Preface

These records are the legacy of our Yarbrough family researchers, to whom much is owed. The known family researchers include Jean Baker, Ann Y. Broadbent, Mary Y. Daniel, Frances (Rea) Donohue, Betty Humrighouse, Pauline Gray, Evelyn Goble, Nelle Morris Jenkins, Ophelia Kessler, Frances Lockwood, Karen Mazock Renee Smelley, Dorothy Svec, Jeanette Wilson, Cleveland "Cy" Yarborough, Edna Yarbrough, George A. Yarbrough, and Robert Price Yarbrough.

The originals of these volumes are being kept for the benefit of future generations by the Williamson County Library, Franklin, Tennessee.

No claims of accuracy or authentication of the material herein are made or may be assumed. Many of these records have been superseded by subsequent research. Hence, there are records which are erroneous and unreliable; it would have been a Herculean task to attempt to correct all of them. Fortunately, there are only a few critical genealogical facts that are involved, and which are correctly stated here:

- Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough was never married to Frances Proctor;
- Ambrose Yarbrough did not immigrant from Yorkshire; he is now believed to be a descendant of Richard the Immigrant;
- There are so far only two proven sons of Old Richard John and Richard II;
- There is so far no evidence proving Joshua Yarborough I to be a descendant of Old Richard.
- The "Old Country" referred to in old documents and letters is the Colony of Virginia, not England or the Old World.
- There were not seven brothers who immigrated from "the old country"; in fact, it now appears there were three brothers and four sons of the brothers. Which were the fathers and which were the sons are so far unknown.

In spite of these inaccuracies, these records comprise much of our history and some of our accomplishments. There are pages whose print quality is so poor that word recognition was not possible. In spite of that, at least partial capability for searching these volumes is provided, as well as an index to each volume. Nonetheless, the viewer is cautioned to perform his/her own due diligence in connection with any use of this material.

The various spellings of the Yarbrough surname have never been applied consistently, even within a given family. To the extent possible, the names in the index reflect the names used on the source pages; where it wasn't clear as to which might be the proper spelling, the spelling used is "Yarbrough".

About this Volume

The indices for both the scanned and archived volumes were created by TExtract[®], a software package used by commercial book and document publishers. Among its many features is the ability to merge the individual chapter/volume indices into a composite master index. It is not, of course, an error-free software package, especially when the print quality of the original documents is poor. Nevertheless, the resulting indices are mostly error-free, with the exception of page numbering. The given page numbers in the indices refer to the actual "page count" number, not the number that may appear on a given page.

The indexing results are in alphabetical order as follows. Each indexed term is followed by the term "Vol." and an associated volume number. These two terms are followed by one or more page numbers, separated by a comma. If the term is found in more than one volume, the succeeding volumes will follow this syntax.

The source material's page numbering has been unchanged, and the indices provided by the author match the content of those volumes as they are paginated. These volumes are all searchable, so the best procedure is to use the index to see on which page a particular ancestor may be located.

CONCORD #1 MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH

The Concord #1 Missionary Baptist Church was organized on Saturday April 21, 1855, which makes our church 130 years old today, April 21, 1985. Bro. W.A. Walker was the founder and first pastor. Our church is said to be the 2nd oldest church in the state, and our Association, which I think means Missionary Baptist Church. The land for the church was given by Isaac Burlesofi; the deed being recorded on June 7, 1856. Bro. Walker, the first pastor, is buried in the cemetery here next to the church, the Concord Cemetery, J.N. Yarborough was the first clerk and U.T. Ashberry, the first deacon. James Newel

The charter members were: John Allison, Mirandy Moon, Willis Burkhalter, and Gerzilda Buckhalter. The earliest missionary we can find out anything about who visited our church, was Bro. Peters from Rogers Prairie.

Miss Cora Kay, who passed away in 1976, an aunt of Julia Mae Richardson, had been a member of our church since 1906, was haptized by Bro. Neyland in Buck Creek. Rea Donofiue Rt. 2 Box 111 Breckenridge Tex76024

supported the church with her money and prayers even when she was unable to attend. At the time of her death, she had been a member of this church longer than any other person. She wrote me a letter in 1970 from lola where she lived after retiring. I was working on the history of the church for our Historical Marker Dedication. She told me about riding to church on the horn of a saddle with her "Papa". It would be about 3 o'clock in the afternoon before they got home, before conference would adjourn. This extra time was spent "preferring charges" against members for dancing, fighting, cursing, getting drunk, gossiping, and many other things.

She remembered another incident as a child. They had torn down the old church and built a new one and, of course, that took quite a bit of doings in those days considering the shortage of money. When the final note for \$60.00 came due, no one could make good his 1 pledge. The boll weevil had eaten the cotton, and the chinyz bug the corn. So, her papa, and G.P. Kay, wen to the bank and borrowed the money to pay off the note. She said she was just a little girl, but it worried her so much for them to owe \$60.00, It looked as big as the national debt does today.

Back in the early days, revivals were called protracted meetings. I can remember my grandmother never spid revival, always pro-

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la 1380 our church paid the pastor \$125.00 • the year. The collection that was taken, advanght be just \$1.25, was all given to the aster. l'cople were always being excluded from Is fellowship of the church. Usually there .ma committee who would go and talk to the rembers, who had the charges preferred remst them. They had to come and make knowledgement to the church and ask for orgiveness. Then the members would vote to ratore them to the church. Reports were nade to the church on members, some of which would be false. Of course, this would ause quite an uproar. Then charges might be rought against the person who reported alse accusations. Some of the preferred barges that were brought up in our church acre: drunkenness, gambling, fighting, proanity_using God's name in vain, dancing, a person, non- attendance, giving parties, unchristian conduct againt tan sembers, and non-fellowship. Sometimes these charges were found to be false and were dismissed. Charges were brought against one suman for round dancing, and she didn't now it was wrong to round dance. In one

instance, a member was excluded for keeping a saloon and operating a billiard table. Now listen to this one, another was excluding for joining the Methodist Society.

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The old church records show that it was not uncommon for a member to come forward and confess his sins. In one instance, a person confessed to the church he had taken the name of the Lord in vain by cursing. He asked God to forgive him and God had forgiven him, and he wanted the church to forgive him.

One man back in 1902, called for a dismission of his letter, because he could not support some of the people fellow-members were supporting in the general election. After two or three months of business meetings, with long drawn out discussions, his request was refused.

In 1914, the Methodist used our church for services. I suppose this is when the Methodist at Concord first organized; for in 1915 they built their church.

We had not had Sunday school for years until August, 1949, when it was re-organized. Mrs. F.F. Seale, member of our church, had taught Sunday school in the Methodist church for years. In 1949, Mrs. Seale had more Baptist in her class than Methodist; so she started to talking to the church to organize a Sunday school. There was some opposition, some felt there weren't enough to have Sunday school; but the church voted to organize a Sunday school, and we have had Sunday school ever since. I remember Mrs. Seale said she came to Sunday school one Sunday; she and her child were the only ones present. So, she sat down and prayed before she went home. She taught me in Sunday school. After I was grown, we worked together with young people in 4-H work and in Bible schools. She always did a lot of witnessing, and I feel she lead more young people to Christ than any other person I have known. I know she was the main one that introduced me to our blessed Saviour. To me she was one of the finest Christians that I have ever known. She has gone to her heavenly home. Mrs. Seale was not a member of this church the last years of her life.

There have been many faithful and dedicated Christians in our church, as you know; or it would never have survived all these years. The Lord has been among us, and is still with us to see us through the hardships that we encounter. We know we are one of the Lord's churches. Even though we are small in number, we try to carry on the Lord's work. The records are not complete, about twenty years are missing, but I would like to recognize some of the former leaders that I know carried on the work. I'm sure there were many more that I have no way of knowing about: Back in the early days there was Uncle Jim Mattison, Conner Walker, Virgil Selman,

G.B. Selman, Pleas Bull, Willis Willett, and John and Laura Powell. Laura Powell joined the church in 1875 and was a life-time member. Mrs. Daisy Barrett and Mrs. Lena Burns said they always liked to see the Powell's coming to church. Samuel Ewing married Selma Beatty, whose grandmother was an endentured slave. She was attending school in Edingburgh, Scotland, and was fooled into entering a ship bound for America. The children were so enamored with the things aboard ship and they were bever told they were being trantice America. When they finally dissovered the trap, they cried and were pacified by being given gold and ornaments.

In 1843 Samuel Ewing and Selma Beatty settled at Rogers Prairie near Caney Creek in Leon County. They were buried on the Flood Farm, south of OSR near Caney Creek. They lived in a Fort on Caney Creek. They had six children: Elizabeth Craig Ewing, a fifth generation Beatty and should have had a legacy left that generation by Grandma Beatty. Elizabeth Craig Ewing married Bethel A. Smith in Missouri. They had 17 children, 13 of whom lived.

Elizabeth Craig Ewing and Bethel A. Smith's daughter Elizabeth Darst was born February 20, 1846. She married Wharton R. Moore (see John Bowen Moore story). Other family members of record are sisters Selma Smart, Visy Humphry, Mary Morris, Rosetta Richardson, and Rachel Moore.

Jane Ewing married Ed Baker who clerked for A.G. Weaver at Rogers Prairie, Texas. Rachel Ewing married Capt. D.C. Carrington. Their children were Hubbard Samuel, Dank Terry Salina, who married a Newsome, then Dr. Dunn Dewitte, his children were Mable, Florine, and Cameron Dewitte.

FAIL, WILLIAM DIXON FAMILY Rea Donofiue Rt. 2 Box 111 F345

Breckenridge Tex76024 In Butler County, Alabama, on 7 May 1857, William Dixon Fail was born, the son of Lovard Fail and Mary Williams. His greatgrandfather, Dixon Fail, the man whose name he bears, served as a soldier in South Carolina

during the American Revolution. In 1866, William Dixon Fail moved with his 👢 parents who were farmers in Butler County, Alabama, to Jasper County, Mississippi. On 19 March 1879 he wed Amanda Lena Jones, daughter of John Ransome Jones and Catherine Louisa Moody, of Clarke County, Mississippi. John Ransome Jones' grandfather, John Jones, fought in the American Revolution from South Carolina. Catherine Moody's grandfather, Joseph Bass, helped establish America's Independence during the Revolution by providing supplies for the soldiers. Here in Jasper County, William Dixon was a farmer, too. "I had the good fortune to visit his farm in Mississippi where all of his children were born. A pear tree he set out in 1880 is still near the old homesite. Cuttings have been taken from this tree for propagation purposes . . . The home of William Dixon has just recently been torn away, attesting to the sturdiness of the building as well as to the pioneers who constructed it."

In the year of 1893, William Dixon Fail moved his family from Mississippi to Corinth, Leon County, Texas, near Amanda Lena's parents who had preceded them to Corinth in 1881. Here he continued his vocation of farming. Prior to 1900, he moved his family to Jewett where he continued to farm and to grow and ship nursery stock. This activity, combined with his experience with the pear tree in Mississippi leads us to believe that propagation of plants was his real interest.

To the union of William Dixon Fail and Amanda Lena Jones were born four children: William Luther, my father, married Margaret Elizabeth Williams, daughter of Samuel Wright Williams and Sarah Eliza Thompson. Children of William Luther and Margaret Elizabeth are a baby boy, unnamed, who died at four days of age, Vesta Una and twins, Melton Uel and Welton Ruel. Vesta Una's birth is recorded in a year-long diary kept by her father during the year of 1906. She grew up to marry Finis Eric Petty. Their children are Luther Eric, Alfred Marion and Una Irene. Melton Uel married Lottie Mae Honsinger, their issue, Elizabeth Rachel. Welton Ruel married Mildred Chapman, no issue. The aforementioned diary, after seventyeight years, was found and came into the hands of the children of William Luther Fail. It is now in the files of the Leon County

My husband served in England in the G2 Intelligence Division in the Signal Corps. He was severely injured from a raid and was one of only 12 survivors out of 140 men. He received a medical discharge in 9/43. He never regained his health after the war.

We sold the store, bought a ranch near Boerne, Kendall County, Texas, 4/21/51, where we farmed and ranched. I learned to plow, plant, etc. with the tractor, also put up electric fences to keep the deer from eating the crops. My husband's health got worse and was in and out of the hospital until his death 7/5/64.

Three months after my husband's death, I started selling World Book Encyclopedias; six months later I became an area manager, and later a district manager. I worked full time until 1972 and won many trophies, prizes, and awards. I am still working part time.

I moved to Leon County in 1975. My hobbies are: baking with yeast, gardening, selling World Books and crocheting.

I was a Lutheran until I was 64 years old, when I became a member of the Church of Christ, in Boerne, Texas.

Jimsey Hester was born in Whitevill, North Carolina the 8th day of October 1870. Jimsey was the son of Write and Mary Eliza Hester. He had four brothers and two sisters. At the age of 18 years a tree fell on his younger sister and as a result she died.

The people in North Carolina did not depend on cotton and cattle for a livelihood as much as they did in Texas. The forest in North Carolina were long leaf pine trees. Big square holes were cut in the large trees to catch the resin or sap that ran out of the trees, when the holes were full it out and put into a bucket with a tool they called a turpentine puller. This substance was sent away to be used to make medicine, and varnishes. Pulling the pine boxes was my father's occupation.

In 1892 he visited his family in North Carolina, and another time in 1907. On the second trip he brought his turpentine puller with him, and now it is in my-possession.

At an early age Jimsey my father left his home and spent two years in Georgia and North Carolina. When he left there he came to Buffalo, Texas and lived with his uncle in the Flo Community.

August 7, 1892 he was married to Nancy Harritt Kidd (Nanny). To this union were born three children, namely Mary, Joe and Winston. They lived in that home for several years, then they moved to Limestone County. He worked on a farm until they moved to Oakwood, Texas. He then farmed for himself and unstand at the rotuce below in the balance drafted into the World War One where he was killed.





Born in Oakwood, Leon County, Texas, February 9, 1894, to James Obadiah and Lula Belle Henson Radford, Everett was the first of their nine children. He always recalled the events of his childhood and young manhood with fondness.

Everett enlisted in the U.S. Army, serving in Company E, 144th Infantry, 36th Division during WW I. On October 11, 1918, in France, while searching for his missing captain in "no man's land," he lost his sight from a shellburst that killed two accompanying soldiers. He was awarded a presidential citation and medal for gallantry in action.

While attending Evergeen School for the Blind in Baltimore, Maryland, he was quickly nicknamed "Tex" by his friend. There he met and married Erla M. Thorney on June 21, 1919. Over the years their family grew by four children: Robert Melvin, born July 21, 1920; Ruth Margaret, July 13, 1924; Charles Henry, October 16, 1928; Ray Allen, February 19, 1932.

Although blind, he never let this handicap limit his achievements. With a son and sonin-law already serving their country during WW II, he was determined to fill a joh supporting the defense effort. He started by winding armatures by hand, then inspecting small parts for B29 bomber electrical systems. Because of the increased sensitivity of his fingers, he performed this task better than men with their sight. Step by step, he earned the trust to operate lathes, drill presses, screw machines and ultimately a complex milling machine.

In later years he was responsible for building the major portion of a chicken house He finally "retired" in Lake Worth, Florida, where he spent much of his time reading his braille literature and Bible and staying current with national and world interests. "Tex," who wore his nickname proudly, died June 28, 1978.

The nearest town and Post Office was in Navarro. They left two children in Alabama. Robert R. in Perry County and Lucy, wife of James Martin in Talledega County.

First child, son Robert R. was born December 23, 1818.

Second child, son David was horn May 3, 1820. He died and left two children, Josephene and Henry. His widow married W.H. Lansford. Then she died.

Third child, son Reuben was born August 15, 1821. He lived in Leon County and way never married. He was in the second draft of the Civil War., Company B; 18th, Brag. Captain A.J. Spiller, General W.B. Middleton, 1st, CSA. He died November 27, 1877. His grave has recently been found in the Mount Pisgah Cemetery, by Mary Belle Stevens a great-great nicce of his.

Fourth child, daughter Emely Ann, was born May 24, 1823. She died between 1856 and 1859.

Fifth child, son William, was born October 8, 1824. His oldest child, Georgiana married A Gunn in Leon County. Another daughter, Dora Ann, married John C. Lamon. One of Dora Ann and John C. By the time Lacy noticied the cut cake, Walker was better.

Walker was 17 years old when his father died. Three years later his youngest brother Velmer died at the age of eleven.

Jack Wayne was born May 8, 1935 and his wife's name is Shirley.



William Walton (Billy) Moore was born in Tennessee May 30, 1811 and married Jane M. Browning February 8, 1838. Jane was born November 10, 1820 in Virginia. Their first home was in Tennessee and the oldest child Mary Mildred was born there.

The Moore's then moved to Mississippi. In 1851 Billy, Jane, their six children, and one slave traveled with the Walter Patrick family by wagon train from Tishomingo, Mississippi to Texas. Before leaving Billy sold his slaves but Jane's maid-in-waiting who was given to her by her family when she married was brought to Texas as Jane didn't want to part with her.

On the six weeks journey to Texas, Billy served as scout and helped kill game for food. Their oldest son Franklin, who was eleven, helped Jane and the slave share the responsibility of driving their team and helping with the supply wagon. The Moore's plans were to travel on further into the state but while they were in Flo, Leon County, two year old Columbus poured a cup of scalding coffee on himself. It was such a bad burn the parents didn't think he would live and stopped (as Columbus later said) "for him to die, but he was too contrary to die." Billy purchased some land at a good price, planning to sell and move later, but after making a crop be couldn't find a buyer, so he had a two-story log house built on what is now known as it a

went after the horse. All of this was on foot. They ran the horses until they could put them across the creek on that trail and were close enough behind them to block the opening. They finally got a rope on the horse and started home with him but dark caught

n and they had to tie him to a tree and back for him the next morning.

Oden at Oden, Texas when Jack first left home. There was a post office there and it was on the bank of Wheelock Creek north of Wheelock Cemetery. His job at the gin was to put lint cotton into a woven three bushel basket and carry it up twelve feet of steps and pour it into a bin. When the bin was full they would run the screw down and press the cotton to bale size. He said that it was an awfully hot and dirty job.

William M. Moore moved to West Texas in the early 1870's. When Jack Moore was twenty-four years old he married Sally Barnett whose mother was Beckey Barnett.

, On May 4, 1883 Jack Moore patented about one hundred and sixty acres of land that lay between Buffalo Creek and Boykin Chapel Cemetery. His wife, Sally, died of childbirth fever just before the death of the infant. In later years Jack told his children that Sally made him promise when she was on her death bed that he would live a life such that he could meet her in heaven. She is buried in an unmarked grave in Wheelock Cemetery.

After Sally's death Jack Moore stayed on the North A.P. Parker survey and later ried the orphaned granddaughter of the Grs, Mary Fannie Dice, who was born J. 6, 1859. On April 3, 1890 he patented one hundred and sixty acres of land just south of Ike's Pond. Mary Fannie Moore died on January 13, 1900. She is buried in Parker. Cemetery.

Jack Moore sold both of the tracts that he patented and later bought the North A.P. Parker survey which composed three hunMarch 28, 1905. Jasper Alvin was born April 17, 1907. Mary Edna was born November 4, 1911. Alice Evalee who was born November 15, 1913. Velmer Evan was born December 10, 1916.

By the time that his last child was born Jack Moore retired from the farming that had been his life and leased his place out to tenant farmers, often on shares. He was very fond of his children and loved to play with them and to tell them stories.

On his 75th birthday his daughter, Alice, presented him with his sixteen-day-old granddaughter and told him, "Here is your birthday present Papa, your first grandchild." The child was Jo Merle Barnett.

Jack Moore died on March 24, 1939 and is buried in Parker Cemetery. His wife Eva died July 17, 1954 and is buried beside him.

Auther Edell Moore married Ruby Pate January 16, 1927. She died April 24, 1932 and is buried in Parker Cemetery. Two infants preceded her in death. Edell Moore married Mary Josephine Hines on December 17, 1933. They have one child, Mary Jo, born August 5, 1936.

and Jack, and worked some for Lum. Then later he settled on his parents' land and they gave him fifty acres. There he raised his family of three girls and four boys. He and Cannie lost a son, Walter, at the age of 8 months. Henry was a big-hearted man, he loved people and spent a great deal of his spare time visiting among his neighbors. He was a hard working man, but willing to share with anyone less fortunate.

At one time Cannie became ill, so Henry took her to see Doctor Taylor, a neighborhood doctor. After examining her, the doctor told Henry he couldn't help her that she was going to die. Henry said, "Now, Doctor with all due respect to you, I am not going to accept your verdict, I am going to take her somewhere else." The doctor said, "I admire your for trying," and agreed to take them to a doctor in Buffalo, a distance of ten miles. Henry had a wagon and team but the doctor loaned him his buggy because it was more comfortable for a sick person to ride in. The doctor in Buffalo agreed with Dr. Taylor's verdict. Henry again refused to give up without another opinion. Dr. Taylor took them to the depot, put them on the train for Palestine, loaned Henry some money and sent them on their way with his best wishes.

In Palestine a team of doctors examined Cannie and found she had a large tumor that had so sapped her strength that her sight was almost gone. They operated and removed the tumor. After a long struggle, Cannie regained her health and lived a full active life to the age of 81. Cannie told about the nurses keeping her wrapped in blankets even though it was in the month of July and before air conditioning.

Henry had a strong voice and it was not unusual for the neighbors to be able to follow a conversation, especially at night when he was sitting on his front porch visiting with a neighbor. Henry had a unique trait that was a bit unusual. If someone befriended him or perbaps gave him a side of bacon after his store of home-cured pork was gone, he mercly said "thank you." Therise married O.C. Shaw and their children were Thomas Henry and Linda Fay.


Henry valued friendship very highly and knew full well the meaning of the word loyalty. He practiced this loyalty to his friends throughout his life.

It is said my grandfather killed a deer where the Oakwood depot was later built. Wade and William both fought in the Civil War, Wade was a lieutentant and William was a sergeant. When the war was over they came back to Oakwood. My grandfather married Isabelle Moore. He rode with the vigilantes for awhile. While living there two of this children were born, Pearl and Carrie.

William and Wade later bought about a half section of land in the Brushy Community and built their homes there. Wade was a Hard shell Baptist preacher. He built a church and it was also used as a school and he gave the land for the Brushy Cometery.

My father George W Yarborough was born at Brush August 21, 1875. He married my mother, Mary Elizabeth (Bettie) French May 10, 1894. To this union ten children were born Three little boys died in infancy They Bill is buried in Rule, Texas, Pearl and Mary live in Fort Worth, Ruby at Sherman and Woodrow at Weatherford. They had twelve grandchildren. Bill had a son killed during World War II in Italy.

There are several great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren.

My father owned and operated a cotton gin and grist mill in the Flo Community for about thirty years. He farmed two farms most of the time and raised some cattle. He loved to raise fine watermelons (not for the market) but for his family and friends.

George passed away December 10, 1925. My mother lived until February 25, 1955. They are both buried at Brushy Cemetery.





## BRUSHY COMMUNITY C132

Some time during the nineteenth century, two brothers, Wade Hampton Yarborough (born 1835) and William Burns Yarborough (born 1840) journeyed from South Carolina, through Alabama and eventually on to Texas. They settled in Leon County. After serving in the Confederacy, during the civil war, they both returned to the County and together bought some land in the Brushy Community.

Wade H. became ill and was advised by a doctor to move to another climate. He moved away, but William B. stayed, and through hard work paid for all the land. Later when the property was divided the brothers shared in it equally.

Wade was a Primitive Baptist minister. He donated three acres of land, from the northeast corner of his property (The Joseph A. Ferguson Survey) to start a church and cemetery. The one room building which was erected for a church also served the community as a school building.

The oldest marker in the cemetery, that is marked, is the grave of Sarah A. (Dodson) Yerby. She was born 3:4-1828 and died 5-18-1887. The Yerby family helped to get the church and cemetery organized.

The following letter was written in 1896 for the son and daughter in law of James Franklin and Sarah A. (Dodson) Yerby.

Esther Campbell, wife of John Wesley Campbell, born Feb. 5, 1847 and died Jan. 28, 1901, is buried in the Brushy Cemetery. Soon after she died, Sunday Church services fell on a very cold day. Only three members, all men, assembled for the service. They were John Wesley Cempbell, William B. and Wade H. Yarborough. Wade was the preacher. They decided that according to scripture, "When two or more are gathered together in my name," they should have preaching service. Although John W. did not have a good singing voice, he was chosen to lead the singing. As the three were laboring to sing a hymn, a ladie's beautiful voice joined them and continued until the end of the song. Tears streamed down the cheeks of John Wesley as the voice sounded like that of his dead wife. One of the other men went to the window to see if anyone could be seen. They concluded that God's angel had come to help with the singing and they continued with the service.

The first plan to care for the cemetery grounds was for the interested people to meet on Friday before the first Sunday in August. They brought tools and cleaned the cemetery, had an eleven o'clock preaching service, lunch and then a business meeting.



They settled in Clark County within what was the Mississippi Territory (now Alabama). In 1810 Moses returned to Jones County, Georgia April 14, 1810 he again received passports for himself, his wife, and two children. Moses spent the remainder of his life in Alabama, dying in 1832.

Starling Hill was born 1782 in Georgia He was twice married having nine children in the first family and six in the second. His second wife was Edith Reed born 1821.

Starling was a member of the Methodist church and in advanced age was noted for manifesting a cheerful, uncomplaining disposition amid troubles and trials. He first settled in Marengo County near Shiloh and donated land to the church, which was built in the year of 1842. He entered several hundred acres of land and during the year of 1842 he sold his place to a Jones. But it's still called the Hill place.

Later he entered land and settled where the Wayne school house now stands. Here he lived for many years, raising a large family. After his children married and left him alone, he sold his home and spent the last year and a half of his life at the home of his son Moses Hill near Bashi in Clark County, Alabama. He died July 5, 1877 being 85 years old. He was buried at Shiloh Church on land he had donated to the church. His marker was hand hewn from heart of pine. It burned when the forest caught fire, along with his wife's parker. They were never replaced.

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Orsamus, Starling's oldest son, and family came to Texas by wagon train about 1857. They settled in Freestone County at Bonners Ferry. Oss had fiery red hair. Many of his descendents have red hair and it is believed that this family trait came from Oss' mother.

In 1866 Oss was found dead beside a trail. He had walked to town and when he didn't return they started searching for him. When they found him, his body was so decomposed they wrapped him in a sheet and buried him there. Joseph (Joe) was the youngest child and he was only 6years old when his father died.

Sometime later after Oss's death, Louisa married a Trawick. Mr. Trawick and Joe didn't get along well. So Joe left home as a young man and made his way working on ranches. Part of his duties, other than the usual ranch work, was breaking wild horses.

Some of Oss' children did not live to be grown. Three lived long enough to raise families. Martha married a Caylor and lived in Leon County for a number of years. Lydia married a Riley and lived in Eldorado, Texas. Joe married Pearl Yarborough and raised a large family.

The oldest two sons Starling and John C. served in the Civil War and were killed in the Galveston area. Starling enlisted July, 1861. His Commanding Officer was Capt. James W. Gardiner of the Texas Buck Hunters, Vol. Cav. Co., Anderson Co., 11th Brig.

John enlisted June 8, 1861. His Commanding Officer was Capt. M.W. Matthews of the Lone Star Guards, Burnet Co., Cav., 27th Brig. Sept. 15, 1861 he enlisted with the Reserve Co., Navarro Co., 19th Brig. His Commanding Officer was Capt. J.A. Clayton.

Evie May Burroughs was born 23 December 1868 at Raymond, Leon County, Texas. She was the oldest child of Dr. Sam R. and Rebecca Henry Burroughs. The Burroughs Family moved to Houston, Texas, in 1876, as Dr. Burroughs was associated with the Texas Medical College in Galveston, Texas. Evie May attended Miss House's private school on Caroline Street for two years. The family moved back to Raymond, Texas, in 1878 because of the poor health of the Doctor. Later Evie May attended school in Lovelady, Texas. Report cards showed that she was an excellent student. Only small cards about 2" by 3" were given out with no specific grade-just excellent, good, or fair in the particular subject.

On 17 December 1885, at Raymond, Texas, Evie May married Joseph C. Hill (born 30 September 1856 South Carolina-died 27 May 1933 Buffalo, Texas). Two children were born to the couple: 1. Volina Ethel (born 17 September 1886 Raymond, Texas-died 3 February 1963 Houston, Harris Co., Texas). 2. Braxton Burroughs (born 30 September

1887 Raymond, Texas—died 30 January 1962 Dallas, Texas). Volina was a very good student and graduated in 1905 from San Marcos Normal Institute which enabled her to begin her teaching career.

Volina married Evan Lee Sheffield (born 20 August 1879 Jewett, Texas—died 20 October 1940 Buffalo, Texas) on 12 May 1909 at the Baptist Church in Buffalo, Texas. She was an accomplished pianist and was organist (a pump organ) for the Baptist Church for many years. She did not have an instrument at her home, so she went to her grandparent's home to use their organ. Dr. Burroughs, her grandfather, liked to play the violin while she accompanied him. Volina was a faithful member of the Baptist Church, taught a class of small children for years, and attended the meetings of the Women's Missionary Society.

Burroughs Hill attended Tyler Business College at Tyler, Texas. He made his living as a salesman primarily in auto parts and accessories. He was married two times: 1. Hazel Brown from Norfolk, Nebraska. 2. Kathryn Craven from Waco, Texas.

Two grandchildren were blessed with a wonderful grandmother: 1. Evie Kate Sheffield (born 21 February 1913) and James Joseph Hill (born 12 July 1915). Evie Kate spent many happy days with her grandparents while her father worked at the store and her mother taught school. It was fun to ride in the buggy, or the wagon, behind "Minnie", the everfaithful horse. Mur, as she was affectionately called by Evie Kate, knew how to entertain a little girl hy making cookies, playing dominoes, teaching the art of embroidery, or visiting with friends and relatives.

A great grandson, Donald Lee Evans (born 1 December 1942), enjoyed standing beside his great grandmother's chair while she taught him his A.B.C.'s from a well-worn book before he was two years old. Also, Don learned how to play Chinese Checkers and dominoes with the same teacher. In Don's younger days "hide the thimble" was a fun game, as Mur always had some kind of 971. They have three daughters, Terr Mirelle-Sept. 7, 1972, Amy Jo-Sept. 10, 1974, rd Lisa Ellen-March 13, 1977.



## BRUSHY COMMUNITY C132

Some time during the nineteenth century, two brothers, Wade Hampton Yarborough (born 1835) and William Burns Yarborough (born 1840) journeyed from South Carolina, through Alabama and eventually on to Texas. They settled in Leon County. After serving in the Confederacy, during the civil war, they both returned to the County and together bought some land in the Brushy Community.

Wade H. became ill and was advised by a doctor to move to another climate. He moved away, but William B. stayed, and through hard work paid for all the land. Later when the property was divided the brothers shared in it equally.

Wade was a Primitive Baptist minister. He donated three acres of land, from the northeast corner of his property (The Joseph A. Ferguson Survey) to start a church and cemetery. The one room building which was erected for a church also served the community as a school building.

The oldest marker in the cemetery, that is marked, is the grave of Sarah A. (Dodson) Yerby. She was born 3-4-1828 and died 5-18-1887. The Yerby family helped to get the church and cemetery organized.

The following letter was written in 1896 for the son and daughter in law of James Franklin and Sarah A. (Dodson) Yerby.

Nancy Ruth and Franklin Monroe Yerby, Buffalo, Texas.

"This is to certify that sister Nancy Yerby is a member in full fellowship with us At her request dismist(sic) from us when joined to some other church of the same faith and order. Done by order of Brushy Prairie Church of the Regular Predstinaren(sic) Baptist faith and order. This in conference on Saturday before the second Sunday in December, 1896. W.H. Yarborough, Moderator, W.C. Yarborough, C.C." С

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¹, The little church did not conduct services every Sunday. Transportation was by wagon, buggy, horseback or on foot. Nevertheless the people were hungary to hear the gospel. When there were services all the family went to listen. The mother went prepared to give her child a tea-cake if it got hungary, or a drink of water from a fruit jar if it got thirsty. A quilt was placed on the floor for the children to sleep on. If the preacher preached until one o'clock everyone just stayed and enjoyed the preaching while they had the opportunity.

Esther Campbell, wife of John Wesley Campbell, born Feb. 5, 1847 and died Jan. 28, 1901, is buried in the Brushy Cemetery. Soon after she died, Sunday Church services fell on a very cold day. Only three members, all men, assembled for the service. They were John Wesley Cempbell, William B. and Wade H. Yarborough. Wade was the preacher. They decided that according to scripture, "When two or more are gathered together in my name," they should have preaching service. Although John W. did not have a good singing voice, he was chosen to lead the singing. As the three were laboring to sing a hymn, a ladie's beautiful voice joined them and continued until the end of the song. Tears streamed down the cheeks of John Wesley as the voice sounded like that of his dead wife. One of the other men went to the window to see if anyone could be seen. They concluded that God's angel had come to help with the singing and they continued with the service.

The first plan to care for the cemetery grounds was for the interested people to meet on Friday before the first Sunday in August. They brought tools and cleaned the cemetery, had an eleven o'clock preaching service, lunch and then a business meeting.

Years later the people hired a caretaker but

# YARBOROUGH, **GEORGE** WASHINGTON F1201

My great-grandfather, George Washington Yarborough came from South Carolina about 1825 and settled near Oakwood. He had several sons, but the two I have heard the most about are my grandfather, William Burns and his brother, Wade Hampton. It is said my grandfather killed a deer where the Oakwood depot was later built. Wade and William both fought in the Civil War, Wade was a lieutentant and William was a sergeant. When the war was over they came back to Oakwood. My grandfather married Isabelle Moore. He rode with the vigilantes for awhile While living there two of this children were born, Pearl and Carrie.

William and Wade later bought about a half section of land in the Brushy Community and built their homes there. Wade was a Hard-shell Baptist preacher He built a church and it was also used as a school and he gave the land for the Brushy Cemetery.

My father George W. Yarborough was born at Brush August 21, 1875. He married my mother, Mary Elizabeth (Bettie) French May 10, 1894. To this union ten children were born. Three little boys died in infancy. They are buried at Brushy Cemetery Louis their cldest son is deceased and is forced at

i nere are several great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren.

My father owned and operated a cotton gin and grist mill in the Flo Community for about thirty years. He farmed two farms most of the time and raised some cattle. He loved to raise fine waterinelons (not for the market) but for his family and friends.

George passed away December 10, 1925. My mother lived until February 25, 1955. They are both buried at Brushy Cemetery.

Every year we have memorial services in June, and most everyone who has people buried there attend.

Amon Yerby was born in North Carolina in 1784. His parents were Everett Yerby born December 13, 1762 and Sarah McMillian born December 15, 1766. Amon's grandparents were William Yerby born 1728 and Francis Margaret McTyre. Amon's greatgrandfather was John Yerby and his greatgreat-grandfather was Thomas Yerby.

Amon married Rachel McMillian who was born in North Carolina in 1798. They went to Alabama from North Carolina after 1820.

In 1823 Bethel Baptist Church (organized in 1818) in Tuscaloosa Co. received Amon Yerby and wife Rachel as members "by experience." They were members until 1826 when they moved to Sanford (later Lamar) County. They had 11 children: Jemima, Tabitha Octavia, James Franklin, William, Sarah, John, Mary Virginia, Jasper, Lucy, Martha, Alexander.

Rachel died a few months before Amon and he died Feb. 26, 1861 without a will. His estate was inventoried, appraised and sold. Some items listed were: spinning wheel 75 cents, smoothing iron forty-five cents, 2 milk piggins 75 cents, one mule 2 years old \$72 50, onecow and yearling \$18.00, 12 head of sheep \$18 00 and 50 acres of land \$150 00. Most of his estate was purchased by his children. His daughter Sarah and her husband Edward Younghance purchased the 50 acres of land

James Franklin Yerby, oldest son of Amon and Rachel Yerby, was born July 30, 1820 in North Carolina. In 1844 he married Sarah Ann Dodson desighter of William Dodson handwork in her lap.

About 1894 the Joseph C. Hill family moved to Buffalo, Texas. Mr. Hill was a good carpenter and cabinet maker. He was a rural mail carrier for a number of years and he also worked in the post office. He liked to grow vegetables and fruit and was very successful in this line. The author of this article was invited to share a watermelon with him each summer afternoon—half a watermelon for each person.

Mrs. Hill was reared in a Christian home and followed her beliefs in the Baptist Church througout her life. She participated in every phase of the church and for fiftyeight years she taught a class of young women. She read her Bible each day and recorded the date when she had finished all of it in a diary which she faithfully kept with the last entry made just three months before she died. Her favorite hymns were Amazing Grace and When the Roll Is Called Up Yonder I'll Be There.

Evie May was a very sociable person who liked parties with written contests, visiting with friends, and just "going places". She did not enjoy the best of health in her later years, but a couple of aspirins helped her to accept any invitation. She told her daughter, Volina, that she didn't enjoy going to parties with "old" ladies"—meaning women much younger than she was, possibly in their sixties. She enjoyed many long visits with her Cousin Charlie, Mrs. J.W. Manning, in Fort Worth, Texas, where she attended fine musical events sponsored by Mrs. Manning's daughter, Mrs. John F. Lyons.

Evie May had many talents. She was a fine seamstress and made all of her clothes, usually without a pattern. She would not wear anything that was black. She was noted for her beautiful handwork and was most generous with numerous people with gifts of quilts, embro dered pillow cases, fancy lace handkerchiefs, tatted pieces, crocheted edgings for tablecloths and napkins, and intricate drawn work. She was a perfectionist in her work and was very careful whom she asked to quilt on her project. Like her father she wrote poetry some of which was survived the years. Her dictionary was always filled with the crossword puzzles that appeared in the daily paper.



Joseph Rigdon Hill wasborn April 29, 1860. His parents were Orsamus Hill and Louisa Whitley. When Joseph (Joe) was eighteen years old he came to Leon County looking for

was looking for his sister Bell Kaylor. She replied, "Well, you've found her." Thus he was united with his sister and her family.

Oakwood is where Joe met and later married Pearl Yarborough. Joe was a tall man about 6 foot 4 inches and Pearl was 5 feet and a small woman. It was Pearl's nature to be quiet but Joe was a many of many words.

Joe and Pearl were devout members of the Primitive Baptist Church. Joe didn't profess to be a preacher but nevertheless did quite a bit of preaching. He did not preach from a pulpit, but every time he met someone that would listen he quoted "Scripture," but if he made a mistake Pearl would say, "Now Papa." Then he corrected his mistake.

Joe owned and operated a farm. He raised cattle and hogs on an open range. He liked to hunt and fish.

From 1922 until 1934 Joe carried the U.S. mail on horseback from Eunice to Ninevah.

There was always music and singing in the home. Joe had a special dance which he did alone called 'Knocking the back step.' Oss played the fiddle and Bill picked the guitar and mandolin. Their sisters played the organ, guitar and violin. Cordia, Ida, Eva and Adelle made up a good quartet. Eva sang bass, Adelle, alto, Ida, soprano and Cordia, tenor. This was a happy good-natured family.

Joe and Pearl had nine children. Isabell (Belle) married Jessie Pate and their children that lived to be grown were: Ruby, Verner, Toga, Lorene, Howard, Joe L., Iva Dell, Audrey Lee and D.W. Belle died July 3, 1961 and is buried in Parker Cemetery.

Orsamus (Oss) was born March 14, 1887. On December 23, 1906 he married Katie Shaw. Oss was an outstanding citizen and was honest and hard-working He owned and operated a farm, a sawmill, and a gristmill. He raised cattle and hogs and as a young man he worked for his uncle George Yarborough at a cotton gin Oss was a member of the member of the Baptist Church. The best way to describe Oss is the poem "He Lived In A House By The Side Of The Road And Was A Friend To Man" Oss died October 24, 1961 and is buried at Brushy Cemetery

Cordia married Ace Nichols and they were the parents of Chatham She died October 18, 1974 and is buried at Centerville Cemetery

Ida married William Suttles (Billy). They had two children, Harvey and Lula Mae. After Billy died, Ida married Jay Oliver She died March 3, 1975 and is buried at Brushy Cemetery.

William Hampton (Bill) was born 1895 and was a school teacher in a one-room school, was a veteran of World War I and saw active duty in France. He married Eunice Hogan and their children were: Winona, Essie, and Billy Charles. Bill served as County Clerk of Leon County eighteen years. He and Winona were killed 1943 in a car wreck.

Eva married Jim Moore and their children were: Jodie, Lela, Cloey Merl, and Jimmic Lee.

Adelle married Ben Lee and their children were: Mabel, Harley Bob and Benny Dale.

Starling married Willie Mae Davis and their children were: Joseph, William Orsa mus, Imogene, Joyce, Marjorie Nell, Patricia Max Wayne and Sandra. Six of the childre have red hair. Starling is buried in California Jody died when he was 7 years old.

Joe lived a full active life. He was blind the last five years of his life. He died Februar 15, 1942 and is buried at Brushy Cemeter Leon County, Texas



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OHN WINGFIELD YARBRO, manager of the Munger family interests in the famous K M A oil field of Wichita county, has been a resiof this section since the early days of the dant fifst K M A strike in 1915 and made the location for the first well drilled on the Munger property. The Munger ranch in Wichits county consists of approximately twenty-four hundred acres of land and a total of fifty-one successful wells were drilled on the property during the period of shallow With the discovery of deep producdovelopment. tion in that area in recent years, fifty-three addi-tional wells have been drilled, bringing the total number of producers on the Munger holdings by the middle of 1938 to one hundred and four wells. For some time after coming to Wichita county from his former home at Méxis, Mr. Yarbro's activities were concerned solely with the Munger royalty interests. After the boom had subsided somewhat in 1923, he then managed both the oil and grain interests and had charge of all the activities pertaining to the growing of wheat, raising cattle and oil production.

"John Wingfield Yarhro was born in Freestone county, Texas, on the twelfth of May, 1871, and is a son of Mr." and Mrs. F. L. Xarbro, both members of pioneer Freestone county families. Mr. Yarbro spent his childhood in Freestone county and obtained his education in the public schools there. His first employment was with the Munger Oil and Cotton Company of Mexia and for twentythree years Mr. Yarbro had charge of one of the chain of cotton gins operated by this concern prior to his transfer to Wichita county as personal represontative of the Munger interests In the then newly discovered oil field.

Mr. Yarbro was married to Miss Minhie Sewell, a daughter of Captain and Mra. Sewell of Mexia. "Mr. and Mra. Yarbro have one daughter, J. R. Lakey of Valley View, Texaa.

During his long residence in Wichita county Mr. Yarbro has taken an active part in civic and community affairs and for a number of years served as a member of the local school board. His home is on the Munger ranch and about one mile from the main portion of the K M A (Kemp-Munger-Allen) oil field near Iowa Park.

R OBERT MAURICE BROWNLEE, who has been closely allied with the petroleum industry of North Texas during the past several years, specializes in oil and gas distribution, having made rapid progress in this phase of the business since entering the field at Electra, Texas, in 1931. As sole owner of his oil concern, located on East Front Street, in Electra, Mr. Brownlee deals in wholesale gasoline and oils. He operates throughout the Electra territory, furnishing farms etc., with high grado gasoline and lubricants.

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Mr. Brownlee is that enterprising type of business man who early began to acquire experience. As a boy of some thirteen years he took the agency in Electra for the Dallas News, and successfully represented that leading Texas paper here until 1920. As a college student, at Howard-Payne College, he worked in a drug store, and after finishing college returned to his home in Electra and specialized in salesmanship, in various lines, from September, 1930, until February, 1931. He then opened a service station which he operated until Nevember, 1031, when he established his present business. Mr. Brownlee started in a small way and bulk up to one of the largest service stations in Electra, having very modern equipment in the place. A thoroughly progressive business man, and sales oxpert, he understands the distribution and handling of gasoline and olls, and is building up a splendid business in the Electra trade territory, where he has made many friends; by reason of his personality, as well as his ability.⁵

AVE ALFRED MELTON, civic leader, pioneer land owner and cattle man, is e the best known residents of the Electra-District in Wichita county where he has lived for a number of years. Mr. Melton is specializing in the raising of fine Hereford cattle and is following in the foot steps of both his father and grandfather who wore among the early day cattle men and ranchers of West Texas. In the fall of 1892, before he had attained his majority, Mr. Melton iocated in Wilbarger county with his grandfather and there had his first active experience in the cattle business. He obtained his education in the public schools and continued to livo in Porker County until he waseighteen years of age. Mr. Melton married Miss Allie Carter, member of a well known Wichita County family, and they are the parents of two children, Maudo and John Clifton Melton.

During his many years residence at Electra Mr. Melton has taken an active interest in elve and² educational affairs and for more than twenty years has served as a member of the local school beard. He is a hard working, energetic and progressive citizen, well posted in every detail of the cattle business and has no especial recreational bobbles. Although widely known and highly esteemed all over Wichita county, Mr. Melton has never sought or held political office and is not affiliated with any clubs or organizations.

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
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
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

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## BRUSHY COMMUNITY

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Some time during the nineteenth century, two brothers, Wade Hampton Yarborough (born 1835) and William Burns Yarborough n 1840; journeyed from South Carolina, through Alabama and eventually on to Texas. They settled in Leon County. After serving in the Confederacy, during the civil war, they both returned to the County and together bought some land in the Brushy Community.

Wade H. became ill and was advised by a doctor to move to another climate. He moved away, but William B. stayed, and through hard work paid for all the land. Later when the property was divided the brothers shared in it equally.

Wade was a Primitive Baptist minister. He donated three acres of land, from the northeast corner of his property (The Joseph A. Ferguson Survey) to start a church and cemetery. The one room building which was erected for a church also served the community as a school building.

The oldest marker in the cemetery, that is marked, is the grave of Sector Action (1995). Methy She was born 3-4-1828 and died 5-18-1887. The Yerby family helped to get the church and cemetery organized.

> The little church did not conduct services every Sunday. Transportation was by wagon, buggy, horseback or on foot. Nevertheless the people were hungary to hear the gospel. When there were services all the family went to listen. The mother went prepared to give her child a tea-cake if it got hungary, or a drink of water from a fruit jar if it got thirsty. A quilt was placed on the floor for the children to sleep on. If the preacher preached until one o'clock everyone just stayed and enjoyed the preaching while they had the opportunity.

Esther Campbell, wife of John Wesley. Campbell, born Feb. 5, 1847 and died Jan. 28, 1901, is buried in the Brushy Cemetery. Soon after she died, Sunday Church services fell on a very cold day. Only three members, all men, assembled for the service. They were John Wesley Cempbell, Williams B. and Wide H. arborough. Wade was the preacher. They, decided that according to scripture, "When two or more are gathered together in my, name," they should have preaching service. Although John W. did not have a good singing voice, he was chosen to lead the singing. As the three were laboring to sing a hymn, a ladie's beautiful voice joined them and continued until the end of the song. Tears streamed down the cheeks of John Wesley as the voice sounded like that of his dead wife. One of the other men went to the window to see if anyone could be seen. They concluded that God's angel had come to help with the singing and they continued with the service. The first plan to care for the cemetery grounds was for the interested people to meet on Friday before the first Sunday in August. They brought tools and cleaned the cemetery, had an eleven o'clock preaching service, lunch and then a business meeting.

Years later the people hired a caretaker but.

moved to Buffalo, Texas. Mr. Hill was a good carpenter and cabinet maker. He was a rural mail carrier for a number of years and he also worked in the post office. He liked to grow vegetables and fruit and was very successful in this line. The author of this article was invited to share a watermelon with him each summer afternoon—half a watermelon for each person.

Mrs. Hill was reared in a Christian home and followed her beliefs in the Baptist Church througout her life. She participated in every phase of the church and for fiftyeight years she taught a class of young women. She read her Bible each day and recorded the date when she had finished all of it in a diary which she faithfully kept with the last entry made just three months before she died. Her favorite hymns were Amazing Grace and When the Roll Is Called Up Yonder I'll Be There.

Evie May was a very sociable person who liked parties with written contests, visiting with friends, and just "going places". She did not enjoy the best of health in her later years, but a couple of aspirins helped her to accept any invitation. She told her daughter, Volina, that she didn't enjoy going to parties with "old" ladies"—meaning women much younger than she was, possibly in their sixties. She enjoyed many long visits with her Cousin Charlie, Mrs. J.W. Manning, in Fort Worth, Texas, where she attended fine musical events sponsored by Mrs. Manning's daughter, Mrs. John F. Lyons.

Evie May had many talents. She was a fine seamstress and made all of her clothes, usually without a pattern. She would not wear anything that was black. She was noted for her beautiful handwork and was most generous with numerous people with gifts of quilts, embro dered pillow cases, fancy lace handkerchiefs, tatted pieces, crocheted edgings for tablecloths and napkins, and intricate drawn work. She was a perfectionist in her work and was very careful whom she asked to quilt on her project. Like her father she wrote poetry some of which was survived the years. Her dictionary was always filled with the crossword puzzles that appeared in the daily paper.

Evie May Hill touched many lives during her long and fruitful life. She passed away on the 30 of October, 1955, at the home of her daughter in Buffalo, Texas,—just six weeks before her 87th birthday. She is buried with the rest of her family in the Burroughs Plot in the cemetery at Buffalo, Texas.

Oakwood is where Joe met and later married **Pearl Fabborough**. Joe was a tall man about 6 foot 4 inches and Pearl was 5 feet and a small woman. It was Pearl's nature to be quiet but Joe was a many of many words.

Joe and Pearl were devout members of the Primitive Baptist Church. Joe didn't profess to be a preacher but nevertheless did quite a bit of preaching. He did not preach from a pulpit, but every time he met someone that would listen he quoted "Scripture," but if he made a mistake Pearl would say, "Now Papa." Then he corrected his mistake.

Joe owned and operated a farm. He raised cattle and hogs on an open range. He liked to hunt and fish.

From 1922 until 1934 Joe carried the U.S. mail on horseback from Eunice to Ninevah.

There was always music and singing in the home. Joe had a special dance which he did alone called 'Knocking the back step.' Oss played the fiddle and Bill picked the guitar and mandolin. Their sisters played the organ, guitar and violin. Cordia, Ida, Eva and Adelle made up a good quartet. Eva sang bass, Adelle, alto, Ida, soprano and Cordia, tenor. This was a happy good-natured family.

Joe and Pearl had nine children. Isabell (Belle) married Jessie Pate and their children that lived to be grown were: Ruby, Verner, Toga, Lorene, Howard, Joe L., Iva Dell, Audrey Lee and D.W. Belle died July 3, 1961 and is buried in Parker Cemetery.

Orsamus (Oss) was born March 14, 1887. On December 23, 1906 her married Kafle Shaw. Oss was an outstanding citizen and was honest and hard-working. He owned and operated a farm, a sawmill, and a gristmill. He raised cattle and hogs and as a young man he worked for his uncle George Yarborough at a cotton gin. 

starling Hill was born 1782 in Georgia. He s twice married having nine children in the t family and six in the second. His second e was Edith Reed born 1821.

starling was a member of the Methodist irch and in advanced age was noted for nifesting a cheerful, uncomplaining dispoon amid troubles and trials. He first tled in Marengo County near Shiloh and ated land to the church, which was built the year of 1842. He entered several idred acres of land and during the year of 2 he sold his place to a Jones. But it's still ed the Hill place.

ater he entered land and settled where Wayne school house now stands. Here he d for many years, raising a large family. er his children married and left him alone, sold his home and spent the last year and alf of his life at the home of his son Moses I near Bashi in Clark County, Alabama. died July 5, 1877 being 85 years old. He ed at Shiloh Church on land he had d to the church. His marker was hand m from heart of pine. It burned when the st caught fire, along with his wife's tker. They were never replaced. · partial list of Starling's children are: amus, William, Moses, Greenbury, Hen-Rial Taylor, Arminiae, Tabitha D., Cathie, Samuel, Elizabeth.

Starling J., Jerusha, Martha P., John C., Mary. He married his second wife Louisa Whitley September 20, 1852. Their children were: Diana, James, Moses, Lydia, Joseph (Joe).

Orsamus, Starling's oldest son, and family came to Texas by wagon train about 1857. They settled in Freestone County at Bonners Ferry. Oss had fiery red hair. Many of his descendents have red hair and it is believed that this family trait came from Oss' mother.

In 1866 Oss was found dead beside a trail. He had walked to town and when he didn't return they started searching for him. When they found him, his body was so decomposed they wrapped him in a sheet and buried him there. Joseph (Joe) was the youngest child and he was only 6years old when his father died. .

Sometime later after Oss's death, Louisa married a Trawick. Mr. Trawick and Joe didn't get along well. So Joe left home as a young man and made his way working on ranches. Part of his duties, other than the usual ranch-work, was breaking wild horses. Some of Oss' children did not live to be ۳, grown. Three lived long enough to raise families. Martha married a Caylor and lived. in Leon County for a number of years. Lydia married a Riley and lived in Eldorado, Texas. Joe-married Learly arbonough and raised a large family.

The oldest two sons Starling and John C. served in the Civil War and were killed in the Galveston area. Starling enlisted July, 1861. His Commanding Officer was Capt. James W. Gardiner of the Texas Buck Hunters, Vol. Cav. Co., Anderson Co., 11th Brig.

John enlisted June 8, 1861. His Commanding Officer was Capt. M.W. Matthews of the Lone Star Guards, Burnet Co., Cav., 27th Brig. Sept. 15, 1861 he enlisted with the Reserve Co., Navarro Co., 19th Brig. His Commanding Officer was Capt. J.A. Clayton.

1887 Raymond, Texas-died 30 January 1962 Dallas, Texas). Volina was a very good student and graduated in 1905 from San Marcos Normal Institute which enabled her to begin her teaching career.

Volina married Evan Lee Sheffield (born 20 August 1879 Jewett, Texas-died 20 October 1940 Buffalo, Texas) on 12 May 1909 at the Baptist Church in Buffalo, Texas. She was an accomplished pianist and was organist (a pump organ) for the Baptist Church for many years. Two grandchildren were blessed with a wonderful grandmother: 1. Evie Kate Sheffield (born 21 February 1913) and James Joseph Hill (born 12 July 1915). 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

Rt. 2 Dest 11 lost his mother in death, I 882, and his father, 1885. After the death of his mother, his Aunt Mary Sloan was a mother to the Woods children till the death of their father, then the three older children, went to live with Uncle Tom and Aunt Emma. Sloan at Rock Shoales, now Sloan Community. Vallie, Archie and Roy were considered members of the family and received the same consideration as did the Sloan children.

At that time public schools in the country were, as a rule, of short duration. And for their children to get proper schooling some communities hired a teacher to come and teach in their home: Roy Woods received a part of his schooling in this manner. Roy helped on the Sloan ranch, as did also his brother and sister—Roy and Archie on the ranch and Vallie in the home----just as did the Sloan children. Under Uncle Tom's training Roy became a good manager of livestock. After finishing school, Roy bought a livery stable in San Saba and operated it some years.

Sept. 20, 1899, Roy De Woods and Eugenia Pearcy, born October 22, 1879, died February 12, 1979, were united in marriage at the home of her parents, Astol and Lena Marr-Pearcy, in the Sloan Community. Roy and Eugene Woods had born to them children as follows: (1) Vallie Eugene Woods, born Feb. 9,-1901, married Geo. Walker, deceased left two sons. Terrance Walker and Frank (Bubba) Walker; (2) Ruth Evelyn Woods, born March 1, 1903, married Curtis Lanham; (3) Sarah Alice Woods, born Dec. 11, 1905, married K. N. McBride; (4) De Pearcy Woods, born Feb. 12, 1910, married Iona Lusty; (5) Joe Sloan Woods, born July 29, 1912, married Marjorie Bullock; (6) Mary Lucille Woods, born March 1, 1919, married Leonard Barsdale.

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

### JOIIN MAYFIELD MOORE By Mary Love Berryman

John Mayfield Moore was born in Abbeville District, South Carolina, 15 March 1802, the son of Lewellen Moore (1780-1851) and Priscilla Thornton (1781–1851). In 1818 the family moved to Alabama, first to Tuscaloosa County and then to Fayette County where John grew to manhood. About 1830, he married Marinda White Paden (1813–1861), the daughter of James Paden (1787-1834) and Frances Brockman (1788-1834). They were the parents of thirteen children: Biddie Thornton Moore, Mary Moore McVey, (1832 -), James Paden Moore (1834–1919), Clarinda Patterson Moore McVey (1836-1905), John Thomas Moore (1838-1927), Eliza Jane Moore, Dr. William Franklin Moore (1843-1903), Susan Priscilla Moore Morris (1845-1927), Llewellyn Moore (1847-1919), Sarah Frances Moore Tomlinson (1849–1936), Harriett Ann Moore Jackson (1852–1927), Martha Malinda Moore Harrison (1853–1951), Samuel Henry Moore (1857-).

In the early 1840s, the family moved to Bellefontaine, Mississippi, located in Choctaw (now Webster) County, where the family lived until after the Civil War. John Mayfield Moore was a farmer and operated a mill for grinding corn. The three oldest sons fought with the Confederates in the war, and John Mayfield made boots for the soldiers to wear. Marinda died 7 July 1861 and is buried in the Bellefontaine Cemetery according to family tradition.

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town, Williamson County, Texas, married Sarah Kitchell, born 10 August 1828, Illinois, died September 1905, and both are buried in the Green Cemetery. One acre of the Green property had been donated as a cemetery, five miles north of Georgetown, to be used for close relatives and friends. James had one sister, Elizabeth Jane, who was always known to their children as "Aunt Betsy." Their first child, William M. Green, was boo in Perry County, Arkansas, in 1842.

James and Sarah came to Gonzales, Texas, about 1847, when William was five years old. James served in the Civil War near Galveston Island. He had a crooked right arm and was not in the regular service, but hauled supplies to the troops. John Marion Green, grandson of James, inherited the crooked arm from his grandfather, and was very proud of it.

William M. Green was in the Civil War Regular Service (about nineteen years of age) on Galveston Island, and received a Confederate Pension later for his service. He was in Company "H," First Texas Heavy Artillery. He enlisted in Gonzales County on 3 April 1862 and served until about 1864. He lived sixty-three years in Texas, twenty-five of them in Williamson County, according to his Confederate Pension papers, dated August 1909.

William M. Green (1842–18 November 1912) was married 24 February 1869 to Eliza Amanda Alford (1851-8 February 1930), daughter of Winfield Alford and Elisa Derrington, and they had eight children: Sarah Eliza, born 19 October 1870, Gonzales, died 29 May 1954, married 10 November 1885 to Daniel Monroe Finnie of Springfield, Illinois; Waid Hampton, born 23 September 1873, Gonzales, died 14 April 1956, married Mattie Gore, 1895; Hannah Jeanette, born 16 An 1876; Gonzales, died 14 January 1932, married Clarence Gaines Alford, 22 October 1899; William Dee, born 19 October 1879; Gonzales, died 14 July 1963, was a Baptist preacher, married Eldora Collier; James Clinton, born 21 December 1882, Gonzales, died 22 July 1955, married Ora Brown; John Marion, born 20 March 1885, Georgetown, died 29 January 1968, maried Nancy Rebecca Kimbro, 27 November 1904; Odie

# JOHN MARION GREEN FAMILY By J. K. Bentley

James Green was born in Conway County, Arkansas, 20 January 1823. He died at Georgetown 16 February 1899. He married Sarah Kitchell who was born in Illinois 20 August 1828, and died at Georgetown in 1905. The family moved to Gonzales County, Texas, in 1845. The 1860 census for Gonzales County gives the following: James Green, age 37; Sarah Green, age 32; William Green, age 18 (born Arkansas); Fanny Green, age 13 (born Texas); Calvin Green, age 11 (born Texas); and John Marion Green, age 9 (born Texas).

Fannie and Calvin died young, and are buried at Waelder. William and John Marion married first cousins in 1869. William married Amanda Alford, daughter of Winfield Alford. John Marion married Mary Ann Alford, daughter of Hatch Alford. Mary Ann was born 26 November 1852, and died at the home of her oldest son, Jim, in Brownfield, Fexas, in 1926. John Marion was born 8 April 1851, and died at Georgetown 30 October 1901.


James and Sarah Green, William and Amanda and their eight children, John Marion and Mary Ann and their six surviving children moved from Waelder to Williamson County around 1890. They settled on adjoining farms five miles north of Georgetown.

John Marion and Mary Ann Green's children were as listed, with their families.

James (Jim) Green, born 10 July 1870, married Greenie Young in Williamson County. They lived for many years at Brownfield, Texas, where Jim served a number of years as County Clerk.

Nora Green, born 26 July 1872, married Charlie Lord, who became a lawyer. They moved to Beaumont, Texas, and remained there the rest of their lives. Their children were Owen and Ruby.

Willie Green, born 8 May 1875 and died 29 October 1939, married Emma Young, sister of Jim's wife. They had twelve children. Two died in infancy. Ola married Paul Ischy, and had seven children. They lived on RR 5, Georgetown. Flora married Paul Stevens. Dee married Nancy Lackey. Horace married Ruth Lackey. Jalina married Corbett Graham of Marble Falls. Nora married Miles Keener. Truman married Sophia Singleton, Tennie married Dowin Stipp of Burnet. Ivy married Ray Southworth of Georgetown. Leonlus never married. He died in 1955 and is buried at Round

ricke Eleanora Hogriefen in Germany in 1843 and emigrated to Texas landing at Galveston in 1846 and going inland to Austin County. Shortly thereafter his only child and then his wife died. He relocated to Washington County where in 1848 he married Louise Caroline Koenig who had arrived on the same ship as H. D. W.

On 12 November 1885 Theodore Granzin married Caroline Homeyer in Washington County and took his bride to a farm east of Walburg where their only child, Olga Lula, was born 5 May 1888. In 1890 he sold that facth and moved to another he had acquired on Berry Creek northeast of Georgetown.

After the marriage of Olga Lula to Carl Liese in 1909, Theodore and Caroline relocated to Weir where he operated a truck farm. With an avid interest in horticulture, Theodore's orchard included numerous varieties of peach trees along with pecan, apple, and mulberry. In addition to all types of vegetables, he cultivated berry and grape vines. His favorite flowers were roses which grew profusely in his yard.

Theodore Granzin became a naturalized citizen of the United States in 1906. He was one of the organizers of St. Peter Lutheran Church in 1899. He died 6 June 1937 in Georgetown. Caroline Granzin died 11 April 1935. Both are buried in St. Peter Lutheran Church Cemetery east of Walburg.

After Theodore's marriage, his mother Emilie Charlotte, brother Albert and sister Augusta moved to Washington Territory (now Washington State) where they took up land claims in 1886. In 1897 Emilie Charlotte and Albert moved to Sutter Creek, California. Augusta married Joseph Somerville and remained in Washington.

In 1898 Albert brought his mother back to Texas for an extended visit with Theodore and Caroline. In Sep) a grandson, Felix Bohl who had recently arrived from the old country, took Emilie Charlotte back to Sutter Creek where she died some two weeks later. Albert died in Sutter Creek 31 May 1920.



Adella Green, born 18 August 1884, died 13 May 1 Oat Georgetown. She married Wayne Adams. They had five children: Edward, Lonnie, Ola, Jessie and Charles, who operated the Western Auto Supply in Georgetown. Charles and Lonnie were both drowned in the Georgetown lake on 30 August 1982.

Grandmother Amanda Green had two brothers, John Posey Alford and George Alford, and one sister, Caroline or "Callie." Callie married Black Holly. Mr. Holly died before their son George was born, Later "Callie" married Joe Foster, who lived near Georgetown. They had three sons and a daughter: Leonard, Lowrey, Archie, and Lona. Lowrey worked for many years for the Williamson County Sun. Lona married George Harrison and they had six children: Howard, Kate, Abe, who was killed in World War I, Horace, Georgia, and Mary.

## JOHN GROSSMAN AND ROSA ZGABAJ GROSSMAN By Margie Janssen

When John Grossman (1858-24 December 1943) was nine years old, and his sister, Rosina, was six years old, they immigrated from Moravia (Czechoslovakia) to Fayette County, Texas, with their young widowed mother in approximately 1868. Rosina Grossman movied a Mr. Zatopek and remained in Fayette County near Ellinger. In 1882 John married Rosina (Rosa) Zgabaj (4 September 1863-17 April 1948), as recorded in the Fayette County Marriage Records, La Grange, Texas.


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Rosa was the daughter of Jan (John) (1820-17 June 1904) and Rosina (1826-8 February 1888), who immigrated to Fayette County from Broz, Moravia (Czechoslovakia) in approximately 1866, when Rosa was almost four years old. The Zgabajs purchased land in Fayette County, near Fayetteville. John Zgabaj was a merchant and a wagon master and made many trips to Port Brownsville with cotton to be sold.

John and Rosa Grossman moved to Williamson County soon after their marriage and rented (later bought) a farm seven miles west of Granger. They prospered and bought an adjoining farm. The land was fertile and crops of corn and cotton were bountiful, in good years producing two bales of cotton per acre; but they had to deal with cattle rustlers and outlaws, having many exciting experiences and close calls. John Grossman owned a team of fine Percheron mares and was often called upon to break up the waist high prairie grassland for agricultural use. He plowed up several thousand acres in the Granger-Taylor area, often boarding away from home two to three weeks at a time.

The Grossman home was a musical home, as all the children sang well or played the organ or accordion; they later had a phonograph and records. They built a large home with dishes and furniture imported from Czechoslovakia. Besides crops they raised large seasonal gardens and stored and preserved most of their food. They made hugh ten gallon crocks of sourkraut, smoked sausage and ham, raised chickens (for eggs as well as meat), ducks, turkeys, guineas, beef cattle, milk cows, pigs and lambs. They made their own wine and brewed their own beer. A Sunday dinner at "Grandma Grossman's" was always served with a hugh tureen of chicken noodle soup (homemade noodles, sliced very fine), homemade bread, home churned butter, fresh cottage creamy cheese or aged cooked cheese and Kolaches for dessert, along with fruits, vegetables and meats of the season.

John and Rosa had nine living children: John, 16 September 1883-24 December 1923; Alojs (Louis), 15 August 1885-10 November 1973; Johanna Emilie, 11 December 1887; Anna, 10 May 1890; Frantiska (Frances), 19 September 1893-25 March 1981; Marie (Mary), 3 September 1895-13 March 1978; Joseph, 19 April 1899-20 May 1893; Ludmilla (Lilliam), 30 September 1903; and, Rudolph, 1 June 1906. At the time of Rosa's death in 1948, she had twenty-eight grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren. They had ten

## SANDERS FAMILY F942

The family name "Sanders", purely Enlish, and of considerable antiquity, is spelled woors, "Sanders" and "Saunders". Our ore descended from Lawrence Saunlers, a Baptist minister who was burned at he stake under the "Bloody Mary" reign because he would not give up his religion. hwrence was from England. His martyrdom oduced a long line of ministers. So deep in hearts of our forefathers was the yearning have freedom of worship, our beloved

Rea Donofiue Rt. 2 Box 111 Breckmadge Tc. 76024 Iarge family. It was not uncommon to have ten, or twelve children, all born without defects. As early as 1649 some people reached America in search of freedom. Others by the name of Saunders or Sanders never reached the New World. Some died before the American Revolution.

My grandfather, William Clark Saunders, was born in 1820 in East Tennessee. He was married to Martha Moore, a member of Methodist Episcopal Church. Grandfather was a staunch Missionary Baptist. To this union were born thirteen children, nine boys and four girls. They were a deeply spiritual family, and Grandmother took special pains to train all of their children to be useful and happy in Christian work, never forgetting that life is a gift from God. Some of the Sanders are missionaries. Dr. Roscoe.Saunders was a missionary to China for almost fifty years. During World War II, Mrs. Saunders was held as civilian prisoner of war by the Japanese. Martha Sanders, my father's niece, was a missionary to Persia, barely made her escape back to the states. When she returned, she lectured throughout the country dressed in the garb of Persian women. Another niece of my father, Pearl Sanders, was teaching in Germany when the war broke out. Stranded there at a dangerous time, she like Martha barely made her escape.

The Sanders are noted for having ambition and a determination to advance intellectually. I have wished many times that I could have known my intelligently inclined ancestors, hoping some of their brilliance would rub off on me. They lived in a different era, before the invention of automobiles and airplanes, and there was little opportunity to communicate and know each other better. I am reminded of an incident that happened on a bus one time when I was coming home from San Antonio, a gentleman took a seat beside me. I quickly learned he was talkative. When he learned my people were from Tennessee, we struck up a conversation. He was from Tennessee, also, and was elated that we had that much in common. I had many relatives there. Perhaps I could profit from our conversation, and I thought the subject of ancestors would be an interesting subject. I was asked what city and county my people were from. I thought a moment before answering, hoping I could give the right answer. It was early in the morning, and I hadn't had my coffee to refresh me. I answered, "I'm embarrassed. I can't think of the name of the county, but one thing I do know. Two families, the Sanders and Pettigrews, practically run the whole county!" This brought a quick response.

"I know. It's McNairy, and what you just said is true. Your people have had an important role in the affairs of that county. In fact, the Civil War played havoc, but long ago your ancestors played an important part in repairing the damage."

"Ancestors!" I repented. "That's what I'm interested in, ancestors and family history. May I ask where you are from? I assume McNairy County." I replied.

While we are assuming, may lassume that you are linttic Sanders on your way to dewett?" That startled me.

to correspond? We, the whole family, used to read your most interesting letters. I am Jerry Sanders, a son of Dr. Jerry Sanders. In your letters you used to speak of riding to Jewett on the bus from San Antonio. Remember?" he asked, displaying a big smile. "You have the Sanders look, dark hair and brown eyes. I took a chance on it being you," he explained, wearing a big smile on his handsome face.

"What a strange, strange coincidence! But it's been fun meeting you. Time is running out. I'll be getting off the bus soon, but before I do there's a question I want to ask you. May I?"

"By all means, please do. You have my curiosity aroused. I hope I can answer your question. Don't make it too difficult." A mischievous smile appeared on her face.

"Why are there so many doctors in the Sanders and Saunders family, and so many in Tennessee? I've often wondered. Just recently I discovered a family in San Antonio that has five doctors in the family.

"I can't answer, I'm afraid. I've oftenwondered myself. It's a hard life, but useful. I'll name a few, but I don't know them all. Some have passed on. The ones I have known are: May and James L. brothers of your father, Gilsie Saunders, Frank Saunders, Henry Saunders, Jerry Saunders, Clyde Sanders, Joe Ivan Sanders and his son. They live in Del Rio. If you're working on a project, perhaps I've helped a little."

"The bus is about to stop. You have my address. Let me hear from you, and wish me luck on my project."

"That I will do." he promised as he waved goodbye.

Jerry Saunder's mention of Civil War days brought back sad memories of what my grandparents had related about those heartbreaking experiences. My Pettigrew grandparents lived near Shiloh Battle ground, and suffered the harrowing experiences of invading soliders who ransacked homes, took all the food, blankets, anything they wanted, even jerked the blanket from under my mother, then a tiny baby in her cradle. Reconstruction Days caused families, including the Sanders and Pettigrews, to flee in wagons, boats, anything that could carry them to safety, leaving prized possessions behind. The Sanders and Pettigrews chose Texas for their new home, enduring many hardships. There must have been a combination of sadness and gladness when they landed on Texas soil, then on to Jewett in Leon County. They were among the first arrivals in Texas. Old roots uprooted in Tennessee, and new roots established in the beautiful state of Texas. Celia Pettigrew grew up to be married to the handsome boy she loved.

How wonderful to have been among the first arrivals. The rough places in life they had been over seemed to be getting smoother. Celia and Beauregard were soon married. It was a beautiful wedding, lavishly planned, reception following, all the trimmings, and a beautiful wedding gown. We, as children, have had a complete description, and I have part of her wedding dress. After all, she was an only child after having lost her baby brother. Celia had to have the best.

To this union were born five children, three



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
