of John Yarborough moved to Fayetteville, Cumberland County, North Carolina, where they worked in a Cotton Mill that year and returned the following year to their home in Montgomery County, North Carolina. This accounts for some members of the family such as Joshua and Deborah Yarborough living in the Fayetteville area of North Carolina. After their return from Fayetteville it seems that the family was able to resume their life here and many of their children married and raised families in the same general area in which many members live today.

I will attempt now to give a family by family breakdown of the family of John and Verer Yarborough of Wake County, North Carolina who arrived and lived in Montgomery County North Carolina.

John Yarbocough wife of Joanna Chambers Yarborough. The following appears in his file: John Yarborough (R11925) Wife Joanna nee Chambers. Married to John in Wake Co. near the close of the cavolation. No documentary papers found to substatiate her claim for a pension for the services of her husband. The following condensed facts were brought out in the affidavits of Henry inorrison? Madison? H. Yarborough, John Spoon, Sarah McCaskill, John Mannison and others. That Henry was her son, that she was then residing in Montgomery County near the Wake Co. line and that she was born about 1758 or '59. The date of these affadavits was the 28th of Harch 1856. She died in Montgomery Co., N. C. 29 March 1850, being then nearly 100 years of age. John died in Chatham Co., in 1813. His wife mon to omeny at the time of her affidavits was supported by her children and a small appropriation made by 'Iontgomery Co.. Henry H. Yarborough deposed that his father John had cold him that he, John, was in the Battle of Blackwater Bridge on the Cape Fear River not far from FAyetteville; that he fired many rounds in that battle and was not wounded though some of his comrades were wounded and others killed; that he also fought against the forces of Archibald Clark, a Tory leader and saw

Clark fall shot through the body; that he saw Clark's sister , Sally, remove him from the field to their home where she nursed him back to health. The following children where born wilsin to John and his Wife Joanna: William, Joel, Fannie, Mary, with and in Henry H., Betsyyy, John died prior to his Mother, Larkin, - Mary, with Wilson and Sally. These last 3 children left the state and fister was never heard from since their departure. The application the for a pension was denied and she died without receiving the for the further assistance.

The Civil War.

Many men of the Yarborough clan served in the war between the states but we will only give you a few sample of information found in the files of men from Montgomery County, North Carolina.

Some time ago I decided to write a history about the family that would link our direct line with the original immigrant to America. It seemed to be a simple straightforward project but it soon became more time consuming than I ever dreamed imaginable. The major problem stems from the fact that many of the earliest and most crucial court records were unfortunately lost or destroyed so alternative methods had to be utilized. Eventually I came to the realization that I had to become knowledgable about all branches of the Yarborough family if there was any hope of overcoming the obstacles I encountered in tracing my personal line. That also implies being acquainted with their friends, their neighbors, as well as allied families who were linked by marriages. This could only be accomplished by tracking down personal family records such as bibles, letters, wills, deeds or by reviewing published genealogies, parish records etc. It is a painfully slow process that will test one's patience and resolve but from these documents there gradually emerges vital information on family members, their births, marriages, deaths and even migratory patterns as well as a host of other information. Fortunately I have not only the interest but the determination to complete the job because of the importance I attach to family. I cannot help but feel that when we come to the end of the road the last thing we hold dear is the memory of those we truly cherish. We have a rich heritage and that appreciation has only been strengthened as I become more aware of the struggles, the sacrifices, and contributions made by our ancestors. Perhaps it will also be an inspiration to you.

The enclosed material is a brief summary and documentation of nine generations from John and Verer Yarborough in the 1760's to my grandchildren in 1986. The final pages will present an overview of what is generally known of the Yarboroughs in Europe from 850 AD to the time the immigrants landed in the 1600's. I discuss some general views held by family genealogists with regard to the early Yarborough families as well as my reservations. Finally, I present some exciting clues which may eventually link us with our immigrant. Since it may take years to complete the task I decided to pause in midstream and prepare this booklet. The final product will be handled professionally but at this point I felt it more important to get some basic information on paper. If events should prevent me from completing the project, others could pick up from here. Perhaps it will even reach those who can supply the vital information we need. In any event you can be sure that it is a work of love that I want to share with the family because I feel truly fortunate just to have been a part of the Yarborough family.

Lelia Mae Yarborough was born on August 7, 1899 in Gray's Creek near Fayetteville in Cumberland County, N.C. The following year her parents purchased app. 1,000 acres of a nearby plantation called "Midway Farms". It was here that Franklin Curtis Yarborough and his wife Romelia raised eight children. There were five boys and three girls with Lelia Mae, my mother, being the youngest daughter. Raising a large family is never an easy chore but then again neither was life on a farm. It takes a lot of hard work and dedication but they managed to do it successfully. Romelia assumed the responsibility of the children and the home while Franklin worked the farm. Before long they had established themselves as a prominent family and Franklin was recognized as one of the most progressive farmers in the area. His positive approach made him a respected leader and he went on to serve as Commissioner for Cumberland County where he was known for his support of education.

In spite of their success, there were many difficult moments but the Yarboroughs were not ones to complain. On one occasion my father asked Franklin what he was going to do if the drought killed his crops. He simply said he would do the best he could and try again next year. This positive flow of energy created the sense of confidence that permeated the very core of this family. At an early age the children learned to work hard and to take on responsibility. My mother was proud of the fact she could earn ten cents a day working in the cotton field. It not only gave her a sense of accomplishment but it enabled her to feel that she could meet life on its own terms and win. The day came when she eagerly embarked upon the biggest challenge of her life as she went off to Caroline College where she majored in music and became an accomplished pianist.



#### SUMMARY

- 1. On Nov. 3, 1852, Malcolm Murchison J.P. came to the home of the widow to take application since she was nearly 100 years of age. Under oath she stated that she was the widow of John Yarborough who joined the militia in Wake County N.C. where he was a resident. She thought he served about 3 months under Capt. McDaniel and fought in the battle of Black Water Bridge on the Cape Fear River near the town of Fayetteville, N.C. After he returned from war they married in Wake County N.C. on Jan. 12, 1777 where they lived for two years before moving to Montgomery County N.C. in 1779. They remained there until his death on Sept. 9, 1822. ( Note: Date on tombstone was 1821 even though approximate dates of 1819 and 1822 have been mentioned elsewhere). She never remarried and when Montgomery County appropriated a small sum for her support they advised her that as widow of John Yarborough she was eligible for his pension since Signed Joanna x Yarborough March 4, 1836.
- 2. Henry Yarborough states under oath that he is the son of John and Joanna and is now 53 years of age. He often heard his father speak of serving in the Revolutionary War under Capt. McDaniel and the battle at Black River Bridge. He understood that he was discharged after some three months of service. His father died Sept. 19, 1822 leaving his mother Joanna as widow. Signed 11.3.1852 Henry Yarboro
- 3. Malcolm Gillis also stated on Nov. 3, 1852 that he was well acquainted with John Yarborough for more than 20 years prior to his death. Joanna was his widow and they had 5 children. (Note : Evidently referred to living children because Joanna and Henry later named 10). He named Henry Yarboro as a man of good character and indicated that Joanna was in need of assistance. Signed - Malcolm x Gillis
- 4. On June 28, 1853 Joanna appears before James Batten, Magistrate and repeated her story but said she had no documentary evidence of proof of his service nor proof of their marriage. She then said that John died Sept. 9, 1819 in Montgomery County N.C. and she remained a widow.
- 5. Sara McCaskill appeared on the same day and stated she was about 60 years of age, raised in Montgomery County and had known John and Joanna as man and wife for 50 years. They lived together with great satisfaction raising a large family of children understood to be born in lawful wedlock. Signed Sara x McCaskill
- 6. Malcolm Gillis states on June 28, 1855 that he was about 77 years of age, was born and raised in Montgomery County and knew John for some 30 years as a good neighbor before he died. He always heard that John served in the U.S. Army for 6 or 12 months and believes that he was honorably dischared. John was reputed to have married Joanna Chambers and had a number of children in lawful wedlock, several of whom are now living and whom he knows well. Joanna remained a widow and is reputed to be about 100 years of age and resides with her children about 4 miles from affiant and is supported by 2 unmarried daughters. Signed Malcolm x Gillis

- 7. On Dec. 8, 1852 Mr. James Mendenhall of Jamestown in Guilford County, N. had written Mr. J. E. Heath, Commissioner of Pensions sending the clair of Joanna Yarborough for processing and indicated that she was very ager and afflicated in body. On July 20, 1853, he followed up with a letter to J.P. Waldo indicating that he had done what he could to satisfy his request that John and Joanna marriage and service claims be more fully proved. He again stated that there was no doubt he was in the war and Joanna was in need of the pension to which she was entitled. In referrto Malcolm Gillis and Sarah McCaskill he stated that these aged and respectable people bear proof of Joanna's entitlement.
- 8. On January 11, 1854, George C. Mendenhall, father of James, wrote an impatient letter to Mr. Waldo stating his response to his son on Sept. 14, 1853 was unsatisfactory. You claim that the claimant only alledges 3 months service but her words say she was unable to state the exact time but now believes he served more than 3 months, that he served some years. Malcolm Gillis, a respectable and worthy old man testified he was sure he had served more than 6 months and he thinks more than 12 months and understood he was honorably discharged. He begged them to reconsider. He also pointed out that the evidence on file was so strong that it would not only establish their marriage but be sufficient to recover in a Court of Justice in North Carolina. The claim is good but must have been overlooked in the process of business. Flease answer to this office-- Hon. John Kerr is our Representative in Congress. Signed George C. Mendenhall.
- 9. George Mendenhall also refers to another letter from Mr. Waldo writter Hay 17, 1853 where Waldo says that John Yarborough's service is not sufficiently proved, that there is no evidence to time and place of marriage to Joanna nor of his death. Hendenhall says that testimony of witnesses established the evidence as far as can be in any human tribunal- for surely it is not to be expected that after 3/4 of a century we are to bring persons who actually served with him. This lady is very aged with two aged and almost helpless single daughters with her. I earnestly ask that the claim receive early attention and be allowed. Signed - G. C. M.
- On April 28, 1854 Wm. J. Clarke, Comptroller State N.C. verifies that John Yarborough received payment designated as Vol.C entry 1429 and 2092. Also in Book No 3 pg. 38 and Book 10 p. 43. Hr. George Mendenhall writes Hr. Waldo and sends proof which he hopes is satisfactor so that poor old Joanna, his widow, who is now in sight of the very last mile of life will draw her pension. He points out that John could not have made that much money as a soldier unless he served long enough to entitle his widow to the pension unless the government paid better then than it does now. I hope by early mail to be notified that this old lady is placed on Pension Roll and to draw from 1836. Signed - George C. Mendenhall.

He indicated that he was a citizen of Moore Cty. and under oath states he is 85 years of age next August and that he formerly lived in Montgomery Cty. N.C. He stated he knew John Yarborough and his wife Joanna well, as long as 55 or 56 years and they were well understood to be man and wife lawfully married. He is informed and believes that John was a Revolutionary soldier. Signed -John McLeod.

- 12. On May 17, 1856, Mr. John D. Spoon of Guilford County, N.C. under oath stated that he was well acquainted with John Yarborough in Montgomery County N.C. about 50 years ago and he died leaving his widow Joanna. Everyone understood he had served in the Revolutionary War and he was considered a man of character and truth. This affiant is not old enough to know anything about his services but he is satis-fied that he served in the war with Great Britain just as General George Washington had. He had many acquaintances in various counties in the region but he never heard of any other John Yarborough being a Revolutionary soldier other than the husband of Joanna. He died some 35 years or more thence and that John and Joanna Lived as man and wife. All his children were understood to have been in lawful wedlock. Signed-John D Spoon.
- 13. On August 28, 1856, Henry H. Yarborough made the following statement: He was a resident of Hontgomery County, N.C. and by law was responsible for obtaining for himself and his brothers and sisters, the children and heirs of Joanna Yarborough, deceased, the arrearages of pension money due under Act of Congress passed July 7, 1838 as their mother was entitled being widow of John Yarborough. He said she applied first under the Act of 1836 but it should have been under the Act of 1838. She had stated before James Batten, Acting J.F. Montgomery County, N.C. that she was the widow of John Yarborough late of said county who died Sept. 9, 1819 where he resided. She married him shortly after the close of the Revolutionary War but could not remember precise date being nearly 100 years old. He was a private (Soldier) who served under Copt. McDaniel but she had no documents for evidence as to when he joined or was discharged nor for their marriage. Henry said he really believes the Declaration of his mother to be correct and true. He often heard his father tell of being in the Revolution and spoke of Black Water Bridge Battle on the Cape Fear River below Fayetteville. He shot 3 rounds with his musket and was never wounded but a number were killed. He spoke of fighting against Archibald Clark who was among the Tories and saw that he was shot through the body. His sister Sarah Clark went and nursed him bringing him home where he lived many years. Henry knew Sarah Clark well because she lived in Montgomety Cty. many years near his father before moving to Hoore County where she died about 10 years thence. He heard her speak of going after her wounded brother Archibald Clark to the battleground but he has been dead many years. Henry understood his parents were married in Wake County, N.C. and it was from Wake that his father volunteered prior to getting married. He had procured counsel to find a marriage license bond but there was none found. There was also no evidence he had to prove his service or his discharge.but it was well known he was in the Army as a soldier in the Revolutionary War. All the old men who had knowledge of his service are dead. lie had never heard of any other John Yarborough being in the War and the records in Raleigh confirm payment for his It was forwarded to the Department for his mother. Henry also service. declared that his mother Joanna died in this county on March 29, 1854. She left the following children: \*\* John, William, Mary, Henry H., Joel, Fanny, Betsy ( Elizabeth ), Larkin, Wilson, Sally. The last 3 had left the state many years since and had not been heard from and supposed to be dead. John had died before his mother. Henry declared he understood his father was in the Army several months perhaps 6 months or better. Joanna remained a widow from the death of his father to her death. Signed - Henry Yarbrough before Nathaniel Knight, Clerk of Superior Court, Fontgomery Cty. N.C.

- 14. On August 28, 1856, John Morrison under oath states he was born on December 11, 1786 in Moore County, N.C. where he still resides near the Montgomery County line. He knew John Yarborough from his earliest recollection in life being his neighbor. He said John died in 1819 and he always understood him to be a Revolutionary War soldier and that he served at least several months.. He also knew Archibald Clark and his sister Sarah while they lived. Archibald was understood to be an invalid from a ball shot through him in a battle afterwhich Sarah brought him home. Affiant knew John Yarborough and Joanna to live as man and wife for near 30 years and Joanna remained a widow until her death in 1854. They had the following children all of whom are understood to be born in lawful wedlock: William, Mary, Henry H., Fanny, Betsy, Joel who are now living and Larkin, John , Wilson, and Sally who are supposed to be dead. John and Joanna came from about Ralsigh in Wake County to Montgomery and said that they were both respectable persons. He would feel bound to believe any of their statements and Henry h. Yarborough is also a man of good standing and respectablity and entitled to be believed. He never knew or heard of any other John Yarborough except his son who is dead. It was well understood that old John served in the War but all the old people in that section of the country are dead who could have had that knowledge. Signed - John Morison Nathaniel Enight, Clerk.
- 15. On August 30, 1856, George C. Fendenhall of Jamestown, Guilford Cty., N.C. wrote Hon. J. Minot enclosing the Declaration of Lenry H. Yarborough, one of the children of Joanna Yarboro who filed for Pension, of her late husband, John Yarborough in 1853. Furthur proof had been requested of the marriage and service. In January, 1654, proof of payment for services were forwarded and signed by Wm. J. Clarke, Comptroller . In May 1854, an affidavit of John McLeod was procured and MISLAID as to marriage but now forwarded. In May 1856, an affidavit of John Spoon was also taken which I now forward. Since he lives 60 or 70 miles from Henry H. Yarboro, he did not know of his mother's death for some time after. It seems impossible to get any furthur proof. There was NO OTHER John Yarboro in this country and if the evidence of payments by the government is not sufficient then they have grown grey in supporting their helpless mother until she died. I would add that few if any men in N.C. who served as privates in the War can be identified with judgements made to them more than this John Yarborough -- he being the only one paid by that name in North Carolina. John Yarborough and Joanna Chambers, residents of Wake County, N.C. married Jan. 12, 1777 after he arrived home from the War. In 1779, they moved to Montgomery County, N.C. where he died on Sept. 9, 1821 and she died on March 29, 1854. They had the following children: John, William, Mary, Henry H., Joel, Fanny, Elizabeth, Wilson, Larkin, and Sally. John died early and Wilson, Larkin and Sally left the state. Their neighbors and good friends included Malcolm Gillis, John Spoons, Sarah McCaskill, John Horrison and John McLeod. Montgomery County, N.C.

I Joanna Yarborough of Montgomery County widow of John Yarborough do make and publish this my last Will and Testament. I give and bequeath all my right and claim to any pension which is due or may be due and coming to me from the government of the United States for the service of my late husband John Yarborough in the Revolutionary War and all the rest of my Estate to Henry H. 

# Macedonia Church Renewed, Worshippers Returning

CANDOR — After nearly 30 years of Inac-tivity, the Macedonia Church now is renewed and ready for worshippers.

The church has stood on a hill near Candor nice 1804. An unaffiliated church, it became Freshyterian in 1832, and the original build-tage was destroyed by fire some time later. The date of the fire and the consequent re-building are unknown, but unofficial histori-ans gress the current process was put up in the 1850. the INCh.

Under the Rev. Depaid Hardman's urging to repair the church of destroy it. Ted Chish-olm began-a fund raising driver that resulted in the repaired church.

When the issue of what to do with the old building arose at a church meeting in the aumner of 1979, Chisholm said he was told \$3.5,000 would be needed to save the church. So Chisholm and a crew of volunteers went to work. A new roof was added, the building was painted inside and out and a new woodon floor was laid over the old floor. floor



Most of the labor was unpaid, Chisholm said, and the floor was put in at cost by the husband of a former church member.

Chisholin and other volunteers worked long bours at the building. "He (Chisholin) and Curtis (Martin, snother church member) worked out there day in and day out," Hard-man recalled.

The church bears a strong physical resem-blance to what was there before, but some parts of church life in the past century are gone. In the church's early days, it had two doors — one for the men and one for the wom-en. The two sexes sat on opposite sides, while

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their slaves sat in the back. Early church records are filled with accounts of members called before the church elders for conduct unbecoming a Christian.

The graveyard around the church dates back to at least the 1850s. On July 16, 1862 Benjamin Franklin Yarbrough joined the 14 th Regiment Company A North Carolina Infantry along with 2 of his brothers William and Samuel in Raleigh, N.C. A few weeks later they were fighting in the Battle of Antietam at the spot known as Bloody Lane. As General Lee retreated toward Winchester, Benjamin became ill with Thyphoid Fever and was sent to a Winchester Hospital on Oct. 1 st and 2 days later admitted to St. Charles Hospital in Richmond, Va. located next store to the Railway Station. On Nov. 10, 1862 he died and was sent to Hospital No 11 and from there sent to Oakwood Cemetery for burial confirmed by cemetery records.

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# **Battle of Antietam**





The Battle of Antietam was fought Sept. 17, 1862, from 6 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. over 12 square miles in woods and cornfields and on roads and bridges in the Maryland countryside.

At 6 a.m., Sept. 17. Lee and his small band of soldiers turned and offered battle in an open field located about a mile north of Sharpsburg. The Union Army's 1st Corps pushed the Confederates back before finally being repulsed themselves.

The second attack by the Federals under the command of General Mansfield took place an hour and a half later. The Confederate divisions of General Hood and General Jubal Early were penetrated and the Dunkard church, an important strategic locale, was captured. Losses to both sides had been great and Mansfield was killed.

General Sumner's 2nd Corps had arrived on the scene at 10:30. Although his corps consisted of three divisions, only one was present when Sumner decided to attack the Southern division commanded by General McLaws. Attacking the left flank of the 2nd Corps, the Confederates had trapped Sumner's men in a pocket and more than 2,000 Union soldiers fell in a matter of minutes.

The focal point of the fourth Union assault centered around a sunken road situated about a mile northeast of Sharpsburg. After the war, this road was referred to as "Bloody Lane." The two remaining divisions of Sumner's 2nd Corps slowly fought their way into a position from where they could fire at will along the sunken road which the rebel division, commanded by General Daniel Hill, was using.

The Confederate troops had become sitting ducks being picked off at random by Union riflemen.

The fifth and final Union offensive began along the banks of Antietam Creek. Union troops were having no luck in crossing Antietam Creek in the face of rebel gunfire on the opposite side. It wasn't until 3:30 that Burnside's 9th Corps, consisting of four divisions, successfully crossed the creek at what is known today as Burnside's Bridge. The reason for the relatively easy crossing was that most of the Confederates guarding the creek had been recalled to participate in other defenses.

Burnside's corps easily broke through the thin line of southern resistance leaving no opposition to his advances.

Many were the times that the Federals could have beaten the Confederates, but the unplanned, uncoordinated assaults had wasted too much time. The last of Lee's four divisions had now arrived on the scene from Harper's Ferry. Led by General Ambrose Hill, his Light Division had marched 17 miles that day and succeeded in forcing the

Union troops back to Antietam Creek. The Battle of Antietam was over.

Although urged to retreat, Lee refused. The following day, the Confederate Army remained even though 10,000 additional Union troops had arrived.

Historians give the victory of the Battle of Antietam to the North for stopping Lee's advance into Maryland but actually neither side won. Lee's Army was never driven from Maryland, they retreated when they were ready. And the losses to both sides were staggering. The South lost 10,700 men including 11 generals, the North 12,400 men, 9 of them generals. The Battle of Antietam, or as it was known in the north, the Battle of Sharpsburg, was the deadliest day of the Civil War.

The park includes a tour route with interpretative signs and tapes. A visitor center houses a 134-seat theatre featuring a 26-minute film about the battle; an audiovisual slide program; Battle of Antietam oil paintings by Capt. James Hope, an eyewitness; historic Civil War objects and exhibits; a 900-volume library; research files; photos; and a sales desk featuring Civil War books, slides, postcards and other merchandise.

The Antietam National Battlefield is located one mile north of Sharpsburg along Md. 65, 10 miles south of Hagerstown.



# Civil War 'Detective Ends Search Here

By Ray McAllister Times-Dispatch Staff Writer Morrowicky & Benjamin Franklin Yarborough was 34 years old, with a wife and a year-old son, when he left **Chapter State**, N.C., on July 16, 5 1862. He joised Company A, 14th North Carolina Infantry Regiment of the Confederate army.

His family never heard from him again. Neither his wife nor this son ever learned what happened to him.

Indeed, what happened to Yarborough after he left home on that summer day more than a century ago remained a mystery to generations of his family.

Each generation that visited the family grave site in Gray's Creek could see his grave, next to those of his wife, his son and his son's wife. Yarborough's grave was empty, waiting for him.

The soldier, it had been assumed, was killed in the Civil War. But no notification had ever been received, no records seen and no body found.

IN APRIL 1977, Curtis Bowen took his parents home to Gray's Creek. They then lived in Baltimore and had not been back in 15 years. His father was old and not moving well any longer. His mother had thyroid cancer and was soon to die. They would not get another chance.

Once there, of course, they visited the cemetery, which was on land donated by the family.

Bowen and others in the Yarborough family saw the grave of Benjamin Franklin Yarborough, his great-grandfather who had disappeared nearly 115 years before. They talked of the countiess searches, all unsuccessful, for information about him.

With that in mind, Bowen asked if he could go through the family's old papers, which had been stored in a trunk and virtually forgotten.

He found a letter written in August 1891 — more than 29 years after the soldier left home — by a son of a friend of Yarborough's widow. The letter offered some information to Sarah Blake Yarborough.

HER HUSBAND, the letter writer had said, had been reported to have been near Winchester, VA., hundred of miles north of her home. Apparently he was killed there.

There wasn't much more for Bowen to go on. Returning to his home in Frederick, Md., he stopped in Winchester to talk to a friend about the missing soldier. The friend couldn't help. But he gave him the name of a Winchester historian who might be able to.

Bowen returned a few weeks later.

In desperation, Bowen went to the National Archives in Washington. He spent several hours going through microfilmed records.

Yarborough, the records showed, had survived the Battle of Antietam. But two weeks later, after Lee's Army of Northern Virginia had retreated into Virginia, Yarborough contracted typhoid fever.

The company commander's report listed Yarborough as absent from duty for health reasons. He was believed to have been sent to a Winchester hospital.

But a later report indicated that Yarborough had been sent by train to St. Charles Hospital in Richmond.

The hospital is long since gone, but records confirmed that Yarborough was admitted Oct. 3, 1862. He died **Sec.** 10of typhoid and acute dysentery, according to a report from the medical director's office.

BUT THERE WAS NO INDICATION of what happened to the body.

Logically, Bowen assumed, he would have been buried in Richmond, probably with other war dead. He checked the archives here for cemeteries containing Civil War dead. Then he checked the records of two cemeteries without finding any help. The historian said there had been no major battles in Winchester shortly after the time Yarborough enlisted. But he suggested that, if Yarborough had entered the Confederate army in mid-July 1862, he may well have been involved two months later in the Battle of Antietam, fought just inside the Maryland line near Sharpsburg.

That battle, the bloodlest day in the war, resulted in about 23,-000 casualties. It also marked Gen. Robert E. Lee's first setback in Northern territory.

The historian suggested that Bowen try the library at the Antietam National Battlefield Site Center.

BOWEN DID, and learned that the 14th North Carolina fought at what was called Bloody Lane. The ominous name was wellearned. Half of the regiment was killed or wounded there repeiling Union attacks.

Bowen checked local cemeteries. The graves of men from the 14th North Carolina were plentiful. But none had Yarborough's name. Of course, many from the regiment had been buried together, without names on the makers.

There was no way to tell.

In the records of the third, Oakwood Cemetery, he learned that a B.F. Yarborough of Company A. 14th North Carolina, was buried in the cemetery.

To be sure that he had found the correct man, Bowen went to North Carolina to check the state's archives. Only one B.F. Yarborough, he found, had ever served in the 14th North Carolina. I fact, only one B.F. Yarborough from the state had ever served in the Confederate army.

Bowen found another tidbit of identifying information, written by hand in the margin of a page. Mrs. Yarborough had received a small pension in the 1890s, 30 years or more after her husband died.

THIS, IT SEEMS, was the correct man. The detective work was done.

Yarborough could be brought home to be buried next to his wife.

Whether he will be --- or even whether he can be --- is a matter that will have to be decided in Richmond Circuit Court. Richmond has said it will need a court order before it will etime the body.

In fact, the city is not sure the body can be found or exhumed. It has no records on whether Yarborough's body was buried in a casket or just put in the ground, buried alone or with others.

Bowen and seven others in the family — five of Yarborough's grandchildren and three great-grandchildren — went to Richmond Circuit Judge Marvin F. Cole Friday for the order. Cole said he will issue it if the family's lawyer can prove he has the legal authority to do so and if "probing" devices can prove that the body can be found and removed,

"We're a close-knit family," said one of the greatgrandchildren, Norma B. Moran, whose husband, Roanoke lawyer Leroy Moran, is handling the court work.


The family, she said, knows how her brother, Curtis, feit as he did the detective work that led to finding how Yarborough die

"He just sensed what it must have been like [for Yarborough] to be lying there in that hospital bed, dying and having no way to tell his family where he was or what was happening to him....

"We all just want to bring him home where we think he belongs."



-Curtis A. Bowen stands beside the gravesite of his great grandmother at the cemetery beside Marvin Methodist Church in Gray's Creek app. 12 miles South of Fayetteville, N.C. The day was August 10, 1979 and Benjamin Franklin Yarborough was finally resting next to his devoted wife Sara and their only son Franklin Curtis Yarborough. The family was now truly reunited in every sense of the word.



benjamin terborough Story

 Benjamin Yarborough joined the Confederate Army (14 th kagiment Co. A North Carolina) on July 16, 1862 leaving a wife and a year old son. His family never heard from him again.

- General Lee was preparing his Northern invasion and within weeks Benjamin marching into Maryland. On Sept. 17, he found himself on the outskirts of a little town called Sharpsburg. The stage was set and the Battle of Antietam was about to begin.
- 5. The cannons roared and Benjamin found himself in a sunken road that is now known as Bloody Lone. All morning they fought repelling Union attacks while his comrades lay 4 and 5 deep. It was a nightmare, an experience that must have had a very humbling effect. Half of his regiment had been killed or wounded. He had witnessed a battle that claimed 25,000 men, the bloodiest day of the war.
- 4. General Lee's Army retreats toward the Shenodoah Valley. Weeks of inadequate supplies takes its toll. Benjamin becomes ill and is sent to a hospital near winchester, Va. His illness is diagnosed as Typhoid Fever and he is put on a train and sent to St. Charles Hospital in kichmond, Va. on Oct. 3, 1862.
- 5. On Nov. 10, 1862, Benjamin Yarborough dies. His family was never notified.
- 6. Years go by while his wife Sarah searches in vain. Finally in 1891 she receives word from a family friend that Benjamin was believed to have died in a battle near Winchester, Va. This was the letter Curtis Bowen found in the family trunk on a visit to North Carolina in April, 1977.
- 7. On his return home he stopped in Winchester and asked a friend who was considered to be the most knowledgeable man in the area on the Civil War. He recommended Dr. Quarrels who was an educator, author and historian. In addition he was well known for originating the Apple Blossom Festivle held annually in Winchester.
- 8. An appointment with Dr. Quarrels rules out the possibility of a battle in Winchester in 1862 because there was none. He suggested that if Benjamin joined the 14 th Reg. in July 1862, the time frame would indicate that he would have been involved in the Battle of Antietam 8 weeks later. He told me to check the library at Antietam to see if the 14 th Keg. was involved and if no luck go to the National Archives in Washington for military records.
- 9. The library at Antietam pinpointed the exact spot where the 14 th Reg fought. A marker now stands at that location.
- 10. A check of the local cemetery at Sharpsburg indicated that many of the dead were from the 14 th Reg. but no name was found for Benjamin Yarborough. There was a section that contained 1200 unknown soldiers. Perhaps Benjamin was there?
- 11. A trip was made to the National Archives in Washington D.C.. A day of searching enabled me to come up with some valuable information. His military showed that he had in fact survived Antietam, became ill with Typhoid 2 weeks later and sent to Kichmond where he died. No records however indicated where he was buried.
- 12. A trip to kichmond(State Archives) enabled me to get the names of ceneteries in the area that had Confederate dead. A systematic check of these ceneteries enabled me to come up with records showing that a B.F. Yarborough was buried in Division B Row L Lot 46 in Oakwood Cenetery. He was a member of 14 th Reg Co A N.C. and buried Nov. 11, 1862, but the remote possibility existed that their might have been another B.F. Yarborough in the same company.
- 13. A trip to the State Archives in Raleigh, N.C. showed that indeed there were two other Yarboroughs in that legiment but their names were Samuel and William. Kecently I found that they were Benjamin's brothers who joined with him the same day. Samuel died in the war but William survived even though he had been wounded. After returning to his unit he was later taken prisoner in a battle near Petersburg, Va.
- 14. A furthur check of the records showed that there were 54 Yarboroughs to serve from the State of North Carolina. Only two had the first initial of B. One was Bailey A. Yarborough and the other was Benjamin F. Yarborough. This proved beyond a shadow of a doubt that we had the right man.
- 15. The family was informed and a question was asked if there would be any objection to our bringing him home. The family stood united in our effort to do so,




- 16. An ap cal was made to Mr. Conway, Superintendent of Cemeteries, to allow us to proceed. He indicated that if we presented the necessary documents signed by all members of the family he would consider the request. The necessary papers were presented.
- 17. Mr. Conway suddenly reverses his position and refuses to grant us permission. He cited several reasons for his refusal some of which are listed below.
  - A. A disteracht of this nature should be carried out by his wife.
  - B. He felt it would be better to leave him in Lichmond with his comrades in arms. A close knit family would want the same.
  - C. It was illegal to disinter a body in the City of Kichmond.
  - D. It would set a precedent.
- 18. Leroy Moran, a member of our family and a practicing attorney in Roano(ke, Va. takes the case and arranges for an informal meeting with Mr. Conway and several Richmond attorneys. Mr. Conway refuses to budge from his position leaving us no alternative but to sue the City of Richmond for a court order.
- 19. On Dec 8, 1978, a court session is held and Leroy Moran meets the objections headon.
  - A. He tells the court that there was no way the wife could procede with disinterment since she never knew what happened to him. The letter of 1891 is shown indicating she was still searching. He points out that the actual grave site was just discovered this past year.
  - B. Moran points out that Benjamin Yarborough was taken from his gellow soldiers in the 14 th Regiment Co A and ship, ed to kichmond with hundreds of sick soldiers that he never knew. It is precisely because we are a close knit family that we care enough to make this effort to bring him home . He pointed out that a site next to his wife and only son had been waiting for his return.
  - C. Moran pointed out that there was no law prohibiting disterment in Kichmond but rather a set procedure that was to be followed and for which we had complied. He noted that when Kichmond officials wanted to make room for a highway they would merely place a notice in the paper and if there was no objections they would procede with disinterment at taxpayers expense. This family asks nothing but your permission and is willing to pay all expenses involved. Should they not be given the same consideration as a highway project?
    - D.Mr. Conway's concern over this incident setting a precedent should be of no concern because the precedent had already been set. Mis research showed that several disinterments had already occurred in that very wemetery shortly after the Civil War.
- 20. Judge Marvin F, Cole upon hearing the arguments ruled that the Yarborough Family had more right to the body than the City of Michmond and that he would issue the Wourt order if the family would have a local mortician provide him with evidence that the exact position of the body could be ascertained and removed without disturbing adjoining graves.
- 21. Test borings were made at the site as directed and the results forwarded to Judge Cole. After reviewing the findings he issued the court order to proceed.
- 22. On August 10, 1979, the Salamone Funeral in Frederick, Md. rode to Kichmond and placed the body of Benjamin Yarborough in his new casket and proceded to take him home to Marvin Methodist Church Cemetery in Gray's Creek, North Carolina. The family rejoiced as Benjamin Yarborough received a proper burial and was at last reunited with his family...

When Benjamin F. Yarborough did not return from the war, his wife Sara and their one year old son Franklin Curtis Yarborough continued to live in Montgomery County, N.C. until about 188016. At that time I understand that Sara's mother, Martha Chappell Blake, decided it would be best to go to live near Stedman N.C. where they had relatives. It was app. 10 miles East of Fayetteville in Cumberland County, N.C. I believe I heard my mother tell me that as a young man Franklin was selling Singer Sewing Machines and during his travels he met the family of James and Leonas Ferrell Marsh who had 11 children and he fell in love with Romelia who was born April 9, 1867. They married Dec.29,1891. The Marsh ancestry included the family names of Ferrell, Dixon, Gregory, and Paige. James Marsh was born June 25, 1821, married Leonas Ferrell in 1857 and died Jan. 31, 1885. Leonas was born April 14, 1838 and died August 25, 1882 . Both are buried beside Marvin Methodist Church as well as Martha Chappell Blake b. March 8, 1820 and d. June 18, 1901. On Nov. 25, 1896 Franklin C. Yarborough with the help of his uncle E. C. Blake and J.W. Edge purchased from Mr. E. H. Evans what was then known as the Jackson Plantation located on Swann's Creek including the Williamson Mill and app. 1,000 acres which Franklin eventually bought completely and renamed " Midway Farms ". It was their home for over 50 years until their death. Franklin died in 1946 and Romelia in 1952. Both are buried at the cenetery beside Marvin Methodist Church.

"Midway Farms," the colonial country home of Mrs. Charles A. DeVore, is

located just off the Wilmington highway in Grays Creek, about 12 miles south of Fayetteville.

Deeds to lands described in the titles of "Midway Farms," the Yarborough house, are interesting and give some history of the area on the west side of the upper Cape Fear River. Col. Johnson, appointed

governor of North Carolina in 1733, had a great interest in the Scots who emigrated to the Cape Fear region. In North Carolina all new settlers were exempt from taxation for ten years. On Sept. 11, 1735, Gov. Johnson insued letters of patent of George II, King of England, for lands described in subsequent deeds.

On Jan. 24, 1793, Joseph Cooper, ciling the king's grant transferred lands on the west side of Swann's Creek to Samuel Horton (Haughton). Earlier deeds recorded indicate the family as owning land along the Cape Fear under royal grant. In 1798 Samuel Horton, listed at this time in Wake County, transferred land to John Jackson (this deed found in book 17, page John Jackson transfer-242) red the land to Jesse Jackson in 1804, but he reserved the right to a mill pond on Swann's Creek. By 1821, the property was sold by the sheriff of Cumberland Coun-

sheriff of Cumberland Coun-ty. Alexander McKay, to John Kelly. Kelly held a mortgage against the land fund in book 34, page 63. Then in 1823, he sold it to Alfred and A. C. Jackson, sons of Jesse Jackson, who had lost it under the sale. In 1868 Alfred Jackson teactioned the land in Wiltransferred the land to Wil-liam McQueen, a resident of Robeson County. William McQueen transferred it to Peter McQueen. In time, Neil- McQueen possessed the land (Book 100, page 552).

In 1888 as administrator of the cstate of Nelli McQueen tsheriff of Cumberland County at the time), William entered into a contract with John R. Smith whereby the latter was to purchase the land, paying part of an agreed sum annually. On the failure of Smith to make payment, the administrator such to reposees the lands, and Judge William A. Hoke

Smith spealed to the Su-preme Court when Chief Justice Furches, writing the ophion, found Hoke partial-ly in error, and ordered the land sold by the Court, preserving the Binith coulty. In 1865, the court appointed Judge N. A. Spinolait as commissioner to auction the lands at the courthouse door me mes lands at the courthouse door whereby the land was pur-chased by E. Hervey Evans

for \$1.875. On Nov. 25, 1898, Evans On Nov. 25, 1896, Effans sold this property to E.C. Blake, J.W. Edge and F.C. Yarborough: Lacated on Swann's Creek and known all the Jackson Plantation including the Nathan Williamson Mill, it included 1000 acres.

E.C. Blake and Frank Curtis Yarborough had come to Cumberland around County, Blake, was an uncle of Yarborough. J.W. Edge was a native of Cumberland



It is remembered that the Jackson house was 50 years old in 1896 which would give the year 1846 as the building date. Parts of it could easily be older. There is evidence



Life has a way of creating the "Unexpected ". It happened one afternoon purely by chance as Lelia Yarborough was returning to Cak City. N.C. from a visit home by train. She politely acknowledged a greeting of " Hello " from a complete stranger but that's all it was. That was only proper but this man had a certain charm that disarmed her. She somehow managed to respond to some of his questions simply because he appeared so honest, sincere and decent but again that's all it was. A casual conversation with someone she would never see again. Right? Wrong!!! There are times when I marvel at the order, the beauty, and the harmony that exists in the midst of a universe that is seemingly unexplainable and I wonder if that order extends to and includes destiny. My mother must have pondered that question at some depth when she arrived at school the following day. The entire school faculty both teachers and administrators had been summoned to a meeting where they introduced the new principal and welcomed him to Oak City High School. You can imagine the incredible shock she experienced when she saw and recognized the man as the casual stranger who had introduced himself as Hilary Bowen on the trainride the day before. Our family has truly been blessed to have had the benefit! of such a heritage but I realize more than ever that we are but a link in a chain that crosses all generational barriers. The qualities that made them what they were passed on from those who have gone before and given to us as a gift which we in turn should appreciate and pass along. The true meaning was so eloquently expressed in the words of the poem " Flanders Field " when the poet said, " To you from failing hands we throw the TORCH, be yours to hold on high. 

## F. C. Yarborough Dies At His Home

#### Widely Known Reside. In 85th Year Of Age

Franklin Curtis Yarborough, one of Cumberland county's oldest and best-known citizens, died this morning about 6:30 at his home in Grays Creek township after a long illness. He would have been 85 years old on May 4.

Mr. Yarborough was one of the most extensive farmers in Gray's Creek township and his genial and kindly disposition endeared him to people in all walks of life throughout the county. He had served on the board of county commissioners and took a leading part in promoting the cause of education in Cumberland county. He was a member of the Marvin Methodist church and an active worker in the affairs of Methodism in North Carolina.

He was born in Montgomery county but moved to Cumberland in 1870. His father, a Confederate soldier, lost his life in the Civil war. Until early manhood Mr. Yarborough lived in Eastover township but later moved to Grays Creek and was in the 'farming' and mercantile business there

Surviving are his wife, the former Miss Romelia Marsh; three sons, W. D. Yarborough of Wingate, M. G. Yarborough of Fayetteville, and W. F. Yarborough of Fayetteville; and three daughters, Mrs. Jasper Edge of Grays Creek. Mrs. G. H. Lyday of Brevard and Mrs. H. T. Bowen of Baltimore, Md.

Funeral services will be- conducted tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Marvin Methodist church by the Rev. W. B. Colton of Parkton, the Rev. Virgil E. Owen of Fayetteville and the Rev. R. E. Brown of Fayetteville.

Grandsons will be pallbearers and there will be no honorary pallbearers.

The body will remain at Jernigan's Funeral home in Fayetteville until tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.


Insurance Co. and vice president of the Business Development Corporation of North Carolina.

## Wilson Yarborough

Many of the most significant and admirable attributes of modern-day Fayetteville and Cumberland County had an early architect and champion in Wilson F. Yarborough Sr., who died Saturday at 80.

As a businessman, investor, member of the General Assembly, city councilman, and civic leader beginning as a young man in the 1930s, Yarborough had a strong vision of the sort of quality community he wanted his native place to be, and a tough skill in making reality of his vision.

He was an early advocate and actor in the industrial and commercial diversification that transformed the pre-World War II textiles-and-cotton community into today's urban center. He knew a good business deal and a good investment, and his acumen served banks, savings and loan companies, and other investors in bringing quality development to city and county.

He invested his own money and encouraged others in notable civic projects, such as the Cumberland County auditorium, Methodist College, the YMCA, and the Business Development Corporation of North Carolina, reflecting his goal of a community served by quality institutions.

Politically, he worked for reform and modernization of both county and city government, as well as for statewide programs for progress that would especially benefit back home.

A good-humored man who reveled in the company of his family and friends, he also did hundreds of unsung acts of support and nurture for people in all walks of life. At the end, he endured a final illness with courage and solicitude for those around him.

A community is only as great as its people, and much of the present-day greatness of Fayetteville and Cumberland County is a legacy from this devoted son of Grays Creek Township who gave his best for his native place, enriching it during his lifetime and for the future as well. "Among very early doctors to locate at the old town was one Dr. Jackson, who was considered a quack, and soon left, after other doctors began to locate.

"Among the early settlers was a family named Tumbleston that I remember as having lived in a log house near the slaughter - house of the late Virgil P. Monkress. Mr. Tumbleston had a son-in-law named Dean who followed farming. He moved to Athens in 1951 and started in the hotel business and some of his family are said to still be operating a hotel on the site located in 1851.

"My father sold out in 1851 to a man named John C. Kennedy, from Tennessee, who owned considerable slaves. After selling to Mr. Kennedy my father moved to Ellis county and settled on Red Oak Creek. He returned to Cherokee county in 1953 and settled on a place southeast of town, not many years ago occupied by Mr. Frederick and myself. My father died there Nov. 6th, 1867.

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# REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS OF HALL COUNTY, GEORGIA

It is practically established through family records, courthouse records and tradition that many veterans of the American Revolution settled in Hall County, Georgia, after the war. It is believed that many of these veterans died in Hall County and are buried here in unmarked graves. A few graves of these "freedom fighters" have been marked by the Daughters of the American Revolution; however, the majority of the graves are unlocated and unmarked.

One such veteran's grave may now be located. Some family records on the Yarboroughs, compiled years ago, state that JOHN YARBOROUGH, as veteran of the Revolutionary War, moved with his family to Hall County, Georgia, prior to 1820. (Hall County was created in 1818) The records also stated that John was buried in the Hopewell Baptist Church Cemetery which is located near Candler.

When transcribing Hall County tombstone inscription a few years ago I found a crude headstone marker with only the name of John Yarborough transcribed thereon - no dates and other information. This marker was located in the Hopewell Methodist Church Cemetery, just off hgwy #60 (Dahlonega hgwy) near Murrayville, Hall County. This is believed to be the grave of the RWB John Yarborough. It is known that this family lived in the vicinity of Murrayville.

John Yarborough, according to family records, died in December, (1926). He was married to Elizabeth Edwards, probably in South Carolina. Elizabeth was the daughter of William and Milly Smith Edwards. She was born January 4, 1786, South Carolina, and died Jan. 27, 1873 in Marietta, Ga. After John's death Elizabeth evidently moved away with some of her children.

Some records were found in the Georgia States Archives on the family of Elizabeth Edwards Yarborough:

William Edwards, father of Elizabeth, was born June 22, 1760. He was the son of Edward Edwards and was married to Mildred "Milly" Smith, daughter of William Smith. Mildred Smith was born Oct. 13, 1764, Virginia, and died June 6, 1839, Spartanburg, South Carolina. The Smith family moved from Virginia to South Carolina when "Milly" was quite small.

CHILDREN OF WILLIAM and "MILLY" SMITH EDWARDS:

 Elizabeth Edwards, born Aug. 4, 1786, Spartanburg, S.C., died Jan. 27, 1873, Marietta, Ga. She married John Yarborough.

John and Elizabeth Edwards Yarborough were parents of eight children. Some the children married and reared their families in Hall County. Some moved elsewhere in Georgia and one son went to California.

# CHILDREN of JOHN and ELIZABETH EDWARDS YARBOROUGH:

 Ann Yarborough, born Mar. 30, 1806, S.C., and died April 16, 1875, Hall County, Ga. Ann was married in Hall County on Aug. 10, 1824. Jessie Jay either died or the couple were divorced. Ann Jay was married again in Hall County on Mar. 1, 1828 to Burrwell (Burwell) G. Rives. He was born June 20, 1807, and died 1888. Ann and The Rev. Burwell G. Rives are both buried in the Yellow Creek Baptist Church Cemetery near Murrayville, Ga.

Burwell G. Rives was a brother to the famous Baptist preacher, "Uncle" Jackie Rives of Hall County. Both men are named as sons and executors of the will of Thomas Rieves, Sr., dated May 13, 1838, and recorded in Lumpkin County, Ga. Thomas also named a granddaughter, Angeline Edwards, daughter of Elijah and Susannah Edwards.

Children of The Rev. Burwell G. and Ann Yarborough Rives:

- A. John Francis Marion Rives. He was married to Elizabeth Castleberry. He joined the gold rush in 1849 to California and then
- returned to enlist in the Confederate Army. He died Feb. 7, 1887. Children of J.F.M. and Elizabeth Rives were: Thursie C., Susie, Amanda, Reuben P., Julia, Janie, and Thomas.
- B. Reuben P. Rives was married to Susan E. \_\_\_\_. He also fought with the Confederate forces. His children were: Bartow, Francis, Asena, and Elizabeth.
- C. Thomas Rives was known as "Shot-Mouth" due to a wound received in the War between the States. He was married first to Carrie Boone. Their children were: Burwell, Annie, Robert, John, Reuben, Elizabeth, and Edward Lee. One son, Webster, was born of the second marriage to Isabella McManus.
- 2. Nancy Yarborough, born Sept., 1808, S.C., and died Jan. 7, 1888, Marietta, Ga. She was married to William Owens. Nancy's headstone in the Citizens Cemetery, Marietta, is inscribed: "Nancy Yarbrough, wife of William Owen, 1808-1876." Buried in the same plot with Nancy are probably her son and daughter-in-law:

"George S. Owen, born Jan. 28, 1849, died May 5, 1925; Sallie R. Owen, wife of George S. Owen, died June 22, 1899."

A William Owen who could be Nancy's husband is buried in the New Hope Methodist Cemetery, Forsyth County, Ga. He died May 17, 1890 at the age of 78 years.

- Sarah Yarborough, born S.C., was married in Hall County on Oct. 25, 1832, to Jordan Griffis. (There was a widow, Nancy Griffice, with a family enumerated in the 1830 census of Hall County.
- 4. Mary "Polly" Yarborough, born May, 1811, was married to William Craw-

ford Hancock. William C. Hancock, son of William, Sr., was born Aug. 17, 1811, and died July 4, 1877. He left a will recorded in Hall County. Mary "Polly" Yarborough Hancock died April 6, 1897. She and William C. are both buried in the old Concord Presbyterian Church Cemetery, Hall County, Ga. The couple left numerous descendants in Hall and Jackson Counties, Ga. Their children were: William Richardson Hancock, John A. Hancock, William Crawford Hancock, Jr., Samuel Hancock, Burrel W. Hancock, and Sarah Elizabeth Hancock who was married to James Madison Watson.

 John Wesley Yarborough, born May 20, 1813, and died December 16, 1879. He was married to Amanda Lane on December 1, 1836.

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. Milly Edwards Yarborough, daughter of John and Elizabeth, was born March 14, 1815. She was married in Hall County, September 13, 1832, to Basil (Bassel, Bazel, Bazzel) Lowrey. Emily "Milly" and her husband are both in Cobb County, Ga., Citizens Cemetery, Marietta.

Rev. Bazzel Lowery, born Jan. 12, 1812, Franklin County, Ga. died Atlanta, Ga. April 13, 1894.

Emily Yarbrough, wife of Rev. Basil Lowrey, born March 14, 1815, died December 3, 1905.

Buried also in the family plot are the graves with the following inscribed headstones:





## NEWNAN CHAPEL UNITED METHODIST CHURCH Newnan

1824-1840

Newnan Chapel United Methodist Church was established because the black population wished to practice their religion in their own churches. As early as August 22, 1824 Rev. George Standing came from Sussex, England, to assist in the establishment of what was to be called the Newnan Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church. The first meetings were held in a brush arbor which was followed by a wooden structure some years later.

As church membership grew, the Newnan Chapel purchased the property used today for the sum of one dollar in September 1840. Church members, working after their day's work was completed, dug clay from the banks of a stream on the property and made bricks of sand, clay and water to use in building the church. Women and children of the church brought food and drink to the men making the brick and carried finished bricks to the church site. A vestibule and steps were added later, and an annex was constructed during the years 1877 to 1892.

These buildings have also served other purposes for the black community, providing space for a public primary school which was sponsored by Clark College for a time, and providing a large auditorium and facilities for educational, cultural, and recreational activities. The buildings have received extensive renovation and improvements throughout the years.

Under the leadership of the Rev. Paul Settles who came in 1982, Newnan Chapel experienced real growth both spiritually and physically. Through the Council on Ministries there was a greater community outreach program developed. Through Settles' foresight and hard work, a new parsonage was completed in 1984 with the support of several Methodist bodies. Since 1968 when several national groups merged, the church has been known as the Newnan Chapel United Methodist Church.

#### GRANTVILLE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH Grantville 1841

Earliest known records indicate that on or before March 26, 1841 the Mount Horeb Methodist Episcopal Church was established in the small community of Calico Corner. That original one-room wooden structure stood on a site which is in-the center of the present Grantville City Cemetery. The earliest recorded pastor serving Mount Horeb was J.W. Yarbrough (1844-1846) who also established the Methodist church at Moreland. With the change of the name of the town to Grantville the church had become the Grantville Methodist Church South by June 15, 1857.

By 1891 a new, larger white frame church building had been erected on the site where the parsonage now stands. Construction of the present church building was begun in 1926, a design of Rev. C.M. Lipham, architect and pastor at that time of the First Methodist Church in Newnan. The three-story, brick, Gothic-design church features beautiful stained-glass windows. The new building was constructed opposite the 1891 structure on property given by William N. Banks. Funds to build the new church were subscribed at one church service.

The congregation worshipped for the first time in the new sanctuary on the second Sunday in May 1927. The land occupied by the former church building became the site of the present parsonage which was completed in January 1929.

The Reverend Peggy Little has been pastor of Grantville United Methodist Church since June 1986.

Many Coweta County hardware stores sold the pottery made by W.T.B. Gordy, his wife Annie, and his sons and daughter. William, D.X., Sara, Herbert E. and Jack learned the craft and began producing "big pots" in their teenage years. Those utilitarian household articles such as jugs, jars, crocks, and churns made by the Gordys are now highly treasured by those Cowetans who have examples of their work.

The Gordy family is descended from the Coweta County carpenter-architect William M. Yarbrough. Great-grandson Herbert E. Gordy is a skilled wood craftsman in Newnan in 1987.

# WILLIAM M. YARBROUGH

In the 20 to 30 years preceding the War Between the States, carpenter-architect William M. Yarbrough built a series of both Federal Period and Greek Revival-style houses in Coweta and Meriwether Counties, some of which are still standing. These fine houses are characterized by the use of Doric columns, delicately carved mantels, and elegant window trim. One house even has a floating staircase.

William Yarbrough was born in Woodbury; the date of his birth is uncertain. He must have started as a very young man as some of the houses attributed to him were built in the late 1840s or earlier. It is thought that he had some education as designs of his houses are similar to those found in pattern books written for the carpenter-architects of the early 19th century. Those pattern books showed builders how to construct houses through step-by-step instructions, even down to interior cosmetic details.

Most of the houses built by Yarbrough are of the Federal Period style, many with central porticos. Several reflect more of a Greek Revival influence, with a broad expanse of massive columns across the full facade of the building.

According to a great-grandson, Herbert Gordy, William Yarbrough made many of the tools he used in building his houses. Structural supports were hewn by hand from local virgin timber. Most likely he was assisted in his work by skilled slaves who were hired out to him when they were not needed by their owners. Elbert Wimbush is said to have been one talented slave who may have worked with Yarbrough in the building of Twin Oaks, just outside of Greenville. Yarbrough's houses often contained features of bod Greek Revival and Federal Period styles. For differentiation, houses with central porches will be listed as Federal Period, and those with full porches as Greek Revival. Federal-style houses attributed to Yarbrough are:

Old Stagecoach Inn, near Turin

Oak Grove, south of Palmetto

Cedar Hill, south of Moreland (has the floating staircase) (The house was built for William Boyd Pinson, Coweta Judge d Inferior Court from 1847 to 1853.)

Sims-Pinson home, south of Moreland

A house on Poplar Road

Swygert home, south of Haralson

Woodruff home, cast of Newnan (This house has exterior wood work said to have been made by R.D. Cole Company, which may have been added later.)

The "Haunted House," near Greenville

Yarbrough house, near Gay

Greek Revival-style houses built by Yarbrough:

Calhoun-Hill home, Greenville Street, Newnan (This house wa torn down when the Newnan Plaza shopping center was built) Willcoxon-Arnold home, Bullsboro Drive, Newnan (This house is now Hillcrest Chapel.) Twin Oaks, near Greenville Beulah Land, near Greenville

William Yarbrough served in the Confederate Army in Company E, Ninth Georgia Artillery. He suffered a head injury during a battle and it is said that from then on he carried in his head a silver dollar, which was used as a plane to cover the wound. After the war, Yarbrough and his some operated a gristmill on the Flint River in Meriwether County.

Though most of Yarbrough's building days were over, he is credited with building three structures after the War Between the States: a large house with a Victorian-style gabe (location unknown), a big wooden frame house outside Gay (exact location unknown), and the New Hope United Methodist Church, which was built in 1886.

William Yarbrough died around 1890 near Haralson and is buried in the New Hope United Methodist Church cemetery.

#### WYNN

Glen Owen Wynn b. 8-31-1817, d. 8-27-1890, was the son of John Wynne and Susannah Owen Wynne of Oglethorpe Co. He married Sarah Pope Lumpkin b. 11-17-1822, d. 1-2-1888, daughter of Samuel Lumpkin and Mary Arnold Lumpkin of Oglethorpe Co. She was the niece of Governor Wilson Lumpkin and Chief Justice Joseph Henry Lumpkin. They married in Athens, Ga., on 8-3-1841.

Glen Owen Wynn served in the Indian wars of 1836. He and his wife came to Coweta Co. in 1841 and settled on land purchased by his father near Line Creek in the Sixth Land District encompassing large acreage in both Coweta and Fayette Counties. He served as representative in 1855, senator in 1858, and again served in the Legislature in 1861-62.

# Chapter XXIV Nineteenth-Century Historic Homes

oweta County enjoyed two distinct "boom" periods in the 19th century which resulted in a profusion of fine period homes being constructed during those prosperous times. The great flowering of Greek Revival homes in the 1850s came upon the heels of the railroads (built 1847-53) which carried away cotton and brought back dollars-a "flush" time which ceased abruptly in 1861. The next prosperity came in the 1880s and 1890s. The Industrial Revolution had arrived in Newnan at last, and there were cotton mills and machine-made Victorian mansions to prove it.

Ironically, the two "boom" periods of the 20th century, the 1920s and the 1950s-60s, were in many ways the most damaging to the legacy of the preceding century. A number of white-columned masterpieces were razed to make way for the Tudor mansions of the Roaring Twenties and the shopping centers of the post-World War II years in Newnan.

However, the national historic preservation movement of the late 1960s and early '70s did not bypass Coweta County. The Newnan-Coweta Historical Society was formed in 1972. The cities of Newnan, Moreland, Senoia, Grantville, Sharpsburg and other communities found powerful allies in their activist citizens who formed historical societies, mobilized preservation-minded garden clubs and patriotic societies, sought National Register listings, and individually and collectively restored old homes and buildings.

Newnan, which has been known as "The City of Homes" for more than 80 years, boasts three in-town neighborhoods listed as historic districts on the National Register, in addition to its courthouse.

The Newnan-Coweta Historical Society has published "A Driving Tour of Ante-bellum Homes In Newnan" with the assistance of the City of Newnan, Newnan-Coweta Board of Realtors, and the Newnan-Coweta Chamber of Commerce. The society presents annually or bi-annually Newnan's wellknown Hospitality Tour of Homes. This event is held in October, and other private tours are available through advance reservations.

A sampling of 19th century homes from Newnan and Coweta County is included in this chapter. Below is a thumbnail sketch of architectural periods and styles in Coweta County (dates and stylisms approximate; may overlap):

#### 1830-1845: Plantation Plain and Federal

These two-story homes were generally two rooms wide and one room deep. Plantation plain houses had no classical details, were unpainted, had wooden interior walls, and a shed-roof porch. Federal houses had classical columns restricted to the space of the pediment, modified Palladian windows, and carved mantels.

#### 1845-1861: Greek Revival

These homes had central hallways, four rooms over four, often a full third-floor attic. Porches extended across entire front of house often with round fluted columns. Mantels were severely simple in keeping with the feeling of Greek stone temples. Chair rail omitted or else incorporated into full-blown wainscot.

1861-1865: Little or no construction during war.

#### 1865-1875: Reconstruction Cottages

Small, one-story houses with very modest classical touches such as colonnettes. Severe timber shortages and financial hardship limited size and luxury of houses.

#### 1875-1900: Victorian Variety

Machine-made wooden decoration adorned asymmetrical houses built with towers, turrets, balconies, bay windows, arched doors. Stained glass, leaded glass, iron roof cresting, colored roof slates, decorative shingles, bargeboards, nooks and crannies. Architectural styles: Gothic, Queen Anne, Eastlake, Second Empire. William Yarbrough served in the Confederate Army in Company E, Ninth Georgia Artillery. He suffered a head injury during a battle and it is said that from then on he carried in his head a silver dollar, which was used as a plate to cover the wound. After the war, Yarbrough and his sons operated a gristmill on the Flint River in Meriwether County.

Though most of Yarbrough's building days were over, he is credited with building three structures after the War Between the States: a large house with a Victorian-style gable (location unknown), a big wooden frame house outside Gay (exact location unknown), and the New Hope United Methodist Church, which was built in 1886.

William Yarbrough died around 1890 near Haralson and is buried in the New Hope United Methodist Church cemetery.



Edward Clinton (E.C.) Beers came to Newnan as a teen ager about 1905 to live with his uncle, Travis Beers, and his family. He was apprenticed at Cole Shop and began work carrying tools to other workers. A talented machinist, he also repaired clocks and guns as a hobby. After his retirement in the 1960's he was often seen standing in front of his home on East Broad Street in the early mornings waving to people passing by on their way to work. Well loved by many, he was alert and active until his death at age 93.

Edward Clinton Beers b. 4-16-1889, d. 12-11-1982, son of James Henry Beers and Josephine Patrick Gordon Hadley of Harris County. Married Lucile Lovelady, b. 10-19-1891, d. 10-24-1973, dau. of W. She was a member of the Newnan Chapel United Methodist Church, where she served on the Usher Board.

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# REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS OF HALL COUNTY, GEORGIA

It is practically established through family records, courthouse records and tradition that many veterans of the American Revolution settled in Hall County, Georgia, after the war. It is believed that many of these veterans died in Hall County and are buried here in unmarked graves. A few graves of these "freedom fighters" have been marked by the Daughters of the American Revolution; however, the majority of the graves are unlocated and unmarked.

One such veteran's grave may now be located. Some family records on the Yarboroughs, compiled years ago, state that JOHN YARBOROUGH, a veteran of the Revolutionary War, moved with his family to Hall County, Georgia, prior to The records also stated that John 1820. (Hall County was created in 1818) was buried in the Hopewell Baptist Church Cemetery which is located near Candler.

When transcribing Hall County tombstone inscription a few years ago I found a crude headstone marker with only the name of John Yarborough transcribed thereon - no dates and other information. This marker was located in the Hopewell Methodist Church Cemetery, just off hgwy #60 (Dahlonega hgwy) near Murrayville, Hall County. This is believed to be the grave of the RWB John Yarborough. It is known that this family lived in the vicinity of Murrayville. 1926

John Yarborough, according to family records, died in December, (1926). He was married to Elizabeth Edwards, probably in South Carolina. Elizabeth was the daughter of William and Milly Smith Edwards. She was born January 4, 1786, South Carolina, and died Jan. 27, 1873 in Marietta, Ga. After John's death Elizabeth evidently moved away with some of her children.

Some records were found in the Georgia States Archives on the family of Elizabeth Edwards Yarborough:

William Edwards, father of Elizabeth, was born June 22, 1760. He was the son of Edward Edwards and was married to Mildred "Milly" Smith, daughter of William Smith. Mildred Smith was born Oct. 13, 1764, Virginia, and died June 6, 1839, Spartanburg, South Carolina. The Smith family moved from Virginia to South Carolina when "Milly" was quite small.

John and Elizabeth Edwards Yarborough were parents of eight children. Some the children married and reared their families in Hall County. Some moved elsewhere in Georgia and one son went to California.

 Ann Yarborough, born Mar. 30, 1806, S.C., and died April 16, 1875, Hall County, Ga. Ann was married in Hall County on Aug. 10, 1824. Jessie Jay either died or the couple were divorced. Ann Jay was married again in Hall County on Mar. 1, 1828 to Burrwell (Burwell) G. Rives. He was born June 20, 1807, and died 1888. Ann and The Rev. Burwell G. Rives are both buried in the Yellow Creek Baptist Church Cemetery near Murrayville, Ga.

Burwell G. Rives was a brother to the famous Baptist preacher, "Uncle" Jackie Rives of Hall County. Both men are named as sons and executors of the will of Thomas Rieves, Sr., dated May 13, 1838, and recorded in Lumpkin County, Ga. Thomas also named a granddaughter, Angeline Edwards, daughter of Elijah and Susannah Edwards.

Children of The Rev. Burwell G. and Ann Yarborough Rives:

- A. John Francis Marion Rives. He was married to Elizabeth Castleberry. He joined the gold rush in 1849 to California and then
   " returned to enlist in the Confederate Army. He died Feb. 7, 1887. Children of J.F.M. and Elizabeth Rives were: Thursie C., Susie, Amanda, Reuben P., Julia, Janie, and Thomas.
- B. Reuben P. Rives was married to Susan E.\_\_\_\_. He also fought with the Confederate forces. His children were: Bartow, Francis, Asena, and Elizabeth.
- C. Thomas Rives was known as "Shot-Mouth" due to a wound received in the War between the States. He was married first to Carrie Boone. Their children were: Burwell, Annie, Robert, John, Reuben, Elizabeth, and Edward Lee. One son, Webster, was born of the second marriage to Isabella McManus.
- Nancy Yarborough, born Sept., 1808, S.C., and died Jan. 7, 1888, Marietta, Ga. She was married to William Owens. Nancy's headstone in the Citizens Cemetery; Marietta, is inscribed: "Nancy Yarbrough, wife of William Owen, 1808-1876." Buried in the same plot with Nancy are probably her son and daughter-in-law:

"George S. Owen, born Jan. 28, 1849, died May 5, 1925; Sallie R. Owen, wife of George S. Owen, died June 22, 1899."

A William Owen who could be Nancy's husband is buried in the New Hope Methodist Cemetery, Forsyth County, Ga. He died May 17, 1890 at the age of 78 years.

3. Sarah Yarborough, born S.C., was married in Hall County on Oct. 25, 1832, to Jordan Griffis. (There was a widow, Nancy Griffice, with a family enumerated in the 1830 census of Hall County.

'4. Mary "Polly" Yarborough, born May, 1811, was married to William Craw-

ford Hancock. William C. Hancock, son of William, Sr., was born Aug. 17, 1811, and died July 4, 1877. He left a will recorded in Hall County. Mary "Polly" Yarborough Hancock died April 6, 1897. She and William C. are both buried in the old Concord Presbyterian Church Cemetery, Hall County, Ga. The couple left numerous descendants in Hall and Jackson Counties, Ga. Their children were: William Richardson Hancock, John A. Hancock, William Crawford Hancock, Jr., Samuel Hancock, Burrel W. Hancock, and Sarah Elizabeth Hancock who was married to James Madison Watson.

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- 5. John Wesley Yarborough, born May 20, 1813, and died December 16, 1879. He was married to Amanda Lane on December 1, 1836.

Bishop Haygood was born in Watkinsville, Clarke County, Ga., on Nov. 19, 1839, and died Jan. 19, 1896, in Oxford, Ga. He graduated from Emory College, class of 1859, and served as Chaplin of the 15th. Georgia Regiment, Col. Thomas Thomas commanding in the Army of Northern Virginia during the War Between the States. 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





# **The Tree That Owns Itself**

By Mamie Odum

MANY communities in the South have beautiful and historic trees they are proud of, but Oxford, Ga., like Athens, has a tree that owns itself.

Thirty-one years ago the citizens of Oxford deeded 1,256 square feet of land to a huge white oak known as "The Prince of the Forest." So the tree is now a tax-free property owner. It stands near the old Oxford Post Office and for half a century it has been the town's chief landmark and topic of conversation.

It's perhaps fitting that the tree should be at Oxford, the birthplace of Emory University. When one enters the quiet shaded streets of the town, time seems to roll back to that era when life proceeded at a slower, more serene pace.

Emory students have walked beneath the town's shady trees since 1831 and for many years they have admired the magnificent "Prince of the Forest." In its earlier days, the tree was cared for, lovingly, by the Rev. John W. Yarbrough and his son, George W. Yarbrough, who also became a Methodist

Editor's Note: A story in our Magazine of Oct. 23 about the large Bradford Oak at Nashville inspired the following piece by Mamie Ozburn Odum, who is poet laureate of Covington and Newton County, Ga. minister. The preacher gave the tree its name.

About 75 years ago he and his son pruned and tended the tree so that it would develop into the symmetrical beauty that it has now become. The Rev. Yarbrough. and his son placed wreaths beneath the sturdy trunk of the white oak as long as either of them lived.

The tree is said to be more than 200 years old. Its base is seven feet in diameter and the circumferential circle made by its branches is about 400 feet.

Years ago the commissioners of Oxford, supported by the women's clubs, deeded the tree to itself, and this deed was drawn and recorded by the city attorneys. It reads as follows: "This indenture made this 30th day of September, 1929, between the commissioners, township of Oxford, county of Newton, state of Georgia, of the first part, and The Giant White Oak tree known as 'The Prince Of The Forest', of the county of Newton, township of Oxford, of the second part.


"Witnesseth: that the said party of the first part, for and in consideration of love and affection, has granted unto party of second part, all that tract or parcel of land on which it is situated, lying and being in the city of Oxford, a few paces directly southwest of the present Post Office of the said town-

Be it known by all men, that this a deed by said commissioners, of tree itself, the conveyance growing out of holy love and sincere affection entertained by our citizens, and countless others for this great work of Nature, and handiwork of God.

"Signed and sealed in the presence of the commissioners of the town of Oxford, W. R. Branham, Chairman; R. L. Paine; R. F. Harwell; D. T. Stone; V. S. Williams; W. F. Sherwood; and E. Walton Strozier, Attorney At Law."





### DR. GEO. W. YARBROUGH.

Brother Yarbrough celebrated his eighty-fourth birthday March 10th at the home of his son, Rev. Jno. F. Yarbrough on Thornton Ave. The occasion was a very pleasant one indeed. Only a few friends and his brother, Rev. Walter Yarbrough, of Rome, (the only brother living) were present. Those from Dalton were: Mr. and Mrs. Jno. Brown, Rev. and Mrs. H. C. Emory and Rev. and Mrs. Chas. H. Williams. The dinner prepared by Mrs. Yarbrough could not be surpassed.

Brother Yarbrough was enjoying good health. His wit and humor furnished entertainment throughout the day. It was inspiring to see his pleasant face, sweet spirit and hear his Godly counsel and Christain experience.

He was lifensed to preach and joined the Conference in 1857 at Oxford, Ga., Covington Station. He was also Chapun of the first Georgia Senate after the War and is the only living member of that group. There are not any of his class-mates in college, or any member of the class that joined the conference when he did living. He is the oldest member of the North Georgia Conference except Rev. J. V. M. sforris.

The Marietta District was organized by him in 1869. At that time Bishop Candler was only a boy and was very fond of riding Bro. Yarbrough's horses to water.

For fifty-o... years he served his Church as Pastor and Presiding Elder, taking the superannuate relation in 1906.

When in his presence we feel that we are in the



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



In the resolutions on his death are these impressive words: "This church will ever cherish a grateful remembrance of his works of love and mercy and the truly scriptural manner in which he fully employed the excellent traits of the Christian character in all his intercourse with the church and the world. We esteem him a man of God."

From the minutes we learn that:

Cost of keeping the church has risen steadily; for the coming year it is to be \$15.

A sister charged that a brother in the church had repeatedly promised to pay her and had as repeatedly falsified his word, and they took up the matter. Belonging to a church in those days meant right obligations to be rightly kept.

Coke Chapel (named for Bishop Coke or Cokesberry) first at Burt Hill farm in the early 30's, was moved to its present site, a lot 600 x 600 feet, deeded by Mark Smith for \$25, to the trustees, George Glass, Caleb Cook, J. E. Hunnicutt, Joshua P. Shropshire, L. M. Hunnicutt. Dr. J. E. P. Hunnicutt was superintendent of its Sunday School fifty-three years. It was the home church of Dr. George Edward Smith

a beloved local preacher who believed wives should call their husbands Mr. or My Lord and was of the almost puritanic austerity of life that characterized the Methodists of that time that made them turn Mrs. John Ray, senior, out of one of their churches for wearing jewelry.

Three stone steps (in 1927) mark the time when most women of the congregation rode horseback to church and the steps were used to mount and dismount. They were hewn by Mike Costello.

The old church and burying ground are well worth a visit; some of the monuments and epitaphs are most beautiful. One monument is of Carrara (Italien) marble. Captain George Smith, of 1st Regiment Virginia Cavalry, War 1819, is buried here.

"Coke Chapel is in the Sixth district—the garden spot of the county,<sup>1</sup> Dr. Luther Smith, first graduate of Emory College from Coweta county and later its president, as boy and young man belonged to this church to which many of Georgia Methodism's greatest men preached." From Anderson:

"Willard F. Taft, carriage maker, built a new shop. He had three old sots of drinkers working for him to pay their liquor bills. All got to talking about what they were working for, and how they were spending their money and time—for what was their ruin, and the impoverishment of their families—and they all just quit work and hunted up the officer of the Temperance Society, and each one took the pledge, and returned to work to pay their indebtedness. Some did not, and some did hold out faithfully to the end. All have passed to their long home." (1880.)

Neriah (the light of the Lord) Baptist Church was organized in September; Reverends John S. Dodd, George B. Davis and Berry Holmes were present; George B. Davis was elected pastor—also reelected pastor of Ebenezer; G.W. Yarbrough, of Mount Gilead, Methodist; the Presbyterians retaining J. Y. Alexander, who had served them ten years, and the White Oak Presbyterian church for six. The latter built a new church this year and put a rock wall around their cemetery.

#### 1843

Alexander H. Stephens and Judge Walter T. Colquitt had a debate in Newnan this year that has been famous ever since. Colquitt spoke first and so brilliantly and effectively that Stephens' Whig friends I-Mrs. N. L. Cook, Miss Nora Page, Mrs. T. D. Mobler.

were very much crest-fallen when the frail thin voiced and uninspiring speaker began his reply, but, taking up Judge Colquitt's attacks on him, he began comparing their acts in the Legislature and soon had the audience in a roar of applause, and everything he said from then on to the conclusion of his speech was received with cheers and shouts of victory. It was on this occasion that Stephens is said to have retorted, when Colquitt scorpfully declared, "I could pin back his ears, grease him and swallow him whole," "Then you would have more brains in your belly than you have in your head." Of this speech, Honorable John T. Boifeuillet quotes from Henry Cleveland's entertaining book, "Alexander H. Stephens, in Public and Private," "The result of the speech at Newnan was the triumphant election of the entire Whig ticket a few weeks afterward by the largest majority given any party there in years."

Ebenezer Baptist church lost William M. Stokes, its noble deacon, in whose home it had been organized in 1828. He and his second wife, (born Jane Strong, March 26, 1785, in Virginia, married a man named Bridgewater who lost his life in the War of 1812, became Mrs. Stokes in 1815; removed to Coweta county, land lot 25 in the Sixth district, in 1827, )living in a double log-cabin-where Ebenezer was organizedfor a year, then building one of the first framed and weatherboarded houses in the county. Their home for the twenty-eight years of their married life, was noted for its gracious hospitality. But with many well trained slaves, an abundance of supplies from fields, forests, and streams it was easy to be hospitable. The timbers of their house were hewn from trees on the place, the weatherboarding, flooring and ceiling were sawed with a whip-saw. (This building in 1926 continues to be used as a dwelling). A pretty story is: that a child visitor was made so happy by this childless couple that on leaving he looked back and said to his mother, who was with him, "Ma, do you reckon that heaven is any better place than that?" Mrs. Stokes remembered when her brothers returned from serving in the Revolutionary war.

Reverend G. B. Davis was pastor of Ebenezer from 1840 to 1846 and of Neriah church as well.

The Methodists had Reverends J. F. Tigner at Mount Gilead and Harris Stearn at Newnan.

Jonathan W. Lee opened a hotel, on what was Neely's corner in 1880. Dennis F. Hammond came to practice law—as did John B. Willcoxon, H. R. Harrison-and George V. Vaughn a tailor, J. Kent, a saddler were other accessions to the population. James Rollins succeeded William F. Taft, who died, in the saloon business. Major Hugh Brewster and Walter Smith were merchants this year; Daniel Thompson, aged eighty-four died.

### 1844

In the Second district, six miles south of Newnan, on the left side of the State road a Methodist Church was organized with the name Mount Zion. A Class Leader's book has the date April 8, 1844, J. W. Yarbrough, at the bottom of the first page, with "Tarply Pricket G. W. Bryant (without punctuation), Leaders-at the top, and on the following pages the names: Tarply Pricket, George W. Bryant, Hiram Camp, Edmond Camp, Abner N. Camp, Henry Martin, James and William Hammock, George W. Camp, George W. King, Franklin Colley, J. B. McClure, W. H. Wright, James Z. Brady, John Hammock, Sarah Pricket, Mary, Peninah and Mary A. Camp, Susan, Naney and Caroline Costley, Mary Hammock, Mary A. Dodds, Catherine Flurrey, Elizabeth and Rebecca Johnson, Lucinda King, Mary Dodds, Matilda Bryant, Nancy Hindsman, Jemima Reynolds, Leah, California A. and Elizabeth A. Pricket, Nancy Holland (Senior and Junior.) Harriet Holland, Frances Colley, Elvira and Martha H. McClure, Jane Wright, and Elizabeth Tomlin.

New business ventures: J. Colen, chair and cabinet maker; Peter Buchan, watchmaker and jeweler; William Fernandez, Morton and Forbs, cabinet and chair makers—Forbs died before the year ended—; Willis Cash, a carriage workman and Harry Goram. In the country O. Linch, Esquire; T. Kirby and some others.

The whole country was in a stir from June to November over the Clay and Polk presidential campaign. There were five barbecues, and an illumination after the election. Polk stalks, ash poles, hickory trees, Clay and Polk poles with banners, were planted about the square. William U. Anderson gives a lively glimpse of that time: "Some men hung Zeak Polk on the hickory. They were afraid to venture high with him; hung him close to the ground, so they could run if they were seen. We had many speeches: Walter T. Colquitt, William H. Stiles, Hugh A. Haralson, Sampford, William B. Pryor, Herschel V. Johnson, Hiram Warner and others on the Democratic side; Alexander H. Stephens, Robert Toombs, William C. Dawson, Judge Floyd,

the writer that certain marks on the outside would convey the word of health and welfare that was all she cared for. The by-stander then thought out the value of the stamp system.

Bowen & Ragland closed their business and Samuel D. Dickson opened a grocery business with Captain J. D. Brown—which may mean what is now called a grocery, or it may mean saloon, which, in those days was often called grocery. The election returned Dr. I. E. Smith to the senate. Sanders W. Lee, Thomas O. Carter and Nicholas Dyer were chosen for the house. Reverend Andrew Neese was pastor at Mount Gilead Methodist church.

An epidemic like "the grip" of 1889-90 and "the flu" of 1918-20, was called the "Tyler grip" by those opposed to Tyler.

Only a few items concerning the schools over the county have been found. Three teachers are named by Caloway M. Webb in the sketch of him in "Memoirs of Georgia;" as he was born in 1835 they must have taught him along in the '40's: William Porch was the first, Mamie Barnes, the second, and William Allen, the third. The log schoolhouse he attended must have been in the neighborhood of the location of the present town of Moreland. J. Y. Alexander taught the Seminary or Academy-friend Anderson gives it both names on the same page—in Newnan, for fourteen years.

July 4 was always enthusiastically celebrated. The Old Virginia Reel was danced and the fiddles gave forth "Arkansas Traveler," "Walls of Jericho," "Hail Columbia," and other tunes older and just as popular.

Reverend Y. F. Tigner preached to the Newnan Methodists this and the following year, Reverend Andrew Neese to those at Mt. Gilead. There were other Methodist churches in the county, but only vague generalizations concerning them, but they must have been supplied by those who preached at Newnan and Mt. Gilead, since both of these were units of circuits.

1842

#### Obituary.

Died on Sabbath evening the 27th of February last at his residence in Newnan, Ga., Deacon Randle Robinson in the eightieth year of his age. Bro. Robinson was born in Granville county, N. C., May 2, 1762. He removed to Edgefield district S. C., where he and his wife united with the Baptists, worshipping at a place on Stephens creek known

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as Hardy's meeting house, ten miles N. E., of Augusta. From this he removed to Putnam county, Ga. about 37 years ago. This county was then comparatively a wilderness, but soon he with his wife and others united in forming a church, called at that time, Glady Creek. since known as Tirza. The church, soon after its organization, in obedience to the apostolic command to the church at Jerusalem in looking out among them a 'man of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom,' selected Bro. Robinson to fill the office of Deacon. Here he was an active and useful officer and one highly esteemed as a man and a Christian taking a firm stand in all the liberal schemes for promoting the interest of the church of Christ. In this church he lived nearly twenty years beloved and respected by his brethren and fellow citizens. About the year 1826 he emigrated to Butts county which was then a new section of the country. Here also he and his wife united in organizing a church at Towlaggee where he also discharged the duties of a deacon for about two years. Removed to Coweta county and settled in the woods one mile and three-quarters east of Newnan, about the close of 1827. In 1828 a few Baptists in and near Newnan organized a church which they called Newnan Baptist Church. Bro. Robinson was a man a little above the ordinary size, he was active, industrious, prudent and persevering in the prosecution of his worldly interest and by these means and the blessings of heaven he prospered in the affairs of this life and accumulated an ample competency for himself and children-notwithstanding his devoted interest in things of Religion, and his liberality in the support of the ministry, and that he was the warm friend of and a liberal contributor to the benevolent operations of the church, The Bible, Tract, Missionary, Temperance, Educational and Sabbath School Societies found in him an efficient friend and supporter. About six years ago he distributed the principal part of his property among his children and grandchildren, reserving a mere competency for his own support; he removed to the village in order to be near the church and to enjoy the privilege of devoting himself more fully to the service of God. Soon after his removal, owing to his age and consequent inability to attend conveniently the weekly prayer-meeting of the church, at his request, it was held at his house every Tuesday night up to the time of his death, a period of about five years. This prayer-meeting at the request of his surviving consort is still held there.
