Preface

These records are the legacy of our Yarbrough family researchers, to whom much is owed. The known family researchers include Jean Baker, Ann Y. Broadbent, Mary Y. Daniel, Frances (Rea) Donohue, Betty Humrighouse, Pauline Gray, Evelyn Goble, Nelle Morris Jenkins, Ophelia Kessler, Frances Lockwood, Karen Mazock Renee Smelley, Dorothy Svec, Jeanette Wilson, Cleveland "Cy" Yarborough, Edna Yarbrough, George A. Yarbrough, and Robert Price Yarbrough.

The originals of these volumes are being kept for the benefit of future generations by the Williamson County Library, Franklin, Tennessee.

No claims of accuracy or authentication of the material herein are made or may be assumed. Many of these records have been superseded by subsequent research. Hence, there are records which are erroneous and unreliable; it would have been a Herculean task to attempt to correct all of them. Fortunately, there are only a few critical genealogical facts that are involved, and which are correctly stated here:

- Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough was never married to Frances Proctor;
- Ambrose Yarbrough did not immigrant from Yorkshire; he is now believed to be a descendant of Richard the Immigrant;
- There are so far only two proven sons of Old Richard John and Richard II;
- There is so far no evidence proving Joshua Yarborough I to be a descendant of Old Richard.
- The "Old Country" referred to in old documents and letters is the Colony of Virginia, not England or the Old World.
- There were not seven brothers who immigrated from "the old country"; in fact, it now appears there were three brothers and four sons of the brothers. Which were the fathers and which were the sons are so far unknown.

In spite of these inaccuracies, these records comprise much of our history and some of our accomplishments. There are pages whose print quality is so poor that word recognition was not possible. In spite of that, at least partial capability for searching these volumes is provided, as well as an index to each volume. Nonetheless, the viewer is cautioned to perform his/her own due diligence in connection with any use of this material.

The various spellings of the Yarbrough surname have never been applied consistently, even within a given family. To the extent possible, the names in the index reflect the names used on the source pages; where it wasn't clear as to which might be the proper spelling, the spelling used is "Yarbrough".

ې پې As an interesting feature I would like to relate a few of the interesting stories told by different family members. The first story relates to David B. Yarborough as told to me by Mrs Bertha Poole of Jackson Springs, North Carolina.

It seems that Mr Yarborough was a Constable in the Thickety Creek area of Montgomery County. One night at kind of a late hour a man came to the door of Mr. Yarborough and told him he had something to show him and wanted him to tell him what to do with it. When he opened the bag there was the decapitated head of a Colored man. It is not known what he advised him to do with it other than maybe, bury it.

Another story that has been handed down through the family relates to another family member named Elisha Yarborough.

It seems that the family was sitting around the house late one evening after darkness had arrived and it seems that someone said something about they would like a watermelon. The watermelon patch was not too far from the house and Elisha volunteered to go to the patch and get a watermelon. After a considerable length of time Elisha did not return with the watermelon and the family became disturbed and decided to go looking for him. There being no means of any bright artifical lights they were unable to locate him in the darkness. After a considerable length of time the search was abandoned to be resumed the next morning. At first light the next morning, the family members was back to

the patch where they found Elisha lieing in the field dead. He had been mauled by a Bear. The family was deaply greived and Elisha was laid to rest the next day. The family lived near the McCallum graveyard near Candor, North Carolina where he is buried.

Mrs. Mollie McDonald of Route #1, Candor, North Carolina related the following story along with many others we will try to print.

The Yarborough family first arrived in the Montgomery County area in the later part of the 1700's and were prosperous by the standards of that day. However, there was a severe drought about the year 1848 and thing were so bad that the family did not make a crop that year and were unable to feed themselves and had to make other arrangement for the Winter. The Family of John Yarborough moved to Fayetteville, Cumberland County, North Carolina, where they worked in a Cotton Mill that year and returned the following year to their home in Montgomery County, North Carolina. This accounts for some members of the family such as Joshua and Deborah Yarborough living in the Fayetteville area of North Carolina. After their return from Fayetteville it seems that the family was able to resume their life here and many of their children married and raised families in the same general area in which many members live today.

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I will attempt now to give a family by family breakdown of the family of John and Verer Yarborough of Wake County, North Carolina who arrived and lived in Montgomery County North Carolina.

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Turning from some of the more detailed accounts of the family I will try to give you I breakdown of some of the family member who served in the wars of this country.

The Revolutionary War.

John Yarboroagh wife of Joanna Chambers Yarboroagh. The following appears in his file:

John Yarborough (R11925) Wife Joanna nee Chambers. Married to John in Wake Co. near the close of the cavolation. No documentary papers found to substatiate her claim for a pension for the services of her husband. The following condensed facts were brought out in the affidavits of Henry H. Varborough, John Spoon, Sarah McCaskill, John Mannison and others. That Henry was her son, that she was then residing in Montgomery County near the Wake Co. line and that she was born about 1758 or '59. The date of these affadavits was the 28th of March 1856. She died in Montgomery Co., N. C. 29 March 1850, being then nearly 100 years of age. John died in Chatham Co., in 1818. His with at the time of her affidavits was supported by her children and a small appropriation made by Montgomery Co.. Henry H. Yarborough deposed that his father John had told him that he, John, was in the Battle of Blackwater Bridge on the Cape Fear River not Ear from FAyetteville; that he fired many rounds in that battle and was not wounded though some of his comrades were wounded and others killed; that he also fought against the forces of Archibald Clack, a Tory leader and saw Clark fall shot through the body; that he saw Clark's sister , Sally, remove him from the field to their home where she nursed him back to health. The following children wor born to John and his Wife Joanna: William, Joel, Fannie, Mary, Henry H., Betsyyy, John died prior to his Mother, Larkin, Wilson and Sally. These last 3 children left the state and was never heard from since their departure. The application for a pension was denied and she died without coceiving further assistance.

The Civil War.

Many men of the Yarborough clan served in the war between the states but we will only give you a few sample of information found in the files of men from Montgomery County, North Carolina.

Atlas Yarborough, Private, Co. E. 2nd M. C. Infantry.

Claim for settlement of an estate presented by John Y. Sept. 21, 1365. Subject Soldier died of small pox in C. S. A. Military Hospital, Howard's Grove, Richmond, Va., 1 April 1863.

David B. Y., Private, Co. E. 52 M. C. Infantry. Place and date of enlistment of shown. Home Hontgomery Co., N.C.. Had light blue eyes, fair complexion, and was 5'10" tall. Captured while in Jackson Hospital, Richmond, Va., 3 Apr. 1865.

William B. Y., Private, Co. A., 14th N.C. Infantry. Solisted at Raleigh N> C> on July 16, 1862, for 3 years.

Age 34. Dark complexion. Grey eyes. 5'10" tall. Home, Montgomery Co., N. C. At home on wounded furlough, Nov. 10,1862. Captured at Petersburg, Va., Apr 5, 1865. Released from prison June 6, 1865.

A. C. (Atlas) Y., Private, Co. E. 2nd N. C. Infantry.
Elistment date not shown. In Howard's Grove Hosp., Jan. 10, 1863. Died of
1863. Transferred to S. P. Hosp. Jan. 10, 1863. Died of
smallpox Apr. 1, 1863. Age 23 Years. Had red hair, hazel
eye, light complexion, 5'9" tall. Was from Montgomery
County. Papers in the file show conslusively that this



Dear Ouida:

Your James Daniel Yarbrough was born January, 1880, the son of Charles A. and Alsey or Alcy (Green) Yarbrough, according to the 1880 Jackson County, Alabama Federal census.

I am enclosing a copy of Charles A. Yarboro(ugh)'s marriage license to Alcy E. Green from Jackson County, AL Marriage Book B, 1871-1876. They were married on November 9, 1873, at the bride's residence, by Probate Judge David Tate.

I also read the 1850, 1860, 1870, and 1880 Jackson County, Alabama Federal censuses and learned that Charles A. Yarborough was the son of John K. and Lucinda $(S \cup A) m \in Yarborough$. Because John and Lucinda married prior to 1851, I have no way to determine her maiden name. The Jackson County, AL marriage records prior to Oct, 1851, were destroyed during the Civil War.

Just prior to the Civil War John Yarborough purchased the following land in Township 2, Range 6 East, according to the Jackson County, AL Plat Book:

Southwest $\frac{1}{4}$ of Southeast $\frac{1}{4}$, Section 25, 1860, Certificat No. 32268 East $\frac{1}{2}$ of Southwest $\frac{1}{4}$, Section 25, 1860, Certificate No. 32268 Southwest $\frac{1}{4}$ of Southwest $\frac{1}{4}$, Section 25, 1860, Certificate No. 32268 Southeast $\frac{1}{4}$ of Southeast $\frac{1}{4}$, Section 26, 1860, Certificate No. 32268 North $\frac{1}{2}$ of Northwest $\frac{1}{4}$, Section 36, 1860, Certificate No. 32268 Northeast $\frac{1}{4}$ of Northeast $\frac{1}{4}$, Section 35, 1860, Certificate No. 32268

The certificate was dated August 27, 1860. The War came and "the bottom dropped out" of everything - Confederate money, crops that were planted were often "harvested" and "appropriated" for Federal troops' use, and no local market or any means to transport produce to outside markets. Therefore, it appears that John and Lucinda probably had to sell their newly acquired 320 acres. I am enclosing a copy of their deed to R. A. Coffey from Jackson County Deed Book H, page 250, dated Nov 20, 1863, showing they sold the <u>320 acres for \$100.00</u>. Today this land is considered prime timber land, and R. A. Coffey's heirs still own this mountain land. It is a small part of the beautiful, rustic area of Big Coon. Today. A Jacoba fam. married into Ceffey family (Jarbrough Coffey, Jacob)

John Yarborough died between the 1870 and 1880 censuses, as Lucinda is enumerated as head of her household in 1880. Her two daughters are still with her in 1880, but Nancy J. married J. A. Venable on Feb 22, 1882. I checked through 1890, but did not find a marriage for Mary Caroline in Jackson County. Possibly she married after they removed from this county. In 1880, Charles A., Daniel Napoleon, and Lucinda were living east of the Tennessee River (at the foot of Sand Mountain) in an area called Yucca.

Several years ago I was permitted to read the early minutes of the Friendship Baptist Church which served the Big Coon area, and I remember seeing John and Lucinda Yarborough's names listed as members. pance < carle

Dear Ouida:

Thank you for the payment of \$22.50. My bill was for \$25.50, as I had to spend \$2.00 for copies and \$1.00 for mailing postage. Therefore, I am adding the unpaid \$3.00 to my bill this time.

I read the 1860 and 1870 Jackson County censuses for Alcy/Alsey Green. I did not find a trace of her in 1860, but I did find her in 1870 as head of her household which also included her first son, William L., born in 1868, and what has to be two of her sisters: Mary E. Green, born 1845, and Malissa E. Green, born in 1855. Next door to Alcy and family, I found William L. Green, born 1853, living with William and Nellie Mason. William L. Green was listed as a farm laborer which means he worked on Wm. Mason's farm. Alcy probably named her first son after this brother, William L. Green.

I spent an hour literally combing the 1860 census, but did not find any trace of Alcy or her siblings. I also searched the 1850 Jackson County, AL census, as both Alcy and Mary E. Green should have been enumerated as they were both born before 1850. At the time the 1870 census was taken Alcy told the enumerator she was 23. Since the census enumerator was at her house on June 20, 1870, this means she would have been 24 in October of 1870. This would place her birth in 1846. Therefore, I suspect the Oct 13, 1848 birth date on her death certificate is "in the ballpark." Since she was about four years older than Charles A., she probably "fudged" about her age when the 1880 census was taken and reported herself one year younger than her husband which was "the norm" in most marriages.

The death certificate for Charles A. Yarborough listing his mother's maiden name as Swim is a gem. The name was really Swaim, but was pronounced Swim in the foot hills of the Applachain Mountains in Jackson County. We slurred our letters then and many still speak with a twang today. The census taker wrote the name as Swim in 1850, as Swain in 1860, but the 1870 enumerator got it right and spelled it Swaim as it was spelled in North Carolina where they came from. There are a great number of Swaims who remained in North Carolina and Greensboro, NC is supposed to be founded by one of your Swaim family.

Lucinda Swaim Yarborough was the daughter of Silas Swaim who married Catherine Jones on July 30, 1805 in Randolph Co, NC. Only three of their children are known, but there must have been several more as Catherine lived until early 1831. Silas married second Temperance Wall on Nov 2, 1831, in Randolph Co, NC, and they had four children: Daniel, Silas Christopher, Martha, and Nancy. You will remember that Lucinda named a son Daniel and a daughter Nancy. Back to Silas Swaim. He and Temperance moved to Alabama shortly before 1840, and Lucinda is the female, age 15-20, in their household in the 1840 Jackson County census. Her full brother, Michael, married a Rebecca in NC, and they moved with Silas to Alabama. Their full brother, Jesse Abner Swaim, was living with Michael in 1840. In 1849, Michael and Rebecca Swaim sold their land and moved to Marion Co, ARK. Jesse Abner left Jackson County and also ended up in Ark. Lucina.

Lucinda married circa 1848-1849. Therefore, with her marriage and her brother, Michael, selling out and leaving Jackson Co., AL in 1849, it appears that their father, Silas, died circa 1848-1849. Temperance Swaim was a widow with her four children in her household at the time of the 1850 census. John and Lucinda Lucinda's father, Silas Swaim.

I have exhausted all resources to trace Alcy/Alsey Green. I will keep on the alert for any trace of her family in my future research. However, right now I would say we are "up against the proverbial brick wall."


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

Dear Ouida:

How could I not respond to a letter that started out Help! Help! Help!

I am short on time this morning and have had time only to make a cursory search through my records. I should explain that I have thousands of Yarbrough ("Y") records and I do not yet have the benefit of a home computer. Each search must be done manually and takes me some time.

First of all, I have filled out some family group sheets as far as I could go with the information in your letter. If you can fill in any of the missing blanks on these group sheets, it is possible I can link the information up with something in my files. Sometimes I have been able to link up a line by one of the children's names rather than having a history listed under the name of the head of the family.

I first of all looked at the 1900 Census records and found:

(I have the census records typed off with the names in alphabetical order and I seem to be missing the page that would have contained James Daniel Y.)

According to the above, Charles and Alcy (or Elsie) had a daughter, Melisa P., that you don't have listed. It looks like Thomas E. Yarbrough's had his-wife's entire family living with him. But, the census does provide his wife's maiden name as well as the name of her father.

The Dan Yarbrough is the right age to be the brother of Charles and he was also born in Alabama. This is possibly John Y's son, Daniel Napoleon Y.

Note that Melisa is shown as being born in Ala in 1883. Charles was still in Alabama at least in 1883. IF Dan is his brother, and IF the brothers traveled together, then they must have gone to Texas after 1894 as Dan's youngest daughter was born in Alabama. There is nothing, of course, that tells us whether they traveled together ... Charles could have gone to Texas first and then his brother followed him there.

Another thing about Dan's family ... there is a wide age gap between son James and daughter, Savanah (10 years). It is probably a safe bet that there were one or two children born in that ten years. Possibly they were married by 1900.

This James is certainly the right age to have been a son of Charles A. Y., but you mentioned that James Daniel's wife was Lillie. Was Lillie a second wife by any chance? Or is this just an unidentified James?

As far as John Yarbrough -- it gets a little tougher here. John was the most common given name in the Y family. I Ouida Maddoux August 17, 1991 Page 3

have over 200 family groupsheets with John Y's as the head of the family. I think I have records on every county in Alabama EXCEPT Jackson County. I've written to a couple of researchers in Alabama to see if we can find anything more.

I have only the census indexes for Jackson County:

If I had to guess the middle initial (and it would be a guess) I'd say it was probably "H" ... John Henry was a very commonly given name during those years in the Y family.

As for the story that James told about the family being full blooded indian ... it is hard to guess how accurate that might be. As John is on the census in Alabama, I would tend to say that the Yarbrough side is probably not indian. Because so many of the family "myths" have been found to actually be based in fact, I don't discount them. Again I am guessing here, but if there is indian blood, I would tend to think that it was probably Alcy who might have been full blooded indian, which would have made James (half indian). There were several marriages to indian women. (I have Cherokee on my paternal side - Yarbrough is on my maternal line.)

Once place you might try looking is on the 1900 census. There is a Schedule 1 to this census that is entitled "Special Inquiries Relating to Indians." If Alcy was indian, it is possible that they filled out this schedule.

Another source you might try (if you think it was Cherokee Indian -- and it was the Cherokee tribe who made the trail of tears trip) is <u>Cherokee by blood</u> by Jerry Wright Jordan. There are several volumes to this set. I have not seen it, but other researchers have said it is a fantastic source.

I have written to an Alabama researcher and also a researcher in Texas on your behalf. Perhaps one of them will have something that will connect with your information.

I would be pleased to receive copies of any of your records you wish to share. While I research all the records I

can, the majority of what I have to share is what other researchers writing have shared with me. Sometimes I've been able to give a researcher several generations further back than they had. Of course, sometimes we find very little to help. But -- we always try.

I don't know if Laura told you that there is a national Yarbrough organization -- the official name is Yarbrough National Genealogical & Historical Association, Inc. Most of us call it YNGHA (pronounced Ying-ha). This is an organization for any interested Yarbrough researcher or descendant of a Yarbrough -all lines and all spellings (and we have found something like 87 variations of the spelling of the name, believe it or not).

In the past we have published a monthly newsletter during the months of September through May. However, this year we have changed to a quarterly in order that we can include more records and things of interest to all lines of the Y families. Once a year we hold a conference, varying the sites so as many can attend as possible. If you would be interested in joining, I'll be happy to provide you with more details on our organization .. I should say corporation as we incorporated last year.

Please forgive me for such a hastily written letter. I'll look forward to receiving any of your records you wish to share. When I receive your completed groupsheets, I'll again compare them to the records I have. Between that and what I hear from my Alabama and Texas contacts, perhaps we can find some definite clues for you.

I have good news and bad news. The good news is that I have finally received answers to the letters I wrote requesting information on your John Y. line. The bad news is that no one seems to have records for the counties where you need research. In fact, the only records we have on Jackson County, Alabama are the ones you sent.

I am enclosing the few things I received. Not much help.

I note that Jackson County, Alabama borders Lincoln, Franklin and Marion Counties, Tennessee. There were Y's in Lincoln and Franklin County, but none seem to belong to your line. Marion County, Tennessee is a burn county and no records exist for the early years.

I receive new records almost daily. I have written several more researchers and maybe one of them will have something that will give you a clue. I'll send along anything that I find. Meanwhile, keep me posted on anything new you discover -- somewhere I know we will find a record that will be a link.

Yesterday I mailed you the brochure on the Yarbrough National Genealogical & Historical Society, Inc. ("YNGHA"). It included a query form. Why don't you complete the form and we will put a query in the March issue, adding any new information you may have found. This is the fastest way to reach the most Y. researchers and, you never know, one of them may have the records you need.

I have a list of the Yarbrogh deaths in Texas from 1903 to 1940. I looked for James Daniel Y's wife Mattie and see no Mattie, Mrs. J.D. or Martha Y. listed. She probably died before 1903.

I did see a D. N. Yarbrough, died Milam County 9 Apr 1926 (file No. 15352) and that is probably Daniel Napoleon. I looked for his wife, Mary Ann, and there are two Mary A. Y's listed. One died in Clay County in 1938 - quite a distance from Milam County. The other died in Bosque County on June 30, 1932 (file No. 24199). Bosque is fairly close to Milam County.

Sorry to be so long in writing. Got your letter and have procrastinated too long in letting you know that we would be delighted to have the Yarbrough family history. Not too long after we got the letter we went to New Mexico for a couple of weeks for vacation and then forgot until Ann went through our "mail box" (actually a basket on the kitchen counter) and found the letter.

We don't have a lot of information, and not any photos to speak of. Mother lost nearly all of her family photos back in 1951 when their basement flooded. We do have Mother's birth certificate, however.

She was born Beulah Mae Yarbrough on April 14, 1905 in Killeen, Bell County, Texas. Father's full name was James Daniel Yarbrough and mother Lilly Mae Jeffreys Yarbrough. James D. was born in Jackson Co. Alabama and Lilly in Coryell Co. Texas. Beulah Mae (Boots) was married to Leonard (NMI) Surles on June 12, 1925 in Eastland Co.Texas. She died in Oklahoma City on July 1, 1987. And Lidend Supplement

I don't know whether you will need the information or not butI will list mine and Jack's information too. Jack was born in Cisco, Texas on August 16, 1928 (Doyle Lamar Surles) and I was born in San Angelo, Texas November 1, 1932 (James Robert).

To the best of my knowledge (based on stories Mother had told me) she grew up in Dothan, Texas and Cisco, Texas. I think those are theonly two places they lived when she was growing up (after they left Bell Co.). One of our favorit stories from Mama Lilly was when Grandad (Co.). They travelled in a covered wagon as far as the Red River in Texas and he would leave them on the Texas side as it was too dangerous for "her and the kids" in the Indian Territory north of the river. So, I presume my mother to be one of those kids since she was one of the oldest but I don't know if they were living in Bell Co then or where.

ettla, Grandad Yarbrough had a <u>daughter</u> by <u>his first wife</u> but I have no idea what her name was or where she lived (big help aren't I?)....Do you suppose Ann Qualls would have enough memory to help out?

We will look through all our photos one of these times (it is truly an undertaking you see) and if we come across some old ones of Mama Lilly or Mother as a child, etc. we will copy and send to you. Let us know how you get along and just whistle when you need some help with expenses. And, thank you, Jo, for taking time to do this. I wish we were there to help. I think it is great. Ann sends her love with mine to you and yours. Tell your mom Hi! and we really do intend to come see you all soon. Do you ever get this direction? Would really love to see you so this is your invitation to "drop in" any time....no advance notice required. We have your bed and breakfast waiting!

Hopefully this information might be helpful. We are the only "Yarbrough's" in this area, and the extra "R" is not common in the spelling of the name - as you probably well know.





REV. WARREN FURMAN YARBOROUGH1

YARBOROUGH, REV. WARREN FURMAN, pastor of "the First Bapchurch of Jackson and recognized as one of the leading members of the clergy of his denomination in Mississippi, was born in Yazoo county, in this State, Dec. 11, 1807. His father, John Yarborough, was likewise born in Yazoo county, where he resided on his plantation up to the time of the outbreak of the Civil war, when he enlisted ina Mississippi regiment, with which he did valiant service for the Confederate cause. He was taken prisoner in the battle of Missionary Ridge and confined in the Rock Island prison until the close of the war. After the close of the war he married and finally removed into Holmes county, near Pickens, where he continued in the same line of enterprise which had previously engaged his attention and to which he had been reared. He was a son of Thomas G, and Jane (Jacob) Yarborough, the former of whom removed from Franklin county, Tenn. to Franklin county, Miss., about 1840, later taking up their residence in Yazoo county where he married, and where he and his wife passed the remainder of their lives, the former dying shortly after the close of the Civil war. John Yarborough married Miss Mary Elizabeth Toombs, daughter of George W. and Winifred (Green) Toombs, of Copiah county, Miss., where the family lived for many years. Mr. Toombs was a member of the well known Georgia family of that name. Rev. Warren F. Yarborough received his preliminary education in the country schools of Holmes county, his first teacher having been the Rev. Matthew Lyon, one of the ablest and best of the old field type of school teachers. In 1887 Mr. Yarborough was graduated with first honors in the Gillsburg Collegiate institute, with the degree of Bachelor of Science and in 1892 he was graduated in Mississippi college, at Clinton, with the degree of Bachelor of Arts and with the first honors of his class. In his senior year the Hermenean literary society of the college elected him its anniversarian. From 1887 to 1889 Mr. Yarborough was a successful teacher in the public schools of Pike county, Miss., and he had continued to manifest a deep interest in educational affairs. He completed a three years' course in theology in the Southern Baptist theological seminary, in Louisville, Ky., where he was graduated as a member of the class of 1896, receiving the degree of Master of Theology. He was ordained to the ministry of the Baptist church in Clinton, Miss., Feb. 21, 1892. Thereafter he supplied various churches

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during his vacation until he wag graduated from the theological seminary, and after his graduation became pastor of the Baptist church at Crystal Springs, Copiah county, 1896-7, while in February, 1899, he accepted the call to his present important charge, as pastor of the First Baptist church of the capital city, where his work has been attended with gratifying success, both in spiritual and in temporal advancement. The numerical and financial strength of the church has been materially augmented and in all departments of its work a gracious co-operation and sympathy ob-. tains between pastor and people. Mr., Yarborough is a a member of the Mississippi Baptist Publishing Company, the Baptist board of ministerial education, board of trustees of the Baptist orphanage, the Baptist State convention board, of whose executive committee he is chairman, as he is also of the publishing company of the church, noted above. In 1893-4 he was a member of the editorial staff of the Baptist Seminary Magazine, Louisville, Ky., and in 1899-1900 he wrote able expository notes on the International Sunday school lessons, for the Baptist denominational organ of Mississippi, and has also been an occasional contributor to the denominational and secular press. He is a man of high scholarship, much power and eloquence as a public speaker and of that genial and gracious personality which begets staunch friendships. His political allegiance is given to the Democratic party. On Nov. 24, 1896, was solemnized the marriage of Mr. Yarborough to Miss Mettie May Forbes, daughter of David N. and Delia (Keene) Forbes, of Louisville, Ky. The paternal line is traced to the sturdy pioneer stock of Kentucky, and the maternal ancestors took pride in tracing a direct lineage from Oliver Cromwell. Mr. and Mrs. Yarborough have four children, whose names, with respective dates of birth, are as follows: Warren Forbes, Aug. 23, 1897; John Marion, Oct. 25, 1898; Mary D., Nov. 24, 1900; Lilian, July 20, 1902.

Thus qualified for the practice of the profession to which he had devoted his life and his talents, Mr. Thames became engaged in practice in Winona, in partnership with the Hon. W. D. Hall, then district attorney and later and for many years member of congress from that district. In 1896 Mr. Thames located in Vicksburg and has ever since been engaged in practice in that city. Less than four years after taking up his residence in Vicksburg, Mr. Thames was elected to the office of district attorney for that district and has been retained in that office, a tenure of office which

has few parallels in the judicial history of the state. On June 1, 1899, Mr. Thames was united in marriage to Miss Nellie Hobart of Warren county, and to this union have been born four children: Josephine,

Nell, Gloria, and James D., Jr.

FELIX BENJAMIN LONG, M. D.

Dr. Felix Benjamin Long, a well known member of the medical profession of Starkville, Oktibbeha county, Mississippi, was born on the 17th of October, 1882, in Choctaw county, the same state, his parents being Benjamin Franklin and Cleopatra (Watson) Long, both of whom were born in Choctaw county, Mississippi, and on both sides were of Scotch-Irish ancestry. Benjamin Franklin Long died in 1907, at the

age of fifty-six. His wife is living, aged sixty-one years. Felix Benjamin Long obtained his early education in the public schools of his native county and was graduated from the high school in Ackerman in 1904. He re-

ceived his degree of M. D. from the University of Tennessee Medical College at Memphis in 1914. Before entering college, however, he was engaged in farming, from 1890 to 1900, in Angelina and Nacogdoches counties, Texas, and from the latter year to 1908 he taught school in Choctaw county, Mississippi. After receiving his medical degree in 1914 Dr. Long began the practice of medicine in the city of Starkville, Oktibbeha county, Mississippi, where he now enjoys a large and increasing practice. From 1917

to 1923 he was health officer of Oktibbeha county. In 1912, in Oktibbeha county, Dr. Long was united in marriage to Miss Ethel Lee In 1912, in Oktibbena county, Dr. Long was united in marriage to Miss Etnei Lee Clardy, who was born in August, 1896, daughter of Joseph and Mariah (Pitts) Clardy, both of whom were natives of Oktibbeha county. The former died in 1922, at the age of seventy-six. The latter is living, aged sixty-eight years. Dr. and Mrs. Long the age of seventy-six. The latter is Reire To Longe Units and Langers Longe are the parents of five children: Marie, Felix, Jr., James, Julia and Lawrence Long. Dr. Long is a Royal Arch Mason, belonging to Oktibbeha Chapter, No. 142, R. A. M., and to Lodge No. 23, I. O. O. F., of Starkville, Mississippi, and to the Chamber of Commerce of the same place. He is also a member of the Oktibbeha County, Mississippi State and Southern Medical Associations. His church associations are in the Baptist church of Starkville and in political views and efforts he is a democrat. Dr. Long has gained recognition as one of the able physicians of not only his adopted city but of Oktibbeha county and has many friends in the medical fraternity as well as the local public.

REV. WARREN FURMAN YARBOROUGH, D. D.

Rev. Warren Furman Yarborough, one of the distinguished divines of Hattiesburg, has been identified with the ministry of the Baptist denomination for a period of thirty-two years, and to the spread of its influence he has devoted the full service of a finely tempered mind. His thoughts are ever fixed on problems for the elevation

and betterment of humanity. Upon the foundation of faith in God and the courage to walk with unfaltering steps the path appointed to his feet, has been reared a life of rare symmetry and nobility of purpose. He is recognized as one of the leading members of the clergy of his denomination in Mississippi and the far-reaching effects of his work are attested in every community in which he has lived and labored. He was born December 11, 1867, in Yazoo county, near Pickens, Mississippi, and is the eldest of the six children in the family of John and Mary Elizabeth (Toombs) Yarborough, the latter of Scotch and Irish lineage. His maternal grandparents, George W. and the latter of Scotch and Irish lineage. His maternal granupations, Georgia, and Winifred (Green) Toombs, lived for many years in Capiah county, Mississippi, and The promiment families of Georgia. The paternal grandfather, Thomas G. Yarborough, removed from Franklin county, Tennessee, to Franklin county, Mississippi, about 1840, and later became a resident of Yazoo county, where he was married to Jane Jacob. There he spent the remainder of his life, dying shortly after the close of the Civil war. His son, John Yarborough, was born in Yazoo county, August 13, 1843, of English and French ancestry, and Mrs. Yarborough, was born in Copiah county, near Utica, August 13, 1846. Mr. Yarborough was reared on his father's plantation near Pickens and there resided until the outbreak of the Civil war, when he enlisted in a Mississippi regiment, and valiantly defended the Confederate cause. He was captured by Union troops during the battle of Missionary Ridge and confined in the Rock Island prison until the cessation of hostilities. After his marriage he located in Holmes county and there followed the occupation of farming until his death.

Warren Furman Yarborough was reared by God-fearing parents and early became a pupil in the Sunday school near his home, where he learned to love the Bible. To this day he recalls the impression of indignation and sorrow made upon his mind when as a child of five or six years he carried home a lesson paper with a picture of Christ on the cross and his mother told him the story of the crucifixion. Owing to the influence of the church and the religious atmosphere of his home he early realized his need of the Saviour and at the age of thirteen united with the Central church in Holmes county. When a boy of eight years he became a pupil in one of the poorly equipped country schools of those days and his first instructor was the Rev. Matthew Lyon, one of the ablest and best of the old field type of school teachers. The school was conducted very irregularly, being open at times only two or three months in the year, and meanwhile Warren Yarborough worked on the home farm, where he received good training and discipline. At the age of seventeen years he entered the Gillsburg Collegiate Institute in Amite county. A short time before leaving home death had deprived him of his mother, who left an indelible impression upon his life and character, inculcating in him high ideals and aspirations. He at once took high rank as a student and leader among his fellows and in 1887 was graduated from the Institute with first honors, receiving the degree of Bachelor of Science. In 1887 Dr. Yarborough became a teacher in the public schools of Pike county, Mississippi, devoting two years to that profession, and has ever continued to manifest a deep interest in educational affairs. In 1892 he won the Bachelor of Arts degree from Mississippi College at Clinton, again carrying off the first honors of his class, and during his senior year the Hermenean Literary Society of the college chose him as its anni-He next matriculated in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Lou'sville, Kentucky, in which he completed a three-year course, and was graduated in 1896, receiving the degree of Master of Theology. Throughout his life he has remained a student and in May, 1911, Howard College at Birmingham, Alabama, conferred upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity in recognition of his learning, piety and ability.

Dr. Yarborough was ordained to the ministry of the Baptist church in Clinton, Mississippi, on February 21, 1892, and thereafter supplied various churches during his vacation until his graduation from the theological seminary. He was pastor of churches in Magnolia and Silver Creek, in Pike county, Mississippi, and in 1896 was called to Crystal Springs, where he spent three years. In 1899 he took charge of the First Baptist church, Jackson, Mississippi, succeeding Dr. H. F. Sproles, who had just completed a new house of worship. The church was burdened with a large debt and the first year of his pastorate was trying in the extreme, as the city suffered from an epidemic of yellow fever and smallpox. Dr. Yarborough succeeded in lifting the burden of indebtedness at the end of two years and during the eleven years of, his pastorate the membership was increased from three hundred and fifty to thirteen hun-

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dred and fifty, including the membership of the churches formed from the First church. Two other churches of this denomination were built in the city and the annual contributions were increased fivefold. While a resident of Jackson, Dr. Yarborough numbered among his congregation two governors, two chief justices and other high officials of state. A number of churches in other states were desirous of securing his services and on January 1, 1910, he accepted a call from the Parker Memorial church in Anniston, Alabama, of which he was pastor for six years. He then became corresponding secretary of the Alabama Baptist Mission Board, entering upon the duties of that position in eventful times. The World war was then in progress and irresistible forces were drawing America into the vortex. During those stressful days when the selective draft law was first put into effect Dr. Yarborough rendered invaluable service to his country, going from county to county in Alabama, encouraging our young men and their parents by setting forth the religious basis for the patriotism which Americans were called upon to exercise. It was no unusual thing for fathers and mothers to come to him at the close of an address and tell him that he had reconciled them to the sacrifice demanded of them by the nation. For four years and three months he filled the office of secretary and one of his noteworthy accomplishments was the purchase of the Alabama Baptist for the denomination. Another was the securing of Alabama's quota of the fund of seventy-five million dollars pledged to the church for campaign purposes, and of this achievement Dr. Charles A. Stakeley, pastor of the First Baptist church of Montgomery, snid: "In leaving us for another field of labor, Dr. Yarborough leaves us on the crest of the greatest single success that the Baptists have ever had in Alabama, and possibility for success or failure lay on him in a greater degree than any other. In performing this task his strength to the utmost was given and Alabama's part was gloriously accomplished."

Of his work as secretary Dr. Frank Willis Barnett said in the Birmingham Age-Herald on the occasion of his third annual report to the Alabama Baptist convention: "On Thursday morning, when State Missions came up, Dr. W. F. Yarborough, a high type of the religious secretary, a man known for his piety, his enthusiasm, and his energy, brought before the convention the cheering report that the board for the first time in eleven years was out of debt. The news caused the body to break out in applause. Dr. Yarborough is a Mississippian. . . He did not sit back and wait, on coming to Alabama, before getting whole-heartedly into the general work of the denomination, but from the very outset took hold as if he had been born and reared in the state, and by his modesty and tact, backed up by hard work, he soon won for himself a warm place in the hearts of the brethren. Two years ago, when the beloved secretary, Dr. Crumpton, who had carried the Baptist banner up and down the state for a quarter of a century, was made secretary emeritus, a loud call was made for the black-eyed and dark-haired Mississippian. Dr. Yarborough stepped into a difficult job, but he has more than made good, and is today strongly entrenched in the bosom of the Baptists of his adopted state, and is rapidly being regarded as the ideal secretary, for while he has plenty of courage, he is ready to counsel with his brethren and do the thing which he thinks is best for the whole denomination, of which he has proved himself to be a faithful and efficient servant."

Greatly to the regret of every member, Dr. Yarborough resigned his position with the board in January, 1920, and resumed his ministerial labors, becoming pastor of the First Baptist church of Hattiesburg on the 1st of April, 1920. His efforts have been resultant both in spiritual and in temporal advancement. numerical and financial strength of the church has been materially augmented and in all of its departments harmonious cooperation and a strong bond of sympathy

Dr. Yarborough was president of the Mississippi Baptist Publishing Company and in 1893-4 was connected with the editorial staff of the Baptist Seminary Magazine, published in Louisville, Kentucky. In 1899 and 1900 he wrote able expository notes on the International Sunday school lessons for the Baptist denominational organ of Mississippi, and has also been an occasional contributor to the denominational and secular press. At various times he has served on the following denominational boards: The state convention boards of Alabama and Mississippi; the Baptist Board of Ministerial Education; the board of trustees of the Baptist Orphanage of Mississippi; the Foreign Mission Boards as state member from Alabama and Mississippi; and has thrice been selected as a member of the board of trustees of the Southern

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On November 24, 1896, in Louisville, Kentucky, Dr. Yarborough was united in marriage to Miss Mettie May Forbes, who was born in Eminence, Kentucky, August 29, 1870, a daughter of David Neal and Delia Cassandra (Keene) Forbes, both deceased. The father was born near Eminence, May 5, 1836, and the mother was a member of one of the pioneer families of Kentucky. She was born in Georgetown,

Kentucky, December 31, 1840, and traced her ancestry in the paternal line to Oliver Cromwell. She was a successful educator and at one time was connected with the faculty of a girls seminary, then affiliated with Georgetown College of Kentucky. Mrs. Yarborough is prominent in religious work and has filled various offices in the Woman's Missionary Union of the Baptist denomination in Mississippi, Alabama and the southern convention. Dr. and Mrs. Yarborough have become the parents of five children: Warren Forbes, who was born August 23, 1897, and is now instructor in the religious education department of the Southwestern Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas; John Marion, born October 25, 1898, who is in business in Pickens. Mississippi; Mary D., born November 24, 1900, who is at present a student in Peabody College, Nashville, Tennessee; Lilian Forbes, born July 20, 1902; and James Furman, born June 8, 1908, now a high school student. All of the children are unmarried except Lilian Forbes, who became the wife of the Rev. Roland Q. Leavell, on June 26. 1923. There are nine sons in the Leavell family and eight are engaged in religious work. Rev. Mr. Leavell is a native of Oxford, Mississippi, and a minister in the Baptist church. He was graduated from the University of Mississippi and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and is now pastor of a church in Lawrenceburg, Kentucky.

Dr. Yarborough is a democrat and exerts his influence for clean politics but has never been an active worker in the ranks of the party, thinking more of personal character than partisan success in politics. He belongs to the local Kiwanis Club and for a year was a member of the state militia. He is a forceful, eloquent speaker, and a man of scholarly attainments, with whom association means expansion and elevation. His efforts have been fruitful of great good to the cause of Christianity, and he is widely known and universally esteemed. The following tribute was paid to Dr. Yarborough by a fellow pastor:

"As an association builder W. F. Yarborough is unusually successful. He cultivates the weaker pastors, gains their confidence and love, and at once becomes their big, strong brother. He also acquaints himself with the members and needs of all the weaker churches in his association, and as brother and faithful adviser he helps to enlarge the work of the weaker churches. His influence is felt for good in every church in his association.

"In his city he always stands for civic righteousness and improvement. He condemns the wrong in high and low places alike and commends the right. The town is made a safer and better place because of his citizenship.

"As pastor he is most successful. He knows all his people by name, he knows the condition of each. He studies his territory carefully and organizes his people to care for every need in the territory. He directs his organizations and sees to it personally that they do their work. He always leaves a church better organized and developed.

"His services are much in demand as pastor-evangelist. Being himself a most successful pastor, he knows how to conduct a meeting in the way that brings pastor, church and community closer together and closer to the Lord. He is successful in town, city and country alike."

HOWARD MCTYEIRE EVANS.

One of the progressive young business men of Greenwood is Howard McTyeire Evans, manager of the Buckeye Cotton Oil Company. He is a native Mississippian and the son of a Methodist Episcopal clergyman who held charges in various towns and cities of northern Mississippi. The father, Robert Manson Evans, was born in Atlanta, Georgia, but, as stated, spent the years of his ministry in this state and married one of its native daughters, Lillie Dear. He and his wife were of Welsh and Irish stock which had become well identified with the culture and life of the old south. Their son, Howard, was born in McNutt, June 28, 1894, and grew to young

1805 GEORGIA LAND LOTTERYS

By an act of the 1803 Georgia tegislature three new counties were formed within the state: Baldwin, Wayne, and Wilkinson. Grantees for land in these new counties were to be decided by lottery in 1805. Any free white male over twenty years old, a one year resident of Georgia, and a U.S. citizen was entitled to one draw if a bachelor. But if he were married and had a wife and/or minor child, he was entitled to two draws. A widow who was a one year resident of the state and had a minor child was entitled to two draws, also. Minor orphans, or families of minor orphans, with father dead and mother dead or re-married were entitled to one draw.

Each of the following represents an entry in the 1805 lottery. Following the name is the registrant's serial number, and a "P", indicating a prize, or a "B", indicating that a

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YORK COUNTY

First named Charles River, York County was one of Virginia's eight original shires formed in 1634. The present name was given in 1643, probably in honor of James, duke of York, second son of King Charles I. The county seat is Yorktown.




BRUTON PARISH POORHOUSE ARCHAEOLOGI-CAL SITE, Williamsburg vicinity. This archaeological site consists of the remains of an 18th-century workhouse for the poor built by Bruton Parish Church of Williamsburg. A 1755 act of the General Assembly empowered all of the colony's parishes to erect poorhouses; the Bruton Parish poorhouse is one of the few known to have been built. A survey of the site, conducted by the Virginia Division of Historic Landmarks in 1978, located the foundations of one of the four buildings identified by the French cartographer Desandrouin in 1781-82 as the poorhouse complex. Shown is a sampling of the variety of 18th-century artifacts associated with daily life found in the surface investigation. A full-scale scientific investigation of the site could pro duce unique data about the architecture of the complex as well as the lives of a predominately inarticulate portion of the colonial population. Archaeological research also could provide new insights into the Virginia government's first attempt to provide institutional care for the colony's poor, who by the mid-18th century constituted a significant social problem. 99-70 (II/18/80).


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BRYAN MANOR ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITE, Williamsburg vicinity. Frederick Bryan, deputy sheriff of York County, purchased a 500-acre plantation near Wiliamsburg in 1757 from John Fergason and Lewis Hansford and established his residence here. According to the Desandrouin map of 1781-82, the plantation complex then consisted of five buildings. Bryan had other landholdings and received considerable income from the sale of tobacco, pork, veal, and other products produced on his properties. Preserved in the York County records is a highly detailed househould inventory made at Bryan's death in 1771, documentation which would be interesting to compare with artifactual findings. A 1976 survey of the house site revealed an unusual footing made of sections of bog iron bonded together with shell mortar. Also at the site is a stone slab over the grave of Bryan's one-year-old son, John, who died in 1760. 99-65 (6/21/77).

GOOCH TOMB AND YORK VILLAGE ARCHAEO-LOGICAL SITE, U.S. Coast Guard Reserve Training Center, Yorktown vicinity. The village of York, the first English settlement on the York River, was established on an elevated point near the west branch of Wormeley Creek before 1635 and remained the area's principal community until the 1690s when the present community of Yorktown was established two miles west. A church was built at York ca. 1638 and within its walls in 1655 was buried Maj. William Gooch, a burgess from York County and uncle of Sir William Gooch, acting governor of the colony from 1727 to 1749. Gooch's armorial slab is the second oldest legible tombstone in Virginia. The village and the church were abandoned in the 18th century, and the village buildings fell into ruin. The church site is marked by a small park maintained by the U.S. Coast Guard with the tombstone protected by a special cover. The village site remains undisturbed and no doubt holds artifacts and architectural remains of a village dating from the first period of America's European settlement. 99-60 (10/16/73).

GRACE CHURCH, Yorktown. Grace Church, originally known as York-Hampton Parish Church, was built ca. 1697. It seems to be the state's only remaining colonial structure built of marl, a soft material composed largely of shell matter which hardens almost to stone when exposed to air. The marl was taken directly from the Yorktown cliffs. The tenacity of these walls is remarkable given the church's history. The building was used as a magazine by Lord Cornwallis during the Revolution and lost its windows and pews. It was accidentally burned in 1814 and stood as a ruin until rebuilt in 1848. Further damage was done in the Civil War when Union troops put a signal tower on the roof and used the interior for a hospital. The church was returned to service in 1870 and received a thorough renovation in 1926 when the belfry, western door frame, and circular window were added. In its churchyard is the magnificent 1745 English table tomb of Thomas Nelson, as well as the srave of his grandso.: Thomas Nelson, Jr., a signer of the Declaration of Independence. 99–10 (6/2/70).






KISKIACK, Yorktown Naval Weapons Station, Yorktown videnty. Named for a local Indian tribe, Kiskiack is an important example of Virginia's early vernacular architecture, one of the state's oldest illustrations of the regularity that was to become a hallmark of 18th-century colonial design. Although claims have been made for a 17th-century construction date, the house more likely was built in the early decades of the succeeding century as the home of William Lee, who owned the property from 1696 to 1728. Lee was the grandson of the immigrant Henry Lee who patented the land in 1641. Of the original fabric, only the Flemish bond brick walls and the T-shaped interior end chimneys remain. All wood members were destrayed by fire in 1915. Rebuilt within the walls, the house remained in the ownership of the Lees until 1918 when the property was acquired by the U.S. Navy for a high-security military installation, off-limits to the public. The house has been sealed up by the navy for long-term preservation. 99-12 (9/9/69).

PORTO BELLO, Camp Peary, Williamsburg vicinity. During his short term as Virginia's last royal governor, Lord Dunnore acquired a plantation called Porto Bello six miles from Williamsburg, between Queens Creek and the York River, where he maintained a country home. Here Dunmore sought refuge in 1775 when the hostility of the patriots forced him to leave the Governor's Palace. It is known through early descriptions that Dunmore maintained at Porto Bello two dwelling houses and some ten outbuildings and farm buildings. None of these remains. The one extant early structure, a much-altered mall, brick house, was probably built ca. 1800 when the property was owned by the Bright family. The site of Dunmore's complex apparently remains undisturbed and could be of significent archaeological interest. The property was acquired by the federal government at the beginning of World War II and is now maintained as a high-security facility for experimental training. 99-50(11/9/72).

YORKTOWN HISTORIC DISTRICT, including the vallage of Yorktown, the Yorktown Battlefield, and the Moore House. orktown was established by the Virginia Port Act in 1691 and for much of the 18th century reigned as a busy commercial center, its excellent harbor used primarily by ships involved in the tobacco trade. Despite its prosperity, its population has ver exceeded 3,000. Yorktown is chiefly remembered as the scene of the final battle of the Revolution and the surrender to George Washington of British forces under Lord Cornvallis. The terms of surrender were drafted on October 18, 1781, a the Moore house, on the edge of the battlefield, and were accepted the following day, bringing an end to America's colonial era. Yorktown declined after the victory, and much of the hwer part of the town was destroyed in a fire in 1814. The con mu-Civil 51 nity was the scene of a minor engagement during the

(Charles River, 1634-1643, later York County, 1643-

CHARLES River Shire or County was one of the original shires or counties created by the General Assembly in 1634. The name of the county was changed in 1643 to York County.¹

There is evidence that prior to 1634 the unofficial division of the county into plantation parishes had begun. Each of the earliest settlements in the county soon developed into a plantation parish, bounded only by the extent of the population, with the result that the county was soon divided into five distinct parish organizations.

These five seventeenth-century parishes were described as follows:

1. New Poquoson, from Back River to Poquoson River

2. York, from Poquoson River to Morgan's Creek

3. Chiskiack, from Morgan's Creek to Queen's Creek

4. Marston, from Queen's Creek to Scimino Creek

5. Middle Plantation, comprising the settlement of that name between Queen's Creek and Archer's Hope Creek, now College Creek.

New Poquoson's name was changed in 1692 to Charles Parish. York Parish; there is no record establishing a parish, but it had an inducted minister in 1638.

Chiskiack Parish was established in 1640 and its name was changed to Hampton Parish in 1643.

Marston Parish, including the upper part of York County, was created a parish in 1654.

Middle Plantation combined with Harrop Parish in James City County to form Middletown Parish. In 1674 Middletown and Marston parishes were united to form the present Bruton Parish. In 1707 York and Hampton parishes were combined into Yorkhampton Parish, with which Martin's Hundred Parish, in James City County, was united in 1712.²

The northern boundary of the Colony of Virginia was the Potomac River; hence York County, the northern frontier county, extended to that river. It was not until settlers began to infiltrate from the north of the Potomac River that efforts were made by Virginia to settle that territory. The northerly extension of York County was soon limited to the Rappahannock River by the creation of Northumberland County in 1645. This county encompassed that territory lying between the Potomac and Rappahannock rivers. York County's area was further curtailed north of the York River by the creation in 1651 of Lancaster and Gloucester counties. York County acquired its present limits when the territory on both sides of the York River, west of Poropotank and Scimino creeks, was cut off to form New Kent County in 1654.

This study is confined to those parishes lying along the south side of the York River as York County exists today.

The York River region was the earliest northern frontier of the Virginia Colony. This expansion was seriously retarded by the Indian massacre of 1622. The first settlement on the south side of the York River was not made until 1630, when the settlement at Chiskiack was established by statute;³ following this, that at York was established in 1632⁴ and Middle Plantation, later Williamsburg, in 1633.⁵

The study of these ancient York parishes is made difficult by the fact that all but two of them have long since disappeared, together with their respective parish records. As far as is known, there are only two parish registers, and no vestry books, in existence. However, we are fortunate in having available some ancient county records.

NEW POQUOSON PARISH, 1635-1692 CHARLES PARISH, 1692-

(York County, 1692-)

No legislative enactment forming New Poquoson Parish has been found. The first recorded mention of it seems to occur in the will of Benjamin Syms, dated in February, 1635. This will, founding the first free school in America, restricted its benefits to "the adjoining Parrishes of Elib. City and Poquoson."⁶ The early existence of the parish is also substantiated by the will of Anthony Yonge, which is dated February 23, 1636. The testator bequeathed 500 pounds of tobacco "to the church of the newe Poquoson."⁷

Unlike the other early parishes in York County, New Poquoson Parish was never combined with another parish to form a larger one, but, like them, it underwent a change in name. On December 12, 1692, the House of Burgesses issued the following order:

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Upon petition of the parishioners of New Poquoson in the County of Yorke, itt is ordered that from henceforth forever hereafter that the said parish shall be called and named Charles Parish & the said Parish Church shall be called & named Charles Church. And the River formerly called new poquoson River shall from time to time att all times hereafter be called, named & written Charles River.⁸

This order was ineffective with regard to the river which is called to this day Poquoson River.

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Charles Parish is now listed as dormant. The parish covers that part of York County south of Chesapeake Bay and west of the Back River to the limits of the county, and is bounded on the southwest by the county line.⁹

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YORK PARISH, circa 1638-1707 (Charles River County, 1634-1643) (York County, 1643-1707)

ONE of the early settlements on the south side of Charles River, in Charles River County, was the settlement known as York in 1632.¹⁰ This was before the country was divided into eight shires, or counties, in 1634. This was a growing settlement, and it is reasonable to conclude that it was established as a plantation parish. The apparent absence of any enactment forming York Parish may be explained on the basis of its origin as a plantation parish. The records disclose that York Parish had an inducted minister in 1638.¹¹

In 1643, by an Act of the General Assembly, Charles River County's name was changed to York County.¹²

The combining of the smaller and weaker parishes into a larger parish was not unusual, so in 1707 we find Hampton Parish, formerly Chiskiack Parish, uniting with York Parish to form the new Parish of Yorkhampton.¹³ Again, in 1712, Yorkhampton was increased in size by the addition of Martin's Hundred Parish, one of the earliest parishes in either James City or York County.¹⁴

CHISKIACK PARISH, 1640-1643 HAMPTON PARISH, 1643-1707

(York County, 1640-1707)

THE first mention of Chiskiack settlement is found in an entry of an order of the General Court on January 13, 1627, as follows:

The Court hath also ethought fitt with the first means for many considerations to seat a sufficient party at Kiskyacke, both in reguard of the opportunity we shall thereby have to annoy the Indians & of a good retreate in case wee may have beene overpowered by too powerfull forreine enemy.¹⁸

On October 8, 1630, the Court ordered that "Capt. Jno. West and Capt. John Utie seat Chiskiack on Pamunky River & have 600 acres a piece for it."¹⁶

The leaders of the settlers were two members of the Council, Capt. West and Capt. Utie, who had been allowed 600 acres each on the York River, on opposite sides of King's Creek. Capt. Utie settled at *Utimaria* on the west side of King's Creek and Capt. West on the east side at a plantation afterwards called *Bellfield*. Other settlers ranged themselves on the river on either side of Utie and West, and soon there were two plantation parishes, Chiskiack and York. Two years later, in 1632, palisades were run across the peninsula from Archer's Hope Creek to Queen's Creek six miles long, and Williamsburg, first called Middle Plantation, was built within the center of the line of palisades.¹⁷

The Act of the General Assembly creating Chiskiack as a parish was passed at the session of January, 1640, and provided:

It is enacted for the better case of the Inhabitants of Chiskiack in their convenient repairs to the church that God Almighty may be more duely served by them that the said Chiskiack be reduced into a parish which said parish is to bound and begin from the East Side of Morgan's creek along Charles river to the west side of Skymon's Creek and from the river up into the woods unto the utmost extent of the several branches of the several creeks issueing out of the said River from Morgan's creek to Skymons creek, and so from the head of the several branches along the middle of the Forrest including the middle plantation with the head of Queens creek.¹⁸

Chiskiack Parish as above outlined extended along York River for twelve or maybe fifteen miles. Also to be noted is the fact that it is specifically provided that it included Middle Plantation.

The name of Chiskiack Parish was changed to Hampton Parish in 1643.¹⁰ In 1707 Hampton Parish and York Parish were combined to form Yorkhampton Parish,²⁰ and in 1712 Martin's Hundred Parish was added to Yorkhampton Parish.²¹

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YORKHAMPTON PARISH, 1707-(York County, 1707-) (James City County, 1712-)

IN response to an Act of the General Assembly permitting the weaker parishes to unite with others, the two small parishes of York and Hampton were consolidated by order of Council dated 5th February, 1707, and the combined parish was named Yorkhampton. The still smaller Parish of Martin's Hundred, in James City County, was added to Yorkhampton Parish in 1712.²²

MIDDLE PLANTATION PARISH, 1633-1658 (Charles River County, 1634-1643)

(York County, 1643-1658)

By an Act of 1633, "for the seating of Middle Plantation," it was ordered:

That every fortyeth man be chosen and maynteyned out of the tithable persons of all the inhabitants, within the compasse of the forrest conteyned between Queenes creek in Charles river, and Archers Hope creeke in James river, with all the lands included, to the bay of Chesepiake.

The Act stated that the men so chosen were to be employed in the building of houses and securing the tract of land lying between the two creeks. The Act further provided:

And if any free man shall this yeare before the first day of May, voluntarilie go and scate uppon the sayd place of the middle plantation, they shall have fifty acres of land Inheritance, and be free from all taxes and public chardges.²³

The Williamsburg Peninsula is situated between the York and James rivers. Down the middle of the peninsula lies the high ground or water shed, from which Queen's Creek flows into the York River, while Archer's Hope Creek flows into the James River. These two creeks practically form a line across the peninsula. The territory from which the men were chosen must have come from the area east of the two creeks, that is the lower part of the peninsula down to the Chesapcake Bay.

The bounds of Chiskiack Parish, which included the western portion of the area described above, also included "the middle plantation with the head of Queens creek."²⁴

An Act of the General Assembly, dated April 1, 1658, provided that

Upon the petition of the inhabitants of Middle Plantation and Harrop parishes, *It is ordered*, That both of them be henceforth incorporated into one parish which is to be called the parish of Middletowne and the bounds of the same to be those already includeing both the aforesaid former parishes.²⁵

HARROP PARISH, 1645-1658

(James City County, 1645-1658)

An Act was adopted in February, 1645, which provided that

With consent of Mr. Thomas Hampton, rector of James Cittie parish, in respect of the dangerous times and inconveniencies for the inhabitants of the east side of Archer's Hope Creeke to the head thereof and downe to Warham's ponds, to repaire to the parish church att James Citty, That they be a distinct parish of themselves or shall have power to adjoyne themselves to the parish of Martin's Hundred as they the said inhabitants shall find most convenient.²⁶

During the session of March, 1646, an Act was passed providing that:

Whereas by a Grand Assembly held, the 17th of Feb. 1644 [i.e., 1645], It was then enacted by the consent of Mr. Thos. Hampton, rector of Ja: Citty parish, That the inhabitants of the east side of Archers hope creeke to the head thereof, and downe to Warehams ponds, should be a distinct parish of themselves, Bee it now further enacted by the authoritye of this present Grand Assembly, That the said parish be nominated and called by the name of Harrop parish.²⁷


By an Act of April 1, 1658, it is recited

Upon the petition of the inhabitants of Middle Plantation and Harrop parishes, *It is ordered*, That both of them be henceforth incorporated into one parish which is to be called the parish of Middletowne and the bounds of the same to be those already includeing both the afore-said former parishes.²⁸

Thus Harrop Parish passes out of existence.

MIDDLETOWN PARISH, 1658-1674 (York County, 1658-1674)

By an Act of the General Assembly, April 1st, 1658, Middle Plantation and Harrop parishes were combined. The Act is as follows:

(Charles River, 1634-1643, later York County, 1643-

CHARLES River Shire or County was one of the original shires or counties created by the General Assembly in 1634. The name of the county was changed in 1643 to York County.¹

There is evidence that prior to 1634 the unofficial division of the county into plantation parishes had begun. Each of the earliest settlements in the county soon developed into a plantation parish, bounded only by the extent of the population, with the result that the county was soon divided into five distinct parish organizations.

These five seventeenth-century parishes were described as follows:

1. New Poquoson, from Back River to Poquoson River

2. York, from Poquoson River to Morgan's Creek

3. Chiskiack, from Morgan's Creek to Queen's Creek

4. Marston, from Queen's Creek to Scimino Creek

5. Middle Plantation, comprising the settlement of that name between Queen's Creek and Archer's Hope Creek, now College Creek.

New Poquoson's name was changed in 1692 to Charles Parish. York Parish; there is no record establishing a parish, but it

had an inducted minister in 1638.

Chiskiack Parish was established in 1640 and its name was changed to Hampton Parish in 1643.

Marston Parish, including the upper part of York County, was created a parish in 1654.

Middle Plantation combined with Harrop Parish in James City County to form Middletown Parish. In 1674 Middletown and Marston parishes were united to form the present Bruton Parish. In 1707 York and Hampton parishes were combined into Yorkhampton Parish, with which Martin's Hundred Parish, in James City County, was united in 1712.²

The northern boundary of the Colony of Virginia was the Potomac River; hence York County, the northern frontier county, extended to that river. It was not until settlers began to infiltrate from the north of the Potomac River that efforts were made by Virginia to settle that territory. The northerly extension of York County was soon limited to the Rappahannock River by the creation of Northumberland County in 1645. This county encompassed that territory lying between the Potomac and Rappahannock rivers. York County's area was further curtailed north of the York River by the creation in 1651 of Lancaster and Gloucester counties. York County acquired its present limits when the territory on both sides of the York River, west of Poropotank and Scimino creeks, was cut off to form New Kent County in 1654.

This study is confined to those parishes lying along the south side of the York River as York County exists today.

The York River region was the earliest northern frontier of the Virginia Colony. This expansion was seriously retarded by the Indian massacre of 1622. The first settlement on the south side of the York River was not made until 1630, when the settlement at Chiskiack was established by statute;³ following this, that at York was established in 1632⁴ and Middle Plantation, later Williamsburg, in 1633.⁵

The study of these ancient York parishes is made difficult by the fact that all but two of them have long since disappeared, together with their respective parish records. As far as is known, there are only two parish registers, and no vestry books, in existence. However, we are fortunate in having available some ancient county records.

NEW POQUOSON PARISH, 1635-1692 CHARLES PARISH, 1692-

(York County, 1692-

No legislative enactment forming New Poquoson Parish has been found. The first recorded mention of it seems to occur in the will of Benjamin Syms, dated in February, 1635. This will, founding the first free school in America, restricted its benefits to "the adjoining Parrishes of Elib. City and Poquoson."⁶ The early existence of the parish is also substantiated by the will of Anthony Yonge, which is dated February 23, 1636. The testator bequeathed 500 pounds of tobacco "to the church of the newe Poquoson."⁷

Unlike the other early parishes in York County, New Poquoson Parish was never combined with another parish to form a larger one, but, like them, it underwent a change in name. On December 12, 1692, the House of Burgesses issued the following order:

Upon petition of the parishioners of New Poquoson in the County of Yorke, itt is ordered that from henceforth forever hereafter that the said parish shall be called and named Charles Parish & the said Parish Church shall be called & named Charles Church. And the River formerly called new poquoson River shall from time to time att all times hereafter be called, named & written Charles River.⁸

This order was ineffective with regard to the river which is called to this day Poquoson River.

Charles Parish is now listed as dormant. The parish covers that part of York County south of Chesapeake Bay and west of the Back River to the limits of the county, and is bounded on the southwest by the county line.⁹

YORK PARISH, circa 1638-1707 (Charles River County, 1634-1643) (York County, 1643-1707)

ONE of the early settlements on the south side of Charles River, in Charles River County, was the settlement known as York in 1632.¹⁰ This was before the country was divided into eight shires, or counties, in 1634. This was a growing settlement, and it is reasonable to conclude that it was established as a plantation parish. The apparent absence of any enactment forming York Parish may be explained on the basis of its origin as a plantation parish. The records disclose that York Parish had an inducted minister in 1638.¹¹

In 1643, by an Act of the General Assembly, Charles River County's name was changed to York County.¹²

The combining of the smaller and weaker parishes into a larger parish was not unusual, so in 1707 we find Hampton Parish, formerly Chiskiack Parish, uniting with York Parish to form the new Parish of Yorkhampton.¹³ Again, in 1712, Yorkhampton was increased in size by the addition of Martin's Hundred Parish, one of the earliest parishes in either James City or York County.¹⁴

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CHISKIACK PARISH, 1640-1643 HAMPTON PARISH, 1643-1707

(York County, 1640-1707)

THE first mention of Chiskiack settlement is found in an entry of an order of the General Court on January 13, 1627, as follows:

The Court hath also ethought fitt with the first means for many considerations to seat a sufficient party at Kiskyacke, both in reguard of the opportunity wee shall thereby have to annoy the Indians & of a good retreate in case wee may have beene overpowered by too powerfull forreine enemy.¹⁸

On October 8, 1630, the Court ordered that "Capt. Jno. West and Capt. John Utie seat Chiskiack on Pamunky River & have 600 acres a piece for it."¹⁶

The leaders of the settlers were two members of the Council, Capt. West and Capt. Utie, who had been allowed 600 acres each on the York River, on opposite sides of King's Creek. Capt. Utie settled at *Utimaria* on the west side of King's Creek and Capt. West on the east side at a plantation afterwards called *Bellfield*. Other settlers ranged themselves on the river on either side of Utie and West, and soon there were two plantation parishes, Chiskiack and York. Two years later, in 1632, palisades were run across the peninsula from Archer's Hope Creek to Queen's Creek six miles long, and Williamsburg, first called Middle Plantation, was built within the center of the line of palisades.¹⁷

The Act of the General Assembly creating Chiskiack as a parish was passed at the session of January, 1640, and provided:

It is enacted for the better case of the Inhabitants of Chiskiack in their convenient repairs to the church that God Almighty may be more duely served by them that the said Chiskiack be reduced into a parish which said parish is to bound and begin from the East Side of Morgan's creek along Charles river to the west side of Skymon's Creek and from the river up into the woods unto the utmost extent of the several branches of the several creeks issueing out of the said River from Morgan's creek to Skymons creek, and so from the head of the several branches along the middle of the Forrest including the middle plantation with the head of Queens creek.¹⁸

Chiskiack Parish as above outlined extended along York River for twelve or maybe fifteen miles. Also to be noted is the fact that it is specifically provided that it included Middle Plantation.

The name of Chiskiack Parish was changed to Hampton Parish in 1643.¹⁹ In 1707 Hampton Parish and York Parish were combined to form Yorkhampton Parish,²⁰ and in 1712 Martin's Hundred Parish was added to Yorkhampton Parish.²¹

YORKHAMPTON PARISH, 1707-

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(York County, 1707-) (James City County, 1712-)

IN response to an Act of the General Assembly permitting the weaker parishes to unite with others, the two small parishes of York and Hampton were consolidated by order of Council dated 5th February, 1707, and the combined parish was named Yorkhampton. The still smaller Parish of Martin's Hundred, in James City County, was added to Yorkhampton Parish in 1712.²²

With consent of Mr. Thomas Hampton, rector of James Cittie parish, in respect of the dangerous times and inconveniencies for the inhabitants of the east side of Archer's Hope Creeke to the head thereof and downe to Warham's ponds, to repaire to the parish church att James Citty, That they be a distinct parish of themselves or shall have power to adjoyne themselves to the parish of Martin's Hundred as they the said inhabitants shall find most convenient.²⁴

During the session of March, 1646, an Act was passed providing that:

Whereas by a Grand Assembly held the 17th of Feb. 1644 [i.e., 1645], It was then enacted by the consent of Mr. Thos. Hampton, rector of Ja: Citty parish, That the inhabitants of the east side of Archers hope creeke to the head thereof, and downe to Warehams ponds, should be a distinct parish of themselves, Bee it now further enacted by the authoritye of this present Grand Assembly, That the said parish be nominated and called by the name of Harrop parish.²⁷

By an Act of April 1, 1658, it is recited

Upon the petition of the inhabitants of Middle Plantation and Harrop parishes, *It is ordered*, That both of them be henceforth incorporated into one parish which is to be called the parish of Middletowne and the bounds of the same to be those already includeing both the afore-said former parishes.²⁸

Thus Harrop Parish passes out of existence.

MIDDLETOWN PARISH, 1658-1674 (York County, 1658-1674)

By an Act of the General Assembly, April 1st, 1658, Middle Plantation and Harrop parishes were combined. The Act is as follows:

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Upon the petition of the inhabitants of Middle Plantation and Harrop parishes, *It is ordered*, That both of them be henceforth incorporated into one parish which is to be called the parish of Middletowne and the bounds of the same to be those already includeing both the aforesaid former parishes.²⁹

Middle Plantation Parish lay entirely in the present York County, and Harrop Parish lay in James City County.

Middletown Parish passed out of existence when in 1674 it combined with Marston Parish to form Bruton Parish.

MARSTON PARISH, 1654-1674 (York County, 1654-1674)

MARSTON Parish was formed out of the upper portion of Chiskiack Parish. Its bounds were described in the Act of the General Assembly, 1654, as follows:

From the head of the north side of Queen's creek as high as to the head of Scimino creeke is made a distinct parish named Marston ordered by the General Assembly.³⁰

A difference arose concerning the bounds of Marston and Middle Plantation parishes, and this was reported to the General Assembly. After examining the differences, the General Assembly at its session of March, 1662, ordered:

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The bounds be continued according to an order of court in Yorke county held the twenty fifth of August, one thousande six hundred and fiftie and six.³¹

Marston Parish passed out of existence when it combined with Middletown Parish to form Bruton Parish in 1674.

BRUTON PARISH, 1674-

(York County, 1674-) (James City County, 1674-

THE record evidence of the establishment of Bruton Parish has not been found. However, there is satisfactory secondary evidence that this well known parish was established in 1674. The following quotation is of interest: In 1674 the parish of Marston was joined to that of Middletown, and the united parishes became known as *Bruton Parish*—a name ever since retained and derived from the Ludwell family, or from Sir William Berkeley, the Governor, who were from Bruton, Somerset County, in England.

The first entry in the old vestry book, now lost, bore date April 18th, 1674, and from that time the distinction between Middletown and Marston parishes ceased, and in the deeds plantations in Marston Parish are described as in *Bruton*.³²

The vestry book disappeared after the War Between the States, but abstracts from it had appeared in print. These have helped to substantiate the foregoing conclusions.

The bounds of the two parishes are roughly described as follows:

From the headwaters of Scimeno Creek, York county, down said creek to the York river, down this river to the mouth of Queen's Creek, up this creek towards the headwaters of Warham's ponds or creek, down this waterway to the James river, up this river to Archer's Hope Creek, up said Creek to its headwaters, thence along an unknown line of Wilmington Parish to the headwaters of Scimino Creek, the starting point.³³


The present-day bounds of Bruton Parish were fixed in 1927 by resolution adopted by the Council of the Diocese of Southern Virginia, 1927, and duly ratified by the vestries of Bruton Parish and Yorkhampton Parish. The bounds were fixed as follows:

Beginning at the mouth of Archer's Hope Creek, running up this creek to its source, thence in a straight line east about 100 yards to the James City-York County line, northwest on this line to Lightfoot Station on the C. & O. Ry. where the county line crosses the headwaters of Scimino Creek, down said creek to the York River, down this river to the mouth of Queen's Creek, up said Creek to the point on the southside known as Blair's Lodge, down the road which begins at this point to the ruins of Fort Magruder on the York-James City county line, down said line to a point about one-half a mile west of Grove Station on the C. & O. Ry. where the headwaters of Wareham's Ponds begin, down said ponds and run to the James River, and thence up that river to the beginning.³⁴

The present limits of James City County were attained in 1766 when the exchange of its long upper end for the lower end of New Kent County took place. Bruton Parish as it exists today lies in both James City County and York County.³⁵

LANCASTER COUNTY

Probably named for the English shire, Lancaster County was formed from Northumberland and York counties in 1651. Bordered by the Chesapeake Bay and Rappahannock River, the county occupies the southern tip of the Northern Neck. Its county seat is Lancaster Court House.




BELLE ISLE, Litwalton vicinity. The formal, symmetrical a rangement of buildings and grounds of the great Tidewate Virginia seats is present in a much reduced scale at Belle Isle, plantation which takes its name from a marshy is and on th north shore of the Rappahannock. The complex, approached by a mile-long axial avenue, consists of a compact Georgian manor house flanked by two perpendicularly sited dependen cies forming a forecourt. On the river side are formal garden laid out on the original terraces. The earliest portions of the grouping probably were built for William Bertrand before hideath in 1759. The house received its one-story wings around 1790 during the ownership of Rawleigh Downmar. Sectionof the interior paneling were removed in the 1920 and later were acquired by the Henry Francis du Pont Winte thur Museum. The complex has since been carefully restored under the direction of architectural historian Thomas T. Waterman. 51-1(3/2/71).

CHRIST CHURCH, Irvington vicinity. Enhanced by its quiet rural setting, Christ Church is without peer among Virginia's colonial churches in the quality of its architecture and state of preservation. The elegant Latin-cross structure owes its fine quality to the fact that it was commissioned by Robert ("King") Carter, the most prosperous and influential of Virginia's colonial planters. Completed by 1735, the exterior is set off by its beautiful brickwork, especially the exquisitely crafted molded-brick doorways, the finest of their type in the nation. The full entablature, complete with cushion frieze, is a feature rarely used on colonial buildings. The windows, which preserve their original sash, are accented by stone keystones and sills, as well as by gauged-brick arches. Inside, the church retains its original pews and stone pavers. The architectural highlights of the interior are the handsomely trimmed pulpit and the walnut altarpiece. Behind the church are the imported tombs of Carter and his two wives. The ensemble is the epitome of colonial Virginia design and craftsmanship. 51-4 (9/9/69); National Historic Landmark.

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
COROTOMAN ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITE, Weems vicinity. An extensive archaeological excavation conducted by the Virginia Division of Historic Landmarks in 1978 revealed the form and size of the mansion of Robert ("King") Carter, colonial Virginia's richest and most powerful planter. Carter began construction of the house in 1720 and lived there until it was destroyed by fire in 1729, three years before his death. The excavation uncovered the foundations of what must have been the most prodigious and richly appointed house of the period: a 40-by-90-foot two-story structure with towers at each corner of the river side. Between the towers was a long veranda with a paved area beneath. The archaeological excavations showed that the hall was paved with marble and that the fireplaces had marble trim and were lined with delft tiles. The thousands of artifacts unearthed in the rubble, including pieces of ceramic tankards and storage vessels, porcelain teacups, wine bottles, buckles, clasps, and hardware, help to reconstruct the life-style of one of the great figures of America's colonial era. 51-34 (12/2/69); Virginia Historic Landmarks Board preservation easement.

FOX HILL, *Lively vicinity.* Named for the 17th-century owner of the property, planter David Fox, this Northern Neck plantation contains an L-shaped Federal dwelling conspicuously situated amid broad flat fields. The severely formal house echoes the Georgian style of the preceding generation and is set off by its even Flemish bond brickwork and molded-brick cornices and its restrained but well-crafted Federal interior woodwork. Complementing the house is a two-story kitchen of the same formal character. It and a brick smokehouse are the remnants of an original complex of five outbuildings. Although no survey has been conducted, the property may also contain the archaeological site of David Fox's manor house. The plantation was acquired in 1793 by Richard Selden II, who apparently built the present house before his death in 1823. 51–9 (4/18/78).





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historic core of the community. The tiny community of Lancaste Court House is one of the best preserved of Virginia's run courthouse villages. The principal element of the district is the late antebellum courthouse with its 1937 portico. The cour house complex includes the former jail and old clerk's office both dating from the 18th-century. Immediately to the east an 1872 Confederate memorial, believed to be the first suc monument erected in Virginia. A ca. 1800 tavern, mid-19th century post office, Carpenters' Gothic church, turn-of-the century store, and several detached 19th- and early 20t century dwellings complete the linear village. Shown are th old clerk's office and, across the street, the tavern. Nearly fre of modern intrusions, the district maintains a harmony scale, color, texture, and materials, all within a larger agraria setting. The county seat was established at this location i 1740. 51-81 (1/18/83).

MILLENBECK ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITES, Millenbeck The area around the present settlement of Millenbeck on the Corotoman River, a tributary of the Rappahannock, contain several colonial archaeological sites. A fort, known as the for at Ball's Point, was established there around the time of Ba con's Rebellion, and traces of it are believed to remain. The site of the late 17th-century family home of Hannah Ball, great grandmother of George Washington, probably remains intace near the fort site. The site of a later Ball mansion, as well as that of another colonial-era house, remains undisturbed. The early date of the fortification and the residences of Washington's ancestors give this complex particularly important archaeological potential. 51–29 (12/2/69).

ST. MARY'S WHITECHAPEL, Lively vicinity. The vicissi tudes suffered by Virginia's Anglican church are expressed in the fabric of this tenacious Northern Neck parish church named for the London suburb that was home for some of its first communicants. The oldest portion of the church may have been built as early as 1669. This rectangular structure was made cruciform in 1740-41 with the construction of the existing transepts. The building was abandoned after the disestablishment but was reoccupied in 1832. To accommodate a muchdiminished congregation, the deteriorated nave and chancel were removed, and their bricks were used to fill the voids between the transepts. Though severely altered from its 18thcentury form, the building's remaining portions are reminders of its importance in the past. St. Mary's was the parish church of the family of Mary Ball, mother of George Washington. 51-22(9/9/69).




MIDDLESEX COUNTY

Formed from Lancaster County ca. 1669, Middlesex County, on the Rappahannock River side of Virginia's Middle Peninsula, was named for the extinct English shire which bordered London. Its county seat is Saluda.

CHRIST CHURCH, Christchurch. The second church of the Christ Church Parish was ordered in 1712 and worked on into the 1720s. Alexander Graves served as its mason, and John Hipkins, Sr., as its carpenter. Among its principal patrons was the Wormeley family of Rosegill. Although it is modest in proportion, there is evidence that the interior was richly appointed and had a chancel screen. Like many of Virginia's Anglican churches, Christ Church was abandoned after the disestablishment and fell into ruin; only its handsome Flemish bond walls survived. The parish was revived in 1840, and the church was restored to use in 1843. In 1921 Christchurch School, a boys' preparatory school, was established nearby, and the church since has served as both the school chapel and the local parish church. Further renovations took place in 1931. The churchyard contains one of the finest collections of colonial tombstones in the state, the most elegant ones marking the graves of the Wormeleys. 59-2 (3/21/72).

DEER CHASE, *Healys vicinity*. Deer Chase, with its brick construction, jerkinhead roof, and center-passage plan typifies the better-quality, medium-size colonial plantation house of Virginia's Tidewater region. Although modest in appearance, the house is generously proportioned compared to the rude wooden cottages of the average farmers of the period. The original occupant is not known, but the property was owned by the Cary family in the late 18th century. The house was gutted by fire in the early 19th century; hence, the present interior woodwork dates from that time. The repair to the fire damage also resulted in the number of bays on the facade being changed from five to three. An 1885 plat of the property shows.

the NORTH CAROLINA families in their line of migration entered Georgia at Rabun County and journeyed southwest through Habersham, Hall, Gwinnett, Dekalb and Fayette Counties. It was in the latter county that they were joined by the members of the Yarbrough or Yarborough families from Union, Pickens, Anderson, Fairfield and Abbeville Counties in South Carolina. The counties they left their traces in were Franklin (where they entered Georgia), Jackson, Oconee (where they were joined by a wagon train from South Carolina who had been in Chester, Abbeville, and Edgefield Counties) and went on through Walton, Newton and Henry County, joining their relatives in Fayette County; part of the line split in Oconee County and went through Morgan, Jasper and Butts and into Fayette where they joined the other two lines. However in Jasper County the last named line was joined by kinsmen from South Carolina entering Georgia at Columbia and journeyed through Warren, Handcock and Putman where they joined their kinsmen in Jasper County and went on to Fayette County with them. There was still another line (about the same time) that entered Georgia through Effingham and journeyed west through Bullock, Tattnall, Toombs, Montgomery, Laurens, Dodge, Pulaski, Dooly, Sumter Terrill and Randolph.

There was a line that came into Georgia from the Augusta area via Richmond and journeyed west through Jefferson, Washington, Baldwin, Wilkinson, Twigg, Houston, Crawford, Taylor, Talbot, and entered Alabama near Opelike where the first, second and third lines entered that state.

The line that entered through Richmond County, is believed to have been a wing of the Yorkshire Yarbrough; the Lincolnshire Yarbrough and the Yorkshire Yarbrough families had intermarried in England, and in America - and were cousins all the way down the line in both England and America.

Sorry it has taken so long to get the pictures to you.

As I told you, I did not order the coat of arms from an advertisement, or coat of arms factory as I call them - I spent considerable time and Ynd money having it thoroughly researched by authorities - it iscorrect in every detail. Recently Jane and I visited the N.C. State Archivesand examined the Yarbrough coat of arms on file there - theirs is identical to the one we have.

About Richard Yarbrough's grave stone: I have communicated with Dr. James Bailey of Blandford Church and have found him to be enthusiastic about our efforts to correct it for he is aware that the stone is now in error. Dr. Bailey secured permission for our correction of the stone from the superintendent of Blandford Cemetery and the Petersburg Dept. of Fourism. Then I asked Arlie Andrews a Petersburg stone engraver to proceed with the work - then the roof fell in. Andrews examined the fragile 278 year old sandstone marker and told Dr. Bailey that he was so afraid to work on it he would'nt touch it with a forty foot pole. Now Andrews and Dr. Bailey suggest that we purchase a new and correct stone and mount it behind the old stone. I cant buy that idea - it would detract and compete with the old stone. I suggest that we put our message on a modest bronze plaque, mount it on a granite slab, and place it flush with the ground in front of the old stone. I know Dr. Bailey will go along with this suggestion. What do you think ? I would like to have your opinion.

Did I tell you that I commissioned the College of Arms to search their files and prepare a family chart of the Yarbroughs ? I finally received the chart and found that the given name EDMUND appeared five times among the descendents of Eustacious de Yarburg. And according to the College of Arms Eustacious was the daddy rabbit of all us Yarbroughs (all spellings).

Edmund Yarburgh of Balore Hall, County York, born ca. 1571 -- married Sarah, daughter and coheir of Thomas Wormeley.

Edmund Yarburgh of Doncaster, County York, Doctor of Physics, born 1625 -- married Anne, daughter of Thomas Stanhope, County York, son of Sir. John Stanhope.
