Preface

These records are the legacy of our Yarbrough family researchers, to whom much is owed. The known family researchers include Jean Baker, Ann Y. Broadbent, Mary Y. Daniel, Frances (Rea) Donohue, Betty Humrighouse, Pauline Gray, Evelyn Goble, Nelle Morris Jenkins, Ophelia Kessler, Frances Lockwood, Karen Mazock Renee Smelley, Dorothy Svec, Jeanette Wilson, Cleveland “Cy” Yarborough, Edna Yarbrough, George A. Yarbrough, and Robert Price Yarbrough.

The originals of these volumes are being kept for the benefit of future generations by the Williamson County Library, Franklin, Tennessee.

No claims of accuracy or authentication of the material herein are made or may be assumed. Many of these records have been superseded by subsequent research. Hence, there are records which are erroneous and unreliable; it would have been a Herculean task to attempt to correct all of them. Fortunately, there are only a few critical genealogical facts that are involved, and which are correctly stated here:

- Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough was never married to Frances Proctor;
- Ambrose Yarbrough did not immigrate from Yorkshire; he is now believed to be a descendant of Richard the Immigrant;
- There are so far only two proven sons of Old Richard – John and Richard II;
- There is so far no evidence proving Joshua Yarborough I to be a descendant of Old Richard.
- The “Old Country” referred to in old documents and letters is the Colony of Virginia, not England or the Old World.
- There were not seven brothers who immigrated from “the old country”; in fact, it now appears there were three brothers and four sons of the brothers. Which were the fathers and which were the sons are so far unknown.

In spite of these inaccuracies, these records comprise much of our history and some of our accomplishments. There are pages whose print quality is so poor that word recognition was not possible. In spite of that, at least partial capability for searching these volumes is provided, as well as an index to each volume. Nonetheless, the viewer is cautioned to perform his/her own due diligence in connection with any use of this material.

The various spellings of the Yarbrough surname have never been applied consistently, even within a given family. To the extent possible, the names in the index reflect the names used on the source pages; where it wasn't clear as to which might be the proper spelling, the spelling used is “Yarbrough”.

John A. married Harriet Rebecca Winchester and lives at the old Plott home on Plott's Creek; Laura Emma, who married James Elisha Hyatt and moved to the State of Washington; Lona Lee, who became Mrs. Alfred Felix Roels, of Tampa, Florida; Kowa Waklin, who married J. Lee Medford and moved to Washington State; Una V., who is a teacher at Old Fort; George Fred, who married Jimmie Queen and lives on the Fairview road; Robert Ellis, who married Carrie Praytor and moved to Kansas; Ola Frances, who married Romulus Davidson Ingram and lives in Asheville; Samuel Cole, who married Elizabeth Grahl and lives in South Carolina; and Arthur Vaughn, who married Fay Snyder and lives on the Fairview road.

Henry Plott, sixth son of Henry Plott and grandson of Johannes Plott, married Eliza Allen and moved to Clay County. They reared five children, as follows: William, who married Nan McGhee; the Rev. John Plott, who married Samantha Headen; Louisa, who married Andrew Jackson Lloyd; Toie, who became Mrs. Ben Ledford; and Laura, who married George McClure. All of these live in Clay County.

Celinda Varner Plott, the second daughter of Henry Plott and granddaughter of Johannes Plott, married Elias D. Brendle, of Jackson County. The following children were reared: Margaret Caroline, Mary Malydia, Sarah A., Celinda Josephine, Lucinda Haseltin, and Henry Plott. One of her daughters, Margaret Caroline, was the mother of Elias Milton Ammons, Governor of the State of Colorado.

George Plott, the eighth son of Henry Plott and grandson of Johannes, moved to Georgia, married, and reared a family of ten children. Peggy Plott, sister of George, married Ezekiel Brown and moved to Georgia; Caroline Plott, the youngest daughter of Henry Plott and granddaughter of Johannes, married Hugh Brown and the following children were reared: Killis, Rebecca, Dick, J. Hugh, Frances, and Margaret. This family remained in Haywood County.

Elias Plott, third son of Johannes Plott and brother of John and Henry, did not come to Haywood County but re-

mained in Cabarrus County, or that part of Cabarrus now included in Iredell. He married twice, first Charity Conard, and second Peggy Kelly. Their offspring is quite numerous in the counties of Cabarrus, Iredell, Catawba, and other counties in the west central section of North Carolina. For the complete genealogy of this branch of the Plott family, the reader is referred to the records in Cabarrus and Iredell counties, and the genealogy of the Plott Family by Grace Plott now in the hands of Mrs. Robert Henry Plott, of Ivy Hill township.

LI. THE HERRENS

It was near the beginning of the nineteenth century that Jonathan Herren, the first of the name to come to this part of Western North Carolina, purchased a tract of land near the present site of the negro school house in Waynesville, probably the same that is now known as the Will Herren place on the edge of Waynesville on the left hand side of Highway No. 284 as one goes east. His purchase was some years before Haywood County was erected and the record of it is in the office of the register of deeds of Buncombe County.

Jonathan Herren's life in Haywood County must have been a very quiet one as there are no traces of his activities except records of the purchase of other lands at a later date. The inference is that his purchases were by State grants and that he began to sell off some of his holdings at a later date. At least that is the information that may be gathered from the scanty records that are available. He married Elizabeth Osborne.

It is known that Jonathan Herren reared two sons. Green Herren married Cordelia Johnson and the names of two sons are recorded, as follows: Lester, an orchardist of some reputation who lived in Buncombe County, and Eli Barker, who married Jane Yarborough, of Raleigh, lived and died in Haywood County.

Eli Barker Herren was a man well known in this county. He was a citizen of much influence, a merchant

and in Waynesville for many years. Later he became a general merchant and had a store in the house known as the Mendenhall dwelling on Main Street torn down in 1935. He was also a large land owner and had forty slaves. He had a tannery on the tract of land that his father had bought and that was afterwards owned by W. A. Herren, a son. He was a charter member of the First Baptist church of Waynesville, which was organized in 1823. He was one of the largest contributors in the building of the first house of worship of that denomination in Waynesville. The old building stood for many years on the right bank of Richland Creek about two hundred yards west of the present site of the passenger and freight depot of the Southern Railway. He was also active in the establishment of schools and churches in other places in Western North Carolina.

Eli Barker Herren and Jane Yarborough Herren reared a family of seven children. Archibald L. Herren married Iola Jones, of South Carolina. He was a merchant in Waynesville for a number of years before going to Seattle, Washington, to live where he became a man of much influence. Adoniram Judson Herren, who married Jennie Moore, of Macon County, was a farmer here for a long time before moving in 1886 to the State of Washington. Louisa Josephine married Thomas S. Siler, of Macon County, who later became a resident of Haywood. Sarah Jane married W. E. Miller, of Waynesville, and lived all of her life here. James Pinkney married Mary (Mollie) Smathers and spent his life in Haywood County. William A. Herren did not marry, but remained as a citizen of Haywood County until his death. Samuel Carey married Laura Teague, of Crabtree township. He lived for a while in Asheville, where he practiced law and edited a newspaper. Later, he moved first to the State of Washington and then to Idaho. He became a distinguished lawyer in his western home. Later, he moved to Chicago, where before his death some years ago he became the city prosecuting attorney. There were three other children of Eli Barker Herren, Ann Haseltine, Ann Amelia, and Ellen, but all three of them died in early life.

Archibald L. Herren and Iola Jones Herren reared the following children, all of whom located in the Great West: Jennie, Elizabeth, Ellen, Archibald, Jr., Lidie, Mattie Siler, Iola, and Maude.

Children of Adoniram Judson Herren and Jennie Moore Herren likewise located in the west. They are as follows: Harry, who died in boyhood; Hugh, Benjamin, Adoniram Judson, Jr., Susie, and Sam.

The record of the children of Louisa Josephine Herren and Thomas S. Siler is given in the story of the Siler family in this volume. Sarah Jane Herren, who married W. E. Miller, lived all of her life in Haywood County. Her children are recorded as follows: Annie, who married E. B. Atkinson, of Asheville; Frank W., who is now (1935) a member of the North Carolina Highway and Public Works Commission; Charles U., who married Mary Kline of Ohio; Samuel, of Waynesville; Mary Josephine, who married W. C. Garrison, lives in Canton; and J. Clarence, who married Virginia Cooper.

James Pinkney Herren and Mary (Mollie) Smathers Herren reared a family of three daughters and one son, as follows: Jessie Josephine, Flora, Lucile, who married Henry Foy, of Wilmington; and A. Duncan, who married Allie Phillips and located in Washington City.

Samuel C. Herren and Laura Teague Herren reared the following children: York, a lawyer in Chicago; Edna, who lives in the State of Washington; Sam, who also lives in Washington; Wilson, Eli B., and Virginia.

FRANK W. MILLER, a son of W. E. Miller and Sarah Jane Herren Miller, was born in Waynesville. He was educated in the Waynesville schools and at Trinity College, which later received the name of Duke University.

His public services have been various. He was for some years deputy clerk of the Haywood County Superior Court; for several terms alderman of the town of Waynesville; and membership on the North Carolina Highway and Public Works Commission. In these various positions, he has been capable and efficient.

Oscar M. Hampton was educated in the public schools and at the Greeneville-Tusculum College, Tennessee, and at the Richmond Business College. He became connected with the Bank of Waynesville, where he served for two years and later was cashier of the Champion Bank and Trust Company. He was also in the mercantile business in Canton with his brother, Charles V.

In 1927, he was appointed by the Legislature of North Carolina to membership on the Board of County Commissioners and served two years, retiring at the end of his term.

THE UNDERWOODS. Fielding Underwood and his wife, Elizabeth Land Underwood, were the first of the name to come to Haywood County. They came about 1820 from Towns County, Georgia, and settled in what has since been called East Waynesville.

Six children were reared, as follows: Jasper, who returned to Towns County, Georgia, where he lived and died; D. Melvin married Mahala Hood; Elijah married Sallie Bryson; Nancy married George Yarboro; Polly married Richard Robinson; and Madely married Alonzo Allen.

D. Melvin Underwood and Mahala Hood Underwood reared the following children: Robert T. Underwood, who married Lou Davis; James P., who married Cenie Bramlett; Martha, who married James Williams; Elizabeth, who married Marion Davis; Samuel Leonidas, who married Rachel Lucinda Roberts; Matthew Hale, who married Sallie Gaddy; and William Pinkney, who married Laura Gaddy.

Elijah Underwood and Sallie Bryson Underwood reared two children, James and Melvin, both of whom left the county. James settled in Jackson County, North Carolina, and Melvin located in Georgia.

James P. Underwood and Genie Bramlett reared a family of three boys, as follows: Robert L., John C., and Edward. Samuel Leonidas Underwood and Rachel Lucinda Roberts Underwood reared four children, as follows: William, Annie, who married H. C. Robinson; Margaret,

who married first J. H. Lilly, and second William Bramlett; and David, who married Clara Corder.

Robert T. Underwood and Lou Davis reared a large family, as follows: Lillie, who married John Armstrong; James Pinkney, who married Della Rose and lives in Memphis, Tennessee; Mary, who became Mrs. Edward Lanier; Mahala, who became the wife of Dr. J. M. Parker, of Asheville; Thomas W., who married Ella Holcombe; Iola, who married Byron Reeves; Fannie Lou, who married Stralie Jones; Arch, who married Hazel Graham; Robert, who married Bertha Graham; Lucius, who lives in Boston; Beatrice, who became Mrs. Joseph Hawkins; Inez, who married Doc Foster; and Allene, who became Mrs. Thomas Pascal. Ross lives in Asheville.

Matthew Hale Underwood and Sallie Gaddy Underwood reared a family of seven children, as follows: Almeda married Nathan West, Pinkney married Annie Underwood, Joseph died before reaching maturity, Cleveland moved to Tennessee, Rufus married Myrtle Phillips, Ellis married Evelyn Curtis, and Maggie.

William Pinkney Underwood and Laura Gaddy Underwood reared a family of five daughters and two sons, as follows: Annie married Pinkney Underwood, Martha married Fred Medford, Fannie married Ray Francis, Lizzie married Elmer Palmer; and Johnson, Fred, and Lula.

THE THOMAS FAMILY. More than a century and a quarter ago, a young couple, who had married a short time before in Virginia, came to the fertile and scenically beautiful Pigeon valley in what is now Haywood County. There they purchased lands and began the building of a home for themselves. They lived together in that new country for about two years when their brief union was tragically broken by the drowning in Pigeon river of the young husband.

The actors in this tragic drama were Richard Thomas, who was born in Virginia, and Temperance Calvert, a descendant of one of the brothers of Lord Baltimore who had settled the Maryland colony in 1634. Only a few

HENRY HENSLEY AND DESCENDANTS

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Henry (aka Harry) Hensley, b. before 1755,
 first appears with Capt. Benjamin Hensley,
 Benjamin Hensley Jr., James Hensley, Ben-
 jamin Hensley Sr., Hickman Hensley, and
 Benjamin Hensley, on the 1770 Henry Co.,
 Va., tax list.

Ben Hensley, Henry Hensley, and Hickman
 Hensley were among the Henry Co., Va. Rev-
 olutionary Army Minutemen who marched to
 the assistance of Gen. Green at Guilford Court
 House, North Carolina, March 11, 1781 in
 Capt. John Hanby's Company under Col.
 Abraham Penn, commanding.

On the 1783 Henry Co., Va. tax list were
 Robert, John, William, Henry and Benjamin
 Hensley. The 1784 list shows Robert, Wil-
 son, John, and Harry Hensley.

Burke Co., N.C. land Entry No. 31 shows
 Henry Hensley entering 200 acres on the "Ball
 Mountain Creek" on June 22, 1791. Entry No.
 32 was for James Hensley and Entry No. 36
 was for Hickman Hensley.

Henry, John, Jas., and Hickman Hensley
 appear in 12th Company of Burke Co., N.C. for
 the 1790 Federal Census. This area became
 Buncombe Co., N.C. in 1792.

Buncombe Co. Record Book 2 Section 1
 shows Henry Hensley receiving 203 acres of
 land on "The Bald Mountain Creek the waters
 of Caneby River beginning near the mouth of
 Saug Fork" on December 22, 1796 from the
 State of N.C.

Henry appears on p. 172 of the 1800 Bun-
 combe Co., N.C. Census, p. 253 of the 1810
 Buncombe Co., N.C. Census as Harry Hens-

ley, and p. 100 of the 1820 Buncombe Co.,
 N.C. Census. He evidently died between 1820
 and 1830. For the John J. Dickey interview of
 Andrew H. Hensley, Menesther, Ky., January
 27, 1898, Andrew called his ancestor Harry
 Hensley and said Harry had a brother Isom.
 Isom Hensley appears on the 1830 Sullivan
 Co., Tenn. Census as b. ca 1760-70. Among
 the children of Henry Hensley were: Henry
 Halen Hensley, b. ca 1781, m. Mary Howard
 and lived on Bald Mt. Creek, Lewis Hensley, b.
 ca 1782, m. Nancy Howard, and moved to
 Harlan Co., Ky.; Berry Hensley, b. ca 1763, m.
 Betsy Littleton and lived in Yancey Co., N.C.;
 Washington Hensley, b. ca 1784, lived Bald
 Mt. Creek in 1810, Nancy Hensley, b. ca 1791,
 m. Jesse Lewis and lived in the Bull Creek
 and Foster's Creek area of what is now Mad-
 ison Co., N.C.

Berry Herren was born December 25, 1774
 and is noted on the Buncombe County Census

of 1820.

His wife was Eda Barker born in 1785,
 daughter of Eli Barker of Barker's Creek, and
 they lived in the Pole Creek section of
 Haywood County. They had the following chil-
 dren.

Eli Barker Herren, born November 18,
 1832, married Jane Yarborough (born June 8,
 1832) and lived in Waynesville. They were very
 active in the community and in the First Baptist
 Church there.

Ezekiel Herren, see separate sketch.
 William Herren, moved to Houston, Texas
 where he died on December 4, 1920.

Green Herren was born 1821, married Cor-
 delia Johnson, and he died in 1898.

Edith Barker Herren died in 1855 and Ezekiel
 Herren died November 27, 1869.

EZEKIEL AND NANCY (RABORN) HERREN

Ezekiel Herren was born on September 3,
 1811 in the Pole Creek Section of Haywood
 County, N.C., the son of Berry and Edith Bar-
 ker Herren.

Ezekiel married Nancy Raborn (or
 Rayborn), the daughter of Hodge and Ariminta
 Martin Raborn who had come from Mont-
 gomery County, Virginia. Nancy was born
 February 7, 1813 in Buncombe County. They
 settled down to a life together here in this



Nancy Rayborn, 1813-1881, and Ezekiel Herren, 1811-1893.

John A. married Harriet Rebecca Winchester and lives at the old Plott home on Plott's Creek; Laura Emma, who married James Elisha Hyatt and moved to the State of Washington; Lona Lee, who became Mrs. Alfred Felix Roels, of Tampa, Florida; Kowa Waklin, who married J. Lee Medford and moved to Washington State; Una V., who is a teacher at Old Fort; George Fred, who married Jimmie Queen and lives on the Fairview road; Robert Ellis, who married Carrie Praytor and moved to Kansas; Ola Frances, who married Romulus Davidson Ingram and lives in Asheville; Samuel Cole, who married Elizabeth Grahl and lives in South Carolina; and Arthur Vaughn, who married Fay Snyder and lives on the Fairview road.

Henry Plott, sixth son of Henry Plott and grandson of Johannes Plott, married Eliza Allen and moved to Clay County. They reared five children, as follows: William, who married Nan McGhee; the Rev. John Plott, who married Samantha Headen; Louisa, who married Andrew Jackson Lloyd; Toie, who became Mrs. Ben Ledford; and Laura, who married George McClure. All of these live in Clay County.

Celinda Varner Plott, the second daughter of Henry Plott and granddaughter of Johannes Plott, married Elias D. Brendle, of Jackson County. The following children were reared: Margaret Caroline, Mary Malydia, Sarah A., Celinda Josephine, Lucinda Haseltin, and Henry Plott. One of her daughters, Margaret Caroline, was the mother of Elias Milton Ammons, Governor of the State of Colorado.

George Plott, the eighth son of Henry Plott and grandson of Johannes, moved to Georgia, married, and reared a family of ten children. Peggy Plott, sister of George, married Ezekiel Brown and moved to Georgia; Caroline Plott, the youngest daughter of Henry Plott and granddaughter of Johannes, married Hugh Brown and the following children were reared: Killis, Rebecca, Dick, J. Hugh, Frances, and Margaret. This family remained in Haywood County.

Elias Plott, third son of Johannes Plott and brother of John and Henry, did not come to Haywood County but re-

mained in Cabarrus County, or that part of Cabarrus now included in Iredell. He married twice, first Charity Conard, and second Peggy Kelly. Their offspring is quite numerous in the counties of Cabarrus, Iredell, Catawba, and other counties in the west central section of North Carolina. For the complete genealogy of this branch of the Plott family, the reader is referred to the records in Cabarrus and Iredell counties, and the genealogy of the Plott Family by Grace Plott now in the hands of Mrs. Robert Henry Plott, of Ivy Hill township.

LI. THE HERRENS

It was near the beginning of the nineteenth century that Jonathan Herren, the first of the name to come to this part of Western North Carolina, purchased a tract of land near the present site of the negro school house in Waynesville, probably the same that is now known as the Will Herren place on the edge of Waynesville on the left hand side of Highway No. 284 as one goes east. His purchase was some years before Haywood County was erected and the record of it is in the office of the register of deeds of Buncombe County.

Jonathan Herren's life in Haywood County must have been a very quiet one as there are no traces of his activities except records of the purchase of other lands at a later date. The inference is that his purchases were by State grants and that he began to sell off some of his holdings at a later date. At least that is the information that may be gathered from the scanty records that are available. He married Elizabeth Osborne.

It is known that Jonathan Herren reared two sons. Green Herren married Cordelia Johnson and the names of two sons are recorded, as follows: Lester, an orchardist of some reputation who lived in Buncombe County, and Eli Barker, who married ~~Jane Varborough~~ of Raleigh, lived and died in Haywood County.)

Eli Barker Herren was a man well known in this county. He was a citizen of much influence, a merchant

county, and raised a large family. Nancy died on May 7, 1881 and Ezekiel died September 10, 1893. Both are buried in the Zion Hill Baptist Church Cemetery near Leicester, N.C.

Their children were: Arimenta Jane, born November 15, 1836, died December 2, 1911 and buried in Snow Hill Methodist Cemetery;

Mary Ann, born October 1, 1840, died February 1, 1892;

Edith, born October 1, 1838, died December 5, 1915, and buried near her parents; Sadie; Nehoma; Archibald; William Martin, born July 5, 1850, died April 12, 1920, buried in Crescent, Oklahoma with his wife, Rachel Penland Herren. William had a large farm there and he and his wife had eleven children.

John Mark Herren, born December 17, 1851, married Lucinda Flippis and had six children. At one time the family were the proud owners of one of the only two "surreys with the fringe on the top" in town. It was once said of John and Lucinda — "there weren't finer folk than John and Lucinda... they made a good living, were well well fixed, but more important, they were respected! They were hard-working people. She swept her house, her yard and her outhouse everyday. She filled her cellar with canned fruits and vegetables!"

Another handed-down 'John Mark Herren Story': There were no banks nearby in those days. John Mark kept from \$100 to \$1,000 in a trunk in his bedroom. One evening Mark had gone to bed. Lucinda was still weaving in the living room (Woman's work is never done!) As she finally started into the bedroom, she saw a man on his knees crawling toward the trunk. At Lucinda's scream, Mark came out of the bed with loaded gun, which always stood beside it. The man went out the window with Mark and gun on his heels and down through the orchard. He never came back.

John Mark Herren's orchard seemed to be the place the intruders always headed for. His Smoke Hose held around ten hogs. As a man was trying to saw the through the chain on the door, Mark shot through the kitchen window and knocked his hat off. Not waiting for his hat, again the intruder took off through the orchard.

John Mark Herren died September 29, 1909 and was buried in Bethel Cemetery, in Denton, Arkansas.

Greenberry Herron was ninth child of Ezekiel and Nancy Herren. He was born January 9, 1854 in Buncombe Co. and died July 7, 1900 in Denton, Arkansas, but was buried in old Lebanon Cemetery, Powhatan, Ark. He was twice married. His first wife was Nellie Morris whom he married on March 27, 1784 and they had one son William A. Herren. His second wife was Margaret J. Matthews. They owned several good acreage in Lawrence County, Ark. and had five children.

The fortunes of most of the descendants of this Herren family led them to other states where they have expended their energies in building up the communities where they lived, but one of the hobbies of Opal Udella Herren Sniff, granddaughter of John Mark Herren,

the mountains of Western North Carolina.

SAMUEL CARY HERREN AND LAURA ANN TEAGUE HERREN

Samuel Cary Herren, (1856-1929) youngest child of Eli Barker and Jane Yarborough Herren, was born in Waynesville, N.C., in 1856. He attended Wake Forest College, and was admitted to the practice of law in 1880.

He married Laura Ann Teague, daughter of Wilson and Adeline Kirkpatrick Teague, in 1882.

In 1885 Sam and Laura, (1863-1942) with their infant son Yorke, journeyed west to Washington Territory. Sam became very active in the forming of the new state. Many of the early documents are in his handwriting. When Washington became a state in 1889, he was the member from Lewis County of the first legislature. His picture is one taken from "The First General Assembly of 1889", hanging in the Capitol in Olympia.

Sam's two brothers, Jud and Arch, and their families, joined him in Washington. They were followed by Sam's sister Josephine's sons Judd and Weimar Siler, and their cousin

Rufe Siler. On Sam's mother's side, Pin Yarborough and family also settled there.

Laura's sisters Mattie and Lizzie Teague and their brother Pinkney Albert followed the others.

Sam's good friend from N.C., James Hamilton Lewis was also in Washington, but later went to Chicago, Ill., where he became City Attorney of Chicago. Sam was invited to join him, and was made Assistant City Attorney in 1907. Later he became Corporation Counsel of Chicago.

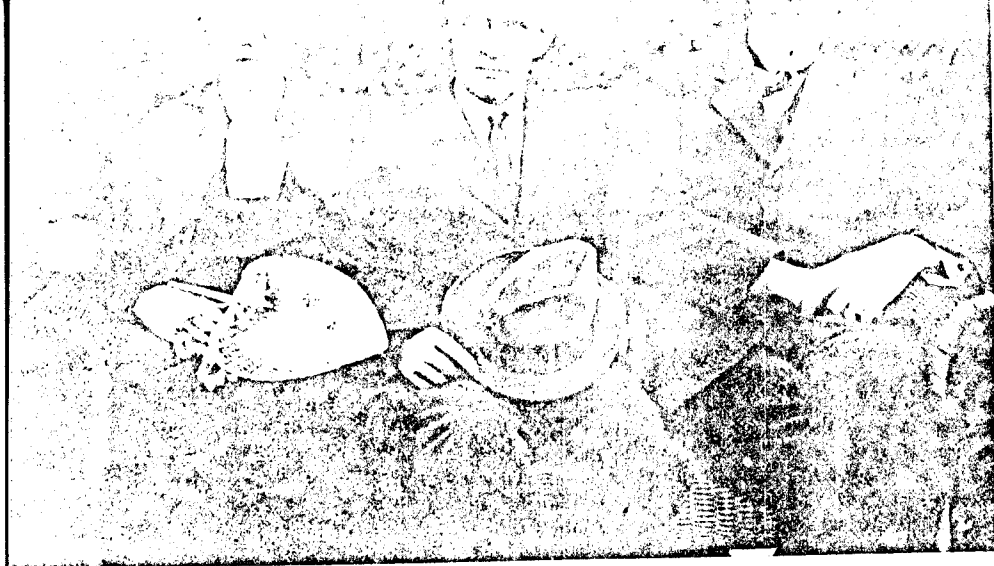
Sam and Laura had two girls and four boys. The youngest son, Eli Barker Herren, became Assistant States Attorney of Chicago in 1927.

In September, 1928, Sam and Laura visited in Waynesville with their relatives and friends. The surviving children of Eli Barker and Jane Herren were photographed together. They were Sallie (Mrs. Everett Miller), Will, and Sam. Five months later in February of 1929 Sam died at age 73. Sallie and Will had both preceded him in death.

Some family anecdotes:

In the "inflation days of 1880," it is interesting note that in 1882, when Sam and Laura Herren were married, Sam was Court Clerk at one-hundred dollars per month. On that amount, they had a nice home, a woman to clean and care for the baby, an another who

and the cooking for all of them. A boy cared for the horses and looked after the yard and garden.

The cook had a large cape that she wore some full of bulges. Occasionally, in the evening Laura would get a little hungry and go into the kitchen to see if she might find a bit of a good cake or pie left over from supper. There was never any. When asked if she ever mentioned it to the cook, she answered, "Oh, no! She needed it for her family."

One of Sam's pet as a boy was a crow whose tongue had been slit. It really learned to say a few words.

George Greenlee Hobson was born December 30, 1860, the youngest son of Josepa Alexander and Ollie Jane (Stanley) Hobson of Mitchell County, N.C. Lula Ann Freeman born November 26, 1862 was the youngest daughter of Robinson Gaston and Sarah Ann (Buckner) Freeman. George and Lula Ann were married on August 14, 1884 and had nine children:

1. Jennie Lee, born May 11, 1885, married Charles Whiting Patterson on July 4, 1909 and five children: Charles W. Patterson II, Blanche Gaston, Allen Hobson, Margaret Elizabeth, Richard Lee Patterson. Jennie Lee died Dec. 14, 1966.

2. Cora Genoa, born February 15, 1887, married Stephen Leeroy Marshbanks on April 10, 1910, and died June 1, 1960. They had seven children: Stanley Frank, Georgia Marian, Roy Wendell, Ollie Faye, Mabel Clara, Violet Elaine, and Dorothy Jean.

3. Georgia Edith, born April 14, 1889, married Zeb. B. Shepherd on January 15, 1911,

and died November 23, 1914. They had two sons Olaf Wilson, and Gerard Winfred.

4. Edgar Staley, born May 26, 1890, married Bergie Sophina Shepherd on January 20, 1929 and he died May 21, 1972. They had one child Margaret Ann who only lived fourteen days. Stanley and his daughter are buried in Piney Mountain Church Cemetery.

5. Adina Leah, born September 2, 1892, married William Talmage on December 22, 1910, and she died May 3, 1930. They had three children: Homer Orville, Harry Hobson, and William Talmage Jr.

6. Ollie Ganana, born July 3, 1894, married Nick Woodfin McElroy on January 2, 1916, and she died December 25, 1963. They had no children, and both are buried in West Cemetery, Weaverville, N.C.

7. Sadie Gertrude, born September 5, 1895, married Joseph Octave Morin on April 24, 1938. They had no children. Sadie died on December 27, 1944, and she is buried at Forks of Ivy Cemetery. Joseph died on November 19, 1965 and is buried at Gabriel's Creek Cemetery.

8. Zora May, born August 26, 1897, never married, and died on October 10, 1920. She is buried at Morgan Hill Cemetery.

9. Clement Freeman, born October 8, 1902, married Blanche Vivian Deaver on July 13, 1929 and had two children, Jerry Mitchell, and Carol Ray (d.y.). Freeman died on September 10, 1964 and is buried in the Garden of Memories Cemetery in Tampa, Florida.

Lula Ann Freeman Hobson died on September 24, 1929, and after her death George married Cora Lee McElroy Dillingham (September 5, 1896 — June 3, 1944). George died May 5, 1935 and was buried with his first wife Lula in Forks of Ivy Cemetery. Cora Lee was buried at Dillingham, N.C.

Cleo Greer Hogan was born 37 March 1905 at Clarksville, Tenn., the second of two sons of Byron Gordon Hogan, born 1905, and Latha Belle Haynes Hogan, born 1907 of Montgomery County, Tennessee. He grew up at the Hogan farm which the family bought in 1866, in a log home built about 1820, without plumbing or electricity.

Cleo graduated from Clarksville High School in 1964 and majored in Mathematics and Physics at Austin Peay State University, Clarksville, Tenn., graduating in 1968.

He joined the US Air Force in 1968 upon his older brother's retirement after 20 years service, and served as a weather officer at Seymour Johnson Air Force Base, Goldsboro, N.C. 1970-71; Osan Air Base, Korea, 1972; as Chief Weather Forecaster at Fort Knox, Kentucky, 1973-75, and at Air Force Global Weather Central, Offutt AFB, Omaha, Nebraska, 1975-78. While in Korea, he made forecasts for all US Army and Air Force bases in Korea, and monitored the marginal weather occurring at Peking, China upon President Nixon's visit there in 1972. Had Air Force One not been able to land at Peking, the President would have diverted his landing to Osan in Korea, the nearest US Air Force Base to Peking.

While stationed at Omaha, Nebraska, Cleo assisted in organizing the Greater Omaha Genealogical Society, and served as the Charter President of this two hundred member society. He was awarded a Certificate of Appreciation by the Nebraska State Genealogical Society in 1978 for his efforts both in Omaha and statewide in Nebraska.

During this time, he met and married Donna Louise Bankey, born 31 October 1941 at Syracuse, New York, the eldest of two daughters of Eugene Robert Bankey (1915-1978) and Jeanie Jeannette Knapp, born 1914, his wife, both of Syracuse. The Bankeys moved from Syracuse to Tulsa, Oklahoma in 1953, to Coffeyville, Kansas in 1957, to Riverside, California in 1958, and finally to Banning, California in 1965. Mr. Bankey died there in December 1978, and in November 1980, Mrs. Bankey retired to Bothell, Washington, where her other daughter and family reside.

Donna attended three high schools during the trek to California, and graduated from Riverside Technical High School in 1959, and attended Riverside Junior College. She joined the US Navy in 1962, and served four years as an Electronics Technician. She then moved to Warren, Ohio, later attended Kent State University at Kent, Ohio, and graduated in 1972 with a B.A. in English Literature. After a few months with her sister's family in Phoenix, Arizona, she accepted a position as Electronics Technician with American Telephone and Telegraph Company in Omaha, Nebraska, moving there in 1974.

After their marriage at First Unitarian-Universalist Church, Omaha on 1 October 1976, and honeymoon at Williamsburg, Virginia, they began making plans to move South

Personally appeared before me the undersigned a Justice of the Peace for the City of Richmond Elisha Yarbrough who being duly sworn deposes and saith that by reason of old age and the consequent loss of Memory he cannot answer positively as to the precise length of his services but according to the best of his recollection he served not less than the periods mentioned below as a private during the War of the Revolution and was in the following services. That in April of 1781 two companies of the Militia of Caroline County, the one commanded by Captain Anthony New and the other by Captn Jameson whose first name is not recollected, met at the place called White Chimneys in said county, Captn Presley Thornton who was a recruiting officer in the regular service either in the Continental or State service he does not recollect which, was there and this Affiant enlisted under him and with his consent on the same day agreed to march with the aforesaid militia companies as a substitute for one Matthew Petros, Captain Thornton giving him orders to return to him as soon as he has performed his tour of militia service. The next day this affiant marched for Richmond under the command of Captn Anthony New and when he arrived there his company was attached to the regiment commanded by Captn Matthews called the fifth as well as he recollects. From Richmond he went to the City of Williamsburg and was quartered in the old magazine in that place for some days he was then marched up the James River to Richmond and when he got there the enemy were on the opposite side of the river burning the tobacco in the town of Manchester --- He recollects distinctly that our troops fired some cannon at them, his brother Joel Yarbrough who died about three years ago being one of the artillery --- Being taken sick at Richmond he went home on furlough his term of service in this expedition being two months, the whole of which time time (sic) he was in active service except the few days that he was at home on furlough as aforesaid. Immediately after the two months were out he went to Captn Thorntons rendezvous at the brick Church in Caroline County and remained there till the news of peace came to them when he was discharged in July 1782 or 1783 as he has said in his declaration made in Hanover County Court on the 2nd day of October. After the most careful reflection on the subject as far as his memory serves he feels positive that his service in the Militia and under the command of Captn Thornton as aforesaid was not less than fifteen months and for which service he claims a pension. It is out of the power of this affiant to obtain any other witnesses as to his said enlistment and services except Thomas Tiller whose affidavit is attached to this said Declaration made in Hanover County Court they being all dead or moved away.

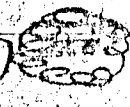

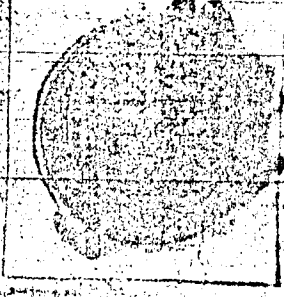

This law has been construed to extend, as well to the line, as to every branch of the Staff of the Army, and to include under the terms "Continental Line," "State troops," "militia," and "volunteers," all persons enlisted, drafted, or who volunteered and who were bound to military service, but not those who were occasionally employed with the army upon civil contracts, such as Clerks to Committees, Post Office Clerks, Store Keepers, &c., Transients, Boatmen, &c. Persons who served on board of privateers, and who were also excluded from the benefits of the law, as well as persons who turned out as militia or volunteers in guarding particular places at night, and were not recognized as being in actual service.

- Four general classes of cases are embraced in this law:
1. The Regular Troops.
 2. The State Troops, Militia, and Volunteers.
 3. Persons employed in the Naval Service.
 4. Indian Spies.

As rolls of the regular troops in the Revolutionary War exist in this Department, all persons claiming the benefit of this law as officers, non-commissioned officers, mechanics or privates, will, in the first instance, make application by transmitting the following declaration, which will be made before a Court of Record of the County where each applicant resides. And every Court having by law a seal and Clerk is considered a Court of Record.

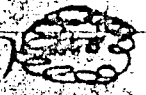

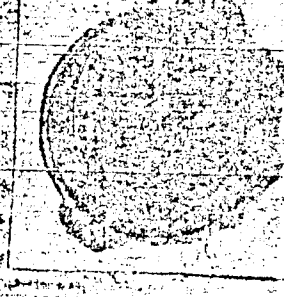

THE YARBROUGHS OF KINGSLAND ROAD, VARINA DISTRICT, HENRICO COUNTY, VA.

Thomas J. Yarbrough, born about 1823, married in Henrico County, Va. on March 18, 1846 to Mary Ann Thomas Salmon, born about 1828.

They had ten children, namely:

Thomas J. Yarbrough was listed on Henrico tax lists and Census records as a farmer. **He served as Constable for District #1 of Henrico County continuously from July 1, 1860 to June 30, 1864. He served as Justice of the Peace from August 1, 1864 until the fall of the Confederacy on April 2, 1865.

**

In 1863 two Henrico Justices went to see Governor John Letcher and informed him that Thomas J. Yarbrough, one of only two constables in Henrico, had been conscripted by Confederate authorities, greatly to the injury of police regulations of the county, and requested him to use his authority to have Yarbrough discharged.

**

Thomas J. Yarbrough had a store in the county and on Thursday, October 6, 1864 he asked permission from Henrico County for his "merchant license" to include selling of retail wine, ardent spirits or a mixture thereof. The court certified that he was a person of good character and saw no objection to such permission being granted.

Mary Ann Thomas Salmon Yarbrough was the daughter of Thomas Salmon and Sarah B. Smith Salmon, who were married January 5, 1821. (Thomas Salmon had previously been married to Elizabeth Sharp on December 3, 1811). Both marriages took place in Henrico County. Thomas Salmon died in 1827 and his wife Sarah was pregnant when he died. She was apparently pregnant with Mary Ann Thomas Salmon, as Mary Ann was born in 1828.

By 1813 Thomas Salmon had bought 56 acres near New Market; however by 1814 he had disposed of this 56 acres.

Thomas Salmon was a son of George Salmon. George Salmon married Mary Throgmorton of Henrico County on December 12, 1786. (She was the daughter of Richard Throgmorton who lived in the Varina-New Market area).***

George Salmon first appeared on Henrico Tax Lists in 1789. February 14, 1798 he had purchased 50 acres on north side of Kingsland Road from Mary and Robert Cary Pleasants. At the same time he purchased 5 acres from them that was on the south side of Kingsland Road. On March 21, 1798 he purchased an additional 51½ acres adjoining the 5 purchased earlier. This 51½ acres was purchased from property "devised to Mary by her brother Jonathan Pleasants". This brought his total acreage on the south side of Kingsland Road to 56½ acres. In 1800 he was taxed as sole owner of 55 acres and taxed for 51½ acres which he then owned jointly with Josiah Throgmorton***. In 1804 George Salmon was credited with only 55 acres and Josiah Throgmorton was credited with the 51½ acres previously owned jointly by Throgmorton and Salmon. 50 of these acres were on the north side of Kingsland Road and 1½ acres were on the south side.

*** The Throgmortons mentioned here may have been ancestors of Emma Frances Johnson who married James Elisha Yarbrough, as her mother was a "Throckmorton" from that same area. Josiah Throgmorton mentioned above operated the Deep Bottom Ferry. He died in 1813.

May 1814 George Salmon acquired 25 acres from Elizabeth Powell, this being part of what he had conveyed to Josiah Throgmorton earlier. In 1816 he conveyed the 55 acres on the south side of Kingsland Road to his son Thomas Salmon. George Salmon died about 1819. At his death the 25 acres on north side of Kingsland Road passed to Thomas Salmon. Thomas Salmon built a new house on this 25 acre tract in 1820 or 1821, about the time he married Sarah Smith. In 1826 he acquired 25 acres on the north side of Kingsland Road adjoining the 25 acres on which he had built his house. After Thomas Salmon died in 1827 it appears that his son George (George was by his previous marriage) moved in with Thomas' wife and baby.

George Salmon's house was on the south side of Kingsland Road on the 55 acre tract. However, this house was abandoned (either demolished or used as slave quarters) after Thomas Salmon built his new house on the north side of the road.

On May 6, 1852, Thomas J. Yarbrough purchased from the estate of Thomas Salmon the land on both sides of Kingsland Road. It was recorded as 110 acres, for which he paid a total of \$332.67 to William and George Salmon, heirs of Thomas Salmon. Thus the first residence of the Yarbroughs in this area was the house on north side of Kingsland Road - the house built in 1820 or 1821 by Thomas Salmon, father of Mary Ann Thomas Salmon Yarbrough.

That Yarbrough house was destroyed by Union troops in 1864 during the Civil War. Tax records do not indicate where the Thomas J. Yarbrough family lived after their home was destroyed, but speculate that they lived in a shack or cabin on the south side of the road. Thomas J. Yarbrough built a new house on the south side of Kingsland Road in 1870 or 1871.

Thomas J. Yarbrough died March 31, 1893, Mary Ann Thomas Salmon Yarbrough died five years later, on August 14, 1898. She left the house and 8 acres of land, one calf, all her poultry, a feather bed and stead, complete with pillows and quilts, to her youngest son, James Elisha Yarbrough. The remainder of her land and estate she bequeathed equally to sons Thomas H. and George W, daughters Florence Gathright and Rebecca Whitlock, and granddaughter, Mary B. Fussell.

When the tax assessment was made in 1900, James Elisha Yarbrough was living on 56½ acres on Kingsland Road, including the 8 acres inherited from his mother, this property being on the south side of the road. It was listed as being twelve miles from the County Courthouse.

This property including Yarbrough House fronted Kingsland Road on the south side. It extended from Deep Bottom Road to what is now known as WRVA Road, with a small parcel being on the east side of Deep Bottom Road. This small parcel on east side of Deep Bottom Road was sold to William Johnson probably about 1925 to 1930. Perhaps about this same time three acres on the corner of Kingsland Road and WRVA Road was deeded to James Elisha Yarbrough's son, James. In the early 1940's eight acres adjoining the parcel deeded to son James and facing on Kingsland Road was sold to Melvin McCabe. In 1946 James Elisha Yarbrough died.

In 1948 Emma Frances Johnson Yarbrough died and the remaining property passed to her two youngest sons, William Wilson and Joseph Waverly Yarbrough. Shortly thereafter they divided the property, Wilson owning a parcel adjoining the parcel previously deeded to McCabe and Waverly owning a parcel containing Yarbrough House and adjoining Wilson's parcel. The remaining parcel, on the corner of Kingsland Road and Deep Bottom Road, was owned jointly by them. In the 1970's Waverly sold the parcel containing Yarbrough House to Calvin Arnold.

Late in the 1970's the property owned by William Wilson Yarbrough and the parcel he owned jointly with Joseph Waverly Yarbrough were acquired by Henrico County for construction of the Henrico Regional Wastewater Treatment System. Henrico County also acquired the parcels which had previously been deeded to James Yarbrough, Melvin McCabe and Calvin Arnold. (Some of these properties had been sold to others after their original purchase from the Yarbroughs).

Yarbrough House was demolished in 1979 or 1980 in preparation for the construction of the wastewater treatment facility.

Thus came the end of ownership of property which had been in the family since 1798, when it was purchased by George Salmon, great-great-grandfather of William Wilson Yarbrough and Joseph Waverly Yarbrough, who were the last owners prior to acquisition by Henrico County.

I give to my beloved wife Ann Yarbrough all my Negroes during her natural life except my man John who is now hired out and I wish to be hired out annually and that he have the privilege of choosing his master as long as he continues to conduct himself as heretofore and that the said man John receive two and a half per cent. of his net hire annually, and the balance of his hire to be equally divided between my son William N. Yarbrough and John F. Cross Trustee for use and benefit of my daughter Mary C. Bradley. I give to my wife Ann Yarbrough all my land lying on both sides of the Mechanicsville Road during her natural life (Item 3rd) after the death of my said wife I give to my son Wm. N. Yarbrough the tract of land on which I now live laying on the west side of Mechanicsville Road to him and his heirs forever. Item 4 . I give to John T. Cross Trustee for my daughter Mary C. Bradley all my land laying on the east side of the Mechanicsville road for the use and benefit of my said daughter Mary C. Bradley provided she live upon and occupy it, but should it be the desire of my said daughter to sell the land then the said John F. Cross is hereby authorized to make sale of the same and vest the proceeds of the sale of the same to - used to the purchase of some other place for the use and benefit of my said daughter Mary C. Bradley when she may wish. But in case she prefer to sell the said land it is my will that my son Wm. N. Yarbrough shall have one-half of the purchase money over and above the sum of five hundred dollars. But if the land be no sold and my said daughter Mary C. Yarbrough shall die before he arrives at the age of twenty one years and the said boy Reuben living at the time he is to revert to my estate subject to be divided between my son William N. Yarbrough and my daughter Mary C. Bradley upon the same conditions of trust hereinbefore made and after the death of my said wife my will is that all my negroes herein given to her with their future increase if any be divided equally between my two children Mary C. Bradley and my son William N. Yarbrough according to their estimated value at that time and that my man Nelson be one of them assigned to my son Wm. N. My desire is that my Executors hereafter named will use their discretion as to the sale of my Land. Sh^d they Judge that it will be more beneficial to Keep it for a home for my children till they are raised, they will do so, if not they will sell it on such credit as they or a majority of them shall deem most to the interest of my said children. And the money arising from such sale to be equally divided amongst them. I do constitute and appoint my friends Samuel Overton and Thomas Starke of Hanover County and William Chamberlayne of New Kent County, Executors of this my last Will and Testament, and do request the favour of each of them to act as such. I request the favour of my friend Samuel Overton to be guardian to my son Lewis Byrd Littlepage till he attains the age of twenty one years, and bring him up to such business as he may judge will be most beneficial to him. I request the like favour of my friend Thomas Starke in behalf of my son John Carter Littlepage, and the like favour of my friend William Chamberlayne in behalf of my son William Chamberlayne Littlepage.

I am well aware of the trouble I am imposing on on my friends by the foregoing requests but trust their friendship for me and a helpless number of Orphans will induce them to comply. In testimony of the foregoing I have hereto set my hand and seal this 31st day of October 1803."

The 1860 Census in Henrico County listed an elderly man, ELISHA YARBROUGH, as residing with Thomas J. Yarbrough. It was speculated that perhaps he was the father of Thomas J. Yarbrough. However, Henrico County had no records for Elisha Yarbrough for years prior to 1860, but Hanover County records did list an Elisha Yarbrough. Perhaps earlier years about the Yarbroughs could be traced through Hanover County records.

Some records show Yarbrough spelled "Yarborough"; an even earlier spelling may have been Yarborow.

"Men of Matadequin", a publication by June Banks Evans, relates to early households in the lower end of Hanover County south-east of Matadequin Creek along the New Kent County line. The following appears in that publication:

A report made to the Virginia House of Burgess in 1699 indicates that eight English settlers, including RICHARD YARBOROW, received parcels of land from the Pamunkey Indians. This land appears to have been leased from the Indians for 99 years, with "priority and first grant thereof when the land came into the hands of the King of England".

In 1727 WILLIAM and CHARLES YARBROUGH had land near Polecat Swamp, St. Margaret's Parish, King William County. The article states that this is an area directly across the Pamunkey River from present day New Kent County.

Reference made in the publication indicates that Hanover County was formerly an upper portion of New Kent County.

R. Ellerson. Both Ellerson Station and the old Ellerson Post Office were named for the Ellerson family. Andrew R. Ellerson was the son of Dr. John H. Ellerson and his wife, Laura. Andrew was born about 1845 and married Rebecca Storrs whose family once owned Meadowbridge located near by. Dr. John H. Ellerson, his father, lived at Laurel Springs located on Cold Harbor Road near Mechanicsville and owned Ellerson's Mill on Beaverdam Creek, the site of the bloody battle by that name, and it was here that Andrew Ellerson grew up.

There have been many owners of Fountain Inn since the Ellerson's ownership. George F. Carneal and his wife, Maybell Carneal, purchased the house tract which was a part of a larger tract around 1915 and made it their home for many years; until 1973 when their granddaughter, Dorothea (Carneal) Stephens and her husband, Edward Stephens, were deeded the house tract of 6.86 acres. The Stephens are in the process of restoring and remodeling the home. What is now the front, was once the side. The present side of the house faced the old stage road.

The Garthright House

There is no authentic information as to the early construction of this old home. It was built in two sections, one of brick and one of frame. It was used for a hospital during one of the bloodiest battles of the Civil War, as it was located at, or very near, the Cold Harbor battlefield. The national cemetery is located across the road. These two landmarks are on the battlefield tour of the Civil War around Richmond. In May 1970 the house was heavily damaged by fire which originated at ground level in the back of the house and burned upward in a two foot wide area until it reached the second floor and roof. However, it was not damaged beyond repair and the National Park Service has restored the house to its original appearance.

The first known occupants of this old home were Miles Garthright and his wife, Margaret E., who were living here at the time of the Civil War. He was deceased by 1896 when deeds were given for several tracts of land "at Cold Harbor National Cemetery" to settle his estate.¹ One tract was for 55 acres, and the other was for 120 acres, joining the lands of Joseph T. Martin, south by lands of Patsy Boze and McGhee, West by William H. Grubbs. The second named tract (120 acres) included an enclosed graveyard and a "strip of 20-ft. on every side of the enclosure is reserved as a family burying ground for the use of all parties to this deed and their families." The bricked-in graveyard can still be seen today, but there are no tombstones.

This tract was deeded to Margaret E. Yarbrough and Alice F. Ratcliffe, daughters of Miles Garthright, who were to take and hold as co-partners for their portion of Miles Garthright's estate, thus becoming the next owners of this old home. Walter C. Garthright, Miles' son, received the land located on the north side of the county road (the 55 acres) joining the National Cemetery. Miles and Margaret Garthright had three children: Walter C. of Richmond; Margaret

E., wife of George Yarbrough; and Alice F., wife of Hampden F. Ratcliff.

The daughter of George and Margaret (Garthright) Yarbrough, Maggie E. McGhee and her husband, C.L. McGhee, came into possession of this old home in 1925 and in 1932 they sold the property to the Richmond Battlefield Park Corporation "... same property conveyed to Maggie E. McGhee in 1925 ... and hereby agree that the old dwelling house, now situated on the property known as the Garthright Home, and which was used as a hospital during the Civil War, will not be moved off the property, but will remain on its present site as evidenced by their accepting and recording this deed."

And thus we have this old historic home, preserved by the Richmond Battlefield Parks to visit, and which is another "monument" to all the wounded and dying men who took part in this bloody campaign of Cold Harbor.

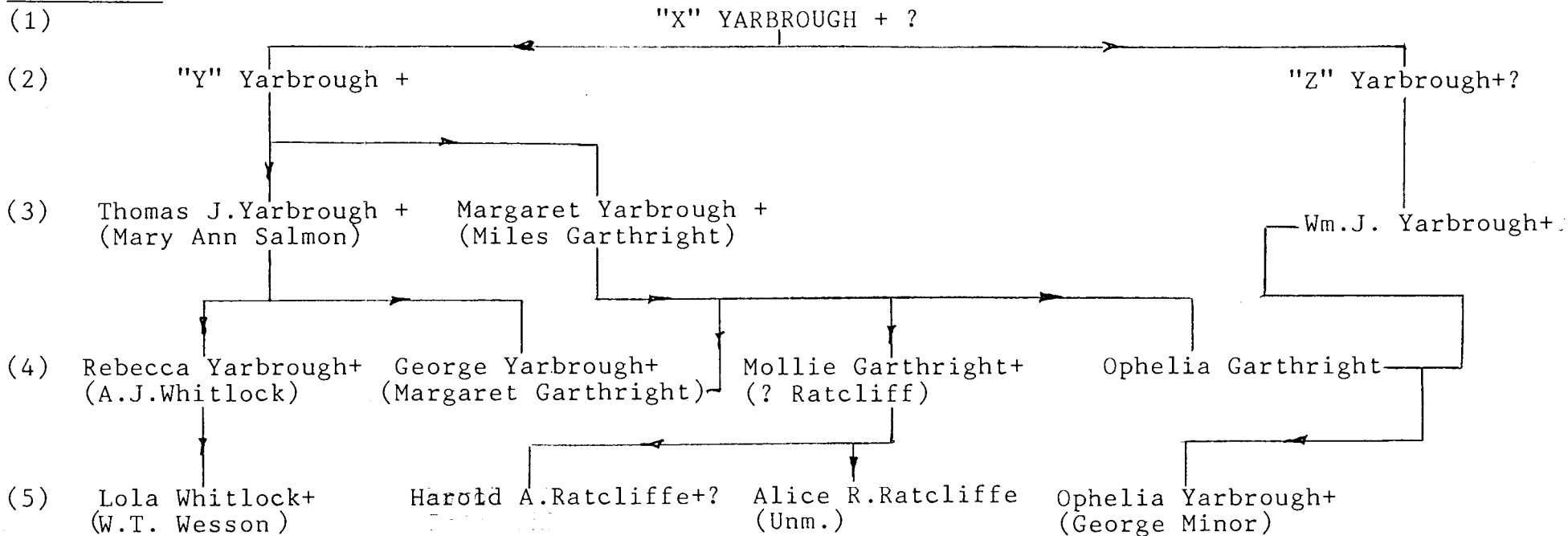

Ginger Bread

This pre-Revolutionary War home was for many years a part of the "Old Church" tract. It is situated on one of the four corners of what was once a thriving intersection. These roads lead to Newcastle, Pamunkey River, and into King William; also to New Kent, Studley, and Hanover Courthouse. Tradition has it that this house was erected at Hanover town, taken down, and re-erected at its present location.¹ It is a cottage-type home, frame, with eight-inch heart pine beaded weatherboarding. The eastern chimney is five feet wide at base, beautifully constructed. The doors are of heavy heart pine and cypress, six-panel cross type with original wrought-iron locks and H and L hinges.

In 1857 Lewis Johnson purchased the "Old Church" tract and "Ginger Bread" tract, the latter consisting of 9 1/2 acres, "transferred from Peter Crutchfield's estate." The tax list identifies the land owner, but not who lives on it, so it is not clear whether or not Peter Crutchfield lived at Ginger Bread or at the dwelling called "Old Church." He may not have lived at either location, but only owned this property, as he in-

Letter from Rebecca Yarbrough Whitlock's daughter, Lola to Dorothy Reynolds, Lola's daughter. Mailed to Dot about 15 years or so ago:

"My grandfather Yarbrough had a brother, James E. who managed on his own a music store in Norfolk, and two sisters, Unity who married a James in Hanover Co. and Margaret who married Miles Garthright.

William J. Yarbrough was my grandfather's first cousin. He married his cousin, Ophelia Garthright, and they became the parents of Ophelia Garthright Yarbrough who married George G. Minor. So this Mrs. Minor was my grandfather's cousin on her father's side and her niece on her mother's side.

Margaret (Yarbrough) and Miles Garthright had a very large family, and my grandfather's son, my Uncle George Yarbrough, married one of them - his first cousin, Mollie Garthright. Another daughter of Margaret and Miles Garthright was married to a Ratcliffe, and they became the parents of Alice (who taught school in Richmond for a lifetime) and Harold A. Ratcliffe who was Commonwealths Attorney for Henrico, and others including the florist, I think. They were the progenitors of a large number of today's Ratcliffes. Alice and Harold were therefore my mother's first cousins, as well as cousins of Mrs. Minor, one of whose children was Mrs. Hill Montague, Jr.

I talked with Miss Alice Ratcliffe at one time and she - or someone - told me that one of the Larus brothers probably has the Yarbrough family history though what his connection is with the family I do not know. These are all distant relatives - yours and mine, and while, as in most families, there may be a black sheep or two, there are so many prominent people in our background, I think the family history should be traced and handed down thru posterity. I understand it goes back to William the Conqueror, who knighted one William J. (?) Yarbrough - and it must go back beyond that. Annie had done a lot of geneological searching, but she turned all of the material over to her daughter, Ann - the one I wanted you to see while in N.Y. and who lives at Creskill, N.J. I do know she said one of the Yarbrough forebears purchased land near Petersburg from the Indians in the early 1600s. This would be interesting work for your retirement years!

I have a lot more material here, but I don't know whether it's enough for D.A.R. membership though it would undoubtedly serve as a nucleus. Mother"

Bradley provided she live upon and occupy it, but should it be the desire of my said daughter to sell the land then the said John F. I do constitute and appoint my friends Samuel Overton and Thomas Starke of Hanover County and William Chamberlayne of New Kent County, Executors of this my last Will and Testament, and do request the favour of each of them to act as such. I request the favour of my friend Samuel Overton to be guardian to my son Lewis Byrd Littlepage till he attains the age of twenty one years, and bring him up to such business as he may judge will be most beneficial to him. I request the like favour of my friend Thomas Starke in behalf of my son John Carter Littlepage, and the like favour of my friend William Chamberlayne in behalf of my son William Chamberlayne Littlepage.
