## Preface

These records are the legacy of our Yarbrough family researchers, to whom much is owed. The known family researchers include Jean Baker, Ann Y. Broadbent, Mary Y. Yarbrough, and Robert Price Yarbrough.

The originals of these volumes are being kept for the benefit of future generations by the Williamson County Library, Franklin, Tennessee.

No claims of accuracy or authentication of the material herein are made or may be assumed. Many of these records have been superseded by subsequent research. Hence, there are records which are erroneous and unreliable; it would have been a Herculean task to attempt to correct all of them. Fortunately, there are only a few critical genealogical facts that are involved, and which are correctly stated here:

- Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough was never married to Frances Proctor;
- Ambrose Yarbrough did not immigrant from Yorkshire; he is now believed to be a descendant of Richard the Immigrant;
- There are so far only two proven sons of Old Richard John and Richard II;
- There is so far no evidence proving Joshua Yarborough I to be a descendant of Old Richard.
- The "Old Country" referred to in old documents and letters is the Colony of Virginia, not England or the Old World.
- There were not seven brothers who immigrated from "the old country"; in fact, it now appears there were three brothers and four sons of the brothers. Which were the fathers and which were the sons are so far unknown.

In spite of these inaccuracies, these records comprise much of our history and some of our accomplishments. There are pages whose print quality is so poor that word recognition was not possible. In spite of that, at least partial capability for searching these volumes is provided, as well as an index to each volume. Nonetheless, the viewer is cautioned to perform his/her own due diligence in connection with any use of this material.

The various spellings of the Yarbrough surname have never been applied consistently, even within a given family. To the extent possible, the names in the index reflect the names used on the source pages; where it wasn't clear as to which might be the proper spelling, the spelling used is "Yarbrough".


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# Founty Landowners

[From an article dated April 2, 1967 Palestine HERALD PRESS] Settlement of the Anderson County area began in 1833. Heavy movement of settlers into the area followed, before and after independence was won from Mexico in 1836.

By the time Texas became a state of the Union in 1845, the area was heavily populated for the time, as the following list of landowners at that time indicates. The list was prepared from state records by Alfred E. Menn, who told the Herald-Press they were the landowners of the county at the time of its organization in 1846.

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

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Richard Yarbrough, immigrant, one of the founders, 1642, of Bristol Parish, Prince George County, Virginia, rests in his grave inside the church yard enclosure. The slab in front of the old headstone is the result of a project started in 1980 by R.P. Yarbrough of Charlotte, North Carolina. With the support of other Yarb(a)roughs, this new marker became a reality and was dedicated at The National Yarbrough Confrence held 1982 at Old Blandford Church, Petersburg, Va.

Richard Yarbrough was buried in this spot when it was known as Well's Hill in the town of Blandford. The brick church was erected in 1735 within a few feet of Richard Yarbrough's grave which is the oldest grave in the cemetery. Old Blanford Church and cemetery is located on US Routes 301 - 460; Crater Road. In all I have seen of research done on the family of YARBOROUGH in the United States, there seems to be a unanimous decision that anyone who can trace their ancestors as having been here before the Revolutionary War were all descendants of Richard Yarborough I. Although it is evident that they were of the same line of origin, it is also evident that there were other Yarborough immigrants in the early settlement of this country.

### RICHARD YARBOROUGH I & II, 1615-1652

Records of English passage lists shows Richard Yar-borough booked passage to Virginia in 1635. If the records are accurate (Wm. and Mary Quarterly, Vol. 5, p. 233), he died at age 87 in 1702. This means he was born in 1615 and was 20 years old when he first come to Virginia. We know that Richard Yarborough I. had a son, Richard II, who was also born in England, (from Court case in 1690). This Richard stated that in 1690 he was 38 years old and was born in England (1652). It is obvious that Richard I made the voyage between England and Virginia more than the one time in 1635. While we do not have the record of the exact place Richard I landed on this continent, it is possible he landed in the vicinity of Yorktown. Some of the earliest records show him present in Counties of Northhampton, King and Queen and King William. It is obvious that his course of migration was up the York River. It has been established that Richard I was of the branch from Yarborough in Lincoln, England, referred to as the "Lincolnshire" branch. About 1600, several members of the "Lincolnshire Yarboroughs" settled in other Counties: William Yarborough settled in Yorkshire, Charles in Nottinghamshire, and Francis in Northamptonshire. One Edmund Yarbrough made his home at Balne Hall, in Yorkshire, and married Sarah, daughter of Thomas Wormeley, of that county.

### EDMUND or EDWARD I & II, c 1630-1650

It would appear, from the following record, that this Edmund was also an immigrant to the colonies. Found in the records of York County, Virginia, Book III - Wills, Deeds and Orders, p. 28: "It is ordered that the Sheriff convey Edward Yarbrough, son of Edward Yarbrough, deceased, to the next court to be delivered to constable and from that constable to another constable until he be delivered to Col. Robert Abrall, who is desired by this Court to dispose of him to his Mother (nee Wormely) or other ways which are fitting. Next Court to be 24 August, 1658."

### CHRISTIAN or CHRISTOPHERE YARBROUGH. c 1630

(\*Ref: "Early Virginia Immigrants 1623-1666 - George Cabel Greer, Baltimore Genealogical Publishing Co., 1960, p. 374)

Christian Yarblow is shown among the arrivals in Virginia in 1653 sponsored by Thomas Willis. Some researchers (Nelle Morris Jenkins) have stated this Christian Yarblow was the same as Richard II and was so called to distinguish him from his Father, Richard I. I believe this not to be so as I feel Richard Yarborough I would have sponsored his own son if it were so.

### AMBROSE YARBROUGH b. c 1710

The Yarborough "cousins" in England did have communication with those who came to Virginia in the colonial days and according to researcher Senator George Washington Yarborough (D. Alabama - probably the foremost authority on the Yarborough Family in America since 1930) another immigrant ancestor of the family was Ambrose Yarbrough who left England in 1732.

Following will be some brief history of these early immigrants:

### IMMIGRANT RICHARD YARBOROUGH

Found in the records of the House of Burgesses, the first representative legislative body in America, there are references to Richard Yarburgh, Yarberry (Yarborough).

"At a Grand Assembly began at Green Spring, the 20th day of February 1676, these following Orders of Public charge were made and allowed, viz. \*\*\* To Richard Yarberry (sic) 6,000 lbs. of Tobacco \*\*\*

## 1702 grave gets new marker

PETERSBURG - Descendants of Richard Yarbrough came from 15 states yesterday to dedicate a new marker at Yarbrough's grave in Blandford Church Cemetery and to rededicate themselves to the United States.

The visitors included former Sen. R.W. Yarborough, 79, of Austin, Texas, who has a different spelling of the name. The oldest tombstone in the cityowned cemetery is that of Yarbrough, who emigrated from Lincolnshire, England, in 1642 and died in 1702 at age 87. But over the years, the soft stone had

been damaged. Also, workers had mistakenly placed the name Scarbrough on it.

R.P. Yarbrough, a retired lumberman from Charlotte, N.C., led the drive to have a new marker with the proper name put on the grave.

"I thought of it last February," Yarbrough said. "I reserved 10 rooms at a Petersburg motel and decided to hold a Yarbrough conference. Word was circulated in a Yarbrough newletter, it spread from cousin to cousin. It ended up with over 100 descendants coming here. We overflowed the third floor of the motel.'

A special program was held yesterday at Blandford Church, now a Confederate shrine and the oldest building in Petersburg. Dr. James H. Bailey, director of the Blandford Information Center, told of the history of the building, which dates to 1645. It was then St. Paul's Church of the Bristol Parish, Church of England. Yarbrough helped found the parish.

Before the church was built, Bailey said, "People had long been buried on this hill. The Yarbrough gravesite is at the highest elevation in the city. On a clear day, you can see 20 miles away."

Later, as the Yarbrough descendants gathered at the grave, Charles Hill Yarbrough Jr. of Louisburg, N.C., a ninthgeneration descendant, said, "We can be proud our ancestor lies in hallowed ground.'

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He urged those present, including his son, Charles H. Yarbrough III, 4, to rededicate themselves to the United States and said, "We leave with stronger ties, a renewed spirit."

Richard Yarbrough - "the immigrant," as his descendants refer to him married Frances Proctor in London in 1635. They had seven boys and three girls. Yarbrough became a major Virginia landowner and planter.

Twenty-nine Yarbroughs fought in the Revolutionary War; most were from North Carolina. There have been Yarbroughs and Yarboroughs in Texas since the 1840s.

Countless regional Yarbrough reunions are held annually in the various states, but this was the first national Yarbrough gettogether. Participants said it was so successful, though, that they plan to make it an annual event.

### YARBOROUGH

While researching the different families, I always found the material more interesting if there were some description of the people and how and where they lived. Occasionally a gentleman kept a diary or "Day Book," but we of the Yarborough family have no such record of our very early immigrant ancestors. Our records are dependent on the deeds of property and wills, and once in a while, a court record. There are times when the will of a man other than a family member can cast some light on the location and neighbors of our kin, and can also tell us at what date the family member sold his land and moved on to a new location. It is from the wills and records of Old New Kent County, Virginia, that we find records of our forefather, Richard, and some of his children.

In 1691 New Kent Co., Va. was divided to make King and Queen Co., and on April 11, 1702, King William Co. was created from King and Queen Co., the dividing line being the Mattapony River. In 1704 there were 216 land-owners in King William Co. The lines of division between St. Johnis Parish and St. Davidis Parish is the same that St. John's Parish and St. David's Parish is the same that were drawn to separate St. Margaret's and St. John's at the time of its creation, beginning at Arnold's and Yar-borough's Ferry below Ayletts and running across the County to the mouth of Monruen Creek. There were a number of large land grants in the upper portion of King William Co. which lay within St. David's Parish. Thes tracts have been located with some success, despite the These loss of many County records. These large tracts of land lay along the Pamunkey River and along the Mattapony

The grants along the Mattapony River are marked by such landmarks as Yarborough's and Arnold's Ferry, which indicates the Ferry existed before the land grants. Benjamin Arnold, 1703 - 1,920 A. on Herring Creek and Mattapony

William Bird, 1702 - 1200 A. from Yarborough-Arnold Ferry up Mattapony

Lewis Burwell, 1691 - 5,000 A. upper side of Herring Creek & lower side of Mattapony R.

Philip Whitehead, 1699 - 5,000 A. adjoining Burwell David Brey, 1703 - 1,892 A. between Herring Creek and Reedy Swamp

John Bucker, 1702 - 3,080 A. on upper Herring Creek

On Oct. 25, 1699; Col. Edmund Jennings, a member of the Council of State, was granted 570 A. of land lying on the south side of the Mattapony River in Pamunkey Neck, beginning at the mouth of Lower Herring Creek and thence along Gravelley branch, the lines of Peter White, Richard Yarborough's land, Foards cornfield in King and Queen Co. The same year he was granted 200 A. on Deep Bottom Run and Pamunkey Neck, and Col. Jennings was again granted 3,490 A. in 1703, and again in 1704, another grant adjourning his previously owned land, 1,900 A.

Col. Jennings' large tract of land covered an area of nearly ten square miles, one of the largest tracts in the county of King William. It is not known when Col. Jennings disposed of all of this land, but when he died in 1727, his estate was sold by his executors. There is only one deed in the old records of King William which shows that a small tract of land purchased by John Yarborough was later purchased by Co. William Aylett and became a part of the Aylett Plantation "Fairfield." The origin of the Aylett family has not been established by records, but Col. Aylett was the first clerk of King William County and a land owner before the county was formed. He was appointed the first clerk in 1702 and served until his death. (Will of William Aylett made No. 18, 1730 - probated, Mar. 17, 1733). It is certain that he purchased his land, for the earlier landowners are named in his will:

> Item: I give and devise to my well beloved son Philip Aylett and to his heirs of his body lawfully begotten forever the tract of land where I now dwell, bounded according to my deeds for the same from Benjamin Arnold as likewise one hundred acres of land thereto adjoining to the bounds in my deed for the same from Benjamin Arnold. I likewise give and devise to my said son Philip Aylett his heirs and assigns forever seven hundred acres of land out of the tract of land I hold by deeds from Mann Page Esq: deceased, to be laid off contiguous beginning to the lower end of the said tract taking the whole breadth and coming upwards till it included seven hundred acres.

Item. Give and bequeth unto my beloved son, John Aylett and to the heirs of his body lawfully begotten forever the several parcels of land I hold by deeds from John Yarborough, John Donner, Jr., John Donner, George Clements, John Hawkins and his wife, Jos. Hall and Abraham Spencer. I likewise give and devise to my said son, John Aylett and to his heirs and assigns forever seven hundred acres of land out of the tract aforementioned, which formerly belonged to Edmund Jennings, Esq., to be laid off contiguous beginning at the upper end of the seven hundred acres given my son Philip and running upwards taken the whole breadth 'til it includes the said quantity of seven hundred acres.

The names of the landowners mentioned in this will are the friends, neighbors and some of those to which the children of Richard Yarborough, immigrant, were married. From Gloucester Co., Va. records we find that Richard Yarborough owned land in King William Co Nov. 1691; Richard conveyed by deed Feb. 12, 1695, in King William Co., to John Yarborough, son of Richard. May 30, 1704, John Yarborough sold 200 A. of land in King William Co. to William Aylett. The deed was recorded in King William Co. and signed by John Yarborough and wife, Abagail.

John Yarborough married Feb., 1695 to Abagail Whitehead, daughter of Philip Whitehead of Gloucester Co., Va. In Gloucester Co., Va. - April 4, 1703, Philip Whitehead gave to Richard Yarborough, through his Will, 200 A. of land, patented by Philip Whitehead of Gloucester Co. Those who witnessed the will were John Yarborough, Richard Yarborough and Abagail Yarborough.

Another landowner of the area was the Brokenborough family, as one of the Aylett sons married a Brokenborough. This name is also found used as a given name of a Yarborough in later years.

These records concern Richard Yarborough, son of the earlier Richard Yarborough. As the records of the court case listed while this area was yet in Old-New Kent County, Va. From this case we know that Richard Yarborough and Benjamin Arnold were neighbors in 1690.

1690 - New Kent Court - Richard Yarborough 38 (1652) and wife Elizabeth 34 (1656)

At the home of Benjamin Arnold several persons gathered for a party. They were having drinks, as was the custom and were toasting the King, Queen and Governors. A Capt. Lumpkin, present, got a little stubborn and refused to take his hat off and raise his glass or cup to the aforesaid dignitaries. Everyone urged him to conform, but he refused. He jumped on his horse and cursed the Governor (Stuart), "God Dam the Governor, I'm as good a man as he

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It was the duty of the host to report such behavior to the High Sheriff, Richard Johnson. All present at the gathering were summoned to court to testify.

Justices, Capt. John Land and Robert Bird were there to swear in and hear testimony of: Richard Yarborough (38) wife Elizabeth Yarborough (34), Ann Browne (31), Benj. Arnold, wife Ann Arnold and Ellinor Thompson (22).

While this preceeding case refers to Richard Yarborough, Jr., some of the records probably refer to the first Richard Yarborough; however, Richard (I) lived in the area of Petersburg, Va. for it is written in the records of Old Blanford Church that Richard Yarborough was a founder of the parish. His tombstone, enclosed in the cemetery of the church, reads: Richard Yarborough, died 1702, age 87. (Wm. and Mary Quarterly, Vol. 5, p. 233) "Richard Yarborough, an Englishman, was founder of Bristol Parish - formed in 1642."

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### Will of William Yarborough - 1771

In the name of God, Amen. I William Yarbrough, of the County of Prince Edward being now sick and weak in body but of a perfect sense and memory Do make and ordain this my last will and testament First I bequeth my soul to God who gave it hoping through the merits of my Saviour Jesus Christ to have full pardon and remission of my sins and my body to the earth from whence it came to be burried in a Christian manner at the discretion of my executors hereafter named my desire is that all my just debts be first paid out of my estate and the Remainder I dispose of in form and manner following

Towit: I lend to my son James Smith Yarbrough my negro girl Silva and her increase until my son Ossweld Yarbrough comes of age and the said wench and increase to be returned into the estate again. Sukey I also lend to my daughter Elizabeth with her increase during her life and after her death I give the said negro and her increase to be equally divided amongst her said brothers or their heirs I give to my son William Yarbrough one feather bed and furniture also one gun My desire is that my son Ossweld Yarborough should have five pounds raised out of my estate also one gun My desire is that my son Joseph Yarbrough should have five pounds raised out of my estate and also one gun and the remainder part of my estate be it of what nature soever I leave to my executors hereafter named to dispose of as they think proper Towards paying my debts then my desire is that the remainder part of my estate should be kept together in the most regular form about upon some rented land where my executor things most proper untill such times my son Ossweld comes of age and till such time my youngest son comes of age to inherit his equal part. Then I desire my estate should be equally divided between my five sons James Smith, Richard, William, Ossweld, and Joseph Yarbrough and my daughter Elizabeth Yarbrough and I do appoint my two sons James Smith Yarbrough and Richard Yarbrough executors of this my last will and testament revoking and disannulling all other will or wills by me heretofore made As Wittness my hand and seal this fourth day of March in the year of our Lord Christ one thousand seven hundred and seventy one

Assigned and pronounced in presence of us William Yarbrough (SEAL).

Richard Beasley Junr. Thomas Hughes Janney Yarbrough ٠.

At a Court held for Prince Edward County November 18th 1771 This last will and testament of William Yarbrough deceased was presented in Court and proved by Janney Yarbrough and Richard Beasley witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded. On the motion of Richard Yarbrough one of the executors therein named who gave and took the oath required by law. Certificate for obtaining a probat thereof in due form is granted him.

## THE JAMES SMITH YARBOROUGH FAMILY

Records of the birth of James Smith Yarborough are found in the old Vestry Book of St. Paul's Parish, Petersburg, Virginia. He was the son of

William Yarborough (1722-1771) m. March 10, 1743 to Diana Smith (No. 18, 1724 - May 18, 1763) daughter of James Smith and Ann Cary. William and Diana lived in Caroline Co., Va., and there are records there showing that William Yarborough, in behalf of his wife, brought suit aginst the estate of John Smith, Uncle of said wife, because she was overlooked as an heir to the estate which named all other of the 10 children in her family. This suit was in progress as late as 1743. William & Mary Quarterly, Vol. 10, (2) p. 217. Children listed in the Vestry Book and also in the Will of William Yarborough, 1771, Prince Edward Co., Va., are as follows:

James Smith Yarborough - Sept. 2, 1745 Richard Yarborough - March 18, 1748 Elizabeth Yarborough - Oct. 23, 1750 William Yarborough - April 7, 1753 Oswell Yarborough - April 26, 1756 Joseph Yarborough - Nov. 6, 1758

We know that at least three of these children went to what is now the southern part of the United States. Oswell Yarborough was the witness to a Will in the Natchez Dist.

The Louisiana Genealogical Register, Vol. 20, p. 7, states that James Smith Yarborough arrived in the area May of 1773, with his wife Mary, five children and his brother.

The first land grant to James Smith Yarborough #363, 400 A. on the Mississippi River, was land which was originally granted to Charles Percy, bearing date of patent for James Smith Yarborough, June 2, 1777. It is not clear whether this was a British or Spanish Land Grant. The legal representatives of Charles Percy took this land.

April 26, 1805, #22, Vol. 1, p. 42, of U. S. Land Grants shows that James Smith Yarborough, "a West Florida Yoeman," received land in Orleans Territory. His son Jordan also received land adjoining. The National Archives Documents show James Smith Yarborough #4735, no. 365 (Rec V 14, p. 448-450.

By 1808 there are several deeds recorded in Iberville Parish, La., which involve James Smith Yarborough, William Yarborough, Joseph Yarborough and Richard Yarborough. (This being in the District of Manchac.) The records of the area are not complete, possibly because those in control of that district were never sure who was the power over them. England? Spain? or France? Records are found in Alabama, West Florida, New Orleans, Baton Rouge, Natchez Dist. and in the U.S. after 1803. The first Census of the area shows James Smith Yarborough and his sons and daughters were residents of Galvez Town, a fortified settlement that enjoyed a brief existence from 1775 to 1789 during the Spanish domination, settled during the administration of Governor Bernardo de Galves. At it's peak, there were 400 residents; in the 1810 Census there were 65 listed.

Some historians intimate that those people of the West Florida-Louisiana Parishes were in the most part, loyal Britons who moved their families away from the Atlantic States to avoid a fight against their Mother Country during the Revolutionary War. We do not know this to be true of James Smith Yarborough. His sons were soldiers in the War of 1812 against England. We also know that James S. Yarborough did not leave the area but chose to stay in spite of extreme hardships. Records show that James Smith Yarborough applied for beef, corn and provisions in April 22, 1784. Records also show that on March 20, 1804, Anna Smith was married. She was the daughter of Maria Yarborough and Santiago Smith. This record also states that Ann Smith was a native of Galvez Town, indication that her Mother, Maria Yarborough, was born c 1769 and no doubt was one of the five children who arrived with James Smith Yarborough.

It is helpful to read the history written about the area where these people lived. I have always thought that one of these sons of James Smith Yarborough was the hero of the Battle of San Jacinto in Texas history. (John Swanson Yarborough). The sad thing is that even though James Smith Yarborough was a "yoeman" and could read and write, his younger sons learned to be trappers for survival and had no schooling. Thus they could not read or write. Is it any wonder there are so few records that concern them? The following is a brief history about Manchac where this family made their home.

"Lower Mississippi," by Hodding Carter, in his series, "Rivers of America," writes that the English had hopes of dredging out Manchac so that their ships could enter the Mississippi River without the hazards of entering the mouth of the river. Their engineering attempts to clear the channel were a failure, but they went on with their

plans to build a fort. Fort Bute, as it was called, was a little backwoods fortification, garrisoned by a few officers who were soon replaced with Scots Fusiliers and English Colonials and veterans of the Seven Years! War.

Below the Iberville River, the Spanish watched with envy the trade which the English controlled. By 1777 the En-. glish had wrought a miracle of colonization. Along the river, scores of comfortable, solid homes gave proof of the prosperity under England. These homes were of brick and mortar and nestled, white and cool, under oak and magnolia trees, back some forty feet from the river bank. A straight road ran the nine miles from the Mississippi to Manchac to the bayou's conjunction with the Amite.

The people of this stretch were at peace with their Spanish neighbors. From the small Spanish Fort, Galvez Town, below the Iberville it was only a bowshot to Manchac, where the warehouses of Monsieur Swanson and Co., Indian traders, emphasized England's merchantile dominance. The two small forts were joined by a wooden bridge.

The peace that had been apparent soon began to fade when the colonists had word that the Spain-England War had begun. Galvez had become Governor in 1777 and had heard of the war and of the British plan to reinforce the Manchac district, so he planned to strike first and take Manchac. His plan was interrupted by a very severe hurricane on August 17, 1779, but he did not give up his plan and gathered troops from the Indians, Negroes, Acadians, farmers, trappers, 330 poor recruits from the Canary Islands and 170 Spanish veterans.

At dawn of September 21st, artillery battle began and by 3:30 the English Fort was in ruins. Galvez demanded surrender of Baton Rouge and Fort Panmure at Natchez. The Spanish had no interest in Manchac except to destroy its threat to New Orleans. With the departure of the English, Manchac dwindled and became a dying settlement. Today there is no Manchac at all. Galvez Town was not important or necessary to the Spanish who had conquered all of west Florida, and without government support, it too became deserted.

The last deeds that can be found which can be connected to this family of James Smith Yarborough were recorded in 1836. Where did these and their descendants go?

Dear Mrs. Kessler:

I neceived your letter on the Yarbrough Family. In response. I enclose some pages from the recently published "Yarborough and Related Families" by Marineal Yarborough Nickolaus, 1983. Page 24, names your ancestor John Swanson Yarborough,presumes, but does not give proof that he was the son of James Smith Yarborough. James Smith Yarborough was originally from Virginia, but later moved to the area of Baton Rouge, Louisiana. His daughter, Maria Yarborough married Maxmillian Martin of Plaquemines Parish Louisiana; she is my ancestor. The Yarborough history mistakenly has her marring a Smith; this is due, I believe, to a misreading of her marriage license. This author does not know what happened to James Smith Yarborough; neither do I. I have found no record of this death in Louisiana; perhaps he moved elsewhere with some of his children. Do you have алсу evidence of a James Smith Yarborough in Texas?

My James Smith Yarborough was clearly the son of William Yarborough (c. 1720-c. 1771) of Prince Edward, Prince George, and Caroline Co's Virginia. This family is well-documented in Bristol Parish Church records Prince George Co. Va. I believe this William Yarborough is the son of William Yarborough of Amelia Co. Va. (-1748) who names a son William in his will. This elder William is supposed to be the son of the immigrant Richard Yarborough.

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

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



### John Swanson Yarbrough by Gladys Buck Ritteé & Maurine R. Herod

Many years of research have been devoted to John Swanson Yarbrough and his desdendents. Land grants for early arrival in Texas and donation certificates for having served in the Army of the Republic of Texas in Captain Hayden Arnold's Nacogdoches Company at the Battle of San Jacinto made some of the documentation easy, but much of it seemed duplicated and/or contradictory until we learned that there were two "Swanson" Yarbroughs, John Swanson Yarbrough, Sr. and John Swanson Yarbrough, Jr. John Swanson Yarbrough, Sr., his eldest son Joseph Randolph Yarbrough, and John Swanson, Jr. all received land grants for having arrived in Texas in 1832 and for serving in the Army of the Republic of Texas. Swanson, Jr. was killed in the Battle at San Jacinto.

A best source in any genealogy is the family Bible but only two pages of the Yarbrough Bible have been found. ""Swanson Yarbrough born Dec. 25, 1777. John S. Yarbrough born March 27, 1819. Joseph S. Yarbrough, deceased Feb. 9, 1849. Swanson Yarbrough, deceased ct. 25, 1862. James D. Yarbrough, deceased Oct. 31, 1863. Joseph Randolph Yarbrough, deceased March 26th, 1867..." From all our research sources, we have established that John Swanson Yarbrough, Sr. had the following children by his first and/or second wives whose names are unknown to us: (1). Joseph Randolph Yarbrough, b. 1-31-1817, d. 3-26-1867; (2). John Swanson Yarbrough, Jr. b. 3-27-1819; (1). Lucinda Yarbrough, b. 1821 in Arkansas m. John Andrew Box; (4). Joseph S. Yarbrough d. 2-9-1849; (5). James D. Yarbrough d. 10-31-1863; (6). Mariah Yarbrough, m. Clayton D. Skidmore; (7). Alfred L. Yarbrough, b. 1828 m. Caroline Ethyl Dodd; (8). Lorenzo Dow Yarbrough b. 1839, m. Nancy Parilee White b. 8-26-1846, Leon Co., daughter of Henry and Lidia Wright White. In 1845-46, John Swanson Yarbrough, Sr. m. Mrs. Frances Cokar Moore Tope, a widow who had been left with small children after the death of her second husband. He was 36 years older than she but also had small children at home. John Moore, Frances' son by her first marriage, m. Ellen Winters, Aughter of Benjamin Franklin and Sylvania Cude Winters. James Tope, Frances' only child by her second marriage, was born 2-22-1840 and m. Dorcas Salina Winters, Ellen Winters Moore's sister. John Swanson and Frances were married 17 years and had only one child, a daughter, Amanda Arminda Yarbrough b. 10-20-1846 in Crockett. In 1864, Amanda became A CARLES STATES AND A CARLES AND A

the second wife of Joseph Walker in Pleasanton, Atascosa Co., Texas. Joseph was born in Chester, S. C., 6-30-1818, a son of James and Martha Telford Walker who had lived in Houston County for a short time during the early days and had two other sons, Philip and James, and a daughter, Rebecca. On March 27, 1837, Swanson was living in Nacogdoches County when he sold his rights to two-thirds of a league and labor of land. On April 22, 1837, John Swanson and his son Joseph Randolph were in Nacogdoches County and signed the petition to form Houston County. Swanson Yarbrough is listed on the 1840 Houston County Census and tax list. In October of 1842, in Houston County, he appointed Isaac Parker to locate his headright. In December, 1850, he sold his San Jacinto Donation Certificate in Harris County to C. Ennis. In 1858, he received a headright grant in Washington County and in that same year moved to the newly formed McMullen County where he and about thirty families settled on the Frio River. The settlement was named YARBROUGH BEND for him and a Texas Historical Marker can be found there today: "Site of County's First Settlement, YARBROUGH BEND, (5 mi. N.E. on Frio River) founded 1858. Named for John Swanson Yarbrough, an original settler, town contained about 30 log picket houses. Settlers were often harassed by Indians, cattle thieves, and wild animals. Other original settlers were Dr. George Dilworth, John Moore, James Tope, N. H. Walker, Joe Walker, and Benjamin Franklin Winters."

Because most of this research has been done by descendants of two of John Swanson's children, Joseph Randolph and Amanda Arminda, we have more detail on descendants of those two than others but we will welcome any corrections and/or additional data any descendant (2) will share with us. Joseph Randolph was b. 1-31-1817, d. 3-26-1867, m. 2-3-1840 Phoebe Clementine Crawford b. 6-27-1823, d. January, 1907, and they were the parents of eleven children who were the subject of an article published in The Dallas Morning News Sept. 20, 1935, bearing the dateline Grapeland, Houston Co., Texas, Sept. 19, and the headline "Longevity Record is Boosted by Eight in Family, 73 to 93". The article carried a picture of Scott Yarbrough, Joseph S. Yarbrough, Miss Helen K. Yarbrough, Mrs. Melissa Herod, Mrs. Belle Owens, and Mrs. George Whitley with the notation that Mrs. Mary Morris and Sam Houston Yarbrough were not present when the picture was taken. Quoting the article in part: "The eight surviving children of Mr. 6 Mrs. Joseph Randolph Yarbrough, ranging from John Summon Carbrough - Page 3

73 to 93, form a record of longevity perhaps unequalled in this section of Texas. Yarbrough, son of the operator of the first hotel at Crockett and one of the earliest settlers of the State, enlisted in the Texas forces when he was 18 and fought in the Battle of San Jacinto. He was one of the guard that took General Santa Anna to General Sam Houston after his capture. He married Mrs. Phoebe Clementine Yarbrough in 1840 and they lived in Anderson and Cherokee Counties, moved to Louisians, and to Houston County, settling near Crockett. During the Civil War, the husband diad at the age of 50, leaving a wife and eleven children. The eight survivors of this union are: Mrs. George Whitley, age 93, Mrs. Balissa Herod, age 91, Mrs. Mary Morris, 89, Joseph S. Yarbrough, 87, Mrs. Bell Owens, 81, Scott Yarbrough, 79, Mrs. Helem E. Yarbrough, 76, Bam Houston Yarbrough, 73. An uncle, George Crawford, diad several years ago near Elkhart at the age of 92. Mrs. Narcisse Yarbrough Burns, a cousin, was 112 at her death. John Swanson Yarbrough, grandfather of the brothers and sisters, died in Nueces County when he was 87."

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

John Swanson Yarbrough died October 20, 1862 and Frances Yarbrough died in 1868 at age 55. They are buried side by side with tombstones marking their graves in the old cemetery at Yarbrough Bend in McMullen County.

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#### THE NACOGDOCHES STORY

In the piney woods of what is commonly called "Deep East Texas" there is a historic town called Nacogdoches. Here the drama of Texas history began for the white man in 1528 when Cabeza de Vaca, a Spanish explorer, became lost on the Texas coast and was taken prisoner by a tribe of Indians who travelled East Texas. He finally escaped and made the long trip through the wilderness to Mexico City, where his report of the Texas interior caused great interest in this portion of Texas.

The Indians living in the area at that time were members of the Caddo family and Hasinai confederacy. The Hasinai word for friend was "tejas" which became Texas. Legend has it that an old Caddo chief living near the Sabine river had twin sons, one with dark hair and of swarthy skin; the other with blonde hair and light skin. When it was time for them to become leaders of their own tribes, the father sent one brother three days journey into the rising sun and the other three days journey into the setting sun. There the settlements of Nacogdoches, Texas developed from the blonde haired tribe and Natchitoches, Louisiana developed around the dark haired descendants. The two brothers remained friendly and beat out a well traveled trade route that later became known as El Camino Real (Old San Antonio Road). These Indians planted and harvested crops, made preserves from wild fruit, preserved meat, and tanned leather. They buried their dead in mounds. They were peaceful for the most part and welcomed the explorers.

The early Spanish missions established in and around Nacogdoches were sponsored by the government of Mexico for the primary purpose of establishing a hold on this new land about 1700. The earliest attempts were abandoned about 1720 because of raids by the French who were established a short distance to the east. In 1773, the government decided the missions were no longer necessary for this purpose, so they ordered them and the 500 settlers of the East Texas area moved to San Antonio. These settlers were not happy in San Antonio and were granted permission to move to the Trinity river. When the settlement was raided by the Comanche Indians, and the river overflowed, Gil Y'Barbo took matters into his own hands and led the people back to East Texas.

1779 marks the year Gil Y'Barbo built the stone house (Old Stone Fort) and Nacogdoches became a permanent settlement. Nacogdoches and this building have seen the coming and going of many flags. Around 1800, Philip Nolan, a wild horse trader, entered the Texas territory from the United States on what might have been a scouting mission of President Thomas Jefferson of the United States. Nolan was killed, his men captured. They were held prisoner in the stone house until they were carried to Mexico City where they were tried and one man was executed by lot. Peter Ellis Bean, a member of this party, was released and settled in Nacogdoches.

Nacogdoches' location on the eastern border of Texas territory placed her in a dispute over borderlines and revolution began to bubble. In 1812 ex-lieutenant of the U.S. Army, Augustus Magee resigned his position and joined forces with Bernardo Gutierrez in New Orleans where Gutierrez was on a money raising tour for Father Hildalgo, sponsor of Mexico independence from Spain. Gutierrez-Magee decided to take Texas for themselves with the help of willing recruits numbering some 3,000 men. This group housed their headquarters in the Old Stone Fort for a time and there set to type a newspaper called the "Gaceta de Tejas" for the purpose of raising support of their cause. They fought some major battles with Mexican forces. They were defeated; and Texas was declared to be a province of Mexico that had declared it's independence from Spain.

In 1819, Dr. James Long led an expedition to claim Texas for the United States as a part of the Louisiana Purchase. Long's headquarters in the Old Stone Fort were wiped out while he was on Galveston Island bargaining for the assistance of the well entrenched pirate, LaFitte. Long made a second unsuccessful attempt.

In 1820, Mexico gave settlers from the United States permission to settle in Texas territory. Haden Edwards obtained a contract to settle 800 families in the Nacogdoches area of East Texas. When he got to Nacogdoches, he found the land he had bargained for settled by Indians and descendants of early Mexican settlers that had been there several generations. He sent a blunt letter of complaint to the Mexican officials who responded by cancelling his contract. Edwards gathered men together in the Old Stone Fort, raised a red and white flag with the words "Independence, Liberty, and Justice" and declared themselves Fredonians (freedom seekers). They gained no support from the people in the area and pulled their flag down and scattered before the Mexican soldiers arrived to arrest them.

The Mexican garrison in Nacogdoches was increased as a result of this skirmish, beginning a chain reaction that eventually developed into a full scale war for independence. Nacogdoches' part in the battle that followed consisted of both men and supplies. Adolphus Sterne, a prominent landowner, went to New Orleans and raised approximately \$10,000 and outfitted a company of volunteers that bivouaced in Nacogdoches at the Adolphus Sterne home before going on to participate in the battle of San Antonio.

Thomas J. Rusk of Nacogdoches, was made Secretary of War under the interim government and served as a General in the fighting as did Sam Houston who had made his home in Nacogdoches for a time. They also served together as United States Senators from Texas after Sam Houston served as first elected President of the Republic of Texas and Rusk served as Chief Justice of her Supreme Court.

William Clark, Jr. They, along with Rusk, are buried in Oak Grove Cemetery in Nacogdoches, the oldest in the State.

Since there had been no school system in Texas until now, education was a major problem to the new government. Nacogdoches University was chartered under the Republic of Texas in 1845. It was financed by four leagues of land and public subscriptions of from \$1.00 to \$300.00 at a time when a Texas \$1.00 was worth 2 cents. This same year Texas was admitted to the Union as a free state.

The Protestant church reached Texas about 1838 and a church was organized at Old North Church, about four miles north of Nacogdoches. Other churches in the county date this same period.

About 1859 Texas' mammoth oil industry was having its beginning at a place a few miles from Nacogdoches where L.T. Barret drilled Texas' first producer. The site became known as 'Oil Springs'.

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1859 saw Sam Houston back in office as Governor, trying to keep Texas in the Union. He lost this battle, however, and Nacogdoches saw both Confederate and Union soldiers on her soil. The Nacogdoches University building served as a hospital first for the one and then the other before the skirmish ended.

Nacogdoches suffered with the rest of the South in the Reconstruction years following the war. However, by 1880 there were brick buildings and the Wettermark bank here. In 1882 the Houston East and West Texas railroad came to Nacogdoches.

Its forests-fed, timber-related industries and good soil and growing conditions for agribusiness opportunities still furnish food and labor for its citizens. With its legends and leadership the courageous heritage of Nacogdoches has determined its course in history.

Between 1750 and 1780 there was a wave of migration toward the Carolina. Many reasons for this have been

sighted by other genealogists, such as, the land no longer produced the tobacco crops or other crops as abundantly as in the past. History shows there was an epidemic of smallpox which wiped out some families. Fear of this urged the people to seek the virgin soil and unpopulated areas of that part of North Carolina which the Federal Government opened, Indian lands, to the white settlers. North Carolina did not become a state until 1789.

Just who and how many of the Yarboroughs left Virginia for the Carolinas is not certain, but the story of of one such group was told to Yarbrough kin of Léxington, N. C. in 1898. The story was retold by George Yarborough, who was a descendant of Manoha and Littleton Yarbrough; the story was printed in the Lexington, N. C. Dispatch, January 5, 1898. As the story related to men who came to North Carolina more than one hundred years before the article was printed, we must view it as legend. The article states: "Between the years of 1729 and 1775, seven brothers of Yarbroughs went (from Amelia Co., Va.) over to Louisburg, Franklin Co., North Carolina. Their names were Zachariah, Archibald, Manoha, Alexander, Thomas, Henry and John."

While some of the above named do appear on the State Census 1764-1779, Dept. of Archives, Raleigh, N. C., it is doubtful that the Yarboroughs mentioned in the article were sons of the same Father. Perhaps, "brothers of Yarbroughs" meant they left brothers in Amelia Co. or elsewhere, but came as a group of Yarbrough kin.

In a record such as this, it would be impossible to trace each man of the generation mentioned in the above article. By the 1790 Census, most of the Yarbrough -Yarborough families were gone to another locality. ### **18 MINUTES**

In 1822 Stephen Austin led a group of 300 settlers - the Old Three Hundred, they were called - to Texas to settle a Spanish Land Grant taken out by his father, Moses Austin. The old three hundred became citizens of Mexico and, in tokens of their good faith, adopted Catholicism as Mexican law required. They bought land and settled down to establish a model colony - law abiding, literate and, within a few years, prosperous.

Ten years later, 55-year-old John Swanson Yarbrough entered Texas with his family of ten. Texas records describe him as a man of good moral habits, industrious, a good citizen and friendly to the laws and religion of the country. Family records characterize Swanson as being red-haired and hot tempered. This may have been true -- considering that just two months shy of his 85th birthday --he was killed by a man over a horse trade that went sour.

By the time John Swanson Yarbrough and his family arrived in Texas, they were but a part of some 20,000 Americans who had flooded over the border. These newcomers were a different breed than the Old Three Hundred. Some, in violation of Mexican law, had brought slaves with them. The newcomers did not want to give up their slaves, or be catholics; they didn't want to accept the Mexican law, preferring instead the laws of America. This flood of newcomers had settled the fate of Texas, and even the Mexicans knew it. They saw the Americans building schools and the Mexicans none; that the Americans were getting land and building houses while the few Mexicans in Texas stayed poor. Mexico suddenly tightened its control over Texas. They prohibited further immigration by Americans and sent troops into the region, trying to administer

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the whole vast province from Mexico City. The inevitable happened. The Americans - Texians as they were beginning to call themselves - rose in revolt.

Sam Houston was sent to Texas to lead an army. Houston's had been a spectacular career. Bored with chores and life on the family farm, at age 17, he slipped away from home and wandered into a Cherokee Indian camp where he remained three years. The chief adopted Houston as a son.

At age 20, he enlisted in the army to fight the Creek Indians who were on a rampage in what is now Alabama; in 1812, he fought under Andrew Jackson and was badly wounded; at age 24 he was a government agent to the Cherokee chiefs under Monroe. While an Indian agent, his indian friends complained they had not received annuities promised by the War department in exchange for their ancestral land. Gravely, Houston acknowledged the injustice and went to Washington.

Never in the annals of the United States Army had an officer appeared before the Secretary of War quite so conspicuously out of uniform. When the group was ushered into the office of John Calhoun, there was Houston at its head, dressed in nothing but a breech-cloth and blanket. Calhoun heard him out, but was outraged at his dress. Houston explained he thought it only courteous to his Indian friends to dress as one of them since he was their spokesman.

By age 30 Sam was a Congressman; at 34, the governor of Tennessee; and by age 35, he was an heir apparent to President Andrew Jackson.

His fall was dramatic. This flamboyant, extravangantly picturesque and romantic figure was beloved of all women - except his wife. In 1829, while

governor, Sam married a Tennessee society beauty 17 years younger than he. Without explanation, they separated after only 3 months. Despite Houston's insistence that his marriage was a private affair, the public reaction when he left her forced his resignation as governor.

He went home to the Cherokees and when they were moved by government treaty to Arkansas Territory, Houston went with them. A demoralized and unkempt Houton drank his way through the trip. Houston wrote afterward that he was in "an agony of despair" and was once even tempted to end his "worthless life". But at that darkest moment came an omen: "An eagle swooped down near my head, and then, soaring aloft with wildest screams, was lost in the rays of the setting sun. I knew then that a great destiny waited for me in the West."

Omen or not, Houston did not emerge from his despondency for another three years - and most of that time he was drunk.

It was not until 1832 when Ohio Congressman William Stanbery slandered *Recovered* him on the floor of the House that Houston rallied. The attack was so unjust that Houston rallied to successfully defend himself. He never returned to his former despondency and, in 1833, he entered Texas on assignment of the American Government.

In 1835, Col. James Morgan arrived with his family and slaves to open a mercantile business, settling at a place where the San Jacinto Bay empties into Galveston Bay, southeast of present day Houston. He called his place New Washington; it is now known as Morgan's Point. Mexican law did not allow slavery, so he freed his slaves and converted them to "indentured servants for 99

years." One of his slaves was Emily West, a beautiful 20 year old mulatto with yellow skin. The mulattos were also known as high yellows. As was the custom, she took the name of her master and became Emily Morgan.

That same year, Widow Lucinda Dyches, along with her sons and sons-inlaw, applied for a Spanish land grant. The interesting thing about Lucinda is that, at 72 years of age, she was one of the oldest to receive a land grant.

As many of you heard today, on March 6, 1836 - blood flowed. 183 Americans fought a desperate 90-minute battle with a vastly superior force of 4,000 Mexicans at the Alamo. Just days later, another clash occurred at Goliad where 350 more brave Texians died. Two-thirds of the Army of the Republic of Texas.

Santa Anna and his forces arrived in New Washington April 18, 1836. He was hoping to catch and kill the Texas government - but the government officials fled just moments before Santa Anna arrived. All he found was Col. Morgan's indentured servants helping load flatboats with supplies. Among those servants was Emily Morgan. Santa Anna determined on the spot to capture the beautiful young girl to be his lover. He took Emily and another young mulatto boy named Turner as captives.

Santa Anna sent out scouts to locate Houston's troops. For some unknown reason, he sent the young servant Turner with them. Emily Morgan had told Turner where Houston was camped and somehow Turner was able to slip away to warn Houston that Santa Anna was approaching.

Confident from two victories, Santa Anna felt that with less than 800 poorly supplied men - and many of them sick - Houston didn't have a chance

against his superior forces. So confident was he that he decided to rest for two days.

By April 20th, the Texians - enraged at the slaughter of their countrymen at the Alamo and Goliad - were eager to fight. Houston had been leading them into retreat for days. What he was actually doing is leading Santa Anna further and further from re-enforcements and supplies. Some 150 of Houston's men had the measles. Instead of fighting, Houston told his men to eat well and get a good night's sleep.

At the Mexican camp, the forces were up all that night, building barricades from saddle packs and supplies. The next morning, Santa Anna's brother-in-law, General Cos, arrived with 300 reinforcements. They had marched all night to get there. They stacked their guns and went into a grove of trees to sleep.

Houston's scouts reported a strange silence in the Mexican camp. Guns were stacked and all the men were inside tents with their camp women and Santa Anna was in his tent with Emily. Houston knew Emily was in the tent for he had climbed a tree and, with his telescope, had watched Emily prepare and serve breakfast to Santa Anna that morning. Houston is reported to have said: "I hope that slave girl makes him neglect his business and keeps him in bed all day." And she did.

On the afternoon of April 21st, Sam Houston conferred with his officers. Should they attack, or wait to be attacked? At 3:30 p.m., Sam Houston looked at his watch and issued the order: Attack.

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<del>ب</del>ر س 743 ragtag Texians assembled. Buckskin breeches were the nearest approach to uniforms and there was a wide diversity even there, some being new, soft and yellow, while others, from long familiarity with rain, greese and dirt had become hard, black and shiny. Boots being an unknown quantity, some wore shoes and some moccasins. Here a broad-brimmed sombrero overshadowed the military cap at its side. One veteran said later, "Uniforms -- rags were our uniforms." But the one great purpose animating every heart clothed them in a uniform more perfect than was ever donned by regulars on dress parade.

The battle of San Jacinto began at four o'clock. You'll want to make note of that. The Texan commander raised his sword and the last ragtag army of the Texas Republic moved up from the woods and across the sloping plain. It was a swashbuckling spectacle that torrid Texas afternoon ... the silken flag of libery flying in the wind, the glove of some first lieutenant's sweetheart bobbing from its staff. There was General Sam Houston, charging down the center on his splendid white stallion, waving his troops toward the enemy encampment.

There was no opposition at first. None. Then the first enemy volley thundered. General Houston's white stallion went down, but, blood filling his boot, he threw himself onto a cavalryman's pony and resumed his patrol of the line.

"REMEMBER THE ALAMO!" the battle cry ripped the sky. Then a shout came from somewhere in the rear ... "Fight for your lives! The bridge has been cut!" The bridge, their only avenue of retreat. For the Texians, it was now a fight to the death. Knives drawn, the infantry slashed ahead .. into and over torn barricades.

The Yellow Rose of Texas was written as a tribute to her, possibly by one of Col. Morgan's slaves. The original words were: "She's the sweetest rose of color this darkey ever knew." Some of you may have noticed the Emily Morgan Hotel across the street from the Alamo.

General Sam Houston became the first President of the Republic of Texas and held it in tact until it became the 28th state in 1845.

John Swanson Yarbrough and his sons, John Swanson Y. Jr. and Joseph Randolph Yarbrough were with General Sam Houston at San Jacinto. John Swanson is listed as being on the left flank at the decisive battle. His sons, 19-yearold Joseph Randolph and 17-year-old John Swanson, Jr., were assigned to guard the camp of General Sam Houston's army and did not participate in the actual battle. Swanson Jr. had the measles. Joseph Randolph Yarbrough was one of the soldiers assigned to guard Santa Anna. He is, perhaps, one of the men in this picture.

Lucinda Dyches' son-in-law, David Hutcheson McFadin, was at San Jacinto. Had a 72-year-old widow not had the courage to take out a land grant and settle her family in Texas, then perhaps her great, great, great grandson, Orman, might not be one of our hosts tonight.

If John Swanson Yarbrough had not had the courage to settle in Texas; had he and his sons not survived the battle of San Jacinto, then their descendants, Ophelia, Rea, and Billie might not be our hostesses tonight.

In fact, had Sam Houston kept drinking; had General Cos arrived a day earlier; had Emily West not been so charming ... we might be meeting in Mexico tonight.

The Mexican force was in disarray and unready for battle. General Houston kept them off balance and drove them into the marsh.

General Houston's decision to attack was strategy timed to the clock. Though his troops were outnumbered by more than two to one, the decisive factor was in his favor. For Sam Houston knew what santa Anna did at 4:00 p.m. Siesta. General Houston caught Santa Anna, literally, sleeping!

Santa Anna escaped, trying to reach his fresh troops. He found a deserted house where he changed into some discarded clothing. Then his sense of direction completely gone, he wandered back along the bayou and walked into a Texan search party who identified him immediately as a Mexican officer. In his vanity, Santa Anna still wore his elegant linen shirt with jeweled studs beneath the newly acquired blue cotton jacket. But they did not recognize him as Santa Anna until they brought him into the prisoners' compound and a prisoner saluted and cried out, "El Presidente!"

History does not record how Emily West Morgan survived the battle of San Jacinto, but she escaped and fled back to Col. Morgan's plantation at New Washington where she told her version of the battle to Col. Morgan two days later. She was given her freedom for her part in the battle and she returned to New York as a free woman. Her assistance at the battle, what she had done to detain Santa Anna, was reported in several early day histories and in documents, but later school histories ignored her part in the victory because it would have been a story difficult to explain to innocent school children. Most of you have known Emily Morgan for years.

These then were some of the times in which our ancestors lived; and some of the people who were shaping destinies and history. They are not merely names and dates in faded record books. The road to Texas independence was paved with blood. Some of our ancestors were there.

To quote Paul Harvey - here is the rest of the story. After retreating for days -- and some of the men had even heard rumors that Sam Houston was leading them not to fight Santa Anna, but back to Louisiana -- when the battle actually started, it was over in exactly the amount of time that I have taken to describe the events leading up to the battle and introduce you to some of the key people. That last ragtag army of the Republic of Texas, those brave men in their buckskin uniforms, won Texas independence in just 18 minutes. The Battle of San Jacinto lasted just 18 minutes.

The Spanish Governor's Palace is the result of an early seventeenth century rivalry between Spain and France for dominance over the territory now a part of the southwestern United States.

King Philip V of Spain, realizing that France threatened to seize the present day territories of present day southern Texas and northern Mexico if the Spanish did not colonize, in 1716 ordered Don Martin de Alarcon with fifty soldiers to build a mission and a presidio (fort) between the San Antonio and San Pedro Rivers. Upon Alarcon's arrival in 1718, he found an Indian village of the Papaya tribe encamped at the head of the San Antonio River, and San Pedro Springs. Alarcon named the settlement Villa de Bejar on the 5th of May.

Father Antonio de San Buenaventura Olivares established among the Indians, Mission San Antonio de Valero, so named in honor of the Marquis de Valero of Spain. Almost one-hundred years later, twice rebuilt and relocated, Mission San Antonio de Valero became known as the historic Alamo.

Alarcon built the Presidio de San Antonio de Bejar to protect the mission and its surrounding colony. In 1722 the Marquis of San Miguel de Aguayo ordered the presidio reconstructed on a strip of land between the San Antonio and San Pedro Rivers, an area now known as Main Plaza. At this time the original thatch buildings were replaced with adobe. Fernando Perez de Alamazon, successor to Aguayo, completed the erection of the walls, ramparts, warehouses, officer's quarters, and soldiers' barracks ... including the Commandancia, which is now the Spanish Governor's Palace.

The Commandancia, originally intended to serve as the residence of the presidio commander, came to represent the seat of Texas government when in 1772 Villa de San Fernando (San Antonio) was made the capital of the Spanish Province of Texas. Six flags fly in front of the Spanish Governor's Palace, signifying the respective Spanish, French, Mexican, Confederate, Republic of Texas, and United States occupancy of Texas.

In later years, after 1822, the Spanish Governor's Palace served as a second hand clothing store, a tailor's shop, a barroom, a restaurant, and a schoolhouse. In 1928 when the City of San Antonio decided to purchase and restore the building, only its main walls were intact ... In 1929 the building was purchased from the descendants of Jose Ignacio Perez of Spain for \$55,000.00. Perez paid 800 pesos for the building in 1804.

Only after thoroughly researching the original design and materials used in the building, was restoration undertaken and completed at the cost of \$29,514.61. Authorities state that the Governor's Palace is authentic to the last degree in room arrangement, fireplaces, the thick walls, and brick ovens. Furnishings of the Palace include antique pieces from the early 1700's.


Formal dedication of the restored Governor's Palace was March 4, 1931 highlighting religious and festive ceremonies commemorating the founding of Villa San Fernando (San Antonio) in March 1731. The Spanish Governor's Palace, since its dedication in 1931, has been under the supervision of the Department of Parks and Recreation of the City of San Antonio. The Spanish Governor's Palace was named a National Historic Landmark in 1970 by the Department of the Interior.


The Commandancia was completed in 1749 as told by the keystone above its front doors, engraved with a double-headed eagle, a simplified version of the coat of arms of King Ferdinand VI of Spain and the words "año 1749-se acabó." The doors of the Palace are of hand carved walnut, copied from etchings of the original doors at the time of restroration.

An old timer, who says his father related the story to him, tells a story of the history of Spanish America as written in the symbols carved on the front doors of the Spanish Governor's Palace ... (Reading from the top right side of the door and down).

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The sea-shells represent the mother country over the sea, the dragons are the dangers encountered by the first settlers and the baby face represents the new country, America. They brought with them their arms for their protection and they came into the great land of flowers and plenty where they found the Indian. ... (Continuing on the left hand door reading from the bottom up). The medallion showing the head of a Spanish conquistador represents the Spaniards who came into this land of flowers and plenty (flower symbols) and by reason of their arms (the shields) conquered all the dangers (the dragons) including the Indians (mask of Indian Medicine Man) and so these first settlers won this land for the mother country over the sea (sea-shells).





## San Antonio Missions

The Spanish missions formed the foundation for the city of San Antonio. From its colonial beginnings as a small settlement near the missions, San Antonio developed into one of the 10 largest cities in the United States. The modern San Antonio community recognized the structures' significance, and since the 1920's has endeavored to preserve them. The Archdiocese of San Antonio, the San Antonio Conservation Society, the Texas Department of Parks & Wildlife, and a number of municipal agencies have played a part in maintaining these remnants of our national heritage. In 1978 the United States Congress pledged Federal support by establishing the San Antonio Missions National Historical Park. With this recognition of national significance came the commitment of the National Park Service to stabilize and preserve the historic structures. By formal agreement the Archdiocese of San Antonio and the National Park Service encourage visitor enjoyment of these sites while ensuring there is no interference with the traditional services at the four active parishes.

#### **New World Architecture**

The sources for the architecture of the Texas missions lie in Spain, which served as a clearing house for many styles and motifs. A variety of features were incorporated into the construction of the missions. Colorful Moorish designs and intricate Renaissance details complement Romanesque forms and Gothic arches. Mission builders, skilled craftsmen recruited from Mexico, preserved the basic Spanish model, with modifications dictated by frontier conditions. Indian participation in the building of these churches helped foster a sense of community.



The handsome church at Concepción looks essentially as it did more than 200 years ago when it stood at the center of local religious activity. Colorful geometric designs originally covered its surface, but the patterns have long since faded. From the beginning, Mission Concepción hosted religious festivals. The friars strove to replace traditional Indian ritual through the demonstration of Christian ide-

als. Carvings of the saints and colorful paintings of other deities were popular visual representations of Catholicism among the Indians. Morality plays, and celebrations such as *Los Pastores*, a colorful drama honoring the birth of Christ, were common practice.

In addition, the friars formalized the Indian's acceptance of Catholicism through the adminis-

tration of the sacraments. While some conversions were temporary at best, the combination of strict teaching and pageantry was, on the whole, successful.

Many Indians continued to practice the Catholic faith after secularization. Today, some members of Concepción parish are likely descended from those early converts.



One year after Fray Antonio Margii de Jesús left the failed missions in East Texas, he founded what would become the largest and best known of the Texas missions. After early travails, San José prospered, its 300 inhabitants sustained by extensive fields and herds of livestock. Viewed as the model among the Texas missions, San José major social and cultural center. A visitor in 1777 referred to the structure as the "Queen of the Missions." So rich an enterprise was a natural target for mounted Apache and Comanche raiders. With technical help from the two or three presidial troops garrisoned there. San José residents learned to defend themselves. Already proficient Although they could not prevent raids on their livestock, the mission itself was almost impregnable. In his journal, Fray Juan Agustin Morfi attested to the defensive character of mission San José: "It is, in truth, the first mission in America... in point of beauty, plan, and strength ... there is not a presidio along the entire frontier line that can compare



## San Juan

Espada



Originally christened San José de los Nazonis while in East Texas, the reestablished mission of San Juan Capistrano made its permanent home along the banks of the San Antonio River in 1731. By mid-century, San Juan, with its rich farm and pasturelands, was a regional supplier of agricultural produce.

San Juan was a selfsustaining community. Within the compound, Indian artisans produced iron, wood, cloth, and leather goods from the workshops. Orchards and gardens outside the walls provided melons, pumpkins, grapes, and peppers. Beyond the mission complex, Indian farmers cultivated corn, beans, squash, sweet potatoes, and even sugar cane in irrigated fields. A few miles southeast of Mission San Juan was *Rancho Pataguilla*, which in 1762 reported 3,500

These products helped support not only the San Antonio missions, but also the local settlements and presidial garrisons in the area. With its surplus, San Juan established a trade network stretching east to Louisiana and south to Coahuila. Mexico. This thriving economy helped the mission to survive epidemics and Indian attacks in its final years.

In 1731, after their retreat from East Texas, the founders of San Francisco de los Tejas moved the mission to the San Antonio River and renamed it San Francisco de la Espada. The southermost of the San Antonio chain

of missions, Espada appears as remote today as it did in the mid-1700s. After each mission developed a solid economy, the

As plows, farm implements, and the gear for horses and mules fell into disrepair, a blacksmith became indispensable. Tanning and weaving skills were needed to clothe the Indians. Following Spanish policy, the friars strove to make life in the mission communities closely resemble that of Spanish villages. As mission buildings became

more elaborate. Indian

occupants learned the skills of masonry and carpentry, generally under the direction of local craftsmen.

After secularization, the vocational skills acquired during the mission period proved beneficial to the post-colonial growth of San Antonio. The influence of these Indian artisans is evident throughout the city today.

### The Acequia System

The initial success of any new mission was dependent upon the planting and harvesting of crops. Sparse rainfall and the need for irrigation water made the design and installation of an acequia system a high priority. So important was irrigation in Spanish Texas that cropland was measured in suertes, the amount of land that could be watered in one day. The Moslems introduced the use of acequias irrigation ditches—to the arid regions of Spain. Once arrived on the frontier, the Franciscans found the system well suited for use in the desert Southwest. In order to distribute the water, missionaries and Indians built seven gravity-flow ditches, five dams, and an aqueduct—a 15-mile network that irrigated about 3,500 acres of land.


The best preserved of these acequias is the one near Mission Espada. Espada Dam, completed by 1740, diverted river water into an acequia madre (mother ditch). It is still in operation, but now plays a secondary role beside the modern dam. The water was carried over Piedras Creek

through Espada Aqueduct-one of the oldest arched Spanish aqueducts in the United States (left). Using floodgates, the aguador (water master) controlled the volume of water sent to each field for irrigation and for such auxiliary uses as bathing, washing, and power for mill wheels. Today, nearby farms still use the water from this system.





The venerable JOHN ADAMS, the second President of the United States, and one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence - is no more. 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
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
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
## ARKANSAS

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The TERRITORY OF ARKANSAS was created by Congress in 1819 from the southern part of the Territory of Missouri. The five original counties in ARKANSAS TERRITORY were: Lawrence, Arkansas, Pulaski, Clark and Hempstead. Pulaski, Clark and Hempstead Counties had been created in a division of Arkansas County in 1818. iii

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#### INTRODUCTION

The actual schedules of the 1820 census of the Territory of Arkansas (the part containing the names of the heads of households) have been lost for many years. Since this census was the first taken after Arkansas became a separate entity, it would have been an important source of information to both historians and genealogists. I became fascinated with the idea of preparing a "reconstructed" 1820 census of Arkansas about twelve years ago and have worked on the project from time to time since 1973.

Originally, I planned to begin with the 1814, 1815 and 1816 tax lists of Arkansas County and the 1815 and 1816 tax lists of Lawrence County—both from the Missouri territorial archives—and include all available tax lists, including the delinquent lists published in the ARKANSAS GAZETTE, through 1828. I selected that terminal date because the 1828 tax list of Pulaski County is the first extant schedule for that important county. That date also permitted the inclusion of some petitions signed by residents of Miller County in 1825 and 1828—important because no early tax list of Miller County has survived (except the delinquent tax lists published in the newspaper).

By 1976, I had copied all the tax lists and petitions, including the 1820 tax list of Lawrence County (compiled before Independence County was created), which was misfiled on the microfilm by the Arkansas History Commission as an 1831 tax list. I then had quite a bit of information, but I tried to think of some way to increase the coverage for Hempstead, Clark and Phillips Counties—for which no early tax lists (except the delinquent lists) were available. It was then that I decided to include jury lists, since early court records for those counties are available.

I once scrapped the project because I thought that what I had was really too broad to make any real contribution to genealogical and historical research. (Not that it would be unacceptable—some of the tax records used for reconstructed 1790 censuses predated the census date by eight years.) I later resurrected the project and decided to narrow the coverage down to three principal years—1819, 1820 and 1821—and widen the type of records used for entries. Who would mind if I found Thomas BURROWS in a Pulaski County deed rather than on a tax or jury list? Since Pulaski County deeds are extant from 1819, I was satisfied with that source as the basis for my "reconstructed"

Because of the importance of the documents to Pulaski County, I later decided to use the names from the 1818 tax assessment record of Arkansas County—which could be broken down by townships of general areas of Arkansas County—and four petitions circulated in the latter part of 1818 in that part of Arkansas County which was to become Pulaski County in 1819.

It is more difficult to use deed and court records in trying to establish residence, but I worked out a system based on common sense and a general

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knowledge of the legal structure of the time. In court proceedings, a defendant in a civil case was either a resident of the county or had some property interest in the county, and a defendant in a criminal case was allged to have been in the county when the criminal offence was committed. While neither is proof of residence, appearance on a <u>resident</u> tax list is also not an absolute proof of residence—I found some non-residents listed on resudebt tax lists because they had property in the county, although they lived in another county in the territory.


The "reconstructed" census which follows provides the names of individuals who may have been listed as heads of household on the lost 1820 census of the Territory of Arkansas. In addition to the records cited in the "County Information" section in the back of the book, I used the following sources: Superior Court Record (Arkansas) 1820-1823; TERRITORIAL PAPERS OF THE UNITED STATES (Clarence Edwin Carter, editor), Volume XIX: TERRITORY OF ARKANSAS, 1819-1825; Register of Militia Commissions (Arkansas Territory), 1820-1836; and the files of the ARKANSAS GAZETTE.

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## THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS 1837-1846

#### CREATION OF HOUSTON COUNTY

By 1837, leaders of this area, a part of Nacogdoches, felt strong and secure enough to petition the First Congress assembled to make them a county. Their petition was written from Mustang Prairie and dated April 22, 1837. (6) It reads: "To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives when in Congress Assembled:

"We, the undersigned, your petitioners, citizens of said republic do most respectfully pray that your honorable body make for us a county on the East side of Trinity River, beginning at Robbins Ferry on said Trinity; Thence running fifteen miles each side of the old San Antonio Road and East far enough to make a constitutional county, and we do further pray that your Honorable Body appoint three disinterested commissioners out of the bounds of said county to locate the seat of justice for said county in granting the aforesaid petition, we, your petitioners as duty bound will ever pray, etc."

The Republic and the state of Texas granted 1,816 donation certificates for 640 acres each, for a total of 1,162,240 acres of land. These donations were granted to participants in the following campaigns or battles:

1. The men at Goliad, or their heirs	405
2. The men in the siege of Bexar	443
3. The men at San Jacinto	718
4. The men who guarded the baggage at Harrisburg during the battle of San Jacinto	134
5. The heirs of the men who fell in the Alamo	115
6. Unclassified (service not given)	1
TOTAL	1,816

The list of Donation Land Grants was compiled by a different procedure than the list of Bounty Land Grants. Whereas the list of Bounty Land Grants lists every warrant issued, including duplicates and those that were rejected, the following list of Donation Land Grants usually lists only one—the one that was patented or surveyed, or, in case none were surveyed or patented, the information for one of the certificates issued. Many of the men received two, three, or sometimes four donation certificates. As mentioned elsewhere, it is believed that the Adjutant General turned the issuing of certificates over to clerks who were often careless in issuing duplicates for originals that had not been lost but had been patented. The vigilant Court of Claims caught most of these duplicates and rejected them if the original was found not to have been lost. It appears that the Texans were not averse to receiving two or more land certificates when they were entitled to only one. One very prominent Texan received two donation certificates for fighting at San Jacinto, and the Court of Claims rejected one. Two miles northwest of Seabreeze, Chambers County, centering around the H.T. & B. Nos. 102, 103, 118, J.T. White, No. 128, and A. Ybarbo surveys, the Sun Oil Company has found the largest gas reserve in the Gulf Coast in what is known as the Seabreeze and Willow Slough fields. The Sun Oil Company's Acom No. 1 brought in November 18, 1936, at a depth of 8,111 to 8,190 feet with a showing of sixty barrels of 50 gravity distillate daily through one-fourth inch choker and 1,000,000 cubic feet of gas definitely opened up the Seabreeze field. Then, in November, 1937, Sun Oil's Acom 3 on H.T. & B. tract No. 103 established the Willow Slough field. The well produced 644 barrels of 40.5 gravity oil in twentyone hours on a quarter-inch choke from a depth of 8,415 to 8,450 feet in faulted structure, Frio formation.<sup>121</sup>

The number of producing wells in the Willow Slough and Seabreeze fields on July 1, 1938, was six. The cumulative production of these fields on July 1, 1938, was 143,086 barrels of oil. There were two rigs running on July 1, 1938, and one on July 1, 1939. The productive acreage is 3,000 with 300 acres now developed.<sup>122</sup>

Salt Dome Oil Corporation and Gem Oil Company leased around 4,600 acres on and off the west shore of Galveston Bay in the vicinity of Cedar Point in September, 1935.<sup>123</sup>

Standard Oil Company of Texas and Salt Dome Oil Corporation's joint State of Texas No. 1, one mile off shore of Cedar Point in Galveston Bay, was completed January 12, 1938, at 6,030 feet with 647 barrels of oil daily on a quarter-inch choker. The formation is Frio with no domal structure encountered as yet, but it is believed to be a deep-seated salt dome.<sup>124</sup> Standard Oil Company of Texas and Salt Dome Oil Corporation's No. 117-13 State, a semi-wildcat test on the southwestern flank of the Cedar Point field, Galveston Bay, was drilling in July, 1939, below 6,817 feet in shale. There was no show of oil in the two higher sands of the fields.<sup>125</sup>

A feature of the Cedar Point field is that the derrick and drilling machinery are on a barge which is filled with cerup to the Mexican government as to the good character of the ones asking for the land.<sup>22</sup>

Chambers County settlers who took land in Vehlein's or Zavala's grants and whose abstracts were not granted by them were Vicente Padilla (east side of Trinity River, 1830, and title given by J. Antonio Padilla, secretary Executive Department of Coahuila and Texas); Solomon \* Barrow, Robert Wiseman, Henry Griffith, William B. Hodges (west side of the Trinity River), James McFaddin and Shadrack Burney (east of the Trinity River, all dated 1831, and signed by J.P. Madero, land commissioner for Coahuila and Texas); Peter Elias Bean (east of the Trinity River, dated 1833, and granted by Vicente Aldrete, land commissioner for Mexican citizens); Thomas Jefferson Chambers (east side of the Trinity River, dated 1834, and given for services rendered as chief justice of the supreme court of Coahuila and Texas by I.R. Lewis, 'special land commissioner of Coahuila and Texas); and Benjamin J. Winfree (west of the Trinity River) and Francisco Valmore (east of the Trinity River, both dated 1835, and signed by C.S. Taylor, special land commissioner for Coahuila and Texas at Nacogdoches).

Zavala granted land to John S. Roberts, James Hoggett, and Joseph Whitcomb on the east side of the Trinity River in 1835.

Settlers taking land in Vehlein's grant in 1835 and the transaction being signed by him were J. Townsend, William D. Smith, James Armstrong, William Bloodgood, Hannah Nash, Hugh Morgan, Chas. P. Welch (all west of the Trinity River) and Moses A. Carrol, James McGahey, Maria T. Boden, Anastacio Ybarbo, Maria G. Diaz, Eluterio Lopez, and Jose Maria Duran (east of the Trinity River).<sup>23</sup>

The Wallis family came to what is now Chambers County in 1825. Two bachelors, Burney and Arnold, arrived at what is now Wallisville, about the same time. Elisha Henry Robert Wallis came from Burke County,

Parisii, Louisiana. An me Subme lan r that got boats and went down that river and up ( Neches River to where the town of Beaumont is now. From there they traveled with wagons and ox teams, reaching the town of Liberty, December 25, 1824. They came down the Trinity River on flatboats and in the first week of the year 1825 they reached and located on what is known as Wallis Hill, just east of Wallisville. With them came Sally (Barrow) Wallis' three brothers, Solomon, Benjamin, and Reuben, helping to drive a small stock of cattle before them, the family traveling in a farm wagon. Solomon Barrow's descendants are well represented in the western part of Chambers County today. Benjamin Barrow settled near White's Bayou and Reuben Barrow on Double Bayou Reuben's oldest child, Martha (Mrs. Joseph LaFour), was the first child born there.<sup>24</sup>

The three oldest Wallis children were girls. The eldest Rachel, was eight years of age when the family came to Texas. Her husband, James Dunman, fought in the battle of San Jacinto in 1836, and was in the war with Mexico in 1846-1848.<sup>25</sup>

Two cousins of the Barrow brothers came to Texa later, and were locally known as French Ben and Dutch Reuben Barrow, to distinguish them from Benjamin and Reuben Barrow. Dutch Reuben is known to have take part in the war with Mexico in 1846-1848.

The Wallis home was a stopping place for traveler coming from the United States and going farther west int Texas. Santa Anna and one of his aides, Alamán, staye all night in the E.H.R. Wallis home, sometime after th Battle of San Jacinto, when they were being taken a prisoners to Washington.<sup>26</sup>

Another family to settle in what is now Chamber County, in 1827, and, incidentally, which intermarrie much with the Wallis family, was that of James Tayle White. White and wife, the first of the James Tayle Whites of southeast Texas, came down the trail which le

"ARNOLD, HAYDEN S., was born in Tennessee in 1805, came to Texas late in December, 1835, and took the oath of allegiance to the Mexican Government, Jan. 14, 1835, at Nacogdoches. Settling there, he was made Captain of the 'Nacogdoches Volunteers' - a company organized March 6, 1836. Later known as the First Company of the Second Regiment of Texas Volunteers, the troops were commanded by Arnold and were disbanded June 6, 1836, at La Bahia by T. J. Rusk. In his service record, Capt. Arnold certified that he had lost in action at San Jacinto, his London Yager gun... it being shot almost off at the breech and later broken entirely and left on the field. In the House of the First Congress, he represented Nacogdoches, being appointed by President Houston during the session, November 20, 1838, Secretary of a Commission to treat with the Indians. As late as December 20, 1838, he was District clerk, pro tem, of the Nacogdoches District. On July 3, 1839, Captain Arnold died at his home in Nacogdoches, and in 1936, the State of Texas erected a monument at his grave in Oak Grove Cemetery."

Capt. Arnold was survived by his wife, Salina, and three children: James R. ARNOLD, who married Sarah MUCKLEROY, 25th November 1846 in Nacogdoches, Texas; Sophronia C., who married George W. LONG, April 20th, 1844, in San Augustine, Texas; and Hayden ARNOLD, Jr., who died about the age of 21 and never married. Mrs. Salina ARNOLD died 3rd of August, 1840, and was buried in Oak Grove Cemetery beside her husband, Capt. Hayden S. ARNOLD.

James R. ARNOLD's daughter, Odelia, who was born in 1848, married Peyton F. Edwards, 24th December 1867. Peyton F. EDWARDS was the grandson of Haden EDWARDS, who led the Fredonian Rebellion.

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# JOHN SWANSON YARBROUGH

John Swanson Yarbrough was born December 25, 1777. in the State of North Carolina. Family tradition and birth places of some of the known children place him in Tennessee, Louisiana and Arkansas. The first census I have found on him is the 1820 census of Hempstead County, ArkansasTerritory. On the 17th day of June, 1831, he sold his farm in Arkansas Territory, the Township of Mine Creek, near the town of Ozan, to one Matthew Gray of the town of Washington, Hempstead Co. Arkansas. Swanson entered Texas in February, 1832, at San Augustine, as shown in his entrance certificate on file at the General Land Office in Austin. The entrance certificate lists him as a native of North Carolina, a married man with a family of ten persons. The land office also holds entrance certificates for his two sons, Joseph Randolph Yarbrough and John Swanson Yarbrough, Jr., both single.

John Swanson Yarbrough is found on the Honor Roll of the Battle of San Jacinto and is listed in many books and publications as a Hero of San Jacinto. The State Archives of Texas has in their holdings, the Muster Rolls of the Texas Revolution, listing Swanson in the Second Regiment of Texas Volunteers, with Sidney Sherman, colonel, in the 1st Company in the command of Captain Hayden Arnold. His sons, Randolph and Swanson Jr., were listed on muster rolls also, but did not participate in the actual battle, staying behind to guard the camp of Gen. Sam Houstons Army.

Swanson was issued many thousands of acres of land for his participation in this hattle that gave Texas her freedom from Mexico. The library at the San Jacinto Monument has confused the 2 John Swanson Yarbroughs, and credits Swanson, Sr. with some of the land actually given to Swanson Yarbrough, Jr.

Swanson has, many land dealings in Texas. I am beginning to believe he was a land speculator more than a farmer-rancher. I find recorded in Nacogdoches, Tex., him selling his headright certificate he was issued at Shelbyville, Shelby Co., Texas, on Feb. 1, 1838. He is listed on the petition to form Houston County from Nacogdoches Co. He is listed in Houston Co. buying and selling town lots. He is in Crockett, Houston Co. Texas Oct. 20, 1846, when my grandmother, Amanda Arminda Yarbrough is born. Swanson was in Grimes County July 28, 1848, when he sold a Crockett town lot to John Hall. There are

many land deals in other Tarac Counting

Swansons' grandchildren, in an article published in the Dallas Morning News September 20, 1935, stated their grandfather was the operator of the first hotel at Crockett, Texas. These grandchildren were the sons and daughters of Joseph Randolph Yarbrough, and all of them lived to be in their nineties, all very active until their death. Most of the Yarbrough descendants have enjoyed longevity.

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The exact number of wives Swanson had is not known to the decendants of Amanda Yarbrough Walker. Family tradition says his first wife was Elizabeth Gailbraith, but we have no written proof of this. His second wife is unknown but believed to be a Coker, and sister to his third wife, Frances Coker Moore Tope, who he married in Houston County, Tx., about 1845. She was a widow with two known sons, John Moore and James Henry Tope, and this is believed to be her third marriage. Frances was born in Arkansas Territory in 1813, probably Hempstead or Clark County. When Swanson brought her home as a bride, one of his young sons greeted her with "why, hello, Aunt Fannie." John Moore married Ellen Winters and James Tope married Dorcas Salina Winters, sisters living near Oakville, in Liveoak Co., closest village to Yarbroughs Bend.

While searching the Gonzales County 1855 school census for my Mothers family, Wells-Wright-Patton, I came across a S. Yarbrough with four children, 3 boys and 1 girl. I thought at the time it could be him because<sup>4</sup>the children are right. When I visited the Gonzales County Courthouse, I found him buying and selling land in 1850. He is also listed on some land deals as the Administrator of the Estate of John R. Castleman, an early settler on the Sandies Creek, Gonzales Co. Could this be another son+in-law?


About 1858, Swanson moved his family from Gonzales County down to what later became McMullen County, on the Frio River to a small village named for him, Yarbroughs Bend. Other families who settled there with him were the Benjamin Franklin Winters, Dr. George Dillworths, and the Joseph Walker families. This area in the bend of the Frio River was on the Dr. George Dillworth place. Several cabins were built in this area, picket style with a packed earth floor.

Frances Coker Yarbrough was known throughout the country as an excellent nurse and midwife, while Swanson was a cattle and horse man. At that time there were no fences in McMullen County, horses and cattle romed free where ever the grazing was best, and mavericks were for the taking. In October, 1862, John . Swanson Yarbrough was shot and killed in his corral by a horse trader, believed to be Engate or Wingate, in a dispute over a horse. He was buried at Yarbroughs Bend, a few hundred yards from the bend of the river that was named for him. Frances died of unknown sickness at Ft. Ewell in 1868 while helping in the birth of a child. She was brought home and buried next to Swanson at Yarbroughs Bend. The U.S. Department of Reclamation, when building Choke Canyon Dam over the Frio River, removed the graves from Yarbroughs Bend Cemetery to Hilltop Cemetery in Tilden, Texas. I witnessed part of this project, done by the University of Texas at San Antonio, Dept. of Archaeology. There were the bones of my ancestors, and I knew little about their lives, who they were or where they came from. I have begun a desperate search to know these people better, realizing that a part of them lives within me. Bits and pieces are coming, but slow; it was so long ago and records were not kept or were burned or destroyed. Swanson has never received due credit for his part of building Texas and his battle that freed Texas from Mexico fought on the twenty-first of April, 1836. No marker has been placed on his grave for being a citizen of the Republic of Texas, nor for his part in the Texas Revolution.


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

# <u>St. Louis Day Trip</u> Historic Missouri settlements charm visitors

This day trip from the *Gateway* -*Guidebook* will take you south of St. Louis to the German settlement of Kimmswick and on to historic Ste. Genevieve, the first permanent settlement west of the Mississippi River. A stop at the Mastodon State Park (named for the animals that roamed the area 10,000 to 13,000 years ago), near Imperial in Jefferson County completes this historic adventure.

To begin this trip, take Highway 61/67 south approximately 20 miles to Kimmswick, one mile east of Imperial. Theodore Kimm, a native of Brunswick, Germany, founded the town in 1859. He named the town after himself and added the suffix "wick," which means village or station in German. This community prospered after the Civil War with a flour mill, a brewery, a lumber yard, a brick kiln and several other businesses. It became a favorite spot of prominent St. Louisans because of the healthful mineral springs north of town.

Today you will find historic homes, antique and craft shops and restaurants. The residents, many of them descendants of early Kimmswick families, have preserved and restored the early charms of this small village. The shops are generally open 10 a.m.-4 p.m. Tuesday-Sunday.

After a visit to Kimmswick, proceed south on Highway 61/67. If you're taking this tour on a weekend day, you'll be able to browse at several large flea markets between Kimmswick and Crystal City.

Continue on Highway 61/67 to Ste. Genevieve, 32 miles south of Kimmswick and located on the west bank of the Mississippi River. The village was established between 1725 and 1750 after the French founded New Orleans. Today Ste. Genevieve retains many examples of French Colonial vertical log homes built by farmers and fur traders, along with authentic German flavor from brick step-gabled homes and business structures.

The turnoff for Ste. Genevieve will bring you into town on Market Street. Continue to Third Street and turn left. On the left-hand side is the Tourist Information Center. This is the starting point for the Ste. Genevieve area tour. Here you can obtain information on all the activities available in the area, which include touring the many historic homes and shopping in Ste.



Genevieve's historic downtown area, which is filled with antique and specialty shops, restaurants and a winery. The center is open daily from 9-11 a.m. and 12-4 p.m. For more information or to arrange a group tour, phone the center at (314) 883-3461.

Directly behind the information center is the Ste. Genevieve Museum.

Across the street from the museum is the town's most prominent landmark-Ste. Genevieve Catholic Church. The steeple can be seen for several miles from all directions. This is the third church built on this site by the townspeople and was completed in 1880 after being under construction for four years. The church continues to serve as the center of community life.

One block east of the Visitors Center is the Felix Valle State Historic Site, at Merchant and Second Streets, built in 1818 as a Federal style store and residence. The home is a fine example of the American influence on an essentially French settlement after the Louisiana Purchase in 1803. Tours are offered Monday through Saturday from 10 a.m.-4 p.m., except for Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Day. Admission is \$1.25 for adults and 75 cents for those age 6-12. For more information, phone (314) 883-7102.

There are several other homes in the



area that can be toured. The Bolduc House, built in 1770, is regarded as the first and most authentically restored Creole house in the nation. It is restored with the original 18th-century furnishings, stockade fence, frontier kitchen and medicinal herb gardens. The Guibourd-Valle House is the most elegantly furnished museum house in town. With its rose garden and stone well, this 1790s house is handsomely restored to reflect the pioneer French settler who inhabited it.

The Green Tree Tavern, built by George Rogers Clark's (of the famous expedition) friend Nicholas Janis, was a tavern and inn following the Louisiana Purchase. The Amoureaux House, built in 1770, was the home of French nobleman Mathurin Michel Amoureaux, a correspondent of Thomas Jefferson. Here there is an antique doll and toy collection, along with an antique shop and country store. The Bolduc-LeMeilleur House is an interesting combination of French and American influences on local architecture. The Bequette-Ribault Living History Museum features an authentically restored 18th-century French Creole poteauz-en-terre house on its original site. It is one of four "post-in-ground" houses in the nation. Visitors participate in hearth cooking and colonial crafts.

The Beauvais House is another of

the four post-in-ground houses remaining in this country. Huge cedar logs form the original ceilings of the home. The tour stresses the written recollections of H.M. Brackenridge, who spent his formative years with the Beauvais family. Candle dipping in the old brick smokehouse, pottery demonstrations, porcelain doll making techniques and lovely enclosed herb and vegetable gardens are also part of the tour.


After visiting Ste. Genevieve, plan to stop at the Mastodon State Park. Follow Highway 61 north to Interstate 55. Take I-55 north to the Imperial and Kimmswick exit. Turn left here and follow the outer road on the west side of I-55 a short distance north. One block past Seckman Road is Mastodon State Park Visitors Center and Museum. Here visitors will learn of the mastodon, an extinct animal that resembled an elephant but was much larger. Exhibits and dioramas are also at the center, and an excavation pit is adjacent to the building. The center is open Monday through Saturday from 9 a.m.-4:30 p.m. and on Sunday from noon-4:40 p.m. Admission is free. For more information phone (314) 464-2976.


The park is open daily from 8 a.m. to sundown. Admission is free.

From here backtrack to I-55 and travel north to St. Louis. Round-trip mileage is approximately 130 miles.

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

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Mrs. J.J. Carpenter, nee Loye Yarbrough, is one of the daughters of the late Scott M. Yarbrough of Grapeland, Texas. She gave the following information about the Yarbrough family:

Scott M. Yarbrough was married twice. His first wife was Mattie E. Neel, and his second wife was Mattie Jane Simpson. Mattie Jane had two daughters, Loye and Audrey. (She was Mrs. Carpenter's mother.) Both of Scott M. Yarbrough's wives are buried at the Davis Cemetery near Grapeland. To the right of Mattie Neel Yarbrough's garve is an unmarked grave in which is buried her infant son. There are two unmarked graves on the left, but Yarbroughs are not buried in them.

Joseph Randolph Yarbrough, Scott Yarbrough's father, who fought in the Battle of San Jacinto, is buried in the front yard of the old Yarbrough home place west of Grapeland, out towards Dealey. Contrary to what Lou Kemp said, JRY is not buried in an unmarked grave at the Grapeland City Cemetery in an unmarked grave. In fact, Scott Yarbrough, when his doughter Loye was about 13 years old, went out to the old home place and made an unsuccessful attempt to locate his father's grave.

JRY's father came to America from England with 6 brothers. Mrs. Carpenter doesn't know his given names.

JRY's father moved to Texas after the Revolution. He built the first hotel in Crockett. He was married twice. His second wife was an Indian. They moved from Crockett to west Texas, where he raised his second family, which was very large. He lived to be 95 years old.

When JRY came to Texas, the name was spelled "Yarborough", but it got changed somehow after the Texas Revolution. The current Yarbrough family was unaware of this until historians began working on the Battle of San

The only family Bible which Mrs. Carpenter knows of is in the possession of her cousin, Mr. Johh R. Owens of Greenville, Texas.

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Mr. Owens is the cousin of Mrs. J.J. Carpenter (nee Loye Yarbrough) and Miss Audrey Yarbrough, daughters of Scott M. Yarbrough.

He has an old Yarbrough family Bible (presumably the Joseph Randolph Yarbrough Bible), but he wasn't able to find any data in it other than an old paper which reads identically with the Lou Kemp paper on Joseph Randolph Yarbrough.

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Scott M. Yarbrough's father was Joseph Randolph Yarbrough. JRY's father came to West Virginia as a child with his parents from England. His father was married three times. His third wife was an Indian.

JRY and his brother Swanson came to Texas with Sam Houston.

Miss Yarbrough knows nothing of the kin of Swanson Yarbrough, except that the Waggoners of Fort Worth married into the Swanson Yarbrough family.

Dear Mr. Snith:

Thank you very much for the kind remarks in your letter of August 7.

As a Momber of the Senate Post Office and Civil Service Consistent since my first arrival here in April of 1957. I have consistently supported legislation that seeks to approve the working conditions, the benefits, and the prestige of the Federal cervice. I have consistently supported legislation to increase the canuities for employees engaged in hecardees duties from 2 to 2½ per cent, and shall do everything in my power to assist Senator Cerlson in the passage of his bill.

The information about your relatives is of great interest to me because I have read a great deal in history of the Yarboroughs of Davidson County, North Carolina. As the Yarboroughs went Mestward, their families were large and their descendents are scattered through Tennessee, Alabama, Missicsipal, Louisiana, Arkansas, Kentucky, Texas, and now on the Pacific Ocean.

My great grandfather was named William Yarborough, but there were many William Yarboroughs, and the enclosed copies of correspondence with Mrs. R. Y. McClein of Columbia, Tennessee, states part of the problem. We know cur line back through William Yarborough, and that he was married to a woman whose first name was Bathsheba, but whose surname we do not have, about 1794; and I do not know whether that was before he migrated to Tennessee or after. Some think that he went from South Carolina to Tennessee or Coergis to Tennessee, but legend has it that he went from North Caroling. Hr. Charles II. Smith Page 2 August 15, 1967

As the families went Westword, their possessions were limited by wagon space as overland travel by wagon train was slow, burdenome, empensive, and difficult; and most of their records, save for the family Bible, were left behind. You will find that in the West the records are very imperfect compared to those kept by families who stayed at the same place. Perhaps you can help me fill in this gop.

It is a pleasure to hear from you. I have heard of the remions of the Yarboroughs of North Carolins. The Yarboroughs in Missicsippi also have a vounder each year, and there are several remions of different branches of the Yarborough family in Texas.

There were three numbers of the Yarborough femily in Sam Houston's army in Tomas in 1826 as they retreated before Santa Anna. Two were down with the measles with the baggege train (about 130 of the Temps incops were down with the measles and were unable to travel) and were left bohind, but the chemy troops were unable to locate them and they ecomped. One Yarborough, Swanson Yarborough, was in Sam Meuston's charge that annihilated Santa Anna's sumy.






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MUSEUM contains varied collections of local memorabilia. Items of interest include: Prehistoric and historic Indian relics, old documents and Spanish land grants, artifacts from Missouri's first industry, the Saline Creek Salt Works. Scale model of the Mississippi River Railroad Transfer Boat "The Ste. Genevieve." Open daily. Admission charge.



MAISON GUIBOURD - VALLE HOUSE was built about the 1784's by a pioneer French settler. Handsomely restored, it is the most elegantly furnished museum house in town. The attick with Norman truss and hand-hewn oak beams secured by wooden pegs features changing exhibits and dried herb display. Beautiful courtyard and rose garden contain an old stone well. Costumed tour guides. Open to public. Admission charge.



FELIX VALLE STATE HISTORIC SITE was built in 1818 as a Federal style store and residence. Occupied by Felix and Odile Pratte Valle as a residence and mercantile headquarters for the Menard & Valle trade firm. The home shows the American influence on an essentially French settlement after the Louisiana Purchase in 1803. A State Historic Site administered by the Department of Natural Resources. Open to public. Admission charge.



**BOLDUC HOUSE**, built 1770 and moved to its present site in 1784, is regarded as the first, most authentically restored Creole house in the nation. It has earned the respect of architectural historians everywhere. Accurately restored with the original 18th century furnishings, stockade fence, frontier kitchen, living quarters, 18th century culinary and medicinal herb gardens and grape arbor. Bolduc, unquestionably the best-known house in the Middle Mississippi River Valley is øpen April - November. Admission includes house and garden tours. Cook house features herbal crafts and solvenirs.



BOLDUC - LeMEILLEUR HOUSE was built in 1820 by grandson-in-law of Louis Bolduc. The brace frame structure with brick nogging is an interesting example of combined French and American influences on local architecture. Accurately restored and furnished with fine examples of early Federal pieces. Vintage herb and scented gardens of the early 19th century complement the house. Open weekends April - November and open daily June 1 - September 1. Admission charge.



GREEN TREE INN was built in 1789 by Nicholas Janis, friend of George Rogers Clark. First inn, tavern, and tobacco shop west of the Mississippi. Used as first Masonic meeting place in Missouri. Beautiful original walnut shutters, doors and mantels. An unusual tri angular fireplace opens into three rooms. Roof rafters are made from 150 young walnut trees. Charmingly furnished with local antiques and antique quilts. Open to public. Admission charge.



AMOUREAUX HOUSE, built 1770, was the French Creole poteaux-en-terre home of French nobleman Mathurin Michael Amoureaux, correspondent of Thomas Jefferson. Believed to be the oldest, most authentic building in Missouri. Huge Norman truss originally supported a thatched roof which architects have used as a model for other restorations. Furnishings include rare doll and toy collection and log building to rear on the site of old kitchen is Country Store - gifts and souvenirs. Admission charge.



BEQUETTE-RIBAULT LIVING HISTORY MU-SEUM features authentically restored 18th Century French Creole poteaux-en-terre house on its original site. One of four post in ground houses in the country. Other period structures undergoing restoration. Visitirs participate in hearth cooking and colonial crafts. Open by appointment to individuals and groups. Tour guides in period dress. 883-7171. No admission charge.

The Village of Ste. Genevieve, Missouri, located on the west bank of the Mississippi 60 miles south of St. Louis, provides the visitor with a glimpse into a historic European town, the oldest permanent settlement in the state.

Established between 1725 and 1750 after the French founded New Orleans, Ste. Genevieve still retains many excellent examples of French Colonial vertical log homes constructed by the farmers and fur traders who migrated across the river from the French town of Kaskaskin. In spite of the American intrusion at the time of the Louisiana Purchase, Ste. Genevieve maintained its European atmosphere when immigrants from southern Germany incorporated their brick step-gabled homes and husiness structures into the colonial taun

As carly as 1935 the Department of the Interior recognized the importance of Ste. Genevieve in the Historic American Building Survey and in 1976 The National Trust for Historic Preservation designated the downtown as a Historic District. Today the visitor can retrace the steps of the earliest of Missouri's settlers and can enjoy the peaceful calm of this eighteenth and nineteenth century village.

Officers and men of the Texas army who participated in the battle fought here April 21, 1836, or in the skirnish of the previous day:

The rolls which follow are substantially the result of a lifetime dedicated to the study of the sources of Texas history by the late L. W. Kemp. Mr. Kemp was president of the Board of Trustees of the San Jacinto Museum of History Association at the time of his death. The rolls as compiled by Mr. Kemp were first published in 1951.

These seventeen names have been marked with an asterisk and inserted alphabetically in this edition. We are grateful to Dr. Miller for his cooperation in amplifying these rolls.

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Inscribed in stone in eight panels, reading from the southeast corner around the monument's base, are the essential facts of the Texas Revolution. The text of the inscriptions follows:

> THE EARLY POLICIES OF MEXICO TOWARD HER TEXAS colonists had been extremely liberal. Large grants of land were made to them, and no taxes or duties imposed. The relationship between the Anglo-Americans and Mexicans was cordial. But, following a series of revolutions begun in 1829, unscrupulous rulers successively seized power in Mexico. Their unjust acts and despotic decrees led to the revolution in Texas.

> > $\star$

IN JUNE, 1832, THE COLONISTS FORCED THE MEXICAN authorities at Anahuac to release Wm. B. Travis and others from unjust imprisonment. The battle of Velasco, June 26, and the battle of Nacogdoches, August 2, followed; in both the Texans were victorious. Stephen Fuller Austin, "Father of Texas," was arrested January 3, 1834, and held in Mexico without trial until July, 1835. The Texans formed an army, and on November 12, 1835, established a provisional government.

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THE FIRST SHOT OF THE REVOLUTION OF 1835-1836 WAS fired by the Texans at Gonzales, October 2, 1835, in resistance to a demand by Mexican soldiers for a small cannon held by the colonists. The Mexican garrison at Goliad fell October 9. The battle of Concepcion was won by the Texans, October 28. San Antonio was captured December 10, 1835, after five days of fighting in which the indomitable Benjamin R. Milam died a hero, and the Mexican army evacuated Texas.  $\star$ 

TEXAS DECLARED HER INDEPENDENCE AT WASHINGTONon-the-Brazos, March 2. For nearly two months her armies met disaster and defeat; Dr. James Grant's men were killed on the Agua Dulce, March 2, William Barret Travis and his men sacrificed their lives at the Alamo, March 6, William Ward was defeated at Refugio, March 14, Amon B. King's men were executed near Refugio, March 16, and James Walker Fannin and his army were put to death near Goliad, March 27, 1836.

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ON THIS FIELD ON APRIL 21, 1836, THE ARMY OF TEXAS commanded by General Sam Houston, and accompanied by the Secretary of War, Thomas J. Rusk, attacked the superior invading army of Mexicans under General Santa Anna. The battle line from left to right was formed by Sidney Sherman's regiment, Edward Burleson's regiment, the artillery commanded by George W. Hockley, Henry Millard's infantry and the cavalry under Mirabeau B. Lamar. Sam Houston led the infantry charge.

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WITH THE BATTLE CRY, "REMEMBER THE ALAMO! REmember Goliad!" the Texans charged. The enemy, taken by surprise, rallied for a few minutes, then fled in disorder. The Texans had asked no quarter and gave none. The slaughter was appalling, victory complete, and Texas free! On the following day General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, selfstyled "Napoleon of the West," received from a generous foe the mercy he had denied Travis at the Alamo and Fannin at Goliad.

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CITIZENS OF TEXAS AND IMMIGRANT SOLDIERS IN THE army of Texas at San Jacinto were natives of Alabama, Arkansas, Connecticut, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, New Hampshire, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Vermont, Virginia, Austria, Canada, England, France, Germany, Ireland, Italy, Mexico, Poland, Portugal and Scotland.

MEASURED BY ITS RESULTS, SAN JACINTO WAS ONE OF the decisive battles of the world. The freedom of Texas from Mexico won here led to annexation and to the Mexican War, resulting in the acquisition by the United States of the States of Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Nevada, California, Utah, and parts of Colorado, Wyoming, Kansas and Oklahoma. Almost one-third of the present area of the American nation, nearly a million square miles of territory, changed sovereignty.



More than 100 years after the abandonment of the Mission San Francisco de los Tejas (established in May 1690 in Houston County about 20 miles east of Crockett on the El Camino Real, now State Highway 21), the lands west of

Henderson Counties were also a part.

county seat and incorporated by an Act of the Republic of Texas on December 29, 1837. The town was named for the Tennessee Scout, David



Nacogdoches County along the Neches and across to the Trinity River began to be settled. The Mexican Government awarded many of the pioneers land grants. Others who fought in the War for Texas Independence received land. Those settlers of the area petitioned the Congress of the Republic of Texas on April 22,1837, asking that a county be created. Some 110 names were signed to this petition, which was approved on June 12, 1837, and signed by President Sam Houston. This county was the first created under the new Republic of Texas and named for its first President. The size of the county was three times that of the present, as Trinity, Anderson and

Crockett, who camped near the area enroute to the Alamo and his death in 1836. While camped, he discovered that a former Tennessee neighbor, Elijah Gossett and family, had a homestead nearby. Elijah Gossett's son, Andrew Edwards Gossett, gave the townsite of Crockett; so to him and his father Elijah was given the privilege of naming the town and county. The town they named for Elijah's old friend; the county, they named for their former commander at the Battle of San Jacinto and the first President of the Republic of Texas, Sam Houston.

The Indians were much in evidence in the county during the 1830's through 1850. Several massacres of families

are known: Edens-Madden, John Sheridan an'd Daniel Crockett was selected as the McLean, the Campbell family. Forts and block houses were built for protection. The best known presently is Old Block House near the community of Austonio, built for protection of families on Mustang Prairie. It was from this stockade that Elisha Clapp and Major John Wortham directed an independent company of Rangers commissioned by President Sam Houston. The first courthouse on the center square was a log fort and settlers fled to its confines for shelter. There was also Fort Brown in the Northeast area of Houston County, between Augusta and Grapeland, on San Pedro Creek; Fort Houston, where Palestine is today; and Box and Hallmark


Forts for these settlers' families and neighbors, located in west, and eastern part of county.

The Neches and Trinity Rivers contributed much to the county's development, providing natural boundaries, a means of transportation and business as ferries were established along both of them.

Hall's Bluff, Alabama Crossing, Hyde's and Robbins' ferries and Calhoun's Landing were some of the Trinity stops. Kennedy, Bates and Anderson's ferries on the Neches served the eastern area along with Bodenheimer's Landing and Shook's Bluff. The famous link between the rivers which joined the East and West was El Camino Real. The King's Highway, which transverses the county. Stage stops were common along this route with the pest known at the residence of lacobs Masters and Joseph Redmond Rice. This road was the freeway of the 1800's, providing movement for pioneers, soldiers, supplies, mail and the output of raw materials. Cotton was the big crop of the 1840's through 1900's. Farmers would move their crops to the river and flatboat it down the Trinity to Galveston for sale and export to New Orleans. The cotton was grown with slave labor. With the Civil War, this was changed, and the virgin pine timberlands of the eastern part of the county gained recognition

One of the largest sawmilling operations for all time (the Four C Mill) was established in the Ratcliff area during the 1900's and ran for nearly 20 years or until the 120,000 acres of virgin pine timber were cut over. Following the Civil War, the county's economy changed more to lumbering and cattle. production of hay and small grains. The economy remains basically agricultural, lumbering and ranching today.

Churches and schools came with the pioneers who established them as one struc-



ture. Sometimes the churchschool was also fort and home. The first college of the Republic of Texas was Trinity College at Old Alabama on the banks of the Trinity River in Houston County. This was chartered in 1841. There was also an Academy at Augusta in 1850; and Steele's Academy near the present community of Pennington was known for its scholars. Since the first colonization efforts of Houston County was that of a Mission (San Francisco de los Tejas) dating to 1690, the Church truly initiated the development of Houston County. This is remembered with the Pilgrimage to the birthplace of Christianity in East Texas each first Sunday in October to the replica of the first Spanish Mission in East Texas.

The coming of the railroad in 1872 brought community development. Up and down the tracks, every 5-6 miles, small communities were built. Three of them, Grapeland, Latexo and Lovelady, celebrated centennials in 1972. The county seat of Crockett and Houston County celebrated a 135th anniversary, having celebrated a joint centennial in 1937. A county birthday celebration is celebrated annually on June 12th, with a

Dear Rea:

I understand that your John Swanson entered Texas in 1830 and listed on his entrance certificate as being a native of North Carolina. I have also been told that John S. was resident in Tennessee in the early 1800s. If this is true your John S. may have been a grandson of Ambrose and Mary.

In the late 1750s two of Ambrose's sons removed from Culpepper County, Virginia and settled in North Carolina along the Rocky River in the area that is now the northwest corner of present Anson County. Both men had large families and we know the names of some children but not all. About the same time two other Yarbroughs came from Virginia and settled in the same neighborhood. These men were Richard and Joel and whether or not all four were brothers we do not know but we may be sure they were close kinsmen. After a generation the Yarbrough clan in north west Anson became sizeable. In 1808 a large wagon train departed from western Anterson County and went to central Tennessee. It is a well documented fact that the train was composed of more than a hundred two wheel carts pulled by oxen, and a goodly number of Yarbrough and allied families joined the caravan. We know that in Tennessee the Yarbrough families divided; most remained in central Tennessee, a few went northward into the fillinois Territory and a few ventured on into Arkansas. It seems to me that these places and dates would put your John S. in the right places at about the right times, so possibly your John S. was one of the voyagers from N.C.

You wrote that you think your John S. (born 1777) related. Jonathan ( (Ambrose's son) did name a son Ambrose. This Ambrose (my gr.gr.gr.) was born 1772 in Anson County. If your John was related to an Ambrose it would almost have to be the one in Anson.

Do you know Beth Walker in San Antonio ? She is a descendant of John Swanson and is trying to trace his roots. Her address is: 114 Cliffside, San Antonio Tx., 78231.







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

THE OLD STAGECOACH INN

Once apon a time travelers on the old San Antonio Road counted the miles until they reached the Midway Stagecoach Inn where they could step off the swaying, rolling stagecoach into stately comfort. When the stagecoach made a stop at this place, the horses were changed and passengers had their meals. They rinsed the dust off their faces, sat at a long table to dine, watched the fires blazing in the fireplaces, and retired to slumber on soft featherbeds.

In 1878 without good roads, railroads or any modern conveniences, mail was carried on horse back by young men and boys who worked for the man who controlled the stage route. San Augustine mail arrived at 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday and left at 6:00 a.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. It took all day to ride from Nacogdoches to San Augustine (by way of Melrose and Chireno). These early mailmen probably changed horses at the inn.

During its role as a stagecoach stop, the Midway Stagecoach Inn was a favorite rest haven for travelers from Florida through Louisiana, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, and other far-away places. At one time the grounds included big barns for stabling stagecoach teams and housing hay and grains. Tall trees growing about the inn gave it a shady, restful atmosphere that way as appealing to the stagecoach travelers of long ago as it would be to the modern traveler.

The Old Stagecoach Inn was build in the early 1840's by Mr. James B. Johnson, who was the first Mayor of San Augustine. It was used as the half-way station between San Augustine and Nacogdoches for the old concord coaches used at that time for mail and passenger service. It was a long unpainted, two-story inn, with an overhanging roof that formed a two-story porch rambling across the entire front. There was a flat, wooden awning over the front door, and the tall posts of the porch were formed of layers of timber fastened together.

One of the most popular features of the inn was the two great stone fireplaces at each end of the house. There were built by slave labor. The lumber for the inn came to Jefferson by boat and then to the inn by ox team, before the Civil War.

The original location of the Old Stagecoach Inn was Highway 21 (E1 Camino Real - The King's Highway), 3.6 miles west of Highway 95 at Chireno. The inn was sold and moved in 1982. It is still located on Highway 21; only now it sits on a hill about half a mile off the road, 6.9 miles from the intersection of Highways 21 and 95 in Chireno (or 11.4 miles from Loop 224 East in Nacogdoches on Highway 21). The property is now a private residence. The Old Stagecoach Inn was - Hold still is - on the north side of the road.

Another station on the same stage line stands in the town  $\odot \mathcal{X}$  Douglass, fourteen miles west of Nacogdoches.

No. 1

If from the very moment we began our political regeneration we might have tried, in good faith, to establish a system as great in military affairs as in those that are related to the civil part; if we might have known how to take advantage of all the recourses with which we have abetted the just cause of our liberty and independence: and finally, if we might have followed always the light of just reason, we would now be entirely free, and the Gachupines (Span. who settled in Mex.) who now travel the environs of San Antonio evidently, would have decided to embrace bur cause and abandon a devoted country to dispose of the tyrannies of the iron sceptre with which they have governed us up to now.

I would give myself up to a living pain and would die perhaps if I believed that the established system had to last much longer but I am sure that the aurora of happiness presents itself now on our horizon; I cannot begin to manifest my contentment. Indeed, beloved compatriots, from now on the memorable era of our political rebirth is beginning to be observed! Glorious day, without a doubt, is the one in which we see the Printing Press emitting rays of light for the first time in the State of Texas! Not only is it the first time that Texas prints in its territory, but it is also the first time in which throughout all the Mexican continent one may write freely.

Great and melancholy truths have presented themselves to the observing intellect during all the time that has intervened since our army set out from this town until today, which no one has dared to reveal to the public, however having drawn the veil from utter darkness, we see shining on our horizon the bright star of truth. Yes, European peoples! Mexico has now also freedom of the press; she is the strongest fortress against the violence and the tyranny of despots and one of the most precious and sacred rights of man. The faculty to think and to communicate to his equals the principles and most sublime ideas of philosophy can only be obtained through the medium of the freedom of the press. If, to this wise establishment is added that of the jury and the law of habeas corpus, we shall have then the three solid pillars which must support our liberties and our rights.

<sup>7</sup>hen a sane government shall be established by good faith, and ~formed by public opinion, in San Antonio, there is not even the least doubt in that not only will these wise measures be adopted but also supported by all my compatriots until attaining total independence or finishing honorably in obsequiousness.

All of Spanish America has awakened finally after three centuries of oppression and enslavement, and has resolved to proclaim her --political independence and cultivate prosperity in her-towns and 'destroying forever the - (paper destroyed, four or five lines) - to fall beneath the barbaric Spanish domination. Santa Fe and Cartagena which were already profiting from the same good that Caracas scarcely had, saw their brothers fall again into bondage,

when unanimously they marched in their - (words blotted out) -and doubtlessly at this very moment Venezuela is now free again. El Rio de la Plata offers great vision or spectre for a happy and glorious regeneration. In Peru the movement for freedom is also present and she will not delay in imitating such beautiful and generous examples. The isle of Cuba is anxious at the moment to break the bonds that superficially bind her to Spain, and to take part in the common cause of independence and liberty of America. Everything is prudently planned and only the happenings in Mexico are detaining it; so that the only thing lacking in order to cement liberty throughout all the hemisphere of Columbus is the uniting of the peoples or towns, that is to say, that they cooperate mutually, joining hands in this holy and wide-spread undertaking. All have already filled the places that are most suitable to them, and they have sworn to be free at any cost, and only the vast and powerful empire of Mexico is holding it back. Indeed, if this fine country comes out of its lethargy, everything will be accomplished, because everywhere in America one finds independent states, and states anxious to help (Mexico) and join it in strongest fraternity. Spain no longer exists for America, and there is nothing, nothing which can intimidate or daunt her rebirth.

What shall we Mexican patriots be able to do? The first step is to constitute a government, without intrigue, consulting the will and the general well-heing of the people! We are already in full possession of our rights; seeing that our independence is costing us so many sacrifices, in forming our government, let us not name men so unworthy of such an arduous undertaking to form the government. Honor and selflessness and partiotism must be the only claims which merit our votes or favor. - Neither the evil ones who spread ignominious voice to the despotism of the former government nor the corrupt ones who try to polish their own fortune on the sacrifices that we are making to earn our liberty -. Nor do the wicked ones who prostitute themselves beneath foreign influence deserve our support or vote.

Much remains, certainly, for us to do in order to reach the glorious aim which we have set forth. But nothing will be too much of a task when we are so deeply interested in this great work. Our brothers from the north have completely decided to help us in as many ways as possible; this is not a paradox. All of us are witnesses to the valor, unselfishness and honor with which the American auxiliary army carries itself. What an exalted rank they are going to occupy in the memorable history of our political regeneration, that army composed almost altogether of heroes! Who will not burn with desire upon hearing about the marvels of bravery with which the Kamperes, the Roses, the Murays, and the Taylors have distinguished themselves. To you, disciples of the immortal Washington, is reserved the honor of continuing the admirable work of freeing the new world; run then to the place where the omnipotent right hand of the ALL POWERFUL being calls you; break the chains courageously with which some of our brothers of the south still remain enslaved, and crown the work with which you have begun with such great honor- - - - - (paper missing)

#### FOREIGN NEWS

#### UNITED STATES OF NORTH AMERICA Washington, 22nd of March

On the 4th of this month our present president has been re-elected to continue in the same office; said news has been received with the greatest enthusiasm throughout all the states of the union, and in honor of this occasion magnificent public gatherings have been given where were discussed to the point of argument that which pertained to matters of good taste and refinement as well as the wittiness of the toasts which they drank to each other.

This election is doubtlessly going to establish in a permanent manner the dignity and grandeur of the United States on which we rely in order to consolidate our system of liberty and independence.

#### March 30th

Excerpt from a letter from Capt. James Lawrence, Commander of the light vessel, of the U.S., The Hornet, carrying 18 cannons -written aboard the same ship on the 19th of the following month to the Secy. of State and to the Marine Commission:

"When on sight of the fort of Demarari on the 24th of last February, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, we encountered the English vessel, The Peacock, with 20 cannons, commanded by Capt. Peake, that which after fifteen minutes of combat, was sunk. Our loss consisted of one man wounded and three suffocated during the time of saving the shipwrecked from the enemy boat." What a terrible lesson for the proud Europeans! This is the fifth battle won by the American Marines. On the 20th of this month, Mr. William Shand arrived at this Post, preceding the one at Natchitoches, with a warrant from the Governor of the United States of North America with regard to the -lwords missing) of Mexico. We do not know the reason for his commission, but we are celebrating this occasion which acquaints us with a subject of such merit. There came with him several people of distinguished character. Some of them came just to accompany him, others with the idea of joining our army. Among them was the son of the famous General Wilkinson, who since then has been made a member of General Toledo's staff and recognized as his aide-de-campe.

At 4 p.m. today J.A. de Toledo accompanied by all his main sta.passed inspection on our cavalry groups at this post and had them execute different maneuvers. The general then immediately made them a speech and told them that he was about to leave with them to join the Republican Army in the north of Mexico where they were going to be honored ones of those troops, as generally happens to the new bodies or military units that join others whose valor and reputation are well known. He informs them that it was necessary that their conduct in the first action correspond to the high opinion which they so justly deserved, and that their honor and their reputation depended on what they should do that day; his heart could desire nothing more than that the general in chief grant them the pleasure of being his companions in arms in the first battle, that is to say, the first victory.

The units full of that enthusiasm, and the loftiness of their free and virtuous heats answered that they would all die happy and contented at his side defending the rights and liberties of the entire America.

Among the various events that prove the good will and enthusiasm of our brothers of the North in favor of the Holy cause, we shall cite in this Gazette one very unexpected happening: A citizen of the United States of America. A. Mower, living in Philadelphia and having a public press of considerable reputation, impressed by the motives of our great war and realizing the necessity in which we find ourselves for printing presses, abandoned all his interests and tranquility which he enjoyed in the bosom of his family order to come to offer his services to the Mexican patriots, after a painful and long trip he finds himself at this post, where to day he has the satisfaction to be the first to give to the public a paper printed in the State of Texas. We do not doubt that the Governor will recompense him as he deserves so that he may be able to continue in this noble work. Mower will find eternal gratitude and recognition in the generous hearts of the true republicans of this country!

#### OLD STONE FORT

The Old Stone Fort, or the "stone house," as it was called in the early records, is one of the outstanding features of early Texas history, being almost as old as the town of Nacogdoches. Over the walls of this fort have flown eight flags, the royal flag of Spain, the flag of the Magee-Gutierrez Expedition of 1813, that of Dr. James Long's Republic of 1819, the flag of the Republic of Fredonia in 1826, the Mexican flag, the Lone Star flag of the Texas Republic, the Stars and Bars of the Confederacy, and the Stars and Stripes.

The "stone house" was probably built as a private enterprise by Captain Gil Y' Barbo about 1778, and as a trading post, it became the most important building in the New Philippines. Cordero, Governor of the Province of Texas, and General Herrera, with 1,300 Spanish troops had headquarters in the "stone house" when on November 6, 1806, the treaty was signed which averted war between Spain and the United States. In 1801 Peter Ellis Bean and the remainder of Philip Nolan's expedition to Nacogdoches were imprisoned in the Old Stone Fort, where they remained for thirty days. For three months it was the seat of government of the Eastern Province of Spain, when Governor Manuel de Salcedo was in Nacogdoches during the summer of 1810.


The first two newspapers to be published in Texas were printed in the Old Stone Fort. Following the collapse of the Fredonian Republic, the building was occupied as a home by John Durst, who sold it to Juan Mora, the District Judge, and Vincente Cordova, who was District Attorney under the Mexican regime. The official records were again placed in the old building, where they remained until a courthouse was built in 1840. Within its walls the oath of allegiance was administered by the Mexican authorities to such celebrities as James Bowie, Thomas J. Rusk, Sam Houston, and David Crockett. Around the walls the forces of Bustamente and Santa Anna vied for supremacy on August 2, 1832, in the battle of Nacogdoches. In the Spring of 1836, the stone walls of the old building seemed a bulwark of safety to the few brave souls who refused to flee from threatened Indian massacre in the Runaway Scrape.

With the formation of the new republican government came "Three-Legged Willie" Williamson, with his pistol as a gavel, to preside over the first district court in the State, and where General Thomas J. Rusk delivered one of his famous orations which has been preserved to us in our court records.

In 1840 the Old Stone Fort was transfered from Vincente Cordova to Rebecca Fenley, a daughter of Mrs. John S. Roberts. The buildings remained in the Roberts Family until it was purchased by Perkins Brothers on June 12, 1901, and torn down in 1902 to make way for a modern drug store.

This old building originally stood on the corner of Main and Fredonia Streets, facing the northeast corner of the Plaza Principal, where the two main branches of El Camino Real merged. It was rebuilt in 1907 on the corner of the Nacogdoches High School Campus by the Cum Concilio Club, and was again rebuilt in 1936, from the original stones, by the State of Texas, to be used as a museum. It now stands on the beautiful wooded campus of Stephen F. Austin State University.

# HISTORY OF THE OLD STONE FORT

The original Stone Fort was built by Don Antonio Gil Y'Barbo, the founder of Nacogdoches, in 1779. Y'Barbo built his stone house on the "Plaza Principal" to be utilized in his trading business and as the portales to the District of Nacogdoches,

During the Spanish reign, troops were occasionally stationed here in order to protect Spanish Texas from intruders. Government officials, such as Gov. Antonio Cardero Y Bustamante, used the building for official business. Samuel Davenport, trader for the Indians, used the building as a trading house for he lucrative market in deer hides and horses

Aexico also used the Stone House during the period it governd Texas. Jose de la Piedras, Colonel in the Mexican Army, had is headquarters here. Piedras was in command when residents If Nacogdoches charged the Stone House in the Battle of lacogdoches."

he Stone House continued to house many different concerns. he first official court action of the Texas Republic took place iere under "Three Legged Willie" Williamson. Williamson is loted for his use of a pistol as a gavel. In its final years, the uilding, then called the Stone Fort, housed a saloon, grocery, nd confectionery. The saloon caused one resident to remark hat the Stone Fort should be "torn down and the ground upon which it stood be plowed and sowed in salt." In 1902 the estruction of the Fort became a reality, when the Perkins rothers tore it down to make way for a modern commercial uilding. The Cum Concilio Club, a local women's club, saved he stones from the building and had it reconstructed on Vashington Square. The approaching Centennial of the Texas evolution caused a wave of concern for historical landmarks; nd in 1936, the present replica; utilizing some of the original tones, was constructed on the campus of Stephen F. Austin tate University.

# History

When Texas was still part of Mexico, this fine, architecturally detailed house was built (circa 1830) by Nicholas Adolphus Sterne for his bride, Eva Catherine Rosine Ruff. It is the oldest on-site dwelling in the city and the only one dating from before the Texas Revolution. In 1869, seventeen years after her husband's death, Mrs. Sterne sold it to Joseph von der Hoya. The home and grounds were given to the City of Nacogdoches in. 1958 by Joseph Hoya's granddaughters, Mrs. Clara Hoya Gray and Mrs. Jennie Hoya Mast, as a shrine to the memory of Adolphus Sterne and as a site for the city library. The Nacogdoches Hova Memorial Library now includes the Jewel Norwood Tilford Children's Collection and the Texana Collection. The front rooms and upstairs leare. original parts of Sterne's house One parlor has been authentically furnished and restored to the early. Texas period of the Sternes and the other to the Victorian times of the Hoyas. Particularly unusual. is the stone wine cellar, which was added in 1845.



# Adolphus Sterne 1801-1852

- German immigrant to New Orleans at age sixteen
- Nacogdoches settler in 1826
- Prominent merchant and Texas Revolutionary leader
- Conspirator with Haden Edwards in the Fredonian Rebellion in 1826
- Agent for the Republic of Texas in recruiting and financing two companies of volunteers in New Orleans during 1835
- Captain of a volunteer company under General Thomas J. Rusk in 1839 at the Battle of the Neches
- Civic Leader Postmaster, Justice of the Peace, Land Commissioner
- State Representative and Senator



From its earliest days the Sterne-Hoya House was identified with the history of Texas

Sam Houston, Texas Revolutionary Commander, first Texas President, and the first United States Senator from Texas; was baptized a Catholic with Mrs. Sterne as his godmother in this house where he visited and boarded.

Thomas J. Rusk: Texas Revolutionary General, Texas Secretary of War, and along with Houston, the first United States Senator from Texas, was a frequent guest

Davy Crockett hero of the Alimo spent a fortnight here in early 1836




Chief Bowles of the Cherokee Indians signed a peace treaty in the house promising that his braves would not join the Mexicans against the army of Texas during the Revolution.

One of the two volunteer companies of New Orleans Greys, recruited and armed by Adolphus Sterne in New Orleans for the Army of Texas, were entertained here in November of 1835, at a banquet given by Sterne and citizens of Nacogdoches: Most of these men died with Fannin at Goliad and Travis at the Alamo, their flag becoming the famous "Flag of the Alamo."


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



# Searching for Indexed Terms<sup>1</sup>

First, find the name or phrase (search term) in the index. Then, from the menu bar, select "Edit", and then "Find" or press CTRL+F. A search field will appear in the upper right corner of the page. Enter the search term into this field and press ENTER. If the search term is not found, nothing will happen; otherwise, the search term will be displayed on the first page in which it occurs. Repeated pressing of the ENTER key will high-light other occurrences within the file. Use the left and right arrow buttons to the right of the search field to look ahead or to look backwards for other occurrences of the term in the document

A directory (folder) or even an entire hard drive may also be searched<sup>2</sup>. First, high-light the selected folder or drive and then press SHIFT+CTRL+F to obtain a listing of all the files in which the search term appears. Next, select and open an individual file to find the first occurrence of the search term(s) in the file, as described in the preceding paragraph.
