Preface

These records are the legacy of our Yarbrough family researchers, to whom much is owed. The known family researchers include Jean Baker, Ann Y. Broadbent, Mary Y. The originals of these volumes are being kept for the benefit of future generations by the Williamson County Library, Franklin, Tennessee.

No claims of accuracy or authentication of the material herein are made or may be assumed. Many of these records have been superseded by subsequent research. Hence, there are records which are erroneous and unreliable; it would have been a Herculean task to attempt to correct all of them. Fortunately, there are only a few critical genealogical facts that are involved, and which are correctly stated here:

- Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough was never married to Frances Proctor;
- Ambrose Yarbrough did not immigrant from Yorkshire; he is now believed to be a descendant of Richard the Immigrant;
- There are so far only two proven sons of Old Richard John and Richard II;
- There is so far no evidence proving Joshua Yarborough I to be a descendant of Old Richard.
- The "Old Country" referred to in old documents and letters is the Colony of Virginia, not England or the Old World.
- There were not seven brothers who immigrated from "the old country"; in fact, it now appears there were three brothers and four sons of the brothers. Which were the fathers and which were the sons are so far unknown.

In spite of these inaccuracies, these records comprise much of our history and some of our accomplishments. There are pages whose print quality is so poor that word recognition was not possible. In spite of that, at least partial capability for searching these volumes is provided, as well as an index to each volume. Nonetheless, the viewer is cautioned to perform his/her own due diligence in connection with any use of this material.

The various spellings of the Yarbrough surname have never been applied consistently, even within a given family. To the extent possible, the names in the index reflect the names used on the source pages; where it wasn't clear as to which might be the proper spelling, the spelling used is "Yarbrough".

SOME SONOMA COUNTY SETTLERS: THE CROCKETT DAVIS YARBROUGH FAMILY

1. SONOMA COUNTY HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

In 1812 the Russians landed at Bodega Bay and Fort Ross in California. From Bodega Bay they moved up the Russian River toward the Santa Rosa Valley, and from Fort Ross they moved up the coast toward Gualala, establishing operations along the Gualala and Russian Rivers. These settlements were support facilities for their Alaskan colonies, principally to grow agricultural products. They apparently formed good working relations with the local Coast Miwok Indians.

In 1823, Sonoma Mission was founded under the Mexican regime. Spanish settlers and missionaries had previously raided the Sonoma County Indians to obtain "converts" for the San Rafael, San Francisco and Mission San Jose missions, but the moist bay area climate proved deadly to these Indians, so the Sonoma Mission site was developed to make "better use of the Indians". The Indians of the Santa Rosa Valley, the Satayomi or Sotoyome, who were Coast Miwok, had resisted being converted by force, responding with guerrilla warfare.

In the 1830's when the missions were secularized, General Vallejo had laid out the streets of Sonoma, and began to build his adobe near Petaluma, establishing land grants for the purpose of bringing in settlers to counter the threat of the Russians. The Satayomi terrorized those who attempted to settle in the Santa Rosa Valley, and effectively prevented any early Spanish (or Mexican) settlements there.

In 1837 an epidemic of smallpox struck at Fort Ross, probably brought in by Russian visitors there. There had been thousands of Indians in the Sonoma county territory, including the Satayomi in Santa Rosa Valley along the Russian River, and toward San Francisco Bay, the more docile Petaluma, Cotati and other southern tribes. The epidemic wiped out most of the white population, and by 1838 had virtually wiped out the entire Indian population of Sonoma, Napa and Solano counties, estimated between 40,000 to 80,000 Indians. In 1841 the Russians traded their property and stock to Johann Augustus (John) Sutter for four years of supplies for their Alaskan colonies, and departed the scene. For perhaps a decade, from 1838 to 1848, most of Sonoma County was populated only by wild animals. In the Russian River basin there were a few surviving Satayomi, who lived in small families. Later in the century, Pomo Indians from Lake County drifted into the Mendocino-Sonoma county territory and Indians again became a presence by the end of the century.

The United States had tried to purchase California from the Mexican Government, and were pursuing that when the Mexican War broke out, further complicated by the Bear Flag revolt in 1846. The treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo was signed in February 1848, ceding California to the United States, but giving legal status to Spanish and Mexican land grants. The discovery of gold in 1848 depleted Sonoma County of settlers, who were primarily located in Sonoma at that time.

2. SOME RUSSIAN RIVER SETTLERS

In the Santa Rosa Valley, which is the Russian River basin, Mark West was probably the first settler. One Markus West, age 20 and born in England, died in Sonoma County in 1851. Mark West left his name on a creek, a hot springs and village and a district between Santa Rosa and Healdsburg. In about 1844 he squatted on the land that was included in the Carrillo land grant. The Carril-

lo descendants, the Fitch Family, had sent an agent to establish a settlement which apparently failed to survive. The Fitch family did not arrive until some time in the 1850's, and even then did not immediately press their land grant claims so that much of the original land grant was lost to competing homestead claims. Other settlers had begun arriving in the late 1840's. In the mid 1850's a large influx of settlers arrived in Sonoma County, with many staking claims to land along the Russian River basin, some in conflict with the Carrillo Land Grant.

One Hugh Porter, was described in a History of Sonoma County (George K. Porter p. 413): Hugh Porter came to California in 1846, making the long overland trip by ox teams, and shortly after his arrival here he enlisted in the California Volunteers, with which he took an active part in the Mexican War. Later he turned his attention to mining, which vocation he followed for a few years, and then, about 1850, came to Sonoma County and took up 160 acres of land on the Russian River, nine miles west of Healdsburg, where he lived for nearly half a century, his death occurring there in 1897. The Porter ranch is now part of the Twin Valleys Ranch of Fred McMurray. This Hugh Porter was among the first settlers on the Russian River, and probably the first of the families of this history that came to the Russian River area.

Two Hugh Porters (one 24 and the other 22, from Tennessee) are together in the 1850 census of Mendocino County along with T.A.D. Porter age 26 and Missouri Porter (female aged 16). This census is presumed to be in the part of Mendocino County which later became Mendocino Township in Sonoma County - the area where the Porter brothers settled.

In 1963, the death notice of Benjamin McKinley Porter, George Porter's cousin, stated that Benjamin's father Thomas A.D. Porter and his brother Hugh settled on the Russian River near Windsor in 1846. Then the Porter brothers were among the next settlers to arrive after Mark West. It also stated they fought in an insurrection in Sonoma in 1870, and later took pack trains to Sonoma from Windsor for supplies. The Bear Flag revolt took place in Sonoma in 1846, but apparently that is not the insurrection mentioned here. By 1871 the railroads were running as far as Healdsburg, with the branch line from Fulton to Guerneville completed shortly afterward, so the purpose of the pack trains is not clear. Perhaps the 1870 date is in error.

Our next Sonoma County settlers were James Madison Hill, his wife Sarah, son Joshua Gilman Hill and daughters Jamima Ann and Emma. James M. Hill was involved in the 1849 gold rush, and had returned to Missouri to collect his family about 1852. They first settled in Fiddletown in Amador County, a town founded by Missouri folk. There he operated a hotel and ran a stage coach to Indian Diggins, a camp between Volcano and Pine Grove in Amador County which is now a state park and Indian cultural museum (Miwok).

In the wake of the gold rush, placer "panning" and loose surface gold had been exhausted, requiring elaborate mining operations with corresponding large mining companies to continue the industry. Former miners were finding their way to Sonoma County in the 1850's, and the James M. Hill family was among them, arriving in 1856. Hill obtained property, for which he later managed homestead status, on the Russian River in one of the few parts of Sonoma County where the land title was not clouded by Spanish and Mexican land grants. The Russian settlement in Fort Ross and along the lower Russian River must have discouraged the Mexicans from including of those areas in Mexican Land Grants, so they could be settled without the prospect of legal problems with the Mexican land grant claimants (Carrillo and Fitch).

Crockett Davis Yarbrough with his long-time friend Billy Bowers supposedly took part in the Mexican War. C.D. Yarbrough turned 14 years of age just before 1846 began, and may have volunteered along with Billy, who was a few

years older. It is further supposed that they served under Hugh Porter in the California company of irregular volunteers in the Mexican War. Bowers was referred to as an old war buddy of Crockett's by one of his grand-daughters, and the Mexican War appears to be the only war in which Crockett Davis Yarbrough could have engaged. After the war Yarbrough may have followed Hugh Porter back to California. However, in the 1850 census Yarbrough is listed with his family in Mount Vernon, Lawrence Co, Mo. Yarbrough. He and his brothers were noted teamsters (drivers of teams of horses and oxen) and supposedly he worked in or guided wagon trains from Missouri to the gold country.

In 1857, Jamima Ann Hill was married to Crockett Davis Yarbrough at James M. Hill's house above West Side Road across the Russian River from the future site of Mirabel Park. They initially resided in El Dorado County where their first child was born, but by the 1860 census they were at the James M. Hill ranch, and remained in the Russian River area the rest of their lives.

3. THE JAMES MADISON HILL FAMILY

William Hill and Catherine Wesley who were both born in Louisa County, Virginia, probably about the time of the Revolutionary War. They were the parents of James Madison Hill the 49er and 1857 settler in Sonoma County.

James Madison Hill claimed that his mother descended from John Wesley, whereas his daughter Jamima told her children that Catherine was the niece of John Wesley, the co-founder of Methodism. The Family of John Wesley is well researched, and the only possibility of an American connection seems to be his brother Charles Wesley, the other co-founder of Methodism who composed over 5000 hymns, some of which are familiar to church members today. James Ogelthorpe founded the Georgia Colony in 1733, and both John and Charles Wesley were there near the beginning, but John stayed only a short time. Charles Wesley spent a longer time, and his stay in the colonies is reported as having ended with an unhappy love affair, but the records give no mention of a child. After returning to England, Charles Wesley married Sally Gwyne on Apr 8, 1749. They had three children who lived to adulthood, but none could have been Catherine's parent. Possibly Catherine's father was the result of the unhappy love affair. Charles Wesley could not have been her father (she would have been born before 1750) because her son James M. Hill was born in 1810. 60 years is usually too old for women to give birth.

JAMES MADISON HILL, b. Apr 3 1810 in Madison Co, Ky, d. Feb 2 1895, Ca. bur. at McPeak Cemetery, off West Side Road, near Hacienda Crossing of the Russian River in Sonoma Co, CA. Before coming to California, J.M. Hill married:

SARAH H. ELSTON, b. May 15, 1811 in Tenn, d. Sept 16 1894 in Ca. buried beside J.M. Hill in McPeak Cemetery.

The following is a biographical sketch resulting from an interview with J.M. Hill in 1880: reference: An Illustrated History of Sonoma County, The Lewis Publishing Co, 113 Adams St., Chicago Ill., 1889, pp.451-452.

James M. Hill.— The subject of this sketch is a descendant from one of the old families of Virginia. His parents, William and Catherine (Wesley) Hill, were natives of Louisa County, that State, and his mother was a descendant of the great reformer, John Wesley. His parents moved to Madison County, Kentucky, at an early date, where he was born April 3, 1810. His father died when Mr.

Hill was but six years old, leaving the care and rearing of the family to the mother. In 1822 his mother moved with her family to Missouri, and located in Boone County, where she engaged in farming and stock-raising. Mr Hill was early in life engaged in farm work, and brought up in the rugged life of pioneer settlements, his schooling being almost entirely neglected. He resided on his mother's farm until he attained his majority, and, in 1831, married Miss Sarah Elston. Her parents were residents of Boone County, but natives of New Jersey. After his marriage, in 1832, he engaged in farming and stock-raising upon his own account, an occupation he followed until 1849. He was attracted by the glowing accounts of easily acquired riches to be obtained in the Golden State, and in the spring of that year he left his family on the old homestead and started across the plains for California. Nothing of particular interest was connected with this journey, and after months of slow and tedious traveling of the ox teams over plains and mountains he arrived in October, 1849, in El Dorado County. Upon his arrival he immediately commenced active operations in mining, which he successfully conducted until 1852. In that year he went by steamer route from San Francisco to New Orleans, and from there returned to his old home in Missouri. Upon his return he sold his farm, settled up his affairs, and in the spring of 1853 started upon his second trip overland, taking his family with him. Upon his arrival in California he again located in El Dorado County, where he established a hotel and freighting line between Fiddletown and Indian Diggings, and was also engaged in mining operations. He conducted these enterprises until 1856, when, desirous of some more congenial occupation, he determined to take up his old calling, that of a farmer. This in view he came to Sonoma County, and located on the Russian River in Redwood Township, where he secured 137 acres of Government land. Upon this he took up his residence and for many years devoted himself to clearing, cultivating and improving it. He continued his farming and stock-growing at this point until 1879, after which he was engaged in various occupations, among which was extensive stockgrowing in San Luis Obispo County. He was successful in his various enterprises, and in 1884 purchases 640 acres of land in Mendocino County, which he stocked with 600 head of sheep. Mr. Hill is a resident of Forestville. His advanced age (nearly eighty years) has induced him to abandon the care and labor attending his ranch, and he is enjoying the well earned competency which his industry and energy have secured to him. He has always been an active and energetic citizen, and his success in life has been due to his well poised intellect and industrious habits rather that to any educational advantages he received in early life. His long residence in the county has made him well known. He is a strong supporter of enterprises that will build up and advance the interests of Sonoma County. In political affairs Mr. Hill is associated with the Democratic party. He is a life-long Democrat, and at the same time exercises an intelligent and liberal view upon all the leading party questions. He is a member of Sotoyome Lodge, NO. 123, F.& A.M., of Healdsburg. From the marriage of Mr. and Mrs. Hill there are but two children living, viz.: Emily, who is living on the old homestead on the Russian River, and Jemima A. (sic), who married C.D. Yarbrough, and is now (1888) living at Guerneville.

Census records:

- 1860 James M. Hill, 49; Sarah Hill, wife, 48; J.G. Hill, son, 22; Emily Hill, dtr, 11. In same house: Davis C. Yarbrough, 29; J.A. Yarbrough, wife, 17; Mary E Yarbrough, dtr, 1; Sarah J. Yarbrough, dtr, 8/12.
- 1870 Sarah as head of household, living with Joshua G. and Emily C. Hill in the same house as Crockett D. and Jemimena Yarbrough with 5 children. Five households away is James M. Hill, 60.
- 1880 Sarah is listed as a widow living with Emily C. Hill in the house next to C.D. and J.A. Yarbrough and 8 children. However, James M. Hill is listed as living in across the Russian River in Forestville at that time.

In 1864 James and Sarah Hill were together, as Sonoma Co records show that on 1 Mar 1864 J.M. and S.H. Hill bought 160 acres in Analy Township from Jacob McReynolds and wife. This property would be listed as being in Forest-ville in the census. They were maintaining separate households by 1870. If they were divorced, Sonoma Co records have marriages of a James Hill and Nancy James Englehart Feb 3, 1866, a James Hill and Nettie Patterson June 28, 1877, and a James M. Hill and P.H. Boyes June 23, 1882. There is no proof that any of these James Hills were our James M. Hill. Family tradition is that James M. Hill had left Sarah and they were separated at the time of her death. They were re-united in McPeak's cemetery.

Emily C. Hill, b. 1848 in Mo.

The death date and burial place of Emily C. Hill are not known. She has been reported to be feeble minded because of a high fever in infancy, and never married.

JOSHUA GILMAN HILL 1838-1879

J.G. Hill was born in Missouri, and came west with his family in the early 1850's. He married Mary Ann Beach in Sonoma County on 7 Oct 1872. They had two daughters who died in infancy. Adele was born in Nov 1873 and died in June of 1875 at 18 months. Nora was born in Sept 1875 and lived only 7 months. Mary Ann died in April 1876, two weeks after Nora, which indicates they died in an epidemic. Joshua G. Hill was known as Sock and has been the subject of a family scandal that he was gunned down by a jealous husband. The Russian River Flag carried a story that he was shot down at a public meeting in Forestville by the brother of Miss Georgia Travis, whom he was courting after the death of his wife. John Litton told that his grandfather, Hamilton Litton, was with Sock the day that he was killed, and had earlier been in a duel with another man, and in the duel Hamilton Litton had been wounded by the other party. This is not in agreement with the account of the killing, which is given below.

While there were numerous witnesses to the fatal wounding of Sock , Wirt Travis was never brought to trial, and is listed in the 1910 census in Forestville. Joshua G. Hill, Mary Ann, Adele, and Nora are buried together at Mc-Peak's cemetery.

The Russian River Flag carried a story that J.G. Hill was killed over Miss Georgia Travis, and was buried from the Christian Church at Ridenauer's Cemetery. The name of the cemetery changed when the McPeaks bought the property. An account of the incident is given in a collection of famous Sonoma County murders.

Killing of J.G. Hill.- On Saturday evening, Nov. 8, 1879, the Blue Ribbon Club at Forestville met, as usual, in the hall of a building owned by the Santa Rosa Savings Bank, and occupied by Robert Weir and family. There were between sixty and seventy persons men, women and children - present, among whom were Miss Georgia Travis and her brother Wirt Travis. A short time before the regular exercises of the Club had commenced Mr. Hill and Samuel Keys came in together, and immediately thereafter Miss Travis rose and approached Wirt, who was sitting a short distance from her, and the two went out together. In about ten minutes Wirt returned, passed near where Hill was sitting, and resumed his original seat. which was in front of Hill, and about eight feet from him. Wirt had not more than comfortably seated himself when his brother John entered the room, and went to near where Hill was sitting, taking about the same course his brother had done before, and appeared to be about to take a seat, but instead of this he struck Hill in the face, reaching over the head of a Mr. Morris to get at Hill. Hill immediately sprang to his feet, and a slight scuffle occurred, in which Hill faced John Travis, with his back to Wirt, and while in this position he was shot, the ball striking him in the back of the head, passing through the skull, ranging the entire length of the head, and is supposed to have lodged somewhere in the bones of the face. In its course it severed the parotid artery, which produced sufficient hemorrhage to cause his death. After this three other shots were fired, but the testimony is confused; some say there were three, and others two. It is altogether probable that there were three fired, as one statement is to the effect that at the time Wirt Travis fired, Hill had a pistol presented at John Travis, and that when Wirt fired, Hill fell, and his pistol exploding, the ball ranged upward and struck the wall in front of him, about four inches below the ceiling. Opinions differ on this point, however, and but little evidence was presented to the Coroner's Jury that would substantiate this. John then fired, the ball passing harmlessly over the heads of those present, striking a chimney in the north-east corner of the room, and glancing, struck the partition and passed out of the room. Not a word was said by the parties during the entire melee. By this time a number of those present had rushed from the apartment, and were thronging the corridor and stairway. Wirt strode to the door, and turning as he reached the threshold, fired another shot, which, is supposed, is the one that struck Hamilton Litton, and then sprang over the

bannister, and, with his brother John, passed along unmolested toward their home, which is about three-quarters of a mile east of Forestville. [end of article]

Jamima Ann Hill Yarbrough's first name is spelled in a variety of ways: On her Marriage certificate it is Jamima (which is probably correct, and is the spelling used here.); 1870 census: Jemimena; 1880 census: Jamimena; headstone: Jemima; and on the death certificate it is Jemila. Creative spelling was rather common even among educated people in those days. She was known familiarly as Ann. Crockett's name is consistently spelled that way, except that it is Crockit on his headstone. This may be due to Jamima's creative spelling. He was probably known as Dave.

On the marriage certificate Crockett is listed as a resident of El Dorado County. Family lore is that he came to California after the Mexican War and then worked wagon trains from Missouri, and that one of those wagon trains brought the Hill family. Some descendants think he is descended from a sister of the famous Davy Crockett, and was named after his him. Davy Crockett had 3 sisters, Betsy b. 1790, Jane b. 1792 and Sally b. 1794. Perhaps one of these was Mary M. Davis's mother, but if so, it is not remembered by the Cowley County Kansas Yarbroughs, while they do believe Mary M. Davis may have been a cousin of Jefferson Davis.

There is a story that C.D. and J.A. first moved to Downieville where

their first child was born, but returned to the ranch before the second was born, and all the other children were born on what was then the Hill Ranch. They had fourteen children, seven who lived to adulthood. Death due to

epidemics were common, and in December of 1879 three of their children died. From the Russian River Flag, Jan 1, 1880:

Mr. Yarbrough's family, living above Korbel's Mill, has been sadly afflicted (diphtheria), six of his children have been sick, and three of them have died.

Two other children died of "black measles". There may be some confusion between Yarbrough children and the children of Joshua G. Hill, as they all lived on the same ranch.

Crockett and Jamima lived in the original homestead house with the Hills at least until 1870, and it is probable that Crockett was employed by Mr. and Mrs. Hill during that time. The Thompson Atlas of Sonoma County, 1878, reveals that the Yarbroughs had obtained the Isaacs homestead, and a house is shown about a quarter of a mile up the canyon from Westside road. There is an old house still standing in that location. The 1880 census has the Yarbrough family living in the next house from Mrs. Hill. The children went to the Lafayette School, which was about 3 miles away by road, but less than a mile if they went cross-country (through Hugh Porter's ranch, which was east of the Isaacs Homestead).

The Atlas also shows that by 1878 the railroad ran along the river road on the south side of the river with nearby stations at Forestville (actually not in the town, but near Mirabelle Park) and one at Hilton, which came to be known as the Korbel Station. The impetus for the railroad was lumber, and the redwood forests were exploited. Korbel, long known for champaign, began there as manufacturers of match boxes. They began growing wine grapes in the river bottom land at Hilton only after they had logged the giant redwoods that had grown there for centuries. I recall the massive stumps along there during the 1940's, but they have since been removed. The railroad brought other possibilities, one of which was the vacation resort business.

At some time, a resort was built somewhere up Isaacs Canyon, and it was known variously as the Isaacs Canyon resort and the Mt. Jackson resort. Whether the Yarbroughs had anything to do with this resort is not known.

Crockett and Jamima ran the ranch for years, living in a house above Hill's house for some time, but had moved into Guerneville by 1888, but probably returned when Sarah Hill died in 1894. Because Joshua was killed and Emily was feeble minded, Jamima probably inherited the homestead when James M. Hill died in 1895. The 1878 map of homesteads shows Joshua G. Hill having the property across the river from the original homestead as well as some land adjacent to the Hill homestead on the Healdsburg side. Jamima probably had these properties too. This should be investigated in Sonoma County land records.

Crockett died in a wagon accident when returning from taking a load of beets to Guerneville to market. It supposedly occurred near Hacienda Crossing. There was a rumor that he had been drinking (Violet Madiera), and Jamima was such a strong member of WCTU that she would not allow hops to be grown on the ranch, nor could any of her children work on other ranches if they grew hops. After Crockett's death in 1898, Jamima and children ran the ranch until some time after the turn of the century. About 1902 Jamima sold the ranch and used part of the money to fix up the family plot in McPeak's cemetery. She bestowed a large sum of money on each of her living children (perhaps \$1000 each). She then went to Guerneville and took a position of housekeeper for a man, and

raised his daughters until they were old enough to take care of themselves (Lois Noffsinger). Then feeling she was too old to work, she spent the remainder of her life living 3 months at a time with her daughters. She was very careful to avoid carrying tales from one family to another. She died in Redwood Township in 1918. She was the last of the family to be buried in McPeak's cemetery.

A Herbert C. Yarbrough of Richmond California signed the death certificate of Jamima Ann Yarbrough in 1918. Herbert C. Yarbrough has not been identified. Crockett had no nephew by that name, and their son who died of diphtheria was named Hubert C. Perhaps the signature was by Frederick Cleveland Yarbrough, who for reasons of his own chose to use that signature. Fred was living in Richmond in 1918, and may have had more names than we know.

NEWTON AND MOLLY YARBROUGH

Crockett's brother Newton Leonidas Yarbrough married Mary K. Stalter in Cowley County in 1875 where son Ernest E. was born in 1879 and son Charles Roy was born in 1886. Shortly after Wade Hampton Yarbrough died Newton and a friend, William Henry Howard, son of Abiga and Ann Howard who lived only three houses away in the 1880 census, went to San Diego, California, by train, and then worked their way up the coast to visit Crockett Davis Yarbrough on the Russian River in Sonoma County. They liked what they saw, so they returned to Cowley County to pack up and move there. Newton was there in time to register to vote on 2 Sept 1892. Young Howard married Virginia Josephine Yarbrough, a daughter of Crockett.

In the 1880 census of Richland Township of Cowley County, Newton L. Yarbrough's family is farming at house 18 while his parents, Wade Hampton and Mary M. Yarbrough, are in house 19.

Newton first appears in California in the Great Registry in 1892 as Newton Leonidas Yarbrough. In the 1910 census Newton L. Yarbrough, 60, born in Missouri, his father born in Kentucky and his mother in Tennessee; and that he is running a home farm, owned by himself. His wife is Mary L Yarbrough, 53 b. Ohio, and had two children. Interestingly enough, in the next two houses on Mines Road (now Armstrong Woods Road) live Crockett and Jamima's two oldest daughters: family 11: Albert P. Laughlin 53, Martha E Laughlin (w) 49 had 4 children, who are all listed; family 12: David B. Peugh 53, Mary E Peugh 51, had 3 children, none living with them then. John Litton told me that these old guys were really tough teamsters, meaning that they drove wagons drawn by a team of horses. In the winter and other times when no farming could be done, they hauled mercury ore from the mines to the railroad. Mercury ore is very heavy, and the roads were very poor. The mines were up Mines Road from where they lived. Newton lived in Guerneville for a long time and later moved to Pacific Grove. His wife was Mary, but she was called Molly, and was thought to be a bit crazy by the Howard children. She supposedly traced the family back to the Mayflower. They had a son named Roy, who supposedly lived "at the foot of Willits Hill between Ukiah and Booneville" (Violet Yarbrough Madiera). Ed Yarbrough told me that Molly was emotionally disturbed because she accidentally ran over one of her children when she was backing her car out of her driveway. I think this may have been a grandchild, because cars were uncommon when her children were young. A newspaper account of the first pedestrian killed by a car in Guerneville occurred in 1914, and the person who picked up the unfortunate child victim was one Roy Yarbrough, who took the child to a doctor's office nearby, but the child had already died. There is no mention of Molly, and the child was not related. In the time from 1906 to 1909, and perhaps earlier and later, Newton and Molly had a "bed and breakfast" vacation farm

described in a pamphlet in 1909 (also in 1906). This is described in a brochure entitled: VACATION 1909

"Yarbrough's, Guerneville. One mile from town; will meet guests. A valley farm, surrounded by mountains covered with evergreen trees such as redwoods, madrones, etc; plenty of shade and fruit, hammocks, croquet grounds, piano and other amusements, boating and bathing on Russian River; swings, daily mail and telephone. Open June 1st until October 1st. Can accommodate 30 in rooms and tents. Adults \$8.00, \$9.00 and \$10.00 per week. Address N.L.Yarbrough, Yarbrough Farm, Sonoma, Cal."

Newton and Molly were living in Pacific Grove in 1925 (Bonnie Yarbrough and Edwin Yarbrough).

THE HILL HOMESTEAD

The Hill ranch is shown in a map of Sonoma County Homesteads in 1880 to lie north of the Russian River, across the river from the from the present site of the Rio Dell area, approximately bounded on the west by a line drawn from the mouth of the Green Valley Creek directly north to Westside Road. This road is so named because the river runs south past Healdsburg, turning west before reaching this area, and the road runs on the west side of the river from Healdsburg. The river runs north-west past the homestead. The Westside road is nearly parallel to the river, a quarter of a mile north-east from the river at this point. The eastern boundary is a line directed north from the river near the junction of the intersection of the Old Trenton Road with the present River Road, just down-river from Mirabelle Park. The homestead was bounded on the north by an east-west line drawn from the west boundary to the east boundary. The southern boundary is the river itself. The homestead was principally bottom lands, subject to flooding, and the mouth of Isaacs canyon above the road, with hills on either side. The next section to the north was homesteaded by Isaacs. It is largely hill country, with an old road leading up to Mt. Jackson. The original Hill homestead was 137 acres, and the Isaacs was no more than 160 acres.

This ranch lies at the boundary of Mendocino and Russian River Townships. In Thompson's Atlas of Sonoma County 1878, The original Hill homestead is shown as being divided into three parts. The largest portion is in the west, and listed as the property of Mrs. Hill. About a third of the homestead is cut off in the south east section, about half of which is bottom land lying below the road, and the rest hill country above the road. The western half of this is identified as belonging to JGH, which is Joshua Gilman Hill, and the eastern half is then part of the H. Wall ranch. The Wall property is entirely in Mendocino township, and both of the Hill properties are in Redwood Township. The map shows no buildings below the road, which was farmland, but a house above the road is seen on the JGH property, and a house and orchard are indicated for Mrs. Hill's property, above the road in the small valley at the mouth of Isaacs Canyon.

In addition to the part of the old homestead, along the eastern edge of Mrs. Hill's property, J.G. Hill is shown on this map as owning 140 acres across the river, the site of the present Rio Dell, extending along the river over the entire southern border of the original Hill homestead. This property is probably part of the 160 acres which James M and Sarah H Hill bought in Analy Township from Jacob McReynolds and wife on March 1 1864. The 1878 map shows this property as being in Analy Township.

The 1878 map also shows C.D. Yarborough (sic) as the owner of the old Isaacs Homestead, abutting the Hill homestead to the north. There is a house shown which is probably the same house which today stands about a quarter of a mile up Isaacs canyon from the site of Mrs. Hill's house. The north-eastern corner of this property is divided from the rest by the township line.

In the History of Sonoma County, p. 161, "Glen Purnell Laughlin": The testimony of Mr. Laughlin is that his mother, Martha Yarbrough was born on Crockett Yarbrough's ranch, which was formerly the old hill ranch (hill not capitalized), which was later known as the Isaacs' Canyon Ranch, and yet later Mt. Jackson Ranch.

The original Hill homestead house was still standing in the 1920's, and is undoubtedly the house shown on the 1878 map on Mrs. Hill's property, at the mouth of Isaacs Canyon.

There is a mineral springs shown on the 1878 map, at the eastern edge of the dividing line between Mrs. Hill's and C.D. Yarbrough's properties. John Litton told me that this is on the top of a hill on the eastern side of the canyon, and he remembers remnants of a resort which once was built there to take advantage of the mineral springs as a health spa. This may have been part of the original Isaacs Canyon Resort, but surely was not part of the Mt. Jackson Resort, which operated well after 1923 according to Mrs. Nase. Around 1980 John Litton made a trip up there, finding the stage road filled with scotch broom, and a rose bush the only sign there had ever been people living there.

Some time after the death of J.G. Hill in 1879, his property came into the hands of Hamilton Litton, which he retained until the death of his wife Sara Jane Yarbrough Litton in 1922.

At some time there was a road from Isaacs canyon down to the river where there was a bridge near the mouth of Green Valley Creek. This bridge served the old Mt. Jackson resort, making a shorter run to the Forestville railroad station. The road split the property, and both the road and bridge were purchased by Hamilton and Roy Litton about 1920. Within a year the old bridge was destroyed by a flood. [John Litton]

Hamilton appears to have sold the strip adjacent to the old Hill ranch to his son Perry Litton. After Sara Jane's death, Hamilton sold most of the property above the railroad to a development company which almost went bank-rupt developing Rio Dell. He kept a small portion of that property, running up a canyon on one edge, and built a small house and raised a garden. When the first heavy rains came and the river flooded, the canyon was filled and the house flooded up to the mantle. His car was garaged under the house, and was completely submerged. The family built him a getaway house further up the hill to take care of future problems, but when they occurred, Hamilton was stranded for several days in his escape house.

Hamilton retained some of the river frontage below the railroad tracks as he had a joint venture selling gravel with his son Roy, who also owned the old Wall ranch shown on the 1878 map adjacent to J.G. Hill's west side property.

Some time ago I decided to write a history about the family that would link our direct line with the original immigrant to America. It seemed to be a simple straightforward project but it soon became more time consuming than I ever dreamed imaginable. The major problem stems from the fact that many of the earliest and most crucial court records were unfortunately lost or destroyed so alternative methods had to be utilized. Eventually I came to the realization that I had to become knowledgable about all branches of the Yarborough family if there was any hope of overcoming the obstacles I encountered in tracing my personal line. That also implies being acquainted with their friends, their neighbors, as well as allied families who were linked by marriages. This could only be accomplished by tracking down personal family records such as bibles, letters, wills, deeds or by reviewing published genealogies, parish records etc. It is a painfully slow process that will test one's patience and resolve but from these documents there gradually emerges vital information on family members, their births, marriages, deaths and even migratory patterns as well as a host of other information. Fortunately I have not only the interest but the determination to complete the job because of the importance I attach to family. I cannot help but feel that when we come to the end of the road the last thing we hold dear is the memory of those we truly cherish. We have a rich heritage and that appreciation has only been strengthened as I become more aware of the struggles, the sacrifices, and contributions made by our ancestors. Perhaps it will also be an inspiration to you.

The enclosed material is a brief summary and documentation of nine generations from John and Verer Yarborough in the 1760's to my grandchildren in 1986. The final pages will present an overview of what is generally known of the Yarboroughs in Europe from 850 AD to the time the immigrants landed in the 1600's. I discuss some general views held by family genealogists with regard to the early Yarborough families as well as my reservations. Finally, I present some exciting clues which may eventually link us with our immigrant. Since it may take years to complete the task I decided to pause in midstream and prepare this booklet. The final product will be handled professionally but at this point I felt it more important to get some basic information on paper. If events should prevent me from completing the project, others could pick up from here. Perhaps it will even reach those who can supply the vital information we need. In any event you can be sure that it is a work of love that I want to share with the family because I feel truly fortunate just to have been a part of the Yarborough family.

I want to express my appreciation to all the individuals who through their research or personal involvement have enabled me to put together this family history. It was their encouragement that enabled me to overcome many frustrations and disappointments. You have my deepest gratitude. I might also say that I invite your participation as well as your constructive criticism so Anything you could do to enhance the final product would be greatly appreciated. Best wishes always.

Lelia Mae Yarborough was born on August 7, 1899 in Gray's Creek near Fayetteville in Cumberland County, N.C. The following year her parents purchased app. 1,000 acres of a nearby plantation called "Midway Farms". It was here that Franklin Curtis Yarborough and his wife Romelia raised eight children. There were five boys and three girls with Lelia Mae, my mother, being the youngest daughter. Raising a large family is never an easy chore but then again neither was life on a farm. It takes a lot of hard work and dedication but they managed to do it successfully. Romelia assumed the responsibility of the children and the home while Franklin worked the farm. Before long they had established themselves as a prominent family and Franklin was recognized as one of the most progressive farmers in the area. His positive approach made him a respected leader and he went on to serve as Commissioner for Cumberland County where he was known for his support of education.

In spite of their success, there were many difficult moments but the Yarboroughs were not ones to complain. On one occasion my father asked Franklin what he was going to do if the drought killed his crops. He simply said he would do the best he could and try again next year. This positive flow of energy created the sense of confidence that permeated the very core of this family. At an early age the children learned to work hard and to take on responsibility. My mother was proud of the fact she could earn ten cents a day working in the cotton field. It not only gave her a sense of accomplishment but it enabled her to feel that she could meet life on its own terms and win. The day came when she eagerly embarked upon the biggest challenge of her life as she went off to Caroline College where she majored in music and became an accomplished pianist.

The Yarboroughs were truly blessed with many talents. As a family they are intelligent and yet very much down to earth. They are determined, persistant, and resourceful but they are also generous and compassionate. My father truly enjoyed another unique quality that he often referred to as that "Yarborough Sense of Humor". Just being present at a gathering of my aunts and uncles was a unique experience. Their laughter was absolutely contagious as they traded humorous stories and practical jokes pulled on one another. They truly enjoyed life as well as their family and that is a heritage for which I shall always be grateful.

Over the years the Yarboroughs have provided me with many special moments but the memories I cherish most will always be of the woman I knew as " Mom ". She was a devoted wife and mother who had a way of making the best of the most difficult of circumstances. She made my clothes, helped me through college, and handled the responsibilities of a minister's wife with grace and dignity. Her greatest pleasure was working in the garden in the midst of her flowers. She had always taught me how to live but in her struggle with cancer she taught me how to die. In her final visit home she visited with family and friends. Then it was on to the church of her childhood, the family cemetery, and finally the the old mill pond where I listened as she relived those special memories. As she spoke I could think only of how fortunate I was to have this remarkable woman for a mother. It is to her memory that I dedicate this book on the Yarborough family.

SUMMARY

- 1. On Nov. 3, 1852, Malcolm Murchison J.P. came to the home of the widow to take application since she was nearly 100 years of age. Under oath she stated that she was the widow of John Yarborough who joined the militia in Wake County N.C. where he was a resident. She thought he served about 3 months under Capt. McDaniel and fought in the battle of Black Water Bridge on the Cape Fear River near the town of Fayetteville, N.C. After he returned from war they married in Wake County N.C. on Jan. 12, 1777 where they lived for two years before moving to Montgomery County N.C. in 1779. They remained there until his death on Sept. 9, 1822. (Note: Date on tombstone was 1821 even though approximate dates of 1819 and 1822 have been mentioned elsewhere). She never remarried and when Montgomery County appropisted a small sum for her support they advised her that as widow of John Yarborough she was eligible for his pension since March 4, 1836. Signed Jeanna x Yarborough
- 2. Fanry Yarborough states under oath that he is the son of John and Joanna and is now 53 years of age. He often heard his father speak of serving in the Revolutionary War under Capt. McDaniel and the battle at Black River Bridge. He understood that he was discharged after some three months of service. His father died Sept. 19, 1822 leaving his mother Joanna as widow. Signed 11.3.1052 Henry Yarboro
- 3. Malcolm Gillis also stated on Nov. 3, 1052 that he was well acquainted with John Yarborough for more than 20 years prior to his death. Joanna was his widow and they had 5 children. (Note: Evidently referred to living children because Joanna and henry later named 10). He named Henry Yarboro as a man of good character and indicated that Joanna was in need of assistance. Signed Malcolm x Gillis
- 4. On June 28, 1853 Joanna appears before James Batten, Magistrate and repeated her story but said she had no documentary evidence of proof of his service nor proof of their marriage. She then said that John died Sept. 9, 1819 in Montgomery Jounty F.C. and she remained a widow.
- 5. Sara McCaskill appeared on the same day and stated she was about 60 years of age, raised in Montgomery County and had known John and Joanna as man and wife for 50 years. They lived together with great satisfaction raising a large family of children understood to be born in lawful wedlock. Signed Sara x McCaskill
- 6. Malcolm Gillis states on June 28, 1853 that he was about 77 years of age, was born and raised in Montgomery County and knew John for some 30 years as a good neighbor before he died. He always heard that John served in the U.S. Army for 6 or 12 months and believes that he was honorably dischared. John was reputed to have married Joanna Chambers and had a number of children in lawful wedlock, several of whom are now living and whom he knows well. Joanna remained a widow and is reputed to be about 100 years of age and resides with her children about 4 miles from affiant and is supported by 2 unmarried daughters. Signed Malcolm x Gillis

- 7. On Dec. 8, 1852 Mr. James Mendenhall of Jamestown in Guilford County, N.C had written Mr. J. E. Heath, Commissioner of Pensions sending the claim of Joanna Yarborough for processing and indicated that she was very aged and afflicated in body. On July 20, 1853, he followed up with a letter to J.P. Waldo indicating that he had done what he could to satisfy his request that John and Joanna marriage and service claims be more fully proved. He again stated that there was no doubt he was in the war and Joanna was in need of the pension to which she was entitled. In referred to Malcolm Gillis and Sarah McCaskill he stated that these aged and respectable people bear proof of Joanna's entitlement.
- 8. On January 11, 1854, George C. Mendenhall, father of James, wrote an impatient letter to Mr. Waldo stating his response to his son on Sept. 14, 1853 was unsatisfactory. You claim that the claimant only alledges 3 months service but her words say she was unable to state the exact time but now believes he served more than 3 months, that he served some years. Malcolm Gillis, a respectable and worthy old man testified he was sure he had served more than 6 months and he thinks more than 12 months and understood he was honorably discharged. He begred them to reconsider. He also pointed out that the evidence on file was so strong that it would not only establish their marriage but be sufficient to recover in a Court of Justice in North Carolina. The claim is good but must have been overlooked in the process of business. Flease answer to this office—hon. John Kerr is our Representative in Congress. Signed George C. Mendenhall.
- 9. George Mendennall also refers to another letter from Mr. Waldo written May 17, 1853 where waldo says that John Yarborough's service is not sufficiently proved, that there is no evidence to time and place of marriage to Joanna nor of his death. Hendenhall says that testimony of witnesses established the evidence as far as can be in any human tribunal— for surely it is not to be expected that after 3/4 of a century we are to bring persons who actually served with him. This lady is very aged with two aged and almost helpless single daughters with her. I earnestly ask that the claim receive early attention and be allowed. Signed G. C. M.
- 10. On April 28, 1854 Mm. J. Clarke, Comptroller State N.C. verifies that John Yarborough received payment designated as Vol.C entry 1429 and 2092. Also in Book No 3 pg. 38 and Book 10 p. 43. Mr. George Mendenhall writes Mr. Waldo and sends proof which he hopes is satisfactory so that poor old John, his widow, who is now in sight of the very last mile of life will draw her pension. He points out that John could not have made that much money as a soldier unless he served long enough to entitle his widow to the pension unless the government paid better then than it does now. I hope by early mail to be notified that this old lady is placed on Pension Roll and to draw from 1836. Signed George C. Lendenhall.
- 11. On May 25, 1854, an affidavit was received from hr. John McLeod of Moore County, N.C. who appeared before Willis L. Dowd, acting J.F. for Moore County. He indicated that he was a citizen of Moore Cty. and under oath states he is 85 years of age next August and that he formerly lived in Contgomery Cty. N.C. He stated he knew John Yarborough and his wife Joanna well, as long as 55 or 56 years and they were well understood to be man and wife lawfully married. He is informed and believes that John was a Revolutionary soldier. Signed 3 John Cobeod.

- 12. On May 17, 1856, Mr. John D. Spoon of Guilford County, N.C. under oath stated that he was well acquainted with John Yarborough in Montgomery County N.C. about 50 years ago and he died leaving his widow Joanna. Everyone understood he had served in the Revolutionary War and he was considered a man of character and truth. This affiant is not old enough to know anything about his services but he is satisfied that he served in the war with Great Britain just as General George Washington had. He had many acquaintances in various counties in the region but he never heard of any other John Yarborough being a Revolutionary soldier other than the husband of Joanna. He died some 35 years or more thence and that John and Joanna lived as man and wife. All his children were understood to have been in lawful wedlock. Signed-John D Spoon.
- 13. On August 28, 1856, Henry H. Yarborough made the following statement: He was a resident of Montgomery County, M.C. and by law was responsible for obtaining for himself and his brothers and sisters, the children and heirs of Joanna Yarborough, deceased, the arrearages of pension money due under Act of Congress passed July 7, 1838 as their mother was entitled being widow of John Yarborough. He said the applied first under the Act of 1836 but it should have been under the Act of 1838. She had stated before James Batten, Acting J.r. Montgomery County, S.C. that she was the widow of John Yarborough late or said county who died Sept. 9, 1819 where he resided. She married him shortly after the close of the Revolutionary War but could not remember frecise date being nearly 100 years old. He was a private Soldier who served under Copt. McDaniel but she had no documents for evidence as to when he joined or was discharged nor for their marriage. Henry said he really believes the Leclaration of his mother to be correct and true. He often heard his father tell of being in the kevolution and spoke of Black Water Bridge Battle on the Cape Fear River below Fayetteville. He shot 3 rounds with his musket and was never wounded but a number were killed. He spoke of fighting against Archibald Clark who was among the Tories and saw that he was shot through the body. His sister Sarah Clark went and nursed him bringing him home where he lived many years. Henry knew Sarah Clark well because she lived in Fontgomety Cty. many years near his father before moving to Moore County where she died about 10 years thence. He heard her speak of going after her wounded brother Archibald Clark to the battleground but he has been dead many years. Henry understood his parents were married in wake County, N.C. and it was from Wake that his father volunteered prior to getting married. He had procured counsel to find a marriage license bond but there was none found. There was also no evidence he had to prove his service or his discharge. but it was well known he was in the Army as a soldier in the Revolutionary War. All the old men who had knowledge of his service are dead. He had never heard of any other John Yurborough being in the War and the records in kaleigh confirm payment for his service. It was forwarded to the Department for his mother, henry also declared that his mother Joanna died in this county on March 29, 1854. She left the following children: **John, William, Mary, Henry h., Joel, Fanny, Betsy (Slizabeth) , Larkin, Wilson, Sally. The last 3 had left the state many years since and had not been heard from and supposed to be dead. John had died tefore his mother. Henry declared he understood his father was in the Army several months perhaps 6 months or better. Joanna remained a widow from the death of his father to her death. Signed - henry Yarbrough before Nathaniel Enight, Clerk of Superior Court, Fontgomery Cty. H.C.

- 14. On August 28, 1856, John Morrison under oath states he was born on December 11, 1786 in Moore County, N.C. where he still resides near the Montgomery County line. He knew John Yarborough from his earliest recollection in life being his neighbor. He said John died in 1819 and he always understood him to be a Revolutionary. War soldier and that he served at least several months. He also knew Archibald Clark and his sister Sarah while they lived. Archibald was understood to be an invalid from a ball shot through him in a battle afterwhich Sarah brought him home. Affiant knew John Yarborough and Joanna to live as man and wife for near 30 years and Joanna remained a widow until her death in 1854. They had the following children all of whom are understood to be born in lawful wedlock: William, Mary, Henry H., Fanny, Betsy, Joel who are now living and Larkin, John, Wilson, and Sally who are supposed to be dead. John and Joanna came from about Raleich in Wake County to Montgomery and said that they were both respectable persons. He would feel bound to believe any of their statements and Henry h. Yarborough is also a man of good standing and respectability and entitled to be believed. He nover knew or heard of any other John Yarborough except his son who is dead. It was well understood that old John served in the War but all the old people in that section of the country are dead who could have had that knowledge. Signed - John Morison Mathaniel Enight, Clerk.
- 15. On August 30, 1856, George C. Mendenhall of Jamestown, Guilford Sty., 5.3. wrote Hon. J. Minot enclosing the beclaration of Leary h. Tarberough, one of the children of Joanen farboro who filed for lension of her late husband, John Marborough in 1813. Further proof had been requested of the marriage and service. In Jamusty, 1814, proof of payment for services were forwarded and signed by Wm. J. Clarke, Comptroller. In May 1854, an affidavit of John Molecod was procured and MISLAID as to marriage but now forwarded. In May 1856, an affidavit of John Spoon was also taken which I now forward. Since he lives 60 or 70 miles from henry H. Yarboro, he did not know of his mother's death for some time after. It seems impossible to get any further proof. There was NO OTHEM John Yarboro in this country and if the evidence of payments by the government is not sufficient then they have grown grey in supporting their helpless mother until she died. I would add that few if any men in N.C. who served as privates in the War can be identified with judgements made to them more than this John Yarborough he being the only one paid by that name in North Carolina. Signed George C. Hendenhall
- 16. Morman records indicate that Pension was refused.

SUMMARY - R 11923

John Yarborough and Joanna Chambers, residents of Wake County, R.C. married Jan. 12, 1777 after he arrived home from the War. In 1779, they moved to Hontgomery County, R.C. where he died on Sept. 9, 1821 and she died on March 29, 1854. They had the following children: John, William, Hary, Henry H., Joel, Fanny, Elizabeth, Wilson, barkin, and Sally. John died early and Wilson, Larkin and Sally left the state. Their neighbors and good friends included Halcolm Gillis, John Spoons, Sarah McCaskill, John Horrison and John McLeod.





Macedonia Church Renewed, Read

Worshippers Returning

CANDOR — After nearly 30 years of inactivity, the Macedonia Church now is renewed and ready for worshippers.

The church has stood on a hill near Candor since 1804. An unaffiliated church, it became Presbyterian in 1832, and the original building was destroyed by fire some time later. The date of the fire and the consequent rebuilding are unknown; but unofficial historians gives the current structure was put up in the 185%. the 1850s.

It was apparently remodeled about 1900 and used until 1952, when a new church was built several hundred yards away. During its 2x-year hatus, the old church was used to house soldiers on maneuvers and once stored.

Under the Rev. Donald Hardman's urring to repair the church of destroy it. Ted Chisholm beguns find adding driverthebreastical in the repaired church.

Chisholm was one of several members who could remember worshipping in the old church. He figured that a lot of people might be as sentimental about it as he is. When some issue of what to do with the old building arose at a church meeting in the summer of 1979, Chisholm said he was told \$3-5,000 would be needed to save the church.

Two months later. Chisholm said, he had Two months later, Chisholm said, he had pledges for over \$4,000. "The people just did respond," Chisholm said. "Nobody said they wanted the church to come down. Some said they couldn't give now, but nobody said they wanted the church to come down."

So Chisholm and a crew of volunteers went to work. A new roof was added, the building was painted inside and out and a new wooden floor was laid over the old floor.

The pine doors presented a special challenge. Regred together, they had been left exposed to the elements. To refinish them Hardman and Chisholm took the doors apar. The work to the church included a new stoop for the front to help protect the doors. Chisholm: 3 75-year-old; retired farmer, wanted the church to be like he remembered it from his youth. The wood floor looks the same, broken window panes were replaced and hooks that held sheets that served as room dividers still adorn the walls. The potbellied stove, of uncertain age, was cleaned and polished. It is doubtful the stove will be used again because of the chance of catching used again because of the chance of catching the building on fire.

the building on fire.

Gas lamps have been replaced by electric ones, but the pulpit, the pews and two chairs behind the pulpit date from the 'old church. Many of the original pews began reappearing as the renoration was underway. Chistologicald, Some people brought them from these horse, while others were found in the new church building. All were in use when the church was vacated in 1852.

Most of the labor was unpaid. Chishological or the labor was unpaid.

Most of the labor was unpaid, Chisholm-said, and the floor was put in at cost by the husband of a former church member.

Chisholm and other volunteers worked long hours at the building. "He (Chisholm) and Curtis (Martin, another church member) worked out there day in and day out," Hard, man recalled.

The church bears a strong physical resemblance to what was there before, but some parts of church life in the past century are gone. In the church's early days, it had two doors—one for the men and one for the women. The two axees as a nagrostic day. en. The two sexes sat on opposite sides, while

their slaves sat in the back. Early church records are filled with accounts of members called before the church elders for conduct unbecoming a Christian.



Maccolonia Presbyterian Church became the parent church to a Presbyterian church in Candor in 1921 and one in Biscoe in 1928. Chisholm also carned praise from a man who came to Montgomery County to find his families' history. He found his ancestors buried in the churchyard and wrote Chisholm telling him what a thrill it had been to stand on the had worshipped there.

"People can come here and spend a little time here and it feels like home." Chisholm said.



The 1804 church on a bill near Candor looks pristine on a clear day, freshly renovated and beckoning worshippers to its doors. The church has a potbelly stove to keep churchgoers warm in the winter as they sit on simple pews. A cemetery out front serves as a reminder of past members and in the distance is the congregation's newer church.

Members of the Yarborough Family worshipped at Macedonia Church. Henry and Nancy Murchison Yarborough are buried just in front of the building. They were parents of Benjamin Franklin Yarborough and grandparents of Franklin Curtis Yarborough. Henry was grandson of John and Verer Yarborough of Wake County, N.C. in 1760's. Franklin Curtis Yarborough was baptized in this building on July 21, 1860. The church is in excellent condition. (1986).

Note: The Yarboroughs and Blakes were adjoining neighbors. Sarah Jane Blake is listed as age 7 and Benjamin Yarborough age 17. Ten years later they became man and wife.

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Benjamin Franklin Yarbrough married Sarah Jane Blake on Jan. 28, 1860 in Montgomery County, N.C. Bondsman and witness was William P. Yarbrough, his brother. On May 4, 1861 they had a son named Franklin Curtis Yarbrough. On July 16, 1862, Benjamin joined the Conferenate Army and was never seen again.

Battle of Antietam



Bloody Lane

The Battle of Antietam was fought Sept. 17, 1862, from 6 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. over 12 square miles in woods and cornfields and on roads and bridges in the Maryland countryside.

At 6 a.m., Sept. 17. Lee and his small band of soldiers turned and offered battle in an open field located about a mile north of Sharpsburg. The Union Army's 1st Corps pushed the Confederates back before finally being repulsed themselves.

The second attack by the Federals under the command of General Mansfield took place an hour and a half later. The Confederate divisions of General Hood and General Jubal Early were penetrated and the Dunkard church, an important strategic locale, was captured. Losses to both sides had been great and Mansfield was killed.

General Sumner's 2nd Corps had arrived on the scene at 10:30. Although his corps consisted of three divisions, only one was present when Sumner decided to attack the Southern division commanded by General McLaws. Attacking the left flank of the 2nd Corps, the Confederates had trapped Sumner's men in a pocket and more than 2,000 Union soldiers fell in a matter of minutes.

The focal point of the fourth Union assault centered around a sunken road situated about a mile northeast of Sharpsburg. After the war, this road

was referred to as "Bloody Lane." The two remaining divisions of Sumner's 2nd Corps slowly fought their way into a position from where they could fire at will along the sunken road which the rebel division, commanded by General Daniel Hill, was using.

The Confederate troops had become sitting ducks being picked off at random by Union riflemen.

The fifth and final Union offensive began along the banks of Antietam Creek. Union troops were having no luck in crossing Antietam Creek in the face of rebel gunfire on the opposite side. It wasn't until 3:30 that Burnside's 9th Corps, consisting of four divisions, successfully crossed the creek at what is known today as Burnside's Bridge. The reason for the relatively easy crossing was that most of the Confederates guarding the creek had been recalled to participate in other defenses.

Burnside's corps.easily broke through the thin line of southern resistance leaving no opposition to his advances.

Many were the times that the Federals could have beaten the Confederates, but the unplanned, uncoordinated assaults had wasted too much time. The last of Lee's four divisions had now arrived on the scene from Harper's Ferry. Led by General Ambrose Hill, his Light Division had marched 17 miles that day and succeeded in forcing the

Union troops back to Antietam Creek. The Battle of Antietam was over.

Although urged to retreat, Lee refused. The following day, the Confederate Army remained even though 10,000 additional Union troops had arrived.

Historians give the victory of the Battle of Antietam to the North for stopping Lee's advance into Maryland but actually neither side won. Lee's Army was never driven from Maryland, they retreated when they were ready. And the losses to both sides were staggering. The South lost 10,700 men including 11 generals, the North 12,400 men, 9 of them generals. The Battle of Antietam, or as it was known in the north, the Battle of Sharpsburg, was the deadliest day of the Civil War.

The park includes a tour route with interpretative signs and tapes. A visitor center houses a 134-seat theatre featuring a 26-minute film about the battle; an audiovisual slide program; Battle of Antietam oil paintings by Capt. James Hope, an eyewitness; historic Civil War objects and exhibits; a 900-volume library; research files; photos; and a sales desk featuring Civil War books, slides, postcards and other merchandise.

The Antietam National Battlefield is located one mile north of Sharpsburg along Md. 65, 10 miles south of Hagerstown.

Salamone Funeral Home in Frederick, Maryland applies for permit on August 18, 1977 but permission was denied. Our family had to bring a suit against the City of Richmond. We all ove a real debt of gratitude to Mr. Leroy Moran, a lawyer from Roanoke, Va., who personally took on a staff of Richmond lawyers and pleaded our case brilliantly. Judge Cole recognized that our cause was fair and just causing no financial burden to Richmond and he granted us permission. It took two years to clear the obstacles but on August 10, 1979, Benjamin Franklin Yarborough was taken from Oakwood Cemetery in Richmond, Va. and brought back home to be placed next to his wife Sarah and his only son, Franklin Curtis Yarborough at Marvin Methodist Church in Gray's Creek, N.C. It was a beautiful warm sunny afternoon as members, friends, and descendants of Benjamin stood proudly as his casket was placed in proper position and given a proper burial. man ever received a more glorious homecoming. Justice and desency had ultimately prevailed in a way that crossed all generational barriers and that says something about the meaning of family. The Yarboroughs were united in this effort and I know that Benjamin and Sarah Jane Blake Yarborough are immensely proud of this achievement. 

· 'Detective' ds Search Here

Times-Dispatch Staff Writer Marryon Exy Benjamin Pranklin Yarborough was 34 years old, with a wife and a year-old son, when he left N.C., on July 18, 1862. He joined Company A, 14th North Carolina Infantry Regiment of the Confederate army.

His family never heard from him again. Neither his wife nor

his son ever learned what happened to him.

Indeed, what happened to Yarborough after he left home on that surppoer day more than a century ago remained a mystery to generations of his family.

Each generation that visited the family grave site in Gray's Creek could see his grave, next to those of his wife, his son and his son's wife. Yarborough's grave was empty, waiting for him.

The soldier, it had been assumed, was killed in the Civil War. But no notification had ever been received, no records seen and no body found.

IN APRIL 1977, Curtis Bowen took his parents home to Gray's Creek. They then lived in Baltimore and had not been back in 15 years. His father was old and not moving well any longer. His mother had thyroid cancer and was soon to die. They would not get another chance.

Once there, of course, they visited the cemetery, which was on

land donated by the family.

Bowen and others in the Yarborough family saw the grave of Benjamin Franklin Yarborough, his great-grandfather who had disappeared nearly 115 years before. They talked of the countless searches, all unsuccessful, for information about

With that in mind, Bowen asked if he could go through the family's old papers, which had been stored in a trunk and virtually forgotten.

He found a letter written in August 1891 - more than 29 years after the soldier left home — by a son of a friend of Yarborough's widow. The letter offered some information to Sarah Blake Yar-

HER HUSBAND, the letter writer had said, had been reported to have been near Winchester, Va., hundred of miles north of her home. Apparently he was killed there.

There wasn't much more for Bowen to go on. Returning to his home in Frederick, Md., he stopped in Winchester to talk to a friend about the missing soldier. The friend couldn't help. But he gave him the name of a Winchester historian who might be able

Bowen returned a few weeks later.

In desperation, Bowen went to the National Archives in Washington. He spent several hours going through microfilmed records.

Yarborough, the records showed, had survived the Battle of Antietam. But two weeks later, after Lee's Army of Northern Virginia had retreated into Virginia, Yarborough contracted typhoid fever.

The company commander's report listed Yarborough as absent from duty for health reasons. He was believed to have been sent to a Winchester hospital.

But a later report indicated that Yarborough had been sent by train to St. Charles Hospital in Richmond.

The hospital is long since gone, but records confirmed that Yarborough was admitted Oct. 3, 1862. He died (1806 typhoid and acute dysentery, according to a report from the medical director's office.

BUT THERE WAS NO INDICATION of what happened to the

Logically, Bowen assumed, he would have been buried in Richmond, probably with other war dead. He checked the archives here for cemeteries containing Civil War dead. Then he checked the records of two cemeteries without finding any help.

The historian said there had been no major battles in Winchester shortly after the time Yarborough enlisted. But he suggested that, if Yarborough had entered the Confederate army in mid-July 1862, he may well have been involved two months later in the Battle of Antietam, fought just inside the Maryland line near Sharpsburg.

That bathle, the bloodiest day in the war, resulted in about 23,-000 casualties. It also marked Gen. Robert E. Lee's first setback

in Northern territory.

The historian suggested that Bowen try the library at the Antietam National Battlefield Site Center.

BOWEN DID, and learned that the 14th North Carolina fought at what was called Bloody Lane. The ominous name was wellearned. Half of the regiment was killed or wounded there repelling Union attacks.

Bowen checked local cemeteries. The graves of men from the 14th North Carolina were plentiful. But none had Yarborough's name. Of course, many from the regiment had been buried together, without names on the makers.

There was no way to tell.

In the records of the third, Oakwood Cemetery, he learned that a B. F. Yarborough of Company A, 14th North Carolina, was buried in the cemetery.

To be sure that he had found the correct man, Bowen went to North Carolina to check the state's archives. Only one B.F. Yarborough, he found, had ever served in the 14th North Carolina. In fact, only one B. F. Yarborough from the state had ever served in the Confederate army."

Bowen found another tidbit of identifying information, written by hand in the margin of a page. Mrs. Yarborough had received a small pension in the 1890s, 30 years or more after her husband died.

Whether he will be -- or even whether he can be -- is a matter that will have to be decided in Richmond Circuit Court. Richmond has said it will need a court order before it will exhiume the

In fact, the city is not sure the body can be found or exhumed. It has no records on whether Yarborough's body was buried in a casket or just put in the ground, buried alone or with others.


Bowen and seven others in the family - five of Yarborough's grandchildren and three great-grandchildren — went to Richmond Chrcuit Judge Marvin F. Cole Friday for the order. Cole said he will issue it if the family's lawyer can prove he has the legal authority to do so and if "probing" devices can prove that the body can be found and removed.

"We're a close-knit family," said one of the great-grandchildren, Norma B. Moran, whose husband, Roanoke lawyer Leroy Moran, is handling the court work.

The family, she said, knows how her brother, Curtis, felt as he did the detective work that led to finding how Yarborough died.

"He just sensed what it must have been like [for Yarborough] to be lying there in that hospital bed, dying and having no way to tell his family where he was or what was happening to him. ...

"We all just want to bring him home where we think he belongs."

The family was now truly reunited in every sense of the word.





- 1. Benjamin Yarborough joined the Confederate Army (14 th Regiment Co. A North Carolina) on July 16, 1862 leaving a wife and a year old son. His family never heard from him again.
- 2. General Lee was preparing his Northern invasion and within weeks Benjamin march into Maryland. On Sept. 17, he found himself on the outskirts of a little town called Sharpsburg. The stage was set and the Battle of Antietam was about to begin.
- 3. The cannons roared and Benjamin found himself in a sunken road that is now known as Bloody Lane. All morning they fought repelling Union attacks while his comrades lay 4 and 5 deep. It was a nightmare, an experience that must have had a very humbling effect. Half of his regiment had been killed or wounded. He had witnessed a battle that claimed 25,000 men, the bloodiest day of the war.
- 4. General Lee's Army retreats toward the Shenodoah Valley. Weeks of inadequate supplies takes its toll. Benjamin becomes ill and is sent to a hospital near winchester, Va. His illness is diagnosed as Typhoid Pever and he is put on a train and sent to St. Charles Hospital in Richmond, Va. on Oct. 3, 1862.
- 5. On Nov. 10, 1862, Benjamin Yarborough dies. His family was never notified.
- 6. Years go by while his wife Sarah searches in vain. Finally in 1891 she receives word from a family friend that Benjamin was believed to have died in a battle near Winchester, Va. This was the letter Curtis Bowen found in the family trunk on a visit to North Carolina in April, 1977.
- 7. On his return home he stopped in Winchester and asked a friend who was considered to be the most knowledgeable man in the area on the Civil War. He recommended Dr. Quarrels who was an educator, author and historian. In addition he was well known for originating the Apple Blossom Festivle held annually in Winchester.
- 8. An appointment with Dr. Quarrels rules out the possibility of a battle in Winchester in 1862 because there was none. He suggested that if Benjamin joined the 14 th Reg. in July 1862, the time frame would indicate that he would have been involved in the Battle of Antietam 8 weeks later. He told me to check the library at Antietam to see if the 14 th Reg. was involved and if no luck go to the National Archives in Washington for military records.
- 9. The library at Antietam pinpointed the exact spot where the 14 th Reg fought.
 A marker now stands at that location.
- 10. A check of the local cemetery at Sharpsburg indicated that many of the dead were from the 14 th Reg. but no name was found for Benjamin Yarborough. There was a section that contained 1200 unknown soldiers. Perhaps Benjamin was there?
- 11. A trip was made to the National Archives in Washington D.C.. A day of searching enabled me to come up with some valuable information. His military showed that he had in fact survived Antietam, became ill with Typhoid 2 weeks later and sent to Richmond where he died. No records however indicated where he was buried.
- 12. A trip to Richmond (State Archives) enabled me to get the names of cemeteries in the area that had Confederate dead. A systematic check of these cemeteries enabled me to come up with records showing that a B.F. Yarborough was buried in Division B Row L Lot 46 in Oakwood Cemetery. He was a member of 14 th Reg Co A N.C. and buried Nov. 11, 1862, but the remote possibility existed that their might have been another B.F. Yarborough in the same company.
- 13. A trip to the State Archives in Raleigh, N.C. showed that indeed there were two other Yarboroughs in that legiment but their names were Samuel and William. Recently I found that they were Benjamin's brothers who joined with him the same day. Samuel died in the war but William survived even though he had been wounded. After returning to his unit he was later taken prisoner in a battle near Petersburg, Va.
- 14. A furthur check of the records showed that there were 54 Yarboroughs to serve from the State of North Carolina. Only two had the first initial of B. One was Bailey A. Yarborough and the other was Benjamin F. Yarborough. This proved beyond a shadow of a doubt that we had the right man.
- 15. The family was informed and a question was asked if there would be any objection to our bringing him home. The family stood united in our effort to do so.


- 16. An appeal was made to Mr. Conway, Superintendent of Cemeteries, to allow us to proceed. He indicated that if we presented the necessary documents signed by all members of the family he would consider the request. The necessary papers were presented.
- 17. Mr. Conway suddenly reverses his position and refuses to grant us permission. He cited several reasons for his refusal some of which are listed below.
 - A. A disterment of this nature should be carried out by his wife.
 - B. He felt it would be better to leave him in Richmond with his comrades in arms.


 A close knit family would want the same.
 - C. It was illegal to disinter a body in the City of Richmond.
 - D. It would set a precedent.
- 18. Leroy Moran, a member of our family and a practicing attorney in Roanoake, Va. takes the case and arranges for an informal meeting with Mr. Conway and several Richmond attorneys. Mr. Conway refuses to budge from his position leaving us no alternative but to sue the City of Richmond for a court order.
- 19. On Dec 8, 1978, a court session is held and Leroy Moran meets the objections headon.
 - A. He tells the court that there was no way the wife could procede with disinterment since she never knew what happened to him. The letter of 1891 is shown indicating she was still searching. He points out that the actual grave site was just discovered this past year.
 - B. Moran points out that Benjamin Yarborough was taken from his fellow soldiers in the 14 th Regiment Co A and shipped to Richmond with hundreds of sick soldiers that he never knew. It is precisely because we are a close knit family that we care enough to make this effort to bring him home. He pointed out that a site next to his wife and only son had been waiting for his return.
 - C. Moran pointed out that there was no law prohibiting disterment in Richmond but rather a set procedure that was to be followed and for which we had complied. He noted that when Richmond officials wanted to make room for a highway they would merely place a notice in the paper and if there was no objections they would procede with disinterment at taxpayers expense. This family asks nothing but your permission and is willing to pay all expenses involved. Should they not be given the same consideration as a highway project?
 - D.Mr. Conway's concern over this incident setting a precedent should be of no concern because the precedent had already been set. his research showed that several disinterments had already occurred in that very wemetery shortly after the Civil War.
- 20. Judge Marvin F, Cole upon hearing the arguments ruled that the Yarborough Family had more right to the body than the City of Richmond and that he would issue the Bourt order if the family would have a local mortician provide him with evidence that the exact position of the body could be ascertained and removed without disturbing adjoining graves.
- 21. Test borings were made at the site as directed and the results forwarded to Judge Cole. After reviewing the findings he issued the court order to proceed.
- 22. On August 10, 1979, the Salamone Funeral in Frederick, Md. rode to Richmond and placed the body of Benjamin Yarborough in his new casket and proceded to take him home to Marvin Methodist Church Cemetery in Gray's Creek, North Carolina. The family rejoiced as Benjamin Yarborough received a proper burial and was at last reunited with his family...

When Benjamin F. Yarborough did not return from the war, his wife Sara and their one year old son Franklin Curtis Yarborough continued to live in Montgomery County, N.C. until about 1880 s. At that time I understand that Sara's mother, Martha Chappell Blake, decided it would be best to go to live near Stedman N.C. where they had relatives. It was app. 10 miles East of Fayetteville in Cumberland County, N.C. I believe I heard my mother tell me that as a young man Franklin was selling Singer Sewing Machines and during his travels he met the family of James and Leonas Ferrell Marsh who had 11 children and he fell in love with Romelia who was born April 9, 1867. They married Dec. 29,1891. The Marsh ancestry included the family names of Ferrell, Dixon, Gregory, and Paige. James Marsh was born June 25, 1821, married Leonas Ferrell in 1857 and died Jan. 31, 1885. Leonas was born April 14, 1838 and died August 25, 1882. Both are buried beside Marvin Methodist Church as well as Martha Chappell Blake b. March 8, 1820 and d. June 18, 1901. On Nov. 25, 1896 Franklin C. Yarborough with the help of his uncle E. C. Blake and J.W. Edge purchased from Mr. E. H. Evans what was then known as the Jackson Plantation located on Swann's Creek including the Williamson Mill and app. 1,000 acres which Franklin eventually bought completely and renamed "Midway Farms ". It was their home for over 50 years until their death. Franklin died in 1946 and Romelia in 1952. Both are buried at the cemetery beside Marvin Methodist Church.

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'Midway Farms,' colonial country home of Mrs. Charles A. DeVore, is located just off the Wilming-ton highway in Grays Creek, miles south of

Fayetteville.

Deeds to lands described in the titles of "Midway Farms," the Yarborough house, are interesting and give some history of the area on the west side of the upper Cape Fear River. Col. Johnson, appointed

governor of North Carolina in 1733, had a great interest in the Scots who emigrated to the Cape Fear region. In North Carolina all new settlers were exempt from taxotion for ten years. On Sept. 11, 1735, Gov. Johnson issued letters of patent of George II, King of England, for lands described in subsequent deeds:

On Jan. 24, 1793, Joseph Cooper, citing the king's grant transferred lands on the west side of Swann's Creek to Samuel Borton (Haughton). Earlier deeds recorded indicate the family as owning land along the Cape Fear under royal grant. In 1798 Samuel Horton, listed at this time in Wake County, transferred land to John Jackson (this deed found in book 17, page 242) John Jackson transferred the land to Jesse Jackson in 1804, but he reserved the right to a mill pond on Swann's Creek. By 1821, the property was sold by the sheriff of Cumberland Counsheriff of Cumberland County. Alexander McKay, to John Kelly. Kelly held a mortgage against the land fund in book 34, page 63. Then in 1823, he sold it to Alfred and A. C. Jackson, sons of Jesse Jackson, who had lost it under the sale. In 1868 Alfred Jackson representations of the sale of the sale of the sale of the sale. in 1888 as administrator of

the estate of Neill McQueen tsheriff of Cumberland County at the times, William, entered into a contract with John R. Smith whereby the latter was to purchase the land, paying part of an agreed sum annually. On the failure of Smith to make payment, the administrator sued to repossess the lands. and Judge William A. Hoke sydered the lands returned

to the McQueen estate. Smith appealed to the Supreme Court when Chief preme Court when Chief Justice Furches, writing the ophion, found Hoke partially in error, and ordered the land sold by the court, preserving the Smith equity. In 1885, the court appointed Judge N. A. Sjnelsië as commissioner to auction the lands at the courthouse door. lands at the courthouse door whereby the land was pur-chased by B. Hervey Evans for \$1,575. On Nov. 25, 1896, Evans

on Nov. 20, 1839, Evens sold this property to E.C. Blake, J.W. Edge and F.C. Yerborough: Located on Swann's Creek and known at the Jeckson Plantation including the Nathan Williamson Mill, it included 1000 acres

1000 acres.
E.C. Blake and Frank
Curtis Yarborough had
come to Cumberland around 1891 from Montgomery County. Blake was an uncle of Yarborough. J.W. Edge was a native of Cumberland

was a native of Cumbersand County.

In 1905, Yarborough became the sole possessor of the Jackson house and certain parts of the acreage.

Frank Curtis Yarborough was an only child of Benjamin Curtis and Sarah Jane Blake Yarborough. Jane Blake Yarborough, of Jane Blake Yartorough, or English ancestry. He was born May 4, 1861 the same year that his father "went off to war," and it was in an army hospital in Richmond, Van, that Benjamin Curtis Varborough died Nov. 10 Yarborough died Nov. 10, 1862. His mother took her young son back to the home of her parents, and there he grew to manhood.

When he was about 30 years old, he came to Cumberland County with his mother's brother, E.C. Blake, who was just a few years his senior. His uncle assisted him in buying lands, and he finally settled in the Stedman area where there are decendants today.

It was around 1891, after coming to Cumberland, that Frank Curtis Yarborough married Romelia Marsh. the daughter of James and Leonas (Ferrell) Marsh; whose Marsh line is traced back to an earlier settler in the 1700's and to the Ferrell line traced back to the Paiges, a royal line connection in England.

It is remembered that the

Jackson house was 50 years old in 1896 which would give the year 1846 as the building date. Parts of it could easily be older. There is evidence

other than the deed that the Jackson family was on the site, for a short distance from the house is the Jack-son Cemetery. Of interest are these pames found

When the house was purchased, it was in 1912 that yarborough added a porch on the second story. The kitchen and dining room were in an ell or wing on the back. It is remembered that the dining room was 23-by-11 feet wide, and the kitchen was 15-by-15 feet wide. The remodeling was done by L. R. Russ. Today the outside has had no changes, but within there have been some floor plan changes. Most of the improvements have made the house more comfortable and convenient. The old parlor has beautiful pineflooring of random widths, and a pine mantle is lovely with a 14-inch width board house was enclosed by a

picket fence. The pickets no longer are there, but the heart pine posts still stand, solid and firm. There will ation be a new one.

A beautiful blanket chest

that once belonged to Sarah Jane Blake Yarborough is a prized heirloom of Dorothy DeYore. Another prized possession of the family is a photograph of Frank C. Yarborough and his bride, taken by J. T. Winburn of Fayetteville.

The rural setting is very

scenic with the house on a slight elevation, a distance isign elevation, a distance from the highway, in a grove of old and shapely trees. A wide expanse of green fields surrounds the area, and these fields are bordered by a deep woodland area. Some a deep woodland area. Some of the trees found in the grove are live oaks, hickory, elm and crepe myrtle of many years and a delightful sparkleberry tree with great age filled with fruit and beautifully colored shiny leaves. Boxwood shrubs tie the burst to the land the house to the land.

Frank C. Yarborough was a progressive and well-organized farmer. Found on his stationery letterhead is the listings of his special en-deavors. From an old photograph of the house one notices that a model-T Ford stands in the driveway. It is remembered that his Ford was one of three in the was one of three in the neighborhood. The other two belonged to Henry Marsh and Angus McQueen. Mrs. Jasper Edge. a daughter of Yarborough, remembers how excited she was to have an automobile. The Yarborough home was one of the first in Grays Creek to have electricity.

Children of the Frank C. Children of the Frank C. Yarboroughs were Julian (deceased), Floy Dixon (Mrs. C. H. Lyday) of Brevard, Lelia May (Mrs. H. T. Bowen) of Baltimore, Winffred D. of Charlotte Winifred D. of Charlotte, Neill H. (dead), Milton of Benson, lone (Mrs. Jasper Edge) of Grays Creek, and Wilson of Fayetteville. There are grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Wilson Yarborough inherited Midway Farms and sold it to' Mrs. Dorothy Edge DeVore (Mrs. Charles A.), the present occupant, a granddaughter of the Yarbo-roughs. Her husband, now roughs. Her husband, now dead, was a native of Kansas. Her son Gregory is married and lives in Fayetteville. Dorothy, her daughter, lives at home and is a medical technician at Cape Fear Valley Hospital. 



Life has a way of creating the "Unexpected ". It happened one afternoon purely by chance as Lelia Yarborough was returning to Oak City, N.C. from a visit home by train. She politely acknowledged a greeting of " Hello " from a complete stranger but that's all it was. That was only proper but this man had a certain charm that disarmed her. She somehow managed to respond to some of his questions simply because he appeared so honest, sincere and decent but again that's all it was. A casual conversation with someone she would never see again. Right? There are times when I marvel at the order, the beauty, and the harmony that exists in the midst of a universe that is seemingly unexplainable and I wonder if that order extends to and includes destiny. My mother must have pondered that question at some depth when she arrived at school the following day. The entire school faculty both teachers and administrators had been summoned to a meeting where they introduced the new principal and welcomed him to Oak City High School. You can imagine the incredible shock she experienced when she saw and recognized the man as the casual stranger who had introduced himself as Hilary Bowen on the trainride the day before. Neither had any idea they were heading to the same place and that they would be working together for some time. Such is the irony of life. They began to see one another and gradually fell in love. Dad admired her because she was a genuinely fine person of solid character who was not only talented but had her feet on the ground. She was patient and understanding and he felt comfortable in her presence. On the other hand she was attracted by his free and independentspirit, his positive attitude and his ability to make friends and to be comfortable in most any situation. There were those who strongly opposed him on many issues because he was a man of conviction who was fiercely independent especially on social issues, but I know of no one who ever doubted his honesty or sincerity. His thirst for TRUTH was unquenchable and it was this search that led him into the ministry. Our family has truly been blessed to have had the benefit of such a heritage but I realize more than ever that we are but a link in a chain that crosses all generational barriers. The qualities that made them what they were passed on from those who have gone before and given to us as a gift which we in turn should appreciate and pass along. The true meaning was so eloquently expressed in the words of the poem "Flanders Field " when the poet said, " To you from failing hands we throw the TORCH, be yours to hold on high. If you break faith with us who die, we shall not sleep though poppies grow in Flanders Field ". Therin lies not only our challenge but also the key that will enable us to live a truly meaningful existence that will be a credit not only to ourselves but to our creator.





Widely Known Resident In 85th Year Of Age

Franklin Curtis Yarborough, one of Cumberland county's oldest and best-known citizens, died this morning about 6:30 at his home in Grays Creek township after a long illness. He would have been 85 years old on May 4.

Mr. Yarborough was one of the most extensive farmers in Grays Creek township and his genial and kindly disposition endeared him to people in all walks of life throughout the county. He had served on the board of county commissioners and took a leading part in promoting the cause of education in Cumberland county. He was a member of the Marvin Methodist church and an active worker in the affairs of Methodism in North Carolina.

He was born in Montgomery county but moved to Cumberland in 1870. His father, a Confederate! soldier, lost his life in the Civil war. Until early manhood Mr. Yarborough lived in Eastover township but later moved to Grays Creek and was in the farming and mercantile business there.

Surviving are his wife, the former Miss Romelia Marsh; three sons, W. D. Yarborough of Wingate, M. G. Yarborough of Fayetteville, and W. F. Yarborough of Fayetteville; and three daughters. Mrs. Jasper Edge of Grays Creek. Mrs. G. H. Lyday of Brevard and Mrs. H. T. Bowen of Baltimore,

Funeral services will be- conducted tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Marvin Methodist church by the Rev. W. B. Colton of Parkton, the Rev. Virgil E. Owen of Fayetteville and the Rev. R. E. Brown of Fayetteville.

The body will remain at Jernigan's Funeral home in Fayetteville until tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.





Grandad, I love you and we all do very much. May God be with you, always.



Ramon Yarborough Isham Blake Ceremony

@ March 2007 update

Ramon, Thanks for sending the Commemoration Ceremony program honoring Isham Blake. I recall your sending an article from your newspaper that described the reunion between Isham and General Lafayette when he visited Fayetteville. As I recall, Isham played the fife in the military marching band. I am sorry that I never researched the Blake line beyond Richard, father of our Sarah Jane so if you find it, I would appreciate your passing it along Regarding the completion of the family history, it seems that I have mounds of research but have not been able to make that final link with positive proof. This is what I know. Richard Yarborough arrived in this country in the 1640's following the English Civil War of 1642 -1645. He came from Lincolnshire County, England. There were Yarborough cousins living in Yorkshire County, England the first to immigrate was Ambrose in 1732. He settled in Culpepper, Va on the edge of the Robinson River and eventually moved to Union, South Carolina where he died in 1788. According to his Will, a son Jonathan was given land. That rules out our being from the Ambrose line because our John whose wife was Vera died 3 years earlier in 1785. I wondered what was the maiden name of Vera and thought it might be Wright for 3 reasons. I ran across some records of Westmoreland County, Va. where a John Wright gave a cow to his daughter Verlinda in 1709. Then I found a Will in Goochland County, Va written by Meriday Wright in 1729. Remember our John Yarborough had a brother Meriday but I found nothing there that mentioned Vera. The 3 rd reason for my suspicion was that a Dionysius Wright was involved in the transaction that enabled John and Vera to open an Ordinary on their farm. Where did John and Vera come from when they bought their farm in North Carolina in 1763? My suspicion is that they may be from Caroline County, Va. because the Yarboroughs ran Ordinaries and Taverns in that area for many years. As a matter of fact, a Charles Yarborough operated the Bull Tavern in the town of Ladysmith, Va.in the town of Ladysmith, Va. off Rt. 95 in the 1740's. One interesting item of interest appears in the records. If Charles was married, I never ran across a the name of his wife. It seems that Charles had a son and he went to the house of his sister, Mrs. Durant, and asked her if she would raise him but she refused. I would love to know the name of that child. The story was related by a woman , Angeline Searles, who worked for Mrs. Durant. Another item of interest was that in the 1690's, the immigrant Richard sold some of his land in Pamunkey Neck, Va. to a John Ashcroft and in 1763, a Richard Ashcroft was selling our John and Vera Yarborough 48 acres of land that he had purchased from Mary Jennings. Family connection?? Another angle I followed through on had to do with the witnesses that signed the Will of John Yarborough in 1785. William Chambers leads me to believe that he may have been the father of Joanna Chambers who married John, Son of John and Vera of our line. There was a Richard Rivers who I was able to trace back to Brunswick County, Va. where I once ran across a record of a John and Adelay or Amelia ? Yarborough in the 1740's. William Topping led me up a blind alley so I guess he was just a friend. One other item comes to mind that was of interest. When Joanna applied for John Yarborough's Pension , she or her son Henry of our line related the Battle of Blackwater Bridge where a friend of theirs was wounded. His name was Archibald Clark and his sister Sally came to the battlefield and nursed him back to health. I ran a check on this man and guess where it led me? Back to Caroline County, Va.where I found that he was a founding member of the Masons . Research carries you anywhere and everywhere but hopefully you will find it to be of some help. Maybe one day I will be able to tie it altogether......Sorry to hear about your health problems but it looks like you are coming out of the woods. Give our best to your mother. 

The Association was incorporated in the Commonwealth of Virginia as a not-for-profit entity in 1991 through the efforts of the late Allen Yarborough.

Since its founding, the highlight of the year has been the annual conference, hosted by one or more of the members. This is an occasion for further research through the extensive records owned by various members and made available for all to review. It is also an occasion to make new friends within the extended family.

While the early Yarbroughs settled in Virginia, they soon began to go west, following the migration routes that ran generally southwestward into the Carolinas, across Georgia to Alabama, Mississippi and westward to California, Oregon and Washington. The late Senator Ralph Yarbroough was pleased to remind one and all that there is a Yarbrough Peninsula in the northern polar region, a Yarbrough Bay in Central America, and a Mt. Yarbrough in Antarctica, indicating the venturesome nature of the family.


While to a new family researcher, there may appear to be several branches, all intertwined. These branches followed the same migratory routes, all the while naming their children with the previously mentioned Christian names.

This practice certainly complicates the task of unraveling who was begat by whom.

Adding to the problem is the lack of definitive public records.

Another complicating factor was the shared penchant of acquiring property in more than one state or territory. It is not at all unusual for one Yarb(o)rough to appear on the multiple census roles, creating the appearance that the each landowner was a separate identity, when in fact it was one individual! Nevertheless, evidence clearly indicates that all American Yarbroughs, of whatever spelling are related. Evidence is equally clear that members of the family have been prominent (even notorious) members of their respective communities since the founding of the country.

Thomas G. Yarborough

Thomas G. Yarborough is the earliest Yarborough ancestor that I can verify. I have had help from many cousins to include: Vernelle Socky, Hubert Joiner, and Jenny Londrico (Needham's line), , and Judy Yarborough Moore(Eligah's line). We can't find any records that list Thomas's parents, according to census records his parents were born in Virginia.

According to the census records, Thomas was born abt. 1785 in Virginia. He married Nancy _____ who was born abt. 1798 in South Carolina. In 1820 he was living in Williamsburg County, SC as a farmer with 3 children and wife. He remains in Williamsburg County thru 1860 census and had a total of 11 children. Thomas served in the War of 1812 as a Private in Capt John Bradshaw's Co. of Inf., 5 Reg't North Carolina Detached Militia. He joined in Hillsborough, NC and stated his home in Gilford, NC. He was enlisted for 6 months. From Hillsborough he went to Norfolk where he was discharged on 22 Feb 1815. His pay per month was 8 dollars. A copy of his pay record is on next page.







FREDERICK CLEVELAND YARBROUGH AND DENA MCMICHAEL

VI.12 FREDERICK CLEVELAND YARBROUGH was the 12th child of Crockett Davis Yarbrough and Jamima Ann Hill. He was born August 6, 1882 on the Hill Ranch near Hacienda Crossing on Russian River, and died on January 22, 1955 in Essex, Montana. He is buried in Whitefish, Montana. About 1904 he married the mother of his children:

VI.7 ALBADENE McMICHAEL (Dena) a daughter of Absolem Bayelil and Louisa Cleminza Anderson McMichael. She was born on September 2, 1882 "on the trail" in Arkansas. She died on January 9, 1919, in Richmond, California. She is buried in the Healdsburg, California Cemetery.

After Dena's death Frederick Cleveland Yarbrough may have married a red haired English woman, but about 1924 he married Georgeana Malvina Miller Hudson, the daughter of Louis Marc Miller and Marie Olivine Remillard.

Fred Yarbrough was the only child of Crockett and Jamima Yarbrough who begat sons to carry on the Yarbrough name. He was still living with his mother on the Hill/Yarbrough Ranch at the time of the 1900 census. He had attended Lafayette School on the West River Road, and went to high school in Healdsburg. He met Abbadene McMichael at Lafayette School, the grammar school on Westside Road, and they were married some time between the 1900 census and the birth of their first son, Forrest Lloyd, in May of 1906. At the age of 21, Fred is reported in the Healdsburg Enterprise of September 19, 1903 as purchasing a restaurant:

"Fred Yarbrough has purchased the Louvre Restaurant and is now in possession. Mr. Yarbrough is an energetic, wide awake young man, and under his management the Louvre will be conducted in a first class manner."

It is supposed that Fred obtained the money to make this purchase from his mother when she sold the ranch. His first son was probably born at their home just north of Cloverdale. By the 1910 census Fred and Dena are gone from the Northern Sonoma County area, and were probably in Richmond, CA. No record or remembrance of the disposal of the Louvre restaurant episode has been found.

Floyd Caughey reported that Fred and Ben Porter went to Richmond to work for Standard Oil Company of California. By the 1910 census the Howard family had also left the area, leaving only Claude Howard living in a rooming house in Healdsburg. Freda Howard Shane reported that Fred Yarbrough's family lived next door to the Howards in Richmond. There is a picture of some members of the clan as volunteer firemen manning a fire engine in a parade in Richmond, where Fred may have been involved with the steam equipment. There is a story that he purchased some of the property which now contains oil refineries. He bought it for a few dollars per acre and sold it for 25 dollars per acrebefore the oil companies became interested.

Two more sons were born in Richmond, Jean Frederick in 1913 and Edwin Lee in 1917. They lived near the Howards as Freda Shane has told me. In 1919 Abbadene died. She had been suffering from influenza and was apparently recovering. However she was asthmatic, and had a congenital heart defect according to tradition, so her weakened heart gave up. Her son, Jean Porter, was quite young at the time, but remembered his father and older brother Lloyd crying together on a couch in the darkened living room for hours. Alvin Caughey remembered his mother Rena, Dena's twin, having to go to a neighbor's house to

receive bad news. Rena was afraid that it would be Dena, so she took Alvin with her for support.

After Dena died, Fred left Jean with Ben and Betty Porter, who subsequently adopted him, and sent Edwin to stay with his sister Ethyl and her husband Rice McMichael. He kept Lloyd with him at first. He married a red haired English woman for a short time, and Lloyd had such problems with her that he returned to the Russian River area. During the mid-twenties Fred was employed as a steam engineer at various canneries, a skill he learned working for the Standard Oil Company at point Richmond. He was married to Georgeana Hudson during that time. He was working in Monterey on Cannery Row in 1924, living with his Uncle and Aunt, Newton and Molly Yarbrough according to Bonnie Yarbrough and Ed Yarbrough. There is a picture of him and Georgeana at the Cliff House in San Francisco in 1926.

There was a story that he spent some time as a marine engineer in the merchant marine, which could have been in that period of time. His son Edwin reports that Fred got his steam experience working for the Standard of California refineries at Point Richmond, and that the story about the merchant marine probably comes in from the work he did as a steam engineer on a junk river boat that was loaded with lumber and sold to Japan about 1927. He worked that trip, and returned on a passenger trip.

He divorced Georgiana in Seattle around 1927 and went to Oilmont, Montana to run a garage for the wife of a man he had met in Seattle. After about a year he became lonesome and sent for Georgiana, and they were again married. He told his son Edwin that they had been married twice, but Ed is not sure of the details.

Ed Yarbrough told me that they went to Montana in 1928 after being in Seattle. In Ferdig, Montana, Fred became a supervisor for a string of oil wells, and he was apparently still running them in 1946, when I first visited them at an "oil lease" near Sunburst. When I visited them again in 1949, they had gone into business with Georgeana's son Ted (Charles E. Frederick Hudson) and his wife Hazel, purchasing a resort including a general store, a bar, a dozen cabins and camping facilities. This was near Essex, Montana, on the southern edge of Glacier National Park near the continental divide in the Rocky Mountains.

Georgeana died in 1954, and Fred followed her within a year, dying in his sleep at Essex on January 22, 1955, at the age of 72. They are both buried in Whitefish, Montana.

Jean Porter grew up near Sebastopol, California, where Ben and Betty had

a ranch. Jean was always fascinated by death, and decided early to become a mortician. He worked at that business in several establishments, owning funeral homes in both Santa Rosa (Porter and Egan) and San Francisco where he had a funeral home across the street from the Southern Pacific Hospital. In his later years they moved to Pacifica, California. He died while living there in 1985 at age 72. Their surviving children live in the San Francisco Bay area. Children Of Jean and Inez Porter:

Edwin was two years old when his mother died, and he went to live with Rice and Ethyl (Yarbrough) McMichael on their ranch 5 miles south of Cloverdale, Ca. He stayed with them until he was about 8 yrs. old, when his older brother, Lloyd, came from Monterey to bring him to visit his father for two weeks, His father kept him for a year, and then took him to visit his other brother, Jean, at their Uncle Ben and Betty (McMichael) Porter's, but forgot to come back and get him. He stayed there for about 4 years (he would have been about 13) when he had to return to Rice and Ethyl's because of Aunt Betty's bad health. He stayed there for a few months when his father suddenly remembered where he was, and took him to Ferdig, Montana, where Fred was superintendent for an oil company. Fred had come to Montana in 1928 from Seattle. When Ed was 17 and living alone tending oil wells near Kevin, Montana, he met and married Betty.

In the late 1930's Ed an Betty and the older children lived next door to His brother Lloyd in Santa Rosa for about a year. He worked for L.C. Smith Furniture at this time. They then returned to Montana where they lived in Cutbank as they had before going to California.

In the late 1940's Ed, Betty and the four children were living in the Texaco "camp", a company town when Ed was a foreman for the Texaco oil fields to the east of Sunburst Montana. Later Ed worked for Colorado Fuel and Iron in the wire rope division. He retired from that job and he and Betty were living in Jefferson Colo. in 1982, and near Salida, Colorado in 1993. Their children are married and spread along the Rocky mountain states except Dena who is in Washington state.

THE McMICHAEL FAMILY

In the wake of the War Between the States, many Southerners joined the western migration. Absolem McMichael had been with Lee at the Appomatix Court House at the end of the war. During the war, the northern part of Sonoma County had been sympathetic with the Confederacy, while those living around Petaluma had been Union adherents. It was reasonable that the Andersons and their son-in-law chose to move to Mark West Station between Santa Rosa and

Healdsburg shortly after the war.

The McMichael family records, <u>A TREASURY OF KITH AND KIN</u>, compiled by Mrs. Leona McMichael Jacobs and Mrs. Edna McMichael are the primary source for the first two McMichael Generations. Information on the California McMichael branches is from family bibles and other records held by various members of the Caughey families.

The McMichael Clan of Scotland was an associated sept of Prince Charles Edward Stewart, known as Bonnie Prince Charlie. The Royal line of Stewarts were from the same clan as the McMichaels, but changed their name to Stewart when their ancestor became the Steward to the Royal House of Scotland. He had the good fortune to marry the queen, and thereby establish a royal family carrying that name. Upon the death of Queen Elizabeth I. of England, the United Kingdom was formed from England and Scotland with James Stewart, the son of Mary Queen of Scots, becoming King James I (of England) and VI (of Scotland).

It is family tradition that the McMichael family of that part of Bedford Co, TN which later became Coffee Co, was native to Scotland, but for some reason, probably because of political or religious difficulties, removed to Ireland, and then eventually to America where they settled in South Carolina.

South Carolina Records of land grants to Protestant Scots-Irish immigrants began about 1770, where families were given land as an inducement to leave Ireland and settle in S.C. In those records a meeting of Jan 6, 1773 records one Patrick McMichael in Craven Co. as well as a Hugh Porter and a James Porter. On the 16th of July in 1784, one Thomas Farrar is granted land in Greenville County, north of the Saluda River. In the 1800 census Rese F. Ross is in the Greenville County, SC census.

The McMichaels came to Tennessee early in the 19th century. Although there were no McMichaels in the 1812 Tax List of Bedford Co. it is possible that some of them were in the county by 1812 to 1814. The area they settled in Bedford County between Davis Mill (later Fairfield) and Noah's Fork community and post office, was settled earlier than some parts of the county.

The Ross and perhaps the Farrar families also came to Tennessee at about this time. IV. Sophronia Ross (McMichael) was born in South Carolina about 1812, and her brother IV. John F. Ross was born in Tennessee about 1822. There were young Farrar children living with John F. Ross and his family including his father III. Rice F. Ross in Coffee County in 1850.

In Goodspeed's "History of Tennessee', 1886, it was stated that "one of the first settlements in the county (meaning Coffee Co. in 1886) was made on Noah's Fork of Duck River, in the neighborhood of the site of the village of Noah, in the Third Civil District by Daniel, John and Neeley Patton, brothers, and that "the date they came is supposed to be about 1800". (In 1800 all of Middle Tennessee was in Davidson County.)

Deed Book L, pp132-33 in R.O. Bedford Co., records that on Oct 1, 1818, Margaret McMichael, a widow, was deeded 180 acres of land by Andrew Erwin of Augusta, GA. This land lay on the north side of Noah's Fork of Duck River. In 1836, this part of Bedford Co was taken into the new county of Coffee, and fell in Third Civil District of that county.

This land was part of a North Carolina Grant No. 217 to John Gray and Thomas Blount, and was surveyed Sept 1792 under Warrant 1668 for 5,000 acres on both sides of Middle Fork of Duck River. Later this land was sold to Andrew Erwin. Because of the Allison Land Deal, Margaret McMichael was assessed \$54 on her land, and Erwin and cohorts took a 3-year mortgage on her 180 acres until she paid \$18 per year in 1825, 26 and 27.

These must have been trying times for Margaret and her family. However, they were making progress. In 1830 they paid \$400 for 39 acres of land. Little

by little they increased their holdings until several decades later the total acreage is said to have reached 1,100 acres.

III. Margaret McMichael, a widow, came to Tennessee ca. 1815 with seven children. In 1980 this farm was owned by her descendant Leona McMichael Jacobs and her husband Luke Jacobs (related to Luther Burbank's second wife). In 1975 the Jacobs received the Heritage Award from the State of Tennessee for owning land that had been in the same family for more than 100 years. Leona Jacobs is a great-great-grand-daughter of Margaret McMichael.

The house that Margaret's sons built for her about 1818 is still standing, however it has had many additions over its 160 year existence. It originally had one large log room, two stories high, with enclosed staircase. The large open fireplace heated the main room as well as the upper room. The cooking was done in the fireplace in the early years.

Family lore is that Margaret spent her Sunday afternoons reading and instructing her children in the Bible, and was "put out" if neighbors came to call and disturbed this Sunday routine.

The line to California is traced through:

- IV. SOPHRONIA ROSS, b. 2 Nov 1812 in South Carolina, d. between 1870 and 1880, but probably before 1875. She was a daughter of RICE FARRAR ROSS and SARAH BONHAM ROSS.

In Coffee County Minute Book p.28-1837-"...it is ordered by the Court that the following persons be appointed to a Jury to View to lay off and mark a road from Jessee Shelton's to Beech Grove.....William McMichael" seven other names were included.

In 1854, when it appeared that the NC&St.L Railroad would go through Coffee County, James, Alexander and William McMichael bought stock in the new railroad.

In 1857 James McMichael, bachelor, died and was buried in the family Cemetery on the farm. Over the years the McMichael holdings had been run as a family enterprise, as McMichael Brothers, by Margaret's sons James, Alexander and William. However William maintained a separate household in the 1st District of Coffee Co as he had a very large family. It was deemed advisable to have a division of the holdings when James died.

On Nov 25, 1857 a commission of three men was appointed by the Coffee County Court to appraise and partition the McMichael holdings. The result of this division gave William McMichael 39 acres valued at \$40 per acre, 130 acres of the original tract @ 32.50 per acre, and a female slave named Frankie and her two children valued at \$1,500.

There were few families that furnished any more manpower to the Civil War than the William McMichael family, who provided 5 sons and one son-in-law. All

returned home after the war.

In 1875 William McMichael (Sr.) was several years past three score and ten, and he thought it was time he made a will. Accordingly his will, dated January 15, 1875 is of record in Coffee Co., TN as follows:

STATE OF TENNESSEE COUNTY OF COFFEE) I, William McMichael (sen) for the love and affection I have for my children, R.R. Mc-Michael, A.B. McMichael, Thomas F. McMichael and Searcy McMichael and my grandchildren S.(arah) B. Johnson, Mary Jane Johnson, Susan Ida Johnson, William T. Johnson and Malinda H. Johnson, do hereby transfer and convey to them and their heirs forever the following tracts of land. They are to take possession at any time they choose, by paying me rent for the same during my natural life and paying the taxes for the same. (descriptions omitted by Wilma Vaughn Chunn)

To R.R. McMichael - 40 acres valued at \$1,050

To A.B. McMichael - Two tracts totaling 74 acres valued at \$1080

To W.R. McMichael - 55 acres valued at \$1,112

To Thos F. McMichael - 64 acres valued at \$1,020

To Searcy McMichael - 58 acres valued at \$1,061

To heirs of daughter Malinda H.Johnson, deceased, 87 acres valued at \$2,124

None of the above mentioned tracts of land are to be sold to anyone except to one of my children without my consent during my natural life.

Because Sophronia Ross McMichael was not mentioned in this will, it is assumed that she had died before 1875. The fifteen children of William and Sophronia Ross McMichael are as follows.

THE CALIFORNIA MCMICHAELS AND ALLIED FAMILIES

The Chickasaw Indians were a tribe of northern Mississippi and parts of Tennessee, and were closely related to the Choctaw. In the French and Indian War they were allied with the British, and they were friendly with the United States in the Revolutionary War. By treaties negotiated in 1832 and 1834 they removed to western Oklahoma where they formed the Chickasaw Nation and became one of the Five Civilized Tribes. In the Civil War they served in the Confederate Army, and they freed their slaves at the end of the war. In 1906 they became citizens of the United States. [The Columbia Encyclopedia, C.F. Ansley, Columbia University Press, 1940, p348]

John. P. Anderson came to California via the Southern Route. His grand-daughter, Rena McMichael Caughey, wrote that he landed at Mark West Railroad Station in the late 1860's. He was Post Office Manager at Mark West for years, and also sold chewing tobacco and stick candy.

A.B. McMichael enlisted in the Confederate Army, 17 Nov 1862 at age 18. He served under Bragg in the battles of Murfreesboro (30 miles S.E. Nashville, Tennessee, December 31, 1862- January 2, 1863), Chickamauga (N.W. Georgia, September 19-20, 1863) and under Longstreet at the siege of Knoxville (Tennessee, November 1863). He was transferred to the Virginia Army (with Longstreet), and fought in the principal battles around Pittsburgh. He surrendered under General Lee at the Appomattox Court House in Virginia (April 9, 1865).

A.B. and L.C. McMichael first came to California in 1873, settling in Mark West with John P. Anderson. They are reported to have made several trips back to Tennessee, taking the entire family. They returned to Tennessee to settle the family estate when William McMichael died ca. 1880. It was on the return from Tennessee that the twins Rena and Dena were born in Arkansas. One night the horses escaped, and A.B. searched for them for a week before some Indians helped him catch them. They then went north and sold the horses and wagons, and took the train to California. It was probably on this trip that their oldest child, Mary, died on the trail.

With the proceeds from his father's estate, A.B. McMichael bought the Lambert Ranch, river bottom land on the Healdsburg road (West River Road) a few miles towards Healdsburg from the Lafayette School. Their children attended that school. In the Great Register of 1891 Absolem Baelil McMichael and in 1898 Absolem Bayelil McMichael is described as 5 ft 8-1/2 inches tall, light blue eyes and brown hair, born in Tennessee, a farmer, with a Forestville post office in 1892 and a Healdsburg post office in 1899.

On March 29, 1904, R. Forrest McMichael age 14, the youngest child of A.B. and L.C. McMichael, drowned while swimming in the Russian River with some friends. A sea captain had befriended Forrest and a group of his friends and had arranged a Sunday picnic at the river. His parents had company that Forrest enjoyed, and he was hesitant to go on the picnic. His father said that as he had promised to go on the picnic, he should go. Forrest reluctantly joined the picnic. After lunch and home-made ice cream, all went swimming. Forrest could swim very well, and had often been in the river. Whether he was seized with cramps or caught in an undertow, no one knows. His father was heavy with grief, blaming himself for insisting that Forrest go. The family was land poor at that time, and the money to pay for the headstone was obtained by selling the sheep that Forrest had been raising.

By the 1910 census, A.B. and L.C. McMichael are in Cloverdale as are three of their married children. Rice Franklin McMichael has married Ethel P. Yarbrough, and their two daughters Lois and Ann have been born there. Two daughters married Caughey brothers. The twin Rena married William Caughey and has sons William Wesley and Alvin. Eula P. McMichael has married Alexander Caughey, but the census is a month too early to record their son Floyd.

The sons of A.B. and L.C. McMichael were singularly unsuccessful in producing sons, and so the McMichael name has died with them. The daughters have been more prolific, and the names which carry on are Caughey, Porter, Warner and Yarbrough, families among the early Russian River settlers.

The McMichaels married people they grew up with. John married Cashia Covey daughter of settlers at Hacienda Crossing near the old Hill Ranch. Dena, the other twin, married Frederick Yarbrough, who had grown up a few miles down the road from the McMichaels on the Yarbrough Ranch (originally the Isaacs homestead). Sophronia Elizabeth married Benjamin McKinley Porter, son of Thomas A.D. Porter and nephew of Hugh Porter, early settlers of the part of

Mendocino County that later became Mendocino Township in Sonoma County, i.e. the Westside Road. Hugh Porter was described in a History of Sonoma County (George K. Porter p. 413): Hugh Porter came to California in 1846, making the long overland trip by ox teams, and shortly after his arrival here he enlisted in the California Volunteers, with which he took an active part in the Mexican War. Later he turned his attention to mining, which vocation he followed for a few years, and then, about 1850, came to Sonoma County and took up 160 acres of land on the Russian River, nine miles west of Healdsburg, where he lived for nearly half a century, his death occurring there in 1897. The Porter ranch was just up the road from the McMichael's ranch, and is now part of the Twin Valleys Ranch of Fred McMurray.

An article in the Healdsburg Tribune on 21 March 1918 tells of the death of A.B. McMichael, aged 73 yrs, 6 mos and 15 days) at the home of his son in Healdsburg. He had stayed with this son in order to receive better medical attention. The article states that he had been living near Cloverdale for a few years, and had been a resident of Sonoma County for 35 years (since about 1883). He was buried in the Healdsburg Cemetery from the Healdsburg Methodist Church of the South. There is no mention of influenza, although it was rampant at that time.

The middle name of Absolem B. McMichael is not certain. Tennessee records have him as Absolem Bezilla, and the voter registrations have him as Absolem Baelil, 45 yrs in 1891 and Absolem Beyelil, age 51 in 1898. On an old picture he is called Zillia.

The Biblical Absalom, son of King David, lead Israel against his father. Before the final battle he lead the nation (tribe) into the land of Gilead: 2 Samuel:17 and 18: David met with a number of other tribes, and one name was Barzillai the Gileanite from Rogelim. After Absalom was slain in battle and David mourned him, David was guided back across the Jordan by Barzillai, who was a man of 80 years at that time.

Then it appears that our Absolem was named for these David's son and David's guide: Absalom and Barzillai. It would be interesting to see the spellings used in the old Bible that Margaret McMichael read to her children, which of course included William, A.B. McMichael's father. So the name is probably supposed to be Absalom Barzillai McMichael, which accounts for the Zillia on the photograph.

Louisa Cleminza Anderson McMichael died on 16 Jan 1930 in Santa Rosa. She was living in a small house behind Floyd and Ethyl Caughey at that time. She is buried next to her husband in Healdsburg Cemetery, and the only way to find the site is to locate the headstones for their children Dena Yarbrough and Forrest McMichael, who are buried in the same plot. Her grandson, Alvin Caughey, remembered her as one who was always helping others: helping with births and tending the sick.

Descendants of Absolem B and Louisa C. McMichael are in the appendix.

THE CAUGHEY BROTHERS

Two brothers from Canada, William and Alexander Caughey, arrived at Bodega in the early 1870's, and worked in the lumbering industry.

The older Caughey brother was V.1 William Caughey who was born in 1839, died Dec. 2, 1902, at age 63 and is buried in the Bloomfield cemetery. He may have had only one child: VI.1 Joseph Caughey (b. 1876) who was working in a Lumber camp in Salt Point in 1910, and he had married and divorced Kate Clasby, and they had one child, IX.1 Arthur Caughey. Kate later remarried into a San Rafael family, and operated a funeral home for years. Arthur was killed in

a hunting accident in Mexico. Joe delivered mail around the Guerneville area on horseback, and was otherwise known to sit on a captain's chair with a glass in his hand and chewing tobacco, outside of a bar in Guerneville, after he'd finished his rounds. This was in the late 1920's and early 1930's.

The younger Caughey, V.2 Alexander, was born in Canada 21 Nov 1846 and died 9 Sept 1911 and is buried in the Cloverdale Cemetery. He was naturalized as a citizen of the United States in 1881 in Sonoma County. His wife was V. Ann Thompson Caughey, and they had eight children. Among these are the ancestors of today's Caugheys of Sonoma County.

An article in the Canadian newspaper Witness, about 1880:

Mr. and Mrs. William Thompson

Who can beat this? - There live in the village of Kemptville, two old persons, William Thompson and his wife, both of whom have had an eventful history. Shortly after his marriage in Dumfries, Scotland, he came to this country, arriving in South Gower in the year 1817. Three years after his wife followed him. There were born to them eleven daughters and one son. He is now 86 and his wife 84 years of age. They have 89 grandchildren, 52 great grandchildren and one great-great-grand child. We have never heard before of parents still living, one of whose grandchildren is a grandfather. Nor is it every immigrant couple that gives to Canada a hundred and fifty born Canadians in half a century. The old gentleman is perfectly blind, but his judgment and memory are as vigorous as they ever were. In his younger days he has been a laborious student of the Bible, while the doctrines he holds are well supported with scriptural passages, all of which he will quote as accurately as if they were read from the printed page. His wife has more muscle and pluck than many of our young girls at twenty. She will set out on a visit to her son, walking all the way, though the distance is fourteen miles. The old folks have been getting the Witness for sixteen years.

A note at the bottom of the page says: Your father's Great Grandfather. This article was in Witness Newspaper about 1880.

Ann Thompson would have been either a daughter of this couple, or else the daughter of their only son who lived fourteen miles away in about 1880. Kemptville is in Ontario, Canada, twenty eight miles due south of the capital, Ottowa. North Gower is eight miles north of Kemptville, but there is no South Gower on a current map of Ontario. Kemptville may have been named South Gower earlier. The interested Caughey researcher has a place to begin researching the Thompson line here.

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THE YARBROUGH FAMILY

Its Origin

The Yarbrough family is regarded as one of the oldest families in England, going back to as early as 853 A.D. when authenticated historic references are made to Germund, who owned land in Fermethorpe, County Lincoln. He is the first of the line recorded. In the old Monastary records which were unearthed in World War II bombings, the English Yarburgh family can be traced in an unbroken chain to this Germund.

The family was of Danish origin and it is assumed they came into England (then known as Angle-land) during the Danish Viking invasions which began about 800 A.D. The patriarch of the Yarbrough family, along with hundreds of his fellow Danes settled in the area now known as Lincolnshire, and they continued to war with the West Saxons for many years. Finally Alfred the Great became king in 871 and after several defeats, he won a great military victory, the conquest of London in 886. The Danes withdrew to the eastern third of England called Danelaw where Danish laws, customs, and language prevailed.

In 1066 William of Normandy invaded England, and the Danes, being enemies of the Anglo-Saxons, sided with William and helped him destroy the Anglo-Saxon army in the battle of Hastings on Christmas Day, 1066 A.D. The war was won and William, now known as William the Conquerer, became King of England and in the same year knighted Eustacius, who was a descendant of Germund. This was before surnames were used.

King William, the Conquerer, had an extensive survey made of the land, listing the principal landholders, the farm population, and the material and financial resources of his realm which is now contained in the DOMEDAY BOOK. This book gives the name "Gereburg" and early documents mention the name Yerdsburg or Jerdsburg. The present pronunciation of Yarbrough comes from the Danish "Jard" and "Jerda" and the Norse word "Jardborg". The English meaning of the word is "earth fortification."

King William ordered the territory be taken from the nobility and large landowners and divided among his followers. Eustacius was made Lord of Yarburgh and became known as Eustacius de Yarburgh. (Yarburgh was the name of a place in Lincolnshire.) At present two places called Yarburgh are there, one a parish in the union of Louth, and the other a hamlet in the parish of Croxton.


The Yarburgh estate received a charter from the king and was allowed a representative in Parliament. Eustacius de Yarburgh, Lord of Yarburgh, had a son named Robert de Yarburgh. He in turn named his son Lambert de Yarburgh; however after the fifth generation the de was dropped and Yarburgh became a surname.

Burke in his HISTORY OF THE COMMONERS, Vol. III, page 661, states: "The family of Yarburgh can be traced in authenticated male succession from the time of the Norman Conquest at which time Eustacius de Yarburgh was Lord of Yarburgh, in the County of Lincoln, which manor, together with

the patronage of the living, still remain vested in his lineal representation, the present Major Yarburgh of Heslington. For many centuries they were chiefly settled in various parts of Lincolnshire, but more than two hundred years ago they removed their residence to Snaith Hall in the West Riding of the County of York and subsequently, Snaith Hall being destroyed to Helsington Hall, near York."

The spelling "Yarburgh" continued unchanged in England for almost five hundred years. The first appearance of the spelling "Yarbrough" on the family chart prepared by F. S. Andrus of the College of Arms was the entry concerning Sir Nicholas Yarburgh, Snaith Hall, Yorkshire, a knight. Two of his sons, Sir Thomas and Richard, adopted the spelling "Yarbrough" while other sons continued with the old spelling.

Several researchers have spent considerable time trying to connect the colonial Yarbroughs to the English line, and a few are convinced that Richard, son of Sir Nicholas, mentioned above, is the same Richard found in the Virginia Colony in 1642; however, parish records show Nicholas Yarburgh was born in 1612 and his son Richard was baptized 1 Oct. 1640. So he is a generation too late to be Richard, the Immigrant. Richard, the Immigrant was born in 1615 according to his tombstone inscription.

EARLY YARBROUGHS IN AMERICA

In early American records, as well as in old English documents, the Yarbrough name occurs with various spelling such as: Yerbury, Yarburgh, Yarboro, Yerborow, Yarbrow, Yarberry, Yarberough, Yarborough, Yarbrough, and others. Even today in current telephone directories the name may be spelled Yarber, Yarbro, Yarboro, Yarberry, Yarbough, Yarborough, and Yarbrough.

Genealogists agree all spellings are of the same original family. The varied spellings came about because most pioneers were unable to read or write. They signed their documents with an "X" and the clerk spelled the name as it sounded to him, and since distinct dialects were spoken in different parts of the country, names had various pronunciations. Later descendants who learned to read and write adopted the spelling they found on family documents or the way their teachers spelled the name for them. In my own line of Yarbroughs, I have found the name spelled seven different ways in county records. Sometimes it is spelled two or three ways in the same instrument, so evidently the recorders were, also, unsure of the spelling.

Until recently I along with other Yarbrough researchers believed there were only two early Yarbrough immigrants to America--Richard, who came to the Virginia Colony from Lincolnshire, Eng., before 1642, and Ambrose, who came to the same area from Yorkshire, England, in 1732-- and that anyone who could trace his line to a time before 1732 could be assured he had descended from Richard the Immigrant. However a couple years ago while doing research on my Gibbons line in the records of York Co., VA, I happened on proof there was an Edward Yarbrough in York Co, VA, before 1645. The records are as follows:

EDWARD YARBROUGH OF YORK COUNTY, VA.

From Microfilm Reel No. 1A, Record 2, Deeds, Wills, Orders, Etc., 1645-1649, page 132, was extracted this deed of gift.

Be it knowne unto all men by ye sd presents that I Richard Pasmuch for and in consideration of ye naturall love and affection which I doe bear unto Edward Yarborrough sone of Edward Yarborrough late of York I doe give unto Edw: Yarborrough, Jun. and his heires and assignes, one pide black and white Cowe Calfe being marked as followes Viz Cross on ye Right Eare, a hole in ye right & soe slit out and ye fore part of ye left eare cut out to have & to hold ye Cawe Calfe with all her female increase unto ye sd Edward Yarborrough jun or his heires or assignes forever from and against all men shall and will warrant and forever defend by ye sd presents ye male increase decending backe unto me ye s Richard Pasmuch or my heires or assignes. In wittness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal on ye 25th day of May 1646 and in ye twoe & twentyeth year of ye Raigne of our soverigne lord Charles by ye grace of God King of England.

From page 95 of the same record is found a bill of sale whereby Richard Lee sold Edward Yarrow, son of Edward Yarrow, dec'd a brown cow and calf in Jan. 1645. The mutilated record was next to impossible to read, but it was evident that it had a provision that if Edward died before becoming twenty-one, something (I couldn't make out what) should take place. This proves Edward was a young boy.

Another record found on Reel 1A, Record 3, Wills, Orders, Deeds, Etc., 1657-1662, p. 28, was a court order dated 25 June 1658, stating:

It is ordered that the sherrif convey Edward Yarbrough, soine of Edward Yarbrough, dec'd, to the next court to be delivered to the constable and from that constable to another constable until he be delivered to Col. Robert Abrall, who is desired by this Court to dispose of him to his Mother or other ways which are fitting. Next Court to be 24 Aug. 1658.

A thorough search of other records of York County turned up nothing else on this Edward or any other Yarbrough. Perhaps Edward was taken to another county to live with his mother. Evidently he had been serving an apprenticeship as was customary in those days to teach children a trade.

CHRISTIAN YARBLOW, AN IMMIGRANT TO YORK CO., VIRGINIA


To confuse matters worse there seems to be another Yarbrough immigrant to York Co., VA. In Greer's EARLY VIRGINIA IMMIGRANTS 1623-1666, page 374, we find: In 1653 Christian Yarblow immigrated to York Co., Virginia. Thomas Willis was the patentee or party bringing him over.

For a time I completely ignored him because of the spelling of his surname. In fact when I first started my research, I ignored all spellings except two--Yarbrough and Yarborough--until I found my own Yarbrough ancestors spelled Yarbrow and Yarber.

Nell Morris Jenkins in her Yarbrough Quarterly stated that she believed this Christian to be Richard Yarbrough, Jr., son of Richard the Immigrant, his middle name being used to distinguish him from his father. When you examine the facts, however, this doesn't seem likely, for according to a New Kent County Court record, which will be quoted later, Richard Yarbrough, Jr., was born about 1652. A year old child wouldn't likely be coming to America without his mother or father, unless, of course, the mother had died in England and Mr. Willis was bringing him to his father. While searching the York County records, I found no mention of Christian, and I've not seen his name in any other county records.

AMBROSE YARBROUGH, AN IMMIGRANT TO VIRGINIA COLONY

Ambrose Yarbrough was born into the Yarbrough - de Bateson family of Yorkshire, England, in the year 1710. At age 22 he immigrated to the Virginia Colony. He went to Prince George County, VA, and joined his cousins, the descendants of Richard Yarbrough, in 1732. He later went to Culpepper County, Virginia, where a 68 acre tract of land was granted him in 1758. In 1776 Ambrose and wife Mary sold their 68 acres and moved to South Carolina. He died in Union County, South Carolina, in 788. Known children of Ambrose and Mary are: Jonathan, Ambrose, Jr., Humphrey, Ann, Jeremiah, Mary, and John.







Above: The Old Blandford Church built in 1735 on what was then known as Wells Hill in the town of Blandford. Today it is on U. S. Routes 301 & 460; Crater Road, Petersburg, Virginia.

Richard Yarbrough's grave is inside the walls of the church-yard some 15 or 20 feet from the second window from the left. His is the oldest grave in the cemetery. He was buried there over 30 years before the church was built. During the Civil War Confederate soldiers were buried on the gentle slopes just outside the churchyard so it has become a memorial chapel and Confederate Shrine.

RICHARD YARBROUGH, THE IMMIGRANT TO VIRGINIA COLONY

Richard Yarbrough, the Immigrant, has been left until last because more information is available on this line, and because I feel he is the immigrant from which our line descended.

A number of Yarbrough researchers have traced their lines to Richard Yarbrough, very few with documented proof. Most, like me, have arrived at their conclusions because of proximity and close association of their Yarbroughs and the previous assumption that all Yarbroughs found in the records before 1732 were from the immigrant Richard.

According to his tombstone inscription, Richard Yarbrough was born in 1615. He came to America as a young man. Researchers do not agree on the time nor the place of his arrival; however, since records show he was one of the founders of Bristol Parish in 1642, we can assume he came to that area sometime before that date.

Some researchers say Richard the Immigrant was married to Frances Proctor, to Elizabeth Williams, and perhaps to others. George W. Yarbrough, a former senator of Alabama who did years of Yarbrough research stated in one of his papers that Richard Yarbrough, Jr., swore in court that his mother was Frances Yarbrough; however, I have not been able to find this court record.

A record of marriage for a Richard Yarbrough and Frances Proctor has been found in the English records dated 1635, but there is, also, a record of the death of a Frances Yarbrough in the same parish dated 1680, which seems to indicate that this Richard and Frances remained in England and were not our immigrant ancestors.

Richard, the Immigrant, died in 1702, at age 87, and was buried on Wells Hill inside the original enclosure of the old Blandford Churchyard. The church is presently located inside the city limits of Petersburg, Virginia, on Carter Road.

On my first visit to Petersburg, I was disturbed to find the tombstone read "Richard Scarbrough, 1702, aged 87." I wondered if the notation I had read in the William and Mary Quarterly about Richard Yarbrough being buried in Blandford Churchyard was an error. However at the Blandford Church Interpretation Center I was informed that the sandstone marker had slowly worn away over the 275 years, requiring repairs to be made and in doing so the engraver mistakenly etched an "SC" instead of a "Y". They assured me they knew of the error. Later when I heard their audio-visual presentation relate how Richard Yarbrough and a few other settlers had ventured up the James River into the wilderness, I was satisfied.

Not long after this, Bob Yarbrough led Yarbrough descendants in raising money to have a corrective slab marker placed direcly in front of the original tombstone, which by then was too crumbly to be reengraved. When I returned to Petersburg in 1985 and revisited the grave, I experienced a deep feeling of pride when the guide at Blandford church pointed

out Richard Yarbrough's grave as the oldest in the cemetery and explained how the Yarbrough descendants had placed the second marker to correct the error. I was glad I'd had a small part in having it done.

According to the guide, the original church had been a wooden frame structure and for a time the cemetery had been confined to the church-yard; however, when that filled, graves were placed outside the walls as well. Then during the Civil War, heroic men who died in defense of the city of Petersburg against the Union army were buried on the gentle slopes back of the church.

The present brick church building, which was built in 1735, is now used as a memorial chapel and Confederate shrine in memory of these 30,000 Confederate soldiers buried there.

Children of Richard, according to the late Nelle Jenkins, were: William W., whose wife was Ellinor; Edmund; Henry; James; Charles; John, who married Abigail Whitehead in Gloucester Co., VA, 2 Feb. 1695; Richard, Jr., who was said to have married Elizabeth Mason and also a Miss Whitehead; and three girls. Some researchers, however, believe some of these are his grandchildren instead of his children.

A deed dated 20 May 1704 and recorded in both King William Co. and King and Queen Co., VA, proves that at least Richard and John were his sons. Extracts of the deed follow:

John Yarbrough of King William Co., planter, to William Aylett for 20 lbs. sterling and 5000 lb. tobacco, 200 acres in King William Co. Said land part of land formerly sold by the Chickahominy Indians to Arnold and by said Arnold then of King and Queen Co. to John Hurt, and by John Hurt sold to Richard Yarbrough, father of the said John, as by deed acknowledged in King and Queen County court 12 Feb. 1695 and is now in the possession of the said John Yarbrough, one half by virtue of a deed from his brother, Richard Yarbrough, and the other half as an heir to his father. Abigail Yarbrough relinquished her right of Dower in King William Court.

I, in cooperation with a group of Yarbrough researchers, have searched the early records of Virginia in an unsuccessful attempt to prove the parentage of these other Yarbroughs--William W., Edmund, Henry, James and Charles.

From SKETCHES OF VIRGINIA by Foote and from ENGLISH DUPLICATES OF LOST VIRGINIA RECORDS by Louis Cognets, Jr., we find the following early records for Richard Yarbrough and his sons, Richard, Jr., and John: (Note the spelling of Yarbrough.)

. . . And whereas severall parcells of Land were by the Pamunkey Indians for good and valuable consideration leased for 99 yeares to these severall persons hereafter named which Lands by the Order of Assembly at James City the 25th of April 1679 was granted to be confirmed unto them and that they should have the priority and first grant thereof when the same came to the King's hands. . .

Richard Yarborow, a tract, quantity not mentioned; John Yarborow for himselfe and the children and the devisees of Richard Yarborow;

James Edwards, Lewis Davis and Stephen Terry 1300 acres conveyed

Richard Yarborow; Henry Dilling in behalf of George Douglas, orphan and heir of Robert Douglas, dec'd, 200 acres purchased of Rich'd Yarbrow;

Wm. Rawlins 800 acres purchased of Richard Yarbrow; John Oakes 550 acres conveyed from Richard Yarbrow;

Wm Morris 300 acres from Rich'd Yarborow;

Thomas Henreck 300 acres purchased of Richard Yarborow and John Ascough;

Peter White 300 acres from Richard Yarbrow; Mackallaster 100 acres from Richard Yarbrough.

Either this land was in the area which became New Kent Co., VA, or Richard Yarbrough, Jr., moved to New Kent Co. for in the records of the House of Burgesses, the first representative body in America, we find the following on Richard Yarbrough of New Kent Co., VA.

At a Grand Assembly began at Green Spring, the 20th of Feb. 1676, these following Orders of Public charge were made and allowed viz. . . To Richard Yarberry 6,000 pounds of Tobacco. . .

Att a Generall Assembly begun att James Citty the 16th day of Apr. in the Thirty sixth years of His majties Raigne and in the years of our Lord 1684. These following Orders of Publique Charge and Levy were made. . . New Kent County. . . To Richard Yarburg for his service. . . severall tymes in discovering the Senerca Indians and other publique service with Coll Byrd 1620 pounds of tobacco. 10

Xber 7th 1685. . . The report has come from ye committee of Claimes, relating to ye New York and Albany charge is by ye house allowed and Mr. Augitor Bacon is desired to pay. . . To Richard Yarborough, Interpreter, for his voyage and services, 20 pounds. !!

At a Grand Assemblie held att James Cittie by prorogation from the one and twentieth day of September, in the year of our Lord 1674, to the Seaventh day of March in the eight and twentieth yeare of the reigne of our Soveraigne Lord Charles the second . . . An Act for the safeguard and defence of the country against the Indians. . . and forty one men out of the lower parts of New Kent County to be garrisoned at one fort or place of defence between Yerburyes houseand Chickahominy Indian Towne Landing on Mattapony River. . .

In "Jacobitism in Virginia" taken from the <u>Virginia Magazine of History and Biography</u>, Vol. VI, No. 4 (1899) pp. 389-96, is found a court action held in New Kent Co. Court, 9 Oct. 1690, in which Richard Yarbrough, Jr., and wife Elizabeth were witnesses against Capt. Jacob Lumpkin who had been reported by Ben Arnold for "expressing and publickly declaring divers Seditious turbulent and unlawfull words in contempt of their maj^{ties} and their present Governour. . "

According to the testimony of Ben Arnold, Lumpkin had not only refused to drink to their Majesties' health but had swore "God dam nim if he were here I would fight him." Richard and his wife's testimonies were as follows:

Richard Yarbrough, Aged 38 years or thereabouts, Sworne, Saith:
That your Depont being att ye house of Benjamin Arnold about ye
beginning of September last, in company with Severall p'sons
of ye neighbourhood & drinking their maj^{tles} health, King William
and Queen Mary, ye said Capt. Lumpkin refused to name them. . .
& in like manner refused to name the Govern's health being named
by severall of ye Company Govern' Nicholson's health, or move
his hat, but he mounted his horse & yo' Depon't being att some
distance heard ye said Capt. Lumpkin say with a loud voyce he
would fight ye Govern'. Whereupon ye said Joseph Clarke tooke
him up & threatened to beat him & alsoe pulled him off his
horse. And I heard noe more from him afterwards, and further
Saith not.

RICHARD YARBROUGH, his mark.

Elizabeth Yarbrough, wife of Richard Yarbrough, aged 34 years or thereabouts, Sworne, Saith that your Depont being att ye house of ye said Benjamin Arnold in ye Company afore mentioned did hear Capt. Jacob Lumpkin say with a loud voice as he satt upon his horse that he would fight ye Govern. And further Saith not.

ELIZABETH YARBROUGH, her mark.

Hath Sworne to in Court, New Kent, October ye 9th, 1690.

Test Job. Howes, Cl. Cur.

Pamunkey Neck, Mattapony River, Pamunkey River and Reedy Swamp are common landmarks regarding property of the early Yarbroughs. These land marks were in that part of New Kent County that was used to form King and Queen County, VA, in 1691. Following are some land grants in King, and Queen Co., which bear this out: 12

On 29 Oct. 1695, Edward Jennings, Esq. 570 acres in King and Queen Co. on south side Mattapony River on the line of Peter White and Rich'd Yarbrough. (Patent Book 9, p. 76.)

Andrew MacCallester 86 acres King and Queen Co. in Pamunkey Neck beginning on Mattapony River--corner of old Richard Yarbrough's whole tract leased of Pamunkey Indians.

Morris Floyd 100 acres King and Queen Co. in Pamunkey Neck; 1 April 1702. . .to Peter Whites corner and Rich'd Yarbrough's new ground. (Patent Book 9, p. 452.)

In 1702 part of King and Queen County was used to form King William County, VA, and the Mattapony River became the boundary between the two counties. A number of land grants and tax records show that the Yarbrough and lay in this area and that the Yarbroughs operated a ferry on the Mattapony River.

On Oct. 28, 1702, M. Rawlins, 933 acres in King William Co., St. John's Parish in Pamunkey Neck, adjacent Yarbrough's line. (Patent Book 9, page 505.)

In 1702, William Bird, 1200 acres from Yarbrough-Arnold Ferry up the Mattapony River.

From Smith's QUIT RENTS OF VIRGINIA 1704, we have the following Yarbroughs paying quit rents on land in King William Co., Virginia.

John Yarbrough, 150 acres. Richard Yarbrough, 300 acres.

Other King William records involving Yarbroughs:

May 30, 1704, John Yarbrough sold 200 acres in King William Co., to William Aylett. (Deed Book 1, p. 170.)

Nov. 8, 1704, Richard & Sarah his wife, sold to Robert Abbott 80 acres of land in King William Co. (Deed Book 1; page 231.)

May 2, 1705, Samuel Williams and William Lee received 400 acres in King William Co. on the south side run of Herring Creek. . .a little below the mouth of a branch that heads at Edward Yarbrough's plantation. (Patent Book 9, p. 649.)

May 2, 1706, John Hurt was granted 546 acres in King William Co., in Pamunkey Neck. . .down the Mattapony River by Rich'd Yarbrough's tobacco ground. (Patent Book 9, p. 733.)

A record which has puzzled me is a land grant to James Terry for 400 acres in King William County on the north side of Pamunkey River. . .16 Jule 1714 for the importation of eight persons including a Richard Yarbrough. (Patent Book 10) Is this another immigrant or did Richard Yarbrough, Jr., make a trip back to England?

During the 1720's we find the following Yarbroughs obtaining land grants in King William County, Virginia:

William Yarbrough, 400 acres of New Land in St. John's Parish on branches of Reedy Swamp of Mattapony River and the North Anna River adjacent Rober Baber, his own, Edward and William Yarbrough, Thomas Evans and land of Mr. English, 9 July 1724 for 40 shillings. (Patent Book 12, p. 56.) Also 250 acres new land in King William Co. in St. Margaret's Parish on north side of South Fork of South River on Frances Durrat's line, 31 Apr. 1726 for 25 shillings. (Patent Book 13, p. 27)

Edward and William, 400 acres new land in St. John's Parish on west side of Long Branch on Robert Baber and Cocecham's line, 20 Feb. 1723 for 40 shillings. (Patent Book 11, p. 330.)

Richard Yarbrough, 400 acres on north side of North Creek and on north side of South River in Richard Maulin's line in St. Margaret's Parish, 9 July 1724. (Patent Book 12, p. 57.) Also 400 acres on branch of Reedy Swamp issueing out of the Mattapony River and the branches of the North Anna in St. John's Parish adjacent to Edward Claybrook, Charles Evans,

and William and Edward Yarbrough's line, 3 October 1727, 40 shillings. (Patent Book 13,, page 283.)

Charles Yarbrough, 400 acres new land in St. Margaret's Parish on south side South River adjacent Richard Malden, 17 Aug. 1725, 40 shillings. (Patent Book 12, page 257.)

John Yarbrough, 400 acres new land in King William Co., in St. John's Parish, on north side of Reedy Swamp. . .adjacent John Sutton's line and Capt. Christopher Smith. . .17 Aug. 1725. (Patent Book 12, p. 259.)

Caroline County, VA, was formed from parts of King William, King and Queen, and Essex Counties in 1727/28. (1727 by the old style calendar in which the new year started in March and 1728 by the more modern calendar whereby the year began in January.) As a result the Reedy Swamp and the North Anna and South Rivers where part of the above mentioned Yarbrough land grants were located were now in Caroline County. The following grant for Edward Yarbrough proves this:

September 27, 1729, Edward Yarbrough, 200 acres new land in Caroline Co. between the south fork and middle fork of Reedy Swamp in St. Margaret's Parish. (Patent Book 13, page 300.)

Early records of New Kent, King and Queen, King William and Caroline Counties have been destroyed except the land grants, which are in the State Archives, and a few other records including the Caroline Co. Court Order Books. This loss of records makes it virtually impossible to prove irbrough lineages.

From one of the court records of Caroline Co., it is learned that a Richard Yarbrough of Caroline Co., VA, married Sarah Weller, widow of William Weller about 1747. However it hasn't been proven which Richard Yarbrough this is. Another obstacle to overcome is the fact that almost every Yarbrough line has a Richard, John, Edward, Henry, William, Thomas, etc. With so many Yarbroughs with the same given name, it is difficult to sort them out.

Other Yarbroughs found in the Caroline Co., Virginia, Court Order Books from 1728 to 1752 were: Richard, Jr., John, William and wife Diana, Charles, Edward and wife Eliza, Griggs, Thomas Griggs, Abraham, Thomas, Henry, James, Lazarius, Jeremiah, and Joshua Yarbrough. The last of these, Joshua Yarbrough, is the earliest Yarbrough ancestor of which I am reasonably sure.

In spite of the fact I have spent more time and effort on the Yarbrough line than all my other lines and have gathered a wealth of information, I have found no documentation or even convincing evidence determining the relationship of Joshua to the other Yarbroughs found with him in Caroline County, Virginia; however, researchers tend to agree they are all descendants of Richard I. All the previous information has been given to show that these Yarbroughs living in Caroline county are living in the same area as John, Richard, Jr., and other early Yaroughs, the counties have just changed names. We have proof that both John and Richard, Jr. are sons of Richard I, so we feel sure our Joshua was a descendant of this line of Yarbroughs.

JOSHUA AND SARAH YARBROUGH

The earliest record found for Joshua Yarbrough is in the Order Books of Caroline Co., VA, dated 15 Jan. 1736/7. Two entries are found for him on that day. In one Joshua, Abraham Yarbrough, and several other men were ordered to assist Henry Isabell in keeping the road repaired. In the other action, James Yarbrough was ordered to pay Joshua Yarbrough, Thomas Burch, and William Cockerham each 50 pounds of tobacco for two days attendance as a witness for him in his case against Barber and Mr. Butler

Joshua was, no doubt, a grown man at that time, probably at least 20 years of age which would mean he was born by 1716. In March 1737 he is found on the list of tithers of Orange Co., Virginia. Orange County had been created three years before from the county of Spotsylvania which had originally been part of King William, King and Queen, and Essex Counties, so Joshua hadn't moved far from Caroline County, Virginia.

Originally the colony of Virginia was divided into eight shires—Charles City, Elizabeth City, Henrico, Isle of Wright, James City, North-hampton, York, and Old Rappahannock (which was changed to Essex in 1692). As the populated areas expanded and the settlers found themselves too far from the county seat, they petitioned for a new county. It was carved out of one county or made from parts of several adjoining counties.

The only other Yarbrough found in Orange County during the time our Joshua was there was Richard Yarbrough whose wife was Rachel. He was in the 1737 Tithe List with Joshua, and on 22 Mar. 1737, he sold Joshua 213 acres of land on the south side of Robinson River in Orange County for 21.5 pounds. Richard's wife Rachel signed to relinquish her right of dower. This land was part of a 600 acre tract which Richard had bought from Richard Mauldin of St. Mark's Parish, Caroline Co., VA, for 60 pounds.

On 28 May 1741 Joshua Yarbrough of Orange Co., a planter, sold to Ambrose Powell for 40 pounds the 213 acres on the south side of Robinson River, which he had purchased from Richard Yarbrough. Joshua's wife Sarah signed relinquishing her right of dower. Though no marriage record has been found, this proves they married before 1741.

In March 1742 Richard Yarbrough and Rachel, his wife, sold Joshua 100 acres more land on Robinson River adjoining Joshua Fry and Ambrose Powell. On 5 Nov. 1743 Joshua sold the same 100 acres, described as being "the plantation on which Joshua lives" to Goodrich Lightfoot. Richard Yarbrough was one of the witnesses to the deed. 18

Orange County Court Order Books show Joshua appearing in court 13 times from March 1738 to May 1746. At times he was the plaintiff; other times he was being sued for a debt. Once he was reporting on a road which he and two other men had laid out to be built.

Richard Yarbrough was in court even more than Joshua; once he was a witness for Joshua; however, no other Yarbrough appeared in these early court records with them. The last entry for Joshua Yarbrough in these records proves that he had moved from Orange County before 1746.

Thursday 22 May 1746: Wm Waller, Gent., having obtained an attachment against the estate of Joshua Yarbrough who hath

privately removed himself out of this county or so absconded so that process cannot be served on him for three pounds current money due from said Joshua to the said William Waller. This day came the plaintiff who proved his demand to be just by his own oath; therefore, it is considered by the court that the plaintiff recover against the said defendant the said sum of three pounds and his costs. . . and Edward Spenser, Gent., appeared and being sworn saith that he is endebted to Joshua Yarbrough in the amount of three pounds seven shillings and three pence half penny which he is ordered to pay to the residue if any to the defendant.

Since Joshua had sold his last tract of land in 1743 and the last entry for him in the order books prior to the one above was, also, in 1743, Joshua appears to have simply moved rather than absconded to avoid a debt as implied in the entry above.

With Joshua and Richard so closely connected and the only Yarbroughs mentioned in Orange Co., VA, records until 1750, I naturally felt that perhaps Richard was Joshua's father and tried unsuccessfully to find the proof. I still feel it is a possibility; at least they were close kin.

From Orange Co., VA, Joshua moved to Amelia Co., VA. Amelia Co. was created from Brunswick and Prince George Counties in 1732. Prince George was the county in which Richard, the immigrant, had lived and died.

On 12 Jan. 1747 Joshua received a land grant of 400 acres which "lay on the head of Whetstone Creek in the fork of Nottoway River in Amelia County bordering the land of Thomas Yarbrough, Sr., and Thomas Yarbrough, Jr. Several other Yarbroughs, also, received land grants in Amelia Co., VA, during this period: William, 1739, 1740, and 1755; Henry and Thomas (a partnership) 1740; Samuel, Moses, William, and Hezekiah, 1746; Henry, 1745; and Thomas, 1745. All these tracts lay on Nottoway River.

Other Yarbroughs found in Amelia Co. deeds and court records for these years were: Charles, Ellinor wife of William, Richard, Richard, Jr., Sarah wife of Samuel, John and wife Betty, Joseph, Jordon, and Priscilla. Through wills and court records of Amelia County we are able to identify a number of these Yarbroughs.

William Yarbrough left a will which was recorded 16 Dec. 1748 in Amelia County Will Book I, p. 50. In it he names his wife Elliner and his children, Samuel Yarbrough, Ann Higgons, Carymhaporah Anderson, William Yarbrough, Hezekiah Yarbrough, Moses Yarbrough, Micajah Yarbrough, and Priscilla Yarbrough. Richard Yarbrough and Richard Yarbrough, Jr., witnessed the will.

We have no proof that either of these Richard Yarbroughs is the same as Richard Yarbrough of Orange Co., VA; however, we know William, Sr., is the same one found in King William Co., VA, earlier because in 1002 William Yarbrough sold Martin Chandler land in King William Co., a. Elliner his wife relinquished her right to dower. 21 Hezekiah, named as son in William's will, also, left a will in Amelia Co., recorded for probate 27 June 1754, leaving everything to his sister

Priscilla and his brother Moses Yarbrough; however, Moses died leaving a will recorded 22 Apr. 1756, Amelia Co., VA, giving all his estate to his sister Priscilla Yarbrough, so evidently these two brothers were unmarried when they died. Henry Yarbrough witnessed both these wills.

Samuel, another son of William, moved to Orange Co., NC, where he left a will probated 5 Nov. 1770, naming his wife, Sarah; children: William, Samuel, John, Elizabeth, Sarah, and Lewcey Yarbrough. Another son, William, Jr., remained in Amelia Co. and later lived in Prince Edward County which was formed from Amelia County in 1754. His will, recorded there in 1771, names sons: James Smith, Oswell, Joseph, Richard and William; and daughter, Elizabeth Yarbrough. No wife is named, but from Bristol Parish register and Caroline Co., VA, Order Books we learn his wife was Diana Smith and that she died 18 May 1767.

The last son of William Yarbrough, Sr., Micajah, is a mystery. A few researchers have suggested that he was probably father of my Joshua because Joshua named a son Micajah. During this time children were named for their parents, grandparents, and other relatives; however, I have abandoned this theory after thoroughly searching Amelia County records for this period without finding his name mentioned except in his father's will by which he inherited 400 acres. No record was found where he disposed on the land which is a puzzle for Amelia County records are well preserved.

Another will found in Amelia County, Virginia, is for Thomas Yarbrough recorded 23 Mar. 1769, naming his wife Hannah; children: Jordon, Archibald, Hannah, Mary, Jane, and Catherine Yarbrough and grandson Thomas Yarbrough. The son Jordon left a will recorded 25 Oct. 1770 in Amelia County, leaving all his property to his brothers and sisters, so he, too, died unmarried. (WB 2, p. 332) Thomas's other son Archibald lived on in Amelia and Prince Edward Counties with his wife Ann.

From Amelia County court records we learn that the father of Thomas's wife, Hannah, was Samuel Jordon and the father of Thomas Yarbrough was another Thomas Yarbrough. From Amelia County tax records we learn that Thomas Yarbrough, Sr., also, had sons, John and Zachariah. They were listed as his titheables in the tax lists of 1747 and 1749. Our Joshua Yarbrough was, also, listed in these same tax lists as head of a household, and since he earlier received land grants lying next to Thomas, Sr., and Thomas, Jr.'s, land, I am inclined to believe Joshua is an older son of Thomas Yarbrough, Sr., which would possibly make him a great grandson of Richard, the immigrant, because most researchers believe that Thomas, Sr., was son of Richard Yarbrough, Jr., and grandson of Richard Yarbrough, the immigrant. No proof, however, has been found.

On 20 Oct. 1749 Joshua sold the 400 acres he had received as a land grant in Amelia County to Richard Stone for the sum of 20 pounds current money of Virginia. Joshua's wife Sarah "being examined privately relinquished her right of dower. (Deed Book 3, p. 295)

The next record found for Joshua Yarbrough was in 1754 when he was listed in Captain Surgar Jones's Company of Granville Co., NC, Militia. A year later both Joshua and John Yarbrough are listed on the Granville Co. tax list. In 1758 Joshua is again listed on the tax list and paid

tithes on his sons, Joshua, Jr., and Micajah. In 1766 he lists James as his son on the tax list. Tithes had to be paid on sons beginning at age 16. We know from the tax lists that Joshua had at least three sons.

Joshua, Sr., received two land grants in Granville County in 1761. Grant #116 was issued 29 July 1761 for 700 acres on the south side of Shocco Creek. (Book 14, p. 109) Grant #156 was issued 5 Dec. 1761 for 700 acres on both sides of Mill Stone run. (Book 14, p. 109) Samuel Yarbrough, also, received a land grant for 260 acres in 1760. John, Manoah, and Henry Yarbrough bought land in Granville Co. before 1760. Manoah was, also, listed in the tax list as son of Thomas Yarbrough.

Soon after getting his grants, Joshua began selling tracts of land from it. Sept. 5, 1761, he sold Thomas Davis 379 acres on Shocco Creek. March 28, 1763, he sold Joshua Nelms 250 acres on Millstone River. On 23 Jan. 1764 he sold his son Micajah Yarbrough 150 acres on Sliding Rock Branch on John Yarbrough's line. Joshua, Jr., witnessed this deed.

In 1764 Bute Co. was formed from that part of Granville County where the Yarbroughs lived and in 1766 Joshua sold 280 acres more of his land to Eley Eley with Green Hill, Manoah Yarbrough and James Yarbrough as witnesses. Then on 3 Aug. 1766 he sold 120 acres where the lived to Green Hill. Eley Eley and Micajah Yarbrough were witnesses. I feel that these to whom he sold land were his sons-in-law or grandsons.

In the 1771 tax list of Bute Co., NC, the following were listed:

James Yarbrough, 1 poll; Henry Yarbrough, Jr., 1; Richard Yarbrough, 1;

James Yarbrough, 6; Micajah Yarbrough, 1; James Yarbrough, 1; Joshua, 2;

Zachariah, 1. Yarbroughs found in other records of Granville and Bute

Counties which haven't been mentioned were: Littleton Yarbrough, John

and wife Elizabeth, Martha wife of Henry Yarbrough, Thomas and Charles.

Except for the three children already mentioned--Joshua, Jr., James, and Micajah--we aren't sure how Joshua is related to the others. Some may, also, be his children; others may be brothers; at least, they must all be closely related, so we've tried to learn something about each of them.

An article on the Yarbrough family, printed in the Lexington, NC, Dispatch, January 5, 1898 states: "Between the years 1729 and 1775, seven brothers of Yarbroughs (from Amelia Co., VA) moved to Louisburg, Franklin Co., North Carolina. Their names were Zachariah, Archibald, Manoah, Alexander, Thomas, Henry, and John." Since over a hundred years had passed between the migration of Yarbroughs and the publication of the article, we must view the story as family legend and probably not completely accurate.

True we have convincing evidence that Zachariah, Manoah, John and Thomas are brothers and all four names are found in Granville and Bute County records; however, the Thomas found in Granville Co. wasn't the brother Thomas. As mentioned before their brother Thomas left a will in Amelia County. Furthermore tax records list Thomas Yarbrough of Granville County as father of Manoah, so that proves an error. Also ther Alexander nor Archibald have been found in the early records of these counties, but Joshua was there and I can't help believing he was one of the brothers.

The last record found for Joshua Yarbrough, Sr., was 1780 in Franklin Co., NC, which was formed from part of Bute Co. in 1778. Joshua was living by his son Micajah. He probably lived on there until his death which must have been before 1790 as he isn't in the 1790 Franklin Co., NC, census. Information on other Yarbroughs living with Joshua in Granville and Bute Counties follows:

Henry Yarbrough, Sr., and wife Martha Robinson, found in Amelia County, VA, by 1739; bought land in Granville Co., NC, in 1760 while still living in Virginia. He died intestate in Franklin Co., NC, between 1790 and 1800. He is said to have children: James, Henry, Charles, Edward, Thomas, Clement and two daughters.

Henry Yarbrough, Jr., and wife Elizabeth Murray, Henry, son of Henry, Sr., and Martha Yarbrough, left a will in Franklin Co., NC, probated June 1794. (WB A, p. 123) Children: Archibald, Charles, David, Henry, James, Thomas, Nancy, Frances, and Martha.

James Yarbrough, son of Henry Yarbrough, Sr. in Franklin Co. until 1800.

Manoah Yarbrough, was in Granville Co., NC, by July 1756; moved to Georgia in 1769 according to a petition he filed requesting a land grant in St. George's Parish in May 1770. Littleton and Thomas were in the same parish by 1790. They are possibly his sons.

Zachariah Yarbrough, listed in Amelia Co. tax list in 1747 and 1749 as a titheable of Thomas Yarbrough, Sr.; came to Bute Co. before 1771; then to Rowan Co. and finally to Randolph Co., NC, where he made entry for a land grant in 1795 which he received in 1802. He is said to have married Elizabeth Dowd and had children: Zachariah, Jr., Henry, Thomas, Alexander, Manoah, Julia, Elizabeth, Archibald, and John.

John and wife Elizabeth Yarbrough, moved from Amelia Co., VA, before 1755. John was son of Thomas Yarbrough, Sr. According to George W. Yarbrough, a descendant, they moved to Fairfield Co., SC, where he died in 1816. Children: Jesse, Moses, Arthur, Thomas, Martha, Joseph, Richard and Nancy.

Micajah Yarbrough, son of Joshua and Sarah, received a warrant for 100 acres by improvement on branches of Mill Stone in Bute Co., NC, adjacent to his own line and his father Joshua Yarbrough's line on 24 Jan. 1778. On 10 Oct. 1783 he received a grant for 100 acres in Franklin Co., NC, on the waters of Sandy Creek. (Grant Book 52, p. 179) He was found in Franklin Co. as late as 1810. He had sons: Micajah, Jr., Joshua, Shadrick and perhaps others.

James Yarbrough, son of Joshua and Sarah, was last found in Bute Corecords in 1770. Evidence leads me to believe he is the James Yarbrough who in 1784 received a grant of 287½ acres in Franklin Co., Georgia, for Revolutionary War services. This James and his eldest son were killed by Indians not long after settling in Georgia. Heirs to his land, which we assume are his children, were: Groves, Joshua, Susanna, Mary, John, Jeremiah, Elizabeth and the wives of Anderson Berry and Jesse Bowden. The fact that one of his sons was named Joshua and that three Yarbroughs thought to be James's brother, Joshua, Jrs.'s sons—Gideon, Jeptha, and Benjamin joined the family in Franklin Co., GA, by 1804 convinces me that this James is indeed James, son of Joshua and Sarah.

JOSHUA YARBROUGH II

Joshua Yarbrough, Jr., the son of Joshua, Sr., and Sarah Yarbrough, was born by 1741 we are sure because he was listed as a tithable of his father in 1758 and he had to be over 16 to be taxable.

Joshua, Jr., was last found in Granville Co., NC, when he witnessed a deed for his father in 1764. He was next found witnessing a deed for Harvey Hargett 11 Oct. 1774 in Anson Co., NC. In 1778 he made entry for a land grant in Mecklenburg Co., NC, which lies next to Anson Co. Joshua ended up receiving the following grants in Mecklenburg Co., NC.

Grant 521, Book 53, p. 287, F 3426, 100 acres on the Onion Fork of Richardson Creek. Entry was made in 1779 and the grant issued 2 Nov. 1784. Chain bearers for the surveyor was Thomas Vinson and Benjamin Yarbrough.

Grant 891, Book 76, p. 218, F 3790, 150 acres on both sides of Onion Branch, a branch of Richardson Creek; entered 1778 and received 17 Nov. 1790. Chain bearers were James Nelms and Joshua Yarbrough.

Grant 123, Book 42, p. 217, F 2967, 400 acres lying on both sides of the Onion Fork of Richardson Creek; received 1 Mar. 1780.

Grant 75, Book 42, p. 217, F 2967, 200 acres on both sides of Phillips Spring Branch of Richardson Creek joining the place on which the said Joshua Yarbrough lives. Received 1 Mar. 1780.

Grant 1292 for 300 acres on the waters of Richardson Creek adjoining land of Edward Richardson, May Odom and Reubin Yarbrough; entered 1791 and issued 28 Aug. 1795 and surveyed 5 Dec. 1794 with H. Vinson and Reubin Yarbrough as chain bearers.

Grant 2133, Book 126, p. 38, 150 acres lying on the waters of Richardson Creek, including the plantation where Shem Yarbrough now lives; entered 21 Sept. 1810, issued 4 Dec. 1811.

Although there were thirty Yarbrough families in North Carolina in the 1790 census, Joshua Yarbrough was the only one listed as head of a household in Mecklenburg County. Besides himself, there were two boys over sixteen years of age, three under sixteen and one woman in the household. The woman is undoubtedly his wife whose name we haven't learned. Since very few North Carolina marriage records before 1800 are in existence, it is not surprising that Joshua's hasn't been found.

Nine Yarbrough families were found with Joshua in the 1800 Mecklenburg Co. census. He is now listed as Joshua Yarbrough, Sr., as he has a son Joshua, Jr. He is in the age group 45 and above. His wife was in the same age group and with them were two boys below 10, one in the age group 16-26, and two girls under 10. Other Yarbroughs listed as heads of useholds were: Charles, John, Joshua, Jr., Benjamin, Edmond, Gideon, ptha, Rubin, and William. All were in the age group 26-45 except Joshua, Jr., and Gideon. They were between 16-26.

No proof has been found as to which of these Yarbroughs are sons of this Joshua Yarbrough, Sr., who will be referred to as Joshua II from now on to distinguish him from his father and son; however, since Joshua Yarbrough II's land all lay on Richardson Creek, and Reuben, Benjamin, Gideon, Jeptha, and Joshua III lived on the same creek and witnessed each other's deeds, it seems almost certain that at least they are his sons, although it is possible some of them may be his younger brothers.

By 1820 all of these Yarbroughs listed in the 1800 Mecklenburg Co. census had moved on to other newer lands. To aid future researchers, each will be discussed briefly.

Jeptha Yarbrough, born about 1763 in Granville Co., NC. His name was first found in the 1798 Tax List of Mecklenburg Co. North Carolina, which shows him with one white poll, no blacks and no land; futhermore, the land records don't show him receiving a land grant or buying any land. He did witness a deed in 1798 whereby Joshua, Sr., sold Gideon Yarbrough 200 acres on the north side of Onion Fork of Richardson Creek, and then in 1799 he witnessed the deed whereby Gideon sold the same 200 acres to Joshua Yarbrough, Jr. 25

Jeptha moved from Mecklenburg Co., North Carolina, to Franklin Co., Georgia, soon after 1800. A deed dated 9 Apr. 1804 shows Jeptha Yarbour of Franklin Co., Georgia, buying 143 acres from Moses Allred. The land was located on Little Nails Creek of Hudson River in Franklin Co., GA, and was described as "land on which Jeptha Yarber now lives and adjoining his brother Gideon Yarber's land." (Deed Book PP, pages 23 and 33)

There were several other deeds for Jeptha in Franklin Co., Georgia. The last one dated 15 Apr. 1813 shows he had moved to Randolph Co., GA, and was selling the remainder of his Franklin Co., GA., land. This land is described as being adjacent Benjamin Yarbrough, so evidently Benjamin, Jeptha, and Gideon all moved to Franklin Co., Georgia, where James Yarbrough's family lived.

Later Jeptha was found in Jasper Co., Georgia, but by 1840 he had moved to Chambers Co., Alabama. In 1850 both he and his wife Nancy Ann were listed in the Chambers County census as being 78 years old. Jeptha was born in North Carolina and his wife was born in Georgia.

According to the family Bible of Franklin Yarbrough, Jeptha died 12 Nov. 1853 and Nancy Ann died 3 Apr. 1857. No proof of the names of their children has been found, but since their deaths were recorded in Franklin's Bible and they were listed together in the Chambers County, Alabama, census we assume Franklin is a son. Jeptha Yarbrough, Jr., and William Yarbrough were, also, listed in the same census and are probably sons too. Census records show Jeptha had at least 12 children, 8 sons and 4 daughters. Some researchers think Reuben Yarbrough listed in the 1850 Coosa Co., Alabama, census is, also, his son.

Gedion Yarbrough, born about 1780, NC (probably Mecklenburg Co.); had a wife and son in the 1800 census. He married second Nancy Scarbrough 20 Sept. 1810 in Burke Co., GA. A deed proves Gedion was in Franklin Co., GA, by 1804. By 1820 he was in St. Tammany Parish, LA,

and was found in Washington Parish by 1830. Gideon fought in the War of 1812, being discharged in Mar. 1815 at New Orleans. On 6 June 1833 Gideon, at age 73, applied in Orleans Parish, LA, for bounty land. He died between then and 18 Sept. 1856, for on that date his wife Nancy of Washington Parish, LA, aged 66 years, applied for bounty land under the Act of 14 May 1856, as the widow of Gideon Yarbrough for his service in the war. In her application we learn the date of their marriage and that her maiden name was Nancy Scarbrough.

Benjamin Yarbrough was first found in Mecklenburg Co., NC, in 1794 when he made entry for a land grant for 50 acres which he received in 1802. He received another grant for 230 acres in 1799. Both tracts of land lay on the waters of Richardson Creek. (Bk. 100, p. 407)

As mentioned before Benjamin Yarbrough was in Franklin Co., GA, with Jeptha and Gideon. He was found in Washington Co., GA, in the 1820 census, and in 1830 he was listed as between 70 and 80 in Telfair Co., GA. This means he was born before 1760, so he may be the son of Joshua I and a brother to Joshua II. Evidently Benjamin married a daughter of William Vinson before 1797, for in his will Vinson named Benjamin Yarbrough's three children, Vinson Yarbrough, Susannah Yarbrough, and Eliza Mary Yarbrough. The will was dated 26 Sept. 1797. On 3 Oct. 1797 Benjamin married Miss Hartgrave (first name not given) in Mecklenburg Co.

Edmond Yarbrough made entry for a land grant of 188 acres on Adder branch of Waxbaw Creek, Mecklenburg Co., NC, in Aug. 1789. He received it 22 Nov. 1792. (Grant 991, Book 14, p. 342) He received another grant 8 May 1823. (Grant 2352, Book 17, p. 349) He moved to Perry Co., TN, before 1830. Later he was found in Decatur Co. which was made from Perry Co. His known children were: Aquila, Henry, James, William, Nancy, Joseph, and John H. Yarbrough. Wife was Sophia Goswick.

William Yarbrough witnessed two deeds for Joshua II--one when Joshua sold land to Reuben Yarbrough, and then when he sold land to Thomas Vincent. According to a descendant, the late Ida Walling, William was born about 1766 and married Rachael Shelby 1793, Mecklenburg Co. (No record found in the courthouse) and moved first to White Co., TN, and then to Hardeman Co., TN. Their known children: Sarah, Benjamin, Hampton, Jeptha, William, George, Hulda, John, Susanna, and Reuben.

Joshua III was found in the 1797 and 1798 Mecklenburg Co. Tax List. On 5 Dec. 1799 he purchased 200 acres of land "lying at the head of Joshua Yarborough, Seniors, Spring Branch and Meeting House Spring Branch which includes the plantation on which said Gedion Yarborough now lives." In the 1800 census Joshua, Jr. is listed as between 16 and 26, and his wife is in the same age group. Their son is under 10 years of age.

Joshua III left Mecklenburg Co., NC, and is found buying land in Chester Co., SC, in 1811. A deed dated Feb. 1812 proves his wife's name was Elizabeth. In 1824 Joshua sold the remainder of his land to his son Uriah and moved to Georgia. On 25 Jan. 1825 he bought land in Fayette Co., GA. Jepthah Yarbrough, J.P., was one of the witnesses. We know this is the same Joshua for it says Joshua Yarbrough of Chester Co., SC. (Fayette Co., GA, Deed Book A, page 316).

Joshua III died 1844 in Campbell Co., GA. By then he had married again for he names his wife Nancy Yarborough; sons: James, Joshua T., Thomas J., Uriah, Greenberry, George, Charles. Daughters: Elizabeth, Sarah, Elender, and ? (illegible).

It is not known if Joshua II remained in Mecklenburg until his death or if he went with Joshua III to Chester Co., SC. In the 1810 census of Chester Co. a Jos. Yarbrough, Sr., and Jos. Yarbrough, Jr., were listed. The age groups were right to be Joshua II and Joshua III, but Jos. usually stands for Joseph; however, on checking the deed index I found no Joseph buying or selling land. Only one Joshua was listed in the 1820 Chester Co. Census, so what happened to Joshua II is a mystery.

Shadrack Yarbrough was not in the 1800 census, but he appeared on the 1799 Tax List. Since Joshua, Sr., had a boy at home between 16 and 26 in 1800 and also two boys and two girls below 10, it could be that Shadrack had lost his wife and was living with his parents. However he could have been a bachelor.

Shadrack made entry for land in Mecklenburg Co. 22 Feb. 1792 and received 200 acres on 12 Apr. 1798. (Grant Book 98, p. 68) The land was located on the waters of Richardsons Creek. He made another entry 2 Jan. 1793 and received 72 acres on waters of Cain Creek on 9 Mar. 1799. He received a third grant from the state for 200 acres on Richardson Creek on Dec. 22, 1800. On June 21, 1802 Shadrack sold 72 acres on Waxhaw Creek to Peter Presly.

Shadrack remained in Mecklenburg until after 1840. He undoubtedly died there, for the court records show Ezekiel and Micogen were appointed administrators of his estate in Mecklenburg Co.

Shem Yarbrough was first found in Mecklenburg Co. in 1798 when he witnessed a deed for Joshua, Sr., when he sold land to Gideon Yarbrough. For some reason Shem was also left off the 1800 census, but in 1810 he was listed as between 26 and 45 with one son and three daughters below ten years old. His wife was also between 26 and 45.

In 1810 Joshua Yarbrough made entry for 150 acres on Richardson Creek and received it 4 Dec. 1811. The land was described as "lying on the south side of Beaverdam Creek where Shem Yarborow now lives.

This is the last entry for Joshua Yarbrough and we wonder if this land was given to Shem, for Shem lived on in Mecklenburg County until after 1840. In 1850 he is listed in the Washington Co., TN, census with a wife Nelly. She is 76 and Shem is 75. Children listed are Eulin, 15; Polly, 12; Clinton, 11; Dicy, 8. Perhaps they are grandchildren since they are too old to have such young children. Listed next door is a Jeptha Yarborough, age 52, who was listed with Shem in the 1840 Mecklenburg Co. census. He has wife Elizabeth, 36; children, Alonza, 18; Francis M. 16; Talbot C., 14; Lucinda, 11; Middleton M., 6; Burt R., 3. Also listed with him is a William Yarbrough, 39, who was also in the

REUBEN YARBROUGH, our ancestor, will be discussed in the next part.

REUBEN AND REBECCA YARBROUGH

The earliest record found so far for Reuben Yarbrough, our great great grandfather, was July 1788 when he witnessed a deed by which Joshua Yarbrough sold Thomas Vinson land in Mecklenburg Co., North Carolina.

In 1791 Reuben made an entry at the land office for a state land gran in Mecklenburg County. Two grants were issued—#1406 issued 12 April 1798 for 250 acres on both sides of Beaver Dam Fork of Richardson Creek. (Book 98, page 76.) The second grant was #1404 issued 12 April 1798 for 100 acres on the waters of Richardson Creek. (Book 98, page 74.)

A note dated 25 July 1797 was with the grant. It states, "Joshua Yarbrough and James Doster appeared in open court and made oath that they paid the purchase money for 350 acres of land into the Entry Takers office on behalf of Reuben Yarbrough." This convinced me that Joshua is indeed Reuben's father. Perhaps James Doster is his father-in-law. . .

Besides the 350 acres Reuben received in land grants, he purchased 250 acres from John Hodges. All this land lay on Richardson Creek in Mecklenburg Co., North Carolina.

From deeds we know Reuben's wife was Rebecca, but since no marriage record has been found, her last name is unknown. Reuben wasn't listed in the 1790 census which is a puzzle because he was undoubtedly married before then, for the 1800 census shows him with two daughters over 10; three daughters under 10 and three sons under 10. Both Reuben and wife, Rebecca were listed as being between 26 and 45.

On 21 June 1802 both Reuben and Rebecca Yarbrough signed a deed selling Jacob Broom the 250 acres on Beaver Dam Fork of Richardson Creek which he had gotten as a land grant. Rebecca must have died sometime between the date of this deed and the 1810 census because there is not a female listed in her age group. Since there were five children under 10, we can assume she died of child birth as many women of those days did. The fact she didn't sign two other deeds Reuben made selling land in Mecklenburg Co. bears out the fact that she died. With the five children born between 1800 and 1810 added to the eight shown in the 1800 census makes thirteen children born to Reuben and wife.

In 1820 Rubin Yarber is found in Maury Co., TN, census. Either he had remarried or some of his married children or a housekeeper with children was living in the household for now there is a female over 45, three females 26-45, three females 16-25, one female 10-16, one male over 45, one male 26-45, two males 18-25, one male 16-18, two males 10-16, and one male under 10--a total of 16 in the household. That same year Reuben bought two tracts of land in Bedford Co., TN, where he was living when he sold the rest of his land in Mecklenburg Co., NC. Both deeds refer to him as Reuben Yarbrough of Bedford Co., TN, proving it is the same Reuben Yarbrough who formerly lived in Mecklenburg Co., NC.

It hasn't been determined the time nor mode of transportation Reuben used in moving from Mecklenburg Co., NC, to Maury Co., TN; however, according to FISHER SCRAPBOOK, Jacob Fisher who married Charlotte Yarbrough in Mecklenburg Co. came to Maury Co., TN, on a flat boat down the French

Broad River in 1814. Evidence indicates Charlotte was a daughter of our Reuben instead of Joshua as suggested by the author of FISHER SCRAPBOOK. He gave her birth date as 1785, making her 15 in 1800. Reuben had a daughter in that age group in the 1800 census of Mecklenburg Co., while Joshua didn't. He had two females under 10 and one over 45 years of age.

Perhaps Reuben and family came to Tennessee on the flat boat with the Fisher family. On the other hand they may have come by ox-cart. In the Marysville, Kansas, Advocate, dated 11 June 1908, we find the obituary of Williamson F. Boyakin, whose mother was Millie Yarbrough. It states that the 100-year-old Boyakin had moved, at age one, with his parents from Anson Co., NC, to Maury Co., TN, in a caravan consisting of "100 two-wheeled carts of primitive construction, not a pound of iron being used in the whole outfit." The trip was made in 1807, so since Reuben was still in Mecklenburg County (which lies next to Anson Co.) until after 1810, he couldn't have gone on that trip, but perhaps there were other ox-cart caravans which made the same trip later.

Reuben Yarber was the only Yarbrough in the 1820 Maury Co., TN, census, but in 1830 he was listed in Bedford Co. census along with Joel, Sampson, and Jacob Yarbrough. In 1836 Marshall Co. was formed, taking in that part of Bedford County where the Yarbroughs lived, so in that county's first census of 1840, D. H. Yarboro, George Yarboro, Joel Yarboro, Ruben Yarboro and Sampson Yarboro were listed. This Ruben, however, wasn't Reuben, Sr. This Ruben was listed in the 20-30 age group. Reuben, Sr., is not listed. He is thought to be living in the household of D. H. Yarbrough for he has an elderly man living in his household. All the above mentioned Yarbroughs are thought to be sons of Reuben, Sr. By the census we know he had at least seven sons.

In the 1850 census (the first one in which wives and children are named) we find the families of George, Joel, Rheuben, Jr., and Doctor H. In this census the spelling was Yarbrow. Reuben, Sr., is living with the George Yarbrough family and is listed as age 83 and born in North Carolina. George, Joel, Rheuben, Jr., and Doctor H. were, also born in North Carolina.

Reuben, Sr., wasn't found in the 1860 census, so evidently he died between 1850 and 1860. No will or estate records have been found, probably because he had already disposed of all his property; therefore, we have no proof of the names of his children; however, in the biography of George Yarbrough's son, Jasper, found in Goodspeed's HISTORY OF MARSHALL COUNTY, TENNESSEE, we learn George's father had 14 children. Since census records show Reuben had at least 13 children (in 1820 there were 14, but he had a new wife so some of them may have been hers) and is the only Yarbrough living in the area who had that many children and the fact he was living in the household of George Yarbrough seems to be adequate proof he is the father of George Yarbrough, our great grandfather, and, also, the others listed with him in the census. Children of Reuben and Rebecca of which we are reasonably sure are:

I. CHARLOTTE YARBROUGH, born 1785 in North Carolina; married to Jacob Fisher about 1805, Mecklenburg Co., NC. They moved to Tennessee in 1814 and lived neighbors to Reuben Yarbrough in Maury and Bedford Counties. She died in 1822 in childbirth. Their children were:

- John Fisher, born 17 Sept. 1806.
- Rebecca Fisher, born 1808; married Moses Helm 1828; died 1887.
- Fredrick Fisher, born 1810, died in Missouri.
- George Washington Fisher, born 1812; married three times; lived in Verona, Marshall Co., TN.

It should be re-emphasized that no actual proof has been found that the above are Reuben Yarbrough's children; however, there is enough evidence to convince me they are. The following may, also, be his children, but there is less evidence to support that theory.

- VIII. James Yarbrough, married Elizabeth Fisher 9 June 1833. During the settlement of Fredrick Fisher's estate in 1934, James Yarbrough and wife received one bed and furniture valued at \$20.00; one saddle at 17 dollars; and \$10 cash. No further information.

 - X. Rebecca Yarbrough, married Josiah Luallen, 24 Mar. 1813, Maury Co., TN. No further information.

The fact that these last four Yarbroughs married in Maury County during the period that Reuben Yarbrough was living in that area is the only reason to think they might be his children; also, the fact that he had several grown daughters and sons in the 1820 census who were gone in 1830.

Below is the biography of Jasper Yarbrough found on page 1232 of the Goodspeed History of Marshall County, Tennessee, which is one of the reasons I feel sure that Reuben is the father of George Yarbrough.

JASPER A. YARBROUGH, register of Marshall County, is a son of George and Nancy E. (Gibbons) Yarbrough. The father was born in North Carolina and the mother in Tennessee. They were married in Tennessee, and their family consisted of ten children. Jasper's maternal grandparents had twenty-six children and his paternal had fourteen. Both our subject's parents were members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The father was a well-to-do farmer and had the honor of furnishing three brave boys for the war, one of whom was killed. The father lived to be about seventy-six and the mother about seventy-four. Our subject, who was born November 7, 1839, in Marshall County, is a man three feet and nine and a half inches in height. He was reared on the farm and received a practical education in the common schools. Having picked up the shoe-maker's trade he worked at it for about eight years, besides teaching school. He was always a very handy workman and could make a suit of clothes, knit a pair of socks, or almost anything he turned his hand to. In 1874 he was elected register, and has held that position ever since with ability and to the satisfaction of the people. In 1881 he wedded Lizzie McKee. The fruits of this union were three children, two of whom are living. Mr. and Mrs. Yarbrough are members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He has been a citizen of Marshall County for forty-six years. In politics he is a warm Democrat.

GEORGE W. YARBROUGH AND NANCY E. GIBBONS

George Yarbrough, born 15 Feb. 1807, NC; married Nancy E. Gibbons, daughter of Thomas Gibbons, 24 July 1828; died 1878, at age 71, Marshall County, Tennessee. Nancy was born 20 Apr. 1808, TN; died 1880, at age 72. (See Gibbons section.) They are both buried in the Ligget-Andrews Cemetery, Franklin Road, near Lewisburg, Marshall Co., TN.

The first time George's name appears in county records was when he witnessed a deed for his brother in 1826. Joel Yarbrough of Bedford Co., TN, was buying 50 acres from Fredrick Fisher of Maury Co. The land was described as being on the Sinking Branch of Rock Creek, on the south side of Duck River in Bedford County, Tennessee. (Book Y, page 253)


Two years later George and Nancy were married probably in Bedford County where the Yarbroughs lived or White County where the Gibbons lived at that time. Since both county's early marriage records have been destroyed, the only record found of their marriage was the family Bible records. Because of the loss of records it is difficult to document much of the Yarbrough information. No actual proof has been found that George was son of Reuben, but there seems little doubt for the following reasons:

The biography of George's son Jasper which appears in Goodspeed's HISTORY OF MARSHALL COUNTY, TENNESSEE states that Jasper's father was one of 14 children, and as stated previously, census'records show Reuben as the only Yarbrough in the area with that many children. Then, too, a son was shown in Reuben's household in the age group in which George would be in every census until the time of George's marriage, then he was gone, but was listed as head of his own household in the same census with Reuben. The fact that Reuben was living with George's family in 1850, and both men were born in North Carolina seems to be conclusive evidence.

The first record we have of George buying land was in Marshall Co. when he bought 95 acres from his father-in-law, Thomas Gibbons, 18 Aug 1838. Both men were of Marshall Co., and the land was described as being on Rich Creek in Marshall County. D. H. Yarbrough was one of the witnesses. (Book B, page 301

From that date until his death in 1878, George had 15 land transactions in Marshall County. He was engaged in farming all his life; however, in the 1860 Marshall Co. census he was listed as a "common school teacher," so evidently he taught school some too. The Yarbrough family was a close neighbor to the Devin family, and James (Jimmy) Devin, when just a young boy, worked on the farm for George Yarbrough.

Three of George and Nancy's boys--John Fletcher, Rufus, and George W., Jr.--fought for the Confederacy. Rufus died in the conflict; yet if it caused the family to feel any bitterness toward the North, it wasn't passed on to their descendants. Perhaps it was because George and Nancy were devout Christians. They belonged to the Methodist Church. It is said that George wouldn't own slaves. He always said a person couldn't make any money on them if they were treated as they should be treated, and he wasn't about to treat them any other way.
