Preface

These records are the legacy of our Yarbrough family researchers, to whom much is owed. The known family researchers include Jean Baker, Ann Y. Broadbent, Mary Y. Daniel, Frances (Rea) Donohue, Betty Humrighouse, Pauline Gray, Evelyn Goble, Nelle Morris Jenkins, Ophelia Kessler, Frances Lockwood, Karen Mazock Renee Smelley, Dorothy Svec, Jeanette Wilson, Cleveland "Cy" Yarbrough, Edna Yarbrough, George A. Yarbrough, and Robert Price Yarbrough.

The originals of these volumes are being kept for the benefit of future generations by the Williamson County Library, Franklin, Tennessee.

No claims of accuracy or authentication of the material herein are made or may be assumed. Many of these records have been superseded by subsequent research. Hence, there are records which are erroneous and unreliable; it would have been a Herculean task to attempt to correct all of them. Fortunately, there are only a few critical genealogical facts that are involved, and which are correctly stated here:

- Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough was never married to Frances Proctor;
- Ambrose Yarbrough did not immigrant from Yorkshire; he is now believed to be a descendant of Richard the Immigrant;
- There are so far only two proven sons of Old Richard John and Richard II;
- There is so far no evidence proving Joshua Yarborough I to be a descendant of Old Richard.
- The "Old Country" referred to in old documents and letters is the Colony of Virginia, not England or the Old World.
- There were not seven brothers who immigrated from "the old country"; in fact, it now appears there were three brothers and four sons of the brothers. Which were the fathers and which were the sons are so far unknown.

In spite of these inaccuracies, these records comprise much of our history and some of our accomplishments. There are pages whose print quality is so poor that word recognition was not possible. In spite of that, at least partial capability for searching these volumes is provided, as well as an index to each volume. Nonetheless, the viewer is cautioned to perform his/her own due diligence in connection with any use of this material.


The various spellings of the Yarbrough surname have never been applied consistently, even within a given family. To the extent possible, the names in the index reflect the names used on the source pages; where it wasn't clear as to which might be the proper spelling, the spelling used is "Yarbrough".

There are several William Yarbrough's in this volume, and it is not entirely clear as to whether one or two of them are separate individuals or if there are separate family sheets for the same person. This arises in part from the lack of definitive records for the time periods in which these individuals lived, as well as the lack of certainty as to the approximate dates pertinent to these individuals.

Raymond Yarbrough's paper, "A Tennessee Yarbrough Family" helps clarify who these individuals are and is required reading in order to understand the relationships of these William Yarbroughs.

William Yarbrough Sr. was born on 4 January 1774 in North Carolina. He was in Greenville, South Carolina for the 1800 and 1810 censuses. Family records of Wade Hampton Yarbrough, b. 1809, give his mother's name as Martha, so Martha was the wife in the 1810 census. Martha was born in South Carolina on 22 March 1780, so she could also be the wife in the 1800 census. The last location we have for William and Martha Yarbrough is in the 1850 census of Gibson County, Tennessee where they are living next to William Lewis and Mahulda Yarbrough Sanders, between the towns of Milan and Trenton, not far from the Rutherford Fork of the Obion River.

The children of this William Yarbrough Sr. have been enumerated, (with errors) by Mrs. Ida Walling, dcd., of McMinnville, TN. Some independent proof exists for three sons of William Yarbrough Sr.: In a Power-of-Attorney, William Yarbrough named his son James of Hardeman County. Then, in a letter from James' son Newton to Benjamin, Hampton and Benjamin are referred to as uncles of his. Newton also mentioned Reuben Yarbrough, but did not indicate his relationship. There is circumstantial evidence that Jephtha, William Jr., Susanna Jane, Mahulda and George P. were children of William Sr.. Sarah Yarbrough Howard has been taken as a daughter of William because of Ida Walling's descent from her. There are no known public records connecting Sarah to the family, but the Greenville SC connection can be taken as evidence.

Numbering of generations is by Roman numeral, and family group placement is by Arabic numeral, except unknown family group placement is a question mark. The earliest known ancestors of the Yarbrough-Davis researchers are Conrad and Sarah Davis. Three children of William Yarbrough Sr. married great grandchildren of Conrad and Sarah Davis. These great-grandchildren are in the fourth generation, so William and Martha are placed in the third generation.

Mrs. Walling also claimed that Rachel was buried next to William Yarbrough, Sr. in a cemetery near Toone, Hardeman County, Tennessee. However, William Yarbrough's wife was Martha from before 1810 and up to 1850, so it is unbelievable that Rachel Shelby could be buried next to William. Mrs. Walling claimed she received this information from Franklin Pierce Yarbrough, a grandson of William Yarbrough, Sr. She may have misconstrued the given information.

The William and Martha Yarbrough family left Greenville, South Carolina, around 1818, going first to Overton County, Tennessee where on 15 April 1820, William Yarbrough sold two Negro girls to Sterling Harris of Jackson Co. Tennessee⁵. A William Yarbro is in the 1820 Census of Overton County, TN⁶, with a family listing corresponding to known ages of most children, except that Hampton is listed as under 10, when he would become 11 that year, but may have been 10 at the time of the census.

A William Yarbrough purchased a land grant in White County in 1812, but there is no tax list evidence that he occupied that land. William Yarbrough Sr. first appears on tax lists in 1824, and he bought and sold real estate in White County between 1824 and 1848. He had several properties on Calfkiller Creek and elsewhere near Sparta, and lived in White County from about 1823 through 1835. On 26 Feb 1828 William Yarbrough sold 90 Acres in White County to Reuben Yarbrough, witnessed by George Yarbrough. In 1836 William Yarbrough Sr. gave Power of Attorney to Jeptha Yarbrough to sell property to Thomas Gibbons. Then in 1837 William Yarbrough Sr. gave Power of Attorney to his son Hampton to sell further land. His sons Jephtha, William Jr., James and Hampton also held land in White County. William Sr.'s last land transaction in White County was to legally transfer 12 acres to John Porter Howard. Susanna Jane Yarbrough married John Porter Howard in 1829, and they lived out their lives in White County. The oldest daughter of William Yarbrough Sr., Sarah Yarbrough, married Robert Charles Howard in Greenville, South Carolina, but came

to White County Tennessee in what was apparently a large migration which included this Yarbrough family, J. Pennington's family, several Wallings and other Howards.

By letter, Brother William Yarbrough and Sister Martha Yarbrough were received into the Church at Mill Creek, Hardeman County, in August of 1842. They are believed to be the Wm Yarbough family on page 211 of the 1840 census of Gibson County⁸, where the census taker has slipped one column in the female tally. On the same page is a Wm Yarbey family, which is thought to be that of William Yarbrough Jr.. In the 1850's William Yarbrough Sr. sold land in White County to sons William Jr. and George P. Yarbrough, but we don't know when William Sr. obtained these lands or if he ever lived in Hardeman County. In 1846 William Yarbrough Sr. bought 133 3/4 acres near Rutherford along the Rutherford Fork of the Obion River in Gibson County. He sold this land to his son James in 1854, the year that Martha died. In the 1850 census of Gibson County William and Martha Yarbrough are living next to Lewis and Mahulda Sanders, their youngest daughter, between Trent and Milan. It is not known where William and Martha died. Lewis Sanders died in 1851 and Mahulda remarried, James died soon after Martha, so the nearest remaining relative that William could have lived with would have been son Benjamin, who is listed as living in the town of Gibson, not far from the Sanders' place. There is a possibility that both William Yarbrough Sr. and Martha Yarbrough are buried in the Sanders Cemetery in Gibson County, perhaps in the part that is now covered by a pond.

IV.1. SARAH YARBROUGH HOWARD PENNINGTON

Sarah Yarbrough's descendant Ida G. Walling of McMinnville, TN (deceased) claimed that William Yarbrough Sr. and his wife Rachel Shelby Yarbrough are buried in the William Yarbrough Jr. cemetery near the town of Toone in Hardeman County, TN, and that William Yarbrough Sr. ended his days living with William Yarbrough Jr.'s family. We Know that Ida Walling is wrong about Rachel Shelby being William Yarbrough Sr.'s wife in Tennessee, and there is no other confirmation that William Yarbrough Sr. is buried in that cemetery, so Ida Walling may have been mistaken in that fact as well. She claimed that Franklin Pierce Yarbrough gave her that information, but she didn't make it public until after he had died. Ida Walling had obtained D.A.R. membership on the basis of Revolutionary War Service of William Yarbrough Sr., who was born in 1774 and certainly did not serve in a war that ended when he was 6 years old. The D.A.R. has disallowed this service, as it belongs to a different William Yarbrough (d. 1793). Ida Walling had a Revolutionary War headstone placed in the cemetery near Toone, with Williams birth listed as in 1766. This headstone should be removed, as it was obtained and placed there under false claims.

Mrs. Ida G. Walling disseminated information concerning her Yarbrough ancestors containing many errors. All claims by her must be verified by independent sources. The following is a compilation of Ida Walling's published information. Verified errors are underlined. Other probable errors can be

Letters, Ida G. (Mrs Alonzo Nelson) Walling, "Rebel Hill," McMinnville, Warren County, Tennessee, to C.K. Shelby.

(a) Aug. 2, 1932,-

My great-grandmother was Sarah Yarbrough, born in North Carolina about 1793 and died in 1882, Her mother was a Shelby. Sarah married Robert Charles Howard (b. Charleston, S.C.) about 1812. Their oldest daughter Minerva was born in 1813. My grandmother, Mahala Howard, another daughter was born in Greenville, South Carolina, December 1815. She married a Walling.

There were Yarbroughs in Charlotte, North Carolina, also. A Raleigh genealogist told me that Moses's sixth child, Margaret, was born in 1772. I found a William Yarbrough and Robert C. Howard were granted land in White County, Tennessee, in 1824. I know that my Shelby-Yarbrough lived in Sparta in that county in the early twenties and that they moved to what was then called the "Western Districts" about 1830. South Carolina had no marriage license law until 1911. I am trying to find out the identity of the parents of the above Sarah Yarbrough.

(b) Jun. 5, 1933

I have at last found my Shelby connection. Goodspeed's History of Obion County, Tennessee, mentions a Jepsy (Jeptha) Yarbrough, son of William, a pioneer of Hardeman County, and on inquiry I learned of a Mr. F.P. Yarbrough at Toone, an undertaker, now eighty-six years old. He is a grandson of William Yarbrough, Sr., and wife Rachel Shelby, daughter of Moses Shelby. They died in the home of his father, who was William Yarbrough Jr., she in 1855 (ae abt. 81) and he in 1859 (ar 93).

The children of William and Rachel (Shelby) Yarbrough, the first five born on Dutch Buffalo creek in North Carolina, were: Sarah, b. 1792 (my gt-grandmother), m. Robert Charles Howard; Benjamin (killed in battle?); Hulda, m. ---- Sanders; Jeptha, m. Lavina Isham; William Jr. b. 1804m m. 1. Gibbons, m2. Hannah Davis; George, m. Celia Davis, Hannah's sister; Hampton; Susannah, b. 1812, m. Jack Howard.

William Yarbrough, Sr., was from Halifax County and served from that district in the Revolution under Captain Brinkley and was a captain in the War of 1812, living then in Nashville, Tennessee. He removed in 1824 to White County.

It was in White county that my grandmother, Mahala Howard, married Hiram Kilgore Walling. After 1830 the Yarbroughs lived in Hardin County.

William and Rachel are buried two and a half miles north of Toone, Hardeman County, in the Yarbrough graveyard. I happen to be Presbyterian.

(c) July 3, 1933,-

When I was ten years old (am now forty-five) a young lady in Evansville, Indiana, where I lived, married a man (from Ohio, I

think) named Frank Chapline. I was then living with my Father's sister, Mother having died when I was fifteen months old. Father often came to see me and I remember my auntie telling me on one occasion about Sadie Bennett's marriage, at which he remarked, "Some of Mother's people were Chaplines." Now, do you suppose that Moses's wife was Isabella Chapline, either a daughter or sister of Joseph?

I am waiting for a blank to fill in requesting a government marker for the Revolutionary soldier, William Yarbrough. Neither his nor Rachel's grave is marked, but old Mr. Yarbrough knows exactly where they lie, for he "cleans off the graves" every year. The old gentleman wrote that Rachel had dark eyes and hair; but that the Yarbroughs were fair.

note: The following is quoted from a booklet on the Yarbroughs that Pauline Gray found in the Mormon Library in Salt Lake City. Unfortunately she did not copy the title page. However, by comparing ages of Mrs. Walling to other information, it appears to have been written about 1954.

(This from Mrs. Ida G. Walling of "Rebel Hill" McMinnville, Tennessee.)

"I do not have a great deal of Yarbrough data. Some years ago a woman from Iowa came to see me, got from me the Yarbrough Coat-of-Arms, and went on to N.C. to visit some Yarboroughs, and came back with most fantastic deductions. Somewhere in the attic I may still have her letters, but while she had lots of odds and ends, there was no proof of lines. I have only a few dates and got them from an old man at Toone, Hardeman Co., Tennessee, where William is buried.

South Carolina had no marriage license records until 1911, so wills are the only proof, and the Yarboroughs must have all been poor. I do not leave my D.A.R. ancestor papers open to the public, because I like to know who wants to use them and why. I will, however, give you an outline.

"I am a daughter of Felix Grundy Walling, born in 1839. I was a Walling before I married a distant cousin, Alonzo Nelson Walling, who died in 1947. I am 66 years old and teaching my last year. Felix Grundy Walling's mother was Mahala Howard, who married Hiram Kilgore Walling. She was the daughter of Sarah Yarbrough and Robert Charles Howard, who was born in 1796 and died in 1883. Mahala was borne in Greenville, Green Co., S.C., Dec 24, 1815, died March 21, 1876. (This is an error, as there is no Greene Co., in S.C.)

Sarah Yarborough, born 1796, was daughter of Rachel Shelby, born 1776, died 1855. She married William Yarbrough in 1792. Rachel was a daughter of Moses and wife, Isabella. William Yarbrough was the son of Manoah Yarbrough, born 1766 and died March 20, 1859. William Yarborough, born in N.C. 1766, died Hardeman Co., Tenn., March 20, 1859. Residence during Revolution was Halifax Co., N.C. (from affidavits of Henry Jones Cabitt, Wisconsin, and Franklin P. Yarbrough, Toome, Tennessee.) Service - Pvt. soldier Wm. Brinkley's Co., N.C. Col. Samuel Jarvis, 1st. N.C. Regiment, Halifax District. (N.C. Roster, p. 623)

Children of William Yarborough and Rachel Shelby:
Sarah m. Robert C. Howard and Joshua Pennington; Benjamin, Hampton, Jeptha m. Lavinia Isham, William m. Gibbons and Hannah Davis, George, Hulda m. Sanders, John m. Cath Davis, Susanna, b. 1/9/1812, m. Jack Howard 1/1/1829, Reuben.

William Yarborough moved to White Co., Tenn., then to what was called Western District, and is now Hardeman Co., Tenn. I suppose he got land for Revolutionary service.

note: The following is from Yarbrough-Yarborough and Allied Families, a Quarterly by Nelle Morris Jenkins, Volume 1 pages 82 and 83. The direct author is Mrs. Jenkins. The year of publication is 1961, so Mrs. Walling would be then about 73 years old. RBY

There is another mention of the name Jeptha Yarborough. A letter to me from Mrs. Walling of McMinnville, Tenn., states that hi she is the daughter of Mahala Howard Walling, whose mother was daughter of Sarah Yarborough and Robert C. Howard. This Sarah was born in 1796, was the daughter of Rachel Shelby born 1776. Rachel Shelby married William Yarborough born 1766, died 20 March 1859 the son of Manoah Yarborough. (This Manoah was the brother of Zachariah who was the father of my Manoah and of the Henry Yarbrough who went to Tipton, Co., Tenn.)Mrs. Walling said that her William Yarborough lived in Halifax District County, N.C. during the Revolution and upon the affidavit of several, among whom was Franklin P. Yarborough., he was given a pension. William Yarborough moved to White County, Tenn., then to Hardeman County, (then called Western Dist. William and Rachel (Shelby) had 10 children: Sarah, Benjamin, Hampton, Jeptha, William, George, Hulda, John, Susanna, Reuben. Mrs. Walling said that William Yarborough is buried in Toome, Hardeman County, Tenn. (To Dorothy Svec:) Mrs. Walling is an ex-school teacher and paints. She does nice work painting the Yarborough Coat of Arms, in case you would like to contact her, her address is Mrs. Ida Walling, Rebel Hill, McMinnville, Tenn. I have not heard from her for several years, but I presume she is yet living.

note: the following is from volume 2 of Nelle Morris Jenkins Quarterly, page 94. RBY

... William Yarbrough who married Rachel Shelby (both born 1766) and he died in Hardeman County, Tenn., 1859 was a son of Manoah who went to Georgia - so he was a first cousin of my Manoah. This William was a Rev. soldier and lived in Halifax County, N.C. during the Revolution. He received his pension on affidavit of Franklin P. Yarborough of Toome, Tenn. William and Rachel Yarborough had a son Reuben who was perhaps the youngest. Other children were Benjamin, Hampton, Jeptha who married Lavinia Isham, William who married (1) a Gibbons and (2) a Davis, George, Hulda, John, Susannah and the (hte above) Reuben. Mrs. Walling of McMinnville, Tenn. Sent this to me - she is descended from ...

Shelby genealogical researchers have disallowed the claim that William Yarbrough married Rachel Shelby until independent verification can be ob-

tained. Ida Walling is their only source of that information. They are aware that William Yarbrough was married to Martha throughout his life in Tennessee.

A Helen W. Tomlinson of Brunsville, MN compiled an undated Family Group sheet which Karen Mazock sent to Melba Tullos and Karen Lambert. This deals with the family of Robert Charles Howard and Sarah Yarbrough. It says Howard b. 1789 in Charleston SC., married Sarah in Greenville, Greenville Co, SC in 1812, died 19 May 1867 in Mineral Point, Iowa Co, MN. Sarah and Robert Charles Howard were divorced and he went to Wisconsin, changing his name to Hoard. Sarah Yarbrough Howard married Joshua Pennington after the 1840 census, and they moved to Warren County, Tennessee before 1860.

The information on Sarah is obviously tainted by Ida Walling, indicating birth in NC ca 1893 with parents of William Yarbrough and Rachel Shelby. Under places of residence are NC, Greenville SC, Sparta TN, Spencer TN, MO. Her death place is listed as Sedalia, Pettis Co MO in Apr 1883. It has the two oldest daughters born in Greenville in 1813 and 1815, and showing the eldest, Minerva, going to Minnesota with Hoard after marrying Warrington Jones in 1830, probably in Sparta TN. In a note: Hoard was in Mineral Point Wisconsin by 1828. Sarah divorced Robert Charles Howard and lived with daughter Mahala Walling on the Daniel Walling Estate on Spencer Mt. in Van Buren Co TN. There are 5 children listed on the sheet, and another sheet has a sixth. The children of Robert Charles Howard and Sarah Yarbrough are:

The fact that Martha's son is named Shelby Walling may have been the source of Ida Walling's notion that she was descended from a Shelby. Perhaps the Wallings were so descended.

IV.3. JEPTHA YARBROUGH

Jephtha Yarbrough first appears in White County, TN in the 1828 Tax List 85 1/2 acres of school land and 30 acres of other land. The same are listed for him in 1829. In the 1830 census of White County, TN he is listed with another adult male in his age range, a female in the same range, and a daughter under 5 years old. From later censuses Jeptha was born in 1800/1801, his wife is Levinia (Isham) and they have eight listed children 10. As Jeptha acted as attorney in White County for William Yarbrough and James Yarbrough in 1835, and is listed in the 1840 Hardeman County Census, he came to Hardeman County

between 1835 and 1840. He appears to be the second of this Yarbrough family to settle in Hardeman County, and he remained there the rest of his life. Jeptha Yarbrough sold land in Hardeman Co. in 1849 and 1850, and a Jeptha Yarbrough¹¹ bought property in 1853 and 1858 in Hardeman County. The Estate of Jeptha Yarbrough sold land in 1872 to W.H. Yarbrough, so our Jeptha Yarbrough died shortly before then. A J.W. Yarbrough bought and sold 109 acres in 1859, and a W.J. Yarbrough bought property in 1873.

HARDEMAN COUNTY, TENNESSEE FAMILY OF JEPTHA AND LAVENIA ISHAM YARBROUGH By Karen Lambert

William Yarbrough I and Rachel Shelby had several children who lived in Hardeman County, Tennessee, where William I is buried. Jeptha Yarbrough and William A Yarbrough (II) settled in that county and their descendants remain there today. Jeptha was born around 1801 in North Carolina. He is found in White County in Capt. Malory's Company or District in 1828, and Bradford's Company in 1835 on tax lists. Jeptha Yarbrough sold property in Hardeman County Tennessee in 1849 and 1850. There is no record of the acquisition of this property in Hardeman County's Deed Books. He bought land in 1853 and 1858 in Hardeman County. His heirs sold land in 1872.

Jeptha Yarbrough married Lavenia Isham who was born in 1805. Jeptha and Lavenia are buried in an old cemetery on the farm of A.E. Smith Jr. near Toone, Tennessee. Her headstone is broken into several pieces but the date of birth is readable. Only a footstone remains for J.Y.. Lavenia and Jeptha had eight children (U.S. Census, 1860):

W.I. Yarbrough is buried in the cemetery with Jeptha and Lavenia, and this may be their son William. William Ira Yarbrough is listed on the Hardeman County Tenn. Confederate Pension List, naming his wife as Lucretia. A William H. Yarbrough married Catherine Davis in the Hardeman County Marriage Records, and W. H. Yarbrough purchased the land from the Jeptha Yarbrough heirs in 1872. Probably Wm. H. is not Jeptha's son William Ira Yarbrough, but could be another relative of Jeptha's.

In the following, various censuses, marriage records of Hardeman County and

Gibson County and various information from researchers have been used to construct the family of Jeptha and Lavinia Yarbrough. Neither the name Horace nor the information on twins is in the 1860 Census Index, and most of the marriages are uncertain. If Hampton's name is Wade Hampton, after his uncle, then he would be the person who bought the property after Jeptha died.

IV.4. WILLIAM YARBROUGH, Jr.

William Yarbrough Jr. is first found in the White County Tax lists in 1828, but has not been found in the 1830 census there. The William Yarbrough Jr. family was probably in the Gibson County, Tennessee, census in 1840, and first appear in the Hardeman County census in 1850. They settled near Toone. William had married Hannah Davis, a daughter of Augustus Parks Davis, who was listed with the William Yarbrough Jr. family along with his youngest children in the 1850 census¹². Augustus' property was East and next to that of William Yarbrough Jr..

HARDEMAN COUNTY, TENNESSEE FAMILY OF WILLIAM YARBROUGH AND HANNAH ADA DAVIS by Karen Lambert

William Yarbrough I had another son, William (II), who lived in Hardeman County. There is a Wm Yarbro in Overton County TN in the 1820 Census and on the tax list of that county in 1823. He was in White County TN in the later 1820's and in the 1830 Census. There were two William Yarbroughs listed in the 1840 census in Gibson county TN that fit the ages and family ages for William I and William II. William II bought 175 acres in Hardeman County from his father in 1852. There was no record of this land through 1874.

According to a bible record transcribed by Rebecca Watson, a descendant of William Yarbrough II (this bible was in the possession of another descendant and has since been destroyed). William Yarbrough married Hannah Ada Davis on 2/25/1836. Hannah was born 6/18/1814 and died 5/15/1864. However Mrs. Watkins says the page this was on was very hard to read and this may have been 1884. Hannah was living in the later census records, so probably the correct date is 6/16/1884. Another transcription of the same bible record listed Martha Martella as one of the children, but this child was not included on Mrs. Watson's bible record. William and

IV.5. JAMES YARBROUGH

Several children of William Yarbrough Sr. settled in Hardeman County, Tennessee. James Yarbrough, whom William identified as his son and as living in Hardeman County in a letter granting James Power of Attorney on 27 Oct 1835, was probably the first of this Yarbrough family to settle there. James bought the property of Peter Howard at a Sheriffs' Sale in White County in 1829. On 9 Nov 1835 James gave Jeptha Yarbrough Power of Attorney to convey 53 1/2 acres to Thomas Gibbons in White County, which indicates he preceded Jeptha to Hardeman County. James Yarbrough received a land grant in Hardeman County in 1836. He sold Hardeman property in 1838 to John L. Weed and in 1847 to H.L. Doyle, and he moved to Gibson County, Tennessee, before the 1850 census. In Gibson County in 1838 James bought 640 acres from Lewis Sander, which he later sold to East Tennessee College 13. In 1854 James purchased 133 3/4 Acres in Gibson County from William Yarbrough. James was the original executor of Lewis Sanders' estate, and had guaranteed Benjamin Yarbrough's guardianship of the minor children of Lewis and Mahulda Sanders. James moved to Henry County, Tennessee about 1855, and died there in early 1856. In his letter of 12 Feb 1855 to uncle Benjamin Yarbrough, James' son Newton mentions his father's health and urges Ben to come visit him in the spring. Newton says to send his letters to massadonia, (Macedonia?) Carroll County, which must be the nearest post office. In this same letter he mentions a letter from uncle Hampton saying they have bought land in Missouri. Wade Hampton Yarbrough is known to have purchased 120 acres near Columbus, Jackson Township of Johnson County, Missouri on 1 Dec 1854.

Newton R. Yarbrough signed an affidavit on 11 July 1852 attesting Rebecca A. Yarbrough was resident in Gibson County, and so eligible to marry James Davis in that county. Rebecca Armstrong is in the James Yarbrough family in the 1850 Gibson County census. Possibly this James Davis is a son of Augustus Parks Davis. James Yarbrough had another son, William who was 14 in the 1850 census. It is possible that this is the William H. Yarbrough who married Catherine Davis, youngest daughter of Augustus Parks Davis. A William H. Yarbrough witnessed the sale of property by William Yarbrough Sr. to William Yarbrough Jr. in 1851, and it is questionable that a 15 year old boy could witness a deed. In the 1840 Hardeman County census of James Yarbrough lists

another male born 1830-1835 who is probably another son, possibly the Joseph H. Yarbrough who owed William Lewis Sanders \$12 on a note due 5 Jan 1845 in the estate papers.

JAMES YARBROUGH (W. James Yarbrough) by Wanda Johnson

James Yarbrough was born around 1806 in South Carolina. He was a son of William and Martha Yarbrough and a brother to Benjamin Yarbrough. His wife was Martha who was born around 1801 in Virginia.

James Yarbrough, Benjamin Yarbrough and several other men were named as administrators of the Lewis Sanders estate in 1852. James served in that capacity until 1854 when Benjamin took over the duties.

Probably in January of 1855 James, Martha, N.R. and Eurilda moved from Gibson County to Henry County, TN. (N.R., R.N. and Newton R. are used at various times. I believe these all refer to the same person). At least two older children remained in Gibson County 14 : Rebecca Yarbrough Davis who married James Davis, and possibly an older son.

James Yarbrough purchased 124 3/4 acres on 14 March 1855 in Henry County, TN. which was recorded 24 July 1855. On March 14, 1856, an inventory of the estate of James Yarbrough was submitted to the clerk. Administrator was N.R. Yarbrough. None of the names at the sale were familiar except Martha, N.R. and William Yarbrough (possibly the older child). An inventory of notes held by James Yarbrough was also submitted. Some of these date to 1835, but no county is given, and the names are very unclear.

Newton R. Yarbrough married Mary F. Anderson 12 December 1865 in Carroll County, TN. Eurilda Yarbrough married Lafayette Young on 22 November 1860 in Henry County. According the 1880 census of Henry County TN, 9th Civil District, Eurilda is listed as Childers, obviously a second marriage.

N.R./R.N. Yarbrough's will was dated 15 November 1911 and recorded in Henry County court Minutes 31 March 1925. "I give, devise, bequeath unto my son, James N. Yarbrough his heirs and assigns of State and County above said who now resides with me my entire farm on which I live." This being the same 124 3/4 acres purchased by James Yarbrough in 1855. He named one Grandson, William Gilbert Yarbrough, to whom he gave \$10.00. The remainder was given to James N. No other children or heirs were listed.

James N. Yarbrough, 2/29/1876 - 3/3/1933, is buried in the Shiloh Church Cemetery in Carroll County, TN, just a few miles from the Henry County line. No other Yarbroughs are listed as buried there, but it is an old cemetery with many unmarked graves. The Yarbrough stone appears to not be in the correct position according to the stones around it.

No other descendants have been found at this point. 1 April 1992.

IV.6. WADE HAMPTON YARBROUGH

Wade Hampton Yarbrough was born April 21, 1809 in Greeneville County, South Carolina. His parents were William and Martha Yarbrough 15. Wade Hampton Yarbrough married Mary M. Davis in Sparta Tennessee about 1830, and carried on the business of farming several pieces of property there until about 1841.

Mary M. Davis was a daughter of Jonathan C. Davis. She was born in Sparta, White County, Tennessee on 28 August 1814¹⁷. In 1840 they were living next to Jonathan C. Davis¹⁸ near Rock Island. In 1841 Hampton Yarbrough and Owen Bates sold their (jointly owned) land, originally a grant to Jonathan C. Davis. Then these Yarbroughs and some relatives of Mary M. Davis Yarbrough went to Dade County, Missouri, where Wade Hampton Yarbrough pursued the trade of shoemaker and Saddler. In the 1850 census of Dade Co MO we find Owen Bates¹⁹ who was probably Mary's brother-in-law. They were in Lawrence Co MO for the 1850 census²⁰.

Lawrence County was organized from parts of Dade and Barry Counties on Feb 14, 1845, so this Yarbrough family and that of Mary's cousin Maxwell Davis²¹ were among the earliest inhabitants of the newly established town of Mount Vernon, which was laid out also in 1845. In 1848 Wade Hampton Yarbrough was in a partnership with Rufus M. Elsey, a saddler, in purchasing a shop on a small lot in Mount Vernon²². The next year Wade Hampton Yarbrough bought Rufus out²³ and in 1850 sold it to John S. Williams²⁴.

Wade Hampton and Mary M.Yarbrough went to Johnson County, Missouri, purchasing property near the town of Columbus in Jackson township to take up farming, just over the LaFayette County line, from where Rufus M. Elsey is

found in the 1850 census. Hampton's property had two parcels, one of 40 and the other 80 acres. It was purchased for \$200 from Samuel and Lucretia Cornett on 1 Dec 1854^{25} .

Wade Hampton Yarbrough's family is in Johnson County MO for the 1860 census²⁶.

In January of 1862 the worst in Johnson County of the violence of the war between the states took place. Union soldiers from Kansas (Jayhawkers) who had lost some of their number in an ambush in western Johnson County returned to wreak vengeance on South sympathizers. This Jayhawk regiment robbed and burned about forty homes in the south-west part of the county. Jayhawk troops were then sent to the Columbus area, but were tricked by the towns people into an ambush where 5 Kansans were killed and many more wounded. In retaliation, Columbus was burned along with surrounding area homes of some 50 Southern sympathizers²⁷. Two of Wade Hampton Yarbrough's sons and two future sons-in-law somehow ended up in Union uniforms, in spite of the fact that they were all Southerners by birth.

In 1864 Wade Hampton and Mary M. Yarbrough sold their Johnson County property to son Felix Grundy for \$700²⁸, but they remained on the tax lists through 1867. They are found in the 1870 census of Bourbon County²⁹, where they remained for about two years, moving on to Cowley County around 1871. They are in Richland Township of Cowley County in the 1880 census. Crockett, their oldest son had gone to Sonoma County, California, but the three remaining sons and two daughters are also in Cowley Co, KS at that time. Their oldest daughter has settled in Labette Co, KS.

IV.7. SUSANNA JANE YARBROUGH HOWARD

Susanna Jane Yarbrough was born in South Carolina, presumably in Greenville, on 19 January 1812, and died 16 Dec 1853 in Sparta, White County, TN. She married John Porter Howard on 1 January 1829. Robert J. Howard of Morrison TN in 1989 wrote that John Porter Howard and Susanna Jane Yarbrough were both born in Greenville SC, and that in White county they obtained a land grant³⁰ of 640 acres. William Yarbrough Sr.'s last land transaction in White County was on 10 Oct 1848 to legally transfer 12 acres to John Porter Howard.

IV.8. MAHULDA YARBROUGH SANDERS MATHIS

Mahulda Yarbrough probably met William Lewis Sanders in Gibson County after the Yarbroughs moved there from White County. There is no record of Sanders in White County. The first recorded contact of a Yarbrough with Lewis Sanders is in 1838 in Gibson County TN, when James Yarbrough purchased 640 acres from a Lewis Sander. However, the oldest son of Lewis and Mahulda is William Lewis Sanders Jr., who was born about 1836, so Mahulda and Lewis Sanders were married in 1835 or earlier. As William Yarbrough Sr. is still on the tax lists in White County as late as 1832, it is unlikely that the Yarbroughs went to Gibson County before about 1833. Both William Yarbrough Sr. and James Yarbrough gave Power-of-attorney to Jeptha in 1835, indicating they were already gone from White County at that time. So, in all likelihood,

^{30.} A Land Grant was the initial establishment of property ownership and was available by application to settlers in new territory. Land grants associated with military service were usually issued to cover arrears in pay to the serviceman. Land Grants may have involved some cost, but in many cases they were free to encourage people to settle new territories.

William Lewis Sanders and Mahulda Yarbrough were married in 1834 or 1835. In the 1840 census, William and Martha Yarbrough are near the town of Rutherford, which is about 10 miles north-west of the Sanders place. In the 1850 census they are in the next dwelling from the Sanders.

Wanda Johnson wrote that William Lewis Sanders was born 1 January 1772 in South Carolina, where he was appointed constable for Union County in 1796; that he is in the 1800 Union Co SC census and in the 1810 and 1820 censuses of Chester Co SC.; that there is an L. Saunders in the 1830 census of Chester Co SC who may be Lewis Sanders; and that Lewis Sanders first appears on the Tax List of Gibson Co TN in 1836. Note that in the 1850 Gibson Co TN Census, his name is Lewis Saunders. As Lewis Sanders died on 1 September 1852, the 1850 census shows all of the known children of Lewis and Mahulda Sanders³¹.

After Lewis Sanders' death, both James Yarbrough and Benjamin Yarbrough served as executor of Lewis Sanders' estate. In the inventory of notes and accounts of Lewis Sanders (4 Feb 1853?) there are two notes of particular interest. One is a note for payment of articles purchased at the estate sale which is for \$55.50 cosigned by William Yarbrough and Mahulda Sanders. The other is an old note on Joseph H? Yarbrough, due 5 Jan 1845, for twelve dollars, with the words in solvent and dead. This may be James Yarbrough's missing son who was in the same age range as Newton in the 1840 Hardeman Co TN census. There is almost overwhelming circumstantial evidence that Mahulda is a sister of James and Benjamin and a daughter of William and Martha Yarbrough.

Mahulda married Elisha Mathis in 1853, and is not found in Gibson County until on 24 Feb 1880 she signed a Quit-Claim in favor of Lafayette Sanders, her son.

MAHULDA YARBROUGH SANDERS (Matilda Mahulda Yarbrough)

Mahulda Yarbrough was born 17 September 1817. She probably married William Lewis Sanders in 1831. Actual date and location are unknown. She is probably the daughter of William and Martha Yarbrough. They were living next door, or very close to, Mahulda in both the 1840 and 1850 Gibson Co TN Censuses. James and Benjamin were administrators of the estate of her husband, Lewis Sanders.

Four children were born to Mahulda Sanders: William Lewis, George Washington, Martha H. Pernelia, and James Lafayette.

The census records say Mahulda was born in SC, but the family says "9 miles from Sparta, White County, TN". Larry Morris has this figured out:

Census Taker: "Mrs. Sanders, where were you born?"

Mahulda: "I was born in SC."

Grandchild: "Grandmaw, where were you raised?"
Mahulda: "White County, 9 miles from Sparta, TN."

Probably any variation of this scenario will produce the same results, especially if Mahulda was born in SC and moved soon afterward to TN. There is another remote possibility, but for now I am going with SC.

The census records say she cold not read or write, yet the family has a small handbook of poems that belonged to her. This book also contains the name "John Pennington", and Mahulda's and Lewis Sanders' birthdates. The letter that accompanied her application for widow's pension is signed, but not with an X.

In 1853, Mahulda married Elisha Mathis. It has not been established where she spent the next 20 years. As far as we know, there were no children from this marriage. On 20 March 1878, Mathis applied for a pension on service during the war of 1812. It was rejected. He was 80 years old and a resident of Henderson, Texas.

Elisha Mathis died in Texas on 7 September 1883. Mahulda applied for a widow's pension on 18 March 1893. She believed that Mathis received a pension. Her application was rejected. She obviously did not know he had been rejected, which leads me to believe that she was not living with him at the time and probably did not live with him very long at all.

In later years, I think Mahulda lived with both children and grandchildren. My grandmother always said the "Grandmaw raised me" meaning Mahulda.

Mahulda Yarbrough Sanders Mathis died 10 September 1891 in Gibson County, TN. She is buried next to William Lewis Sanders in the old Sanders Cemetery in Gibson County.

IV.9. GEORGE P. YARBROUGH

George P. Yarbrough was born in Tennessee about 1820. If he was born in Overton County, then he was born before the census of that year, as he is a necessary member to make the census fit the family. He first appears in the White Co TN Marriage Book, where he married on 15 Sept 1839 Celia Davis, a daughter of Augustus Parks Davis. It is presumed that they are with William Yarbrough Sr. in the 1840 Gibson Co TN census, and that the census taker slipped a column in the female tally, so that both Celia and Martha are actually there.

George Yarbrough received a Hardeman Co TN land Grant of 189 1/2 acres in 1848. George P. and Celia Yarbrough appear in only one known census, in

1850³² in Hardeman Co TN. They settled near Toone, having property facing that of William Yarbrough Jr.. George purchased 25 acres from William Yarbrough (Sr?) in 1850, and 206 acres from E.S. Legget in 1852. He sold 100 Acres to Benjamin W. Yarbrough in 1855 and sold 106 acres and 40 acres to B.N. Jones in 1859. George moved away, but may have sold 25 acres to William Yarbrough Jr. in 1870. At least one of George's children remained in Hardeman County.

BENJAMIN YARBROUGH c1824 - 1861

Benjamin W. Yarbrough was born about 1824, probably near Sparta TN. His marriage in Gibson Co TN on 5 Mar 1845 to Mary Jane McAllilly is the first record of them. Mary Jane was born 1 Oct 1826 in TN and died 3 Mar 1891, she is buried with Mahulda Yarbrough in the Lewis Cemetery in Gibson Co TN. Her mother was probably a Delashment. She and her sisters were represented by George P. McAllilly in litigation over Elijah Delashment's estate³³:

Deed Book R, p. 497 April 7, 1855. Benjamin Yarbrough and Mary Jane Yarbrough, formerly Mary Jane McAllilly; Job and Elizabeth Hicks, Formerly Elizabeth McAllilly, James and Margaret Cook, formerly Margaret Mc Allilly, appoint George P. McAllilly, attorney (Power of attorney). Ligation of Elijah Delashment, dec'd. Signed by Benjamin Yarbrough, Job Hicks, James Cook, Mary Jane Yarbrough, Margaret Cook, Elizabeth (X) Hicks.

When Lewis Sanders died, Benjamin became guardian of Lewis and Mahulda Sanders' minor children. When James Yarbrough could no longer carry out the duties of Administrator of Lewis Sanders' estate, Benjamin was appointed to carry on. These legal arrangements provide further evidence of the close relationship between these Yarbroughs and Mahulda Sanders.

Ben Yarbrough died in the War between the states probably in 1861. Benjamin apparently was with his parents until he married, and he appears in two Gibson Co TN censuses³⁴, and Mary Jane remained in Gibson County for the rest of her life.

Benjamin Yarbrough was the son of William and Martha Yarbrough. He was born in Tennessee probably 1825. In 1852, Benjamin Yarbrough, James Yarbrough and several other men were appointed as administrators of the Lewis Sanders' estate. James Yarbrough served in that position until 1854 when Benjamin took over.

Benjamin married Mary Jane McAliley, 3/6/46, in Gibson County. George P. Yarbrough was the bondsman. She was probably the daughter of James or Samuel McAliley of Chester County SC. Both James and Samuel died early, and Mary Jane and Margaret were made wards of Richard McAliley. Mary Jane Yarbrough is buried in the old Sanders Cemetery in Gibson County.

Benjamin Yarbrough joined the 22 Tennessee Infantry (State Troops) mid-1861 and survived the Battle of Belmont. By mid-1862 signed vouchers by the administrator of his estate can be found. In all probability, he was a casualty of the Battle of Shiloh. It's just a matter of checking CSA records to be sure. 1 April 1992

In Cowley County, Kansas, in the heart of the community of Floral is an old cemetery which is still cared for. Among the oldest gravestones in this Floral Cemetery is a stele inscribed "Mary M. Yarbrough wife of W.H.", and "W.H. Yarbrough, d. 12 March 1886 - 76 y 10m 9d." These are Wade Hampton Yarbrough and his wife who was born Mary M. Davis. They came to Cowley County in the 1870's along with three sons, two married daughters and an orphaned grandson. The sons were Felix Grundy Yarbrough, Andrew Jackson Yarbrough and Newton Leonidas Yarbrough. The daughters were Sarah Samantha Holloway, wife of Stephen Judd Holloway, and Virginia Catherine Clabaugh, wife of Charles Thomas Clabaugh. The orphaned grandson was William C. Cornet. Except for Newton who moved to California, these people lived out their lives in Cowley County where some of their descendants are living today. Two other sons and three other daughters did not go with them. Crockett Davis Yarbrough went to California during the Gold Rush, Mary Melissa Freeman went to Labette County, Kansas, Martha Ann Cornett died in Missouri, Amanda Jane Yarbrough's fate is unknown, and George William Yarbrough died in infancy in Missouri.

The names of the sons in this family require some comment. At the time of Crockett Davis Yarbrough's birth, Davy Crockett had just been defeated in his bid for re-election as a Congressman from Tennessee, as he was a bitter political opponent of reigning president Andrew Jackson. Davy Crockett was the champion of the squatters who were encamped in Western Tennessee, and against the land speculators and plantation owners (exemplified by such as John Sevier, the preeminent pioneer of Tennessee, and Wade Hampton the most noted

Georgia. Wade Hampton's army was successful in locating and punishing those raiders, and he is remembered well in the city of Greenville, which has named a major thoroughfare in his honor.

Wade Hampton, 1752-1835, American planter and soldier, served as a colonel under General Sumpter in the American Revolution, and afterwards took part in South Carolina politics, opposing the ratification of the Federal Constitution, and serving as U.S. Representative, 1795-97 and 1803-5. He developed large cotton plantations in South Carolina before 1800 and sugar plantations in Mississippi about 1811, and ultimately became the wealthiest planter of his day in America. In the War of 1812 he was given command of a column which was to march from N. New York to the St. Lawrence and then, after effecting a union with Wilkinson's army, move against Montreal. He was turned back back at Chateauguay and immediately resigned his command.

His grandson, also Wade Hampton, 1818-1902, was a significant leader of Confederate forces, and later a powerful politician in South Carolina.

The Columbia Encyclopedia, Clarke F. Ansley ed., Columbia University Press, MCMXL, page 788.

This Wade Hampton also obtained huge land grants along the Mississippi River and Tennessee River in the latter 18th century, which are documented in land records of Greenville County, South Carolina. Some of John Sevier's grant on the Tennessee River are included in the same source.

William and Martha Yarbrough took their family, which by then included two more daughters, to Tennessee some time between 1818 and 1820. Family lore reported by Robert J. Howard [1] is that the Howards, Yarbroughs and Beaver's came to Tennessee together. Certainly the Yarbroughs and Howards were in Greenville County, South Carolina, but the only Bevers who appear in my records are in Cowley County, Kansas and Sonoma County, California, and they came from Indiana. There were Dills, Howards, Princes, Wallings, and Wests in Greenville County, South Carolina in 1810, and these names are all present in White County, Tennessee in 1830. It is likely that at least some of these families moved to White County, TN from Greenville County, SC.

In 1820, William returned to Greenville Co., SC, to sell property. In the same year the family appears in the census of Overton County, Tennessee under Wm. Yarbro with a total of six sons and two daughters. The oldest son and daughter were not with them at that time.

A William Yarbrough bought a land grant in White County, Tennessee in 1812, but there is no evidence that he took possession at that time. This William Yarbrough appears on Tax lists in White County, Tennessee beginning in 1823, and is in the 1830 census there with his wife and only the three youngest children. Only one son appears in that census, having a brother living with him. However, land records in the late 1820's include three of Wade Hampton Yarbrough's older brothers. Wade Hampton Yarbrough first appears in public records in White Co. TN on the tax list of 1834 as Hampton Yarbrough. He was about 25 years old then.

MARY M. DAVIS: HER ANCESTRY

Mary M. Yarbrough was born on 28 August 1814 in Tennessee (TN), traditionally in or near Sparta, White Co. TN [2]. Her father was Jonathan C. Davis and her mother Minnie according to Richard E. Brown (400 Tokay Ave, Modesto CA 95305), descendant of the brother of Mary K. Stalter, Newton Leonidas Yarbrough's wife. Hampton Yarbrough and Owen Bates together received a land grant in 1839, which was originally granted to Jonathan Davis. In the Tennessee Census of 1840, first district of White Co. TN, Hampton Yarbrough is just before Jonathan Davis, and next after him is Owen Bates [3]. In August of 1841, Hampton Yarbrough and Owen W. Bates sold this land [4]. This is taken as evidence that Hampton Yarbrough and Owen Bates married daughters of Jonathan C. Davis.

Jonathan C. Davis was born 28 Oct 1780 in Rowan County, North Carolina, and died 17 March 1856 in White County, Tennessee, and is buried in the Davis Cemetery in the Taft Community there. His only sibling was Augustus Parks Davis, born 10 Nov. 1778 in Rowan Co. NC, and died in November of 1850 in Hardeman County, Tennessee. Augustus and Jonathan C. Davis were the children of Jonathan "Schoolmaster" Davis and Hannah Parks Davis (b. 10 Feb 1749, d. 2 Nov 1840). Jonathan "Schoolmaster" Davis was killed by the British in the Revolutionary War shortly before Jonathan C. Davis was born. Hannah, the mother of Jonathan C. Davis, made a Declaration on 16 February 1839 so as to obtain the benefit of the acts of Congress for the relief of officers and soldiers of the Revolutionary War (and their widows and orphans). She swore to this before William Bruster, Justice of the Peace for White County, Tennessee. In this first declaration she stated she was married to Jonathan Davis about harvest time in 1771, and that he was familiarly known as Schoolmaster Davis. She claimed he was killed by the British at the battle of Camden on or about the 16th of October of 1780. She stated that she in company with Jonathan's mother visited the battleground a few days after the action, and all that they could hear of Jonathan Davis that he was seen to fall in the battle to rise no more -- killed. She declared she had remained a widow ever since, and that she had two sons then living who were born of this marriage, to wit: Augustus Parks Davis born on 10 November 1778 and Jonathan C. Davis born 28 November 1780. The last birth took place only a little while after Jonathan was killed, and that as far as she remembered he had re-entered the army about April 1 of 1780, and had joined for during the war.

She later amended the statement to the effect that he was killed after October 1, and she was no longer certain of the battle. Now it should be noted that Camden South Carolina, the site of a battle where General Gates lost 2300 of 3000 American troops in a major defeat by the British, is about 100 miles due south of Salisbury (Rowan County) North Carolina. So a trip from Rowan County to Camden would be quite an expedition, and one that should be remembered. On the other hand, the turning point of the war was the Battle of Kings Mountain on October 7th, 1780, where Major Ferguson and some 1,100 Loyalist troops were defeated by about 600 mountain militia men led by John Sevier of Tennessee, who made prisoners of the 200 Loyalist survivors. Kings Mountain is about 40 miles from the present day Rowan County boundary, which is different than the boundary then, perhaps a two day's ride, but Hannah was almost 9 months pregnant. It seems barely possible that, if Jonathan Schoolmaster Davis fell at Kings Mountain, Hannah and Jonathan's mother could have visited the site. It is more likely that he was killed closer to home, perhaps in some unnamed skirmish with the marauding army of British General Cornwallis who had invaded North Carolina with little opposition, after decisively defeating the American General Gates at Camden. Cornwallis turned back to Camden at the news of the defeat at Kings Mountain. Hannah's second declaration follows:

The amended Declaration of Hannah Davis. In order to obtain the benefits of the acts of Congress passed for the relief of the

officers & Soldiers of the war of the Revolution.

State of Tennessee White County

On the fourteenth day of January in the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and forty there personally appeared before me, William Bruster, one of the acting Justices of the Peace in and for said county White and state aforesaid, one Hannah Davis a resident of said county and state aged 91 the tenth day of February next, who being first duly sworn according to Law Doth on her oath make the following amended declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the various Acts of Congress passed for the benefit of officers & Soldiers (their widows & Orphans) of the War of the Revolution. That from her great age, great length of time & loss of Memory, she will here make the best and most accurate Statement She can. She therefore states that she is the widow of Jonathan Davis who was a soldier in the continental line of the State of North Carolina in the Revolutionary War and that was Killed in the fall day in the month of October 1870. That said Jonathan Davis Served a tour of three months in the year 1777 in Captain James Smith's Company against the British at Cross Bank in the Regiment commanded by Col Look. After his return home and during the harvest of that year (1777) she was married to said Jonathan Davis. That said Jonathan Davis again entered the Continental line of North Carolina as a private soldier for during the war on the first day of April (1780) Seventeen hundred and Eighty and was Killed in the month of October thereafter. She has always, or for some time back, thought he was killed at Camden South Carolina, but of late learning that battle took place in the Month of August 1780, She is satisfied she was not correct for it was after the first of October he was Killed. Jonathan Davis lived in Rowan County in the State of North Carolina when he entered the Army. She has no documentary proof in her possession to offer the department in the authenticating of her claims.

Jonathan C. Davis carried on a campaign of research to find the support necessary to convince the North Carolina authorities that his mother's claim was valid. Jonathan C. Davis applied for his part as heir to the pension on 1 Dec. 1851. Jonathan C. Davis obtained affidavits that the marriage had taken place, and that his father was killed by the British in the Revolutionary War:

State of Tennessee White County

On this second day of April in the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and thirty nine personally appeared before me Jane Brown aged about seventy six years, last February, and who being first duly sworn according to Law, doth on her oath make the following statement, to wit: that she was the acquaintance of Hannah Davis now of this County and formerly of Rowan County State of North Carolina, that she believes the said Hannah was the wife of Jonathan Davis that was killed as she is informed and believes at the battle of Camden with the British in 1780. This affiant did not see the said Hannah & Jonathan married, but they were reputed to be Husband and Wife and that she never heard a breath of suspicion to the contrary, that said Hannah has lived a widow ion since the death of said Jonathan & that said Hannah and Jonathan were married some time in the year 1777.

Sworn and Subscribed before me the day and date above written. Wm Hitchcock Justice of the Peace

The above affidavits were sent by Jonathan C. Davis to the Honorable J.L. Edwards, Court of Pensions, in North Carolina. His letter is dated 4 July 1839, sent from Rock Island Tenn.

On the 2d of February 1786, a warrant was issued to the Heirs of Jonathan Davis for 640 acres of land (No. 3458) for the service of said Jonathan Davis as a private soldier in the Continental Line of the State of North Carolina in the Revolutionary War, signed by James Glasgow, Esq, Secretary of State, North Carolina, and affirmed by William Hill, Secretary of State of North Carolina on 7 Oct 1839. This land was granted to David Davis, the oldest brother of Jonathan "Schoolmaster" Davis, who was the heir at law-according to what I have been told by other researchers - even though the deceased had a wife and two children. This property was granted on Mill Creek in Davidson County, NC, to Jason Thompson as the assignee of David Davis, and it was registered with a deed on Feb 2, 1789 (Warrant Deed): Grant No 1069, issued 26 Nov. 1789 (Warrant No. 3458), Book 74, Page 114, Davidson County, North Carolina.

By virtue of a Warrant from the Secretary of Stat no 3458 located December 27th 1788. I have Surveyed for Jason Thompson, Ass'gn of David Davice, heir of Jonathan Davice, Six hundred and forty Acres of Land lying on Mill creek Beginning at a Cherry tree being Joseph Medowels N west corner, Thence West three hundred and seventy 6 poles to a walnut, thence North two hundred and seventy two poles to and Ash, Thence East three hundred and seventy six

poles to an Elm, thence South to the beginning. Surv'd by. February 2d, 1789 - John Buchanan Svr Mart Armstrong Srvr

This property was granted to Thompson by the State of North Carolina on the 26th of November, 1788 and signed by J. Glasgow.

It is believed that Jonathan "Schoolmaster" Davis was the second child of Conrad and Sarah Davis. Conrad Davis has been researched by Mary Jo Davis Shoaf [5140 Hackney Lane S.W., Roanoak, VA 24018] who published CONRAD DAVIS in THE HERITAGE OF DAVIDSON COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA. She provides the following information: Conrad Davis b. c1729, d. c1790 in Rowan Co. NC. He married Sarah who died after 1812. Conrad and Sarah Davis purchased 419 acres in the Jersey Settlement in what is now Davidson County in 1770, and in 1772 he and sons David and Jonathan are on the tax list. In 1778 son Simon is added to the tax list with the previous three. In a legal case involving his deceased son Simon, it is made clear that Conrad is a Spinning-wheel maker, as he is ordered to teach that trade to Simon's orphan son, Simon Jr.

In his will (Rowan County Will Book E, pages 250 & 251), dated 13 October 1789, Conrad Davis leaves one shilling sterling each to son Henry Davis and daughter Mary Barclay, indicating they have married and already received their portion of the estate. He leaves the rest of the estate to his wife, Sarah Davis, and to sons Andrew and Morris. He does not mention sons David, Jonathan or Simon, which may mean they were all dead by that time. In the will of Andrew Davis (26 July 1800, Rowan County Will Book E pages 248 and 249 - they are in alphabetic order) leaves the bulk of his estate to his brother Morriss, but gives to Simon Davis, son of Simon Davis, decd, the sum of ten pounds, and to Augustus Davis and Jonathan Davis, both sons of Jonathan Davis, dcd, the sum of five pounds each. In the 1772 Rowen County, North Carolina, tax list, Coonrod (sic) Davis and sons Jonathan and David are enumerated together. All of these are supporting evidence for Mary Jo Shoaf's reconstruction of this family.

If the elder brother was the heir at law of Jonathan Davis, then it is probable that David Davis acted as Hannah's agent and sold the grant for her. Apparently David Davis died before Conrad, or had left the state by then. The widow and orphans of Jonathan Schoolmaster Davis moved to Tennessee, probably in a group of neighbors and relatives, before 1812.

IN WHITE COUNTY, TENNESSEE

The earliest White County, Tennessee, records of Augustus and Jonathan C. Davis is when they appeared on the tax roll of Captain Parkinson's Company with one poll and no acreage in 1812. In that same year, a Moses Davis has 260 acres in the same district. In 1815 Augustus Davis has 50 acres in that same The oldest known children of Augustus and Jonathan C. Davis are listed as born in Tennessee, but they were all born after 1812. Augustus had two sons who were born before 1812, but we do not know their names. Mary M. Davis and two sisters were born from about 1813 to 1815, and could have included twins or triplets. If there were more children born before 1820 they died before the census where Jonathan C. Davis has three daughters and a wife. By 1830 he has a son between 5 and 10, two daughters between 15 and twenty, so it seems that one of them has married, probably Mary. But Hampton Yarbrough is not found in that census. Mary seems to have been close to her sisters and to her first cousins Rachel, Hannah, Maxwell and Jonathan Carson Davis.

Census records and other records held by descendants of Augustus P. and Jonathan C. Davis allow the following reconstructions of their families. Jonathan's last wife was Winny and is listed in the 1850 and 1860 White Co TN censuses. In his [1851] last Will and Testament, Jonathan C. Davis names Winny as his executrix and tells that he had five children by her. All of these children appear in the 1850 census. According to the ages given in the censuses, Jonathan C. Davis had at least two wives: in 1820 his wife was 26-45, born 1775-1795, in 1830 his wife is 30-40, born between 1790 and 1800, so these could have been the same woman. However, in 1840 his wife is 30-40, apparently Winny who was born about 1806. It is entirely possible that Jonathan returned to Rowan Co, NC, to marry Ann Cunningham as a second wife, but there were several men named Jonathan Davis at that time.

It is possible that there are twins or triplets among the first three children here. Amanda Jane was the name of the wife of Rufus M. Elsey, who was a partner of Hampton Yarbrough in Missouri. Hannah was Owen Bate's wife's name and it is assumed she was a daughter of Jonathan C. Davis, named after her paternal grandmother Hannah Parks Davis. Malissa Davis is not in the 1850 census, appearing in the 1860 census, where she could be Leonard's wife, but she fits the missing female from the 1840 census. It is presumed that the five children indicated in Jonathan C. Davis' Will are the last five on this list. A Nelson C. Davis is mentioned in the Will, and is presumed to be this son.

1850 census, White county Tennessee, page 5: Davis, Jonathan 70 NC, Winny 44 TN, Leonard 16 T, Nelson C 13 TN, Marion C. 10, TN, George C 7 TN, Jonathan L. 4 TN. Next house: Davis, John W. 26 TN, Lucinna 24 NC, Isaac N. 2, Yarbrough to sell some land in White Co TN (Vol B p 50). On the 21st of January in 1839 (Vol B p 170) Hampton Yarbrough sold to James Jenkins 3 tracts-320 acres. He sold other land J.N. Jenkens (vol K p188), and to S.S. Wray (vol I p365). Hampton Yarbrough and Owen Bates jointly were granted a 100 acre parcel (Mountain District Grant No. 7028, 28th of August 1839), which they sold to Richard Nelson on 20 August 1841 (White County Roll No.63, Book M, page 63).

In the first district of White Co. TN in the 1840 Census, Hampton Yarbrough is next door to Jonathan Davis and Owen Bates is on the other side. In the Yarbrough household are females corresponding to Mary M. Yarbrough age 20-30, daughters Mary Melissa age 5-10 and Martha Ann age 0-5. The males include W.H. Yarbrough age 30-40, and son Crockett Davis Yarbrough age 5-10. Another male aged 10-15 is listed as working in agriculture, and may be a relative or not. Wade Hampton Yarbrough and Mary M. Davis were married in Sparta Tennessee according to family tradition [2], and that must have been about 1830. This marriage produced 10 children according to records of their descendants through son Felix Grundy Yarbrough [2]. The first four children were born in White County Tennessee, perhaps near Sparta according to tradition, but possibly near the county line close to Rock Island where they were living in 1840. Crockett Davis Yarbrough was born in 1831, Mary Melissa in 1834, Martha Ann in 1837 and Felix Grundy Yarbrough in 1840.

As early as 1834 there began an exodus from White County, which was the next stage of the Western movement. Hampton's brother James Yarbrough went to Hardeman County in Western Tennessee about that time, and was shortly followed by the older brother Jephtha Yarbrough. Before 1840, Hampton's parents and other older brother, William Yarbrough, Jr. moved to Gibson County, also in Western Tennessee. With the parents went younger brothers George P. and Benjamin W. Yarbrough. William Yarbrough, Jr. had married Hannah Ada Davis, daughter of Augustus, and George P. Yarbrough had married Celia, Hannah's sister. The move to Gibson County included Hampton's sister Mahulda, who had married William Lewis Sanders whilst still in White County. Some time after the 1840 census, most of the remaining members of Augustus Davis's family moved to Hardeman County, except for Rebecca Davis, who had married Thomas Prince in White County, and Jonathan Carson Davis, who had married Elinor Prince in White County. They went to Missouri, perhaps after first stopping over in Hardeman County. In the end, only Jonathan C. Davis with Winny and her children and Susannah Yarbrough Howard, Hampton's middle sister, remained in White county. In the 1860 White County census we find that Mary Davis Adcock and her family have returned from Hardeman County.

TO MISSOURI

About 1841 the Hampton and Mary Yarbrough family, together with a number of Davis relatives, went to Dade County, Missouri, where Wade Hampton Yarbrough pursued the trade of shoemaker and saddler, possibly trades learned from his father-in-law Jonathan C. Davis. Apparently Owen Bates, who was probably Mary M.'s brother-in-law, and his family traveled with them, as they are found in the 1850 census of Dade Co. MO. Andrew Jackson Yarbrough, the sixth child of Hampton and Mary Yarbrough claimed birth in Dade County, Missouri (1845), so it is likely that his next older sister, Amanda Jane Yarbrough was also born there about 1843. Family lore from Ivy Koher, descended from Rebecca Davis Prince, tells that the Thomas Prince family went to Dade County Missouri about 1841, where he pursued the trade of furniture maker. They had moved to Pike County, Missouri by 1846. Thomas was murdered by highwaymen about 1848 during a trip to Mexico, Missouri, where he had gone to sell furniture and a

horse. Rebecca and her six children, together with the family of Jonathan Carson Davis, joined a wagon train that left for Washington in April of 1849. Her story is included in the book by Robert W. Layton: PRINCE AND DAVIS OF TENNESSEE. Hampton Yarbrough's oldest sister, Sarah Yarbrough Howard Pennington is said to have died in Sedalia, Missouri, but whether she went to join relatives is not known.

When Lawrence County was organized from parts of Dade and Barry Counties on Feb 14, 1845, the Hampton Yarbrough family and perhaps Mary's cousin Maxwell Davis and his family were among the earliest inhabitants of the newly established town of Mount Vernon, which was laid out also in 1845 [5]. In 1848 Wade Hampton Yarbrough was in a partnership with Rufus M. Elsey, a saddler, in purchasing a shop on a small lot in Mount Vernon [6]. The next year Wade Hampton Yarbrough bought Rufus out [7]. Rufus McElsey's wife signed the papers, and she was Amanda Jane. Now this may be just a coincidence, but Hampton and Mary named their third daughter Amanda Jane, and Rufus McElsey was a leather worker. This may be more than a coincidence, in that Amanda Jane McElsey might have been Mary's other sister, and perhaps Rufus learned his trade from Jonathan C. Davis - this is just speculation. In 1850 Hampton and Mary sold the Saddle and Shoe shop to John S. Williams [8]. Children born in Mount Vernon were Sarah Samantha in 1847 and Newton Leonidas in 1850. In 1851 the oldest daughter Mary Melissa married Jonathan Freeman, in Lawrence County [9]. Virginia Catherine (Jenny) was born in 1852 [2], probably in Mount Vernon.

Wade Hampton and Mary M.Yarbrough eventually went to Johnson County, Missouri, purchasing property near the town of Columbus (not to be confused with Columbia) in Jackson township to take up farming, just over the county line from where Rufus M. Elsey is found in the 1850 census. Hampton's property had two parcels, one of 40 and the other 80 acres. It was purchased for \$200 from Samuel and Lucretia Cornett on 1 Dec 1854 [10]. Their last child, George William, was born in 1855 [2], but seems to have died before 1860. In 1856 the second daughter, Martha, married John Cornett [2]. Martha died before 1860, perhaps in childbirth, and she left a son William C. Cornett.

The 1850's were sad times. Mary's uncle Augustus Davis died in Hardeman County, Tennessee in about the first of November of 1850 and her father, Jonathan C. Davis, died in White County in March of 1856. William and Martha Yarbrough, Hampton's parents, died in Western Tennesse, probably in Gibson County, she in July of 1854 and he in March of 1857. Thus passed one generation. Susannah Jane Howard, Hampton's nearest sister and wife of John Porter Howard died in White county in December of 1853. Also James - Hampton's nearest brother - died in early 1856 in Henry County, Tennessee. Two, and possibly three, of their children died in that decade. Their youngest son, George, died in infancy, and their second daughter, Martha Ann Cornett, died after childbirth about 1856. In addition, their third daughter, Amanda Jane, vanished from records before the 1860 census, and so also may have died.

In 1857 the oldest son, Crockett, married Jemima Ann Hill in Sonoma County California [11]. Crockett had worked as a saddler for his father in Mount Vernon [12]. According to family lore, he was involved in the Mexican war along with his lifelong friend Billy Bowers, and after the war they went from there to California with two Porter brothers, supposedly being there as early as 1849. Crockett then supposedly engaged in guiding wagon trains from Missouri to California for several years. James Madison Hill had been a 49er in the gold rush, but had staked a claim along the Russian River in California. He went back to Missouri to move his wife Sarah (Elston), son Joshua Gilman and his two daughters Jemima Ann and Emma to California in about 1856. Supposedly the wagon train was guided by Crockett. Crockett married Jemima Hill and

remained in California the rest of his life.

In 1859 Felix Grundy Yarbrough married Mary Elisabeth Sanders in Johnson County Missouri [13]. In the 1860 census of Johnson County, this young family has a 4 months old son George, and Martha's orphaned son William Cornett, reported as 4 yrs old. Amanda Jane Yarbrough is not with the family in the 1860 census, and no more is known of her fate.

In January of 1862 the worst of the violence of the war between the states in Johnson County took place. Union soldiers from Kansas (Jayhawkers) who had lost some of their number in an ambush in western Johnson County returned to wreak vengeance on South sympathizers. This Jayhawk regiment robbed and burned about forty homes in the south-west part of the county. Jayhawk troops were then sent to the Columbus area, but were tricked by the towns people into an ambush where 5 Kansans were killed and many more wounded. In retaliation, Columbus was burned along with surrounding area homes of some 50 southern sympathizers. [15]

Wade Hampton Yarbrough's sons and future sons-in-law put on Union uniforms, in spite of the fact that they were all Southerners by birth. Grundy was a 3-year volunteer in the Missouri State Militia [16], Jackson was in Company M of the 12th Missouri Cavalry [17]; future son-in-law Stephen Holloway was in Company H. of the 9th U.S. Volunteer Infantry [18]; future son-in-law Charles T. Clabaugh and his brother William S. Clabaugh were both in Company I of the 15th Missouri Cavalry [19]. Family lore is that Crockett in California paid for a stand-in who was mustered for only a week, and son Newton Leonidas Yarbrough was too young to take part. This may have had something to do with their departure from Johnson County Missouri. After the Jayhawker incident the may have been a great deal of resentment toward Union veterans.

In 1864 Wade Hampton and Mary M. Yarbrough sold their Johnson County property to Grundy for \$700 [20], but they remained on the tax lists through 1867. In 1865 daughter Sarah Samantha Yarbrough married Stephen Judd Holloway in Johnson County Missouri [21], where sons John W. and William Holloway were born c1866 and c1867 [22].

On 9 Aug 1867 Grundy sold the Johnson County farm property to J.W. Glasscock, a substantial landholder at that time, for \$1,500 [23]. The son, George, who was born in 1860 had died, and a second son, Mathew, who later owned a store in Winfield, Kansas, was born in February of 1867, presumably in Johnson County. Grundy and family soon moved to Carroll County near Bowers City, and were farming next to Mary Elisabeth's mother, youngest sister and two youngest brothers in 1870. Another son, John Franklin Yarbrough was born there in April 1870 [24].

In the 1867 tax lists Andrew Jackson Yarbrough owned property on fourth street in Warrensburg, the county seat of Johnson County. He sold it for \$250 to Wm McGinnis on 4 Nov 1868 [25]. This is the last known public record of this Yarbrough family in Missouri.

ON TO KANSAS

In the census of 1870 Judd and Samantha Holloway are in Mound City, Linn County Kansas, with the two sons born in Missouri and a daughter Georgina born that year in Kansas. Across the border in Bourbon County, Kansas are Wade Hampton and Mary M. Yarbrough farming with sons Jackson and Newton, daughter Jenny and grandson William Cornett, age 12 [26]. They remained there for about two years, moving on to Cowley County around 1871 [27].

John J. Freeman age 38 is found on page 57 of the 1870 Labette County Ks. census with wife Mary M. age 35, and five children. This is Mary Melissa

Yarbrough and her family. Andrew J. and Mary M. Freeman were born in Missouri, but Jacob G, Elizabeth and Alice Freeman have all been born in Kansas, so they had been there for from 6 to 9 years, and remained for the rest of their lives [27]. They are also found in the 1880 and 1900 censuses of Labette Co.

Charles Clabaugh was perhaps the first recorded land grantee in this group, obtaining patent deeds in Salem Township on March 18 and 28 of 1876. Wade Hampton Yarbrough received grants that same year: on 12 Oct 1876, W.H. Yarbrough received a United States grant [28]. Wade Hampton is also recorded as transferring property to his son Newton: 14 Jul 1881 N.L. Yarbrough is granted by W.H. Yarbrough [29] and 12 June 1885 Yarbrough, Newton L. from Yarbrough, Wade H. [30]. These, and most of the other property involving this family was near the village of Floral, mostly in Salem Township.

Mary M. Davis Yarbrough did not sign any of the deeds when W.H. Yarbrough sold property in Cowley County, which may mean that the property sold was not their home property, or that she died before Wade Hampton Yarbrough. On the other hand, the grave stone has his death date but not hers, so she may have out lived him. In any case, she phrobably died before Newton and Molly left for California permanently, which was before 1892. Written on the back of a picture of Mary M. Davis Yarbrough are the words, cousin of Jeff Davis. If there is more than a guess involved here, then it must be a quite distant cousin, because Jefferson Davis's genealogy is complete back three generations, with no known link to Conrad Davis or Jonathan "Schoolmaster" Davis of Rowan County, North Carolina.

There must have been some kind of an agreement made among the Mary Yarbroughs in this family: Hampton's wife Mary M., Grundy's wife Mary Elisabeth and Newton's wife Mary K., not to mention Jonathan Freeman's wife Mary Melissa. In the records of Freda Howard Shane, Newton's wife was called Molly, and Grundy's wife was Bell (although Mary Elisabeth was not known by that name to Felix Grundy Yarbrough's grandchildren) and Mary Melissa Freeman was known by Melissa.

Felix Grundy Yarbrough and family had come from Carroll County Missouri to Mound City Kansas for son George Thomas was born in 1872 or 1873. According to Felix Grundy's obituary, they left Carroll County MO and went to Lyons, Kansas about 1871, and then to Cowley County, Kansas just in time to be recorded in the 1880 census. Birth records have Nora born in Cowley County in 1876, and Charles Nathan born in Mound City 1879. According to the obituary George, Nate and Nora should be listed as born in Lyons, Kansas. They are in Cowley County in 1880, in house 54 of the Richland Township census, probably in rented property. According to Grundy's obituary, they lived on a farm near Floral 10 years, and then moved to his last home near Box in Harvey Township where died in 1917. F.G. Yarbrough has several land transactions in Cowley County, beginning in October of 1882.

From the Burden (Kansas) Times: Yarbrough, Mr. and Mrs. F.G. - 56th anniversary celebrated Sunday, 21st of May 1915.

From the Burden Times, 17 May 1917: Yarbrough, Felix Grundy (b) 31 Aug 1840 Sparta, Tenn. (d) 29 April 1917 at his home in Harvey Township - 77 years old. Moved with his parents to Johnson Co, MO when young. (md) 21 March 1859 to Mary E. Sanders in their home 10 miles from Warrensburg, Mo. There he enlisted in army, served 3 years in the state militia as a Union Soldier. Baptised by Elder Thomas Gaines and Mandersville, Mo. In 1879 he and his wife moved to Lyons, Kansas and lived there nine years. They then moved to a farm near Floral, Kansas, where they lived ten years. They have lived in Box neighborhood (Harvey Twp) about 29 years. Five sons

and two daughters - two children died in infancy, and one daughter, Mrs. Nora Matthews deceased about 12 years. Leaves wife & four sons, M.L. of Lathan, Kansas, George T. of Box, Kansas, Frank of Winfield Ks., C.N. of Moscow Kansas, 16 grandchildren, 1 brother in California. Funeral at Box Schoolhouse 1 May 1917.

Felix Grundy Yarbrough is buried in Box Cemetery, which today is in the middle of a field, and not well maintained. Mary Elisabeth Sanders Yarbrough is buried in Mt. Vernon Cemetery in Harvey Township, where the cemetery receives regular care. She died in 1937. Descendants named Yarbrough who were living in Cowley County in 1992 are from this line.

Andrew Jackson Yarbrough came to Cowley County in 1871, according to the following biographical sketch. He married Mary Emma Marquis there in 1875 [31] in Cowley County. She was a daughter of W.S. and Hannah Marquis who came from Jackson County Missouri and had a land claim adjacent to Jackson Yarbrough's place. Jack and Emma Yarbrough eventually had ten children born in Cowley County. In the 1880 census Jackson is at house 86 in Richland Township. Jackson died in 1904 and his wife Emma died in 1943. Both are buried in Floral Cemetery. Andrew J. Yarbrough was involved in numerous land transactions beginning in 1881.

Biographical Record: Biographical Sketches of Leading Citizens of Cowley County Kansas, Biographical Publishing Co, Chicago Ill. 1901, beginning on page 230: A.J. Yarbrough

A.J. Yarbrough, an extensive land-owner in Cowley county, and a much respected farmer and citizen, has been a resident of the county since February, 1871, and now lives on 40 acres near the village of Floral, in Richland township. He was born in 1845 in Dade county Missouri, and is a son of W.H. and Mary (Davis) Yarbrough.

W.H. Yarbrough and his wife were born near Sparta, Tennessee, and the husband was of English descent. His trade was that of a saddler, and he followed it at Mount Vernon, Missouri, for many years, after which he went to Johnson county Missouri, and engaged in farming. Later he sold out and moved to Linn county, Kansas, where he spent two years and thence removed to Cowley county, taking up land near Floral, where he passed away on his farm in 1882. A.J. Yarbrough had four brothers and three sisters, namely: C.D., who went to California, in 1849, and died there; N.L., who once lived in Cowley county; F.G., who resides on Grouse Creek, Cowley county; George who died in infancy; Melissa (Freeman), who lives in Labette county, Kansas; Martha (Cornet), who died in Missouri; and Jennie (Clabaugh), deceased, who lived near New Salem, Cowley county.

Mr. Yarbrough obtained but a common school education, and at an early age enlisted from Johnson county as a private in company M, 12th Reg., Mo. Vol. Cav., under Col. Wells, and served three years in the Department of the South. He was mustered out at Fort Leavenworth. He was sent west on the famous Powder River expedition, and with the 16th Army Corps was detailed to build pontoon bridges for Wilson's cavalry. He was once stunned by a bombshell, but was never wounded. Returning to Warrensburg, Missouri, after the war, he applied himself to farming, but at a later period entered Kansas, and worked to Salina with a railroad-construction

gang, for which he had contracted to furnish buffalo meat. Subsequently, he did considerable freighting in different parts of Kansas, and spent one year in farming in Bourbon county. In February, 1871, he journeyed to Cowley county, and after looking over the county located a claim, - the east half of the west half of section 7, township 31, range 5, east; He now owns the full half section. On this farm he built a stone claims-house, which still stands, and to which he kept adding, until he soon had a fine, large house. He lived there until 1896, when he moved to his present small farm, which he purchased from a Mr. Anderson, and which was preempted by a Mr. Turner. He enlarged the small house until he now has a six-room dwelling, with a good barn. For many years, he was engaged in the sheep business but now carries on general farming. He is, besides, an extensive stock raiser, having 160 acres in pasture. He raises from 50 to 100 Shorthorn cattle every year, and favors Poland-china and Chester White hogs, of which he raises many. He has a fine orchard, which yields abundantly, and which is well drained by a tributary of Dutch Creek. On his farm is plenty of timber, consisting of oak, walnut and box-elder. He also owns 80 acres in Fairview township, - making his landed possessions 440 acres, in all. Mr. Yarbrough is widely known throughout the county as a worthy public spirited citizen, and his many acquaintances hold him in high esteem.

The subject of this sketch was married in Cowley county to Emma Marquis, a daughter of W.S. Marquis, who was one of his first neighbors, and who came from Jackson county, Missouri. Ten children have been born to Mr. and Mrs. Yarbrough, as follows: Wade M., who resides west of Mr. Yarbrough's place, and who married Pearl Hart, by whom he has one child; Ella (Hart), who resides north of her father, and has three children; Dora, the wife of O.R. Elliott, who lives on her father's farm, and has three children; Opha; Stella; Ira; Mamie; Russell; Lloyd; and Glenn. Politically, Mr. Yarbrough is a republican, while in religious views he is a Baptist. He belongs to the Grand Army of the Republic.

The reader may have noticed that Andrew Jackson Yarbrough has forgotten two of his sisters: Amanda Jane Yarbrough, of whom we lost track in Missouri, and Sarah Samantha Holloway who was living in Cowley County not far from Jack. It is strange that he neglected Samantha, because he was living no more than a few houses from her widower, Stephen J. Holloway, in the 1900 census.

Newton Yarbrough began land transactions in September of 1878 when he obtained a quarter section just East of Floral, with Timber Creek passing through its southern end [32] and several properties south of and adjacent to Floral, perhaps including the present cemetery, the most obvious feature of Floral today, where many Yarbrough relatives are buried. Just to the South of the cemetery are the remains of a stone corral which Newton supposedly built. Newton sold property up to 1888, when he must have gone to California. In 1889 and 1892 some of his land is sold by the sheriff, and his wife, Mary K. Yarbrough, sold property to Absolem Bever in May of 1891 that she had obtained from Abija Howard in February of 1889. About 1889, Newton had gone to California with William Henry Howard, Abija Howard's son. Later, Absolem Bever's son, Tunis Verdon, married Abija Howard's daughter Martha in California in a double wedding with William Henry Howard and Virginia Josephine Yarbrough, Crockett Yarbrough's daughter and Newton's niece.

Newton Leonidas Yarbrough married Mary K. Stalter in Cowley County in 1875 [33] where their children Ernest E. was born in 1879 and Charles Roy was born in 1886. Shortly after Wade Hampton Yarbrough died Newton and William Henry Howard, son of Abija and Ann Irwin Howard who lived only three houses away in the 1880 census, went to San Diego, California, by train, and then worked their way up the coast to visit Crockett Davis Yarbrough on the Russian River in Sonoma County. They liked what they saw, so they returned to Cowley County to pack up and move there. Newton was there in time to register to vote on 2 Sept 1892. As mentioned above, Wm. H. Howard married Virginia Josephine Yarbrough, Newton's niece. There is more about Newton and Molly in the story of the Sonoma County California Pioneers.

In the 1880 census of Richland Township of Cowley County, Newton L. Yarbrough's family is farming at house 18, Wade Hampton and Mary M. Yarbrough are in house 19 and Holloways are in house 20. Judd and Samantha Holloway have moved there from Mound City and have lost Georgina, but have two more sons and two more daughters.

Virginia Catherine Yarbrough (Jenny) married Charles Thomas Clabaugh at his home in Greenfield (Dade Co) Missouri in 1871 according to Yarbrough family records [2]. Charley Clabaugh's obituary in the Burden Times of 10 Feb 1922 says they came to Cowley County in 1871 and settled in New Salem. Two years before coming to Kansas he married Miss Jennie Forbaugh (should be Yarbrough) at his home in Greenfield MO. He had a number of children, 2 living are Mrs. Robert Clarke and Lee Clabaugh. The Burden Eagle of 31 Dec 1896 tells of the marriage of Lee Clabaugh and Miss Dessa Peter, where Miss Ida Clabaugh was bridesmaid and Mr. Harry Sawyer was bridesman. In the 1880 census, Tisdale Township, is Charles and Jenny Clabaugh have children May J. 6 and Willy L. Clabaugh, 4.

William C. Cornett may be listed as a 22 yr old herder on the second page of Silver Dale Township in the 1880 census, but the record is poor quality. He obtained property prior to 1884, because he and his wife (William C. Cornett et ux) sold it to Andrew Jackson Yarbrough on Oct 14, 1884.

Lloyd Yarbrough – Bonnie Hudson Family

THE LLOYD YARBROUGH - BONNIE HUDSON FAMILY

Raymond B. Yarbrough

All persons listed here are identified by Roman numerals to indicate the generations beginning with the earliest known ancestors, Conrad and Sarah Davis who are given the numeral I. The generation of Lloyd Yarbrough is VII, so all from the Hudson-Miller line are numbered accordingly. Thus the oldest known ancestor in the Hudson-Miller line, Joseph Remillard, being Bonnie Hudson's great grandfather, begins this line as generation IV. The following generations are counted in Roman numerals from him. When the placement within a family is known, an Arabic numeral is used. Direct ancestors have their names in italics. The information about the 19th century ancestors is largely from letters, which are included in the appendices. Other information is from contemporary letters and oral accounts. All mistakes are the responsibility of the author.

VII.1 FORREST LLOYD YARBROUGH b. Cloverdale Mar 28, 1906, d. Oct 3 1941 Santa Rosa Ca, m. May 7 1926 in Martinez Ca: VII.5 Marie Olivine Hudson (Bonnie) b. Aug 8, 1906 Glendive, Montana, d. 15 May 1990 Carlsbad, California.

Lloyd Yarbrough was born in Cloverdale, just north of the city limits in the home of his parents, Fred and Dena Yarbrough. This was not far from the home of Dena's parents, Absollem and Louisa McMichael. The Fred Yarbrough family moved to the Richmond area before 1910, and stayed until Lloyd's mother died in 1919. Then he stayed with his father, until after Fred remarried (an English woman?). After a time he felt that he had to leave that situation, and so he went to live with the Littons on the old Hill Ranch on the Russian River. He drove a school bus to support himself while he finished High School at Healdsburg. John Litton told me of one time that the chimney was on fire, and Lloyd was sent up with a hose to put it out. When he got up there, there was very little water pressure, and the roof was getting slippery. Someone warned him "be careful, we don't want to lose you", to which Lloyd replied, "small loss". But he did get the fire put out.

After high school, he worked as a commercial artist for Rosenburg's department stores in Healdsburg and Santa Rosa. After a time he picked up his brother Edwin at his Uncle Rice and Aunt Ethel (McMichael)s ranch south of Cloverdale, and went to visit his father in 1925. By this time his father was married to Georgeana Hudson and they were living with Fred's Uncle Newton and Molly Yarbrough in Pacific Grove. Georgeana's daughter, Bonnie, had been with her mother and Fred in Locke, California, and had again joined them in Pacific Grove, where she was working in a Sardine Factory. She told me that this was the second time she and Lloyd met.

VII.5 Marie Olivine Hudson was the fifth child of Fred Howard Hudson and Georgiana Malvina Miller. She was named after her French-Canadian grandmother. She was born in Glendive Montana, a railroad town, because her father was a Conductor on the Great Northern Railroad. She became known as Bonnie because when her brother Howard was a small child he could not pronounce Olivine, but called her Bonine, which became Bonnie.

She began elementary school in Lewistown (Montana), another railroad town. Her parents had divorced, and her mother went to Lehigh, Montana. Because of illness, Bonnie had to repeat the seventh grade, and so was 15 when she graduated from grammar school in Lehigh, Montana in 1921. There was no

high school in Lehigh, and she would have had to go to another town for further schooling. Her mother, *Georgiana*, married a miner named Wilson in Lehigh, and later sent Bonnie to her father in Seattle.

The following is a letter she wrote me telling about her childhood. It was postmarked 29 Feb 1988.

I was born in 1906, which was a good time to come into the world in case you planned to reach the ripe old age of past 80. I have lived in the most progressive century (good and bad) the world has ever known, good for technology, bad for morality. "Everything" is a little hard to come by.

Remembering - a very large house on the banks of the Yellowstone. Before that there was probably a converted box car, father worked on the railroad, but it is a little hard to remember the day you were born... So, the very large house, upstairs, downstairs and basement... Being the child smack in the middle is a mixed blessing with pressure from the "overs" and bickering from the "unders" until suddenly the roles are reversed (who knows why).

We lived in the "top" in the winter and moved to the basement in summer. We went on picnics across the river - no swimming - the river was too strong. I remember a birthday party when I was very small, my older sisters dressed me in a taffeta dress and a big hair ribbon. After the party I helped with the dishes and finished up all the left-over ice cream! (I still have the invitation).

Started school, came home covered with mud because I had slid down a gully. Cut my toe on a piece of broken glass and expected to bleed to death, visited the neighbors who had a rabbit warren in their barn. Watched my brother shoot his BB gun at the kid next door - good shot! My father putting sacking on the rose bushes for winter.

My grandmother taking me to church and making me put my money in the collection when I wanted to use it to buy a doll I had seen on the way. Brushing off ants after she had picked me up from an ant hill on which I had foolishly sat. Ridding my head of lice with kerosene and a fine-tooth comb. She went to Seattle to visit her twin sister but left her to French poodle with us. She died while in Seattle and it died on the same day. Weird. She had given me a tiny statue of Mary and I took it to school to show it off. The girl to whom I showed it told Sister that I had given it to her and Sister believed her. Broke my heart. And I remember a "chinaman" who used to come around with a hand freezer full of ice cream and sell us cones. That was a real occasion.

We moved to Lewistown. Father lost job on RR and took one delivering ice. Slipped and broke his collarbone... Muriel born. Christmas that year Evelyn made me a little bag and put a small doll in it. We lived next door to the D'Autremots and their kids had lots of toys. We played at their house a lot. We had a rain barrel to holler down, and a cellar door to slide on.

Moved to a house where the septic tank kept overflowing. An old washing machine that ran on water power through a hose, if you can picture that. Took a few music lessons (we always had a piano) and a little dog chased me all the way home. Since then I have always been leery of dogs! Stella got married at 16 and we had a

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new house before it was finished, so Raymond was born in the living room of that house in 1931. Subsequently Michael was born there on Dec 25 1935, and Marcia in 1940. About 1937 the road was paved, named and numbered. The house number was 184 Baker Ave.

Today, Baker Avenue is merely an access to Highway 101, with a convenient entrance to Denny's Restaurant. The Yarbrough property has become a part of highway 101. the house stood just south of the overpass in the southbound lane. The drainage ditch which was called "the creek" is still there, it ran through the southern end of the property. This creek became a torrent during the rainy season, and was dry during the summer. At the corner of Corby was Mrs. Belotti's farm house, with a barn, chicken house and wind-mill fed water tank house where the coolest water was found in the summers. The first house built there by Lloyd Yarbrough was next to Mrs. Belotti's.

In the late 1930's, Lloyd bought a temporary building that the Mead-Clark lumber company used for an office after the yard had burned along with their original buildings. The building was probably 600 square feet, about 20x30 feet, and he had it placed next to our house on the east, and remodeled it to make a bedroom and a living room, and added to the back a kitchen, bathroom and another bedroom in the back. Lloyd's brother Edwin and family came down from Montana in the depths of the depression, and lived in that house for two years. Edwin worked for a furniture store at the corner of 4th and D streets, across from Rosenburgs Department Store. After Lloyd's death, Bonnie rented it to an older couple named Miller, from Mill Valley, and later sold that part of the property to them, leaving us with about an acre and a quarter.

At some time, before or after the my father built that house, another lumber yard burned and so they built a temporary office building. When they had built their new building, they sold it to Lloyd, who made it into a shop, which he had placed behind our house. In it he had a woodworking shop, mechanics tools to work on cars, and a dark-room where he developed his films, as he was quite good as an amature photographer.

When they moved to Santa Rosa, Lloyd first worked for Corrick's Stationary store on 4th St., as an office equipment repairman. In the mid 1930's he opened his own store at 410 Mendocino Av. in Santa Rosa: Yarbrough's Office Supplies. He serviced and repaired office machines such as typewriters and dictaphones. He had an extensive service route which took him throughout Sonoma, Mendocino and Lake counties. A Mrs. Nase, whose father had bought the old Hill homestead on the Westside Road near Hacienda Crossing on the Russian River, told me that in the 1930's she bought a used typewriter from Lloyd Yarbrough, who delivered it to her and told her the history of the property she had inherited from her father. He also told her that he had sold that particular typewriter as a "starter" to dozens of people who later traded it in to him when they bought a new typewriter from him. It was with that typewriter, one that Corricks had discarded, he founded his business.

Lloyd was an accomplished artist, and a number of his paintings are still in existence. At one time Alex Napote, who was later head of the California School of Art, was looking for a place to teach painting in Santa Rosa. Lloyd offered the loft in his shop in a trade for free lessons. So he studied art under Alex Napote for several years.

Lloyd was involved with the Little Theater group in Santa Rosa, both as an actor and as a technician. He became somewhat of an expert in sound systems, and became involved with the First Baptist Church in Santa Rosa so that he installed and regularly serviced the sound system in that church. That was the church built from a single redwood tree, and so was featured by "Believe It Or Not", a national column (and later a book) by Robert Ripley - who incidentally was a Santa Rosa native.

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Lloyd was somewhat of a car fanatic. He owned a Stutz "Bearcat" at one time during the 1920's, and was quite talented at renovating ailing cars. He almost always seemed to have an extra car in the garage, which he bought from a distressed owner, doctored mechanically until they were in sound running condition, and then he spray painted them to enhance their resale. He would use the car while he worked over another, then sell it when the next was useable. In this was, he managed to work his way up in car value without having to put up a lot of cash. The first nice car he bought was a 1938 or 39 Pontiac sedan which was almost new. He then convinced himself that he needed a station wagon for his travels about the tri-county area in his business. So he traded in the Pontiac on a brand new 1941 Packard station wagon, the only one of its kind I ever saw, and his only new car.

In the late 1930's they bought a decrepit cabin on Lower Lake at a tax auction. Many weekends were spent renovating it, but the cabin was destroyed in a grass fire in the middle 1940's.

I remember the night before Lloyd died. He and Bonnie were going out - a rare event - and I was sitting out in front of the garage, looking at the stars when they left. I think my parents were having a hard time with their marriage, because I remember that I wished on the first star that mom have a good time tonight, because she had been pretty glum lately. I vaguely remember about 1936 when we to Chicago, that is, Mom, Howard, Mickey and I went. Dad was taking us to the train in Martinez, but had a flat tire and so had to race the train to Davis or Sacramento to get us on. We met Grandpa and Grandma (Fred and Georgeana Yarbrough) in Ogden Utah, and rode with them in their 1936 Chrysler Airflow sedan, across the country to Chicago, and probably to Moosehart, Indiana, as Fred Yarbrough was a National Officer in the Loyal Order of Moose that year. I think we were gone for most of the summer. My brother Howard told me that while in Chicago, Aunt Stella told mom that it didn't do any good to stay there, that she had to go back to California to work things out with Lloyd.

Lloyd had a history of heart problems. He took Howard and I along when he went to work on the cabin on Clear Lake during the summer of 1940. Some friends and cousins, including Floyd Caughey, were up there helping on a weekend when Floyd took me to town to buy food for dinner. On our way back we passed Carl Leu driving dad to the hospital because of what was diagnosed as a heart attack. That was the only time I knew something like that had happened, but I was told that there were other incidents. I believe that my father, Forrest Lloyd Yarbrough, suffered from a congenital heart defect, which was inherited from his mother, Dena McMichael, who died from complications arising from Influenza in 1919, generally attributed to a heart defect. Lloyd died at 10 a.m. on the third of October, 1941. His brother Jean Porter was the funeral director, and the funeral services were at the First Baptist Church. His ashes were scattered on the surf at the mouth of Salmon creek, an area he particularly loved. Lloyd died just two months before the Pearl Harbor attack drew the United States into the second world war.

After Lloyd's death Bonnie sold the store, to a Mr. Deardorf (who later sold it to Mae Leu, Lloyd's secretary) and got enough from it to pay off all debts, so she just had Lloyd's insurance money to live on for some time. She first worked at restaurants to keep food on the table and the family together. She rented the small house to an army couple, but the man was sent over seas and his wife moved back with her parents. Then she rented to an older couple named Miller, from Mill Valley. They were interested in buying that place, so lkshe sold it, along with the garage which straddled the new property line, so Mr. Miller moved it onto his side, and Bonnie and Howard built a lean-to garage. Later she obtained a position in the classified department of the

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Santa Rosa Press Democrat, where she worked for several years.

During the war she learned how to fly, taking lessons in a Piper Cub. She said the most unnerving episode was when the flying instructor required her to stall the plane during one lesson. She survived that and went on to qualify for a pilot's license, but she didn't use it very often.

Howard dropped out of school to work in the ship yards in Vallejo, and later joined the Navy, in 1946. Bonnie met a number of men who seemed to be interested in her, but seemed to back away when they found she had four children. She drifted away from Lloyd's relatives, keeping close ties only with Floyd and Ethel Caughey and with Aunt Rena (and Uncle Bill Caughey), Lloyd's mother's twin sister. She felt she was losing control of her children, and wanted a situation where she could spend more time with them. When Raymond was about to graduate from High School, she decided to sell the house on Baker Avenue and move to southern California near her sister Muriel Wilson. She sold the house in January, with an arrangement to vacate by the end of March. She moved south with only Michael and Marcia as Howard was in the Navy, and Raymond who had graduated from Santa Rosa High School in February, was sent off to Montana to "visit" his grandparents. She went to Oceanside and stayed with her sister for about 6 months and then bought the house in Carlsbad where she was to live for the rest of her life. She bought the house from the proceeds of the sale of the Santa Rosa property (about \$5,000 from there was divided between a downpayment and other expenses, the Carlsbad house cost about \$11,000 in 1949). Bonnie obtained the position of registrar at the Army & Navy Academy in Carlsbad, a preparatory school for boys. She was able to enroll Michael in the Army and Navy Academy, and sent Marcia to the Academy of the Little Flower, a Catholic Girl's school at San Luis Rey Mission.

Bonnie was a diligent house keeper, and really enjoyed gardening. She had put a lot of work into landscaping the Santa Rosa property, and when she bought the Carlsbad house it had no plantings at all, so she had the opportunity to start all over again. Over the years she developed a very pleasant yard including a vegetable garden, until she could no longer care for it herself. She played the piano and the organ. For years she was involved with the Spanish Choir at St. Patrick's church in Carlsbad. She had been born Catholic, but with the breakup of her parents she had ceased practicing. After the she moved to Carlsbad she returned to the church.

Bonnie retired from her position at the Army & Navy Academy in 1971. During the forty one years that she lived in Carlsbad, she saw her children grow up, marry, establish families and spread out along the West Coast. She said she never remarried because she never found another man like Lloyd Yarbrough, who would love her for herself.

During her last years she grew steadily weaker. She gave up driving after her 80th birthday party, and had to quit walking to town. She died on Tuesday, May 15, 1990, after hearing from all of her children and many of her grandchildren on Mother's day. Her ashes are interred at Eternal Hills Cemetery in Oceanside.

She died at home, just like she said she wanted to do. She died without ever having to live with her children or enter a rest home or any of those things she'd said she'd never do.

I had regularly called her on Monday evenings, and was afraid I might miss her after Mother's Day, because she had been feeling very poorly most of this year. But she answered the phone. When I asked how she was, she said she wouldn't answer that. We chatted for about a half an hour and I wished her a happy Mother's Day and told her I would call her the next Monday.

She died the next morning. Her sister Muriel Wilson found her when she went to take her shopping. We delayed the services until Monday because people

had to come from as far as Germany. She wanted to be cremated and did not want a funeral, so we had a memorial mass at St. Patrick's Church in Carlsbad. All of her children, fourteen of her twenty one grand children, and five great grandchildren were there. In addition two current and two former daughter's-in-law, one current and one former son-in-law were also there to honor her. Her sister Muriel and her husband Bob Wilson as well as their two grown children were also there. There were a few others, but as she said the last time I spoke with her, most everyone else she knew around there had died since she retired.

In the afternoon we went to Eternal Hills Cemetery in Oceanside for the interment. Her ashes are placed on the western slope of a pleasant hill with a nice view. She lived almost 49 years after our father Lloyd Yarbrough died in Santa Rosa in 1941.

THE CHILDREN OF LLOYD AND BONNIE YARBROUGH

Howard spent four years in the Navy, and lived in Chicago for some time afterward, and he earned a degree in Electrical Engineering at Illinois Institute of Technology. He worked for the railroad while going to school and later as an engineer for Goss Printing Press Co. He and his wife Francis moved to the San Diego area after their first child was born, and to Carlsbad just after the second. Howard earned a Master of Science degree in Electrical Engineering from San Diego State University and another from the University of Southern California. He has long been associated with various aircraft companies as a design engineer. He moved from the Carlsbad area after his divorce from Francis. His marriage to Ardith Stone in 1967 was annulled. He was also married in 1979 to Bernadette (Nadette) Golka and later divorced. Howard is an Electrical Engineer at Boeing Aircraft in Seattle.

2. REMILLARD

The Hudson female lines are Miller and Remillard. The earliest we know of is IV. Joseph Remillard, who fathered 14 children including three sets of twins. Among these is our ancestor Marie Olivine Remillard Miller who was a twin born in 1852 in St. Bartholemy, Quebec, Canada of Joseph's first wife who died about 1859, and whose name is not known. Joseph married again and moved to Montreal where he was head singer in the choir at the Catholic Cathedral of Notre Dame for 25 yrs. One of his sons joined the priesthood and two daughters became Nuns. Only the names of Marie Olivine and her twin sister are known. The Remillard family may have been originally from Brittany in France.

V. Marie Olivine Remillard, born Feb. 10, 1852 St. Bartholemy Quebec Canada, died Nov. 30, 1913 at Edmonds, Wash., buried Dec 3, 1913 at Edmonds, Wash. About 1870 she married Louis Marc Miller in Montreal, Canada.

Marie Olivine was the second wife of Louis Marc Miller, who had a daughter, Catherine Henrietta, the only child of his first wife who died when their daughter was two years old. Marie Olivine had five children, only one of whom lived to marry and have children. Her children were Louis Barnabas, Georgiana Malvina, Mary Angeline, Joseph Cleaphas, Emiline Clementine.

Marie Olivine was short, 5 ft. 2 in., and stout. She had brown eyes, brown hair, a very fine complexion always with the rosiest cheeks, but her daughter Georgiana claimed that her disposition wasn't so good. She was a hard worker and had been all of her life. She was hired out at 12 years. She worked and went to school. She received \$8.00 a year, clothes and board. When she was grown she worked as a stewardess on a boat between Three Rivers and Montreal. She never had a sick day to speak of until two years before she died. She had cancer of the stomach, but pneumonia set in when she died.

V. Marie Louise Remillard: Marie Olivine Remillard's twin sister was Marie Louise Remillard. In June 1872 Marie Louis married Joseph L.C. Miller, who was the youngest brother of Louis Marc Miller. Joseph had never previously met his sister-in-law, Marie Olivine. The twins used their middle names, as is the French custom.

Further information on these twins is included in the stories that follow.

MILLER/DUMOULIN - REMILLARD

Next we consider the Miller-Remillard line, where extensive information has been provided by VIII.2 Bonnie Palluck, obtained from her mother VII.2 Clara Stella Hudson, who in turn gleaned it from her mother: VI.3 Georgiana Malvina Miller in 1942.

The name Miller is the anglicization of a French name, which is most often given as Dumoulin or Dumulin. Apparently it was changed to Miller by all of the male children of a descendant of a member of Champlain's expeditions in America. They changed their names when they became naturalized citizens of the United States about the time of the Civil War.

As told from generation to generation, this explorer was a son of the House of Dumoulin in Marseilles, France. At the time of the French Civil War (between the Catholics and Calvinists, some time between 1590 and 1610) their property was confiscated by the Government and all of the family in Marseilles were beheaded. However, one son was in Canada with Champlain, and remained there to become one of the earliest settlers along the St. Lawrence in French Canada. It was either him or one of his sons who settled in what is now the

Province of Quebec at Nicolette. This settler obtained a land grant, which was to be handed down from eldest son to eldest son, under the system of primogeniture. One of his descendants was the grandfather of Louis Marc Miller, and gave 160 acres to Nicolette Boys College. Then he and his brothers donated their labor and his team's service to build the college. A family tradition is, that any boy of direct descent would be given his education free, but only one at a time. This agreement has apparently lapsed, if the school still exists.

An oral tradition or story has a Miller ancestor associated with the founding of McGill University, but my research found the only possible person with such association was the superintendent of public instruction for the Province of Quebec, who roundly criticized the operation of the University shortly after it was founded. His name was Jean Baptiste Meilleur. He was the founder of another college in Canada: College of L'Assomption MLA. Oral tradition is unreliable, whether given as such or written out. For this reason it is thought he may have been our ancestor. If the family name was Meilleur rather than Dumoulin, he could have been the father of Louis Marc Miller. He was born 8 May, 1796 (at Petite Côte in the parish of St. Laurent on Montreal Island) He was the son of Jean Meilleur and Marie Suzanne Blaignier. He married Josephine Eno dit Deschamps and they had 10 children. However, as the name was changed to Miller before Georgiana was born, and the family tradition has always been that the original was Dumoulin, we shall have to assume this story is merely interesting. Another possibility is that Mielleur is somehow connected to Remillard, as another tradition was a connection with Brittany.

The first names we know are the eight Dumoulin children from Nicolette, the youngest of whom was born in 1842, and the oldest reported as being born in both 1821 and 1841. The 1821 date does not agree with other dates given, and the 1841 date is too late. The children of this family were:

- V.1 Louis Marc Dumoulin (Miller), born June 12, 1821/41 at Nicolette, Quebec, Canada, died Feb. 20, 1900 at Cleveland, Tenn., buried Feb. 25, 1900 at Fargo, N.D., (died of Dropsy of the heart) m. (2) Marie Olivine Remillard. They were the parents of VI.3 Georgiana Miller who is our ancestor.
- V.2 Henrietta Dumoulin, m. Duclos, three girls: Lorena, Loretta and Eva. Only Eva married.
- V.3 Frank Dumoulin (Miller) married twice. He had sons Frank and Lewis by his first wife who died. He emigrated to Duluth Minn. and homesteaded what is now the Hill Iron ore mine, but the ore was not known of then. He gave it to the Church when he could not make a living and after his wife died. He left the boys with his brother for a few years. He took up land near Devils Lake N.D. married a quarter-breed Indian, had four children: Agnes, John and two others. Frank Miller, died of heart trouble March 20, 1900 at his home.
- V.4 Mary Dumoulin, m. Dollaire. Child: Edmond, possibly others.
- V.5 Onesime or Onezym Dumoulin (Miller), emigrated to Minneapolis, Minn. in the late seventies, homesteaded at Stump Lake and had six children: Louis, Camilia, Eldia, Frank, Rosella and Lydia.
- V.6 Sophia Dumoulin, m. Fortier. children: Philip, Rose (Real) and Emma. Philip and Rose lived in Fargo, N.D.
- V.7 Phenomen or Phenonieu Dumoulin, m. (1) Jerome had two children: Mary and Ezeb. Jerome died. m.(2) Woods, children: Elodie, John, George and?.

 Mary Jerome lived with Louis Marc Miller family in Fargo ca. 1880's.
- V.8 Joseph L.C. Dumoulin (Miller), born in three Rivers, Canada in 1842 and died at South Park, Seattle, Wash. June 26, 1908.

Joseph L.C. Dumoulin was the youngest of the family and was eligible to go to the Nicolette Boy's School but he ran away from home, and came to the United States. At age 19 he enlisted in the Civil War on Sept 5, 1861 as a private in Co. C, 4th regiment, New Hampshire Infantry, at Manchester, N.H. and he was mustered into service on Sept. 18, 1861. He was mustered out of service and honorably discharged on Feb. 19, 1864, so that he could reenlist on Feb 20, 1864 as a Veteran Volunteer of the same organization. At the end of the Civil War he was mustered out of service and honorably discharged June 2, 1865. Joe had been in Massachusetts and had married but his wife died leaving him with two children, Edward Ginge and a daughter Rose. He returned to Canada and was married to Marie Louise Remillard in June 1872. There were two sons by this marriage, Arthur Joseph and Joseph Tillingford. They emigrated to Michigan and he took up the career of timber Cruiser, measuring standing timber first in Mich. later at Brainerd Mines, where also he ran a boarding house. Later he moved to Seattle where he died of heart trouble.

Rose Miller (James) lived with Louis Marc Miller Family in Fargo ca. 1880's. She died in 1903 leaving three children, two boys and a girl. Joseph Tillingford Miller m. Edna, children: Dode, Glen, Delbert.

3.1 LOUIS MARC MILLER

V.1 Louis Marc Dumoulin (Miller) was born on June 12, 1821/1841 at Nicolette, Quebec, Canada, and died Feb. 20, 1900 at Cleveland Tenn, and Buried at Fargo, N.D. He was the eldest of eight children.

Because his father died when he was but 12 years old, he had to help support his family from the time he was 14 until he was 21, Louis Marc Miller never finished school, attending only elementary school. But he was an observant man, who took time for the study of available literature and to follow current events in newspapers to become a self educated man.

He was six feet tall, with broad shoulders, fair complexion, blue eyes, brown hair and a very amiable disposition. He was highly regarded for his honesty and integrity. He wore a beard and long tailed coat like Abraham Lincoln, the fashion of the time, and some thought he resembled Lincoln. He went to Boston, Massachusetts when he was 21. For four years apprenticed as a shoemaker, learned English, took out naturalization papers and changed his name to Miller. He worked there at shoemaking for several more years. He had tried to enlist when the Civil War began, but was turned down because of kidney trouble.

He was in his early thirties in 1865 in Chickopee, Massachusetts when he married a Cahill girl who died when their daughter Catherine Henrietta was two years old. After two years of hiring a baby sitter, Louis Marc took Catherine to stay with his sister Mary in Montreal. He met Mary's friend Marie Olivine Remillard and within a week they had married. They returned with Kate to Stockbridge, Massachusetts where he had a small shop of his own. Louis Stephen Barnabas was born there in 1872. He sent his wife and children to visit his folks in Canada, and headed West to visit his brothers.

Louis Marc first visited Frank at Duluth, then Onezym at Minneapolis. He joined an expedition going to Fort Abercrombie on the Red River of the North, which took 3 months by ox-team to cover 185 roadless miles. It was nearly winter when they reached the Fort, so he stayed there until Spring. He took passage on the River Steamer Selkirk on its first trip North to Winnipeg, to the site where the Northern Pacific Railroad was to cross the river.

He returned to Canada and brought Marie Olivine and the two children as far as Minneapolis, leaving them with his brother Onezyn and his wife Amanda.

In 1874 Louis Marc obtained property at Moorhead, Minnesota, where the rail-road was approaching. He was among the first settlers there, and built the first log house, where he opened a Boot and Shoe Shop, and sent for his family. He was on hand when the first locomotive drew into the station. He was the first constable of Moorhead, and held several city offices. During their stay in Moorhead, they platted out the new towns of Moorhead and Fargo while steamboats plied up and down the Red River from Fort Abercrombie to Winnipeg, shipping furs for the Hudson Bay Co. and other trading goods.

In 1875 he briefly took up a homestead near Sabine, twenty miles East of Moorhead, on what is now the N.P. Railroad shops in Dilworth. He then bought a section of land and homesteaded another half way between Moorhead and Fort Abercrombie, and established a mail and trading station known as Miller's Station, where the mail relay dog-teams were changed. He built a big log house with four or five rooms. The farm buildings were in a grove where the Red River formed a point. The Indians camped in the grove to pick fruit, and to trade at Miller's Station. VI.2 Mary Georgiana Malvina was born at Miller's Station on May 28th, 1876, and Mary Angeline on April 14th 1878. While records indicate that Joseph Clephas, born Mar. 17, 1880, and Emeline Clementine born Jan 28, 1882, were born at Fargo N.D, they may have also been born at Miller's Station.

In 1876 Louis Marc had been one of the council that met and smoked the Pipe of Peace with Sitting Bull some months before the Massacre of Gen. Custer's Army at Little Bighorn. Custer had been protecting the construction crews of the Northern Pacific Railroad, and scouting for routes for eight years.

Besides farming his property, Louis Marc was breeding cattle and horses, for which he had mortgaged his farm, but the enterprise was failing. In 1884 he traded 160 acres, cattle and horses for a boarding house with black-smith and carriage shop in Fargo, and enough cash to pay off the mortgage.

Fargo was booming, with property changing hands dozens of times. His horses and carriages were in great demand. Louis Marc was active in civic affairs and in the Republican Party. He was the businessman interpreter for two French Canadian communities of about 200 families at Holy Cross and Wild Rice, south of Fargo.

He decided to farm the remaining 160 acres near Miller's Station, and began to put in a crop each year. He built a small house, granary and barn, bought four horses and a cow which he brought to town during the Winter months.

In the early 1890's Louis Marc bought 160 acres twenty miles inland of Tampa, Florida, near Plant City. He contracted for the care and farming of the orange grove, other citrus fruit and strawberries. After Fall work was done on the Red River farm, he would go south for the winter. His health was beginning to fail. He had leased the shops, but Marie Olivine continued to run the boarding house, and refused to go south. in 1896, Louis Marc prostrate trouble became so bad that he stopped the trips to Florida. He suffered terribly during his last years. He apparently sold the Florida property, and just before his death, he sold the North Dakota farm and bought a place near Cleveland Tenn. He was bargaining to trade that for a place near Tallahassee Fla. but developed dropsy and died before it was completed.

CHILDREN OF LOUIS MARC MILLER

VI.1 Catherine Henrietta, the only child of *Louis Marc* and his first wife, born on Aug. 19, 1866 - at Chickopee, Mass, and died March 1914 in Seattle, she was cremated and her ashes interred at Georgetown Mortuary.

She married Charles Augustus Carpenter in 1881. From this union five children were born: Melvina who died in infancy, Luella born March 14, 1886, Ralph born Aug 14, 1887, Adelbert born Mar 14, 1888 and Viva who died in infancy. Luella Carpenter married Ellsworth Hines about 1908. From this union two children were born: Geraldine and a girl who died in infancy. Geraldine married and had at least one child. Ralph Carpenter also married. Adelbert married twice.

- VI.2 Stephen Barnabas was born Dec. 19, 1872 at Stockbridge Mass. and died of typhoid fever on Dec. 14, 1891 or 1895 at Fargo, N.D.
- VI.3 Mary Georgiana Malvina Clementine was born at Miller's Station near Fargo, N.D. on 28 May 1876, married Frederick Howard Hudson Jan 6, 1898 at Fargo N.D. from which union eight children were born:

MARY GEORGIANA MALVINA CLEMENTINE MILLER

VI.3 Georgiana Miller was born in a log house on the border of North Dakota and Minnesota, the third child of immigrant French Canadian settlers. She usually referred to herself as Georgiana Melvina in letters, but her children knew of a third name, Clementine, which she always told them. In one account of her birth, she gives her name as Mary Georgiana Melvina, so here all are included. She was born on a homestead farm where her father had a trading post and mail station which functioned in the winter with dog-teams carrying mail down the Red River of the North to Winnipeg, Canada. She remembers three times the river flooded to the second floor of their house.

In her memoirs, she tells that the farm buildings were in a grove where the Red River formed a point. This grove had all kinds of wild plums, raspberries and grapes. The Indians used to come and camp in the point to pick fruit, and to trade at Miller's Station. She claimed to have spoken French and Indian before learning English.

She went to school in Fargo, from the first grade through high school. Later, she took a course at the Dakota Business College, where she first met Frederick Howard Hudson. For two years she was in Waterville, Washington where she kept books for her brother-in-law Charles Carpenter, the husband of her half-sister Katherine Henrietta. She then returned to Fargo, and married Fred Hudson in 1898. They lived with Georgiana's family until her father died. She had seen her older brother Stephen die of Typhoid fever in 1895, and her closest sister Mary Angeline die of the same disease in 1896. When her father died, they sold out and moved to Mandan North Dakota, probably because Fred

Hudson was working on the Northern Pacific Railroad, and company housing was available. They soon moved to Glendive, where her youngest sister, Emiline Clementine, died of pneumonia in late 1900. From then her mother referred to Georgiana as her only child, as the other four had met premature deaths. The listing of birthplaces of the children of Georgiana Miller and Fred Hudson shows the constant moving from one railroad town to another: Mandan in 1899, Glendive in 1900 and 1903, Seattle in 1904, Glendive again in 1906, 1908 and 1910, and finally Lewistown in 1914.

We break off this line until part 4, to bring in the Hudson and Carter history - as much as is presently known.

HUDSON/CARTER

The approximate location of Ella Carter's parents in the late 19th century is known, but their names and history have not yet been discovered.

V. Edward W. Hudson d. ca 1886 near Sykeston N.D., m. Ella Carter from Dublin Ireland. They were the parents of Frederick Howard Hudson, who is our ancestor.

children of Edward W. Hudson and Ella Carter:

- VI.1 Alby (Albert?) Hudson, m. May _____, had children. According to Georgiana Miller, Alby was a hard drinker who died from painters colic, complicated by alcohol. May later married Mr. Hodgson.
- VI.2 Frederick Howard Hudson, b. 14 March 1873 in Corry PA, d. Nov 1935 in Seattle, age about 62 yrs. In Fargo N.D. on 6 Jan 1898 he married Georgiana Malvina Clementine Miller.
- VI.3 Jennie (Virginia?) Hudson, m. Badger
- VI.4 Eddie Hudson, m. Jennie ___, children: Ella, Elwood.

According to Georgiana Miller, Ed Hudson was a hard drinker and Ella left him and later married a man named Richardson. She died shortly after their daughter Nadine was born and Aunt Abby raised her. Abby (Hudson) Graves was a sister to Edward Hudson. Fred Hudson's wife, Georgiana Miller wrote of Abby in 1942: She was a grand person, used to write me regularly. She sent me the cutest crochet jacket and cap for Evelyn when she was born. She died some years ago.

Another story (which may be in error) is that *Ed Hudson* later divorced *Ella Carter* and m. (2) Geraldine (....) by whom he had one daughter, Nadine Hudson. Nadine had no children.

Georgiana Miller wrote: Edward Hudson went to North Dakota, near Sykeston, about 1885, and took up a homestead. He had taken his second son Fred with him because he had asthma. During the winter (probably 1885 or 1886) Ed took cold, which turned into pneumonia, and he died in three days. Fred, who was twelve at the time, was alone with him. Fred was taken in by a family named Hikey (?), and so he worked and went to school in North Dakota.

Ed Hudson and Ella Carter were married in Pennsylvania, and their son Frederick Howard Hudson was born in Corry PA. There is a letter which is transcribed in appendix A, postmarked 1888 but dated 1880, from Ella to her son Fred, which, judging from the contents, was written after the Ed and Ella had been separated for several years. The letter indicates that Jennie was living with her mother in Concord, VT. and that Alby and Eddy were living near Concord VT with Ella's parents. Ella mentions that Ed should pay her mother for his little boys' board.

Ella was living in Concord Corner VT, which must have had a postal

substation for the main post-office in Concord, as there are post marks for both on the envelope. Concord is in Essex County VT, the county seat being Guild Hall in north-eastern VT. The nearest larger city to Concord is Saint Johnsbury, about ten miles down-stream on the Moose River, which joins the Connecticut River at Saint Johnsbury. There is also a connection between Concord and Saint Johnsbury via Main Central Railroad. Because Alby "came up" to see them, and reported that Grandpa had been sick but is better, and because Ella mentioned paying her mother, it may be implied that her parents lived somewhere near-by, and probably down-stream (as Alby had come up) along the Moose River, perhaps in Saint Johnsbury.

The letter tells us that Fred (who was 15 in 1888), Jennie and Alby are of school age and the latter two are attending school. Alby was older than Fred, and it can be estimated that Jennie was more than 6 at that time.

Ella was probably earning room and board for herself and daughter Jennie as a live-in maid, and took the job making gloves at the Glove Shop in Littleton to give her an income. I have not located Littleton.

Family tradition is that *Ella* was from Dublin, Ireland. It is probable that she came to this country as a small child in the 1850's or 60's with her family to escape the potato famine which took a heavy toll of the Irish population both by starvation and emigration, with many emigrants entering the United States via Boston, and more via Montreal, Canada, both of which are near VT.

Ed Hudson had apparently been ill, which had not prevented him from expressing hostility toward Ella in an earlier letter in which he had told her to stop writing to him. They apparently had been separated for some time, and some years earlier he had taken Fred with him when he went west. The town Sykeston, is in central North Dakota in Wells Co. It is on a branch of the Northern Pacific R.R. west from Carrington, ND Bismark ND is some 70 or 80 miles south-west of Sykeston. The county seat of Wells Co. is Fessenden.

5. HUDSON - MILLER

VI.2 Frederick Howard Hudson, b. 14 March 1873 in Corry PA, d. Nov 1935 in Seattle, age about 62 yrs. In Fargo N.D. on 6 Jan 1898 he married Georgiana Malvina Clementine Miller.

As a young boy, Fred Hudson had gone to Sykeston, ND with his father. When his father died, he was raised by a family named Hikey, where he worked and went through school. For many years he worked for the Great Northern Railroad. During his marriage to Georgiana Miller, they lived in many towns in Montana, including Glendive, Lewistown, Oilmont and Lehigh. One child, Clementine, died in a fall from a railway car. The two oldest girls grew up in Montana, but the younger children were to leave the state before reaching maturity.

Fred and Georgiana were separated around 1914, and later divorced. Fred left the younger children in Lewistown with their mother and went to Seattle and joined his daughter Evelyn, who was married to Clyde Fenn. About 1921 Georgiana married a Robert Wilson, and the children could no longer stay with her. she sent Muriel to Stella and her husband Harry Ward in Chicago, put Bonnie on a train for Seattle, and placed Ted and Irene in a home for orphans in Montana. It was a very unhappy time for the children. Fred sent for the scattered children one-by-one, bringing them to the home of Evelyn and Clyde Fenn. The younger children finished their schooling in Seattle. Fred left his position with Northern Pacific and took a job as a streetcar conductor in Seattle so that he could be at home with the children.

APPENDIX A. Letter from Ella Carter HUDSON to Fred HUDSON

The envelope is postmarked West Concord Vt, and Concord VT, both dated Nov. 15, 1888. The letter is addressed to Mr. Fred H. Hudson, Sykeston, Wells Co., Dakota, c/o E.W. Hudson. Punctuation has been added as appeared appropriate.

My dear son Freddy, it has been a long time since I have heard from you. how are you getting along and what are you doing? Jennie and I are well at present and hope you are. do you have the asthma any? do you go to school, and how far do you have to go? are you living with your father or someone else? how is your father now? does he work any yet, and what does he do? I don't dare write to him for he told me not to, but I hope you wont for get your mother Fred, and will write to me perhaps some time. If we are both live we shall see each other again. I wish I could see you tonight. I want you to be sure and write as soon as you get my letter and let me know how you are. Alby has been up to see us to day, grandpa has been sick but is better now. Alby is well and goes to school. Jennies school finished Friday but commences again in two weeks from now. she says tell Fred to be good and come and see her. she wants

to see you awfuly. she wishes she had some thing to send you, but she aint got I have been over to littleton and been in the glove shop to work two weeks and just got back. I am making gloves for the firm now. I am going to make them this winter and don't know how much longer. I get twenty five cents a pair. I can make seven or eight pair a day besides working for my board and Jennies in the forenoon. I have got me a new Wheeler and Wilson sewing machine number ten [undeciphered word] for gloves. I hope I shall have my health, and if I do I shall be all right and Jennie and Eddie with out your father help. I hope he is enjoying him self; I am, as much as I can. have made up my mind that I shant worry my brains about Ed Hudson. I don't think he will die as long as he is able to write such a letter as he did, the last one he wrote to me. All I ask of him is to pay my mother for his little boys board for two years and I hope he will be obliged to if he ever shows himself round here. but Fred, I want you to write Jennie and me, and we will write to you if you want us to write soon. well- lots of love from ma and Alby and Jennie, be sure and write soon, from your loving mother and sister Jennie. don't let you papa keep you from writing to us Fred.

My Dear Daughter,

You asked who these are. Abby (Hudson) Graves: She was your great Aunt, a sister to your father's Dad. She was a grand person, used to write me regularly. She sent me the cutest crochet jacket and cap for Evelyn when she was born. She died some years ago. I wrote Graves for information.

Your Dad was born March 14, 1873 in Cory Pa. I wrote there for data but they didn't have any. Your Dad's mother was Ella Carter, his Dad- Edward. Your Grandfather was a hard drinker and his wife left him and later married Nadine's father, Richardson. She died shortly after Nadine was born and Aunt Abby raised her. Your Grandfather had come to N.D. near Sykeston and took up a homestead, he brought Fred (your Dad) with him too because he had asthma. During the winter he took cold, went into pneumonia and died in three days. Your dad was alone with him, he was 12 years old. Then the Hikey's (?) took him and he worked and went to school. We visited them, you and I, when you were 1 yr. old.

You'll find the answer to your questions about birth dates on another page, also other information as I remember it. I've already written to get data on your father's family and will send it as soon as I get it. Am enclosing some letters which you can get something from.

You asked who Joe, Edna and Dode are? Joe is Uncle Joe's youngest boy, Edna is his wife and Dode the daughter, Glen and Delbert his sons. Ed Miller (the letter enclosed) is his half brother, the oldest of the family.

My Mother's father's name was Joseph Remillard but don't know nothing about birth dates.

In that letter of Edna's I sent you is the data and place of birth of Uncle Joe. If you will write to the Cure at the Catholic Church at Three Rivers, no doubt the name of his father and mother are there so we can there

who died. He left the boys with his brother for a few years. He took up land near Devils Lake N.D. married a quarter-breed Indian, had four children: Agnes, John, didn't know the others names. Agnes was my brides-maid when I married in 1898.

Mary (Moulin) Dollaire/ I only knew of one child, Edmond, there may have been others.

Onesime (Moulin) Miller had six children: Frank, Louis, Camelia (she was so much like me we were taken for twins. We were born on the same day.) I visited this family in 1909.) Eldia, Lydia and Rose.

Sophia (Moulin) Fortier had three children: Philip, Rose and Emma (Philip and Rose (Real) lived near us at Fargo).

Philomeul(?) (Mouline) Jerome had two children: Mary and Ezeb. Jerome died and she married a Woods, had four more children: Elodie, John, George and I don't know the other's name. Mary Jerome lived with us in Fargo when I was a child, also Rose (Miller) James.

Joseph (Moulin) Miller had two children by his first wife: Ed and Rose. And two children by his second wife (my mother's twin) Arthur and Joe. He was a timber Cruiser, measuring standing timber first in Mich. later at Brainerd Mines, where we visited him and he ran a boarding house the same as we did. Many French people working there and boarding with them later came to Fargo and asked when she got there, thinking it was Aunty, just like you kids used to think when you were small. Later he moved to Seattle where he passed away about 1902 or later. Heart trouble.

Frank Miller died just one month later than Louis at his home. Heart trouble.

APPENDIX C. LOUIS MARC MILLER

FROM A TYPED COPY from Georgiana M. Yarbrough to Stella Ward about 1942
Louis Mark (Demulin) Miller

Louis Mark Miller was born on June 12, 1821, at Nicolet, Canada, and dies Feb. 20, 1900 at Cleveland Tenn, and Buried at Fargo, N.D.

As told from generation to generation, he was a direct descendant line from the house of Peers of the House Demulin, in Marseilles, France, and which was confiscated by the Government after beheading all the family except the one son who was on an Expedition with Champlain in Canada, and who stayed there. Whether it was he or some other descendant who settled in Nicolet, is not known, but the Grandfather of Louis and his brothers was one of the men who donated his and his team's service to build the Nicolet Boys College, for which any male descendant was to be educated free, one at a time. This is just as told by father.

Father never finished school, only attended elementary, as he had to work to help support his brothers and sisters, his father having died when he was but 12 years old. But he never missed an opportunity to obtain all the education he could assume by hard application to study of literature he could obtain and following events in papers. At the time of his death he was one of the best read, best informed and best educated men of his time. He was a self educated man.

When he was 21 he came to Boston Mass. and apprenticed as a shoemaker, which at that time was considered a good trade. He served four years and during that time, perfected himself in the English tongue and took out his naturalization papers, at which time he changed his name to Miller, the English derivation of the name Dumulin, which means of a Mill or a Miller. He worked at his trade for some years and in many towns, all in Mass. When he was between thirty and thirty-five he met and married a Cahill girl, who was the mother of my half-sister Katherine, or Kate as we called her. Kate's mother died when she was two years old, and for two years my father tried to take care of her alone, but finding it a task decided to take her to Canada to his sister Mary who had children and could look after her.

While he was there he met and married my mother, Mary Olivine Remillard, and took Kate back to the U.S. with them. They lived at Stockbridge, Mass for some years, and there my brother Stephen was born in 1872.

But to go back to the days of the Civil War, Father tried to enlist, but was affected with Bright's disease and they rejected him, but his youngest brother Joe, enlisted and when he deserted and was taken he was to be shot, but father went to Lincoln and swore Joe was only 19 and they could not execute him, he was a minor, he was deported to Canada, instead. It was after the war, he married.

Father had three brothers and four sisters. All the boys became American Citizens. Onezym Miller emigrated to Minneapolis, Minn. in the late seventies, homesteaded at Stump Lake and had six children: Louis, Camilia, Eldia, Frank, Rosella and Lydia.

Frank Miller emigrated to Duluth Minn. and homesteaded what is now the Hill Iron ore mine, but was not known then. He gave it to the Church when he could not make a living and after his wife died.

He [Louis Mark] visited Frank at Duluth, where he had taken up a homestead on what is now the iron mines, but Louis did not like it there, so moved on to visit his brother Onezym at Minneapolis. While there he heard of an expedition going to Fort Abercrombie on the Red River of the North and the great excitement of the Northern Pacific Railroad on its way to the Coast, so he joined the expedition which took three months to reach Abercrombie by oxteam. There were no roads, many lakes and swamp lands to cross and many Indians to look out for.

It was Fall when they reached the Fort, and the Winter near at hand, so he stayed there until Spring break-up before going North to the railroad at Moorhead. During the Spring break-up some Indians decided one night to massacre the whites at the Fort, and had camped a mile or so North, but one of the Indians who was friendly came to the Fort during the night to notify the whites of the attack and it was while they were there that the treacherous Red River flooded everything and the Indians were nearly all drowned.

By this time the River Steamer Selkirk was getting ready for its first trip North to Winnipeg, and he took passage on it to the site where the rail-road was to cross the river. Now many had bought up land all the way from Holy Cross to ten miles North of what is now Moorhead, as no one knew where the crossing would be, but Louis got hold of a piece of land at Moorhead, and when they finally crossed there and platted out Moorhead and Fargo, he had built himself a three-room log cabin, the front was his shop and the rear rooms were where he was to have his family, which he had sent for. Here for two years he raised chickens, which he sold to the boats for \$1.00 a pound made and repaired boots and shoes, was elected their first constable, and he took up a homestead near Sabine, twenty miles East of Moorhead.

This he abandoned later, as it was impossible to live there in Summer on account of mosquitoes, it being very low land in Winter the severe weather

prohibited living in the frail shanty. He tells he abandoned it because the mosquitoes were so big and thick, that one time he had to get under a big iron tank, but the mosquitoes drilled right through with their bills, so he thought he would clinch their bill inside, but when he got that done, they flew away and took the tank with them. Anyway, he returned the land to Uncle Sam.

But the land was in his blood, and later he homesteaded 160 acres and bought 160 acres half way between Fort Abercrombie and Moorhead, and moved out there among the Indians. But he made friends with them and with their help established a station called Miller's Station, where trading was carried on and the mail was hauled by dog team through there from the Fort to points North, South, East and West.

On May 28th, 1876, Mary Georgiana Melvina [Miller] was born, an old Indian woman taking care of the mother and child, but after three days the Indian left and the mother had to get up and take care of things. Two years later on April 14th 1878, Mary Angeline was born.

During this time Louis had taken to breeding cattle and horses as well as farming. He had purchased a stallion for which he had mortgaged his farm, but the stallion was no good and he had to dispose of his holdings or lose everything. So he traded 160 acres and cattle and horses for a boarding house with black-smith and carriage shop, combined and enough to boot to pay off the mortgage.

Fargo now was a booming town, land and property changed hands a dozen times. He was prominent in civic affairs and particularly in Republican Party affairs. He was the interpreter and businessman for all the French Canadians living in and around Holy Cross and Wild Rice, two small communities south of Fargo of about two hundred families. He had been one of the council that met and smoked the Pipe of Peace with Sitting Bull some months before the Massacre of Gen. Custer's Army.

He was doing a thriving business in both departments, horses and carriages being in great demand, the river boats being almost entirely discontinued because of low water in the river and railroads.

He now decided to again cultivate the 160 acres, and each Spring went out and put in a crop. He built a small house, granary and barn, bought four horses and a cow which he brought to town during the Winter months. He spent what leisure time he had reading and educating himself thoroughly, also seeking for new developments.

Three times the Red River flooded and filled the house to the second floor. After the first time, he had a flat-bottom boat in which he could salvage whatever the river took from the place, and whatever else he found. He always bought oak wood from Brainerd Minn. and had it cut up in stove lengths for the year. This was what mostly flooded away.

During the Fargo Fire, in which the whole town nearly burned, it was through his and a couple of firemen's efforts that his house and subsequently the town of Moorhead was saved.

In the 90's he decided to buy some property in Florida, and took a trip to look at some land inland twenty miles of Tampa, and one mile from Plant City. He contracted for 160 acres: forty in orange grove, forty in citrus fruit and five acres in strawberries. In the winter after Fall work was done on the Red River farm, he went south. His health was beginning to fail, he had leased the shops and Mrs Miller ran the boarding house. She refused to go south.

He was through the last Yellow Fever epidemic and took care of the sick without contracting the disease, but the last year he was south, his old prostrate gland trouble returned, and for ten years he suffered terribly. It finally developed into dropsy, from which he never recovered. He sold his farm

and tried Tenn. where he died.

A SOMEWHAT DIFFERENT VERSION IN THE SAME SET LOUIS MARC (DE MULIN) MILLER

Louis Marc Miller was born at Nicolett Canada, on June 12, 1841. He was the eldest of three brothers and four sisters, Henrietta, Onezym, Mary, Frank, Sophie, Phenomen and Joseph.

Because of such a large family, he had to be satisfied with little schooling and help out in the support of his family. From the time he was 14 until he was 21 he did this.

He then came to Boston U.S.A. where he apprenticed for four years as a shoe-maker, for there was a great demand for hand made boots and shoes by the rich people. Some paid as high as \$100.00 for a pair of boots.

While working with some forty others, who were inveterate smokers, the talk turned to whether a man could quit smoking or the use of tobacco if he wanted to. A bet was made that they all quit to prove it, and the one who went back to it paid each of the others one dollar. Louis was the only one to collect 39 dollars. He stated many times that it took all his will-power to refrain from going back, and that at the end of a year he craved it terribly, but the taste left him suddenly, and the very smell of tobacco was nauseating. He did use snuff, and had a fine hand carved snuff box of those times.

During the Civil War he lived in Mass. but was turned down on account of kidney trouble, but his brother Joseph enlisted, they had been naturalized taking the name of Miller. His brothers Onezym and Frank had also immigrated, one to Duluth, Minn, and one to Minneapolis.

In 1865 he married a Cahill girl at Chickopee Mass, and from this union Catherine Henrietta was born, but her mother passed away when she was two years old. After two years of hiring someone to take care of the child, Louis decided to take her to his sister Mary in Montreal. Mary had a very dear friend who was Stewardess on one of the steamers that plied between Montreal and Three Rivers, Marie Olivine Remillard. It so happened that while Louis was there, Marie stopped in to see Mary, and then and there Louis decided that he wanted her for his wife. He married her before the week was over, and they returned to Stockbridge where he had a small shop of his own.

In 1872 their first child was born, Louis Stephen Barnabas. They stayed there two years before moving West. During all this time his brothers were writing glowing accounts of the opportunities in the West, with the railroads pushing their way to the Coast, and the Gold discoveries in California. So he decided to take a trip and investigate. He sent his wife and children to visit his folks in Canada, and headed West.

Joe Miller emigrated to Mich. and took up the career of Wood Cruiser, at which he worked until his death. He had married, and when his wife died leaving him with two children, he returned to Canada and married my mother's twin sister, Mary Louise Remillard. He had never met my mother.

In 1872 my father emigrated to Minneapolis but not liking it decided to go further West. He had left my mother in the East until he found a place he wanted. There were no railroads west of Minneapolis, and he had to buy an oxteam to travel. He struck directly west to Fort Abercrombie, a distance of 185 miles, and it took him two months to make the trip.

He decided to make his home on the Red River of the North, and sent for his family. By the time they came out, the railroad was nearing completion to Moorhead Minn., and he decided to move there. He built the first log house and opened a Boot and Shoe Shop in one of the rooms. He was on hand when the first locomotive drew into the station. He was elected the first constable of Moorhead, and served on most of the city offices. During his stay, steamboats

plied up and down the Red River from Fort Abercrombie to Winnipeg, Man. Canada. The Hudson Bay Co. shipped their furs and brought in trade goods via the boats. He saw many a man go places and many events that are hardly believable. One year when the river flooded the country, so many buffaloes were drowned that it took two days for them to float by, the stream was clogged and everyone had buffalo.

In 1875 he took up a homestead on what is now the town of Dilworth and is now the N.P. Railroad shops. But the mosquitoes were so bad and so big he had to give it up. He then bought a section of land half way between Moorhead and Fort Abercrombie, and established a mail station known as Miller's Station, when the mail dog-team was changed with the mail for the North, South East and West. There I was born on May 28, 1876.

In 1884 he lost his farm and sold out, or rather exchanged what credit he had for a Blacksmith and Carriage Shop and Boarding House in Fargo, N.D. It was then a small village and mostly swamp. He lived there until he moved to Tenn. just before his death. In succession, he farmed another piece of land near where he homesteaded, bought a place of 160 acres in Tampa, Fla. and just before his death had bought a place near Cleveland Tenn. but had bargained to trade for a place near Tallahassee Fla. but which was never put through.

APPENDIX D. MILLER'S HISTORY
Letter from Joe & Edna Miller to Georgiana Yarbrough about 1942

Just a little data on the Miller's history.

Their Ancestors lived in Marseilles, France and they were of the house of Du Moulin, aristocrats of some sort, but we do not know the titles.

At the time of the French Revolution, one son was with Champlain's Expedition over here in America, and therefore escaped beheading, which wiped out the family in France. This son settled in what is now the Province of Quebec at Nicolette. He took up a land grant, which at his death was to be handed down to the eldest son and so on and on. One of his descendants donated 160 acres for a college, also furnishing the teams and the men to build the college, the proviso was, that as long as there was a boy of direct descendants he should be given his education free, but it seems the agreement has in some way been done away with.

Joseph L.C. Miller was eligible to go had he cared to do so, but he ran away from home, came to the United States and enlisted in the Civil War in 1861.

When the Du Moulin's came to the United States and took out their naturalization papers, they then changed their name to "Miller" as Du Moulin means "of the mill" or "miller".

Joe's father, Joseph L.C. Miller was the youngest of a family of eight children, four boys and four girls. He was 19 years old when he enlisted on Sept 5, 1861 as a private in Co. C, 4th regiment, New Hampshire Infantry, of the Civil War at Manchester, N.H. and he was mustered into service on Sept. 18, 1861 and was mustered out of service and honorably discharged on Feb. 19, 1864, by reason of reenlistment as a Veteran Volunteer. He reenlisted on Feb 20, 1864 as a Veteran Volunteer of the same organization and was mustered out of service and honorably discharged June 2 1865 at the end of the Civil War. He was born in three Rivers, Canada in 1842 and died at South Park, Seattle, Wash. June 26, 1908. He was married to Marie Louise Remillard in June 1872. There were two sons by this marriage, Arthur Joseph and Joseph Tillingford. There were also two children by a former marriage, Edward Ginge and Rose, a daughter who died in 1903, leaving three children, two boys and a girl.

We have not been able to learn much about either the Du Moulins or the Remillards, and Dodi is like Stella, anxious to get the genealogy on the

father's side of the family. I have my side pretty well traced down at least as far back as 1639 when my mother's ancestors left Lancashire, England and finally settled in Stamford, Conn. in 1641. My father's people came from France and settled in Nantucket about 1680, finally going to N.Y.. We had hoped Ed would be able to help us, but he does not seem to remember much about his father's side of the family either. About all we have is what Bert Carpenter sent us and I guess you have all that, about your father being the oldest and in his second trip west settling in Moorhead, Minn. in 1874. He took up a homestead there, the NPRR had built its line that far by that time, but there were only very few white settlers. Your father was the first constable and he built the first log house in Moorhead. Later on he took up land midway between Moorhead and Ft. Abercrombie at which place was the relay dog team for the mail, and was called Miller's Station.

A week before the Custer massacre, Sitting Bull and some of the Chiefs met in council with the whites at Fargo, and your father was one of those white men.

Only wish Georgia I could help you more. Dodi wrote to Three Rivers trying to trace the Millers (or Du Moulin's) but had no luck. Hope you have better luck, all we had to go on was the add. on his grand-father's pension papers. I am sending you those old addresses of Joe's Mother's and thought they might help you in locating some of the cousins perhaps. Bert said he hoped to go to Montreal and spend his vacation some time and if he did would try and look some of them up, but I guess with the conditions as they are today he will not be going very soon.

We were surely glad to hear from you after all these years and hear all about your family. They are all pretty well scattered out too, the same as our own. Up till last July when Dodi and her family moved back to Everett after being in Idaho for seven years, their daughter Peggy, the oldest, who was 20 last Aug. is still in Moscow. She works in the office at the University and likes it very much. She has just completed the advanced course in first-aid and ambulance driving, and is now taking the instructor's course and mechanics. She works days and then studies eve, so her time is pretty well taken, but she says she wants to be prepared in case she is needed. Their son who was 18 in Sept. is taking the Boeing course at the Hi here, and expects to have it completed and will likely be called to go to work in one of the Seattle plants soon. Dodie and I are putting in two days a week from 10 a.m. till 4:30 p.m. at the Red Cross, working in the surgical dressing dept. and she too is taking up first aid.

Delbert and family are still living in Everett and their oldest boy Wesley 15, is nearly as tall as Delbert and wears a one-half size larger shoe than his dad, so you can see how large he is and he is a swell lad. The other two children are growing up fast too, they spent most of their vacation last summer in Alaska with Ellen's folks who live in Juneau.

Glenn and family are in Pearl Harbor, he has been stationed there at the Submarine Base for nearly 5 years, will be five in March. Irene and Marilyn went out there four years ago last Aug., and now they have a son, who will be one year old March 12. We are expecting Irene and the children home any day and every time the phone rings I expect to hear her voice calling to tell us they are in San Francisco. Glen wrote the 11th saying we would be seeing them soon, but when, of course, he did not know, as they have about an hour's notice to make the boat; some of them have had two hours, but everything is done in such secrecy on account of those d_d Japs. Irene said she was surely dreading the trip alone with the children, and how she was ever going to manage with only a suit case for herself and the two kiddies she didn't know, but that is all they are allowed. I could just read between the lines of

Glenn's letter and see how he was going to miss the family and he just adores that baby, wrote us saying "Mom, I know you will just love Gary, for he is such a cute, friendly little fellow, with a smile for everyone." Poor kids, I feel so sorry for them as they have been renting furnished ever since they have been out there till last July, when they moved into one of the new houses just been completed, and now of course they can not bring a thing only just the personal things that are necessary. Irene wrote she was ready, had her bag packed, as of course she would not have time after she gets her notice, with two children to get ready, but Marilyn who will be nine next month is a regular little helper and how she does love her baby brother. The five days I put in from the time the news came on Dec. 7 until we received Glenn's radiogram "they were safe" I shall never forget, but oh what a blessed relief when it did come to know they were O.K.

You asked about Arthur. He is pretty well, lives in the same place and batches. He was up for a few days a Xmas time.

Ed, Ida, Louis(?) and Marian were up for 10 days last summer, and we had such a grand visit with them. Spent most of the time at out beach cottage, as that was what they all wanted to do. Dode & family were up there at about the same time they were there. Dode had a couple of his friends from Helena, Mont. visiting so we surely had a house full, but they all seemed to enjoy it, and every eve. would build a big bonfire and sit around it and visit, & the young folks would play and sing too, and some times they would go in for a swim before going to bed.

Joe and I went down to the Golden Gate Exposition and visited Ed and Ida; the first time Joe had ever gone to Calif. We had such a nice trip and enjoyed every minute.

Well, I just looked at this letter & I guess you will laugh as I see there is no salutation whatever, but when I started in, it was only to write what I had of the Miller history & then was going to write a separate letter, but some how have just kept right on, so guess it will have to go as is now.

Do you hear from Louella or Geraldine? We had a nice letter from Luella at Xmas time, but have not heard from Geraldine for a long time, guess she is kept pretty busy with her music, helping her hubby and looking after their boy.

Well Georgia, I hope you will have good luck with the family genealogy, and will you please send us what ever data you have or may get about either side of the family, as we will certainly appreciate it very much.

MEMOIRS by Georgiana Melvina nee Miller, written to Stella Ward

My father, Louis Marc Miller was a man six feet tall, with broad shoulders, fair complexion, blue eyes, brown hair and a very amiable disposition. I don't ever remember of his being angry. He looked a great deal like Abraham Lincoln. He wore a beard in the same fashion and long tailed coat at that time. He was a man that observed and learned, educating himself as he lived. He was a brilliant scholar, self made and well read. His philosophy was self-improvement by confidence in whatever he undertook. His honesty and his word were as good as gold. I don't believe he had an enemy.

During the Civil War he tried to enlist but was rejected on account of kidney trouble (Bright's Disease it was called). When his brother Joe enlisted then deserted, father had to see Pres. Lincoln to get him off, as he was not of age.

When he came West he brought mother and the two children as far as Minneapolis, and left them with an Uncle and Aunt. My mother told once that while she and Aunt Amanda were picking wild berries, a rattler got mixed up in Aunties hoop skirts, so she shed them in a hurry.

My mother Marie Olivine was short, 5 ft. 2 in., and stout. She had brown eyes, brown hair, a very fine complexion always with the rosiest cheeks, but her disposition wasn't so good. She was a hard worker and had been all of her life. She was hired out at 12 years. She worked and went to school. She received 8.00 a year, clothes and board. When she was grown she worked as a stewardess on a boat between Three Rivers and Quebec. She never had a sick day to speak of until two years before she died. She had cancer of the stomach, but pneumonia set in when she died.

Of the place where I was born I have a faint recollection of a big log house with four or five rooms. When I was born I had two tiny front teeth. When they fell out, my mother put them away in a shell covered box on a shelf over her bed. I remember trying to get them one day. The farm buildings were in a grove where the Red River formed a point. This grove had all kinds of wild plums, raspberries and grapes. The Indians used to come and camp in the point to pick, and also to trade with the folks. The mail was relayed by dog train to Winnipeg. It was called Miller's Station. I could speak French and Indian before I learned English.

When I was eight, we moved to Fargo. My first school was the High School Bldg.: Grammar grades on the first floor, High on the second. I skipped the 2nd and 4th grades. I was transferred to the North-Side School for the 7th and 8th grades, then finished at High. I missed only 2 days of school in 8 years. I later took a course at the Dak. Business College, where I met your Dad.

I went to Waterville, Wash. to keep books for my brother-in-law Charles Carpenter. I stayed there two years, then came back and married your Dad. We lived with my folks as father was now down with Dropsy and bed fast for ten years. He had prostrate gland trouble which had overtaken him in Florida the last year he was able to go there. In that same year my brother took typhoid fever. He lingered until father got back, then died. The next year my sister Mary took it too, and between she and father, mother had her hands full. I was clerking to support the family. She died, the flood came and we had to take father out in a boat to the Hotel. The next year we were married. Your Dad never took one of us out without the other, my sister and I.

Then we moved to Mandan, next to Glendive, and the rest you know.

FREDERICK CLEVELAND YARBROUGH AND DENA MCMICHAEL

VI.12 FREDERICK CLEVELAND YARBROUGH was the 12th child of Crockett Davis Yarbrough and Jamima Ann Hill. He was born August 6, 1882 on the Hill Ranch near Hacienda Crossing on Russian River, and died on January 22, 1955 in Essex, Montana. He is buried in Whitefish, Montana. About 1904 he married the mother of his children:

VI.7 ALBADENE McMICHAEL (Dena) a daughter of Absolem Bayelil and Louisa Cleminza Anderson McMichael. She was born on September 2, 1882 "on the trail" in Arkansas. She died on January 9, 1919, in Richmond, California. She is buried in the Healdsburg, California Cemetery.

After Dena's death Frederick Cleveland Yarbrough may have married a red haired English woman, but about 1924 he married Georgeana Malvina Miller Hudson, the daughter of Louis Marc Miller and Marie Olivine Remillard.

Fred Yarbrough was the only child of Crockett and Jamima Yarbrough who begat sons to carry on the Yarbrough name. He was still living with his mother on the Hill/Yarbrough Ranch at the time of the 1900 census. He had attended Lafayette School on the West River Road, and went to high school in Healdsburg. He met Abbadene McMichael at Lafayette School, the grammar school on Westside Road, and they were married some time between the 1900 census and the birth of their first son, Forrest Lloyd, in May of 1906. At the age of 21, Fred is reported in the Healdsburg Enterprise of September 19, 1903 as purchasing a restaurant:

"Fred Yarbrough has purchased the Louvre Restaurant and is now in possession. Mr. Yarbrough is an energetic, wide awake young man, and under his management the Louvre will be conducted in a first class manner."

It is supposed that Fred obtained the money to make this purchase from his mother when she sold the ranch. His first son was probably born at their home just north of Cloverdale. By the 1910 census Fred and Dena are gone from the Northern Sonoma County area, and were probably in Richmond, CA. No record or remembrance of the disposal of the Louvre restaurant episode has been found.

Floyd Caughey reported that Fred and Ben Porter went to Richmond to work for Standard Oil Company of California. By the 1910 census the Howard family had also left the area, leaving only Claude Howard living in a rooming house in Healdsburg. Freda Howard Shane reported that Fred Yarbrough's family lived next door to the Howards in Richmond. There is a picture of some members of the clan as volunteer firemen manning a fire engine in a parade in Richmond, where Fred may have been involved with the steam equipment. There is a story that he purchased some of the property which now contains oil refineries. He bought it for a few dollars per acre and sold it for 25 dollars per acrebefore the oil companies became interested.

Two more sons were born in Richmond, Jean Frederick in 1913 and Edwin Lee in 1917. They lived near the Howards as Freda Shane has told me. In 1919 Abbadene died. She had been suffering from influenza and was apparently recovering. However she was asthmatic, and had a congenital heart defect according to tradition, so her weakened heart gave up. Her son, Jean Porter, was quite young at the time, but remembered his father and older brother Lloyd crying together on a couch in the darkened living room for hours. Alvin Caughey remembered his mother Rena, Dena's twin, having to go to a neighbor's house to

receive bad news. Rena was afraid that it would be Dena, so she took Alvin with her for support.

After Dena died, Fred left Jean with Ben and Betty Porter, who subsequently adopted him, and sent Edwin to stay with his sister Ethyl and her husband Rice McMichael. He kept Lloyd with him at first. He married a red haired English woman for a short time, and Lloyd had such problems with her that he returned to the Russian River area. During the mid-twenties Fred was employed as a steam engineer at various canneries, a skill he learned working for the Standard Oil Company at point Richmond. He was married to Georgeana Hudson during that time. He was working in Monterey on Cannery Row in 1924, living with his Uncle and Aunt, Newton and Molly Yarbrough according to Bonnie Yarbrough and Ed Yarbrough. There is a picture of him and Georgeana at the Cliff House in San Francisco in 1926.

There was a story that he spent some time as a marine engineer in the merchant marine, which could have been in that period of time. His son Edwin reports that Fred got his steam experience working for the Standard of California refineries at Point Richmond, and that the story about the merchant marine probably comes in from the work he did as a steam engineer on a junk river boat that was loaded with lumber and sold to Japan about 1927. He worked that trip, and returned on a passenger trip.

He divorced Georgiana in Seattle around 1927 and went to Oilmont, Montana to run a garage for the wife of a man he had met in Seattle. After about a year he became lonesome and sent for Georgiana, and they were again married. He told his son Edwin that they had been married twice, but Ed is not sure of the details.

Ed Yarbrough told me that they went to Montana in 1928 after being in Seattle. In Ferdig, Montana, Fred became a supervisor for a string of oil wells, and he was apparently still running them in 1946, when I first visited them at an "oil lease" near Sunburst. When I visited them again in 1949, they had gone into business with Georgeana's son Ted (Charles E. Frederick Hudson) and his wife Hazel, purchasing a resort including a general store, a bar, a dozen cabins and camping facilities. This was near Essex, Montana, on the southern edge of Glacier National Park near the continental divide in the Rocky Mountains.

Georgeana died in 1954, and Fred followed her within a year, dying in his sleep at Essex on January 22, 1955, at the age of 72. They are both buried in Whitefish, Montana.

He worked at that business in several establishments, owning funeral homes in both Santa Rosa (Porter and Egan) and San Francisco where he had a funeral home across the street from the Southern Pacific Hospital. VII.3 Edwin Lee Yarbrough b. Jan 28, 1917 Richmond Ca., m. Elizabeth May (Betty) Drought, daughter of Walter and Mary Montgomery Drought, in Montana.

Edwin was two years old when his mother died, and he went to live with Rice and Ethyl (Yarbrough) McMichael on their ranch 5 miles south of Cloverdale, Ca. He stayed with them until he was about 8 yrs. old, when his older brother, Lloyd, came from Monterey to bring him to visit his father for two weeks, His father kept him for a year, and then took him to visit his other brother, Jean, at their Uncle Ben and Betty (McMichael) Porter's, but forgot to come back and get him. He stayed there for about 4 years (he would have been about 13) when he had to return to Rice and Ethyl's because of Aunt Betty's bad health. He stayed there for a few months when his father suddenly remembered where he was, and took him to Ferdig, Montana, where Fred was superintendent for an oil company. Fred had come to Montana in 1928 from Seattle. When Ed was 17 and living alone tending oil wells near Kevin, Montana, he met and married Betty.

In the late 1930's Ed an Betty and the older children lived next door to His brother Lloyd in Santa Rosa for about a year. He worked for L.C. Smith Furniture at this time. They then returned to Montana where they lived in Cutbank as they had before going to California.

In the late 1940's Ed, Betty and the four children were living in the Texaco "camp", a company town when Ed was a foreman for the Texaco oil fields to the east of Sunburst Montana. Later Ed worked for Colorado Fuel and Iron in the wire rope division. He retired from that job and he and Betty were living in Jefferson Colo. in 1982, and near Salida, Colorado in 1993. Their children are married and spread along the Rocky mountain states except Dena who is in Washington state.

THE McMICHAEL FAMILY

In the wake of the War Between the States, many Southerners joined the western migration. Absolem McMichael had been with Lee at the Appomatix Court House at the end of the war. During the war, the northern part of Sonoma County had been sympathetic with the Confederacy, while those living around Petaluma had been Union adherents. It was reasonable that the Andersons and their son-in-law chose to move to Mark West Station between Santa Rosa and

Healdsburg shortly after the war.

The McMichael family records, <u>A TREASURY OF KITH AND KIN</u>, compiled by Mrs. Leona McMichael Jacobs and Mrs. Edna McMichael are the primary source for the first two McMichael Generations. Information on the California McMichael branches is from family bibles and other records held by various members of the Caughey families.

The McMichael Clan of Scotland was an associated sept of Prince Charles Edward Stewart, known as Bonnie Prince Charlie. The Royal line of Stewarts were from the same clan as the McMichaels, but changed their name to Stewart when their ancestor became the Steward to the Royal House of Scotland. He had the good fortune to marry the queen, and thereby establish a royal family carrying that name. Upon the death of Queen Elizabeth I. of England, the United Kingdom was formed from England and Scotland with James Stewart, the son of Mary Queen of Scots, becoming King James I (of England) and VI (of Scotland).

It is family tradition that the McMichael family of that part of Bedford Co, TN which later became Coffee Co, was native to Scotland, but for some reason, probably because of political or religious difficulties, removed to Ireland, and then eventually to America where they settled in South Carolina.

South Carolina Records of land grants to Protestant Scots-Irish immigrants began about 1770, where families were given land as an inducement to leave Ireland and settle in S.C. In those records a meeting of Jan 6, 1773 records one Patrick McMichael in Craven Co. as well as a Hugh Porter and a James Porter. On the 16th of July in 1784, one Thomas Farrar is granted land in Greenville County, north of the Saluda River. In the 1800 census Rese F. Ross is in the Greenville County, SC census.

The McMichaels came to Tennessee early in the 19th century. Although there were no McMichaels in the 1812 Tax List of Bedford Co. it is possible that some of them were in the county by 1812 to 1814. The area they settled in Bedford County between Davis Mill (later Fairfield) and Noah's Fork community and post office, was settled earlier than some parts of the county.

The Ross and perhaps the Farrar families also came to Tennessee at about this time. IV. Sophronia Ross (McMichael) was born in South Carolina about 1812, and her brother IV. John F. Ross was born in Tennessee about 1822. There were young Farrar children living with John F. Ross and his family including his father III. Rice F. Ross in Coffee County in 1850.

In Goodspeed's "History of Tennessee', 1886, it was stated that "one of the first settlements in the county (meaning Coffee Co. in 1886) was made on Noah's Fork of Duck River, in the neighborhood of the site of the village of Noah, in the Third Civil District by Daniel, John and Neeley Patton, brothers, and that "the date they came is supposed to be about 1800". (In 1800 all of Middle Tennessee was in Davidson County.)

Deed Book L, pp132-33 in R.O. Bedford Co., records that on Oct 1, 1818, Margaret McMichael, a widow, was deeded 180 acres of land by Andrew Erwin of Augusta, GA. This land lay on the north side of Noah's Fork of Duck River. In 1836, this part of Bedford Co was taken into the new county of Coffee, and fell in Third Civil District of that county.

This land was part of a North Carolina Grant No. 217 to John Gray and Thomas Blount, and was surveyed Sept 1792 under Warrant 1668 for 5,000 acres on both sides of Middle Fork of Duck River. Later this land was sold to Andrew Erwin. Because of the Allison Land Deal, Margaret McMichael was assessed \$54 on her land, and Erwin and cohorts took a 3-year mortgage on her 180 acres until she paid \$18 per year in 1825, 26 and 27.

These must have been trying times for Margaret and her family. However, they were making progress. In 1830 they paid \$400 for 39 acres of land. Little

by little they increased their holdings until several decades later the total acreage is said to have reached 1,100 acres.

- III. (Patrick?) McMICHAEL was b. Cargus, N. Ireland, [Caughey Family records, however there is no Cargus or Cargil in Ireland. There is a Cargill, Tayside, Scotland (north of Perth)] m.:
- III. MARGARET McMICHAEL, born ca. 1770, possibly in Ireland. d. June 10 1846 and is buried in the McMichael Cemetery on the McMichael Farm in Coffee County Tenn.

III. Margaret McMichael, a widow, came to Tennessee ca. 1815 with seven children. In 1980 this farm was owned by her descendant Leona McMichael Jacobs and her husband Luke Jacobs (related to Luther Burbank's second wife). In 1975 the Jacobs received the Heritage Award from the State of Tennessee for owning land that had been in the same family for more than 100 years. Leona Jacobs is a great-great-grand-daughter of Margaret McMichael.

The house that Margaret's sons built for her about 1818 is still standing, however it has had many additions over its 160 year existence. It originally had one large log room, two stories high, with enclosed staircase. The large open fireplace heated the main room as well as the upper room. The cooking was done in the fireplace in the early years.

Family lore is that Margaret spent her Sunday afternoons reading and instructing her children in the Bible, and was "put out" if neighbors came to call and disturbed this Sunday routine.

The line to California is traced through:

- IV.6 WILLIAM McMICHAEL b. 1 May 1801/02 in Abbeville Dist. South Carolina, d. May 1880 in Tennessee. On 12 Dec 1838 he married:
- IV. SOPHRONIA ROSS, b. 2 Nov 1812 in South Carolina, d. between 1870 and 1880, but probably before 1875. She was a daughter of RICE FARRAR ROSS and SARAH BONHAM ROSS.

In Coffee County Minute Book p.28-1837-"...it is ordered by the Court that the following persons be appointed to a Jury to View to lay off and mark a road from Jessee Shelton's to Beech Grove......William McMichael" seven other names were included.

In 1854, when it appeared that the NC&St.L Railroad would go through Coffee County, James, Alexander and William McMichael bought stock in the new railroad.

In 1857 James McMichael, bachelor, died and was buried in the family Cemetery on the farm. Over the years the McMichael holdings had been run as a family enterprise, as McMichael Brothers, by Margaret's sons James, Alexander and William. However William maintained a separate household in the 1st District of Coffee Co as he had a very large family. It was deemed advisable to have a division of the holdings when James died.

On Nov 25, 1857 a commission of three men was appointed by the Coffee County Court to appraise and partition the McMichael holdings. The result of this division gave William McMichael 39 acres valued at \$40 per acre, 130 acres of the original tract @ 32.50 per acre, and a female slave named Frankie and her two children valued at \$1,500.

There were few families that furnished any more manpower to the Civil War than the William McMichael family, who provided 5 sons and one son-in-law. All returned home after the war.

In 1875 William McMichael (Sr.) was several years past three score and ten, and he thought it was time he made a will. Accordingly his will, dated January 15, 1875 is of record in Coffee Co., TN as follows:

STATE OF TENNESSEE COUNTY OF COFFEE) I, William McMichael (sen) for the love and affection I have for my children, R.R. Mc-Michael, A.B. McMichael, Thomas F. McMichael and Searcy McMichael and my grandchildren S. (arah) B. Johnson, Mary Jane Johnson, Susan Ida Johnson, William T. Johnson and Malinda H. Johnson, do hereby transfer and convey to them and their heirs forever the following tracts of land. They are to take possession at any time they choose, by paying me rent for the same during my natural life and paying the taxes for the same. (descriptions omitted by Wilma Vaughn Chunn)

To R.R. McMichael - 40 acres valued at \$1,050

To A.B. McMichael - Two tracts totaling 74 acres valued at \$1080

To W.R. McMichael - 55 acres valued at \$1,112

To Thos F. McMichael - 64 acres valued at \$1,020

To Searcy McMichael - 58 acres valued at \$1,061

To heirs of daughter Malinda H. Johnson, deceased, 87 acres valued at \$2,124

None of the above mentioned tracts of land are to be sold to anyone except to one of my children without my consent during my natural life.

Because Sophronia Ross McMichael was not mentioned in this will, it is assumed that she had died before 1875. The fifteen children of William and Sophronia Ross McMichael are as follows.

THE CALIFORNIA MCMICHAELS AND ALLIED FAMILIES

The Chickasaw Indians were a tribe of northern Mississippi and parts of Tennessee, and were closely related to the Choctaw. In the French and Indian War they were allied with the British, and they were friendly with the United States in the Revolutionary War. By treaties negotiated in 1832 and 1834 they removed to western Oklahoma where they formed the Chickasaw Nation and became one of the Five Civilized Tribes. In the Civil War they served in the Confederate Army, and they freed their slaves at the end of the war. In 1906 they became citizens of the United States. [The Columbia Encyclopedia, C.F. Ansley, Columbia University Press, 1940, p348]

John. P. Anderson came to California via the Southern Route. His grand-daughter, Rena McMichael Caughey, wrote that he landed at Mark West Railroad Station in the late 1860's. He was Post Office Manager at Mark West for years, and also sold chewing tobacco and stick candy.

A.B. McMichael enlisted in the Confederate Army, 17 Nov 1862 at age 18. He served under Bragg in the battles of Murfreesboro (30 miles S.E. Nashville, Tennessee, December 31, 1862- January 2, 1863), Chickamauga (N.W. Georgia, September 19-20, 1863) and under Longstreet at the siege of Knoxville (Tennessee, November 1863). He was transferred to the Virginia Army (with Longstreet), and fought in the principal battles around Pittsburgh. He surrendered under General Lee at the Appomattox Court House in Virginia (April 9, 1865).

A.B. and L.C. McMichael first came to California in 1873, settling in Mark West with John P. Anderson. They are reported to have made several trips back to Tennessee, taking the entire family. They returned to Tennessee to settle the family estate when William McMichael died ca. 1880. It was on the return from Tennessee that the twins Rena and Dena were born in Arkansas. One night the horses escaped, and A.B. searched for them for a week before some Indians helped him catch them. They then went north and sold the horses and wagons, and took the train to California. It was probably on this trip that their oldest child, Mary, died on the trail.

With the proceeds from his father's estate, A.B. McMichael bought the Lambert Ranch, river bottom land on the Healdsburg road (West River Road) a few miles towards Healdsburg from the Lafayette School. Their children attended that school. In the Great Register of 1891 Absolem Baelil McMichael and in 1898 Absolem Bayelil McMichael is described as 5 ft 8-1/2 inches tall, light blue eyes and brown hair, born in Tennessee, a farmer, with a Forestville post office in 1892 and a Healdsburg post office in 1899.

On March 29, 1904, R. Forrest McMichael age 14, the youngest child of A.B. and L.C. McMichael, drowned while swimming in the Russian River with some friends. A sea captain had befriended Forrest and a group of his friends and had arranged a Sunday picnic at the river. His parents had company that Forrest enjoyed, and he was hesitant to go on the picnic. His father said that as he had promised to go on the picnic, he should go. Forrest reluctantly joined the picnic. After lunch and home-made ice cream, all went swimming. Forrest could swim very well, and had often been in the river. Whether he was seized with cramps or caught in an undertow, no one knows. His father was heavy with grief, blaming himself for insisting that Forrest go. The family was land poor at that time, and the money to pay for the headstone was obtained by selling the sheep that Forrest had been raising.

By the 1910 census, A.B. and L.C. McMichael are in Cloverdale as are three of their married children. Rice Franklin McMichael has married Ethel P. Yarbrough, and their two daughters Lois and Ann have been born there. Two daughters married Caughey brothers. The twin Rena married William Caughey and has sons William Wesley and Alvin. Eula P. McMichael has married Alexander Caughey, but the census is a month too early to record their son Floyd.

The sons of A.B. and L.C. McMichael were singularly unsuccessful in producing sons, and so the McMichael name has died with them. The daughters have been more prolific, and the names which carry on are Caughey, Porter, Warner and Yarbrough, families among the early Russian River settlers.

The McMichaels married people they grew up with. John married Cashia Covey daughter of settlers at Hacienda Crossing near the old Hill Ranch. Dena, the other twin, married Frederick Yarbrough, who had grown up a few miles down the road from the McMichaels on the Yarbrough Ranch (originally the Isaacs homestead). Sophronia Elizabeth married Benjamin McKinley Porter, son of Thomas A.D. Porter and nephew of Hugh Porter, early settlers of the part of

Mendocino County that later became Mendocino Township in Sonoma County, i.e. the Westside Road. Hugh Porter was described in a History of Sonoma County (George K. Porter p. 413): Hugh Porter came to California in 1846, making the long overland trip by ox teams, and shortly after his arrival here he enlisted in the California Volunteers, with which he took an active part in the Mexican War. Later he turned his attention to mining, which vocation he followed for a few years, and then, about 1850, came to Sonoma County and took up 160 acres of land on the Russian River, nine miles west of Healdsburg, where he lived for nearly half a century, his death occurring there in 1897. The Porter ranch was just up the road from the McMichael's ranch, and is now part of the Twin Valleys Ranch of Fred McMurray.

An article in the Healdsburg Tribune on 21 March 1918 tells of the death of A.B. McMichael, aged 73 yrs, 6 mos and 15 days) at the home of his son in Healdsburg. He had stayed with this son in order to receive better medical attention. The article states that he had been living near Cloverdale for a few years, and had been a resident of Sonoma County for 35 years (since about 1883). He was buried in the Healdsburg Cemetery from the Healdsburg Methodist Church of the South. There is no mention of influenza, although it was rampant at that time.

The middle name of Absolem B. McMichael is not certain. Tennessee records have him as Absolem Bezilla, and the voter registrations have him as Absolem Baelil, 45 yrs in 1891 and Absolem Beyelil, age 51 in 1898. On an old picture he is called Zillia.

The Biblical Absalom, son of King David, lead Israel against his father. Before the final battle he lead the nation (tribe) into the land of Gilead: 2 Samuel:17 and 18: David met with a number of other tribes, and one name was Barzillai the Gileanite from Rogelim. After Absalom was slain in battle and David mourned him, David was guided back across the Jordan by Barzillai, who was a man of 80 years at that time.

Then it appears that our Absolem was named for these David's son and David's guide: Absalom and Barzillai. It would be interesting to see the spellings used in the old Bible that Margaret McMichael read to her children, which of course included William, A.B. McMichael's father. So the name is probably supposed to be Absalom Barzillai McMichael, which accounts for the Zillia on the photograph.

Louisa Cleminza Anderson McMichael died on 16 Jan 1930 in Santa Rosa. She was living in a small house behind Floyd and Ethyl Caughey at that time. She is buried next to her husband in Healdsburg Cemetery, and the only way to find the site is to locate the headstones for their children Dena Yarbrough and Forrest McMichael, who are buried in the same plot. Her grandson, Alvin Caughey, remembered her as one who was always helping others: helping with births and tending the sick.

Descendants of Absolem B and Louisa C. McMichael are in the appendix.

THE CAUGHEY BROTHERS

Two brothers from Canada, William and Alexander Caughey, arrived at Bodega in the early 1870's, and worked in the lumbering industry.

The older Caughey brother was V.1 William Caughey who was born in 1839, died Dec. 2, 1902, at age 63 and is buried in the Bloomfield cemetery. He may have had only one child: VI.1 Joseph Caughey (b. 1876) who was working in a Lumber camp in Salt Point in 1910, and he had married and divorced Kate Clasby, and they had one child, IX.1 Arthur Caughey. Kate later remarried into a San Rafael family, and operated a funeral home for years. Arthur was killed in

a hunting accident in Mexico. Joe delivered mail around the Guerneville area on horseback, and was otherwise known to sit on a captain's chair with a glass in his hand and chewing tobacco, outside of a bar in Guerneville, after he'd finished his rounds. This was in the late 1920's and early 1930's.

The younger Caughey, V.2 Alexander, was born in Canada 21 Nov 1846 and died 9 Sept 1911 and is buried in the Cloverdale Cemetery. He was naturalized as a citizen of the United States in 1881 in Sonoma County. His wife was V. Ann Thompson Caughey, and they had eight children. Among these are the ancestors of today's Caugheys of Sonoma County.

An article in the Canadian newspaper Witness, about 1880:

Mr. and Mrs. William Thompson

Who can beat this? - There live in the village of Kemptville, two old persons, William Thompson and his wife, both of whom have had an eventful history. Shortly after his marriage in Dumfries, Scotland, he came to this country, arriving in South Gower in the year 1817. Three years after his wife followed him. There were born to them eleven daughters and one son. He is now 86 and his wife 84 years of age. They have 89 grandchildren, 52 great grandchildren and one great-great-grand child. We have never heard before of parents still living, one of whose grandchildren is a grandfather. Nor is it every immigrant couple that gives to Canada a hundred and fifty born Canadians in half a century. The old gentleman is perfectly blind, but his judgment and memory are as vigorous as they ever were. In his younger days he has been a laborious student of the Bible, while the doctrines he holds are well supported with scriptural passages, all of which he will quote as accurately as if they were read from the printed page. His wife has more muscle and pluck than many of our young girls at twenty. She will set out on a visit to her son, walking all the way, though the distance is fourteen miles. The old folks have been getting the Witness for sixteen years.

A note at the bottom of the page says: Your father's Great Grandfather. This article was in Witness Newspaper about 1880.

Ann Thompson would have been either a daughter of this couple, or else the daughter of their only son who lived fourteen miles away in about 1880. Kemptville is in Ontario, Canada, twenty eight miles due south of the capital, Ottowa. North Gower is eight miles north of Kemptville, but there is no South Gower on a current map of Ontario. Kemptville may have been named South Gower earlier. The interested Caughey researcher has a place to begin researching the Thompson line here.

SOME EARLY WILLIAM YARB(O)ROUGHS

Raymond Benjamin Yarbrough, 3 April 1993

It has been reasonably well established that the William Yarb(o)rough who appears in the Greenville Co SC censuses of 1800 and 1810 is the same man as the one in the 1850 census of Gibson Co TN., who is the father of Wade Hampton Yarbrough. This William Yarbrough will be called Wm of Greenville in this study. In 1803 he sold property in Greeneville County, SC, and his wife released her dower, and is identified as Patty. At that time, the names Patty and Patsy were used exclusively as nicknames for Martha. Family records show William and Martha were the parents of Wade Hampton Yarbrough. However, in the early 1800's there were two North Carolina William Yarbroughs whose wives were named Martha, and who were called either Patty or Patsey. One William, of Anson County, appears to be the son of Jonathan Yarbrough, son of Ambrose, and is almost certainly not Wm of Greeneville; the other, of Warren County, is apparently the son of another William Yarbrough, and some researchers believe he is Wm of Greeneville. In addition, there are other contemporary William Yarbroughs, one of whom may have been a son of Manoah Yarbrough, but none could be Wm of Greeneville. Another possibility is one who was in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina, prior to 1800, and is thought to be a son of Joshua of that County. Each of these possibilities are investigated below.

WILLIAM YARBROUGHS OF WARREN COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA

The William Yarbrough of Warren County, NC, who some think is Wm. of Greenville is a son of a William Yarbrough whose Warren County, North Carolina, Will (Will Book 7, page 5) has been printed in the Yarborough Family Magazine, v3, No 2, p14. The will names minor children William, Joel, Rebecca and Hulda Yarbrough, adult children Samuel and Rhoda Yarbrough and grandchildren Edmond Harper and Nancy Persons.

Warren County NC Marriage Records have the following entries of interest here: Elizabeth Yarbrough m. Peterson Person 1 Jan 1789, Martha Yarbrough m. William Harper (no date), Huldy Yarbrough m. Joel Randolph 21 Dec 1802, Joel Yarbrough m. Sally Sledge 12 June 1803, Rebecca Yarbrough m. Williamson Harper 10 Feb 1830.

The following is from pages sent by Ophelia Kessler entitled Randle-Randolph of Surry and Sussex. This is from Historical Southern Families, V5, 1958, by Wm. B. Boddin, page 58 and following. This is in Luneburg County, Virginia, and is thought to be the line of this William Yarbrough:

Peter Randall married Mary, daughter of John Mitchell (d. 1755). Peter Randall died in 1741, and his widow married William Yarborough in 1746. William Yarborough was guardian for George Randall, orphan of Peter Randall.

The knowm children of William and Mary Yarborough were:

- 1. Mary Yarborough, baptized in 1746.
- 2. Samuel Yarborough who married a Mary, and they had a daughter Mary who was baptized in 1773.

3. William Yarborough, who married Hannah, daughter of John Mitchell (d. 1770). They had a son William Yarborough baptized March 15, 1775 with sponsors Chamberlain Jones, Susannah Jones and Seymore Robinson. They also had a daughter Rhoda baptized 18 Sept 1773 and another daughter Martha baptized in 1768.

Evidently, Rhoda was over 21 at the date of the will, 25 July 1793, but she was baptized on 18 September 1773, less than 20 years before. Then it is entirely possible that William was over one year old when he was baptized on 15 March 1775. (William Yarbrough of Greenville SC was born on 5 January 1774). Wm II of Warren was over 21 by 29 Nov 1797 when the guardianship papers were processed for Hulda, Joel and Rebecca Yarbrough, minors.

From Halifax Co NC Wills and Estates, by Margaret Hoffman, Will # 656, pg 370 on 17 Oct 1800 - Feb Court 1802 James Conner Will, Witness: William Yerby (x his mark), Rebecca Harwell, Sarah Harwell. Yarborough Family Magazine, vol 3, #6, p47 abstracts this will shows Friends Sterling Harwell and John Berry are made Executors. In addition it identifies Patsey Yarborough as one of five daughters of James Connor. Another will abstracted on page 46 of this Yarborough Family Magazine issue is from 1812 and is the will of Elizabeth Connor, names other divisees including the son of Elizabeth's sister Martha Carter, John Yarbrough.

It appears that by 1802 Martha (Patsey) Connor had married William Yarbrough. She subsequently had a son named John Yarbrough and later remarried a Carter. A William Yarborough died in 1803 leaving widow Patsy and son John C. (Will Book 12, page 65 [Yarborough Family Magazine, v3, No1, p2, Oct 1979]). Martha appears to have been the second oldest daughter of James Connor, married to a Yarborough. So it appears that the William Yerby who witnessed James Connor's will was actually Patsey's husband William Yarborough the son of William and Hannah Mitchell Yarbrough. This means that this younger William of Warren County NC died young, leaving only a son John C. Yarbrough, who was born after 1800 when James Connor made his Will.

Entries in Warren Co wills index shows Sterling Harwell was guardian to both Hulda Yarbrough and Joel Yarbrough, and witnessed a settlement from Abraham Mitchell to Jno Williams Jr. for having been guardian for his wife Rebecca Yarbrough.

Janet Yarborough Hull, a descendent of Joel, another son of Wm I of Warren, has established to the satisfaction of the DAR that Wm I of Warren was the (private) William Yarborough in Captain Binkley's Company of the 1st Regiment of North Carolina commanded by Colonel Samuel Jarvis, in the Revolutionary War (DAR #526126, 19 Nov 1966, accepted 18 Oct 1967). This action nullified a previously approved DAR application by Ida Walling (DAR #274119, 30 May 1933, approved 28 June 1933) which claimed that the father of her ancestor Sarah Yarborough Howard (Sarah is believed to be Wade Hampton Yarbrough's oldest sister) was that Private William Yarborough of Captain Binkley's Company.

This Yarborough-Mitchell line appears to be as follows: William Yarborough, son of William Yarborough and Mary Mitchell, married Hannah Mitchell, daughter of the John Mitchell who died

in 1770. The children of William Yarborough and Hannah Mitchell appear to be:

In addition, two William Yarboroughs, age 26 and up, are in the 1800 census for Warren County N.C. It is most likely that second one is Hannah Mitchell's son. Neither could be Wm. of Greenville because there is no daughter to correspond to Sarah, who was born about 1796 and would be 0-10 in 1800.

In aggregate, the circumstantial evidence is quite strong that William Yarb(o)rough of Greenville County, South Carolina, who appeared in the 1800 and 1810 censuses, is not one of these William Yarboroughs of Warren County, North Carolina.

WILLIAM YARBROUGHS OF ANSON COUNTY

In 1837, one William Yarbrough, with his wife Martha, sold Anson County property that was apparently originally granted to Jonathan Yarbrough who died in Anson County NC in 1812. Jonathan Yarbrough named only one son, William, in his Will. The 1810 census has only one Yarbrough in Anson County, Jonathan, and in his household is a male aged 16-25, i.e. born some time from 1784 to 1795, and so too young to have been Wm of Greenville who was born in 1774.

In the 1820 Anson County NC census, William and Amon Yarbrough are both shown to born between 1775 and 1794. In the 1830 census, William and Amon both are shown as being born 1780-1790. The evidence is that the William Yarbroughs listed in the 1820 and 1830 censuses are the same person. The William Yarbrough who in 1837 sold property which had been granted to Jonathan Yarbrough was almost certainly the son mentioned in Jonathan's will. It seems clear that the William and Martha (Patsy) Yarbrough who sold land on Cribbs Creek in 1824 were the same pair who sold Jonathan's property in 1837.

In Anson County on 8 Feb 1821 (Book U, page 108) in the division of the property of Darling Allen, dcd., William Yarbrough received 74-1/2 acres on the North side of Cribbs Creed, and Amon Yarbrough with wife Elizabeth also received 74-1/2 acres. On March 1, 1826, William Yarbrough and wife Martha sold that same amount of property (74 acres) on the North side of Cribbs Creed to Robert H. Allen. Martha was named in the deed, and signed her name Patsy.

Apparently Amon and William Yarbrough both married daughters of Darling Allen. Darling Allen had a son named Darling Allen Jr. who witnessed a deed where William Yarbrough sold 100 acres on

the West side of Lanes Creek to Frederick Stanton in 1838. It seems very probable that this William Yarbrough is the son of Jonathan, that Amon is his older brother or cousin, and that their wives were daughters of Darling Allen. Martha and Elizabeth Allen.

Taking all the above information together as applying to the same William Yarbrough, then he was born between 1784 and 1790, and cannot be Wm of Greenville.

There was a William Yarbrough on page 35 of the 1790 census of Anson County NC. He is a single man over 16 years of age. In the 1800 census of Anson County on page 240 there is a William Yarbrough who is 26 to 45 with a female the same age range and four children under 10. Nothing else is known of these two entries, but they appear to have been the same person, and not Wm of Greenville, who was in Greenville County, South Carolina, for the 1800 census.

It is possible that this is the William Yarbrough (1760-1835) of Abbeville SC, where his records begin about 1808, and whose wife was apparently Mary Lipford. They had sons named Moses, Littleton and William. Both he and his wife Mary are buried in the Upper Long Cane Presbyterian Church graveyard in Abbeville, SC. William was born 17 Oct 1760, d. 10 Sept 1835. Mary b. 17 July 1777, d. 3 Sept 1835. This family does not appear in Abbeville records until about 1810, and could have come from North Carolina. Circumstances appear to permit the possibility that this William could be the son of Manoah. The use of the name Littleton being a clue.

WILLIAM, SON OF MANOAH YARBROUGH

Mrs Ida Walling of McMinnville TN claimed her ancestor William Yarborough was a son of Manoah Yarbrough, and was a Revolutionary War soldier from Halifax County of Halifax District in North Carolina. Manoah was in Bute Co, NC and sold property on 6 Feb 1767. On May 1, 1770 Manoah set forth that he had been eight months in Georgia and asked to be granted land, which was granted. Possibly two of Manoah's sons, Nimrod and Littleton, stayed in Franklin Co NC, as they sold property there as late as 1797. Franklin and Warren Counties were formed from Bute Co in 1779. Halifax County is adjacent to Warren Co. Halifax District included Halifax, Franklin and Warren Counties from 1779 to 1790+.

Ida Walling applied for membership in the DAR (DAR #274119, 30 May 1933, approved 28 June 1933) based on Revolutionary War service of Private William Yarborough of Captain Binkley's Company, whom she claimed for the father of Sarah Yarborough Howard. She claimed the William Yarb(o)rough in the 1790 census of North Carolina, Halifax District, Halifax County, p 66: William Yarborough - 1 white male 16yrs & up. However, this appears to be the same person in the earlier census: North Carolina, Halifax Co., Dist 16 Census of 1784-87 [Yarborough Family Magazine, v3, No1, p5] p.1, 1-2-1786:

William Yarbrough - 1 white male 21-60 yrs. (This William Yarbrough was born prior to 1-2-1765, and so cannot be the father of Wade Hampton Yarbrough). Manoah Yarbrough may or may not be the father of this William Yarborough in the 1790 census of North Carolina, Halifax Dist, Halifax Co.

A William Yarbrough appears in the 1800 census in Halifax County: page 354: Yarborough, Wm - 1 white male 0-10 yrs, 1 white male 26-45 yrs, 1 white female 26-45 yrs (born between 1755 and 1774). This also might be the William of Abbeville SC.

Assuming these record the same William Yarb(o)rough, he was born between 1755 and 1765, and so could have been a Revolutionary War soldier. However, as events have transpired, another William Yarborough of Halifax Dist. Warren Co, NC (who married Hannah Mitchell) has been accepted by the DAR (DAR #526126, 19 Nov 1966, accepted 18 Oct 1967) as performing this service. Ida Walling's candidate has been disqualified by the DAR, no longer credited as being the (private) William Yarborough in Captain Binkley's Company of the 1st Regiment of North Carolina commanded by Colonel Samuel Jarvis, in the Revolutionary War. The DAR apparently based the decision to drop William of Halifax County on Ida Walling's date for that William's birth (1766) in her application. The DAR may have made a mistake here too, because the William from Halifax County would have been between 13 and 23 years old when Capt Binkley resigned his commission. The DAR genealogist has noted (in 1967) on Ida Walling's application (of 1933) that Capt. Binkley served in that position from 1776 to 1778, and that Ida Walling's William Yarbrough would have been only 12 years old at the end of Capt. Binkley's tour. SAR and DAR membership can no longer be based on the service of this William Yarb(o)rough of Halifax Co NC. In no event could it be based on Wm of Greenville, who was only 4 years old when Capt Binkley resigned his commission.

The facts show that Manoah Yarb(o)rough is not a strong candidate to have been the father of Wm. of Greenville. In addition, Wm. of Greenville was not a Revolutionary War soldier, and in particular, he was not that William Yarborough found in the 1790 census of Halifax Co NC as claimed by Mrs. Walling.

WILLIAM YARBROUGH OF MECKLENBURG COUNTY, N.C.

Another William Yarbrough is found in deeds for Joshua Yarbrough in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina.

In the 1790 North Carolina Census of Mecklenburg County there is only one Yarbrough, a Joshua who had three males under 16 and two additional over 16 and only one female.

According to Pauline Gray, this Joshua Yarbrough was born before 1742, because in 1758 in Granville County, North Carolina, both he and his brother Micajah were tithed. Their parents were Joshua and Sarah Yarbrough first found in Caroline County, Virginia in 1741, but who moved to Orange County, Virginia around 1746 and to Amelia County, Virginia about 1750. This senior Joshua was listed in Captain Surgar Jones's Militia Company of Granville

SOME EARLY WILLIAM YARB(O)ROUGHS

County, North Carolina, in 1754. On the 1766 tax list he named his son James, so there were at least three brothers: Joshua Jr., Micajah and James. Joshua Jr. was the Yarbrough in the 1790 Mecklenburg census. Joshua Jr. became Joshua II because he also had a son named Joshua. Joshua II was in the 1800 census of Mecklenburg County, but not in 1810. He may have gone to Chester County, South Carolina, with his son Joshua III in 1810.

In Mecklenburg County records of Joshua Yarbrough, Benjamin and Reubin Yarbrough appear in deeds as chain bearers. It is possible that these two are the additional males over age 16 in the 1790 census. In 1800 Benjamin Yarbro is 26-46, so he was over 16 in 1790.

There are six other Yarbrough families listed in the 1800 census of Mecklenburg County, North Carolina. Three additional Yarbrough names are found in county records before 1800. These nine have been further researched by Pauline Gray, and are, in approximate order of age:

- 1. Benjamin Yarbro, b. between 1755 and 1760, next to Jeptha in 1813 in Randolph County, GA. There is a Benjamin Yarborough in the Moore County, North Carolina census of 1790, with a son under 16 and one female, presumeably his wife. He apparently married a Vinson who died, leaving three children named in William Vinson's will: Vinson Yarbrough, Susannah Yarbrough and Mary Eliza Yarbrough. Benjamin married a Hartgrove in 1798. Age 30-35 in 1790. It is possible that he is a brother of Joshua, or even a nephew. I have not found a Vinson Yarbrough, but he may have been known by his middle name. He could be one of the younger Yarbrough's listed below. I don't know the date of William Vinson's death, and have not seen his will.
- 2. Edmond Yarbrough is in Mecklenburg County records from 1789 to 1823, Perry County, TN in 1830, later in Decatur County, TN. b. 1760-70, wife Sophie Goswick, Children Aquilla, Henry, James, William, Nancy, Joseph and John H. Equllo and J. Yarboro of the 1840 census of Perry County, TN are born between 1780 and 1790.
- 3. Reuben Yarbrough witness for land sale from Joshua Y to Thomas Vinson 1788 in Mecklenburg County, NC. There is evidence that he is a son of Joshua, In 1820 he is in Maury County, TN, then to Bedford County, TN. b. ca 1767. Married before 1790. Age about 23 in 1790.
- 4. Shadrack Yarbrough is not in the 1800 Mecklenburg census. He is on the 1799 tax list for Mecklenburg County. The 1800 Franklin County, NC census has a Shadrick Yarbrough age 26-45, who is probably a nephew of Joshua II. The 1820 Mecklenburg Census has two Shedrick Yarbroughs: (a)26-44 or (b)45 up. The Shedrick described by Pauline Gray died in the 1840s in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina, and was born 1770-80 according to 1840 Mecklenburg census. This must be Shedrick (b) of the 1820 census, and Shedrick (a) one of his sons who was born before 1796. Pauline thinks Shedrick might be listed with Joshua Sen. in 1800, a widower with four children. Shedrick (b) was 15-20 in 1790. A Shadrick Newton Yarbrough was in California in the 1860 census

and registered to vote in Sonoma County, CA in August 27, 1866 at age 61, born in N. Carolina. This is the earliest known instance of the use of the name Newton, which was also used widely in the descendents of William Yarbrough of Greenville County, South Carolina and White and Gibson Counties of Tennessee. Shadrick Newton Yarbrough could have been a son of the earlier Shadrick of Mecklenburg County, (b).

- 5. Jeptha Yarbrough b. ca1773 (Pauline Gray has 1763, a subtraction error) Granville County, NC, 1798 Mecklenburg County, NC, 1804 Franklin County, GA, 1813 Randolph County, GA, 1840 Chambers County, ALA., wife in is 1850 Nancy Ann. age 17 in 1790? Jeftha and Gideon are brothers. However, Jeftha Yarbrough in the 1800 census is listed as 16-26.
- 6. Pauline Gray wrote that a William Yarbrough witnessed two deeds for Joshua Yarbrough II, one where he sold to Reuben Yarbrough (6 Sept 1797) and one where he sold to Thomas Vinson (10 Mar 1798). Pauline did not include William Yarbrough on the 1799 tax list of Mecklenburg County. William Yarbrough is not in the 1800 Mecklenburg Census. Pauline mistakenly included a William Yarbrough that census on page 360 of her book Devin-Howell. The Charles, John and William Yarbroughs she lists are actually in the Montgomery County Census, which precedes the Mecklenburg census instead of following it as the microfilm title page says. Marineal Yarborough Nicholaus makes the same mistake on page 17 of her book Yarborough and Related Families. If the William Yarbrough who witnessed these deeds for Joshua is the William Yarbrough of Greenville County, South Carolina, and of White and Gibson Counties Tennessee, he was born on 4 January 1774 and was 16 in 1790.
- 7. Shem Yarbrough not in 1800 Mecklenburg census, b. ca1775, witness 1798 for Joshua, Sr. See page 363 of Pauline's book) about 15 in 1790. Probably is not the male listed as 16-26 in 1800 Mecklenburg County, TN census of Joshua Yarborough Sen. Age about 15 in 1790. Probably Shema Yarborough in 1850 census of Washington County, TN aged 75.
- 8. Joshua Yarbrough III, Mecklenburg 1797, 16-26 in 1800, Chester County, South Carolina 1811 wife Elizabeth, Fayette County, GA 1824-5, d. 1844 Campbell County, GA, wife Nancy.
 Age 6-16 1790
- 9. Gideon Yarbrough b. ca1780 NC wife & son in 1800, m.(2) Nancy Scarborough 20 Sept 1810 Burke County, GA, brother of Jeptha. Age 10 in 1790.

In the 1800 North Carolina Census Micajah Yarbrough is in Franklin County next to Micajah Jr. He has with him one male 16-26 and two 26-45. In the same county is Shadrick Yarbrough who is 26-45 with a woman of the same age range and 3 children under age 10. Other Yarbrough families in Franklin County at that time are headed by Thomas, James, Nathaniel and Charles. Charles is over 45 and the other three are 26-45.

As mentioned above, Marineal Yarborough Nicholaus and Pauline Gray have both listed three Yarb(o)roughs who were actually in Montgomery County with the Yarbroughs of Mecklenburg County for the 1800 North Carolina census. This is an easy mistake to make, as the title of the microfilm has Mecklenburg County first, but Montgomery County actually is first on the film. The three that are mistaken are: on page 465: John Yarborough 1 male and 1 female 26-45, and Charles Yarborough with one male and one female 26-45, and on page 488: William Yarbrough with one male and one female 26-45, one male 16-26, one female 10-16, and 3 males and one female under 10. These are all in Montgomery County as indicated in the Census Index. The 1790 census of Montgomery County has only John Yarborough, 2 males over 16, 2 males under 16 and 4 females. These found in the 1800 Montgomery County census can readily be read as the same who were there in the 1790 census, with John the patriarch of the family, and William either his brother or son, and Charles and one other as sons. It is unlikely this William could be the William Yarbrough who witnessed deeds for Joshua Yarbrough in Mecklenburg County in 1797 and 1798, and it is impossible that he be William Yarbrough of Greenville County, South Carolina.

ANALYSIS (and speculation)

It seems likely that Joshua III and Gidean were in the Joshua Yarbrough household in 1790, and were two males of the males under 16. While the obvious reason that the other Yarbroughs did not show up on the 1790 census is that parts of it have been lost, and also that many people were not enumerated. Benjamin may have been in Moore County, or was possibly with the Vinson family in 1790, because he apparently had children by then. Reubin was married and had known children before 1790, and Edmond had two or three children before 1790, so probably neither is not listed with Joshua II in the 1790 census. This leaves the possibilities of Shadrick, William, Jeptha and Shem as the two who were over 16 and one who was under 16 in Joshua Yarbrough's household in 1790. The 1790 census was scheduled to begin on 1 Aug 1790 and be completed within 9 months. Apparently North Carolina complied with this schedule.

If this William is my William of Greenville County, South Carolina, then he was over 16 by August of 1790, and became 17 in January of 1791; However he is listed as 16-26 in the 1800 census of Greenville County, South Carolina. Shem seems to have been born about 1775, so could have passed 16 during the time the census was taken. Jeptha was listed as 16-26 in the 1800 census, which indicates that he might have been less than 16 in 1790, but that doesn't seem realistic, as he is supposed to be 78 in 1850. Shadrick seems to have been in the household of Joshua II in 1800 with two boys under 10 and he 16-26, which if true, would make him born between 1774 and 1776.

Then the five males in Joshua Yarbrough's house could have been William and/or Jeptha and/or Shedrick and/or Shem over 16, and Joshua III, Gideon and Shedrick or Shem under 16. It looks like three of them were Shem, Joshua II and Gideon. The other two being William, Shedrick or Jeptha, with a possibility that She-

drick was the same one who is in the 1800 census in Franklin County, leaving William and Jeptha as the most likely.

William Yarbrough of Greenville County, South Carolina, bought 50 acres from Benjamin West on 23 December of 1797 and recorded on June 28, 1798. This West is undoubtedly the Benjamin West who is next to Joshua Yarbrough in the 1790 census: In 1795 Benjamin West of Mecklenburg County, NC bought 190 acres in Greenville County, South Carolina. West sold Yarbrough his 50 acres from that 190 acres.

It appears that William Yarbrough and Benjamin West may have come more or less together from Mecklenburg County, possibly with Ezekial Vinson who also appears in the 1800 Greenville census. It is about 100 miles as the crow flies from the part of Greenville where William Yarbrough lived and the part of Mecklenburg county (now Union County) that Joshua Yarbrough lived. This might be a week of travel in the best conditions, so it is possible that William of Greenville made several trips back to Mecklenburg County. I imagine that Joshua's wife died about this time, as she is missing from the 1800 census. On these trips he may have taken various belongings to his new home, using an oxcart or team to do the haulage; his grandchildren who went west were known as great teamsters. If William of Greenville is the William of Mecklenburg, then the chronology must be something like the following:

 Around 1794 Benjamin West moves to Greenville County, South Carolina, possibly accompanied by William Yarbrough and Ezekial Vinson. In 1795 West buys 190 acres in Greenville County, South Carolina.

2. In the summer of 1797 William Yarbrough returns to Mecklenburg County to talk Joshua, his father, into advancing him money to buy some property in South Carolina. Joshua sells land to Reuben Yarbrough (6 Sept 1797) with William Yarbrough as witness. Joshua advances William the money.

3. William Yarbrough buys 50 acres in Greenville County, South Carolina, from Benjamin West on 23 Dec 1797 (recorded on June 28, 1798).

4. William's mother is dying and William comes to see her. While he is there, Joshua sells land to Thomas Vinson (10 Mar 1798) and William witnesses the transaction.

At the present state of research, it appears that William Yarbrough of Greenville County, South Carolina, and of White and Gibson Counties of Tennessee could well be a son of Joshua Yarbrough of the 1790 Census of Mecklenburg County, North Carolina. It is also possible that William is the son of Benjamin, possibly either William Vinson Yarbrough or Vinson William Yarbrough? Benjamin's wife nee Vinson died before 1798. Benjamin could have been no older than 19 when William was born, and if Benjamin is in the Moore Couty, NC in 1790, he had only one son, which means the daughters were born after 1790, ane would be more than 16 years younger than their brother, which makes it unlikely that Benjamin could be William's father.

If Joshua is William's father, then William is also the grandson of Joshua and Sarah Yarbrough who were last found in Granville County, North Carolina.

There is more to be learned of this William Yarbrough.

Thank you so much for the information you've sent me. It is extremely interesting, and has rekindled my enthusiasm for research.

I must have led you astray on several items which you have included, particularly on Crockett Yarbrough and his family.

The first is Crockett's other name. It is Davis (not David) on two voter registrations. It is Crockett David on his Marriage certificate, David C. on the 1860 census, Crockett D. on the 1870 census, and C.D. on the 1880 census. The marriage certificate was written by the Justice of the Peace (probably some time after the ceremony) and the census information was written by census takers, but the voter registration was by him. In addition, he named one of his sons George Davis Yarbrough. I am now convinced that his name is Crockett Davis Yarbrough.

By the way, if the W.H. Yarbrough of the 1850 Lawrence Co MO census, the Hale H. Yarbrough of the 29 September 1854 Johnson Co MO land record, the Yade H. Yarbrough of the 1860 Johnson Co MO and the W.H. Yarbrough of the 1880 Cowley Co KS census are actually all the same person (whose first name is probably Wade), and is also the Hampton Yarbrough of p3 of the 1840 White Co TN ensus (Mistakenly Yorborough in the census index - clearly arbrough in the census), and this is the son of William Yarbrough who married Rachel Shelby ca. 1792, then several of that Hampton's siblings (including William Jr.) married into the Davis family (the 1840 White Co TN census includes a George Davis in White Co) and Hampton's next door neighbor was Jonathin Davis, so Hampton's wife may also have been a Davis, so that Crockett Davis Yarbrough could be named for that family. (Not entirely for David Crockett who was quite famous in 1831 when Crockett D. Yarbrough was born.) To further the conjecture, George Davis (in White Co TN in 1840 age 40-50) could have been Crockett's uncle or grandfather. If George Davis was a favorite uncle, then his maternal grandfather could be Augustus Davis who is living with William Y. Jr. in the 1860 Hardeman Co TN census.

The second is a correction: I would point out a mistake on the record of Abiga Howard. Abiga Howard came from Memphis TN to Floral KS with his wife Ann IRWIN dtr of Mark West Irwin and Elizabeth Ann Noonkasser Irwin. It Was Abiga and Ann Howard's son, William Henry Howard who married Crockett Yarbrough's daughter, Virginia Josephine Yarbrough on 15 January 1890.

I would like to ask you some questions about the information which you sent.

uestion: How is the Benjamin Yarbrough who married
Hartgrove on 4 Oct 1797 in Mecklenburg Co NC related
to William Yarbrough who married Rachel Shelby about

1792. Your listing shows Benjamin as a son of William and Rachel. This seems quite unlikely.

comment: It seems more likely that Benjamin and William are brothers. The name Benjamin (one of the 12 sons of Israel) fits well with the other biblically named Yarbroughs of Mecklinburg Co. Note that on page 346 of the 1840 census of Mecklinburg Co NC the following Yarboroughs appear: 2 Jepthas, an Ezekial, a Shadrick a Shem and a William. There are no other Y's in that county in 1840. By the way, modern bible spelling of Jeptha is Jephthah. The William listed has a male over 90 years old, who is probably the patriarch of the family. William is the only nonbiblical name in the bunch.

Question: What is the basis for including William in the list of children of Manoah, which appear to come from the 1804 will of Elizabeth Yarborough. (YFM vol 3 p 60). Can you provide additional references? i.e. What does Willie Pearl Rhodes of Patterson-Rte 2 Box 7 Kinston, Ala 36653 have? What do NC marriage records show? and what do the Nelle Morris Jenkins Quarterlies show?

comment: Unless there is some very strong evidence to this connection of William (m. Rachel Shelby), I would be inclined to think William to be more directly related to the biblically named Mecklinburg Y's. There doesn't seem to be any reasearchers interested in them. By the way, one of William and Rachel's sons has his name spelled Jephtha in the 1840 Hardeman Co TN census.

Question: What is the basis for setting William Yarbrough (who m. Rachel Shelby) as b. 1766? That would make him 64 in the 1830 census, and the William Y in White Co is listed as between 50 and 60. Similarly his wife (probably) is between 40 and 50. Rachel Shelby (if b. in 1776) would be 54 at that time. What were their ages in the 1850 census, and where were they in 1850? She died in 1855 in Toone TN and he in 1859 there. What is the basis for this information?

Again I want to thank you for all your help. Without it I would not have found the Missouri records of W.H. Yarbrough, nor have known of the possible links to William and Rachel (Shelby) Yarbrough.

Dear Ophelia,

Thank you for the Nelle Morse Jenkins Quarterlies. I have mailed them back to you, so you should have received them by now. I found that several pages were missing. Those are:

Volume 1. pages 34, 67, 70, 71 and 90.

Volume 2. pages 69 and 70.

Volume 3. page 24.

In addition, page 94 of Volume 2. was missing, but you had sent me a copy of it, so I made a copy of that, and put it back in your book.

You said you could send the Yarborough Family Magazine if I didn't have it. I have all copies from Vol. I, number 5 (April 1967). I would certainly like to have Vol. I. numbers 1 through 4, if you could send them to me to copy.

I am sending you a check for \$25 to reimburse you for some of the expenses you have incurred by copying and sending me information. I really appreciate all you have done for me.

You also mentioned a book by Pauline Gray of Kingston OK that has about 50 pages of Yarbroughs. Has it anything to do with the White Co. TN Yarbroughs? If so I would like to learn where I could purchase a copy.

Since I last wrote to you I have obtained a great deal of information from sources in Missouri and Kansas. Since you were interested in the marriage record of Crockett D. Y. and Jemima A. Hill, I have also included the others that I obtained from MO: Johnathan Freeman and Melissa Yarbrough (Mary) 1852 in Lawrence Co MO; Felix G. (Grundy) Yarbrough and Mary E. Saunders in Johnson Co MO in 1859; and Stephen J. (Judd) Holloway and Sarah (Samantha) Yarbrough in Johnson Co MO in 1865.

I have copies of land record from both counties, and it is quite clear that W.H. Yarbrough is Wade H. Hampton, and his wife is Mary M. The had property in Mt. Vernon in Lawrence Co MO from 1847 to 1852, and had property near Colombia in Johnson Co from 1854 to 1863, and then were in Warrensburg until going to Kansas.

I received a Biographical Sketch of A.J. Yarbrough (Andrew Jackson Y.) from Cowley Co KS, in which he identified his mother as Mary Davis, who was born near Sparta (White Co TN), and he claimed his father was also born there (If he was wrong in that, note that he also failed to mention

two of his sisters). He also said he had another brother, George, who died in infancy. Of course infancy meant he hadn't reached age 18 in some cases.

You asked for information of the George Davis I mentioned as being in White Co TN in the 1840 Census. I haven't made copies, but copied by hand, because the Santa Clara Public Library has the complete 1840 census on microfilm, and I can go look at it any time I want to. What I copied down was:

Page 19 (or 11 - there are double pages, and both numbers appear. 11 is printed and 19 handwritten as I recall).

George Davis: males - two \emptyset -5, one 5-10, one 10-15 and one $4\emptyset$ -50. females - one \emptyset -5 and one $3\emptyset$ -40.

This man could be the brother of Mary M. Davis, or her father, as she was born about 1814, and he was born between 1790 and 1800. There were many Davis's in White Co TN.

My reconstructions are as follows. Some is fact, some is fancy, so I advise against publishing any of it yet.

Wade H. Yarbrough was born ca 1810 probably SC. He died in 1882 on his farm near Floral in Cowley Co KS. Mary M. Davis was born ca 1815 near Sparta, White Co TN. They had 10 known children, 9 of whom appeared in one or more censuses since 1850. The tenth was George, who was said to have died in infancy. However, he may have been the oldest, and died only after 1840.

I believe that Wade H. Yarbrough is listed as Hampton Yarbrough in the 1840 census of White Co. TN. This would make him the son of William Yarbrough and Rachel Shelby Yarbrough, who were married about 1793 in North Carolina. Many researchers claim that William is a son of Manoah Yarbrough, who can be traced back (through Thomas and John) to the immigrant Richard Yarbrough. Manoah was one of the seven "brothers of Yarbroughs" who went from Virginia to North Carolina between 1725 and 1750.

William, who married Rachel Shelby, is referred to as William Sr., as he identified himself on a number of official records. They moved to South Carolina before 1800, as their sons Jephtha (b. 1800), William Jr. (b. 1803) and Wade H. claim birth in SC in various census records. They apparently were in North Carolina when there sister Susannah was born in 1812. They may also have spent some time in Georgia and Alabama with Manoah and his brother Littleton.

William Senior, William Junior and Jephtha first show up in White Co TN on the 1825 tax list, and were not there for the 1811 list (there seems to be no record of any lists between those two) but could have been there at any time after the 1820 White Co census, where I failed to find any Yarbroughs. Jephtha and William Senior are heads of housholds in the 1830 census (with one male of the right age to be William Jr. in Jephtha's house, and one the right age to be Hampton in William Sr.'s house.

In the 1840 White Co TN census Hampton is the only Yarbrough who appears. Hampton of an age to be Wade H. Yarbrough, a female is in the right age range to be Mary M. Davis, and there are children of the correct age ranges to be Crockett, Mary and Martha, children of Wade H. Yarbrough and Mary M. Davis. There is a male between 10 and 15 years who doesn't fit any known offspring of W.H. and M.M. Yarbrough, but there are a number of possibilities, including a brother of M.M., a nephew of either, or finally it is possible that this is the missing brother George, who then would have been the oldest of Wade and Mary's ten children.

I believe that Mary M. Davis is a daughter or niece of Augustus Davis of White Co TN. In the 1840 census, the Hampton Yarbrough family is adjacent to the family of Johnathan Davis, who may have been a son of Augustus. William Yarbrough Jr. married another of Augustus Davis's daughters, and Augustus ended his days in the William Yarbrough Jr. houshold in Hardeman Co, TN. There are two early Davis names on tax lists, F.Isham Davis in 1804 and Moses Davis in 1811. There are nine other Davis names

on the 1825 list, including Augustin. Mary's sons Crockett Davis and Felix Grundy Yarbrough named sons George, and in at least Crockett's case the name was George Davis Yarbrough. They may have been named for the George Davis was in the 1840 census of White Co. This George Davis may have been Mary M. Davis's brother, or perhaps her father.

Jephtha is in Hardeman Co TN for the 1840 census and stayed for the rest of his life. The whereabouts of the two Williams, junior and senior, in 1840 remains a mystery. William Yarbrough Jr. appears in the 1850 and subsequent censuses of Hardeman Co. I don't have any idea of where William Senior and Rachel Shelby Yarbrough were in 1840 and 1850. Apparently he died in 1859 and she in 1854, and they are buried in the Toone Cemetery, in Hardeman Co. They reportedly had other children: Sarah, Benjamin, George (who married another daughter of Agustus Davis), Hulda, John (who also married a daughter of Augustus Davis), Susannah and Reuben. Some of these appear to have been born too late to have been Rachel's children, unless Rachel was born much later than the 1776 date which has been given (which is not confirmed by the 1830 White Co TN census), in which case it is doubtful that she could be the mother of Sarah, who was supposedly born in 1793.

About 1841 Wade H. and Mary M. Yarbrough and children went to Dade Co, Missouri, where he pursued the trade of shoemaker. Lawrence Co was organized in 1845 (taking the part of Dade Co where they were living). They had property in Mount Vernon in that county from 1848 through 1852.

In 1854 they purchased farm property in Johnson Co MO near the town of Columbia. In 1863 they sold that property to their son Felix G. Yarbrough

In the 1870 census they are in Bourbon Co KS with A.J., N.S. and Virginia C. I haven't checked land records there yet.

In the 1880 census they are in Cowley Co, with several children living near by. According to A.J. Yarbrough's biographical sketch, W.H. died on his farm there in 1882. I haven't completed the search of Cowley Co records yet.

Bute County was formed in 1764 from Granville County and abelished in 1779 to from Warren and Franklin Counties. There were 103 land grants issued in Bute County and one tract entered and plat made but no grant issued for it. Plats are extant for all grants, and warrants are extant for all grants except for File #12. All plats are reproduced here. Some of the originals are quite dim and faded; the copies reproduced here are as good or better than the originals. They are in approximate numberical order.

There are 345 land entries from Bute County. All of these are abstracted here. Many entries in Bute County belong to grants issued later in Warren and Franklin Counties. The original land entry book is in the North Carolina Archives at Raleigh. There is also a copy in the Franklin County Court House in Louisburg, North Carolina. I have used the original at the Archives, as the Franklin County copy appears to be a later one and contains several errors and at least one emission. There existed four documents for each land grant in this order: entry, warrant, plat, grant. Some of the plats were made on more scraps of paper; others cover a whole page.

The index covers all surnames in the plats and land entries except for the surveyers John Dent, Joseph Hawkins, and William Christmas. Names are indexed by Plat number(P)(same as file number) and by Entry number (E), not page...

My interest in Bute County records stems from the fact that many Bute County families(e.g. Bobe, Beatman, Duke) moved to the part of Ninety Six District, South Carolina that later became Union County.

RANDLE-RANDOLPH of SURRY and SUSSEX

There was a Randolph family in Kent, England, which was connected with Virginia. An account of that family is given in Berry's Kent, page 27, as follows:

Bernard Randolph of Beddenden Co., Kent, was buried in the chancel May 6, 1628, aged 72. He married Jane, daughter of William and sister of Sir William Beddenden. She died April 3, 1619, aged 48.

There were more descendants of this family shown in the above account. (See also Hasted's Kent, Vol. III, p. 64 and 268. Sussex Arch. Colln. XIV, p. 114).

A John Randle was a headright of Edward Prince in 1639. (C.P. 117). He was probably then a young man and could have been the John Randle who was living on the south side of the Chickahominy adjacent Gregory Well's land in 1692. (W 12 (1) 109) A John Randle or Randolph is said to have been the father of the two brothers, John and Josias Randle of whom later. This seems impossible to prove on account of the destruction of the county records. It is possible that after the Land Grants of Virginia, since 1666, are published, additional information about John Randle (Randall) may be found. A John Randall's inventory was filed in York County, 1701.

John Randle of King William married Mary, daughter of Richard Johns of King William, and Josias, said to be his brother, married her sister Jane Johns.

The will of Richard Johns is as follows:

Abstract of the will of Richard Johns of King William Co., Va., Records Book 2, page 21 (Crozier):

In the name of God, Amen, I Richard Johns of King William

To wife Jane Johns the plantation I now live on and then to son Richard Johns.....

To son William Johns, 150 acres.....

son Thomas Johns, 100 acres.....

To son Robert Johns remainder of land in these parts.....

To son Arthur Johns land known as Island Neck.....

To daughter Eliza now wife of James Adams, 20 shillings.

To daughter MARY, now wife of JOHN RANDLE, 20 shillings.

To daughter JANE now widow of JOSIAS RANDLE, 600 lbs. tbco.

To daughter Anne Johns two cows and calves, at age of 18.....

To daughter Martha Johns two cows and calves, at age of 18..... Loving wife Jane Johns sole executor.

In witness whereof I herewith set my hand and seal this 12th day of January 1703.

Wits: Henry Fox, William Thomas, John Fox.

Richard- R.F. (his mark) Johns Seal

Proved, 20 day of March, anno 1703.

Josias Randle, who married Jane Randle above died in King William County January 1703. His will on file mentions wife and one child in esse.

John Randle married Mary Johns about 1699. She was born March 1678. John Randle is shown on Quit Rent Rolls, King William Co., 1704. For his children see Virginia Magazine Vol. 26, pages 312-313. The name in this list is spelled as "Randolph" but the descendants spell it "Randle".

A number of these children settled in Brunswick Co., Va. The records there show that John Randle, Josias Randle, Jackonias Randle and William Randle were among them. John Randle was the first one found purchasing land 1737 in Brunswick. His will was probated August 28, 1753.

William Randle, son of John Randle and Mary Johns, was born Sept. 22, 1716. His will was recorded in Brunswick County, Book 4, page 67. Gives son John Randle, one negro; son Colby Randle 10 shillings; daughter ANNE TILLMAN, one negro; son John Randle, all land on north side of San Seafford Swamp; to Barnett Randle, home place and land on south side San Seafford Swamp; Wife Anne and son John Randle, exs. Oct. 19, 1770, Trabated April 22, 1771.

The children of William Randle moved to Montgomery County, C. His son John Randle was a Major in the Revolution. Anne married Richard Tillman, and his descend-

ants are given in Vol. IV (See Haynes Family).

Margaret Jennings, widow of Isaac Hill, married secondly a Randle. (See Jennings-Hill chart). He was possibly Nicholas Randle of Spottsylvania. Isaac Hill died before June 13, 1734, as Clement Read was appointed his administrator on that date. (40 V-89) Nicholas Randle died in 1748 in Spottsylvania and his wife Margaret was appointed his administratrix (Id). Was she the mother of a Josias Randle, who was closely associated with Clement Read? (See F. L. Morris' account) (Id.)

George Randall, who may have been related to the Randle family of King Williams, was the first of the name from whom the Surry-Sussex family is descended and nothing apparently is known of him prior to the making of his will in Surry in 1710. He was seemingly a new comer to Surry as he does not show in the Quit Rent rolls of 1704, or in any of the lists of Tithables. His wife, Elizabeth, may have been the widow of James Cain.

His will was dated Feb. 18, 1710, and probated Nov. 25, 1711,

as follows (abstract):

"To son Peter, gun, sword, live stock, and furniture from his mother when 21 years of age. William Rainey to have my son Peter and his estate to keep till said Peter comes to age of 21 years, but to have part of his time to 18 years old. To my youngest son (not named) two cows, hogs and my flock. To daughter Mary two cows, etc. Wife Elizabeth to be executrix and have rest of estate." Wits: Mary Simon, Francis Maybury, Robert Wynne. (B. 6, page 81)

Elizabeth Randall, widow, married Marmaduke Brown. On March 18, 1723, they made a deed of gift to Peter Randall of 100 acres on north side of Nottoway at Rocky Run. (W&D 1715-30, p.520). Marmaduke Brown was dead by Feb. 20, 1738, when 200 acres patented by him March 23, 1715, was divided between his stepsons, Peter and George Randall. (W.B. 3)

Inventory of the estate of George Randall was presented by Mary Randall, admr., Jan. 17, 1742. Appraisers were Robt. and Edward Farrington and William Rainey. Wm. Green and Robert Jones were on the Bond. (W.B. 3, p. 422).

Peter Randall married Mary, daughter of John MITCHELL and died in 1741. His widow then married William Yarborough. In 1746, "William Yarborough, who intermarried with Mary Randall, widow, who was guardian of George Randall, orphan of Peter Randall, rendered an account of the estate of said orphan. (O.B. 1744-49, p. 233)

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

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

RANDLE-RANDOLPH of SURRY and SUSSEX

There was a Randolph family in Kent, England, which was connected with Virginia. An account of that family is given in Berry's Kent, page 27, as follows:

Bernard Randolph of Beddenden Co., Kent, was buried in the chancel May 6, 1628, aged 72. He married Jane, daughter of William and sister of Sir William Beddenden. She died April 3, 1619, aged 48.

There were more descendants of this family shown in the above account. (See also Hasted's Kent, Vol.III, p. 64 and 268. Sussex Arch. Colln. XIV, p. 114).

A John Randle was a headright of Edward Prince in 1639. (C.P. 117). He was probably then a young man and could have been the John Randle who was living on the south side of the Chickahominy adjacent Gregory Well's land in 1692. (W 12 (1) 109) A John Randle or Randolph is said to have been the father of the two brothers, John and Josias Randle of whom later. This seems impossible to prove on account of the destruction of the county records. It is possible that after the Land Grants of Virginia, since 1666, are published, additional information about John Randle (Randall) may be found. A John Randall's inventory was filed in York County, 1701.

John Randle of King William married Mary, daughter of Richard Johns of King William, and Josias, said to be his brother, married her sister Jane Johns.

The will of Richard Johns is as follows:

Abstract of the will of Richard Johns of King William Co., Va., Records Book 2, page 21 (Crozier):

In the name of God, Amen, I Richard Johns of King William

To wife Jane Johns the plantation I now live on and then to son

To son William Johns, 150 acres.....

Josias Randle, who married Jane Randle above died in King William County January 1703. His will on file mentions wife and one child in esse.

John Randle married Mary Johns about 1699. She was born March 1678. John Randle is shown on Quit Rent Rolls, King William Co., 1704. For his children see Virginia Magazine Vol. 26, pages 312-313. The name in this list is spelled as "Randolph" but the descendants spell it "Randle".

A number of these children settled in Brunswick Co., Va. The records there show that John Randle, Josias Randle, Jackonias Randle and William Randle were among them. John Randle was the first one found purchasing land 1737 in Brunswick. His will was probated August 28, 1753.

William Randle, son of John Randle and Mary Johns, was born Sept. 22, 1716. His will was recorded in Brunswick County, Book 4, page 67. Gives son John Randle, one negro; son Colby Randle 10 shillings; daughter ANNE TILLMAN, one negro; son John Randle, all land on north side of San Seafford Swamp; to son Barnett Randle, home place and land on south side San Seafford Swamp; Wife Anne and son John Randle, exs. Oct. 19, 1770, Probated April 22, 1771.

The children of William Randle moved to Montgomery County, L.C. His son John Randle was a Major in the Revolution. Anne mandle, his daughter, married Richard Tillman, and his descend-

ants are given in Vol. IV (See Haynes Family).

Margaret Jennings, widow of Isaac Hill, married secondly a Randle. (See Jennings-Hill chart). He was possibly Nicholas Randle of Spottsylvania. Isaac Hill died before June 13, 1734, as Clement Read was appointed his administrator on that date. (40 V-89) Nicholas Randle died in 1748 in Spottsylvania and his wife Margaret was appointed his administratrix (Id). Was she the mother of a Josias Randle, who was closely associated with Clement Read? (See F. L. Morris' account) (Id.)

George Randall, who may have been related to the Randle family of King Williams, was the first of the name from whom the Surry-Sussex family is descended and nothing apparently is known of him prior to the making of his will in Surry in 1710. He was seemingly a new comer to Surry as he does not show in the Quit Rent rolls of 1704, or in any of the lists of Tithables. His wife, Elizabeth, may have been the widow of James Cain.

His will was dated Feb. 18, 1710, and probated Nov. 25, 1711,

as follows (abstract):

"To son Peter, gun, sword, live stock, and furniture from his mother when 21 years of age. William Rainey to have my son Peter and his estate to keep till said Peter comes to age of 21 years, but to have part of his time to 18 years old. To my youngest son (not named) two cows, hogs and my flock. To daughter Mary two cows, etc. Wife Elizabeth to be executrix and have rest of estate." Wits: Mary Simon, Francis Maybury, Robert Wynne. (B. 6, page 81)

Elizabeth Randall, widow, married Marmaduke Brown. On March 18, 1723, they made a deed of gift to Peter Randall of 100 acres on north side of Nottoway at Rocky Run. (W&D 1715-30, p.520). Marmaduke Brown was dead by Feb. 20, 1738, when 200 acres patented by him March 23, 1715, was divided between his stepsons, Peter and George Randall. (W.B. 3)

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WESTERN TENNESSEE AND NORTH CAROLINA YARBOROUGHS

Back to the discussion which ended at YFM 2/92.

In reviewing my North Carolina material to attempt to pinpoint the various William, Samuel, James and John Yarboroughs who contemporarily appeared in Western Tennessee, I find that Samuel Y. of Orange Co., N.C., who died in about 1770 left widow Sarah, sons William, Samuel and John (Samuel and John being under 21), and daughters Elizabeth, Sarah and Lewcy (Will Book A, p. 107; YFN 2/52). From Orange Co. was formed Caswell Co. in 1777 and then Person Co. in 1791. In 1811 John Y. of Person Co. died, leaving widow Sarah, sons William, John and James, and daughters Mary, Elizabeth Daniel and Catherine Smith (Record Book 6, p. 12). William Y. of Person Co. died in 1820, leaving widow Sarah, sons Samuel and William, and daughter Sarah Chandler (Record Book 8, p. 324). And Samuel Y. of Person Co. died in 1820, leaving widow Alsey, an only son Samuel H., and daughters Alsey Allin, Susanah Mitchell and Yarbrough Mitchell.

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He numbered the baptisms he performed until they reached twelve hundred, then desisted, lest he should sin after the manner of David in numbering the children of Israel. As this occured long before his ministry closed, it would be interesting to know how many he did baptise.

He died at his son-in-law's, in Oglethorpe County, about the year 1845. The last five years of his life were full of suffering, but he said he had nothing to change in the main truths he had

preached.

He was allowed pension on his application executed Sept. 3, 1832, at which time he was living in Oglethorpe County, Ga., and was seventy years of age. General Accounting Office, Records Division, Washington, D.C. Miller Bledsoe, Certificate #12253 or #12254, issued April 11, 1833, rate \$80.00 per annum, commenced 3-4-1831, Act of June 7, 1832. Ga. Miller Bledsoe married JEAN ELIZABETH BOLLING (BOW-LING) in Va. Tradition says she was the daughter of a Dr. Bolling from Fredericksburg, Va., who moved to Ga. right after

The fact that William Miller Bledsoe Jr., born April 13, 1792, put into his Bible that his father William Miller Bledsoe was born April 13, 1761, is of great importance in distinguishing these two men. Abraham² Bledsoe, third son of George¹ Bledsoe, married first Kathrine Ball, and secondly, Sarah. On June 6, 1732, Abraham Bledsoe and wife Sarah sold 400 acres in St. Marks Parish Spottsylvania to Thomas Watts. (Crozier 122) He and his brother William Bledsoe also sold part of a patent granted them May 30, 1726. The will of Abraham Bledsoe was dated March 15, 1753, in Granville County, and was probated May 29 of same year. He names wife, Sarah, his sons Isaac, Abraham, Thomas, Jacob, Moses and Aaron, and refers to "the rest of my children". The executors were his wife, Sarah, and his son-in-law, Henry Thornton. Aaron Bledsoe was given a Captains commission in Spottsylvania County in 1756. Isaac Bledsoe served as a private in Dunmore's War, and in the subsequent Indian Wars. ANTHONY BLEDSOE, who was not named in the above mentioned will, was commissioned a Captain in the Colonial troops about 1774.

Abraham Bledsoe was an Ensign in Captain Long's company in 1774. Abraham, Anthony William and George Bledsoe, noted Indian fighters, who removed from Augusta to Washington Co., Virginia, at an early date, were probably cousins of ANTHONY, Isaac and Abraham Bledsoe who settled in Tennessee. One of the four brothers, Abraham, had sons: Thomas, Loven, Anthony, William, and Isaac.

Colonel Anthony Bledsoe was born in Orange County, Va., in 1733. In 1760 he married Mary Ramsey, daughter of Thomas Ramsey, born in Augusta Co., Va., in 1734. One of her brothers, Josiah Ramsey, was captured by the Indians when a child, being returned to the settlements after Boquet's treaty in 1764. He was in the Battle of Point Pleasant, and was a scout in the Cherokee Campaign of 1776 and in 1780 removed to Kentucky, the next year coming to the Cumberland Settlement, where he was a Major of Militia. He died at an advanced age, at the home of his son in Missouri. Other brothers of Mrs. Bledsoe were Henry and William Ramsey, both killed by Indians. She was 54 years of age when her husband was killed. Five years later she married an old man, a pioneer, Nathan Parker. She died in 1808. (Cisco's "Sumner Co.")

Colonel Anthony Bledsoe was a Justice of the Peace in Botetourt, Fincastle, and Washington Counties, Va. He was a Captain in the Colonial Army; Major in Va. Militia in Revolutionary War; was in the "Battle of the Flats", Commander of the troops at Long

tract, later known as "Merton," on the bayside and "Essex" in Upshur's Neck.





William Yarborough moved to White Co., Tenn., then to what was called Western District, and is now Hardeman Co., Tenn. Suppose he got land for Revolutionary serivce.

Not all of the descendants of that handful who came to America heeded the "Call of the Wild" that sounded so insistently during the closing years of the 18th Century and the first half of the 19th, but there is scarcely a city of any size in the U. S. that does not number among its citizens some of the Yarborough clan. Washington, D. C. has twenty-five families of that name, and Washington is but one of the cities over

(This from Mrs. Ida G. Walling of "Rebel Hill", McMinnville, Tennessee.)

"I do not have a great deal of Yarborough data. Some years ago a woman from Iowa came to see me, got from me the Yarborough Coat-of Arms, and went on to N. C. to visit some Yarboroughs, and came back with most fantastic deductions. Somewhere in the attic I may still have her letters, but while she had lots of odds and ends, there was no proof of lines. I have only a few dates and got them from an old man at Toone, Hardeman Co., Tennessee, where William is buried. South Caro-

lina had no marriage license records until 1911, so wills are the only proof, and the Yarboroughs must have ail been poor.

"I do not leave my D. A. R. ancestor papers open to the public, because I like to know who wants to use them and why. I will, however, give you an outline."

"I am a daughter of Felix Grundy Walling, born in 1839. I was a Walling before I married a distant cousin, Alonzo Nelson Walling, who died in 1947. I am 66 years old and teaching my last year. Felix Grundy Walling's mother was Mahala Howard, who married Hiram Kilgore Walling. She was the daughter of Sarah Yarborough and Robert Charles Howard, who was born in 1796 and died in 1883. Mahala was born in Greenville, Green Co., S. C., Dec. 24, 1815, died March 21, 1876. [This is an error, as there is no Greene Co., in S. C.]

toward Ohio, Indiana and other sections of what was afterwards called "The Northwest Territory."

The story of the settlement of East and Middle Tennessee is too well known to be more than mentioned here. After decision had been reached that each of the infant States should pay the U. S. its proportionate share of the cost of the Revolution, and the U. S. should in turn pay to the men who had served in the Militia or the Continental Regiments, the pay due them, now long in arrears, Virginia ceded her Northwest Territory, a principality in extent, and North Carolina, her Tennessee territory. This cession the Government accepted, and in turn granted these lands to those who had worn the "Buff and Blue." This was a most excellent arrangement all the way around. It was, as the old expression ran, a case of "eating your pie and having it too."

The two letters quoted below, and the charts 1820 and 1850 are examples of how well "Westward the Course of Empire Takes its Way."

Dear Oshelia:

I am sorry not to have answered & thanked you for the cories you sent me. I do have all the Jenkins Quarterlies and YFM's - actually I helped put them together early on.' I collected Y-data and sent Nelle Jenkins cories a course of years before she wrote them. She hadn't even written her "Pioneers of Sumter (o. Ala" yet. However, I do appreciate the data you send me - sometimes I don't have it - like you Swarson Y. data, and am sure much, much more. I also have the marriages and Deeds List from the St. Louis Genea. Soc. - some of the pages you sent, are from this. You can keep all the cories I sent you.

The Wm. H. Y. obit I sent you was Wm. Henry Y. My uncle was Wm. A. for Ambrose, he had two sons only, Harry and Thomas - both deceased.

The Wm-Rachael Shelby T. wound up in Tipton (o. Trn. for 5 hely - writing looking Type George Washington Yarbrough, Senator from Alabama, the recognized (?) guru of early Y-research, felt our ancestor was Zachariah. This might led to son Manoah who Jenkins also thought was ours. I haven't found the connection - still lookin'!

I certainly overlooked the dates I have for Pauline Y. Anders. I just copied off what my cousin, Jacie Hyatt, sent me and didn't notice it. SOME EARLY SONOMA COUNTY FAMILIES HISTORY AND GENEOLOGY

Raymond B. Yarbrough July 1985

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1. INTRODUCTION

- In 1812 the Russians landed at Bodega Bay and Fort Ross, moving up the Russian River and up the coast toward Gualala. They established support facilities for their Alaskan colonies, principally agricultural. They formed a good working relation with the indians.

In 1823, Sonoma Mission was founded under the Mexican regime. Spanish settlers and missionaries had previously raided the Sonoma County indians as "converts" for San Rafael, San Francisco and Mission San Jose, but the moist climate proved deadly to these indians, and the Sonoma site was thus developed to make "better use of the Indians". The indians of the Santa Rosa Valley, the Satayomi or Sotoyome, who were Coast Miwok, had resisted being converted by force, responding with guerilla warfare.

In the 1830's when the missions were secularized, General Vallejo had laid out the streets of Sonoma, and began to build his adobe near Petaluma, establishing land grants for the purpose of bringing in settlers to counter the threat of the Russians. The Satayomi terrorized those who attempted to settle in the Santa Rosa Valley, and effectively prevented any early Spanish (Mexican) settlements there. There had been thousands of indians in the county territory, including the Satayomi and the more docile Petaluma, Cotati and other southern tribes. In 1837 an epidemic of smallpox struck the indians at Fort Ross, probably brought in by Russian visitors there. The epidemic wiped out most of the white population, and by 1838 had virtually wiped out the entire indian population of of Sonoma, Napa and Solano counties, estimated between 40,000 to 80,000 indians. In 1841 the Russians traded their property and stock to Johann Augustus (John) Sutter for four years of supplies for their Alaskan colonies, and departed the scene. For perhaps a decade most of Sonoma County was populated only by wild animals.

In our part of the county, Mark West was probably the first settler, in about 1844. He squatted on the land that was included in the Carrillo land grant. The Carrillo descendants, the Fitch Family, apparently did not arrive here until the late 1850's, and did not press their land grant claims until later. A Markus West, age 20 and born in England, died in Sonoma County in 1851. Mark West left his name on a creek, a hot springs and village and a district between Santa Rosa and Healdsburg. Other settlers began arriving in the late 1840's. In the mid 1850's a large influx of settlers arrived in Sonoma County, and the Russian River area began to be repopulated.

As for the indians, there were a few surviving Satayomi, who lived in small families and more or less blended with the countryside. Later in the century, Pomo indians from Lake County drifted into the Mendocino-Sonoma county territory and indians again became a presence by the end of the century.

The United States had tried to purchase California from the Mexican Government, and were pursuing that when the Mexican War broke out, further complicated by the Bear Flag revolt in 1846. The treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo was signed in February 1848, ceding California to the United States, but giving legal status to Spanish and Mexican land grants. The discovery of gold in 1848 depleted Sonoma County of settlers, who were primarily located in Sonoma at that time.

Hugh Porter, was described in a History of Sonoma County (George K. Porter p. 413): Hugh Porter came to California in 1846, making the long overland trip by ox teams, and shortly after his arrival here he enlisted in the California Volunteers, with which he took an active part in the Mexican War. Later he turned his attention to mining, which vocation he followed for a few years, and then, about 1850, came to Sonoma County and took up 160 acres of land on the Russian River, nine miles west of Healdsburg, where he lived for nearly half a century, his death occuring there in 1897. The Porter ranch is now part of the Twin Valleys Ranch of Fred McMurray. This Hugh Porter was among the first settlers on the Russian River, and probably the first of the families of this history that come to the Russian River area.

Crockett David Yarbrough and Billy Bowers served with Hugh Porter in the California company of irregular volunteers in the Mexican War. After the war Yarbrough was active in the gold fields, and later guided wagon trains from Missouri to the gold country. James Madison Hill had been engaged in commerce in El Dorado County early in the gold rush (1849), and later he returned to Missouri to fetch his family, returned to El Dorado County in a wagon train which Crockett Yarbrough worked.

In the wake of the gold rush, disappointed miners were finding their way to Sonoma County in the early 1850's, and the James M. Hill family was among them, arriving in 1857. Hill had obtained a homestead on the Russian River in one of the few parts of Sonoma County where the land title was not clouded by Spanish and Mexican land grants. The Russian settlement in Fort Ross had probably made the land along the lower Russian River undesireable to potential grantees, and so left it available for settlement when the county first opened up. Crockett Yarbrough was married to Jemima Ann Hill at James Hill's house in 1857 but returned to El Dorado County where their first child was born. By the 1860 census they had returned to the Hill Homestead.

2. THE HILL-WESLEY FAMILY

The most remote ancestors whom have been identified in official documents are:

I. William Hill and Catherine Wesley who were both born in Louisa County, Virginia. They were the parents of James M. Hill.

Jamima Ann Hill, their grand-daughter, claimed that Catherine was the niece of John Wesley, and the daughter of Charles Wesley, the co-founders of Methodism. Records of Charles Wesley's stay in the colonies indicate an unhappy love affair, but there is no mention of a child. After returning to England, Charles Wesley married Sally Gwyne on Apr 8, 1749. They had three children who lived to adulthood, but none could have been Catherine's parent. There is a possibility that Catherine's father was the illegitimate son of Charles Wesley, as Charles left the colonies too early to have been Catherine's father. If she were Charles' daughter she would have been born by 1750, and her son James M. Hill was born in 1810, so she would have had to be 60 years old at the time, a rather unlikely situation.

II. JAMES MADISON HILL, b. Apr 3 1810 in Madison Co, Ky, d. Feb 2 1895, Ca. bur. at McPeak Cemetary near Hacienda Crossing of the Russian River in Sonoma Co, CA. He was the son of William and Catherine Wesley Hill, but no

record of his brothers and sisters is known. Before coming to California, J.M. Hill married:

II. SARAH H. ELSTON, b. May 15, 1811 in Tenn, d. Sept 16 1894 in Ca. buried beside J.M. Hill in McPeak Cemetary. Her parents were born in North Carolina. No information on siblings is known. J.M. and S.H. Hill had three known children. The first was born in Henry Co, Mo, and the other two were also born in Missouri, but the county is not known. The family came to California some time between the birth of their third child in 1848 and the marriage of their daughter in 1857.

JAMES MADISON HILL 1810-1895

James M. Hill.- The subject of this sketch is a descendant from one of the old families of Virginia. His parents, William and Catherine (Wesley) Hill, were natives of Louisa County, that State, and his mother was a descendant of the great reformer, John Wesley. His parents moved to Madison County, Kentucky, at an early date, where he was born April 3, 1810. His father died when Mr. Hill was but six years old, leaving the care and rearing of the family to the mother. In 1822 his mother moved with her family to Missouri, and located in Boone County, where she engaged in farming and stock-raising. Mr Hill was early in life engaged in farm work, and brought up in the rugged life of pioneer settlements, his schooling being almost entirely neglected. He resided on his mother's farm until he attained his majority, and, in 1831, married Miss Sarah Elston. Her parents were residents of Boone County, but natives of New Jersey. After his marriage, in 1832, he engaged in farming and stockraising upon his own account, an occupation he followed until 1849. He was attracted by the glowing accounts of easily acquired riches to be obtained in the Golden State, and in the spring of that year he left his family on the old homestead and started across the plains for California. Nothing of particular interest was connected with this journey, and after months of slow and tedious traveling of the ox teams over plains and mountains he arrived in October, 1849, in El Dorado County. Upon his arrival he immediately commenced active operations in mining, which he successfully conducted until 1852. In that year he went by steamer route from San Francisco to New Orleans, and from there returned to his old home in Missouri. Upon his return he sold his farm, settled up his affairs, and in the spring of 1853 started upon his second trip overland, taking his family with him. Upon his arrival in California he again located in El Dorado County, where he established a hotel and freighting line between Fiddletown and Indian Diggings, and was also engaged in mining operations. He conducted these enterprises until 1856, when, desirous of some more congenial coccupation, he determined to take up his old calling, that of a farmer. This this in view he came to Sonoma County, and located on the Russian River in Redwood Township, where he secured 137 acres of Government land. Upon this he took up his residence and for many years devoted himself to clearing, cultivating and improving it. He continued his farming and stock-growing at this point until 1879, after which he was engaged in various occupations, among which was extensive stock-growing in San Luis Obispo County. He was successful in his various enterprises, and in 1884 purchases 640 acres of land in Mendocino County, which he stocked with 600 head of sheep. Mr. Hill is a resident of Forestville. His advanced age (nearly eighty years) has induced him to abandon the care and labor attending his ranch, and he is enjoying the well earned competency which his industry and energy have secured to him. He

has always been an active and energetic citized, and his success in life has been due to his well poised intellect and industrious habits rather that to any educational advantages he received in early life. His long residence in the county has made him well known. He is a strong supporter of enterprises that will build up and advance the interests of Sonoma County. In political affairs Mr. Hill is associated withthe Democratic party. He is a life-long Democrat, and at the same time exercises an intelligent and liberal view upon all the leading party questions. He is a member of Sottoyome Lodge, NO. 123, F.& A.M., of Healdsburg. From the marriage of Mr. and Mrs. Hill there are but two children living, viz.: Emily, who is living on the old homestead on the Russian River, and Jemima A. (sic), who married C.D. Yarbrough, and is now (1888) living at Guerneville. [end of article]

Census records:

- 1870 Sarah as head of household, living with Joshua G. and Emily C. Hill in the same house as Crockett D. and Jemimena Yarbrough with 5 children. Five households away is James M. Hill, 60.
- 1880 Sarah is listed as a widow living with Emily C. Hill in the house next to C.D. and J.A. Yarbrough and 8 children. However, James M. Hill is listed as living in Forrestville at that time.

In 1864 James and Sarah Hill were together, as Sonoma Co records show that on 1 Mar 1864 J.M. and S.H. Hill bought 160 acres in Analy Township from Jacob McReynolds and wife. They were maintaining separate households by 1870. If they were divorced, Sonoma Co records have marriages of a James Hill and Nancy James Englehart Feb 3, 1866, a James Hill and Nettie Patterson June 28, 1877, and a James M. Hill and P.H. Boyes June 23, 1882. There is no proof that any of these James Hills were our James M. Hill. Family tradition is that James M. Hill had left Sahah and they were separated at the time of her death. They were re—united in McPeak's cemetary. The children of James M. and Sarah H. Elston Hill were:

- III.1 Joshua Gilman Hill b. Jul 19 1838, Henry Co, Mo, d. Nov 9 1879, Ca. He m. Mary Ann Beach b. Nov 22 1855, d. Apr 22 1876
- III.2 JAMIMA ANN HILL b. Dec 6 1843, Mo, d. Jan 30 1918, Sonoma Co Ca. At the house of James M. Hilles (sic) on Oct 9 1857 she married: CROCKETT DAVID YARBROUGH, b. Dec 18 1831, Tenn, d. Oct 2 1898. Both are buried in McPeak's Cemetary.
- III.3 Emily C. Hill, b. 1848 in Mo.

The death date and burial place of Emily C. Hill are not known. She may be in the Howard Family mausoleum in Albany, Ca. She was living with her mother at the time of the 1890 census, but does not appear with her sister in the 1900 census. She has been reported to be feeble minded because of a high fever in infancy, and never married. She is known as Aunt Emma in family tradition.

JOSHUA GILMAN HILL 1838-1879

J.G. Hill was born in Missouri, and came west with his family in the early 1850's. He married Mary Ann Beach in Sonoma County on 7 Oct 1872. They had two daughters who died in infancy. Adel was born in Nov 1873 and died in June of 1875 at 18 months. Nora was born in Sept 1875 and lived only 7 months. Mary Ann died in April 1876, two weeks after Nora, which indicates they died in an epidemic. Joshua G. Hill was known as Sock and has been the subject of a family tradition that he was gunned down by a jealous husband. The Russian River Flag carried a story that he was shot down at a public meeting in Forrestville by the brother of Miss Georgia Travers, whom he was courting after the death of his wife. John Litton told that his grandfather, Hamilton Litton, was with Sock the day that he was killed, and had earlier been in a duel with another man, and in the duel Hamilton Litton had been wounded by the other party. This is not in agreement with the account of the killing, which is given below. While there were numerous witnesses to the fatal wounding of Sock , Wirt Travis was never brought to trial, and is listed in the 1910 census in Forrestville. Joshua G., Mary Ann, Adele, and Nora are buried together at McPeak's cemetary.

The Russian River Flag carried a story that J.G. Hill was killed over Miss Georgia Travis, and was buried from the Christian Church at Ridenauer's Cemetary. The name of the cemetary changed when the McPeaks bought the property. An account of the incident is given in a collection of famous Sonoma County murders.

Killing of J.G. Hill.- Or Saturday evening, Nov. 8, 1879, the Blue Ribbon Club at Forrestville met, as usual, in the hall of a building owned by the Santa Rosa Savings Bank, and occupied by Robert Weir and family. There were between sixty and seventy persons - men, women and children - present, among whom were Miss Georgia Travis and her brother Wirt Travis. A short time before the regular exercises of the Club had commenced Mr. Hill and Samuel Keys came in together, and immediately thereafter Miss Travis rose and approached Wirt, who was sittint a short distance from her, and the two went out together. In about ten minutes Wirt returned, passed near where Hill was sitting, and resumed his original seat, which was in front of Hill, and about eight feet from him. Wirt had not more than comfortably seated himself when his brother John entered the room, and went to near where Hill was sitting, taking about the same course his brother had done before, and appeared to be about to take a seat, but instead of this he struck Hill in the face, reachin over the head of a Mr. Morris to get at Hill. Hill immediately sprang to his feet, and a slight scuffle occurred, in which Hill faced John Travis, with his back to Wirt, and while in this position he was shot, the ball striking him in the back of the head, passing through the skull, ranging the entire length of the head, and is supposed to have lodged somewhere in the bones of the face. In its course it severed the parotid artery, which produced sufficient hemorrhage to cause his death. After this three other shots were fired, but the testimony is confused; some say there were three, and others two. It is altogether probable that there were three fired, as one statement is to the effect that at the time Wirt Taravis fired, Hill had a pistol presented at John Travis, and that when Wirt fired, Hill fell, and his pistol exploding, the ball ranged upward and struck the wall in front of him, about four inches below the ceiling. Opinions differ on this point, however, and but little evidence was presented to the

Coroner's Jury that would substantiate this. John then fired, the ball passing harmlessly over the heads of those present, striking a chimney in the northeast corner of the room, and glancing, struck the partition and passed out of the room. Not a word was said by the parties during the entire melee. By this time a number of those present had rushed from the apartment, and were thronging the corridor and stairway. Wirt strode to the door, and turning as he reached the threshold, fired another shot, which, is supposed, is the one that struck Hamilton Litton, and then sprang over the bannister, and, with his brother John, passed along unmolested toward their home, which is about three-quarters of a mile east of Forrestville. [end of article]

Jamima Ann Hill was born in Missouri, and came to California with her parents about 1853, and to the Russian River area about 1857. There are two conflicting family stories. Either Jamima had met Crockett in El Dorado County, or else they met when he worked the wagon train that brought the family west is true. When they were married, at the old homestead in Oct 1857, she was only a month from becoming 14 years old. Crockett was almost 26, an age difference which was to help separate their deaths by 20 years.

One version of the story is that Crockett and Jamima Yarbrough first moved to Downieville, and the second is that it was back to El Dorado County, however, their first child, Mary, was born in El Dorado County. They returned to the ranch before the second was born, and some of the other children were born on the old Hill Ranch, while the rest, including at least Frederick, were born at the adjacent Yarbrough ranch (Isaac's Homestead).

There is a family tradition that they had fourteen children, but in the 1910 census, in which women were asked the number of children they had borne and the number still alive, Jemima stated that she had twelve, and that seven survived at that time. Supposedly there was one child stillborn after Fred was born. For this reason, thirteen children are listed including the stillborn, which Jamima may not have counted. The twelve were spread in birth from 1859 through 1882, a period of 24 years, which is an average of one child every two years. Death due to epidemics were common, and in December of 1879 three of their children died. From the Russian River Flag, Jan 1, 1880:

Mr. Yarbrough's family, living above Korbel's Mill, has been sadly afflicted (diphtheria), six of his children have been sick, and three of them have died.

A tradition is that two other children died of "black measles". There may be some confusion between Yarbrough children and the children of Joshua G. Hill, as they all lived on the same ranch.

Crockett and Jamima lived in the original house with the Hills at least until 1870, and it is probable that Crockett was employed by Mr. and Mrs. Hill during that time. The Thompson Atlas of Sonoma County, 1878, reveals that the Yarbroughs had obtained the Isaacs homestead, and a house is shown about a quarter of a mile up the canyon from Westside road. There is an old house still standing in that location. The 1880 census has the Yarbrough family living in the next house from Mrs. Hill. The children went to the Lafayette School, which was about 3 miles away by road, but less than a mile if they went cross-country (through Hugh Porter's ranch, which was east of the Isaacs Homestead).

The Atlas also shows that by 1878 the railroad ran along the river road on the south side of the river with nearby stations at Forrestville (actually not in the town, but near Mirabelle Park) and one at Hilton, which came to be known as the Korbel Station. The impetus for the railroad was lumber, and the redwood forests were exploited. Korbel, long known for champaign, began there as manufacturers of match boxes. They began growing wine grapes in the river bottom land at Hilton only after they had logged the giant redwoods that had grown there for centuries. I recall the massive stumps along there during the 1940's, but they have since been removed. The railroad brought other possibilities, one of which was the vacation resort business.

At some time, a resort was built somewhere up Isaacs Canyon, and it was known variously as the Isaacs Canyon resort and the Mt. Jackson resort. Whether the Yarbroughs had anything to do with this resort is not known. Newton Yarbrough had a vacation resort near Guerneville.

In 1888 the Yarbroughs were living in Guerneville, according to Jamima's father, James M. Hill. By this time, all the children except the youngest, Fred age 6 and Ethel age 10, and possibly Jenny (Virginia) age 19, were married and on their own. R.E.L. Yarbrough, the older son, had married Christina Peugh in 1886 and was probably running Mrs. Hill's ranch, and living in J.G. Hill's house next door. When Jamima's mother, Sarah Hill, died in 1894 the Yarbroughs may have returned to their ranch, and it is probable that Jamima became the sole heir to her estate, or at least an heir and a trustee for her sister Emily C. Hill, who was incompetent. When her father, James M. Hill, died in 1895 she arranged that he be buried next to her mother in McPeak cemetary. The history of the properties would be an interesting subject to pursue in the Sonoma County land records.

Crockett died in a wagon accident when returning from taking a load of beets to Guerneville to market. It supposedly occurred near Hacienda Crossing.

There was a rumor that he had been drinking (Violet Madiera), and Jamima was such a strong member of WCTU that she would not allow hops to be grown on the ranch, nor could any of her children work on other ranches if they grew hops. After Crockett's death in 1898, it is supposed that Jamima and her son-in-law William Henry Howard, who married Virginia in 1890, ran the ranch for some time. Violet Madiera, R.E.L. Yarbrough's daughter, said that her family left the area about 1902, and it was probably at that time that Jamima sold the ranch and used part of the money to fix up the family plot in McPeak's cemetary. She then bestowed a large sum of money on each of her living children (perhaps \$1000 each). She then went to Guerneville and took a position of housekeeper for a man, and raised his daughters until they were old enough to take care of themselves (Lois Noffsinger). Then feeling she was too old to work, she spent the remainder of her life living 3 months at a time with her daughters. She was very careful to avoid carrying tales from one family to another. She died in Redwood Township in 1918, probably due to influenza. She was the last of the family to be buried in McPeak's cemetary.

Jamima Ann Hill Yarbrough's first name is spelled in a variety of ways: On her Marriage certificate and in the 1910 census it is Jamima (which is probably correct, and is the spelling used here.); In the 1870 census it is Jamimena; in the 1880 census it is Jamimena; on the headstone it is Jamima; and on the death cerificate it is Jamimena; on the headstone it is Jamima; even among educated people in those days. It is believed that she used the name Ann, and wasn't concerned about here first name. Crockett is consistently spelled that way, except that it is Crockit on his headstone. This may be due to Jamima's creative spelling. However, he varied the placement and spelling of David: Crockett David, Crockett Davis, David C. and Davis C. in various places. It is possible that a David Iarbow on the middle fork of the American River in the 1852 census is our Crockett.

CROCKETT DAVID YARBROUGH 1831-1898

On the marriage certificate Crockett is listed as a resident of El Dorado County. Tradition is that he came to California after the Mexican War and became a guide for wagon trains from Missouri, and that one of those wagon trains brought the Hill family and other who were later to be Russian River settlers to El Dorado County.

Census records show that Crockett was born in Tennessee and that both of his parents were born in North Carolina. There had been speculation that Crockett's mother was the sister of the famous Davey Crockett, and that Crockett David Yarbrough was named after his famous uncle. Davy Crockett had 3 sisters, Betsy b. 1790, Jane b. 1792 and Sally b. 1794. He and his sisters were all born in what is now Tennessee, however it was part of North Carolina at the time they were born. If Sally were his mother, then she would have been 37 years old when he was born. Barbara Jane Griffin has told me that Crockett's mother was named Eleanor Elizabeth. Then, if she was Betsy Crockett, she would have been 41 years old when Crockett was born, which seems unlikely. It is more likely that he was named for the famous congressman, who was perhaps most famous at the time of Crockett's birth, several years before the fall of the Alamo. Also, there was an area of Tennessee where there were a number of Yarbrough families and Crockett families. It is possible the families intermarried, but I have no records to show that.

Crockett is said by a number of people to have had two brothers, Jack and Newton. John and Dolores Litton had a tintype with Jack, Newton and another man who was probably Crockett. Several people have suggested a brother named Grady or Grundy. A Herbert C. Yarbrough from Richmond CA signed the death

certificate of Jamima Ann Yarbrough in 1918. No information on Herbert C. Yarbrough has been found, but he must have been a relative. Crockett's son Hubert C, who died of diphtheria, may have been named after this person. Herbert may be Newton's son, or the son of Andrew J. Yarbrough (see below).

In the 1850 census of El Dorado County, two names of some interest have been found. One is: 799 town of Coloma - David Iarbow, age 20 from Kentucky. This is the same mentioned above, and is certainly a phonetic spelling of Yarbrough. One Hugh Porter (there were two in the Russian River area) is reported in a History of Sonoma County, "George Porter" p. 413:

This may be the link to Crockett Yarbrough coming to California after the Mexican War. It is surmised that he and his old friend Billy Bowers met up with Hugh Porter during that war, and came west with him. The Porters were upriver neighbors of the Yarbroughs and the McMichaels. Billy Bowers is shown in several census records.

The second name of interest in the 1850 El Dorado census is one Jackson Earbaugh (another phonetic spelling of Yarbrough?), age 23, miner from Ohio, who was listed in 603, Placerville and vicinity. This is of interest because of the presence in the Dry Creek Rd. area of Mendocino Township in the 1910 census of Andrew J. Yarbrough, 65, b. Ohio, father born Kentucky and mother in Ohio, and his wife Amanda E., 64, born Indiana. The Healdsburg Tribune of 24 Sept 1914 has a filler stating the Yarbrough ranch in Dry Creek Valley has been sold by P.G. Jacobs to Daniel Reilly of Oakland. It is possible that Jackson Earbaugh is Crockett's brother Jack, and Andrew J. Yarbrough is Jack's son. Jackson Earbaugh would be 83 in 1910. Andrew J. and Amanda E. Yarbroughs are found about 15 miles up river from the old Hill homestead (Dry Creek is a tributary of the Russian River, coming in just below Healdsburg), and may turn out to be relatives.

It has been presumed that Newton was Crockett's brother, although they are 18 years apart in age. Crockett always listed his parents as both being born in N. Carolina, but Newton lists his father as being born in Kentucky and his mother in Tennessee. It seems possible that Newton was a cousin, a nephew or even possibly a son of Crockett's by a previous marriage, and left to be raised by relatives in Missouri. If the David Iarbow in the 1850 census of El Dorado County is our Crockett, he listed himself as being from Kentucky. There seems to be a stonger case that Newton L. and Andrew J. Yarbrough are brothers, or half-brothers. It is entirely possible that Crockett had brothers named Newton and Jack, and if so, Newton Leonidas was not that Newton.

Newton does not appear in California records until the Great Registry in 1892 as Newton Leonidas Yarbrough. In the 1910 census Newton L. Yarbrough, 60, is listed as born in Missouri, his father born in Kentucky and his mother in Tennesee; and that he is running a home farm, owned by himself. His wife is Mary L Yarbrough, 53 b. Ohio, and had two children. Interestingly enough, in the next two houses on Mines Road (now Armstrong Woods Road) live Crockett and Jamima's two oldest daughters: family 11: Albert P. Laughlin 53, Martha E Laughlin (w) 49 had 4 children, who are all listed; family 12: David B. Peugh 53, Mary E Peugh 51, had 3 children, none living with them then. John Litton told me that these old guys were really tough teamsters, meaning that they drove wagons drawn by a team of horses. In the winter and other times when no farming could be done, they hauled mercury ore from the mines to the railroad. Mercury ore is very heavy, and the roads were very poor. The mines were up Mines Road from where they lived. Newton lived in Guerneville for a long time and later moved to Pacific Grove. His wife was Mary, but she was called Molly, and was thought to be a bit crazy by the Howard children. She supposedly traced the family back to the Mayflower. They had a son named Roy, who supposedly lived "at the foot of Willits Hill between Ukiah and Booneville" (Violet

Yarbrough Madiera). Ed Yarbrough told me that Molly was emotionally disturbed because she accidentally ran over one of her children when she was backing her car out of her driveway. I think this may have been a grandchild, because cars were uncommon when her children were young. A newspaper account of the first pedestrian killed by a car in Guerneville occured in 1914, and the person who picked up the unfortunate child victim was one Roy Yarbrough, who took the child to a doctor's office nearby, but the child had already died. There is no mention of Molly, and the child was not related. In the time from 1906 to 1909, and perhaps earlier and later, Newton and Molly had a "bed and breakfast" vacation farm described in a pamphlet in 1909 (also in 1906). This is described in a brochure entitled: VACATION 1909

"Yarbrough's, Guerneville. One mile from town; will meet guests. A valley farm, surrounded by mountains covered with evergreen trees such as redwoods, madrones, etc; plenty of shade and fruit, hamocks, croquet grounds, piano and other amusements, boating and bathing on Russian River; swings, daily mail and telephone. Open June 1st until October 1st. Can accomodate 30 in rooms and tents. Adults \$8.00, \$9.00 and \$10.00 per week. Address N.L.Yarbrough, Yarbrough Farm, Sonoma, Cal."

Newton and Molly were living in Pacific Grove in 1925 (Bonnie Yarbrough and Edwin Yarbrough).

In the great register of 1866 (voter registration) for Sonoma County, Redwood Township, the following entries occur:

Shedrick Newton Yarbrough was born in N. Carolina, and is a possibly the father of Crockett Yarbrough. There are a number of Shedrick Yarbroughs (also Shadrick) appearing in early census of North Carolina. The name Newton, however, is rather rare. The appearance of Shedrick Newton Yarbrough in Redwood Township, where Newton Leonidas Yarbrough later turns up in census and voter registration gives strong evidence of relationship. Then if Newton Leonidas Yarbrough is Crockett's brother, son or nephew, then the chances are that Shedrick Newton Yarbrough is Crockett's father.

Barbara Jean Griffin (King) has told me that Crockett's mother was named Eleanor Elizabeth Yarbrough. Thus we have possible names for Crockett's parents: Shedrick Newton and Eleanor Elizabeth Yarbrough. Crockett lists his parents as both being born in N. Carolina, and at least Shedrick Newton said that he was born there. However, if Newton Leonidas Yarbrough's information is correct (1910 census), Crockett is not his brother, as he lists his father as being born in Kentucky. But on the other hand people forget such things.

I have been told that the Yarbroughs and the Howards knew each other in Coffee, Kansas. The story is that William Henry Howard, who later married Virginia Yarbrough, came to San Diego and later worked his way up the coast to Sonoma County tao join the Yarbrough family. There is a Coffee in Tennessee, but a modern map of Kansas shows only a Coffeeville. Perhaps this was the region where the Yarbroughs and Howards came from to California. Another possible location is Missouri, which has been mentioned by a number of family members.

Helen Litton has linked the family to Floral, Kansas. She reported that Uncle Newton came to California with William Henry Howard from Floral, Kansas, first to San Diego, and then working their way up to Sonoma County. She also said that Uncle Jack stayed in California only a short time, and then returned to Floral. Floral no longer exists, but was six miles north—east of Winfield, which is near the Oklahoma border, about half way across the state.

Mr. Bruce Yarbrough of Hawaii is searching for information about his grandfather, Andrew Jackson Yarbrough, who is buried in the Floral cemetary. Bruce was born in Floral in 1904. Andrew Jackson Yarbrough was born in 1848 and died in 1905, and was married to ______ Emma. As the information from Helen Litton and Bruce Yarbrough are independent, there is a strong indication of family relationship of some kind here, and Andrew Jackson Yarbrough of Floral may be Uncle Jack. If so, it is somewhat curious that their father named one child after Davy Crockett and another after Andrew Jackson, as the two famous politicians were enemies at the time of Davy Crockett's death at the Alamo. They were both from Tennessee, however, and were allies in the 1820's before they became rivals for the presidency.

THE HILL HOMESTEAD

The Hill ranch is shown in a map of Sonoma County Homesteads in 1880 to lie north of the Russian River, across the river from the from the present site of the Rio Dell area, approximately bounded on the west by a line drawn from the mouth of the Green Valley Creek directly north to Westside Road. This road is so named because the river runs south past Healdsburg, turning west before reaching this area, and the road runs on the west side of the river from Healdsburg. The river runs north-west past the homestead. The Westside road is nearly parallel to the river, a quarter of a mile north-east from the river at this point. The eastern boundary is a line directed north from the river near the junction of the intersection of the Old Trenton Road with the present River Road, just down-river from Mirabelle Park. The homestead was bounded on the north by an east-west line drawn from the west boundary to the east boundary. The southern boundary is the river itself. The homestead was principally bottomlands, subject to flooding, and the mouth of Isaacs canyon above the road, with hills on either side. The next section to the north was homesteaded by Isaacs. It is largely hill country, with an old road leading up to Mt. Jackson. The original Hill homestead was 137 acres, and the Isaacs was no more than 160 acres.

This ranch lies at the boundary of Mendocino and Russian River Townships. In 1857 it is listed in Russian River Township, the place of marriage of Crockett David Yarbrough and Jamima Ann Hill. In 1870 in the census it is in Mendocino Township. In the 1880 census it is in Redwood Township, where it remained since that time. The boundaries of townships were not stabilized until Mendocino County was separated from Sonoma County in the 1870's. The retention of Mendocino Township's name recalls the days when all of Mendocino County was part of Sonoma County.

In Thompsons Atlas of Sonoma County 1878, The original Hill homestead is shown as being divided into three parts. The largest portion is in the west, and listed as the property of Mrs. Hill. About a third of the homestead is cut off in the south east section, about half of which is bottomland lying below the road, and the rest hill country above the road. The western half of this is identified as belonging to JGH, which is Joshua Gilman Hill, and the eastern half is then part of the H. Wall ranch. The Wall property is entirely in Mendocino township, and both of the Hill properties are in Redwood Township. The map shows no buildings below the road, which was farmland, but a

house above the road is seen on the JGH property, and a house and orchard are indicated for Mrs. Hill's property, above the road in the small valley at the mouth of Isaacs Canyon.

In addition to the part of the old homestead, along the eastern edge of Mrs. Hill's property, J.G. Hill is shown on this map as owning 140 acres across the river, the site of the present Rio Dell, extending along the river over the entire southern border of the original Hill homestead. This property is probably part of the 160 acres which James M and Sarah H Hill bought in Analy Township from Jacob McReynolds and wife on March 1 1864. The 1878 map shows this property as being in Analy Township.

The 1878 map also shows C.D. Yarborough (sic) as the owner of the old Isaacs Homestead, abutting the Hill homestead to the north. There is a house shown which is probably the same house which today stands about a quarter of a mile up Isaacs canyon from the site of Mrs. Hill's house. The north-eastern corner of this property is divided from the rest by the township line.

In the History of Sonoma County, p. 161, "Glen Purnell Laughlin": The testimony of Mr. Laughlin is that his mother, Martha Yarbrough was born on Crockett Yarbrough's ranch, which was formerly the old hill ranch (hill not capitalized), which was later known as the Isaaac'c Canyon Ranch, and yet later Mt. Jackson Ranch. He gives his father's name as Albert Purnell Laughlin, who was known to our part of the family as Bud Laughlin.

The original Hill homestead house was still standing in the 1920's, and is undoubtedly the house shown on the 1878 map on Mrs. Hill's property, at the mouth of Isaacs Canyon.

There is a mineral springs shown on the 1878 map, at the eastern edge of the dividing line between Mrs. Hill's and C.D. Yarbrough's properties. John Litton told me that this is on the top of a hill on the eastern side of the canyon, and he remembers remnants of a resort which once was built there to take advantage of the mineral springs as a health spa. This may have been part of the original Isaacs Canyon Resort, but surely was not part of the Mt. Jackson Resort, which operated well after 1923 according to Mrs. Nase. John Litton recently made a trip up there, finding the stage road filled with scotch broom, and a rose bush the only sign there had ever been people living there.

Some time after the death of J.G. Hill in 1879, his property came into the hands of Hamilton Litton, which he retained until the death of his wife Sara Jane Yarbrough Litton in 1922.

At some time there was a road from Isaacs canyon down to the river where there was a bridge near the mouth of Green Valley Creek. This bridge served the old Mt. Jackson resort, making a shorter run to the Forrestville railroad station. The road split the property, and both the road and bridge were purchased by Hamilton and Roy Litton about 1920. Within a year the old bridge was destroyed by a flood. [John Litton]

Hamilton appears to have sold the strip adjacent to the old Hill ranch to his son Perry Litton. After Sara Jane's death, Hamilton sold most of the property above the railroad to a development company which almost went bank-rupt developing Rio Dell. He kept a small portion of that property, running up a canyon on one edge, and built a small house and raised a garden. When the first heavy rains came and the river flooded, the canyon was filled and the the house flooded up to the mantle. His car was garaged under the house, and was completely submerged. The family built him a getaway house further up the hill to take care of future problems, but when they occured, Hamilton was stranded for several days in his escape house.

Hamilton retained some of the river frontage below the railroad tracks as he had a joint venture selling gravel with his son Roy, who also owned the old

Wall ranch shown on the 1878 map adjacent to J.G. Hill's west side property.

The ranch was sold by Jamima Ann Hill Yarbrough some time after the 1900 census, which shows her, her son Fred, her sister Emily and Billy Bowers on the ranch. Census and voter registration records show that both Lee Yarbrough and William Henry Howard were farming in the same area. Freda thought their farm to be the old homestead, but that is probably incorrect, unless her father had purchased it from his mother-in-law. The Howards left their farm some time after the 1906 earthquake, as Freda Howard Shane was born there just before the earthquake. This was probably about 1909, as the Howards and the Bevers moved to the Oakland-Richmond area about then. When Jamima sold the ranch, she gave each of her living children an amount said to be \$1,000. As Fred Yarbrough bought a business in Healdsburg in 1903, it is probable that she sold the ranch before then.

In 1923, John E. Tsaris bought 362 acres from a Mr. Wasserman, who had the bottomland planted in prunes. Mr. Wasserman had bought it some time in the 1910's according to Mr Tsaris's daughter. Mr Tsarsis thought he had only bought the bottomland, and was surprised to learn that he also owned a good deal of mountain land, including the old Isaacs homestead. As the original Isaacs and Hill homesteads were no more than 197 acres combined, the extra acres are assumed to be the J.G. Hill westside property, and possibly some of the old Wall ranch, which presumeably Perry Litton had owned. For this reason, it is suspected that Jamima had sold the property to family members. When Mr. Tsaris died, his daughter Lucille Tsaris Nase inherited the Hill ranch and any other bottomland as well as the property lying north of the original Hill Homestead. Her sister inherited the Yarbrough ranch (the Isaacs Homestead) with the old Isaacs Resort on it. She sold the Yarbrough ranch to a Mr. Lacabonne, who ran the resort as Mt. Jackson Resort. The resort has all but vanished today, but Mr. Lacabonne's daughter, Mary Lou Burke, lives on the property and also has Mirabelle Park.

Lucille Tsaris Nase sold the bottomland to West Coast Properties, a farming cooperative who planted it in grapes. West Coast sold it to the present owner, Vino Farms.

Mrs. Nase retained some of the hillside property, probably some of J.G. Hills westside property in the 1878 map, and is living there with her daughter in 1984. Only last spring (1984) an old and badly decayed house, thought to have been J.G. Hill's, was burned by the fire department. Mrs. Nase reports that there is an old cemetary at the top of a hill, but no one seems to know who is buried there.

Mrs. Nase told me that she bought her first typewriter from Lloyd Yar-brough when he had the Office Equipment store on Mendocino Ave in Santa Rosa. She said that he talked with her for hours telling the history of the property. It's too bad he never told his children about it, or wrote it down.

born in N. Carolina, and Newton lists his father as being born in Kentucky and his mother in Tennessee. Curiously, Newton lists his father and mother both as being born in Tenn in the 1880 Kansas census, even while W.H. Yarbrough was living in the same house, and gave his birthplace as Virginia. (or someone did, but surely not Newton.) Notice that in the 1880 census Jackson also says his father was born in Tenn. W.H. Yarbrough also claims birth in SC in the 1850 and 1860 censuses.

There are various discrepancies between the censuses. W.H. Yarbrough was 40 on Aug. 13, 1850, 51 on June 23 1860 and 71 on June 2, 1880. His wife, Mary M. Yarbrough was 36 on Aug. 13, 1850, 45 on June 23, 1860 and 63 on June 2, 1880. She seems to have aged only nine years per decade.

Grundy is 10 in 1850, and born in Tenn. is 19 in 1870 and born in Mo. F.G. Yarbrough is 29 in 1880, and born in Mo. His wife's name is Mary, as is Grundy's wife, but is also the wrong age.

Jackson, is listed as 6 in 1850, but Andrew Jackson Yarbrough of Cowley Co, Kan. was born in June of 1845.

ANALYSIS

The strongest evidence is that Crockett Davis Yarbrough was the son of W.H. and Mary M. Yarbrough who have been identified in the Mo. censuses of 1850 and 1860 and in the Kan. Census of 1880. Taking this as a postulate, then his family, as best it can be guessed from the data at hand is:

Under this scenario, Shedrick Newton Yarbrough is W.H. Yarbrough's brother or cousin. The other possibility is that Shedrick Newton Yarbrough is Crockett's father, and we know nothing else of that family. However, the W.H. Yarbrough family is related to Crockett in either case.

Dear Ophelia,

Thank you very much for the copy of the information on W.H. and Mary Yarbrough. I have been searching for this information for over 15 years. The oldest child is my great grandfather, Crockett David Yarbrough. The third son is Andrew Jackson Yarbrough, and is the great grandfather of Glenn Yarbrough, the popular singer (I have been in contact with his father, Bruce Yarbrough of Hawaii). We also knew about the youngest son, whose name is Newton Leonidas Yarbrough, and had one report of the second son, Grundy, of whom we know no more. We had never ever heard of any sisters, so they come as a complete surprise.

There are two mistakes on the sheet, at least according to the people they concern. Crockett gave his birth date as December 1831, and not 1832, but that is only one month off. The second is more interesting, in that Newton's middle initial is given as S on the sheet. This may come from difficulty in reading the original census form, or it may be an unintentional slip on the part of the responder. I have found a Shedrick Newton Yarbrough in the same area as Crockett and his family in the 1866 voter registration. I first thought this could be Crockett's father, but now I believe he may have been an uncle, and that Newton Leonidas was named after him. The years of birth for both Jackson and Newton correspond with our information, so I am certain that this is the correct family.

I have included the part of my family history involving the Yarbroughs. I will soon be updating this work to include the information you have so kindly provided.

By the way, Crockett always reported that both his parents were born in North Carolina, while W.H. Yarbrough is listed as born in S.C., which may be a mistake, but Mary is listed as being born in Tenn. For this reason, together with a family tradition that Crockett's mother was Eleanor Elizabeth, causes me to wonder if Mary was a second wife to W.H. Yarbrough.

4. CROCKETT DAVIS YARBROUGH 1831-1898

FAMILY TRADITION

In the family tradition, C.D. Yarbrough and his friend Billy Bowers left Missouri together to fight the Mexicans in the Mexican War (1846-48), and in time joined with the California volunteers and Hugh Porter. After the war (1848), Yarbrough and Bowers traveled to California with Porter. Later Yarbrough is reputed to have been a trail guide for wagon trains coming to California from Kansas City.

In 1852, the James Madison Hill family moved to California with one of those wagon trains. Hill had been active in the gold fields, and returned to Missouri to fetch his family. In El Dorado County Crockett courted Jamima Ann Hill, and they were married later at the Hill Homestead on the Russian River. On the marriage certificate Crockett is listed as a resident of El Dorado County.

Crockett was born in Tennessee, but moved with his family to Missouri. His family later settled near Winfield Kansas (Floral), and some of them visited Crockett later in California. Crockett's brother Newton later came to Sonoma County and lived out his life in California. Another brother, Jack, came out for a visit or a short stay, but returned to Kansas.

Several of Crockett's grandchildren knew of two of his brothers, Jack and Newton. John and Dolores Litton had a tintype with Jack, Newton and another man who they though was Crocket. Another brother may have been named Grady or Grundy. Knowledge of the parent's names had been lost before research for this history began.

Dolores Litton has written to me that the Yarbroughs, Howards and Bevers were together in Tennessee and Kansas before coming to California. She has a tintype that her mother has identified as being of Jack Yarbrough and his wife Mary, their two children (a boy and a girl), Granma Yarbrough and Dolores' great grandparents Absolem Bever and his wife from Kansas. She sent the picture of Glenn G. Yarbrough's tombstone and wrote that together with Absolem Bever, her great great grandfather Jonas Bever is also buried in the Floral Cemetary. She reported that Uncle Newton came to California with William Henry Howard from Floral, Kansas, first to San Diego, and then working their way up to Sonoma County. She also said that Uncle Jack stayed in California only a short time, and then returned to Floral. Floral no longer exists, but was six miles north-east of Winfield, which is near the Oklahoma border, about one-third of the way across the state from the eastern end.

Mr. Bruce Yarbrough of Hawaii is searching for information about his grandfather, Andrew Jackson Yarbrough, who is buried in the Floral cemetary. Bruce was born in Floral in 1904. Andrew Jackson Yarbrough was born in 1848 and died in 1905, and was married to Emma.

From Mary Shane and her mother Freda (Howard) Shane: Grandfather Crockett

David Yarbrough, had three sisters and three brothers: Melissa Freeman had 3 children, Samantha married Jud Holloway and had 10 children, Jennie married Bilt Clabaugh and had 3 children. Grundy married Bell and had 4 children, Jack married Emma and had 10 children, and Newton married Mollie and had 2 children.

RECORDS

Sonoma County census records from the latter half of the 19th century list Crockett as born in Tennessee and both his parents are listed as born in North Carolina. Billy Bowers is a Yarbrough neighbor in several of these census records, and is living in the Hill house with the remnant of Crockett's family in the 1900 census.

The Aug. 13, 1850 census of Lawrence County, Missouri, (page 269) has Crocket Yarbrough, a saddler, age 18, listed as the oldest of eight children in a Yarbrough family headed by W.H. Yarbrough, a shoe-maker, age 40, born in SC, and his wife Mary M. Yarbrough age 36, born in Tenn. Some of the other children have the names of traditional siblings of Crockett: Mary M. age 17, Grundy 10, Jackson 6, Samantha 3 and Newton L. 5 months. Two other children, Martha 13, Amanda 8, are not reported in any of the family traditions. Crocket, Mary, Martha and Grundy born in Tenn, Amanda, Jackson, Samantha and Newton born in Mo. Crocket, Mary, Martha and Grundy have attended school during the previous year.

The 1850 Lawrence Co. Mo., has William Bowers, age 25, in the same district with W.H. Yarbrough.

In Lawrence County Marriages 1845-70, Melissa Yarbrough m. Johnathon Freeman, 4 Dec. 1851.

The 1860 census of Johnson County, Missouri (page 776, dwelling 354) 23 June 1860, is the same family, but with W.H. Yarbrough at age 51, born SC, named as Yade H. Yarbrough. Also present are Mary at age 45, born Tenn., with children Andrew J. 15, b. Mo., Sarah S. 12, b. Mo., Newton 9, b. Mo., and Virginia 7, b. Mo. Yarbrough is a farmer with real estate valued at \$1200. On the same page, next house: (page 776, dwelling 355) is the family of Grundy Yarbrough, age 19, b. Mo, his wife Mary 17, b. Mo, and their son George, 4 months. Grundy is a farmer, with no real estate owned.

The Yarbroughs are no longer present in Johnson county, Mo. by the time of the 1870 census.

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

OLD TRYON COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA

Family researchers should be aware of boundary line changes that were made between North Carolina and Virginia, between North and South Carolina, and especially, in old Tryon County, N. C.

Briefly, the Caroline Grant was divided into North and South Carolina in 1729. Tryon County, N. C. was established 1768/69. from Anson County which in turn had been formed 1749 from Bladen County, N. C. Later, Tryon County was dissolved, with a part of it becoming Lincoln County, N. C.

Meanwhile, both North and South Carolina had been granting land along their mutual border since 1752, with Tryon County's southern boundary left open and which, included the present day counties of Greenville, Laurens, Spartanburg, Cherokee, Union, York and Chester, South Carolina - all or in part.

On June 4, 1772 a survey was made to establish the boundary between the two states. Soon thereafter the people petitioned the King in an attempt to save their land because of the tangled state of affairs. Two strips of land eleven miles wide were exchanged to settle the boundary dispute. Anson and Mecklenburg County's in North Carolina lost a portion of their land which became a part of York County, South Carolina. To the north, along the line between North Carolina and Virginia, the people in the Virginia counties of Washington and Grayson were parttime residents of North Carolina until a new boundary line was established.

The witness to the deed Peter Harris died, the widow Harris nec Susannah Hartgrove married Samuel Kuykendall on 12 Feb 1791 in Lincoln County, N.C. Her second husband, Samuel Kuykendall died 16 Nov 1810 in York County, S.C.

These records in various places yet Yarborough and Kuykendall, each married to a Hartgrove woman, may have lived as neighbors and continuous owners of acreage in the area known as old Tryon County, N.C. Boundaries were changed, new counties formed, but the location may have remained the same.



Searching for Indexed Terms¹

First, find the name or phrase (search term) in the index. Then, from the menu bar, select "Edit", and then "Find" or press CTRL+F. A search field will appear in the upper right corner of the page. Enter the search term into this field and press ENTER. If the search term is not found, nothing will happen; otherwise, the search term will be displayed on the first page in which it occurs. Repeated pressing of the ENTER key will high-light other occurrences within the file. Use the left and right arrow buttons to the right of the search field to look ahead or to look backwards for other occurrences of the term in the document
