Preface

These records are the legacy of our Yarbrough family researchers, to whom much is owed. The known family researchers include Jean Baker, Ann Y. Broadbent, Mary Y. Daniel, Frances (Rea) Donohue, Betty Humrighouse, Pauline Gray, Evelyn Goble, Nelle Morris Jenkins, Ophelia Kessler, Frances Lockwood, Karen Mazock Renee Smelley, Dorothy Svec, Jeanette Wilson, Cleveland "Cy" Yarbrough, Edna Yarbrough, George A. Yarbrough, and Robert Price Yarbrough.

The originals of these volumes are being kept for the benefit of future generations by the Williamson County Library, Franklin, Tennessee.

No claims of accuracy or authentication of the material herein are made or may be assumed. Many of these records have been superseded by subsequent research. Hence, there are records which are erroneous and unreliable; it would have been a Herculean task to attempt to correct all of them. Fortunately, there are only a few critical genealogical facts that are involved, and which are correctly stated here:

- Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough was never married to Frances Proctor;
- Ambrose Yarbrough did not immigrant from Yorkshire; he is now believed to be a descendant of Richard the Immigrant;
- There are so far only two proven sons of Old Richard John and Richard II;
- There is so far no evidence proving Joshua Yarborough I to be a descendant of Old Richard.
- The "Old Country" referred to in old documents and letters is the Colony of Virginia, not England or the Old World.
- There were not seven brothers who immigrated from "the old country"; in fact, it now appears there were three brothers and four sons of the brothers. Which were the fathers and which were the sons are so far unknown.

In spite of these inaccuracies, these records comprise much of our history and some of our accomplishments. There are pages whose print quality is so poor that word recognition was not possible. In spite of that, at least partial capability for searching these volumes is provided, as well as an index to each volume. Nonetheless, the viewer is cautioned to perform his/her own due diligence in connection with any use of this material.

The various spellings of the Yarbrough surname have never been applied consistently, even within a given family. To the extent possible, the names in the index reflect the names used on the source pages; where it wasn't clear as to which might be the proper spelling, the spelling used is "Yarbrough".

William Yarbrough Sr. was born on 4 January 1774 in North Carolina. He was in Greenville, South Carolina for the 1800 and 1810 censuses. Family records of Wade Hampton Yarbrough, b. 1809, give his mother's name as Martha, so Martha was the wife in the 1810 census. Martha was born in South Carolina on 22 March 1780, so she could also be the wife in the 1800 census. The last location we have for William and Martha Yarbrough is in the 1850 census of Gibson County, Tennessee where they are living next to William Lewis and Mahulda Yarbrough Sanders, between the towns of Milan and Trenton, not far from the Rutherford Fork of the Obion River.

The children of this William Yarbrough Sr. have been enumerated, (with errors) by Mrs. Ida Walling, dcd., of McMinnville, TN. Some independent proof exists for three sons of William Yarbrough Sr.: In a Power-of-Attorney, William Yarbrough named his son James of Hardeman County. Then, in a letter from James' son Newton to Benjamin, Hampton and Benjamin are referred to as uncles of his. Newton also mentioned Reuben Yarbrough, but did not indicate his relationship. There is circumstantial evidence that Jephtha, William Jr., Susanna Jane, Mahulda and George P. were children of William Sr.. Sarah Yarbrough Howard has been taken as a daughter of William because of Ida Walling's descent from her. There are no known public records connecting Sarah to the family, but the Greenville SC connection can be taken as evidence.

Numbering of generations is by Roman numeral, and family group placement is by Arabic numeral, except unknown family group placement is a question mark. The earliest known ancestors of the Yarbrough-Davis researchers are Conrad and Sarah Davis. Three children of William Yarbrough Sr. married great grandchildren of Conrad and Sarah Davis. These great-grandchildren are in the fourth generation, so William and Martha are placed in the third generation.

Mrs. Walling also claimed that Rachel was buried next to William Yarbrough, Sr. in a cemetery near Toone, Hardeman County, Tennessee. However, William Yarbrough's wife was Martha from before 1810 and up to 1850, so it is unbelievable that Rachel Shelby could be buried next to William. Mrs. Walling claimed she received this information from Franklin Pierce Yarbrough, a grandson of William Yarbrough, Sr. She may have misconstrued the given information.

The William and Martha Yarbrough family left Greenville, South Carolina, around 1818, going first to Overton County, Tennessee where on 15 April 1820, William Yarbrough sold two Negro girls to Sterling Harris of Jackson Co. Tennessee⁵. A William Yarbro is in the 1820 Census of Overton County, TN⁶, with a family listing corresponding to known ages of most children, except that Hampton is listed as under 10, when he would become 11 that year, but may have been 10 at the time of the census.

A William Yarbrough purchased a land grant in White County in 1812, but there is no tax list evidence that he occupied that land. William Yarbrough Sr. first appears on tax lists in 1824, and he bought and sold real estate in White County between 1824 and 1848. He had several properties on Calfkiller Creek and elsewhere near Sparta, and lived in White County from about 1823 through 1835. On 26 Feb 1828 William Yarbrough sold 90 Acres in White County to Reuben Yarbrough, witnessed by George Yarbrough. In 1836 William Yarbrough Sr. gave Power of Attorney to Jeptha Yarbrough to sell property to Thomas Gibbons. Then in 1837 William Yarbrough Sr. gave Power of Attorney to his son Hampton to sell further land. His sons Jephtha, William Jr., James and Hampton also held land in White County. William Sr.'s last land transaction in White County was to legally transfer 12 acres to John Porter Howard. Susanna Jane Yarbrough married John Porter Howard in 1829, and they lived out their lives in White County. The oldest daughter of William Yarbrough Sr., Sarah Yarbrough, married Robert Charles Howard in Greenville, South Carolina, but came

to White County Tennessee in what was apparently a large migration which included this Yarbrough family, J. Pennington's family, several Wallings and other Howards.

By letter, Brother William Yarbrough and Sister Martha Yarbrough were received into the Church at Mill Creek, Hardeman County, in August of 1842. They are believed to be the Wm Yarbough family on page 211 of the 1840 census of Gibson County 8 , where the census taker has slipped one column in the female tally. On the same page is a Wm Yarbey family, which is thought to be that of William Yarbrough Jr.. In the 1850's William Yarbrough Sr. sold land in White County to sons William Jr. and George P. Yarbrough, but we don't know when William Sr. obtained these lands or if he ever lived in Hardeman County. In 1846 William Yarbrough Sr. bought 133 3/4 acres near Rutherford along the Rutherford Fork of the Obion River in Gibson County. He sold this land to his son James in 1854, the year that Martha died. In the 1850 census of Gibson County William and Martha Yarbrough are living next to Lewis and Mahulda Sanders9, their youngest daughter, between Trent and Milan. It is not known where William and Martha died. Lewis Sanders died in 1851 and Mahulda remarried, James died soon after Martha, so the nearest remaining relative that William could have lived with would have been son Benjamin, who is listed as living in the town of Gibson, not far from the Sanders' place. There is a possibility that both William Yarbrough Sr. and Martha Yarbrough are buried in the Sanders Cemetery in Gibson County, perhaps in the part that is now covered by a pond.

IV.1. SARAH YARBROUGH HOWARD PENNINGTON

Sarah Yarbrough's descendant Ida G. Walling of McMinnville, TN (deceased) claimed that William Yarbrough Sr. and his wife Rachel Shelby Yarbrough are buried in the William Yarbrough Jr. cemetery near the town of Toone in Hardeman County, TN, and that William Yarbrough Sr. ended his days living with William Yarbrough Jr.'s family. We Know that Ida Walling is wrong about Rachel Shelby being William Yarbrough Sr.'s wife in Tennessee, and there is no other confirmation that William Yarbrough Sr. is buried in that cemetery, so Ida Walling may have been mistaken in that fact as well. She claimed that Franklin Pierce Yarbrough gave her that information, but she didn't make it public until after he had died. Ida Walling had obtained D.A.R. membership on the basis of Revolutionary War Service of William Yarbrough Sr., who was born in 1774 and certainly did not serve in a war that ended when he was 6 years old. The D.A.R. has disallowed this service, as it belongs to a different William Yarbrough (d. 1793). Ida Walling had a Revolutionary War headstone placed in the cemetery near Toone, with Williams birth listed as in 1766. This headstone should be removed, as it was obtained and placed there under false claims.

Mrs. Ida G. Walling disseminated information concerning her Yarbrough ancestors containing many errors. All claims by her must be verified by independent sources. The following is a compilation of Ida Walling's published information. Verified errors are underlined. Other probable errors can be

Letters, Ida G. (Mrs Alonzo Nelson) Walling, "Rebel Hill," McMinnville, Warren County, Tennessee, to C.K. Shelby.

(a) Aug. 2, 1932,-

My great-grandmother was Sarah Yarbrough, born in North Carolina about 1793 and died in 1882, Her mother was a Shelby. Sarah married Robert Charles Howard (b. Charleston, S.C.) about 1812. Their oldest daughter Minerva was born in 1813. My grandmother, Mahala Howard, another daughter was born in Greenville, South Carolina, December 1815. She married a Walling.

There were Yarbroughs in Charlotte, North Carolina, also. A Raleigh genealogist told me that Moses's sixth child, Margaret, was born in 1772. I found a William Yarbrough and Robert C. Howard were granted land in White County, Tennessee, in 1824. I know that my Shelby-Yarbrough lived in Sparta in that county in the early twenties and that they moved to what was then called the "Western Districts" about 1830. South Carolina had no marriage license law until 1911. I am trying to find out the identity of the parents of the above Sarah Yarbrough.

(b) Jun. 5, 1933

I have at last found my Shelby connection. Goodspeed's History of Obion County, Tennessee, mentions a Jepsy (Jeptha) Yarbrough, son of William, a pioneer of Hardeman County, and on inquiry I learned of a Mr. F.P. Yarbrough at Toone, an undertaker, now eighty-six years old. He is a grandson of William Yarbrough, Sr., and wife Rachel Shelby, daughter of Moses Shelby. They died in the home of his father, who was William Yarbrough Jr., she in 1855 (ae abt. 81) and he in 1859 (ar 93).

The children of William and Rachel (Shelby) Yarbrough, the first five born on Dutch Buffalo creek in North Carolina, were: Sarah, b. 1792 (my gt-grandmother), m. Robert Charles Howard; Benjamin (killed in battle?); Hulda, m. ---- Sanders; Jeptha, m. Lavina Isham; William Jr. b. 1804m m. 1. Gibbons, m2. Hannah Davis; George, m. Celia Davis, Hannah's sister; Hampton; Susannah, b. 1812, m. Jack Howard.

William Yarbrough, Sr., was from Halifax County <u>and served</u> from that district in the Revolution under Captain Brinkley and was a captain in the War of 1812, living then in Nashville, Tennessee. He removed in 1824 to White County.

It was in White county that my grandmother, Mahala Howard, married Hiram Kilgore Walling. After 1830 the Yarbroughs lived in Hardin County.

William and Rachel are buried two and a half miles north of Toone, Hardeman County, in the Yarbrough graveyard. I happen to be Presbyterian.

(c) July 3, 1933,-

When I was ten years old (am now forty-five) a young lady in Evansville, Indiana, where I lived, married a man (from Ohio, I

think) named Frank Chapline. I was then living with my Father's sister, Mother having died when I was fifteen months old. Father often came to see me and I remember my auntie telling me on one occasion about Sadie Bennett's marriage, at which he remarked, "Some of Mother's people were Chaplines." Now, do you suppose that Moses's wife was Isabella Chapline, either a daughter or sister of Joseph?

I am waiting for a blank to fill in requesting a government marker for the Revolutionary soldier, William Yarbrough. Neither his nor Rachel's grave is marked, but old Mr. Yarbrough knows exactly where they lie, for he "cleans off the graves" every year. The old gentleman wrote that Rachel had dark eyes and hair; but that the Yarbroughs were fair.

note: The following is quoted from a booklet on the Yarbroughs that Pauline Gray found in the Mormon Library in Salt Lake City. Unfortunately she did not copy the title page. However, by comparing ages of Mrs. Walling to other information, it appears to have been written about 1954.

(This from Mrs. Ida G. Walling of "Rebel Hill" McMinnville, Tennessee.)

"I do not have a great deal of Yarbrough data. Some years ago a woman from Iowa came to see me, got from me the Yarbrough Coat-of-Arms, and went on to N.C. to visit some Yarboroughs, and came back with most fantastic deductions. Somewhere in the attic I may still have her letters, but while she had lots of odds and ends, there was no proof of lines. I have only a few dates and got them from an old man at Toone, Hardeman Co., Tennessee, where William is buried.

South Carolina had no marriage license records until 1911, so wills are the only proof, and the Yarboroughs must have all been poor. I do not leave my D.A.R. ancestor papers open to the public, because I like to know who wants to use them and why. I will, however, give you an outline.

"I am a daughter of Felix Grundy Walling, born in 1839. I was a Walling before I married a distant cousin, Alonzo Nelson Walling, who died in 1947. I am 66 years old and teaching my last year. Felix Grundy Walling's mother was Mahala Howard, who married Hiram Kilgore Walling. She was the daughter of Sarah Yarbrough and Robert Charles Howard, who was born in 1796 and died in 1883. Mahala was borne in Greenville, Green Co., S.C., Dec 24, 1815, died March 21, 1876. (This is an error, as there is no Greene Co., in S.C.)

Sarah Yarborough, born 1796, was daughter of Rachel Shelby, born 1776, died 1855. She married William Yarbrough in 1792. Rachel was a daughter of Moses and wife, Isabella. William Yarbrough was the son of Manoah Yarbrough, born 1766 and died March 20, 1859. William Yarborough, born in N.C. 1766, died Hardeman Co., Tenn., March 20, 1859. Residence during Revolution was Halifax Co., N.C. (from affidavits of Henry Jones Cabitt, Wisconsin, and Franklin P. Yarbrough, Toome, Tennessee.) Service - Pvt. soldier Wm. Brinkley's Co., N.C. Col. Samuel Jarvis, 1st. N.C. Regiment, Halifax District. (N.C. Roster, p. 623)

Children of William Yarborough and Rachel Shelby: Sarah m. Robert C. Howard and Joshua Pennington; Benjamin, Hampton, Jeptha m. Lavinia Isham, William m. Gibbons and Hannah Davis, George, Hulda m. Sanders, John m. Cath Davis, Susanna, b. 1/9/1812, m. Jack Howard 1/1/1829, Reuben.

William Yarborough moved to White Co., Tenn., then to what was called Western District, and is now Hardeman Co., Tenn. I

suppose he got land for Revolutionary service.

note: The following is from Yarbrough-Yarborough and Allied Families, a Quarterly by Nelle Morris Jenkins, Volume 1 pages 82 and 83. The direct author is Mrs. Jenkins. The year of publication is 1961, so Mrs. Walling would be then about 73 years old. RBY

There is another mention of the name Jeptha Yarborough. A letter to me from Mrs. Walling of McMinnville, Tenn., states that hi she is the daughter of Mahala Howard Walling, whose mother was daughter of Sarah Yarborough and Robert C. Howard. This Sarah was born in 1796, was the daughter of Rachel Shelby born 1776. Rachel Shelby married William Yarborough born 1766, died 20 March 1859 the son of Manoah Yarborough. (This Manoah was the brother of Zachariah who was the father of my Manoah and of the Henry Yarbrough who went to Tipton, Co., Tenn.)Mrs. Walling said that her William Yarborough lived in Halifax District County, N.C. during the Revolution and upon the affidavit of several, among whom was Franklin P. Yarborough., he was given a pension. William Yarborough moved to White County, Tenn., then to Hardeman County, (then called Western Dist. William and Rachel (Shelby) had 10 children: Sarah, Benjamin, Hampton, Jeptha, William, George, Hulda, John, Susanna, Reuben. Mrs. Walling said that William Yarborough is buried in Toome, Hardeman County, Tenn. (To Dorothy Svec:) Mrs. Walling is an ex-school teacher and paints. She does nice work painting the Yarborough Coat of Arms, in case you would like to contact her, her address is Mrs. Ida Walling, Rebel Hill, McMinnville, Tenn. I have not heard from her for several years, but I presume she is yet living.

... William Yarbrough who married Rachel Shelby (both born 1766) and he died in Hardeman County, Tenn., 1859 was a son of Manoah who went to Georgia - so he was a first cousin of my Manoah. This William was a Rev. soldier and lived in Halifax County, N.C. during the Revolution. He received his pension on affidavit of Franklin P. Yarborough of Toome, Tenn. William and Rachel Yarborough had a son Reuben who was perhaps the youngest. Other children were Benjamin, Hampton, Jeptha who married Lavinia Isham, William who married (1) a Gibbons and (2) a Davis, George, Hulda, John, Susannah and the (hte above) Reuben. Mrs. Walling of McMinnville, Tenn. Sent this to me - she is descended from ...

Shelby genealogical researchers have disallowed the claim that William Yarbrough married Rachel Shelby until independent verification can be obtained. Ida Walling is their only source of that information. They are aware that William Yarbrough was married to Martha throughout his life in Tennessee.

A Helen W. Tomlinson of Brunsville, MN compiled an undated Family Group sheet which Karen Mazock sent to Melba Tullos and Karen Lambert. This deals with the family of Robert Charles Howard and Sarah Yarbrough. It says Howard b. 1789 in Charleston SC., married Sarah in Greenville, Greenville Co, SC in 1812, died 19 May 1867 in Mineral Point, Iowa Co, MN. Sarah and Robert Charles Howard were divorced and he went to Wisconsin, changing his name to Hoard. Sarah Yarbrough Howard married Joshua Pennington after the 1840 census, and they moved to Warren County, Tennessee before 1860.

The information on Sarah is obviously tainted by Ida Walling, indicating birth in NC ca 1893 with parents of William Yarbrough and Rachel Shelby. Under places of residence are NC, Greenville SC, Sparta TN, Spencer TN, MO. Her death place is listed as Sedalia, Pettis Co MO in Apr 1883. It has the two oldest daughters born in Greenville in 1813 and 1815, and showing the eldest, Minerva, going to Minnesota with Hoard after marrying Warrington Jones in 1830, probably in Sparta TN. In a note: Hoard was in Mineral Point Wisconsin by 1828. Sarah divorced Robert Charles Howard and lived with daughter Mahala Walling on the Daniel Walling Estate on Spencer Mt. in Van Buren Co TN. There are 5 children listed on the sheet, and another sheet has a sixth. The children of Robert Charles Howard and Sarah Yarbrough are:

The fact that Martha's son is named Shelby Walling may have been the source of Ida Walling's notion that she was descended from a Shelby. Perhaps the Wallings were so descended.

IV.3. JEPTHA YARBROUGH

Jephtha Yarbrough first appears in White County, TN in the 1828 Tax List 85 1/2 acres of school land and 30 acres of other land. The same are listed for him in 1829. In the 1830 census of White County, TN he is listed with another adult male in his age range, a female in the same range, and a daughter under 5 years old. From later censuses Jeptha was born in 1800/1801, his wife is Levinia (Isham) and they have eight listed children 10. As Jeptha acted as attorney in White County for William Yarbrough and James Yarbrough in 1835, and is listed in the 1840 Hardeman County Census, he came to Hardeman County

between 1835 and 1840. He appears to be the second of this Yarbrough family to settle in Hardeman County, and he remained there the rest of his life. Jeptha Yarbrough sold land in Hardeman Co. in 1849 and 1850, and a Jeptha Yarbrough¹¹ bought property in 1853 and 1858 in Hardeman County. The Estate of Jeptha Yarbrough sold land in 1872 to W.H. Yarbrough, so our Jeptha Yarbrough died shortly before then. A J.W. Yarbrough bought and sold 109 acres in 1859, and a W.J. Yarbrough bought property in 1873.

HARDEMAN COUNTY, TENNESSEE FAMILY OF JEPTHA AND LAVENIA ISHAM YARBROUGH By Karen Lambert

William Yarbrough I and Rachel Shelby had several children who lived in Hardeman County, Tennessee, where William I is buried. Jeptha Yarbrough and William A Yarbrough (II) settled in that county and their descendants remain there today. Jeptha was born around 1801 in North Carolina. He is found in White County in Capt. Malory's Company or District in 1828, and Bradford's Company in 1835 on tax lists. Jeptha Yarbrough sold property in Hardeman County Tennessee in 1849 and 1850. There is no record of the acquisition of this property in Hardeman County's Deed Books. He bought land in 1853 and 1858 in Hardeman County. His heirs sold land in 1872.

Jeptha Yarbrough married Lavenia Isham who was born in 1805. Jeptha and Lavenia are buried in an old cemetery on the farm of A.E. Smith Jr. near Toone, Tennessee. Her headstone is broken into several pieces but the date of birth is readable. Only a footstone remains for J.Y.. Lavenia and Jeptha had eight children (U.S. Census, 1860):

W.I. Yarbrough is buried in the cemetery with Jeptha and Lavenia, and this may be their son William. William Ira Yarbrough is listed on the Hardeman County Tenn. Confederate Pension List, naming his wife as Lucretia. A William H. Yarbrough married Catherine Davis in the Hardeman County Marriage Records, and W. H. Yarbrough purchased the land from the Jeptha Yarbrough heirs in 1872. Probably Wm. H. is not Jeptha's son William Ira Yarbrough, but could be another relative of Jeptha's.

In the following, various censuses, marriage records of Hardeman County and

Gibson County and various information from researchers have been used to construct the family of Jeptha and Lavinia Yarbrough. Neither the name Horace nor the information on twins is in the 1860 Census Index, and most of the marriages are uncertain. If Hampton's name is Wade Hampton, after his uncle, then he would be the person who bought the property after Jeptha died.

IV.4. WILLIAM YARBROUGH, Jr.

William Yarbrough Jr. is first found in the White County Tax lists in 1828, but has not been found in the 1830 census there. The William Yarbrough Jr. family was probably in the Gibson County, Tennessee, census in 1840, and first appear in the Hardeman County census in 1850. They settled near Toone. William had married Hannah Davis, a daughter of Augustus Parks Davis, who was listed with the William Yarbrough Jr. family along with his youngest children in the 1850 census¹². Augustus' property was East and next to that of William Yarbrough Jr..

HARDEMAN COUNTY, TENNESSEE FAMILY OF WILLIAM YARBROUGH AND HANNAH ADA DAVIS by Karen Lambert

William Yarbrough I had another son, William (II), who lived in Hardeman County. There is a Wm Yarbro in Overton County TN in the 1820 Census and on the tax list of that county in 1823. He was in White County TN in the later 1820's and in the 1830 Census. There were two William Yarbroughs listed in the 1840 census in Gibson county TN that fit the ages and family ages for William I and William II. William II bought 175 acres in Hardeman County from his father in 1852. There was no record of this land through 1874.

According to a bible record transcribed by Rebecca Watson, a descendant of William Yarbrough II (this bible was in the possession of another descendant and has since been destroyed). William Yarbrough married Hannah Ada Davis on 2/25/1836. Hannah was born 6/18/1814 and died 5/15/1864. However Mrs. Watkins says the page this was on was very hard to read and this may have been 1884. Hannah was living in the later census records, so probably the correct date is 6/16/1884. Another transcription of the same bible record listed Martha Martella as one of the children, but this child was not included on Mrs. Watson's bible record. William and

IV.5. JAMES YARBROUGH

Several children of William Yarbrough Sr. settled in Hardeman County, Tennessee. James Yarbrough, whom William identified as his son and as living in Hardeman County in a letter granting James Power of Attorney on 27 Oct 1835, was probably the first of this Yarbrough family to settle there. James bought the property of Peter Howard at a Sheriffs' Sale in White County in 1829. On 9 Nov 1835 James gave Jeptha Yarbrough Power of Attorney to convey 53 1/2 acres to Thomas Gibbons in White County, which indicates he preceded Jeptha to Hardeman County. James Yarbrough received a land grant in Hardeman County in 1836. He sold Hardeman property in 1838 to John L. Weed and in 1847 to H.L. Doyle, and he moved to Gibson County, Tennessee, before the 1850 census. In Gibson County in 1838 James bought 640 acres from Lewis Sander, which he later sold to East Tennessee College13. In 1854 James purchased 133 3/4 Acres in Gibson County from William Yarbrough. James was the original executor of Lewis Sanders' estate, and had guaranteed Benjamin Yarbrough's guardianship of the minor children of Lewis and Mahulda Sanders. James moved to Henry County, Tennessee about 1855, and died there in early 1856. In his letter of 12 Feb 1855 to uncle Benjamin Yarbrough, James' son Newton mentions his father's health and urges Ben to come visit him in the spring. Newton says to send his letters to massadonia, (Macedonia?) Carroll County, which must be the nearest post office. In this same letter he mentions a letter from uncle Hampton saying they have bought land in Missouri. Wade Hampton Yarbrough is known to have purchased 120 acres near Columbus, Jackson Township of Johnson County, Missouri on 1 Dec 1854.

Newton R. Yarbrough signed an affidavit on 11 July 1852 attesting Rebecca A. Yarbrough was resident in Gibson County, and so eligible to marry James Davis in that county. Rebecca Armstrong is in the James Yarbrough family in the 1850 Gibson County census. Possibly this James Davis is a son of Augustus Parks Davis. James Yarbrough had another son, William who was 14 in the 1850 census. It is possible that this is the William H. Yarbrough who married Catherine Davis, youngest daughter of Augustus Parks Davis. A William H. Yarbrough witnessed the sale of property by William Yarbrough Sr. to William Yarbrough Jr. in 1851, and it is questionable that a 15 year old boy could witness a deed. In the 1840 Hardeman County census of James Yarbrough lists

another male born 1830-1835 who is probably another son, possibly the Joseph H. Yarbrough who owed William Lewis Sanders \$12 on a note due 5 Jan 1845 in the estate papers.

JAMES YARBROUGH
(W. James Yarbrough)
by Wanda Johnson

James Yarbrough was born around 1806 in South Carolina. He was a son of William and Martha Yarbrough and a brother to Benjamin Yarbrough. His wife was Martha who was born around 1801 in Virginia.

James Yarbrough, Benjamin Yarbrough and several other men were named as administrators of the Lewis Sanders estate in 1852. James served in that capacity until 1854 when Benjamin took over the duties.

Probably in January of 1855 James, Martha, N.R. and Eurilda moved from Gibson County to Henry County, TN. (N.R., R.N. and Newton R. are used at various times. I believe these all refer to the same person). At least two older children remained in Gibson County 14 : Rebecca Yarbrough Davis who married James Davis, and possibly an older son.

James Yarbrough purchased 124 3/4 acres on 14 March 1855 in Henry County, TN. which was recorded 24 July 1855. On March 14, 1856, an inventory of the estate of James Yarbrough was submitted to the clerk. Administrator was N.R. Yarbrough. None of the names at the sale were familiar except Martha, N.R. and William Yarbrough (possibly the older child). An inventory of notes held by James Yarbrough was also submitted. Some of these date to 1835, but no county is given, and the names are very unclear.

Newton R. Yarbrough married Mary F. Anderson 12 December 1865 in Carroll County, TN. Eurilda Yarbrough married Lafayette Young on 22 November 1860 in Henry County. According the 1880 census of Henry County TN, 9th Civil District, Eurilda is listed as Childers, obviously a second marriage.

N.R./R.N. Yarbrough's will was dated 15 November 1911 and recorded in Henry County court Minutes 31 March 1925. "I give, devise, bequeath unto my son, James N. Yarbrough his heirs and assigns of State and County above said who now resides with me my entire farm on which I live." This being the same 124 3/4 acres purchased by James Yarbrough in 1855. He named one Grandson, William Gilbert Yarbrough, to whom he gave \$10.00. The remainder was given to James N. No other children or heirs were listed.

James N. Yarbrough, 2/29/1876 - 3/3/1933, is buried in the Shiloh Church Cemetery in Carroll County, TN, just a few miles from the Henry County line. No other Yarbroughs are listed as buried there, but it is an old cemetery with many unmarked graves. The Yarbrough stone appears to not be in the correct position according to the stones around it.

No other descendants have been found at this point. 1 April 1992.

IV.6. WADE HAMPTON YARBROUGH

Wade Hampton Yarbrough was born April 21, 1809 in Greeneville County, South Carolina. His parents were William and Martha Yarbrough 15. Wade Hampton Yarbrough married Mary M. Davis in Sparta Tennessee about 1830, and carried on the business of farming several pieces of property there until about 184116.

Mary M. Davis was a daughter of Jonathan C. Davis. She was born in Sparta, White County, Tennessee on 28 August 1814¹⁷. In 1840 they were living next to Jonathan C. Davis¹⁸ near Rock Island. In 1841 Hampton Yarbrough and Owen Bates sold their (jointly owned) land, originally a grant to Jonathan C. Davis. Then these Yarbroughs and some relatives of Mary M. Davis Yarbrough went to Dade County, Missouri, where Wade Hampton Yarbrough pursued the trade of shoemaker and Saddler. In the 1850 census of Dade Co MO we find Owen Bates¹⁹ who was probably Mary's brother-in-law. They were in Lawrence Co MO for the 1850 census²⁰.

Lawrence County was organized from parts of Dade and Barry Counties on Feb 14, 1845, so this Yarbrough family and that of Mary's cousin Maxwell Davis²¹ were among the earliest inhabitants of the newly established town of Mount Vernon, which was laid out also in 1845. In 1848 Wade Hampton Yarbrough was in a partnership with Rufus M. Elsey, a saddler, in purchasing a shop on a small lot in Mount Vernon²². The next year Wade Hampton Yarbrough bought Rufus out²³ and in 1850 sold it to John S. Williams²⁴.

Wade Hampton and Mary M.Yarbrough went to Johnson County, Missouri, purchasing property near the town of Columbus in Jackson township to take up farming, just over the LaFayette County line, from where Rufus M. Elsey is

found in the 1850 census. Hampton's property had two parcels, one of 40 and the other 80 acres. It was purchased for \$200 from Samuel and Lucretia Cornett on 1 Dec 1854^{25} .

Wade Hampton Yarbrough's family is in Johnson County MO for the 1860 census²⁶.

In January of 1862 the worst in Johnson County of the violence of the war between the states took place. Union soldiers from Kansas (Jayhawkers) who had lost some of their number in an ambush in western Johnson County returned to wreak vengeance on South sympathizers. This Jayhawk regiment robbed and burned about forty homes in the south-west part of the county. Jayhawk troops were then sent to the Columbus area, but were tricked by the towns people into an ambush where 5 Kansans were killed and many more wounded. In retaliation, Columbus was burned along with surrounding area homes of some 50 Southern sympathizers²⁷. Two of Wade Hampton Yarbrough's sons and two future sons-in-law somehow ended up in Union uniforms, in spite of the fact that they were all Southerners by birth.

In 1864 Wade Hampton and Mary M. Yarbrough sold their Johnson County property to son Felix Grundy for \$700²⁸, but they remained on the tax lists through 1867. They are found in the 1870 census of Bourbon County²⁹, where they remained for about two years, moving on to Cowley County around 1871. They are in Richland Township of Cowley County in the 1880 census.Crockett, their oldest son had gone to Sonoma County, California, but the three remaining sons and two daughters are also in Cowley Co, KS at that time. Their oldest daughter has settled in Labette Co, KS.

IV.7. SUSANNA JANE YARBROUGH HOWARD

Susanna Jane Yarbrough was born in South Carolina, presumably in Greenville, on 19 January 1812, and died 16 Dec 1853 in Sparta, White County, TN. She married John Porter Howard on 1 January 1829. Robert J. Howard of Morrison TN in 1989 wrote that John Porter Howard and Susanna Jane Yarbrough were both born in Greenville SC, and that in White county they obtained a land grant³⁰ of 640 acres. William Yarbrough Sr.'s last land transaction in White County was on 10 Oct 1848 to legally transfer 12 acres to John Porter Howard.

IV.8. MAHULDA YARBROUGH SANDERS MATHIS

Mahulda Yarbrough probably met William Lewis Sanders in Gibson County after the Yarbroughs moved there from White County. There is no record of Sanders in White County. The first recorded contact of a Yarbrough with Lewis Sanders is in 1838 in Gibson County TN, when James Yarbrough purchased 640 acres from a Lewis Sander. However, the oldest son of Lewis and Mahulda is William Lewis Sanders Jr., who was born about 1836, so Mahulda and Lewis Sanders were married in 1835 or earlier. As William Yarbrough Sr. is still on the tax lists in White County as late as 1832, it is unlikely that the Yarbroughs went to Gibson County before about 1833. Both William Yarbrough Sr. and James Yarbrough gave Power-of-attorney to Jeptha in 1835, indicating they were already gone from White County at that time. So, in all likelihood,

William Lewis Sanders and Mahulda Yarbrough were married in 1834 or 1835. In the 1840 census, William and Martha Yarbrough are near the town of Rutherford, which is about 10 miles north-west of the Sanders place. In the 1850 census they are in the next dwelling from the Sanders.

Wanda Johnson wrote that William Lewis Sanders was born 1 January 1772 in South Carolina, where he was appointed constable for Union County in 1796; that he is in the 1800 Union Co SC census and in the 1810 and 1820 censuses of Chester Co SC.; that there is an L. Saunders in the 1830 census of Chester Co SC who may be Lewis Sanders; and that Lewis Sanders first appears on the Tax List of Gibson Co TN in 1836. Note that in the 1850 Gibson Co TN Census, his name is Lewis Saunders. As Lewis Sanders died on 1 September 1852, the 1850 census shows all of the known children of Lewis and Mahulda Sanders³¹.

After Lewis Sanders' death, both James Yarbrough and Benjamin Yarbrough served as executor of Lewis Sanders' estate. In the inventory of notes and accounts of Lewis Sanders (4 Feb 1853?) there are two notes of particular interest. One is a note for payment of articles purchased at the estate sale which is for \$55.50 cosigned by William Yarbrough and Mahulda Sanders. The other is an old note on Joseph H? Yarbrough, due 5 Jan 1845, for twelve dollars, with the words in solvent and dead. This may be James Yarbrough's missing son who was in the same age range as Newton in the 1840 Hardeman Co TN census. There is almost overwhelming circumstantial evidence that Mahulda is a sister of James and Benjamin and a daughter of William and Martha Yarbrough.

Mahulda married Elisha Mathis in 1853, and is not found in Gibson County until on 24 Feb 1880 she signed a Quit-Claim in favor of Lafayette Sanders, her son.

MAHULDA YARBROUGH SANDERS (Matilda Mahulda Yarbrough)

Mahulda Yarbrough was born 17 September 1817. She probably married William Lewis Sanders in 1831. Actual date and location are unknown. She is probably the daughter of William and Martha Yarbrough. They were living next door, or very close to, Mahulda in both the 1840 and 1850 Gibson Co TN Censuses. James and Benjamin were administrators of the estate of her husband, Lewis Sanders.

Four children were born to Mahulda Sanders: William Lewis, George Washington, Martha H. Pernelia, and James Lafayette.

The census records say Mahulda was born in SC, but the <u>family</u> says "9 miles from Sparta, White County, TN". Larry Morris has this figured out:

Census Taker: "Mrs. Sanders, where were you born?"

Mahulda: "I was born in SC."

Grandchild: "Grandmaw, where were you raised?" Mahulda: "White County, 9 miles from Sparta, TN."

Probably any variation of this scenario will produce the same results, especially if Mahulda was born in SC and moved soon afterward to TN. There is another remote possibility, but for now I am going with SC.

The census records say she cold not read or write, yet the family has a small handbook of poems that belonged to her. This book also contains the name "John Pennington", and Mahulda's and Lewis Sanders' birthdates. The letter that accompanied her application for widow's pension is signed, but not with an X.

In 1853, Mahulda married Elisha Mathis. It has not been established where she spent the next 20 years. As far as we know, there were no children from this marriage. On 20 March 1878, Mathis applied for a pension on service during the war of 1812. It was rejected. He was 80 years old and a resident of Henderson, Texas.

Elisha Mathis died in Texas on 7 September 1883. Mahulda applied for a widow's pension on 18 March 1893. She believed that Mathis received a pension. Her application was rejected. She obviously did not know he had been rejected, which leads me to believe that she was not living with him at the time and probably did not live with him very long at all.

In later years, I think Mahulda lived with both children and grandchildren. My grandmother always said the "Grandmaw raised me" meaning Mahulda.

Mahulda Yarbrough Sanders Mathis died 10 September 1891 in Gibson County, TN. She is buried next to William Lewis Sanders in the old Sanders Cemetery in Gibson County.

IV.9. GEORGE P. YARBROUGH

George P. Yarbrough was born in Tennessee about 1820. If he was born in Overton County, then he was born before the census of that year, as he is a necessary member to make the census fit the family. He first appears in the White Co TN Marriage Book, where he married on 15 Sept 1839 Celia Davis, a daughter of Augustus Parks Davis. It is presumed that they are with William Yarbrough Sr. in the 1840 Gibson Co TN census, and that the census taker slipped a column in the female tally, so that both Celia and Martha are actually there.

George Yarbrough received a Hardeman Co TN land Grant of 189 1/2 acres in 1848. George P. and Celia Yarbrough appear in only one known census, in

1850³² in Hardeman Co TN. They settled near Toone, having property facing that of William Yarbrough Jr.. George purchased 25 acres from William Yarbrough (Sr?) in 1850, and 206 acres from E.S. Legget in 1852. He sold 100 Acres to Benjamin W. Yarbrough in 1855 and sold 106 acres and 40 acres to B.N. Jones in 1859. George moved away, but may have sold 25 acres to William Yarbrough Jr. in 1870. At least one of George's children remained in Hardeman County.

BENJAMIN YARBROUGH c1824 - 1861

Benjamin W. Yarbrough was born about 1824, probably near Sparta TN. His marriage in Gibson Co TN on 5 Mar 1845 to Mary Jane McAllilly is the first record of them. Mary Jane was born 1 Oct 1826 in TN and died 3 Mar 1891, she is buried with Mahulda Yarbrough in the Lewis Cemetery in Gibson Co TN. Her mother was probably a Delashment. She and her sisters were represented by George P. McAllilly in litigation over Elijah Delashment's estate³³:

Deed Book R, p. 497 April 7, 1855. Benjamin Yarbrough and Mary Jane Yarbrough, formerly Mary Jane McAllilly; Job and Elizabeth Hicks, Formerly Elizabeth McAllilly, James and Margaret Cook, formerly Margaret Mc Allilly, appoint George P. McAllilly, attorney (Power of attorney). Ligation of Elijah Delashment, dec'd. Signed by Benjamin Yarbrough, Job Hicks, James Cook, Mary Jane Yarbrough, Margaret Cook, Elizabeth (X) Hicks.

When Lewis Sanders died, Benjamin became guardian of Lewis and Mahulda Sanders' minor children. When James Yarbrough could no longer carry out the duties of Administrator of Lewis Sanders' estate, Benjamin was appointed to carry on. These legal arrangements provide further evidence of the close relationship between these Yarbroughs and Mahulda Sanders.

Ben Yarbrough died in the War between the states probably in 1861. Benjamin apparently was with his parents until he married, and he appears in two Gibson Co TN censuses³⁴, and Mary Jane remained in Gibson County for the rest of her life.

BENJAMIN F. YARBROUGH

Benjamin Yarbrough was the son of William and Martha Yarbrough. He was born in Tennessee probably 1825. In 1852, Benjamin Yarbrough, James Yarbrough and several other men were appointed as administrators of the Lewis Sanders' estate. James Yarbrough served in that position until 1854 when Benjamin took over.

Benjamin married Mary Jane McAliley, 3/6/46, in Gibson County. George P. Yarbrough was the bondsman. She was probably the daughter of James or Samuel McAliley of Chester County SC. Both James and Samuel died early, and Mary Jane and Margaret were made wards of Richard McAliley. Mary Jane Yarbrough is buried in the old Sanders Cemetery in Gibson County.

Benjamin Yarbrough joined the 22 Tennessee Infantry (State Troops) mid-1861 and survived the Battle of Belmont. By mid-1862 signed vouchers by the administrator of his estate can be found. In all probability, he was a casualty of the Battle of Shiloh. It's just a matter of checking CSA records to be sure. 1 April 1992

William Yarbrough Sr. was born on 4 January 1774 in North Carolina. He was in Greenville, South Carolina for the 1800 and 1810 censuses¹. Family records² of Wade Hampton Yarbrough, b. 1809, give his mother's name as Martha³, so Martha was the wife in the 1810 census. Martha was born in South Carolina on 22 March 1780, so she could also be the wife in the 1800 census⁴. The last location we have for William and Martha Yarbrough is in the 1850 census of Gibson County, Tennessee where they are living next to William Lewis and Mahulda Yarbrough Sanders, between the towns of Milan and Trenton, not far from the Rutherford Fork of the Obion River.

The children of this William Yarbrough Sr. have been enumerated, (with errors) by Mrs. Ida Walling, dcd., of McMinnville, TN. Some independent proof exists for three sons of William Yarbrough Sr.: In a Power-of-Attorney, William Yarbrough named his son James of Hardeman County. Then, in a letter from James' son Newton to Benjamin, Hampton and Benjamin are referred to as uncles of his. Newton also mentioned Reuben Yarbrough, but did not indicate his relationship. There is circumstantial evidence that Jephtha, William Jr., Susanna Jane, Mahulda and George P. were children of William Sr.. Sarah Yarbrough Howard has been taken as a daughter of William because of Ida Walling's descent from her. There are no known public records connecting Sarah to the family, but the Greenville SC connection can be taken as evidence.

Numbering of generations is by Roman numeral, and family group placement is by Arabic numeral, except unknown family group placement is a question mark. The earliest known ancestors of the Yarbrough-Davis researchers are Conrad and Sarah Davis. Three children of William Yarbrough Sr. married great grandchildren of Conrad and Sarah Davis. These great-grandchildren are in the fourth generation, so William and Martha are placed in the third generation.

Mrs. Walling claimed she received this information from Franklin Pierce Yarbrough, a grandson of William Yarbrough, Sr. She may have misconstrued the given information.

The William and Martha Yarbrough family left Greenville, South Carolina, around 1818, going first to Overton County, Tennessee where on 15 April 1820, William Yarbrough sold two Negro girls to Sterling Harris of Jackson Co. Tennessee⁵. A William Yarbro is in the 1820 Census of Overton County, TN^6 , with a family listing corresponding to known ages of most children, except that Hampton is listed as under 10, when he would become 11 that year, but may have been 10 at the time of the census.

A William Yarbrough purchased a land grant in White County in 1812, but there is no tax list evidence that he occupied that land. William Yarbrough Sr. first appears on tax lists in 1824, and he bought and sold real estate in White County between 1824 and 1848. He had several properties on Calfkiller Creek and elsewhere near Sparta, and lived in White County from about 1823 through 1835. On 26 Feb 1828 William Yarbrough sold 90 Acres in White County to Reuben Yarbrough, witnessed by George Yarbrough. In 1836 William Yarbrough Sr. gave Power of Attorney to Jeptha Yarbrough to sell property to Thomas Gibbons. Then in 1837 William Yarbrough Sr. gave Power of Attorney to his son Hampton to sell further land. His sons Jephtha, William Jr., James and Hampton also held land in White County. William Sr.'s last land transaction in White County was to legally transfer 12 acres to John Porter Howard. Susanna Jane Yarbrough married John Porter Howard in 1829, and they lived out their lives in White County. The oldest daughter of William Yarbrough Sr., Sarah Yarbrough, married Robert Charles Howard in Greenville, South Carolina, but came

to White County Tennessee in what was apparently a large migration which included this Yarbrough family, J. Pennington's family, several Wallings and other Howards.

By letter, Brother William Yarbrough and Sister Martha Yarbrough were received into the Church at Mill Creek, Hardeman County, in August of 1842. They are believed to be the Wm Yarbough family on page 211 of the 1840 census of Gibson County8, where the census taker has slipped one column in the female tally. On the same page is a Wm Yarbey family, which is thought to be that of William Yarbrough Jr.. In the 1850's William Yarbrough Sr. sold land in White County to sons William Jr. and George P. Yarbrough, but we don't know when William Sr. obtained these lands or if he ever lived in Hardeman County. In 1846 William Yarbrough Sr. bought 133 3/4 acres near Rutherford along the Rutherford Fork of the Obion River in Gibson County. He sold this land to his son James in 1854, the year that Martha died. In the 1850 census of Gibson County William and Martha Yarbrough are living next to Lewis and Mahulda Sanders9, their youngest daughter, between Trent and Milan. It is not known where William and Martha died. Lewis Sanders died in 1851 and Mahulda remarried, James died soon after Martha, so the nearest remaining relative that William could have lived with would have been son Benjamin, who is listed as living in the town of Gibson, not far from the Sanders' place. There is a possibility that both William Yarbrough Sr. and Martha Yarbrough are buried in the Sanders Cemetery in Gibson County, perhaps in the part that is now covered by a pond.

IV.1. SARAH YARBROUGH HOWARD PENNINGTON

Sarah Yarbrough's descendant Ida G. Walling of McMinnville, TN (deceased) claimed that William Yarbrough Sr. and his wife Rachel Shelby Yarbrough are buried in the William Yarbrough Jr. cemetery near the town of Toone in Hardeman County, TN, and that William Yarbrough Sr. ended his days living with William Yarbrough Jr.'s family. We Know that Ida Walling is wrong about Rachel Shelby being William Yarbrough Sr.'s wife in Tennessee, and there is no other confirmation that William Yarbrough Sr. is buried in that cemetery, so Ida Walling may have been mistaken in that fact as well. She claimed that Franklin Pierce Yarbrough gave her that information, but she didn't make it public until after he had died. Ida Walling had obtained D.A.R. membership on the basis of Revolutionary War Service of William Yarbrough Sr., who was born in 1774 and certainly did not serve in a war that ended when he was 6 years old. The D.A.R. has disallowed this service, as it belongs to a different William Yarbrough (d. 1793). Ida Walling had a Revolutionary War headstone placed in the cemetery near Toone, with Williams birth listed as in 1766. This headstone should be removed, as it was obtained and placed there under false claims.

Mrs. Ida G. Walling disseminated information concerning her Yarbrough ancestors containing many errors. All claims by her must be verified by independent sources. The following is a compilation of Ida Walling's published information. Verified errors are underlined. Other probable errors can be

Letters, Ida G. (Mrs Alonzo Nelson) Walling, "Rebel Hill," McMinnville, Warren County, Tennessee, to C.K. Shelby.

(a) Aug. 2, 1932,-

My great-grandmother was Sarah Yarbrough, <u>born in North Carolina about 1793</u> and died in 1882, Her mother was a Shelby. Sarah married Robert Charles Howard (b. Charleston, S.C.) about 1812. Their oldest daughter Minerva was born in 1813. My grandmother, Mahala Howard, another daughter was born in Greenville, South Carolina, December 1815. She married a Walling.

There were Yarbroughs in Charlotte, North Carolina, also. A Raleigh genealogist told me that Moses's sixth child, Margaret, was born in 1772. I found a William Yarbrough and Robert C. Howard were granted land in White County, Tennessee, in 1824. I know that my Shelby-Yarbrough lived in Sparta in that county in the early twenties and that they moved to what was then called the "Western Districts" about 1830. South Carolina had no marriage license law until 1911. I am trying to find out the identity of the parents of the above Sarah Yarbrough.

(b) Jun. 5, 1933

I have at last found my Shelby connection. Goodspeed's History of Obion County, Tennessee, mentions a Jepsy (Jeptha) Yarbrough, son of William, a pioneer of Hardeman County, and on inquiry I learned of a Mr. F.P. Yarbrough at Toone, an undertaker, now eighty-six years old. He is a grandson of William Yarbrough, Sr., and wife Rachel Shelby, daughter of Moses Shelby. They died in the home of his father, who was William Yarbrough Jr., she in 1855 (ae abt. 81) and he in 1859 (ar 93).

The children of William and Rachel (Shelby) Yarbrough, the first five born on Dutch Buffalo creek in North Carolina, were: Sarah, b. 1792 (my gt-grandmother), m. Robert Charles Howard; Benjamin (killed in battle?); Hulda, m. ---- Sanders; Jeptha, m. Lavina Isham; William Jr. b. 1804m m. 1. Gibbons, m2. Hannah Davis; George, m. Celia Davis, Hannah's sister; Hampton; Susannah, b. 1812, m. Jack Howard.

William Yarbrough, Sr., was from Halifax County and served from that district in the Revolution under Captain Brinkley and was a captain in the War of 1812, living then in Nashville, Tennessee. He removed in 1824 to White County.

It was in White county that my grandmother, Mahala Howard, married Hiram Kilgore Walling. After 1830 the Yarbroughs lived in Hardin County.

William and Rachel are buried two and a half miles north of Toone, Hardeman County, in the Yarbrough graveyard. I happen to be Presbyterian.

(c) July 3, 1933,-

When I was ten years old (am now forty-five) a young lady in Evansville, Indiana, where I lived, married a man (from Ohio, I

think) named Frank Chapline. I was then living with my Father's sister, Mother having died when I was fifteen months old. Father often came to see me and I remember my auntie telling me on one occasion about Sadie Bennett's marriage, at which he remarked, "Some of Mother's people were Chaplines." Now, do you suppose that Moses's wife was Isabella Chapline, either a daughter or sister of Joseph?

I am waiting for a blank to fill in requesting a government marker for the Revolutionary soldier, William Yarbrough. Neither his nor Rachel's grave is marked, but old Mr. Yarbrough knows exactly where they lie, for he "cleans off the graves" every year. The old gentleman wrote that Rachel had dark eyes and hair; but that the Yarbroughs were fair.

note: The following is quoted from a booklet on the Yarbroughs that Pauline Gray found in the Mormon Library in Salt Lake City. Unfortunately she did not copy the title page. However, by comparing ages of Mrs. Walling to other information, it appears to have been written about 1954.

(This from Mrs. Ida G. Walling of "Rebel Hill" McMinnville, Tennessee.)

"I do not have a great deal of Yarbrough data. Some years ago a woman from Iowa came to see me, got from me the Yarbrough Coat-of-Arms, and went on to N.C. to visit some Yarboroughs, and came back with most fantastic deductions. Somewhere in the attic I may still have her letters, but while she had lots of odds and ends, there was no proof of lines. I have only a few dates and got them from an old man at Toone, Hardeman Co., Tennessee, where William is buried.

South Carolina had no marriage license records until 1911, so wills are the only proof, and the Yarboroughs must have all been poor. I do not leave my D.A.R. ancestor papers open to the public, because I like to know who wants to use them and why. I will, however, give you an outline.

"I am a daughter of Felix Grundy Walling, born in 1839. I was a Walling before I married a distant cousin, Alonzo Nelson Walling, who died in 1947. I am 66 years old and teaching my last year. Felix Grundy Walling's mother was Mahala Howard, who married Hiram Kilgore Walling. She was the daughter of Sarah Yarbrough and Robert Charles Howard, who was born in 1796 and died in 1883. Mahala was borne in Greenville, Green Co., S.C., Dec 24, 1815, died March 21, 1876. (This is an error, as there is no Greene Co., in S.C.)

Sarah Yarborough, born 1796, was daughter of Rachel Shelby, born 1776, died 1855. She married William Yarbrough in 1792. Rachel was a daughter of Moses and wife, Isabella. William Yarbrough was the son of Manoah Yarbrough, born 1766 and died March 20, 1859. William Yarborough, born in N.C. 1766, died Hardeman Co., Tenn., March 20, 1859. Residence during Revolution was Halifax Co., N.C. (from affidavits of Henry Jones Cabitt, Wisconsin, and Franklin P. Yarbrough, Toome, Tennessee.) Service - Pvt. soldier Wm. Brinkley's Co., N.C. Col. Samuel Jarvis, 1st. N.C. Regiment, Halifax District. (N.C. Roster, p. 623)

Probably any variation of this scenario will produce the same results, especially if Mahulda was born in SC and moved soon afterward to TN. There is another remote possibility, but for now I am going with SC.

The census records say she cold not read or write, yet the family has a small handbook of poems that belonged to her. This book also contains the name "John Pennington", and Mahulda's and Lewis Sanders' birthdates. The letter that accompanied her application for widow's pension is signed, but not with an X.

In 1853, Mahulda married Elisha Mathis. It has not been established where she spent the next 20 years. As far as we know, there were no children from this marriage. On 20 March 1878, Mathis applied for a pension on service during the war of 1812. It was rejected. He was 80 years old and a resident of Henderson, Texas.

Elisha Mathis died in Texas on 7 September 1883. Mahulda applied for a widow's pension on 18 March 1893. She believed that Mathis received a pension. Her application was rejected. She obviously did not know he had been rejected, which leads me to believe that she was not living with him at the time and probably did not live with him very long at all.

In later years, I think Mahulda lived with both children and grandchildren. My grandmother always said the "Grandmaw raised me" meaning Mahulda.

Mahulda Yarbrough Sanders Mathis died 10 September 1891 in Gibson County, TN. She is buried next to William Lewis Sanders in the old Sanders Cemetery in Gibson County.

IV.9. GEORGE P. YARBROUGH

George P. Yarbrough was born in Tennessee about 1820. If he was born in Overton County, then he was born before the census of that year, as he is a necessary member to make the census fit the family. He first appears in the White Co TN Marriage Book, where he married on 15 Sept 1839 Celia Davis, a daughter of Augustus Parks Davis. It is presumed that they are with William Yarbrough Sr. in the 1840 Gibson Co TN census, and that the census taker slipped a column in the female tally, so that both Celia and Martha are actually there.

George Yarbrough received a Hardeman Co TN land Grant of 189 1/2 acres in 1848. George P. and Celia Yarbrough appear in only one known census, in

1850³² in Hardeman Co TN. They settled near Toone, having property facing that of William Yarbrough Jr.. George purchased 25 acres from William Yarbrough (Sr?) in 1850, and 206 acres from E.S. Legget in 1852. He sold 100 Acres to Benjamin W. Yarbrough in 1855 and sold 106 acres and 40 acres to B.N. Jones in 1859. George moved away, but may have sold 25 acres to William Yarbrough Jr. in 1870. At least one of George's children remained in Hardeman County.

BENJAMIN YARBROUGH c1824 - 1861

Benjamin W. Yarbrough was born about 1824, probably near Sparta TN. His marriage in Gibson Co TN on 5 Mar 1845 to Mary Jane McAllilly is the first record of them. Mary Jane was born 1 Oct 1826 in TN and died 3 Mar 1891, she is buried with Mahulda Yarbrough in the Lewis Cemetery in Gibson Co TN. Her mother was probably a Delashment. She and her sisters were represented by George P. McAllilly in litigation over Elijah Delashment's estate³³:

Benjamin Yarbrough and Mary Jane Yarbrough, formerly Mary Jane McAllilly; Job and Elizabeth Hicks, Formerly Elizabeth McAllilly, James and Margaret Cook, formerly Margaret Mc Allilly, appoint George P. McAllilly, attorney (Power of attorney). Ligation of Elijah Delashment, dec'd. Signed by Benjamin Yarbrough, Job Hicks, James Cook, Mary Jane Yarbrough, Margaret Cook, Elizabeth (X) Hicks.

When Lewis Sanders died, Benjamin became guardian of Lewis and Mahulda Sanders' minor children. When James Yarbrough could no longer carry out the duties of Administrator of Lewis Sanders' estate, Benjamin was appointed to carry on. These legal arrangements provide further evidence of the close relationship between these Yarbroughs and Mahulda Sanders.

Ben Yarbrough died in the War between the states probably in 1861. Benjamin apparently was with his parents until he married, and he appears in two Gibson Co TN censuses³⁴, and Mary Jane remained in Gibson County for the rest of her life.

BENJAMIN F. YARBROUGH

Benjamin Yarbrough was the son of William and Martha Yarbrough. He was born in Tennessee probably 1825. In 1852, Benjamin Yarbrough, James Yarbrough and several other men were appointed as administrators of the Lewis Sanders' estate. James Yarbrough served in that position until 1854 when Benjamin took over.

Benjamin married Mary Jane McAliley, 3/6/46, in Gibson County. George P. Yarbrough was the bondsman. She was probably the daughter of James or Samuel McAliley of Chester County SC. Both James and Samuel died early, and Mary Jane and Margaret were made wards of Richard McAliley. Mary Jane Yarbrough is buried in the old Sanders Cemetery in Gibson County.

Benjamin Yarbrough joined the 22 Tennessee Infantry (State Troops) mid-1861 and survived the Battle of Belmont. By mid-1862 signed vouchers by the administrator of his estate can be found. In all probability, he was a casualty of the Battle of Shiloh. It's just a matter of checking CSA records to be sure. 1 April 1992

William Yarborough moved to White Co., Tenn., then to what was called Western District, and is now Hardeman Co., Tenn. I suppose he got land for Revolutionary service.

There is another mention of the name Jeptha Yarborough. A letter to me from Mrs. Walling of McMinnville, Tenn., states that hi she is the daughter of Mahala Howard Walling, whose mother was daughter of Sarah Yarborough and Robert C. Howard. This Sarah was born in 1796, was the daughter of Rachel Shelby born 1776. Rachel Shelby married William Yarborough born 1766, died 20 March 1859 the son of Manoah Yarborough. (This Manoah was the brother of Zachariah who was the father of my Manoah and of the Henry Yarbrough who went to Tipton, Co., Tenn.)Mrs. Walling said that her William Yarborough lived in Halifax District County, N.C. during the Revolution and upon the affidavit of several, among whom was Franklin P. Yarborough., he was given a pension. William Yarborough moved to White County, Tenn., then to Hardeman County, (then called Western Dist. William and Rachel (Shelby) had 10 children: Sarah, Benjamin, Hampton, Jeptha, William, George, Hulda, John, Susanna, Reuben. Mrs. Walling said that William Yarborough is buried in Toome, Hardeman County, Tenn. (To Dorothy Svec:) Mrs. Walling is an ex-school teacher and paints. She does nice work painting the Yarborough Coat of Arms, in case you would like to contact her, her address is Mrs. Ida Walling, Rebel Hill, McMinnville, Tenn. I have not heard from her for several years, but I presume she is yet living.

... William Yarbrough who married Rachel Shelby (both born 1766) and he died in Hardeman County, Tenn., 1859 was a son of Manoah who went to Georgia - so he was a first cousin of my Manoah. This William was a Rev. soldier and lived in Halifax County, N.C. during the Revolution. He received his pension on affidavit of Franklin P. Yarborough of Toome, Tenn. William and Rachel Yarborough had a son Reuben who was perhaps the youngest. Other children were Benjamin, Hampton, Jeptha who married Lavinia Isham, William who married (1) a Gibbons and (2) a Davis, George, Hulda, John, Susannah and the (hte above) Reuben. Mrs. Walling of McMinnville, Tenn. Sent this to me - she is descended from ...

Shelby genealogical researchers have disallowed the claim that William Yarbrough married Rachel Shelby until independent verification can be ob-

tained. Ida Walling is their only source of that information. They are aware that William Yarbrough was married to Martha throughout his life in Tennessee.

A Helen W. Tomlinson of Brunsville, MN compiled an undated Family Group sheet which Karen Mazock sent to Melba Tullos and Karen Lambert. This deals with the family of Robert Charles Howard and Sarah Yarbrough. It says Howard b. 1789 in Charleston SC., married Sarah in Greenville, Greenville Co, SC in 1812, died 19 May 1867 in Mineral Point, Iowa Co, MN. Sarah and Robert Charles Howard were divorced and he went to Wisconsin, changing his name to Hoard. Sarah Yarbrough Howard married Joshua Pennington after the 1840 census, and they moved to Warren County, Tennessee before 1860.

The information on Sarah is obviously tainted by Ida Walling, indicating birth in NC ca 1893 with parents of William Yarbrough and Rachel Shelby. Under places of residence are NC, Greenville SC, Sparta TN, Spencer TN, MO. Her death place is listed as Sedalia, Pettis Co MO in Apr 1883. It has the two oldest daughters born in Greenville in 1813 and 1815, and showing the eldest, Minerva, going to Minnesota with Hoard after marrying Warrington Jones in 1830, probably in Sparta TN. In a note: Hoard was in Mineral Point Wisconsin by 1828. Sarah divorced Robert Charles Howard and lived with daughter Mahala Walling on the Daniel Walling Estate on Spencer Mt. in Van Buren Co TN. There are 5 children listed on the sheet, and another sheet has a sixth. The children of Robert Charles Howard and Sarah Yarbrough are:

The fact that Martha's son is named Shelby Walling may have been the source of Ida Walling's notion that she was descended from a Shelby. Perhaps the Wallings were so descended.

IV.3. JEPTHA YARBROUGH

Jephtha Yarbrough first appears in White County, TN in the 1828 Tax List 85 1/2 acres of school land and 30 acres of other land. The same are listed for him in 1829. In the 1830 census of White County, TN he is listed with another adult male in his age range, a female in the same range, and a daughter under 5 years old. From later censuses Jeptha was born in 1800/1801, his wife is Levinia (Isham) and they have eight listed children As Jeptha acted as attorney in White County for William Yarbrough and James Yarbrough in 1835, and is listed in the 1840 Hardeman County Census, he came to Hardeman County

between 1835 and 1840. He appears to be the second of this Yarbrough family to settle in Hardeman County, and he remained there the rest of his life. Jeptha Yarbrough sold land in Hardeman Co. in 1849 and 1850, and a Jeptha Yarbrough¹¹ bought property in 1853 and 1858 in Hardeman County. The Estate of Jeptha Yarbrough sold land in 1872 to W.H. Yarbrough, so our Jeptha Yarbrough died shortly before then. A J.W. Yarbrough bought and sold 109 acres in 1859, and a W.J. Yarbrough bought property in 1873.

HARDEMAN COUNTY, TENNESSEE FAMILY OF JEPTHA AND LAVENIA ISHAM YARBROUGH By Karen Lambert

William Yarbrough I and Rachel Shelby had several children who lived in Hardeman County, Tennessee, where William I is buried. Jeptha Yarbrough and William A Yarbrough (II) settled in that county and their descendants remain there today. Jeptha was born around 1801 in North Carolina. He is found in White County in Capt. Malory's Company or District in 1828, and Bradford's Company in 1835 on tax lists. Jeptha Yarbrough sold property in Hardeman County Tennessee in 1849 and 1850. There is no record of the acquisition of this property in Hardeman County's Deed Books. He bought land in 1853 and 1858 in Hardeman County. His heirs sold land in 1872.

Jeptha Yarbrough married Lavenia Isham who was born in 1805. Jeptha and Lavenia are buried in an old cemetery on the farm of A.E. Smith Jr. near Toone, Tennessee. Her headstone is broken into several pieces but the date of birth is readable. Only a footstone remains for J.Y.. Lavenia and Jeptha had eight children (U.S. Census, 1860):

W.I. Yarbrough is buried in the cemetery with Jeptha and Lavenia, and this may be their son William. William Ira Yarbrough is listed on the Hardeman County Tenn. Confederate Pension List, naming his wife as Lucretia. A William H. Yarbrough married Catherine Davis in the Hardeman County Marriage Records, and W. H. Yarbrough purchased the land from the Jeptha Yarbrough heirs in 1872. Probably Wm. H. is not Jeptha's son William Ira Yarbrough, but could be another relative of Jeptha's.

In the following, various censuses, marriage records of Hardeman County and

Gibson County and various information from researchers have been used to construct the family of Jeptha and Lavinia Yarbrough. Neither the name Horace nor the information on twins is in the 1860 Census Index, and most of the marriages are uncertain. If Hampton's name is Wade Hampton, after his uncle, then he would be the person who bought the property after Jeptha died.

IV.4. WILLIAM YARBROUGH, Jr.

William Yarbrough Jr. is first found in the White County Tax lists in 1828, but has not been found in the 1830 census there. The William Yarbrough Jr. family was probably in the Gibson County, Tennessee, census in 1840, and first appear in the Hardeman County census in 1850. They settled near Toone. William had married Hannah Davis, a daughter of Augustus Parks Davis, who was listed with the William Yarbrough Jr. family along with his youngest children in the 1850 census¹². Augustus' property was East and next to that of William Yarbrough Jr..

HARDEMAN COUNTY, TENNESSEE FAMILY OF WILLIAM YARBROUGH AND HANNAH ADA DAVIS by Karen Lambert

William Yarbrough I had another son, William (II), who lived in Hardeman County. There is a Wm Yarbro in Overton County TN in the 1820 Census and on the tax list of that county in 1823. He was in White County TN in the later 1820's and in the 1830 Census. There were two William Yarbroughs listed in the 1840 census in Gibson county TN that fit the ages and family ages for William I and William II. William II bought 175 acres in Hardeman County from his father in 1852. There was no record of this land through 1874.

According to a bible record transcribed by Rebecca Watson, a descendant of William Yarbrough II (this bible was in the possession of another descendant and has since been destroyed). William Yarbrough married Hannah Ada Davis on 2/25/1836. Hannah was born 6/18/1814 and died 5/15/1864. However Mrs. Watkins says the page this was on was very hard to read and this may have been 1884. Hannah was living in the later census records, so probably the correct date is 6/16/1884. Another transcription of the same bible record listed Martha Martella as one of the children, but this child was not included on Mrs. Watson's bible record. William and

IV.5. JAMES YARBROUGH

Several children of William Yarbrough Sr. settled in Hardeman County, Tennessee. James Yarbrough, whom William identified as his son and as living in Hardeman County in a letter granting James Power of Attorney on 27 Oct 1835, was probably the first of this Yarbrough family to settle there. James bought the property of Peter Howard at a Sheriffs' Sale in White County in 1829. On 9 Nov 1835 James gave Jeptha Yarbrough Power of Attorney to convey 53 1/2 acres to Thomas Gibbons in White County, which indicates he preceded Jeptha to Hardeman County. James Yarbrough received a land grant in Hardeman County in 1836. He sold Hardeman property in 1838 to John L. Weed and in 1847 to H.L. Doyle, and he moved to Gibson County, Tennessee, before the 1850 census. In Gibson County in 1838 James bought 640 acres from Lewis Sander, which he later sold to East Tennessee College 13. In 1854 James purchased 133 3/4 Acres in Gibson County from William Yarbrough. James was the original executor of Lewis Sanders' estate, and had guaranteed Benjamin Yarbrough's guardianship of the minor children of Lewis and Mahulda Sanders. James moved to Henry County, Tennessee about 1855, and died there in early 1856. In his letter of 12 Feb 1855 to uncle Benjamin Yarbrough, James' son Newton mentions his father's health and urges Ben to come visit him in the spring. Newton says to send his letters to massadonia, (Macedonia?) Carroll County, which must be the nearest post office. In this same letter he mentions a letter from uncle Hampton saying they have bought land in Missouri. Wade Hampton Yarbrough is known to have purchased 120 acres near Columbus, Jackson Township of Johnson County, Missouri on 1 Dec 1854.

Newton R. Yarbrough signed an affidavit on 11 July 1852 attesting Rebecca A. Yarbrough was resident in Gibson County, and so eligible to marry James Davis in that county. Rebecca Armstrong is in the James Yarbrough family in the 1850 Gibson County census. Possibly this James Davis is a son of Augustus Parks Davis. James Yarbrough had another son, William who was 14 in the 1850 census. It is possible that this is the William H. Yarbrough who married Catherine Davis, youngest daughter of Augustus Parks Davis. A William H. Yarbrough witnessed the sale of property by William Yarbrough Sr. to William Yarbrough Jr. in 1851, and it is questionable that a 15 year old boy could witness a deed. In the 1840 Hardeman County census of James Yarbrough lists

another male born 1830-1835 who is probably another son, possibly the Joseph H. Yarbrough who owed William Lewis Sanders \$12 on a note due 5 Jan 1845 in the estate papers.

JAMES YARBROUGH (W. James Yarbrough) by Wanda Johnson

James Yarbrough was born around 1806 in South Carolina. He was a son of William and Martha Yarbrough and a brother to Benjamin Yarbrough. His wife was Martha who was born around 1801 in Virginia.

James Yarbrough, Benjamin Yarbrough and several other men were named as administrators of the Lewis Sanders estate in 1852. James served in that capacity until 1854 when Benjamin took over the duties.

Probably in January of 1855 James, Martha, N.R. and Eurilda moved from Gibson County to Henry County, TN. (N.R., R.N. and Newton R. are used at various times. I believe these all refer to the same person). At least two older children remained in Gibson County¹⁴: Rebecca Yarbrough Davis who married James Davis, and possibly an older son.

James Yarbrough purchased 124 3/4 acres on 14 March 1855 in Henry County, TN. which was recorded 24 July 1855. On March 14, 1856, an inventory of the estate of James Yarbrough was submitted to the clerk. Administrator was N.R. Yarbrough. None of the names at the sale were familiar except Martha, N.R. and William Yarbrough (possibly the older child). An inventory of notes held by James Yarbrough was also submitted. Some of these date to 1835, but no county is given, and the names are very unclear.

Newton R. Yarbrough married Mary F. Anderson 12 December 1865 in Carroll County, TN. Eurilda Yarbrough married Lafayette Young on 22 November 1860 in Henry County. According the 1880 census of Henry County TN, 9th Civil District, Eurilda is listed as Childers, obviously a second marriage.

N.R./R.N. Yarbrough's will was dated 15 November 1911 and recorded in Henry County court Minutes 31 March 1925. "I give, devise, bequeath unto my son, James N. Yarbrough his heirs and assigns of State and County above said who now resides with me my entire farm on which I live." This being the same 124 3/4 acres purchased by James Yarbrough in 1855. He named one Grandson, William Gilbert Yarbrough, to whom he gave \$10.00. The remainder was given to James N. No other children or heirs were listed.

James N. Yarbrough, 2/29/1876 - 3/3/1933, is buried in the Shiloh Church Cemetery in Carroll County, TN, just a few miles from the Henry County line. No other Yarbroughs are listed as buried there, but it is an old cemetery with many unmarked graves. The Yarbrough stone appears to not be in the correct position according to the stones around it.

No other descendants have been found at this point. 1 April 1992.

IV.6. WADE HAMPTON YARBROUGH

Wade Hampton Yarbrough was born April 21, 1809 in Greeneville County, South Carolina. His parents were William and Martha Yarbrough 15. Wade Hampton Yarbrough married Mary M. Davis in Sparta Tennessee about 1830, and carried on the business of farming several pieces of property there until about 184116.

Mary M. Davis was a daughter of Jonathan C. Davis. She was born in Sparta, White County, Tennessee on 28 August 1814¹⁷. In 1840 they were living next to Jonathan C. Davis¹⁸ near Rock Island. In 1841 Hampton Yarbrough and Owen Bates sold their (jointly owned) land, originally a grant to Jonathan C. Davis. Then these Yarbroughs and some relatives of Mary M. Davis Yarbrough went to Dade County, Missouri, where Wade Hampton Yarbrough pursued the trade of shoemaker and Saddler. In the 1850 census of Dade Co MO we find Owen Bates¹⁹ who was probably Mary's brother-in-law. They were in Lawrence Co MO for the 1850 census²⁰.

Lawrence County was organized from parts of Dade and Barry Counties on Feb 14, 1845, so this Yarbrough family and that of Mary's cousin Maxwell Davis²¹ were among the earliest inhabitants of the newly established town of Mount Vernon, which was laid out also in 1845. In 1848 Wade Hampton Yarbrough was in a partnership with Rufus M. Elsey, a saddler, in purchasing a shop on a small lot in Mount Vernon²². The next year Wade Hampton Yarbrough bought Rufus out²³ and in 1850 sold it to John S. Williams²⁴.

Wade Hampton and Mary M.Yarbrough went to Johnson County, Missouri, purchasing property near the town of Columbus in Jackson township to take up farming, just over the LaFayette County line, from where Rufus M. Elsey is

found in the 1850 census. Hampton's property had two parcels, one of 40 and the other 80 acres. It was purchased for \$200 from Samuel and Lucretia Cornett on 1 Dec 1854^{25} .

Wade Hampton Yarbrough's family is in Johnson County MO for the 1860 census 26 .

In January of 1862 the worst in Johnson County of the violence of the war between the states took place. Union soldiers from Kansas (Jayhawkers) who had lost some of their number in an ambush in western Johnson County returned to wreak vengeance on South sympathizers. This Jayhawk regiment robbed and burned about forty homes in the south-west part of the county. Jayhawk troops were then sent to the Columbus area, but were tricked by the towns people into an ambush where 5 Kansans were killed and many more wounded. In retaliation, Columbus was burned along with surrounding area homes of some 50 Southern sympathizers²⁷. Two of Wade Hampton Yarbrough's sons and two future sons-in-law somehow ended up in Union uniforms, in spite of the fact that they were all Southerners by birth.

In 1864 Wade Hampton and Mary M. Yarbrough sold their Johnson County property to son Felix Grundy for \$700²⁸, but they remained on the tax lists through 1867. They are found in the 1870 census of Bourbon County²⁹, where they remained for about two years, moving on to Cowley County around 1871. They are in Richland Township of Cowley County in the 1880 census. Crockett, their oldest son had gone to Sonoma County, California, but the three remaining sons and two daughters are also in Cowley Co, KS at that time. Their oldest daughter has settled in Labette Co, KS.

IV.7. SUSANNA JANE YARBROUGH HOWARD

Susanna Jane Yarbrough was born in South Carolina, presumably in Greenville, on 19 January 1812, and died 16 Dec 1853 in Sparta, White County, TN. She married John Porter Howard on 1 January 1829. Robert J. Howard of Morrison TN in 1989 wrote that John Porter Howard and Susanna Jane Yarbrough were both born in Greenville SC, and that in White county they obtained a land grant30 of 640 acres. William Yarbrough Sr.'s last land transaction in White County was on 10 Oct 1848 to legally transfer 12 acres to John Porter Howard.

According to Mr. Quill Howard, the Felix Grundy Howard Bible lists the following children of this marriage.

IV.8. MAHULDA YARBROUGH SANDERS MATHIS

Mahulda Yarbrough probably met William Lewis Sanders in Gibson County after the Yarbroughs moved there from White County. There is no record of Sanders in White County. The first recorded contact of a Yarbrough with Lewis Sanders is in 1838 in Gibson County TN, when James Yarbrough purchased 640 acres from a Lewis Sander. However, the oldest son of Lewis and Mahulda is William Lewis Sanders Jr., who was born about 1836, so Mahulda and Lewis Sanders were married in 1835 or earlier. As William Yarbrough Sr. is still on the tax lists in White County as late as 1832, it is unlikely that the Yarbroughs went to Gibson County before about 1833. Both William Yarbrough Sr. and James Yarbrough gave Power-of-attorney to Jeptha in 1835, indicating they were already gone from White County at that time. So, in all likelihood,

^{30.} A Land Grant was the initial establishment of property ownership and was available by application to settlers in new territory. Land grants associated with military service were usually issued to cover arrears in pay to the serviceman. Land Grants may have involved some cost, but in many cases they were free to encourage people to settle new territories.

William Lewis Sanders and Mahulda Yarbrough were married in 1834 or 1835. In the 1840 census, William and Martha Yarbrough are near the town of Rutherford, which is about 10 miles north-west of the Sanders place. In the 1850 census they are in the next dwelling from the Sanders.

Wanda Johnson wrote that William Lewis Sanders was born 1 January 1772 in South Carolina, where he was appointed constable for Union County in 1796; that he is in the 1800 Union Co SC census and in the 1810 and 1820 censuses of Chester Co SC.; that there is an L. Saunders in the 1830 census of Chester Co SC who may be Lewis Sanders; and that Lewis Sanders first appears on the Tax List of Gibson Co TN in 1836. Note that in the 1850 Gibson Co TN Census, his name is Lewis Saunders. As Lewis Sanders died on 1 September 1852, the 1850 census shows all of the known children of Lewis and Mahulda Sanders³¹.

After Lewis Sanders' death, both James Yarbrough and Benjamin Yarbrough served as executor of Lewis Sanders' estate. In the inventory of notes and accounts of Lewis Sanders (4 Feb 1853?) there are two notes of particular interest. One is a note for payment of articles purchased at the estate sale which is for \$55.50 cosigned by William Yarbrough and Mahulda Sanders. The other is an old note on Joseph H? Yarbrough, due 5 Jan 1845, for twelve dollars, with the words in solvent and dead. This may be James Yarbrough's missing son who was in the same age range as Newton in the 1840 Hardeman Co TN census. There is almost overwhelming circumstantial evidence that Mahulda is a sister of James and Benjamin and a daughter of William and Martha Yarbrough.

Mahulda married Elisha Mathis in 1853, and is not found in Gibson County until on 24 Feb 1880 she signed a Quit-Claim in favor of Lafayette Sanders, her son.

Mahulda Yarbrough was born 17 September 1817. She probably married William Lewis Sanders in 1831. Actual date and location are unknown. She is probably the daughter of William and Martha Yarbrough. They were living next door, or very close to, Mahulda in both the 1840 and 1850 Gibson Co TN Censuses. James and Benjamin were administrators of the estate of her husband, Lewis Sanders.

Four children were born to Mahulda Sanders: William Lewis, George Washington, Martha H. Pernelia, and James Lafayette.

The census records say Mahulda was born in SC, but the family says "9 miles from Sparta, White County, TN". Larry Morris has this figured out:

Census Taker: "Mrs. Sanders, where were you born?"

Mahulda: "I was born in SC."

Grandchild: "Grandmaw, where were you raised?" Mahulda: "White County, 9 miles from Sparta, TN."

Then I desire my estate should be equally divided between my five sons James Smith, Richard, William, Ossweld, and Joseph Yarbrough and my daughter Elizabeth Yarbrough and I do appoint my two sons James Smith Yarbrough and Richard Yarbrough executors of this my last will and testament revoking and disannulling all other will or wills by me heretofore made As Wittness my hand and seal this fourth day of March in the year of our Lord Christ one thousand seven hundred and seventy one

THE JAMES SMITH YARBOROUGH FAMILY

Records of the birth of James Smith Yarborough are found in the old Vestry Book of St. Paul's Parish, Petersburg, Virginia. He was the son of

William Yarborough (1722-1771) m. March 10, 1743 to Diana Smith (No. 18, 1724 - May 18, 1763) daughter of James Smith and Ann Cary. William and Diana lived in Caroline Co., Va., and there are records there showing that William Yarborough, in behalf of his wife, brought suit aginst the estate of John Smith, Uncle of said wife, because she was overlooked as an heir to the estate which named all other of the 10 children in her family. This suit was in progress as late as 1743. William & Mary Quarterly, Vol. 10, (2) p. 217. Children listed in the Vestry Book and also in the Will of William Yarborough, 1771, Prince Edward Co., Va., are as follows:

James Smith Yarborough - Sept. 2, 1745 Richard Yarborough - March 18, 1748 Elizabeth Yarborough - Oct. 23, 1750 William Yarborough - April 7, 1753 Oswell Yarborough - April 26, 1756 Joseph Yarborough - Nov. 6, 1758

We know that at least three of these children went to what is now the southern part of the United States. Oswell Yarborough was the witness to a Will in the Natchez Dist.

The Louisiana Genealogical Register, Vol. 20, p. 7, states that James Smith Yarborough arrived in the area May of 1773, with his wife Mary, five children and his brother.

The first land grant to James Smith Yarborough #363, 400 A. on the Mississippi River, was land which was originally granted to Charles Percy, bearing date of patent for James Smith Yarborough, June 2, 1777. It is not clear whether this was a British or Spanish Land Grant. The legal representatives of Charles Percy took this land.

April 26, 1805, #22, Vol. 1, p. 42, of U. S. Land Grants shows that James Smith Yarborough, "a West Florida Yoeman," received land in Orleans Territory. His son Jordan also received land adjoining. The National Archives Documents show James Smith Yarborough #4735, no. 365 (Rec V 14, p. 448-450.

By 1808 there are several deeds recorded in Iberville Parish, La., which involve James Smith Yarborough, William Yarborough, Joseph Yarborough and Richard Yarborough. (This being in the District of Manchac.) The records of the area are not complete, possibly because those in con-

trol of that district were never sure who was the power over them. England? Spain? or France? Records are found in Alabama, West Florida, New Orleans, Baton Rouge, Natchez Dist. and in the U.S. after 1803. The first Census of the area shows James Smith Yarborough and his sons and daughters were residents of Galvez Town, a fortified settlement that enjoyed a brief existence from 1775 to 1789 during the Spanish domination, settled during the administration of Governor Bernardo de Galves. At it's peak, there were 400 residents; in the 1810 Census there were 65 listed.

James Smith Yarborough - Males: 2 under 10; 1, 26-45; 1 over 45; 1 female over 45

James S., Jr. - 1 male under 10; 1 male 26-45; 1 female 26-45

William Yarborough - 1 male under 10; 1 male 26-45; 2 females under 10; 1 female 16-26

Some historians intimate that those people of the West Florida-Louisiana Parishes were in the most part, loyal Britons who moved their families away from the Atlantic States to avoid a fight against their Mother Country during the Revolutionary War. We do not know this to be true of James Smith Yarborough. His sons were soldiers in the War of 1812 against England. We also know that James S. Yarborough did not leave the area but chose to stay in spite of extreme hardships. Records show that James Smith Yarborough applied for beef, corn and provisions in April 22, 1784. Records also show that on March 20, 1804, Anna Smith was married. She was the daughter of Maria Yarborough and Santiago Smith. This record also states that Ann Smith was a native of Galvez Town, indication that her Mother, Maria Yarborough, was born c 1769 and no doubt was one of the five children who arrived with James Smith Yarborough.

It is helpful to read the history written about the area where these people lived. I have always thought that one of these sons of James Smith Yarborough was the hero of the Battle of San Jacinto in Texas history. (John Swanson Yarborough). The sad thing is that even though James Smith Yarborough was a "yoeman" and could read and write, his younger sons learned to be trappers for survival and had no schooling. Thus they could not read or write. Is it any wonder there are so few records that concern them? The following is a brief history about Manchac where this family made their home.

"Lower Mississippi," by Hodding Carter, in his series,
"Rivers of America," writes that the English had hopes of
dredging out Manchac so that their ships could enter the
Mississippi River without the hazards of entering the
mouth of the river. Their engineering attempts to clear
the channel were a failure, but they went on with their

plans to build a fort. Fort Bute, as it was called, was a little backwoods fortification, garrisoned by a few officers who were soon replaced with Scots Fusiliers and English Colonials and veterans of the Seven Years' War.

Below the Iberville River, the Spanish watched with envy the trade which the English controlled. By 1777 the English had wrought a miracle of colonization. Along the river, scores of comfortable, solid homes gave proof of the prosperity under England. These homes were of brick and mortar and nestled, white and cool, under oak and magnolia trees, back some forty feet from the river bank. A straight road ran the nine miles from the Mississippi to Manchac to the bayou's conjunction with the Amite.

The people of this stretch were at peace with their Spanish neighbors. From the small Spanish Fort, Galvez Town, below the Iberville it was only a bowshot to Manchac, where the warehouses of Monsieur Swanson and Co., Indian traders, emphasized England's merchantile dominance. The two small forts were joined by a wooden bridge.

The peace that had been apparent soon began to fade when the colonists had word that the Spain-England War had begun. Galvez had become Governor in 1777 and had heard of the war and of the British plan to reinforce the Manchac district, so he planned to strike first and take Manchac. His plan was interrupted by a very severe hurricane on August 17, 1779, but he did not give up his plan and gathered troops from the Indians, Negroes, Acadians, farmers, trappers, 330 poor recruits from the Canary Islands and 170 Spanish veterans.

At dawn of September 21st, artillery battle began and by 3:30 the English Fort was in ruins. Galvez demanded surrender of Baton Rouge and Fort Panmure at Natchez. The Spanish had no interest in Manchac except to destroy its threat to New Orleans. With the departure of the English, Manchac dwindled and became a dying settlement. Today there is no Manchac at all. Galvez Town was not important or necessary to the Spanish who had conquered all of west Florida, and without government support, it too became deserted.

The last deeds that can be found which can be connected to this family of James Smith Yarborough were recorded in 1836. Where did these and their descendants go?

SMITHS OF MIDDLESEX COUNTY, VIRGINIA

By Mrs. P. W. Hiden, Newport News, Va.

For an amateur genealogist to discuss Smiths is a further exemplification of the old proverb about the class of people who rush in where angels show more discretion. The writer, however, has been interested for several years in the Smith families of Middlesex County, and has collected data about them. She has tried to distinguish between proven fact and inference, a very hard thing to do. With apologies for all mistakes, and the hope that some reader may be able to correct them, the following notes are offered.

There were three clear and distinct families of Smiths living about 1660 in that part of Lancaster that became Middlesex. Whether or not they were related is not known but the probability is that they were.

The first is the family of Major-General Robert Smith, a member of the Virginia Council. As early as 1659, as Colonel Smith, he appears in the list of Lancaster tithables. He was a prominent member of the vestry of Christ Church, Middlesex County, and a great deal of the business transacted at the vestry meetings was done on his motion. So far as is known, he had an only son Robert who married an Elizabeth and had an only child, Elizabeth, who married about 1700 Harry, son of Major Robert Beverly and his first wife Mary. With the death of Robert Smith, Jr., this family of Smiths became extinct in the male line.

The family of Alexander Smith has been written up in Tyler's Quarterly, volume 7, and to some extent in William and Mary Quarterly, volume 9, first series. It is also mentioned in Miss Du Bellet's "Some Prominent Virginia Families," where it is asserted that he was a brother of Arthur Smith of Isle of Wight County, and a nephew of Sir Thomas Smyth, who was a great friend to the struggling Virginia colony. Miss Du Bellet gives no proof of her statements, and to the writer, they seem hardly plausible. The wills of both Alexander and Lt. John Smith have seals but they are not sufficiently clear to be identified as the arms of any Smith. In Greer's "Early Virginia Immigrants," page 304, an Alexander Smith is mentioned as brought to Lancaster by John Robinson in 1653. Five years later, Alexander Smith's name appears for the first time among the tithables of Lancaster County, and in 1661 he is appointed constable. In 1665, Cuthbert Potter deeded to Alexander Smith 700 acres, lying on the Great Swamp, beginning at a marked white oak standing by Mattapony path near the plantation of John Smith. In 1713, the deed for this land then lying in Middlesex was recorded in Middlesex (Deed Book 1703-1720, page 321) by John Smith, grandson of Alexander. This was not the first land Alexander had purchased, for a few months previously, John Curtis had sold to John Smith 300 acres near the Great Swamp adjoining Cuthbert Potter's land, and running to the land of David Allison and Alexander Smith, "of which land John Smith was now and had been in possession for a year." From the fact that John and Alexander appear in the records together, and evidently bought land adjoining each other, it would seem a natural inference that they were brothers. This inference is in line with the statement in Tyler's Quarterly, volume 2, page 196, that Alexander Smith is traditionally said to have been a son of Joseph Smith, of Bristol, and to have had a brother John.

The wife of Alexander Smith is unknown from the records. He had a son Samuel who died young, May 5, 1687. In his will, dated January 5, 1696, and probated April 6, 1696, only two children are mentioned, John and Rachel. Rachel was then the wife of William Wyatt, Jr., of King and Queen County, son of William Wyatt who patented land in Gloucester County December 20, 1653 (William and Mary Quarterly, volume 10, page 260). *John Smith, the son of Alexander, was a Lieutenant of Middlesex Militia, for in the Christ Church Vestry Book, page 74, December 5, 1693, he is given this title, and his will, dated February 8, 1696, and probated at the same time that his father's was, was marked, "Will of Lieutenant John Smith." Lieutenant John Smith married, about 1688, Jane, the daughter of Nicholas and Jane Cocke and widow of Rice Jones, Jr. Nicholas Cocke, though naturalized in 1673, was not a Dutchman but an Englishman who had lived in Holland, for his tomb in Middlesex bears the arms of the Cockes of Lancashire and Cornwall (Crozier's Virginia Heraldica, page 83). He married about 1661, Jane, the widow of Bartholemew Curtis, by whom he had two children, Jane and Maurice. Maurice married Elizabeth, the widow of Doodes Minor, and died childless. Jane Cocke had by her first husband, Rice Jones, Jr., three sons, John, Rice and Nicholas Jones. Rice Jones, Jr., had a sister Ann who married John Wyatt, brother of the William who had married Rachel Smith. This connection explains why John Wyatt is appointed guardian to the orphan children of Lieutenant John Smith.

The children of Lieutenant John Smith and Jane Cocke were as follows: John b. Feb. 23, 1690, of whom later; Maurice married Elizabeth, lived in King and Queen County; Samuel married Anne Amis, lived in Essex County (Tyler's Quarterly, volume 2); and Jane mar-

ried John Webb (Tyler's Quarterly, volume 7).

ohn, oldest child of Lieutenant John Smith and Jane Cocke, married Nov. 24, 1714, Ann (b. Jan. 10, 1700, d cir 1748), daughter of Thomas Smith and Ann Briscoe. His children as given in the Christ Church Parish Register are as follows:

1. Jane, b. Sept. 25, 1715, married Aug. 12, 1735, John Vivion, 3rd. This is the "niece Jane Smith" mentioned in the will of her great

uncle, Capt. John Smith, to whom reference is made later. Frances, b. Sept. 16, 1717.

3. Rachel, b. Aug. 23, 1719, married April 13, 1738, William Grif-

4. Alexander, b. June 22, 1721, d. Oct. 9, 1726.

5. Clara, b. Aug. 4, 1723, married (1) Garrett Daniel, (2) George Blakey.

 Ann, b. Sept. 30, 1725, d. Sept. 6, 1734.
 Maurice, b. Jan. 12, 1727, buried June 26, 1795, married May
 14, 1753, Mrs. Catherine Jones. He was a justice of Middlesex and a major of militia in the Revolution. In his will recorded in Middlesex, he mentions son John, daughters Catey Smith, Frances Webb (wife of William Crittenden Webb [1732-1815], of Orange County, Virginia) and Patty Smith.

8. Caroline, b. Feb. 17, 1730, married Nov. 10, 1758, Thomas Latham of Caroline County (William and Mary Quarterly, volume 4, page 121). John Smith, her father, was dead by this time, so Maurice

Smith signs the bond for his sister's marriage.

The deed in Lancaster County Records (Book 2, page 299) from John Curtis, Gentleman, to John Smith for 300 acres in 1665 had already been mentioned. John Smith had been a tithable in Lancaster

as early as 1657. He was most probably a brother of Alexander, and likely his senior. The writer would identify him as the "John Smith husband of Margaret Smith" whose death is chronicled in the Christ Church Register as occurring Dec. 16, 1669.

The following persons, whom wills and deeds in Middlesex prove to be of the same family, were in all probability children of John

and Margaret Smith:

1. Margaret Smith married cir. 1675 John Vivion, Sr., by whom she had five children: Charles, John (1681-1721), Margaret (1684-1750), Diana (died April 16, 1718), Thomas (died 1761). Margaret Smith Vivion died before 1704, as in that year John Vivion, Sr., mar-

ried (2) Christian, widow of William Briscoe (died 1700).

2. Ann Smith married "per Lycence" May 16, 1680, Joshua Lawson. Joshua Lawson died 1717 in Richmond County, where his will is recorded (Will Book 4, page 6). In this will, dated Jan. 11, 1716, proved Dec. 4, 1717, he mentions his son William and a servant, Ann Lloyd, to whom he leaves a plantation, since "I stand justly indebted to her for wages for twenty-two years' service." William Lawson lived in Middlesex a while, since the Christ Church Register records the birth of Jane, daughter of William and Jane Lawson, Feb. 12, 1713. It also records the death of Jane Lawson on Oct. 8, 1715. This was possibly the child Jane, and not the mother, since Phebe is the only daughter of William Lawson mentioned in the will of her great uncle, Captain John Smith. William Lawson seems to have moved into Caroline County, for his name appears there for some years in the records, where as executor of his uncle, Captain John Smith, he figures as defendant in a chancery suit brought against him by William Yarborough and Diana his write.

3. John, later Captain John Smith, born probably 1662, married by 1689, Phebe, the widow of George Reeves (Middlesex Order Book 2, page 19) who was "the brother and heir apparent of Thomas Reeves, dec'd." (Middlesex Deed Book 1, page 49, Jan. 7, 1682). Apparently there were no children by this marriage, but Phebe must have been a very lovable personality to judge from the number of Phoebes among her great nieces. John Smith was a captain of the Militia as early as 1705, when as captain he qualified as one of the executors of the will of his brother Thomas. Captain John died Nov. 10, 1727; his wife must have pre-deceased him as she is not mentioned in his will. His will (Middlesex Record W.B. "B," page 333, dated Nov. 1, 1727, and proved Jan. 2, 1728) is so interesting that a full abstract of it is made. "I give unto my brother James Smith my horse named Trotman and all my wearing apparel. I give unto my nephew John Smith one negro boy named Robin and my negro woman named xxx to him and his heirs forever, and further I give unto my said nephew John Smith one bed and furniture which he himself shall choose, six of my best chairs, the half of my pewter, one iron pott, my best kettle, one gun of his own choice, my saddle, pistol, holsters, my best rapier and his choice of four head of cattle and two of my best chests. I give and bequeath unto my nephew Wm. Smith all my land and plantation together with my moiety of the mill to him and his heirs forever, and further I give unto the said William Smith all my silver plate and my brandy still with its appertenances, my chest of drawers and great looking glass. I give and bequeath to my niece Phebe Lawson the sum of 15 lbs. current money to be paid her when she comes of age or is married in order to buy her a young negro." The same bequest is made to nieces Phebe Daniel and Jane Smith. "I give and bequeath

to my niece Elizabeth Smith my negro woman named Judy to her and her heirs forever, and also her choice of my beds and furniture. I give and bequeath to my niece Ann Smith, daughter of my brother lames Smith, one negro woman named Sarah to her and her heirs forever, and also her choice of one of my beds and furniture. I give and bequeath to my niece Margaret Smith, daughter of my brother James Smith, one negro woman named Moll to her and her heirs forever, and also her choice of one of my beds and furniture. To Mary Freestone daughter of George Freestone dec'd, one cow and calf to be paid her when she marry or comes of age. Rest of estate to nephews, Cary, William and Oswald Smith and niece Dianah Smith, as they severally come of age. Executors, nephews Cary, Willim and Oswald

Smith, nephew William Lawson,"

4. James² Smith, married Ann (died Dec. 20, 1724), daughter of Caprin David Cary, son of James Cary a London merchant, who married Dec. 19, 1680, Ann Jackson. Ann Jackson, after the death of her first husband on Feb. 17, 1691, married next Mr. Randolph Seager who died in 1694; her third husband was Rev. Sam. Gray, rector of the parish, by whom she had a son George. She died Aug. 8, 1696. By her first marriage, so far as is known, she had only this one child Ann, who about 1698 m. Jas. Smith. The children of James² Smith and Ann Cary, as given in the C. C. Reg. are 1. Eliz. b. Sept. 1, 1699, m. Nov. 17, 1730, Sampson Dorrill. 2. James b. June 25, 1702-d. 1728 unmarried. 3. Ann³ b. Oct. 27, 1704. 4. Sarah³ b. Jan. 12, 1707. 5. Margaret³ b. Mar. 11, 1708. 6. Mary³ b. Dec. 10, 1713, d. Jan. 28, 1726. 7. Cary³ b. May 22, 1716, d. 1743. 8. Wm.³ b. Sept. 14, 1719. 9. Oswald³ b. May 27, 1722. 10. Dian³ b. Sept. 14, 1724, m. Wm. Yarangareta borough, lived in Caroline County. (Caroline Rec. O. B. 1741-1746, p. 263, March 10, 1743, "The suit in chancery between Wm. Yarborough and Diana his wife and Wm. Lawson, exor. of John Smith, Gent., dec'd., is cont'd.")

The will of James2 Smith, Middlesex Rec. W.B. "B," p. 352, dated Aug. 20, 1728, proved Sept. 3, 1728, mentions loving children, Eliz.³ Smith, Ann³ Smith, Margaret³ Smith, Cary³ Smith, Wm.³ Smith, Oswald3 Smith, Diana3 Smith, and grandson James4 Dacier. His wife and daughters, Sarah and Mary, were evidently dead by this time, and Sarah had married _____ Dacier, and was the mother of the James Dacier mentioned. The will of his eldest son James (W.B. "B") was made in 1727, before the death of his uncle, Capt. Jno., and proved

June 4, 1728, only three months before his father's.

Cary⁸ Smith, son of James and Ann, m. Nov. 24, 1741, Ann Wortham. His will (Middlesex Rec. W.B. "C," p. 101, dated May 28, 1743, proved Aug. 2, 1743) mentions wife Ann, daus. Catey and Mary, and Sampson Dorrill "my sister's son." (This Sampson Dorrill was son of Eliz. Smith and Sampson Dorrill.)

Wm.8, son of James and Anne Cary Smith, d. 1792, in Spotsylvania Co. His will given in Crozier's Spotsylvania Records, p. 50, mentions three sons, Oswald, John and James, Elizabeth Smith, dau. of son Oswald, dau. Frances Stubblefield, her husband Col. Harry Stubblefield and their dau. Cathrine Stubblefield, dau. Diana Walker, her husband James Walker and their dau. Polly Walker, dau. Mary Stevens, her husband John Stevens and their dau. Ann Smith Stevens, and dau.

Oswalda, son of James and Anne Cary Smith, seems also to have moved to Spotsylvania Co., where he died about 1748, in which year, Wm. Smith gave bond as his administrator with John Minor as his

security (Crozier, p. 57). John Minor was the son of Garrett Minor and Diana Vivion, therefore a cousin of Oswald and William Smith. Thomas2 Smith has caused more anxiety to the writer than any of his sisters or brothers. After years of research and thought, the following is offered as conforming to all known facts. He was probably the youngest of his family, and died a young man on May 21, 1705. He married (1) Ann Briscoe, dau. of Wm. and Christian Briscoe. By her he had one child, a dau. Anne, b. Jan. 10, 1700. Wm. Briscoe in his will, (Middlesex Rec. W.B. "A," p. 40) dated Sept. 20, 1700, proved Nov. 11, 1700, after leaving his wife Christian his land for life, gives it then to Thos. Smith and his heirs, and for want of such heirs to Ann Smith, wife of James Smith. This Ann Cary Smith, dau. of Capt. Oswald Cary and Ann Jackson, must have been related either to Wm. Briscoe or his wife; Christian Briscoe may have been a sister of Ann Jackson, or Wm. Briscoe may have been kin to Oswald Cary. Both were from London. (So far no proof of either hypothesis has been found.) Ann Briscoe Smith died shortly after the birth of her child, for on Jan. 24, 1704, John, son of Thos. and Ruth Smith, was born. The maiden name of Ruth has so far been undiscovered. Like the first wife, she soon died, for in his will, dated May 5 and proved June 4, 1705, he mentions only his dau. Ann and son John, whom he leaves in the care of his brothers James and John. John Vivion, Sr., must have been very fond of Thomas Smith, whom he mentions in his will as "my loving brother," and to Thomas's dau. Ann Smith, "my wife's granddaughter," he makes larger bequests than he does to any of his own children. The best of the household furnishings are left to her.

John, son of Thomas and Ruth Smith, m. Oct. 27, 1724. Elizabeth. dau. of Jno. (d. April 1, 1727) and Frances Williamson Aldin. In his will, Middlesex Rec. W.B. "C," p. 322, dated April 25, 1746 and proved Aug. 5, 1746, John Smith mentions his wife Elizabeth, son John, daus. Ruth and Frances (d. unmarried 1750), and son-in-law Jno. Batchelder (husband of Ruth). This is the nephew, John Smith, who receives a good deal of the property of his uncle, Captain John Smith.

Since Ann, the dau. of Thos. Smith by his first wife, Ann Briscoe, married a grandson of Alexander Smith, her line was traced there. There was another Smith family resident in Middlesex contem-

poraneously with Alexander's and John's descendants.

John Smith (d. Feb. 19, 1721), whose will, dated Feb. 4, 1721, was proved April 3, 1722 (Middlesex Rec. W.B. 2, p. 282) m. Elizabeth, very likely a Berry, since Garrett Berry, March 4, 1705, deeded cattle to his beloved dau. Eliz. Smith. John and Elizabeth, according to his will, had the following children: (1) John, Jr., who m. Frances and predeceased his father, dying Nov. 15, 1717, leaving a son John, b. Dec. 16, 1717; (2) Thos. m. Ann and d. Mar. 11, 1723; (3) dau. Jane m. May 1, 1705, John Price, who d. 1726, leaving dau. Jane Price and six sons, Robert, James, John, Samuel, William and Thomas; (4) another son who had a son John. This fourth child's existence is problematical. If the Thos. Smith who on Dec. 26, 1706 m. Jane Annis (C. C. Register, p. 80) is the same Thos. who later m. Ann, then the "grandson John Smith the older" might well have been his son by this first marriage. John Smith in his will left his manor plantation to his grandson, John Smith the younger, whom the writer thinks was the son of John and Frances Smith, who was at this time only a little over 4 years of age. To grandson, John Smith, the elder, 50 pounds is to be paid on the birth of his first child.

Thomas, son of John, survived his father a little over a year. In his will, dated March 9, 1723, and probated June 4, 1723, he leaves to his wife Ann for life the land on which he lived, afterwards to son Gregory; land in Essex to be divided between sons Gregory and Thomas, and if Gregory die without heirs, his share to go to son Anthony; beguests to daus. Martha, Ann and the child to be born.

From the Middlesex Records, further facts can be given about the

children of Thomas and Ann Smith.

1. Gregory b. Dec. 31, 1712, m. ____, issue Thos. and Gregory, probably others.

2. Thomas b. Sept. 15, 1715, probably d. Oct. 16, 1723.

3. Martha b. Oct. 31, 1717, m. Achilles Bowker.

4. Ann b. Dec. 24, 1719, m. James Gardner.

5. Anthony b. July 8, 1721, d. Dec. 1745.

6. Eliz. b. April 19, 1723, m. May 23, 1743 Thos Foster.

Ann Smith, wife of Thomas, survived him for 26 years, dying in 1749. In her will she mentions her grandson Thomas Smith, granddaughter Ann Smith, daus. Martha Bowker, Ann Gardner and Eliz. Foster, sons-in-law, Achilles Bowker and Jas. Gardner, exors.

Anthony, son of Thomas, d. in 1745, probably unmarried, leaving in a nuncupative will his estate to his mother, Ann Smith, for life, then to be divided among his sisters' children. A deed in Middlesex, D. B. 1754-1768, p. 545, July 7, 1767, from Thomas Smith, of Westmoreland Co., clerk, and Mary, his wife, and Gregory Smith of the County of K. & Q., Gent., conveys to Geo. Daniel 560 acres of land belonging to Gregory Smith, dec'd. and Ann Smith, dec'd., father and grandmother of the said Thomas and Gregory. This Thomas and Gregory were therefore sons of Gregory, grandsons of Thomas and Ann, and great grandsons of John and Elizabeth Smith. From this family is said to be descended John Augustine Smith, President of William and Mary College. (W. & M., vol. 4, pps. 101-103). *

This, of course, does not exhaust the list of Middlesex Smiths; there are many others referred to whom the writer cannot assign to a family group. One of these unattached persons is Samuel Smith, who in 1696 gives power of attorney to Geo. Wortham in an action for debt (Middlesex D. B. 1696-1703, p. 97). This Samuel may have been the son Samuel referred to in the will of Samuel Smith, of Lancaster Co. (Lancaster Rec. W. B. 5, p. 117). This will, undated but probated April 11, 1688, mentions wife Susan, dau. Susan Davis and her son Samuel Davis, son Samuel Smith under 21. Samuel, Sr., was probably the person who on May 2, 1667, describing himself as Samuel Smith, of Middlesex, appointed Mr. Geo. Veale as his attorney; witnesses, Fortunatus Sydnor and Hugh Brent (Lancaster Rec. D. B. 4, p. 40). There is no will of Samuel, Jr., in Middlesex, thereby making any positive identification of him impossible. He was probably connected with the family of Alexander Smith, among whom the name Samuel has come down for generations.

A Joseph Smith witnessed the will of Jno. Shepperd in Middlesex in 1682, in which John Shepperd leaves "to my loving friend, Mr. Alexander Smith a mourning ring." This Joseph Smith is probably the Joseph Smith who with Humphry Jones bought land from Robt. and Eliz. Kemp on Sunderland Creek in 1662. (Lancaster Rec. Book 2, p. 258). Humphry Jones's dau. Mary was the first wife of Randolph Seager, son of Oliver Seager. Randolph married secondly, as has been

The writer will welcome any data that will supplement these brief notes. As has been said, while no connection between these families is proved, it would seem a logical inference.

Smith.—In the Quarterly for July, 1930, (Vol. 10, 2nd series, pps. 214-220), the writer ventured a few notes on the Smith families of Middlesex Co. *The helpful suggestions of Judge Wm. B. Newman, of Washington, D. C., who, like the scientist reconstructing an entire skeleton from one bone, can reconstruct a whole family's relationships from meagre court records, and further research by the writer have proved one statement incorrect and altered the implications in others.

The following facts are therefore added now. First, the correction: On p. 215 in the volume referred to, Thos. Smith is said to have married Ann Briscoe. This is wrong. He married Ann Petty, stepdaughter of Wm. Briscoe. Wm. Briscoe married between Jan. 7th and March 4, 1689, Christian Petty, widow and executrix of Maximilian Petty, who died Dec 12. 1687 (Christ Church Register). In Maximilian Petty's will, which bears no date either of making or recording, he mentions wife Christian, son Maximilian, and daughter Ann. According to Christ Church Register, the son was born

Nov. 28, 1677, and the daughter Mar. 25, 1680. Maximilian Petty came to Virginia prior to 1675, for in Feb. of that year he announced his intention of making a trip to England (Middlesex O. B. 1, p. 51). He seems to have been a citizen of some importance in Middlesex Co., for he was deputy sheriff in 1681, 1684, 1685, and at the time of his death had just been appointed for the ensuing year. He is listed among the wealthier citizens of Middlesex who, in 1687, when troops were being raised to fight the Indians, were considered by the court able to furnish "a man, horse and armor" (Middlesex O. B. 3, p. 317). In his will, he calls Maximilian Robinson his cozen, tho nephew is probably what is meant. Maximilian Robinson owned land on the north side of the Rappahannock River in what is now Richmond Co. As he was a mariner, he was likely on one of the boats that plied regularly between England and Virginia, and very likely kin to Richd. Robinson, whose uncle Richard was a "Turkey Merchant" (Va. Mag., Vol. 15, p. 445; Wm. & Mary Quar., Vol. 18, p. 190), since

th ir names appear in transactions together in Old Rappahannock records. Maximilian Petty seems also to have been connected with the Wormleys, near whom he lived, and to have made his trip to England in 1675 in their interest. On Dec. 2, 1689 (Middlesex O. B. 2, p. 428), Capt. Ralph Wormley obtained a certificate for land due him for the importation of thirty persons, among these occur consecutively the names Christian Hill and Maximilian Petty. It is not unlikely that Christian Hill became Christian Petty.

It is evident from records previously quoted that since Wm. Briscoe and Christian Petty were not married until the winter of 1689, they could not have become both parents and grandparents in the eleven years that intervened between that date and Jan. 10, 1700, on which day Thos. and Ann Smith's daughter Ann was born. Ann Smith was therefore Ann Petty b. Mar. 25, 1680, daughter of Max-

imilian and Christian Petty.

On page 216. W. & M. Quarterly, Vol. 10, second series, the statement was made that Capt. John Smith (d. 1727) was most probably son of the John Smith who died in 1669; and is called in the Christ Church Register "husband of Margaret Smith." This statement is confirmed by the Middlesex O. B. 2, p. 317, Nov. 23, 1687, where in the list of those deemed capable of providing a foot soldier to defend the frontier occurs the name "John Smith" followed by this parenthetical phrase, "Mrs. Weatherby's son." This was necessary to distinguish him from his cousin John, later Lieut. John Smith (d. 1696) and John Smith of Pianketank (d. 1721). Margaret Smith married (2) Thos. Weatherby, and their daughter Alice was born March 20, 1671 (Christ Church Register). Apparently this marriage was not a success and Thos. Weatherby left the county, for when on Nov. 6, 1678, Mr. Wm. Gordon, as administrator of the estate of John Smith, decd., brings suit in behalf of the minor children, Thos. Weatherby cannot be found and is returned "non est invintus" (O. B. 1, p. 146). Margaret Weatherby was living as late as 1688, for on Sept. 3, 1688 (O. B. 2, p. 366), she was granted a certificate for land due for the importation of three servants, among them, John Vivion. This is an example of the length of time that might elapse before a certificate was applied for, as John Vivion had been her son-in-law for about twelve years before she entered this claim. Another example of the same thing is the case already mentioned of Capt. Wormley who received in 1689 a certificate for Maximilian Petty's trip to England in 1675.

The John Smith of Pianketank, who died in 1721, deserves a somewhat fuller notice than has been vouchsafed him. In Middlesex O. B. 3, p. 250, Oct. 13, 1698, the statement is made that he had married Martha, widow of Jno. Parsons, and had acquired thru his wife land left her in the will of her father, Wm. Butcher, dated Jan. 27, 1668. This explains the will of John Butcher, son of William, who, in his will dated Aptil 18, 1698, proved Dec. 5, 1698, ceaves all his estate "to my loving brother, Jno. Smith" (Middlesex Old Wills, Bundle 3). The Ruth Smith who witnessed this will was very likely the daughter of John Smith and Martha Butcher. It seems likely, since later Thos. Smith is found in the Pianketank neighborhood, that he married after the death of his first wife, Ann Petty, this Ruth Smith, who was the mother of his son John, b. Jan. 24, 1704. This John is therefore the "elder grandson. John Smith," mentioned in the will of John Smith of Pianketank. The £50 sterling he bequeaths him is most probably the money value of the estate of his first wife, Martha Butcher, which she had inherited from her father, and to which the

children of his second wife, Elizabeth Berry, had no claim. If one refers to the will of Capt. Jno. Smith and notices his liberality to the children of his brother James, it would seem he was neglectful of the son and daughter of his brother Thomas, who had been left in his care. When, however, it is remembered that Thomas's daughter Ann had inherited the estates of Maximilian Petty, William Briscoe, and some property from Christian Petty's third husband, John Vivion, Sr., it is seen she was well provided for. Thomas's son John also was taken care of by his grandfather, John Smith of Pianketank, hence did not need the bequests that the children of James Smith received.

The children of John Smith of Pianketank seem to have been (1) Ruth, married Thomas Smith, d. before May, 1705, leaving son John, b. Jan. 24, 1704; (2) John, Jr., who married Frances and predeceased his father, dying Nov. 15, 1717 (his son John was born a month later, Dec. 16, 1717); (3) Jane, who married May 1, 1705, Robert Price, and

(4) Thomas, who married Ann and d. Mar. 11, 1723.

There was a Thomas Smith, a tithable in Lancaster in 1663 in the same precinct with John and Alexander to whom he was probably related. He might well have been the father of John of Pianketank, of Joseph who died intestate in 1699 in Middlesex, of Thomas whose marriage Aug. 17, 1679, to Elizabeth Clabor is given in Christ Church

Register, and of Anthony also mentioned in the Register.

Alexander Smith's son John was given the title of Lieutenant both in the Christ Church Register and in the Middlesex Records. While the date on which he received his commission has not come to light, the fact that he actually saw service is established by the following item: Middlesex Records, O. B. 2, p. 549, March 3, 1692, "Certificate is granted to Lt. John Smith for five days service, himself and horse in guarding the privateers to town." This would seem to indicate that pirates not only lay in wait for vessels off the coast but were bold enough to venture even up the Rappahannock River.—Contributed by Mrs. P. W. 

THE MINOR FAMILY by Dorotha Horvath

William John Minor was the great-great grandson of Thomas Miner, the first member of that family to come to America. Thomas was born in 1608. He debarked in Salem, Massachusetts, from the ship "Arabella" in 1630, having left Somerset County, England. Four years later, he married Grace Palmer and settled in New London, Conn. His grandson, William, changed the -er ending in the spelling of the surname to -or, Minor. William's son, Stephen, born Mapleton, Penn. (then a part of Virginia), on February 6, 1760, was the progenitor of the Minor family in the lower Mississippi Valley.

Stephen descended the Mississippi River in 1779, bound for New Orleans with a load of merchandise. The trip apparently involved more than war materials being secretly supplied by Spain through New Orleans for American Revolutionaries in the West. On the return trip northward, Minor became ill. His party and the war materials which they received in New Orleans continued on their journey into ambush. Minor returned to New Orleans and joined the royal Spanish army being assembled by the Governor of Louisiana, Bernardo de Galvez, for attacks on English Manchac and Baton Rouge (1779). Minor apparently also partcipated in the conquest of Pensacola (1781) and perhaps Mobile (1780) by the Spanish and American forces commanded by Governor Galvez. return for his military services under Galvez, Minor was accorded the rank of Captain and granted the land on which the city of Natchez was built. In 1781, Galvez appointed Minor adjutant of the military post at Natchez, commanded by Gayoso de Lemos. Thereafter, Natchez was the home of Stephen Minor and he continued true to the interest of the Spanish until Spain was forced out of West Florida in late 1810. In 1797, Stephen Minor acquired Concord Plantation (built 1794, burned 1901) from Gayoso de Lemos. Concord was the ancestral home of William J. Minor, who formally made Southdown his home in Louisiana in November, 1867.

William John Minor, who built the first floor of the present Southdown house (1859-61), was the first son born to Katherine Lintot and Stephen Minor (Stephen Minor was preceded in death by two previous wives: 1- A Miss Bingaman, no issue; and 2- Mary Ellis, one daughter, Martha, who married William Kenner, father of Duncan F. Kenner and Rosella Kenner Brent).

Katherine Lintot was the daughter of Bernard Lintot, commissary at English Manchac and later a resident of Natchez. Bernard Lintot is reputed to have studied at the Inner Temple, London. Another daughter, Fanny, married Philip Nolan, St., who lost his life while on an illegal horse hunting expedition at the site of present-day Waco, Texas, in 1797. His infant son, Philip, Jr., was reared by Stephen Minor. Philip Nolan, Jr., apparently lived out his life using the surname of his Uncle, Stephen Minor. It was Philip, Jr., who built Linwood Plantation (ca 1840 to 1939) near Ashland, the plantation home of Duncan F. Kenner in Ascension Parish, Louisiana.

The other surviving children of the Katherine Lintot and Stephen Minor marriage were: Frances, married Henry Chotard of Somerset Plantation in South Louisiana; Katherine Lintot; married James Wilkins of Mississippi; and Stephen, Jr., married Charlotte Walker, daughter of

there, territorial governor of Arkansas.

William J., or W.J. as the owner of Southdown signed most of his correspondence, married Rebecca Gustine, daughter of Dr. Samuel Gustine of Carlisle, Pennsylvania, in 1829. The two had met in Philadelphia when W.J. was a student there. Rebecca was in Philadelphia when she received and accepted W.J.'s marriage proposal by letter in 1828. The issue of the W.J. Minor and Rebecca Gustine marriage were: John, married to Katherine Surget; Stephen, unmarried; William J., Jr., married Amenaide Chaplain; Duncan, unmarried; James, unmarried; Henry Chotard, married Ann Louisa Butler; Frank O., married Odile Larue; and Katherine Lintot, unmarried. Of these children, Stephen, Duncan, Wm. J., Jr., Henry C. and Katherine L. Were associated with Southdown and the other W.J. Minor properties in Louisiana: Waterloo, sixty miles above New Orleans on the Mississippi River, and Hollywood, adjacent to Southdown on Bayou Black in Terrebonne Parish.

William J. Minor's chief concern was sugar production at a profit, but he had other interests. Like his cousin, Duncan F. Kenner, W.J. Minor contributed to Louisiana's reputation as a center of American horse racing in the pre-Cival War era. Most of the horses which Minor owned were kept at Southdown in the stables which he had built there in the 1840's and considerably enlarged in 1858. During the years 1848-1852, Minor emplayed Thomas Alderson as horse trainer. The costly stables burned in 1861, but were re-built sometime after the Civil War.

W.J. Minor and his wife strongly opposed the war. Politically, Minor was a Whig. His 1859 Diary (entry for January 22), reveals that he owned 399 slaves: 176 at Southdown, 165 at Waterloo, and 58 at Hollywood. His wife was opposed to slavery, but often remarked that she did not know how to resolve the economic and social problems which were an inevitable part of emancipation. Their son, Duncan, lost his life fighting for the Confederacy in Virginia. Their son, Stephen's, health was so badly impaired by the typhoid fever he contacted while in the Confederate camp to Bowling Green, Kentucky, that he died in young manhood.

Following the death of W.J. Minor on September 18, 1869, Henry Chotard Minor and Katherine Lintot Minor bought the interest of the other heirs in Southdown and operated the plantation as a partnership. Henry was active manager of the property and often said he'd rather consult with his sister than almost any other planter in the state. Katherine is described as combining the sweetness and charm characteristic of Southern women with an able, analytical mind which was masculine in its approach to business. Miss Kate, as she was affectionately known, was born at Waterloo on December 5, 1849, and died in New Orleans on December 1, 1923. Her brother, Henry, pre-deceased her in 1898.

After the death of Henry Minor, Southdown was run under the name of H.C. Minor Estate Partnership. Katherine retained her interest in the property with the 3 children of H.C. Minor and Ann Louisa Butler: John D., Mary and Margaret. The active administration was under Mr. Walter Suthon and Miss Kate Minor. About 1904, John D. Minor assumed management of Southdown and operated it until 1912. In that year, John sold his interest to his sisters, who had by then married: Mary to David W. Pipes, Jr., and Margaret to Charles Conrad Krumbhaar. Thereafter, Pipes and Krumbhaar were associate managers of Southdown. In 1920, they began acquiring an interest in the property in lieu of salary.





continued to live on, and cultivate the land for two years, then he removed."

The son of Jacob Harmon and Hannah Guice, David was married in 1804 to Elizabeth Lyons, daughter of John Lyons and Nancy Ahart. 49 David Harmon had a vacherie in the Attakapas district, on Vermilion River, in 1797; John Harmon lived on the land and cultivated it, beginning in 1803.

Across the bayou, on Plaquemine Brûlée's south bank, was the second tract owned by Elah Andrus. This land, also bounded on three sides by unclaimed land, extended almost to the present city limits of Crowley.

The remainder of the landowners along Bayou Plaquemine Brûlée were located west of the Antoine Blanc land near Crowley to the point where the bayou flows into Bayou des Cannes and the Mermentau River.

On the bayou's north bank, about two miles west of Crowley, was the Raphael Smith land. The tract was isolated, bounded on three sides by vacant land. Raphael was Charles Smith's brother. In 1826 he married Clemence Guilbeau at St. Jean du Vermilion (Lafayette). Most of the Smiths of the Grand Coteau area are descendants of Raphael Smith. Raphael is identified as a chirurgien, surgeon, in the succession of Jean Baptiste Malveau, opened in 1807.

About two miles farther down the bayou was another isolated bayou front strip, owned by Jacob Harmon. Some two miles farther west were three strips, two owned jointly by Jean Mouton and David Guidry, the third by Pierre Guidry. These will be described with the property owners on the south side of the bayou, as all belong to the same group.

The last tract on the north side of Plaquemine Brûlée, situated about half a mile from the juncture of the two bayous, belonged to William Callaghan, who claimed by order of survey. The original claimant was Garret Yarbre. William Callaghan, son of Daniel Callaghan and Catherine Ouest (West) was baptized at Opelousas in 1793.

An Acadia Parish map shows 28 strips of land, most of them quite narrow, on the south bank of Plaquemine Brûlée between Crowley and Mermentau. Only 12 of these strips were claimed, 11 of them by Acadians. The 12th and largest tract, of some 1,200 arpents, belonged to Robert

Cochran and John Rhea, and was acquired from David Lejeune, the original claimant.

Major Robert A. Cochran, native of Maryland, married Elisa Voorhies, daughter of Cornelius Voorhies and Aimee Gradenigo, in 1825. John Rhea was a land speculator; he purchased 18 different claims totaling more than 10,000 acres of land, seven of which were later rejected as fraudulent.⁵²

The Acadian landowners were Pierre Arceneaux and his five sons, Alexandre, Louis, Cyprien, Pierre and Francois; his three sons-in-law, Jean Guilbeau, Francois Carmouche and Joseph Breaux; Pierre Guidry and his son David; Jean Mouton and Pierre Bernard.

Pierre Arceneaux (Arsenau, Arsenault), born at Beaubassin, Nova Scotia, in 1731, came to St. James Parish, Louisiana, in 1765, thence to the Attakapas district in 1787. He married Anne Bergeron about 1758 and had five sons and three daughters, 53

It is generally accepted, on the basis of family tradition, that Pierre Arceneaux was the prototype of Gabriel in Longfellow's poem, "Evangeline." Dr. Thomas J. Arceneaux, 34 a direct descendant of Pierre Arceneaux who has done extensive genealogical research, has established that Pierre Arceneaux also carried the name of Louis, and was also known by the nickname. "Penault." Dr. Arceneaux has further established that Pierre (Louis) Arceneaux was the only Arceneaux listed among the exiled Acadians.

Pierre Arceneaux was one of the eight Acadians who signed a contract with Captain Antoine Bernard d'Hautrive to raise cattle on the Attakapas and Opelousas prairies. This historic agreement, signed in New Orleans in 1765, is considered the beginning of the cattle industry in southwest Louisiana. 56

Pierre Arceneaux was the original owner of eight tracts of 328 arpents each on Bayou Plaquemine Brûlée between Crowley and Estherwood. These were later claimed by his five sons and three sons-in-law.

Pierre Bernard was one of twin sons born in 1762 to Michel Bernard and Marie Guilbeau of Port Royal, Acadia, Nova Scotia.⁵⁶ Pierre Guidry,




INTRODUCTION

All of Kentucky was at one time a part of Virginia.

On December 1, 1772, there was officially established Fincastle County, Virginia. This included all of what is now the present state of Kentucky, and a small southwest portion of what is today still Virginia.



On December 31, 1776, this was divided into three counties:



- 1. Kentucky County, Virginia
- 2. Montgomery County, Virginia
- 3. Washington County, Virginia

[Kentucky County comprised all of what is now present-day Kentucky.]

FIRST INHABITANTS OF IBERVILLE

When the French and Spanish began to populate both sides of the lower Mississippi valley, they found the area well settled with Indians. In Iberville, on the east bank they found the Houmas, with the Manchacks well established along Bayou Manchac. On the west side, the Goulas had pitched their wigwams in the Bayou Goula section; their principal village being about one mile from the Mississippi River on the banks of the Bayou Goula, at which place in 1699 the Jesuit Father Go Ru crected a church. Several Indian mounds still exist in that section. The Chitemaches held sway in the Plaquemine district extending on down Grand River to Bayou Lafourche.

THE FRENCH TAKE POSSESSION

It was the fond hope of both Bienville and Iberville to Iocate many hundreds of French families along the rivers and bayous of the lower Mississippi valley, but from the date of exploration in 1682 to 1732, including settlers, slaves and soldiers and some two thousand in New Orleans, the total population did not exceed 7000, of which one third were negroes. The French settlers were of one mind—to establish themselves in the French empire of the west, Canada.

The years between 1757 and 1772 were both happy and unhappy ones for the French on the Mississippi coast. Happy for those from Acadia, who found a haven of comfort and rest and a hearty welcome from the French pioneers; unhappy for the many who became separated and those who suffered from exposure, disease and starvation. The fall of Grand Pre and the expulsion of the Acadians is too well known to every student to be reproduced here and will ever remain fresh in the immortal lines of Longfellow's Evangeline. However, the Acadians knew that there were many French settlers in the Mississippi valley and some 7500 made their way to this section.

UNDER SPANISH RULE

Louisiana, after 81 years of tribute to France, on November 3, 1762, passed into the hands of the Spanish. Ulloa was the first governor general in 1766, remained but two years to be succeeded by Alexander O'Reilly in August, 1769. He at once appointed an army officer in charge of each district, who was in charge of both civil and criminal matters, transmiting his findings to the Governor in New Orleans. The first officer in charge in Iberville was Don Thomas Estevan, who had his residence at the seat of government—Galveztown. The next officer was Don Francis Collel, arriving in 1780; the population of Galveztown then being 242.

When the Louisiana Territory was transferred by Spain back to France in March, 1801, there was great dissatisfaction among the Spanish and some 200 moved from Iberville county to make their home in the English area just below Baton Rouge, which section of that city still bears the name of Spanishtown. From a census made by Governor Claiborne in 1804, February 18, as shown in Conveyance Book B, Entry 49, the population of Galveztown was but 28 families, or 138, which included both soldiers and slaves. Galveztown remained a part of Iberville until 1841, when the legislature authorized a change in parish lines and that settlement became a part of the parish of Ascension. There is still a post office in the northeastern part of Ascension called Galvez, but the original town has disappeared. Henry A. Gueymard, a planter from Carville, La., made an inspection in 1939, finding but a few bricks to mark the first county seat of Iberville.

INDIAN TRIBES IN IBERVILLE

THE CHETIMACHES

When the white man came to settle in this area, he found numerous Indians entrenched along rivers and bayous, in possession of the best locations.

The Manchacks had a village at the head of Bayou Manchac and held sway in the lower part of East Baton Rouge and the fourth ward of Iberville.

The Houmas had control of the fifth ward in Iberville, and all of east Ascension.

The Goulas, a small tribe, had a village at the head of Bayou Goula and ruled over the small area known as the Bayou Goula section. As late as 1880, a few of this tribe still lived on the Glenmore Plantation.

The Chetimaches held the greater part of the parish on the west bank of the Mississippi; they had villages at Plaquemine, Indian Village, Belle River and the largest at Donaldsonville. Their main holdings were in the shape of a horse shoe with Plaquemine and its bayou on the north, Donaldsonville and Bayou Lafourche on the south and Grand River, also known as Belle River, on the west.

Trouble arose with the Chetimaches in 1705, when Father St. Cosme and two companions and an Indian guide, on a trip from Natchez to Biloxi, stopped at the Chetimache village near Donaldson-ville. The priest and his two companions were murdered. News of this crime was brought to New Orleans, to Bienville governor of the colony, who declared war on the tribe. He demanded that the murderers be given up to him, and that the tribe clear out of the Donaldsonville and Bayou Lafourche area, thus forcing this tribe into the Belle River and Bayou Plaquemine sections.

As the white settlers began to come in, having obtained grants from the Spanish Government and shoving the Indians back, the Chetimaches through their three chiefs, John Louis Campaign, Anthony Maxchall and Widdow Francis, applied to the Spanish Government for a grant of land. The Spanish Government never recognized any primitive title in Indian tribes, and never made grants of land to any individual tribes or Indians, but did set aside certain areas for their use. On Dec. 1, 1807, a survey was made of a tract of land containing 1023.19 acres, by Francis Hackett, deputy surveyor for the Territory of Orleans and County of Iberville, this semi grant with map is of record in Book of Original Deeds F, Entry 741, being located at the Indian village, nine miles west of Plaquemine.

The Indians quickly adapted themselves to the ways of the white man and soon learned the value of money in order to trade for shoes, clothing, guns, and ammunition. To get this trading value, they began to barter their lands for trifling sums. In Con. Book C, Entry 32, there is a sale on Oct. 16, 1807, to John Trohel, passed before Nathan Meriam, Judge, of a tract of 5 by 40 acres, for \$35.00; also in the same Book, E 33 is a sale of a tract 19 by 40 acres to D. Lacosts,

the price being \$125.00.

The Chetimaches in dwindling numbers continued to inhabit the point at the Indian Village up to 1883, but through death, intermarriage and migration, the tribe has ceased to exist and their name, deeds and actions are but a matter of past history. The last of the tribe to vacate was Emile Cannon, his mother and child, who, on behalf of the tribe and as a last stand, claiming the 17 acres on the Village point, leased it first to Frank Gallagher and later on to Ben Marionneaux. Two suits were filed in February 1889 numbered 917 and 967 of the 23rd Judicial District Court by the Plaquemine Lumber & Improvement Co. for dispossession.

The holdings of the Chetimaches now form the Indian Village,

one of the Wilbert groups of plantations.

A number of suits were brought to the supreme court of Louisiana regarding the titles of Indians:-See Reboul vs. Nero, 5 Mart O S 494; Martin vs. Johnson, same book 655 (1818); Spencer vs. Grimball, 6 Martin N S 355 (1827); Brooks vs. Norris, 6 Rob 175 (1843).

The Indians in Iberville left little behind them from which their early history might be traced. Not knowing how to write and leaving no buildings or monuments of any consequence, the archaeologist is at a loss to fathom out much if anything regarding their mode of

living or antecedents.

In Iberville, there has been located a number of Indian mounds. There is one on the Mound plantation, near Rosedale; one on Bayou Sorrell, south side, about one mile from Lower Grand River; another on the Australia plantation, six miles above Plaquemine. Perhaps the largest and most important is the mound at Bayou Goula, located within a half mile of the village of Bayou Goula. This mound was most carefully explored in the spring of 1940, as a W. P. A. project under the direction of James A. Ford, research assistant in archaeology of the Louisiana State University School of Geology. There has been taken from the mound the bones of Indians, dogs, bears, also flint knives, stone axes, pottery, other crude instruments and numerous bright colored beads, this latter no doubt being received by the Indians from the very early settlers in barter and trade.

LOUISIANA EXPLORATION

It is strange, yet a fact, that for thousands of years, or up to 1492, the peoples of Europe, Asia and Africa did not know of the existence of the western half of the earth. Great nations such as Rome, Greece, Carthage, Persia, and Turkey, flourished and passed into history; great statesmen, business men, lawyers, doctors, kings and emperors, daring explorers, famous generals, painters, poets and wisemen, religious seers and prophets, appeared on the stage of time then disappeared, leaving more than half the world unknown and unheard of.

A great maritime traffic existed in the 15th century, between England, France, Spain, Portugal, Holland and the far East-China and India. There was no Suez Canal nor railroads, and ships to reach the far East, had to travel thousands of miles, with great loss of time,

danger and expense around the Cape of Good Hope.

Columbus, a simple sea-faring man, conceived the idea that the world was round and that by sailing direct west from Spain, he must necessarily find a short route to India. He made the trip and found a new world blocking his passage. He presented his sponsors, Ferdinand and Isabella of Spain, with half the world. His example was followed by explorers from England, France, Portugal and Holland. England seemed satisfied with the eastern part of North America; Spain with the southern part, Mexico and Central America; the Portuguese with South America and France with Canada and the central United States. Exploration, seizure and conquest moved rapidly. France firmly established itself in the St. Lawrence area, moved southwest to claim the vast domain which eventually became the great Louisiana Purchase.

In 1672, Louis Joliet and Father Marquette were appointed by Governor Frontenac of Canada to explore the Mississippi valley and locate the passage to China. They descended the great river to the Arkansas river, then retraced their steps; later returned to complete the work. In 1681, Robert Cavalier Sieur de LaSalle was authorized by King Linuis XIV of France to explore the Mississippi to its mouth. His band consisted of 49 men, including his great friend Tonti and Father Zenobius, leaving Quebec Dec. 21, 1682. Their progress was rapid; they rested awhile among the Tunica Indians in northwest Louisiana and on April 6, 1682, reached the three mouths of the great father of waters. LaSalle made another trip from France in 1684, sailing direct west, to try and reach the mouth of the Mississippi. He, however, missed his great objective, landing on Texas shores, where he was shortly after murdered.

LOUISIANA COURTS

The constitution of 1921 authorized that "The judicial power shall be vested in a supreme court, courts of appeal and such other courts as are hereafter provided."

Supreme Court:—This is made up of one chief justice and six associate justices. The state was divided into six supreme court districts, two judges being elected from the New Orleans area (First District) and one from each of the other five districts. The Fifth District comprises East and West Baton Rouge, East and West Felicianna, St. Helena, Livingston, Tangipahoa, Washington, St. Tanmany, Iberville, Pointe Coupee and St. Landry.

Courts of Appeal:—The state is also divided into three court of appeal districts, one for the New Orleans area; one for south Louisiana and the other for north Louisiana, each appeal court being composed of three judges. For election purposes, the state was again subdivided into three districts, one judge being elected from each of said units. The Second District of the first circuit is made up of Iberville, West Baton Rouge, Pointe Coupee, Ascension, Assumption, St. Martin, Terrebonne and Lafourche.

District Courts:—The state was divided into 26 Judicial Districts—the Parish of Orleans excepted—Iberville, West Baton Rouge and Pointe Coupee forming the 18th District.

Justice Courts:—The Constitution of 1921 authorized the elimination or not, on the part of the legislature, of justice courts. They were permitted to remain, but district courts were given concurrent jurisdiction, which in a measure did away with these minor courts.

The evolution of Louisiana's judicial system from 1682 on down through French, Spanish, Territorial and state regimes, is interesting to both layman and lawyer.

Under French Law. Louisiana was a French province from 1682 to 1762, during which time the French law was introduced. The province was under the jurisdiction of a governor general, assisted by a superior council, which, besides the French law, provided certain ordinances and customs. The province was subdivided into districts, for each of which a commandant was appointed, who administered justice generally, passing all sales, appeals being made to the governor general and his council in New Orleans. The province was sparsely settled and there was little litigation, the duties of the commandant being confined mainly to transfers and land grants. There are no records in the Iberville court house of suits or transfers.

Under Spanish Law. France ceded Louisiana to Spain in 1762.

The offices of governor general and commandant were retained. The Spanish legal system was installed, appeal being made to the governor general and his Cabildo in New Orleans. The province was redistricted in 1769 and Iberville made into a county, with Galveztown as county seat. The records of Iberville practically begin from this date.

Spain ceded Louisiana back to France, Dec. 1, 1800, but retained practical control until Nov. 30, 1803. By a treaty of sale between France and the United States, dated April 30, 1803, Louisiana became a United States possession. The treaty was ratified Oct. 21, 1803 and Louisiana was delivered to the United States Dec. 20th of that year.

Under Federal (Territorial) Laws. By act of congress of March 26, 1804, "All that portion of country ceded by France to the U. S., under the name of Louisiana, which lies south of the Mississippi territory and of an east and west line to begin on the Mississippi River at the 33 degree of latitude and to extend west to the west boundary of said cession, shall constitute a territory of the United States, under the name of the Territory of Orleans." The remaining portion became the District of Louisiana (now Arkansas). By Act of March 3, 1805, it became the Territory of Orleans, with W. C. C. Claiborne as governor and Julien Poydras representative in congress.

The Act of March 2, 1805, authorized that when the Territory of Orleans could show a population of 65,000, it would be admitted to the union as a state. When this fact spread through the South, numerous settlers from Texas and other areas came into New Orleans, to take advantage of both Louisiana and United States citizenship. Several suits were filed later, to have these undesirables declared alien enemies and ordered deported. See Desbois' case, 2nd Martin (OS) 185 and U. S. vs. Laferty et als, 3rd Martin (OS) 734.

The Territorial legislature meeting in December, 1804, divided the territory into 12 counties, as follows: Orleans, German Coast, Acadia, Iberville, Lafourche, Rapides, Natchitoches, Concordia, Ouachita, Opelousas, Attakapas and Pointe Coupee. It will be noticed that the word "county" embraced considerable area and it was not until the Constitution of 1845 that the word "county" was completely eliminated and the word "parish" came into common use.

By Act 12 of 1807, the territory was again subdivided and this time into 19 counties, as follows: New Orleans, St. Bernard, Plaquemines, St. Charles, St. John the Baptist, St. James, Asconsion, Assumption, Lafourche Interior, Iberville, Baton Bonge, Polnte Coupee, Concordia, Ounchita, Rapides, Avoyelles, Natchitoches, St. Landry and Attakapas, Galvestown being retained as the Iberville county seat. Reports of appeal cases to the superior court of the Territory of Orleans begin with the 1st Martin (O5) from the Fall of 1809. There

is no record of appeal cases under either French or Spanish domination. Under another act of 1807, certain district courts were established and Iberville, Ascension, Assumption, St. James and Lafourche became the Second Superior Court District. The office of parish judge was created. He was also sheriff, clerk, coroner and county treasurer. In 1808, the legislature authorized the codification of all laws, which book was known as the Digest and formed the foundation of the present Civil Code, which contains the fundamental laws of the state.

One of the first courts created by the Territorial Legislature of 1806 was the Parish Court. It had jurisdiction in all cases from \$25.00 up to \$500.00 and in all criminal cases where the punishment was not death or necessarily hard labor. The judge was also a committing magistrate. All cases involving amounts of \$500.00 or over and the severe criminal cases went into the superior court. By the Acts of 1833, the judge of the parish court was also president of the police jury.

The court of probates also came into being in 1806, and was under the jurisdiction of the parish judge; both were eliminated in 1846. The parish court was resurrected by the State Legislature in 1868, but the constitution of that year failed to mention parish courts and they ceased to exist.

Up to 1879 the supreme court had jurisdiction in all cases where the amount involved was over \$500.00; but business was growing so rapidly and the court dockets so crowded with cases, that to relieve the situation, the constitution of 1879 raised the appellate jurisdiction to amounts over \$2,000.00 and created courts of appeal with jurisdiction of all cases of over \$100.00 and up to \$2,000.00.

Territory of Orleans Becomes State of Louisiana. The Act of February 20, 1811, of the national legislature authorized that a constitutional convention be held in November, to consist of not more than 60 representatives, for the purpose of drafting a state constitution and the adoption of the national constitution. Its membership was made up of its most eminent citizens, as follows: Julien Poydras, chairman, then territorial representative; Allen B. Magruder, Jean Noel Destrahan, Alexander Porter and Eligius Fromentin, later U. S. senators; Placide E. Bossier, later U. S. congressman, Henry Johnson, later governor and U. S. senator; Jacques Villere and Hy. S. Thibodaux, later governors; Joseph Brown, later U. S. senator and minister to France, and Bernard Marigny, planter and orator. Iberville was represented by William Wycoff and Amant Hebert.

After a debate of three days, statehood and the national constitution were adopted. As the Territory of Louisiana (now Arkansas) was in existence, a minority report at the convention suggested calling the new state "Lower Louisiana." Under this first constitution, the judiciary was provided for, to consist of a supreme court of not less than three nor more than five members, and such other courts as the coming legislature might deem necessary.

It will be noted that with the gathering of each subsequent constitutional convention, the courts of the state were rearranged and

were given different numbers.

Criminal Laws of Louisiana. From the very beginning of Louisiana in 1682 on down to 1926, the criminal jurisprudence of the state consisted of a conglomeration of criminal statutes, frequently amended or annulled and in a measure quite confusing. The legislature of 1926 realized that these laws should be codified and by Act 276 of 1926 authorized that a code be drafted, and by Act 2 of 1928 adopted the Criminal Code. Benj. Wall Dart, a New Orleans attorney, brought forth in 1932 his Code of Criminal Procedure, which today is the legal authority in all criminal matters.

COURT HOUSES IN IBERVILLE

The parish, since its inception in 1769, has had five court houses. The first was at Galveztown, the second at Point Pleasant and the last

three at Plaquemine.

No information can be gathered from the records at the court house of a building for the transaction of public business at the first county seat—Galvez—and it is more than probable that the office of the commandant, or a room in the fort or barracks, served the purpose from 1769 to the time that the seat of government was changed in 1807.

The legislature of the Territory of Orleans met in New Orleans in 1807, redistricted the state, dividing it into 19 districts (or parishes or counties), of which Iberville was one, and authorizing the

change of the district seat from Galvez to Point Pleasant.

Galveztown, named for the then governor of the province, Galvez, was located on the banks of Bayou Manchac, or the river Iberville, where the Manchac empties into the Amite. Here, away from the continually flooding waters of the unguarded Mississippi, and free from the noise of the breaking swells of the shallow Lake Maurepas, the Spanish felt was the ideal place for a future city, and it was here, on the banks of a stream which was thought to be of great future commercial value, they pitched the settlement, laying off

streets, erecting a fort, a chapel, and the first court house.


At this first meeting of the first legislature of the first territory of the great Louisiana Purchase, its first mistake was made in selecting Point Pleasant as the future parish seat of Iberville. Unknown and unsung, unwanted and not sought, the capital honors were crowded on a settlement which did not exist. Without stores or church and a scant few firesides, its only advantage was that on a clear evening one might hear the distant tinkle of the Angelus at the St. Gabriel Church across the river nearly a mile away. Nevertheless this was to be the seat of justice of this junior commonwealth. But it was not to be for long; as a matter of fact, the thriving town of Plaquemine usurped the honors early and almost entirely. The officers resided in Plaquemine, and the greater part of the public business was transacted in Plaquemine, the officials going to the county seat, nine miles south, for the purpose only of holding court and police jury meetings.

POINT PLEASANT

On July 30, 1810 (see CBE E. 158), the parish authorities acquired from Amant Hebert a tract of land located at Point Pleasant, being Sec 60 of T 9 Range 13 E, with a front of two arpents by the depth and containing some 12 acres. On December 21, 1824 (GB I,

Entry 6-1) the Iberville Public School Association, acting through Michael Schlater, August LeBlanc, August Richard, and Pierre Mizael Lambremont, sold the public school building located on this land to the Police Jury, acting through Aubrey Dupuy, to be used as a court house. In CB L Entry 263 we note that on January 7, 1828, a contract was entered into by the Police Jury, represented by Valery Hebert and Edward Landry, with Augustus St. Dizier, for the construction of a jail.

As the town of Plaquemine was fast growing and the business of the parish centered in and around it, the people were asking for a change in the parish seat. The Police Jury met June 1, 1835. It was composed of Paul Hebert, First District; Dr. Charles Clement, Second District; Wm. B. Robertson, Third District; Jean Estevan, Fourth District; Timoleon Lassassier, Fifth District, Edmund Joly, Sixth District; Eliphalet Slack, Seyenth District, with Louis Petit as clerk. (See minutes of Police Jury, Iberville Gazette, June 13, 1835). They authorized the removal of the county seat to Plaquemine.

The first court house in Plaquemine was acquired September 12, 1835, see CB-P Entry 90, from Joseph Francois Gainnie, which building had been known as the Gainnie Hotel, located on Court Street near the Mississippi River; Court Street at that time being known as Still Street. Owing to the fact that the court house was at the head of this street, it subsequently became known as Court Street.

In CB P Entry 317 there is recorded a contract for the construction of a jail, dated April 4, 1835; the Police Jury being represented by Eugene Amedee Sherburne, Valery Hebert, and Louis Desobry. The contract was with Eliphalet Slack. The Police Jury in 1813 sold the property at Point Pleasant, which court house later became St. Peter's (St. Raphael's) Catholic Church. See CB 5 E 275.

Chambers, as well as Fortier's History of Louisiana, places the change in the county seat in 1842. However, because of the wishes of the greater part of the voters for the change, it is very evident, from copies of the *Iberville Pioneer* of 1836 that Plaquemine began to

function as a county seat as early as 1836.

The life of the first court house in Plaquemine was short. A new levee necessitated its removal. On May 3, 1848, as shown in Mo. B 2 E 23 and CB 1 E 252, a sale was made by Honore F. Deblieux to the Police Jury, represented by August Christian as president, of the property measuring 140 feet on Main Street by the depth of 284 feet on Fourth Street (now Church Street), the land on which the present city hall now stands.

On September 26, 1848, CB 1 E 278, a contract was entered into by the Police Jury, represented by Don Rosamond Orillion, Paulin Dupuy and Thomas Winthrop Brown with George and Thomas Weldon of Natchez, Miss., for the erection of a court house and jail, to cost \$15,510. The new court house and jail were readily erected and in CB 1 E 433, we find the acceptance at a cost of \$16,119.17, September 26, 1849. The deed of acceptance states: "Time would be allowed for the addition of the two front steps, the granite for same having been ordered from a foreign country and was on the high seas." In 1888 a vault 15x18 was added. The vault in 1907 was acquired by a local lumber company. The old forty niner, renovated, became the present city hall, see CB 39 E 56, Nov. 21, 1906. The second jail at the old Court House was erected October, 1883, Misc. 4 E 418.

The present commodious structure on Canal Avenue, also known as Railroad Avenue, was constructed in 1906 by the Police Jury, with Andrew H. Gay as its president. The lot measures 280 feet front on the Avenue by the depth of 200 feet on Meriam Street and was acquired from Jacob McWilliams, see CB 37 E 759 and CB 39 E 906.

BAYOU MANCHAC

This small stream, quite famous in the early history of Iberville, has practically dropped into innocuous desuctude. However, it remains today as the boundary line between the parishes of Iberville and East Baton Rouge. The Indians called it Ascantia, the French named it River Iberville. It is also known as the River Manchacque or Manchack. This stream was a short cut from the Mississippi River, only 19 miles to the Amite River or but a total of 31 miles from the Mississippi River to deep water in Lake Maurepas, then through Lake Pontchartrain and Lake Borgne to the Gulf. The French gave it much promise and in 1767, then under Spanish rule, the town of Galvez was laid out, to become the first county seat of the county of Iberville. The English also considered it of strategic value, cleared the channel in 1765 and erected at its head, on the Mississippi River a fort which they called Fort Bute. This bayou during the high water period each spring, would fill up with drift and silt, making the bayou uscless to navigation and causing much flooding of farmlands. The Louisiana Legislature on March 29, 1826 appointed a commission, composed of James Nelson, John Kleinpeter and W. Webb of East Baton Rouge and Charles DeArmas and Philip Winfree of Iberville, with power to dam the bayon at its mouth, which was done in the fall of 1826.

This small stream, little known today, formed the north boundary of the Isle of Orleans, on which was located the present City of New Orleans. This Isle was bounded on the north by Bayou Manchae, on the west by the Mississippi River, on the south by the Gulf of Mexico and on the east by the three lakes mentioned above.

It was this important island that President Jefferson wanted to buy from France in 1803, and about which he instructed his emissaries, James Monroe and Robert Livingston, to negotiate with Napoleon and to offer him up to ten million dollars. Napoleon, however, despairing of holding his American Empire against both the British and the Spanish, made an offer to transfer to the United States, the whole of his Louisiana possession for the sum of fifteen million dollars.

This bayou remained for some years an international boundary with Great Britain and to some extent with the Spanish kingdom. It was in 1810 that West Florida revolted and set up a republic of its own with Baton Rouge as its capital. This bayou then divided two independent American nations; West Florida shortly thereafter being annexed to the United States.

It was on the banks of this bayou on June 7, 1807 that there took place the famous duel between Governor C. C. Claiborne and Daniel Clark, the Governor being wounded in the thigh as a result.

There have been persistent proposals to again connect this bayou with the Mississippi and to make it a link in the National Intercoastal Waterways. In 1931 the House Rivers and Harbors Committee ordered a survey to determine the possibilities of this connection. The report shows that the tonnage would not justify it. The question, however, bobs up every now and then in the proceedings of the Rivers and Harbors Committee.

THE CONSTITUTIONS OF LOUISIANA

1811-1812. Preparatory to statehood, Louisiana's first constitutional convention met in New Orleans, under federal enactment, November 4, 1811, consisting of 42 members, with Julien Poydras, territorial delegate to congress, as president. The constitution was adopted January 28, 1812 and promptly accepted by the United States Congress.

1845. The Acts of 1841 and 1844 approved of the calling of the next convention, consisting of 77 members, which met in Jackson August 5, 1884. Considerable time was lost in being wined and dined. The convention adjourned over the Christmas holidays, to meet in New Orleans, January 14, 1845. The new constitution was adopted by popular vote November 5, 1845; Joseph Walker, late governor, was president.

1852. The people desiring a more restricted and democratic form of government, voted to have another convention, which met in Baton Rouge, July 5, 1852 with Duncan F. Kenner, a wealthy cane farmer, as president. It curtailed the powers of the governor, making elective the secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, attorney general, supreme court, state judges, and district attorneys, etc.

1861. This was known as the secession convention and convened in Baton Rouge, January 26, 1861, with former Governor Alexandre Mouton as president. The vote to secede was adopted by 113 to 17; the convention re-assembled March 11, 1861 and changed the constitution of 1852 by substituting the word "Confederate States" for "United States."

1864. General Banks, in charge of federal troops in Louisiana, called a constitutional convention which met in New Orleans, April 6, 1864, with E. H. Durrell as president. The sessions were boisterous, the constitution of 1852 being completely changed. This constitution had first to be approved by the United States Government, which was never done.

1868. The Civil War over and Louisiana being under reconstruction, General Sheridan in command of all Federal troops in Louisiana and the state in general, in 1868 called an election for the holding of a constitutional convention. Some 130,000 citizens had recently been registered, of which the far greater portion were negroes. The convention met in New Orleans, March 7, 1868, with Joseph G. Talialerro, a supreme count judge as president, with a majority of its membership negroes. Practically an entire new constitution was the result of its three and one half months of labor.

1879. The white people in Louisiana regained political control in 1877 and by Act 8 of the extra session of 1879, called an election

to approve the calling of a constitutional convention. The convention consisting of 134 members, met in New Orleans in February with Louis A. Wiltz, later a governor, as president.

1898. The constitution of 1879 lasted 19 years, when Act 52 of 1896 authorized an election, for the calling or not, of another constitutional convention. The convention was voted, and with E. B. Kruttschnitt, attorney, as president, got under way in New Orleans, April 27, 1898. Again fearing negro political domination, the convention adopted the White Democratic Primary.

1913. This convention was called for the purpose of refunding the State debt. It met in New Orleans, October 28, 1913, with Charles J. Theard, New Orleans attorney, as president.

1921. With the possible exception of the 1811 convention, the most important ever held was that in 1921. The constitution of 1898 had been amended so frequently no limitation was placed on the powers of the members and a very satisfactory constitution was enacted. It met in Baton Rouge with 146 delegates; Hewett Bouanchaud, attorney of New Roads, being made president.

THE CATHOLIC CHURCH IN LOUISIANA AND IBERVILLE

A history of America or of Louisiana or even of such a small unit as the Parish of Iberville, would not be complete did it not dwell at great length on the Catholic religious movement, which is so entwined with every step of exploration, civilization and progress of the two Americas. Historians have devoted far too few pages to this religious side, which has worked hand in hand with the creation of the most wonderful empire of all time.

The Catholic church in Europe was at great height in 1492. It formed a great part of man's everyday life and no undertaking of any size was begun without imploring the assistance of Divine Providence.

Columbus was one of the first to recognize that the world was round and he figured that by sailing directly west from Spain, he would necessarily reach the western coast of Asia and accomplish his great objective, a short route to India. He set out in the spring of 1492 in three small vessels, with a modest crew and several priests. The Bishop of Cadiz was present and extended the departing heroes the blessings of Almighty God. Columbus landed on the island of San Salvador October 12th and his first act was the erection of the cross of Christ and from this planting of the cross, grew the seeds of the Catholic faith in the Americas, readily taking root in its fertile soil and keeping pace with man in the upbuilding of this new empire.

France, England, Italy and other countries sent out expeditions of exploration and conquest. The French were the first to sail up the St. Lawrence, explore the great lakes and to discover the father of waters—the Mississippi. They established Quebec as one of their first settlements, making it a religious center, with a seminary and from it missionary priests were sent out to administer to the colonists and convert the pagan Indians. The enormous province of Louisiana and the Mississippi valley, for more than 100 years, was under the episcopal sec of Quebec.

In July, 1698 Bishop St. Vallier of Quebec dispatched a party of priests, consisting of Fathers Francois de Montigny, Antonio Davion, Francis Buisson de St. Cosme and several Canadians, with Tonti as guide, to explore the religious situation. On Christmas day, the three priests said mass in the village of the Chickashas in Arkansas. Father St. Cosme remained with the Chickashas, Father Davion going to the Tunicas on the Louisiana-Arkansas line and Father DeMontigny casting his lot with the Tensas farther down the river (at what is now Newellton). His health failing, Father St. Cosme left with two companions and an Indian guide in 1705 for a visit to Biloxi. Stop-

ping over night with the Chetamaches near Donaldsonville, he and his two companions were murdered and his Indian guide made a slave by the Indians. Father Davion worked for 22 years among the Tunicas and became a landmark and authority to all passing craft.

On October 24, 1698, France sent out another expedition in charge of Pierre le Moyne, Sieur de Iberville and his brother, Jean Baptiste LeMoyne de Bienville. On this ship was Father Du Ru, a Jesuit.

According to Baudier's History of the Catholic Church in Louisiana, (1939) page 28, Iberville was given the wonderful distinction of having the first church in the whole of Louisiana erected in its midst, and to Father Du Ru the honor of having erected the first place for divine worship in the province. The church was located among the Bayou Goula Indians on the banks of Bayou Goula about a mile and a half from the river, and consisted of a crude building 20 by 50, the first mass being said on March 28, 1700.

LAND GRANTS-LAND SURVEYS

It will be remembered that France laid claim to the Louisiana Territory in 1698 by right of discovery, exploration and settlement. France ceded Louisiana to Spain in 1762, which country held this colony for 38 years, returning Louisiana in 1800 to France, who sold it to the United States in 1803.

Land Grants by the French. France being engaged in wars, with considerable internal strife, was too busy to properly colonize its new province, but did make quite a few grants of land in this part of the New World. The grantees usually were men of wealth and influence, who guaranteed to colonize. One of the first and largest grants was made to Duvernay, who came over in 1761 with his brother, two sisters and 25 settlers, intending to raise indigo, rice and tobacco. Although considerable caution was observed, many grants were made to careless individuals after hurried and uncertain surveys, which later on, owing to titles not being approved or recorded, caused a great deal of litigation.

Grants by the Spanish. The land along the Mississippi River, Red and Ouachita Rivers, Bayous Lafourche and Teche and other navigable streams was rapidly being entered and settled, through grants made by the Spanish Crown. The Spaniards also made numerous large grants of land; among the largest was one to Philipe Enrique Neri, Baron de Bastrop, a Hollander, who received a grant of 12 square leagues or 108 square miles, which formed a good part of the Parish of Morehouse; this being in June 1797. Bastrop agreed to send over 400 families. He associated with him in this venture Abraham Morehouse, a pioneer settler, from whom later on the Parish of Morehouse took its name; the city of Bastrop taking its name from the Baron. Owing to conditions not fulfilled, the grant was never confirmed. Don Josepha, Marquis de Maison Rouge, received a large grant, now forming a part of the City of Monroe.

The Spanish government began to increase the number of immigrants, by offering bonuses from \$200 up per person, with free transportation.

Among the larger Spanish grants made in Iberville, we might mention: The Square League, 3 miles to the rear of White Castle, containing 5,760 acres made to Christopher Adams in 1784.

The Baltimore tract and part of the White Castle and Texas Plantation, containing 3,756 acres, entered by Pedro Belly, in 1774.

Oliver Blanchard 1,437 acres, forming part of the Montecello and Oakley plantation (now the mate farm)

Louis Alexander Reboul, 1,919 acres, now the Bay Farm on Grosse Tete, and part of the Keep place.

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Jean Franchbois, 1,000 acres, and 1,936 acres, part of Bay Farm and Corinne plantations on Bayou Grosse Tete.

Eliphalet Slack, 1,770 acres, rear of Bay Farm on Bayon Grosse Tete.

Joseph Erwin, 1,479 acres, St. Louis plantation (proper).

Theo Zacharie, 1,249 acres, forming part of Cedar Grove plantation.

John R. Lewis, 1,329 acres, forming the Belle Grove plantation. Pierre Sigur, 997 acres, which became the Alhambra plantation.

When Governor General O'Reilly took over the reins as governor of the Louisiana province in 1769, he set aside every vestige of French law and customs and in their stead introduced on behalf of the Spanish Crown, the O'Reilly code of practice and procedure, based on the laws of Spain, which code was the foundation of the present Louisiana Code of Practice.

In 1798 Governor General Gayoso, regarding land grants, issued to his commandants the following instructions:

- 1—Commandants are forbidden to issue grants to new settlers, who had accepted grants in other areas.
- 2—Settlers without money, slaves or movable property, would not be given a grant, until they had remained on the post for 2 years, in some honest and useful occupation.
- 3—Settlers with means are to be divided as follows:

 Married settlers require occupation of the land for 2 years.

 Unmarried mechanics, 3 years, and

 Unmarried settlers without vocation, 4 years.
- 4-No land grants to be made to traders or speculators.

In July, 1799, Intendant Morales added the following rules to the land code:

- I—Each newly arrived family to be granted a tract along the Mississippi River of 8 arpents by depth of 40 arpents; or an inland tract of 800 arpents.
- 2—All grantees along navigable streams must provide a road along the front of thirty feet, also a 15 foot bridge across canals, reaching to the river front.
- 3-All settlers must clear to a depth of 2 arpents within 3 years.
- 4—No second concessions (land back of the first grant), until compliance with the above regulations and a proper survey and title recorded for the front grant.
- 5—That within six months after promulgation of these ordinances, all grantees must record their titles, after proper survery made.

Land Grants and Activity by the United States. Immediately after the Louisiana Purchase Governor Claiborne made a report to the President concerning land grants in southern Louisiana, which in part was as follows: "Lands were obtained with little difficulty or expense; the immigrant made his selection of any unoccupied tract, presented a written request for an order of survey and if no obstacles intervened, the governor issued the order and on the return of the plat and the payment of moderate fees for the survey, the grant was issued. Many settlers squatted on land neither surveyed nor approved, causing confusion and laying the foundation for much future trouble."

Quieting Titles. Congress passed an act May 15, 1828, to test out titles to all land grants made by the French and Spanish in the several states, once forming the Louisiana Territory. Every apparent owner was obligated to come forward and establish his title. Commissioners were appointed, who sat in different communities for several weeks. Notwithstanding the fact that there were no post offices, no mails, no trains, the greater part of the titles were either approved or disapproved. The life of the several commissions were extended from time to time. Notwithstanding all these precautions, a number of owners did not appear and it was not until many years after, that the record was made complete. One glaring example of this was section 14 of Township 9 Range 12, on which the present city of Plaquemine is located. This particular section, containing 358.27 acres, had been entered under a Spanish grant in 1782 by Antoine Rodriguez. The title was not cleared until February 10, 1897, when a special act of Congress was passed, approving the grant, thus perfecting the hundreds of sales and mortgages made to this city property during these 115 years.

Subdivision of Land by the United States. A plan of subdivision of all public lands in the United States was adopted by an Act of Congress May 18, 1796. The plan provided that all land should be divided into townships and ranges or squares; the plan following certain base lines, to be established in the respective states. Each of these squares or townships was to contain 36 sections, or square miles; each section again to be divided into four major quarters, known as the northeast, the northwest, the southeast and the southwest quarter, each containing 160 acres or as near as possible; these major quarters being again subdivided into four smaller quarters of forty acres each, also to be designated as the northeast, the northwest, etc., quarter of the southeast or the southwest quarter as the case may be. For example, you might have the northeast quarter of the northeast quarter of section 25 of township 10 range eleven, east, or it might be west, or north or south of a certain base line. The sketch following will perhaps show more clearly the existing subdivision:



By the Act of March 3, 1811, Congress approved a second method for the surveying of all lands along navigable streams. This act provided that such lands shall be divided into sections having 58 poles front by 465 poles in depth. (A pole being 51 yards or one rod, or 164 feet). The surveyors found the majority of grants measured in arpents, (a French measurement), having 192 feet as distinguished from an acre which has 208 feet 84 inches, and they continued to survey tracts along such navigable streams into lots 5x40 arpents; that is, in sections containing 200 arpents or approximately 165 acres, which are called radiating sections. While it was the intention of the French and Spanish authorities that all settlers should have grants not exceeding 8x40 arpents, along navigable streams, a great many grants were made for larger acreages and up to 1,200 and 1,500 arpents, and the greater amount of grants were for acreages far less than the 320 arpents intended. All such French and Spanish grants were made to conform to the original entries. Owing to the meandering of the streams, some of these grants opened in the rear, and as many closed, many running to a point, especially where there were abrupt bends in the stream.



The above shows a township, range, radiating sections, the forty and eighty aspent lines as established in all particles by U. S. surveyors.

By the same act of Congress, March 3, 1811, provision was made that the land owner fronting any navigable stream would have the preference to enter another 40 arpent tract back of the front grant; this grant being called the second concession. Nearly all original grantees took advantage of this right and entered this second concession, thus running their lands back 80 arpents from the stream. This accounts for what is known as the 40 arpent line as well as the 80 arpent line, running parallel with all navigable streams in the state, and set forth on all Parish (County) maps.

The preceding sketch shows townships, range, radiating section and the opening or closing, with the 40 and 80 arpent line, together with the front concession and the back or second concession:

Large Federal Land Grants. Among the many land grant acts by the national government, the following are the most important:

Act of March 3, 1811 and February 28, 1833, authorizing the owners of lands along navigable streams to enter the land in the rear of their respective properties, said rear tract being known as the second concession.

The Military Bounty Act of 1812, authorizing the grant of lands to soldiers of the Revolutionary War as well as those of the war of 1812, with a latter amendment to cover the soldiers of the Mexican War.

The Act of 1812, known as the land grant to states, also authorizing the granting of land for school purposes, of every regular sixteenth section. Also the amendment to this Act, April 24, 1820.

The Homestead and Pre-emption Laws of May 29, 1830.

The swamp land grants of March 2, 1849 and September 28, 1850, authorizing the ceding by the national government to the respective states, of all lands then known as swamp or overflow lands.

Regarding the Military Bounty Act of 1812, many agents bought up for trifling values this land script and resold them. The script authorized the entry in any state, of any land not formerly claimed. Some of this script was used here in Iberville to fit in with a tract of land where the title from the United States was doubtful.

There were many other acts passed by Congress, authorizing grants of land to Indians, to certain corporations to encourage the building of railroads, to individuals for meritorious service, such as the grant of a large tract in the parish of Pointe Coupee to the Marquis de Lafayette.

There are no public lands left in the parish of Iberville, belonging either to the national or state governments. The Larger State Land Grants. The Homestead Act No. 21 of 1871 authorizing the heads of families to enter tracts, not to exceed 160 acres, was instrumental in reducing the acreage in the state considerably.

Act 104 of 1871 authorized the sale of the state's lands and was the means of transfer of many thousand acres in Iberville as well as other parishes.

The Act of 1884, page 128, made provision for the grant of lands to Confederate soldiers. The Act 116 of 1886, extended this grant to the widows of Confederate soldiers.

Land Offices. (U.S.) The act of Congress of March 2, 1805, authorized a survey of all the land in the Territory of Orleans (State of Louisiana) under the direction of Isaac Bridges as surveyor general The territory was divided into two districts, by a line from north to south through the middle of the state, one called the eastern district with headquarters in New Orleans and the other the western district with offices in Natchitoches. This line was also called the base line or meridian. Another base line ran east to west along the 31st degree of latitude, or the northern line of the Florida parishes. Several other shorter base lines were later developed. This act of 1805 also authorized the appointment of two commissioners and a receiver, whose authority was unlimited in all matters pertaining to Federal public lands, entries, and titles. In February of 1811 the northern district was established with offices in Quachita (now Monroe). In 1831 the eastern district was set up, with Greensburg as a center. In 1847 a Federal land office was established at Winnsbord. In 1851 the state was re-subdivided into the four major districts above mentioned and subsequently thereafter the numerous U. S. Land Offices created were discontinued and the work centralized in the major office in New Orleans. In 1910 through the efforts of the Register of the State Land Office, Fred J. Grace, the office in New Orleans was merged with the state office in Baton Rouge and all U. S. surveys and records made a permanent part of the Louisiana State Land Office, See Act No. 6 of 1910,-

Louisiana State Land Office. The State Land Office was created by Act 39 of the extra session of the State Legislature of 1870. The office of Register came into being by Act 75 of 1880, to be appointed by the Governor. The position was made elective by Act 193 of 1904.

IBERVILLE PARISH BOUNDARIES

With Ascension Act 140 of 1820; Act of 1824, page 140 and Act 8 of 1841.

The east side boundary line was established by August F. Phelps, in 1837. In CB 49 E 183, there is recorded process verbal of a later boundary, authorized by the Police Juries of the two parishes and run by J. Charles Kleinpeter, C.E. for Iberville and A. S. Johnson, C.E. for the State.

With St. Martin, Act 130 of 1847.

With West Baton Rouge, Act 53 of 1828, and Act 186 of 1826. See also Acts 82 of 1848; 143 of 1852 and 14 of 1859.

With Pointe Coupee, Act 70 of 1859.

With Pointe Coupee and West Baton Rouge, Act 186 of 1826, 108 of 1848 and 197 of 1852.

With Assumption, by Act 83 of 1842.

IBERVILLE'S MAPS

THE OLDEST MAPS:—Among the very numerous maps on open file, No. 20, in the office of the Clerk and Recorder for Iberville Parish, and perhaps the oldest, is a survey of the property of Estevan Rivet in February, 1772. The map shows land fronting the St. Louis River, also known as the Micissipy. It also shows the approval of Don Louis Andry, then governor, as well as Louis Dutisne, Commandant for Iberville county.

Another map of more than passing interest is a survey of land on Plaquemine Point dated January, 1775, file No. 19, showing the point vis a vis (opposite) Plaquemine, which is the first mention in the archives of the Iberville Court Houses, that a settlement called Plaquemine existed as far back as 1775.

Parish Maps:—The first official map of Iberville, which also includes West Baton Rouge and Pointe Coupee, is one made by Andrew J. Powell in 1859. This forms the basis of all succeeding maps, gives names of owners and names of plantations. These maps are scarce and expensive.

The map by Charles H. Dickinson, then Iberville Parish Surveyor, followed in 1883. It is an improved copy of the Powell map and is much used. Many copies are still to be had.

PLAQUEMINE SURVEYS:—The first map of Plaquemine and on file in the Clerk's office, is one made in 1820 for the purpose of tracing what is still known as the corporation canal, which canal at that time was the main drain of Irishtown (then a suburb of the city) and in fact of all of Plaquemine proper. It gives the names of land owners in 1820 and the names of streets in existence then.

Another map of importance on file is dated June 2, 1831, which dedicates the major portion of the streets to public use. The streets shown are Second, later known as Bank Street, Third Street, later known as Seminary; Fourth Street, later known as Church, and Canal Avenue, now, known as Railroad Avenue, with Main, Plaquemine, Court, Meriam and Haase Streets running from east to west. This map was signed by Nathan Meriam, Louis Desobry, Giovanni Questi, Dr. Charles Clement, John 1. Brusle, Alfred Greand, John A. Haase and William Jones, all large property holders.

Then followed the J. P. Terrell survey of the Quaesti & Greand tract in 1835, which truct lies between Ganal Avenue and Bayon Road, and Plaquemine and Court Streets. The Meriam Addition (lying between Court & Meriam, Railroad Avenue & 14th) came March 20, 1852, and the Haase Addition (lying between Meriam & Haase, and Railroad Avenue & 14th Sis. followed in September 2, 1852.

The only authentic map of the city was made by Michael Gill in 1854. This map divides the city into Plaquemine, Haaseville, Trinity, Jesseson and Duttonville. These maps are very hard to locate.

WEEKLY PAPERS

The parish has always been well represented with newspapers, from 1830 down to 1944. In the 1830s, Plaquemine boasted of three weeklies at one time, and on several occasions later on of two weeklies and a daily. The first paper published was

- 1. The Iberville Gazette, on May 26, 1830, with John Keays as manager, being published in both English and French. This paper was merged with The Southern Sentinel in 1858.
- 2. The second paper to be established was *The Gondenser*, November 4, 1833, with M. Miller as editor and Rev. David D. Chestnut owner.
- 3. The Ambassador made its appearance July 19, 1837, with D. Austin Wadsworth as editor. This paper was sold May 19, 1838 (see CB S, E. 168), and acquired by Hon. John Dutton.
- 4. The first issue of *The Southern Sentinel* appeared July 30, 1847, with William P. Bradburn as manager and editor. In 1854, Bradburn issued a daily publication of his paper. In 1858, Peter Jennings was manager, and shortly thereafter he was succeeded by Joseph H. Balch. In the fall of 1858, Balch and Bradburn merged *The Iberville Gazette* and *The Southern Sentinel* under the name of *Sentinel-Gazette*. In the issue of *The Sentinel* of November 15, 1851, among a number of very interesting advertisements are several regarding runaway slaves.
 - 5. The Ibervillian.

 - 7. Republican Omnibus & Catholic Herald.
 - 8. Weekly Magnolia.

The parish is credited with the four above named papers, appearing in the 1850s, but a diligent search of the records at the Court House has failed to locate any of them.

9. The Iberville South made its bow to the community July 11, 1864, and has been in constant operation to date—1945—and is at present and has been for the past 30 years (The Tabernacla Herald [C] excepted), the only paper published in the parish. It is evident from several copies printed during the first ten years of its existence, that it was a Republican organ.

The South has changed hands many times. The first sale was made by Dr. Clarence Ward to Fred Versey and John H. Shanks, November 25, 1871, for \$800 (see CB 11 E, 69). The plant was acquired by the late Affred C. Munch, August, 1924, and at his death,

POST OFFICES IN IBERVILLE

POST ROADS-STEAMBOAT-RAILWAY MAIL SERVICE

The following data will probably appeal to the lovers of Louisiana history, and especially to the scholar and student, old and young, of Iberville. It has regard to post offices, past and present, established in this rich and fertile valley of the Mississippi. Post offices come and post offices go, settlements rise and flourish and many with their post offices are lost in the passing of ages. The man of today may know of many, recall some now extinct, but the child of tomorrow will be a stranger to many interesting facts of his community. The creation of rural mail carrier routes has caused the abandonment of many country post offices,

The first mail brought into the parish, and within fourteen months after the United States took possession, was in January of 1805, when a mail route was established January 4 from New Orleans to Manchack Church (St. Gabriel), along the east bank of the Mississippi River. There were no post offices (St. Gabriel 1813, Plaquemine 1822), no regular boat service and, of course, no trains. The second mail stage set up was by Act of Congress, May 15, 1833, from Pointe Coupee Court House to New Orleans, down the west side of the river. Post roads ceased to exist in 1835, when regular traffic was established on the Mississippi and the United States Government contracted with the boat owners for the carrying of the mail. The railways displaced the boats in 1887.

Postage stamps did not become legal or in common use until authorized by Act of Congress, March 3, 1847. Among the old papers to be found at the court house in Plaquemine are numerous envelopes, mostly home-made but the majority made from the original letter, being folded and sealed and postage being paid in various amounts according to distance, the largest postal fee set forth being 25 cents. That a real postal service existed in those early days is shown by the fact that we find a letter from New Orleans dated October 5, 1820, some twenty months prior to the opening of the post office in Plaquemine, addressed to Judge John Dutton, Plaquemine, La., which reached him in due time, the postage being 18½ cents.

Beginning at the lower end of the parish—west bank—we have had the following post offices established:

Cannonburg, located near the south end of Iberville, 3½ miles below White Castle; it took its name from the plantation and store of that name, which in turn took its name from Captain John W. Cannon and the fast steamboat named for him. The post office was established in 1875 by James J. Thompson, the store manager at Can-

nonburg. It continued to exist until 1885, when White Castle was put on the postal map and took all the trade from this down-the-river area.

White Castle became a post office in 1885, with Zack T. Earle as first postmaster, when the town of that name was created. The town got its name from the White Castle plantation, of which the town was a part. Oldsters advise that the name was given to the plantation by the wife of Governor Paul O. Hebert, before marriage a Miss Vaughn. While on their wedding tour, the home on the Vaughn place was painted white; on her return when she saw the vastly improved place, with the barns, fences and numerous white marble statues added to the spacious gardens, she exclaimed: "A White Castle!"

Samstown, a flourishing settlement two miles south of White Castle, became a post office center in 1909 with Louis Hebert as its first, last and only postmaster. It was named for Sam LeBlanc, a planter in that section. It ceased to exist in 1913 when a rural route was set up.

Dorseyville was named for Rev. Basile Dorsey, a negro preacher and land owner living in the village. It became a post office in 1887 with Leonce M. Soniat as first postmaster and continued to exist until 1925.

Bayou Goula is one of the oldest settlements in the parish and has the reputation of having its post office in the same building perhaps longer than any post office in Louisiana, or since 1875. A postal center was established there in 1870, with Ernest Callery as the first postmaster. The village took its name from the Bayou on which it is (was) located and which was named for the Goula Indians infesting the area for centuries before.

Note—St. Raphael, although the county seat from 1807 until 1836, was never made into a postal center. The settlement never flourished and up to 1836, when the seat of parish government was moved to Plaquemine, St. Raphael (or Point Pleasant) was still in embryonic village form. With a post office at St. Gabriel (directly across the river, 1813), and one at Plaquemine, 1822, nine miles north, and although a county seat, the settlement was never considered of sufficient size or with present business or future prospects to warrant the creation of a post office.

Soulouque was the name of an Indian chief and the name given to a small farm, six miles below Plaquemine which belonged to Theophile T. Allain, a well-educated negro. Through his influence and during negro domination and carpethag days in 1876, a post office was established by the Government with Allain as postmaster, which continued to exist until 1890, the mail being brought from Plaquemine.

Seymourville, a village of some 300 to 400, half a mile below

Plaquemine, became a post office center in 1883 with Frank M. Seymour as postmaster. For lack of sufficient business, it ceased to exist in 1910.

Plaquemine. On June 8, 1822, the village of Plaquemine—then with a population of 600—was selected by the United States Government as a site for a postal center and a post office was established under the name of Bayou Plaquemine, with Louis Desobry as its first postmaster. The name was changed to Plaquemine in July, 1824. Plaquemine means persimmon in French.

POST OFFICES-EAST BANK MISSISSIPPI RIVER

Manchae, located on the Manchae plantation, five miles above Plaquemine, took its name from the plantation of that name, and was set up as a post office in January, 1889, with Isaac Brown as first postmaster. It continued to serve the people of that area until 1910.

Forlorn Hope. The Forlorn Hope plantation, now Granada, located six miles below Plaquemine, became the location for a post office in 1881 under the name of Forlorn Hope, with Joseph Anger as postmaster. T. Walter Nicol, manager of the plantation in 1884, disliking the forlorn name of the office, applied to Hon. Edward J. Gay, then member of congress from this section, for a change in name. Mr. Gay had the name changed to the direct opposite—Sunshine.

Sunshine. See Forlorn Hope, above.

Iberville. The French explorer Sieur de Iberville, from whom the parish of Iberville gets its name, was further honored in 1905 when Joseph Byrne, a merchant living in the Bayou Paul section, petitioned for a post office which was set up in his store with himself as the first postmaster. The post office continues to this day. Iberville is located some nine miles from Plaquemine, on the Illinois Central Railway, 1½ miles from the Mississippi River.

St. Gabriel has the distinction of being the oldest post office in the parish, having been established on December 1, 1818, with David O. Hatch as the first postmaster; however, the post office was called therville and remained under that name until May 10, 1857, when Henry S. Browne, then postmaster, had the name changed to St. Gabriel. On May 6, 1872, the name was again changed to Sanford, but on May 20, or several weeks later, the name of St. Gabriel was restored.

Island, ineatest 14 noise below Plaquemine, by the River Road, was made into a just office in 1864 by Jules Dubon, who became the first protogram. The name was shanged to Carville in 1904 by Jules A. Carville, then pustmatter.

Carville. See Island, slove

Dreysus post office was named for Alex Dreysus, merchant in that section in 1915, and he was made the first postmaster. It was discontinued in 1930. Dreysus is located at the sar east end of the parish and within a half mile of the Iberville Ascension line.

POST OFFICES ON BAYOU PLAQUEMINE

Grescent, located six miles west of Plaquemine on Bayou Plaquemine, became a member of the postal union in 1900 and was located in the store of Kearny & Deblieux, with John Deblieux as the first postmaster. In 1917, when the rural route from Plaquemine was organized, Crescent as a post office ceased to exist.

Knowlton. The late Samuel G. Knowlton established a post office in his store at the Indian Village plantation in 1888, ten miles west of Plaquemine. Mr. Knowlton was made the first postmaster. It was discontinued in 1901.

POST OFFICES ON BAYOU GROSSE TETE AND MARINGOUIN

Grosse Tete takes its name from the village and bayou of that name and is located 16 miles by rail northwest of Plaquemine. It became a post office August 11, 1848, with Theodore Johnston as its first postmaster. It was discontinued October 20, 1859, but revived under the name of Regina, October 20, 1890, with Joseph E. Bargas as postmaster. The name was changed back to Grosse Tete by the postmaster, Louis O. Landry, August 20, 1902. The Rev. Wm. Samuel Slack, of Alexandria, a former resident of that area, advised that he has in his possession a letter dated 1838, or some ten years prior to the advent of any post office in that section, addressed to his grandfather, Eliphalet Slack, and mailed to Bayou Grosse Tete, Attakapas, Louisiana.

Regina. See Grosse Tete, above.

Rosedale, located 30 miles northwest of Plaquemine, is a village of 200 and became a post office September 2, 1857, with Charles Emile Dupuy as the first postmaster; it received its mail from 1859 for several years by the Grosse Tete, Opelousas & Baton Rouge Rail Road, being brought out on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Woolfolk had the distinction of being perhaps the shortest lived post office in the United States, being in existence but three months. It is (or was) located 32 miles northwest of Plaquemine, was named for the Austin Woolfolk family and was secured through the efforts of Henry R. Slack, who became the first postmaster, with his son, Wm. 5. black, as assistant. The post office was established in 1885.

Sunny Side became a post office in 1882. It was located in the hunny Side homestead, 55 miles northwest of Plaquemine, the prop-

erty of B. H. Peterson, then a star route mail contractor, who became the first postmaster. The Petersons left Iberville after the high water of 1884, the post office being removed to the cabin of one Johnson Davis, negro, who ran it for some months. The post office was discontinued in 1885, when the Woolfolk post office was put in near by.

Musson is a village fronting Bayou Maringouin, 36 miles northwest of Plaquemine, and 1½ miles south of Maringouin, and was named for a railroad man named Musson connected with the building of the Baton Rouge, Grosse Tete & Opelousas Railway. It developed as a post office center in 1859, and continued to 1890, when it was moved to Maringouin.

Wheelock, located in upper Iberville, 34 miles northwest of Plaquemine, was named after Col. E. B. Wheelock, a vice-president and general superintendent of the construction of the Texas & Pacific Railway (N. O. & Pacific Railway) and became a post office in 1884. The T. & P. Railway had acquired a 40-acre tract at this point on its line, expecting to establish a roundhouse there. The first, last and only postmistress (master) was Mrs. Kate Fair Nelson. The last money order was issued in May, 1888.

Maringouin, a progressive town today of 800, located in the northwest part of Iberville, 36 miles northwest of Plaquemine, became a post office in 1890, when the Musson post office was removed to Maringouin under the direction of Dr. A. W. Tufts, who became its first postmaster. It continues to serve this active community with Charles J. Slack in charge.

Third. One other tract of land granted to James Yarbourg, bounded on the upper side by the last preceding tract of land, and on the lower side by lands of William Yarbourg, having eight arpens in front, by forth arpens in depth, and containing three hundred and twenty superficial arpens: the certificate of survey dated lith of April, 1794, and patent dated 30th of July, 1795.

Fourth. One other tract of land granted to Jordan Yarbourg, bounded on the upper side by the last preceding tract of land, and on the lower side by lands then vacant; having eight arpens in front by forth arpens in depth, and containing three hundred and twenty arpens superficial measure; the certificate of survey dated 16th of April, 1794, and patent dated 30th of July, 1795.

The said four tracts of land are claimed by virtue of the said four patents and surveys, and of an uninterrupted possession and enjoyment by claimant, and those under whom he holds, for and since the respective dates
thereof: in support of which he herewith produces the said four patents and surveys (original), with the conveyances from the said patentees to his ancestor Samuel Flower, as also the conveyance from Samuel Flower to the
claimant.

We are, therefore, of opinion that this claim ought to be confirmed.

The claimant produces no manner of evidence whatever in support of this claim; and, although not claimed as second concession, it appears to be immediately back of a tract claimed by him, and fronting on the bayou Manhack. It appears also that the land has never been inhabited or cultivated until since the 20th December, 1803. We are of opinion that the claim ought to be rejected.

* No. C67.—Deminique Acosta claims a tract of land, situate on the bayou Jacques, in the county of Iberle, containing two hundred and four superficial acres, and bounded on the upper side by land of Jean Trox-

les, and on the lower by land of Mr. Robichaux.

The claimant purchased this land in the year 1807, from the Chetimachas tribe of Indians. The Indians, under Spanish Government, were not permitted to sell the lands they occupied without the act of Government neurring in the sale, and granting the land to the purchaser. We consider that, since the cession of the territy to the United States, they had no right to sell this land without the authority and concurrence of Government; I we are therefore of opinion that the claim ought to be rejected.

No. 358.—Jean Louis Champain, Anthony Manchon, and Madanz François, as chiefs of the Chetimachas of Indians, claim a tract of land, situate on the bayou Placquemines, in the county of Iberville, and containing thousand and twenty-three and nineteen hundredths superficial acres.



CAMDEN COUNTY

INTRODUCTORY: This county is located in the southeast corner of the State. The St. Marys River, its southern boundary, has always been the line between Georgia and Florida since earliest Georgia days. The County was formed in 1777 out of the old Colonial Parishes of St. Thomas and St. Mary. However, there were not enough people in the county to hold elections or form any county government until around 1790. Records of the early 1790s are few and fragmentary.

A court-house fire at old Jefferson, old ante-bellum county-seat, about 1850, destroyed the court-house, but it appears that practically all records were saved. The most serious losses by this fire was the loss of Will Book "B" (dating from 1829) and the loss of the Marriage-license book "A" which included the marriages down to 1819. One or two court-minute books were lost also though these do not constitute as great a genealogical loss as the will book and the marriage record book.

Many of the early settlers of the county came down the coast by boat from other states including the New England states, while others desiring to move back to the United States after having fled to Florida during the Revolution, crossed the St. Marys River and located in Camden. Some families moved in from further up the Georgia coastal area. The first settlements were on Cumberland Island. St. Marys as a town-site was laid out about 1788.

The Editor has been told that after the court-house was moved from St. Marys to Woodbine during the 1920s, great piles of old papers in the different offices were left piled on the floor of the old court-house and were apparently not counted of sufficient importance to be moved; and that these old papers have since disappeared, the old building being left unlocked. These papers relating to estates could be a great genealogical loss.

They also uniformly show the name of the county of residence of the parties (except in a few scattering instances) and this too is not generally found in other counties. A few of the returns mentioned names of witnesses; these and other matters necessitating a foot-note, appear in notes at the end of the list.

He was a member of Bethel Primitive Baptist Church in Brooks County, as was also his first wife. They were received by letter in April, 1827, into Bethel Church from a church in Telfair County; Mrs. Wooten died a member, and Mr. Wooten was granted a letter of dismission in February, 1853, and placed his membership in another church nearer to his home, the identity of which has not been learned. He died a member of that church.

After marriage, James L. Wilcox made his home in Irwin County. His large plantation was located about ten miles south of Abbeville. When Wilcox county was formed in 1858 partly out of Irwin County he was included in it, and he took a leading part in the creation of the new county.

Mr. Wilcox served as Captain in the 433rd district militia, 1833-38. He was State Senator from Irwin County in the 1829, 1830 and 1832 sessions of the legislature. He was County Treasurer of Irwin, 1830-38, also a Justice of Irwin Inferior Court, 1829-1833 and again 1841-1849. He was listed in the 1860 Census of Wilcox county as a merchant. He and most of his family were members of the Methodist Church, and his membership was at Mt. Zion Church near his home. In the legislative act approved Jan. 26, 1850, incorporating the church, he was named as a trustee of the church, and he held that office and that of steward in his church for several years prior to his death.

Mr. Wilcox died July 14, 1861. His wife survived and died Nov. 8, 1887. They were buried at Mount Zion Church about 15 miles north of present Fitzgerald. Mrs. Wilcox died in Hawkinsville at the home cf her daughter, Mrs. Watson, with whom she spent her latter years.

Mr. McClelland was 1st Lieutenant of the militia in the 432nd district, Irwin County, 1837-40. He moved in 1840 to Lowndes County and located on a farm in the portion now Brooks County, in the Tallokas district. After a year or so there he returned to his old home-county of Irwin and lived until 1858 when he bought land in the northern part of Clinch County, now Atkinson County, and moved there. His home-place was on Lot 204, 7th district. He lived there until 1874 when he sold out and moved to Coffee County where he died July 21, 1895.

Mr. McClelland and his wife were converted and united with Bethel Primitive Baptist Church in present Brooks County, he being baptised in June. 1841, and she in July, 1841. They were dismissed by letter September 1842, and later became members of Young's Meeting-house in Irwin County, from which they were dismissed by letter Feb. 27, 1858. They then became members of Pine Grove Church in Clinch County (now known as Red Bluff Church, Atkinson County) and in 1865 transferred their memberships to Mount Olive Church in Clinch (now Lanier) County.

Irwin County remained in its original size and formation for only seven years when Lowndes County was formed out of approximately the south half of Irwin in December, 1825.

Feb. 8, 1811, d.; also listed is the family of their Elizabeth D. who m. Wm. Ruffin Grant). In 1820 Census a Thomas Yarborough was in Franklin Co., Miss.

and was found in Washington Parish by 1830. Gideon fought in the War of 1812, being discharged in Mar. 1815 at New Orleans. On 6 June 1833 Gideon, at age 73, applied in Orleans Parish, LA, for bounty land. He died between then and 18 Sept. 1856, for on that date his wife Nancy of Washington Parish, LA, aged 66 years, applied for bounty land under the Act of 14 May 1856, as the widow of Gideon Yarbrough for his service in the war. In her application we learn the date of their marriage and that her maiden name was Nancy Scarbrough.

Benjamin Yarbrough was first found in Mecklenburg Co., NC, in 1794 when he made entry for a land grant for 50 acres which he received in 1802. He received another grant for 230 acres in 1799. Both tracts of land lay on the waters of Richardson Creek. (Bk. 100, p. 407)

As mentioned before Benjamin Yarbrough was in Franklin Co., GA, with Jeptha and Gideon. He was found in Washington Co., GA, in the 1820 census, and in 1830 he was listed as between 70 and 80 in Telfair Co., GA. This means he was born before 1760, so he may be the son of Joshua I and a brother to Joshua II. Evidently Benjamin married a daughter of William Vinson before 1797, for in his will Vinson named Benjamin Yarbrough's three children, Vinson Yarbrough, Susannah Yarbrough, and Eliza Mary Yarbrough. The will was dated 26 Sept. 1797. On 3 Oct. 1797 Benjamin married Miss Hartgrave (first name not given) in Mecklenburg Co.

Edmond Yarbrough made entry for a land grant of 188 acres on Adder branch of Waxtaw Creek, Mecklenburg Co., NC, in Aug. 1789. He received it 22 Nov. 1792. (Grant 991, Book 14, p. 342) He received another grant 8 May 1823. (Grant 2352, Book 17, P. 349) He moved to Perry Co., TN, before 1830. Later he was found in Decatur Co. which was made from Perry Co. His known children were: Aquila, Henry, James, William, Nancy, Joseph, and John H. Yarbrough. Wife was Sophia Goswick.

William Yarbrough witnessed two deeds for Joshua II--one when Joshua sold land to Reuben Yarbrough, and then when he sold land to Thomas Vincent. According to a descendant, the late Ida Walling, William was born about 1766 and married Rachael Shelby 1793, Mecklenburg Co. (No record found in the courthouse) and moved first to White Co., TN, and then to Hardeman Co., TN. Their known children: Sarah, Benjamin, Hampton, Jeptha, William, George, Hulda, John, Susanna, and Reuben.

Joshua III was found in the 1797 and 1798 Mecklenburg Co. Tax List. On 5 Dec. 1799 he purchased 200 acres of land "lying at the head of Joshua Yarborough, Seniors, Spring Branch and Meeting House Spring Branch which includes the plantation on which said Gedion Yarborough now lives." In the 1800 census Joshua, Jr. is listed as between 16 and 26, and his wife is in the same age group. Their son is under 10 years of age.

Joshua III left Mecklenburg Co., NC, and is found buying land in Chester Co., SC, in 1811. A deed dated Feb. 1812 proves his wife's name was Elizabeth. In 1824 Joshua sold the remainder of his land to his son Uriah and moved to Georgia. On 25 Jan. 1825 he bought land in Fayette Co., GA. Jepthah Yarbrough, J.P., was one of the witnesses. We know this is the same Joshua for it says Joshua Yarbrough of Chester Co., SC. (Fayette Co., GA, Deed Book A, page 316).
