Preface

These records are the legacy of our Yarbrough family researchers, to whom much is owed. The known family researchers include Jean Baker, Ann Y. Broadbent, Mary Y. Daniel, Frances (Rea) Donohue, Betty Humrighouse, Pauline Gray, Evelyn Goble, Nelle Morris Jenkins, Ophelia Kessler, Frances Lockwood, Karen Mazock Renee Smelley, Dorothy Svec, Jeanette Wilson, Cleveland “Cy” Yarborough, Edna Yarbrough, George A. Yarbrough, and Robert Price Yarbrough.

The originals of these volumes are being kept for the benefit of future generations by the Williamson County Library, Franklin, Tennessee.

No claims of accuracy or authentication of the material herein are made or may be assumed. Many of these records have been superseded by subsequent research. Hence, there are records which are erroneous and unreliable; it would have been a Herculean task to attempt to correct all of them. Fortunately, there are only a few critical genealogical facts that are involved, and which are correctly stated here:

- Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough was never married to Frances Proctor;
- Ambrose Yarbrough did not immigrate from Yorkshire; he is now believed to be a descendant of Richard the Immigrant;
- There are so far only two proven sons of Old Richard – John and Richard II;
- There is so far no evidence proving Joshua Yarborough I to be a descendant of Old Richard.
- The “Old Country” referred to in old documents and letters is the Colony of Virginia, not England or the Old World.
- There were not seven brothers who immigrated from “the old country”; in fact, it now appears there were three brothers and four sons of the brothers. Which were the fathers and which were the sons are so far unknown.

In spite of these inaccuracies, these records comprise much of our history and some of our accomplishments. There are pages whose print quality is so poor that word recognition was not possible. In spite of that, at least partial capability for searching these volumes is provided, as well as an index to each volume. Nonetheless, the viewer is cautioned to perform his/her own due diligence in connection with any use of this material.

The various spellings of the Yarbrough surname have never been applied consistently, even within a given family. To the extent possible, the names in the index reflect the names used on the source pages; where it wasn't clear as to which might be the proper spelling, the spelling used is “Yarbrough”.

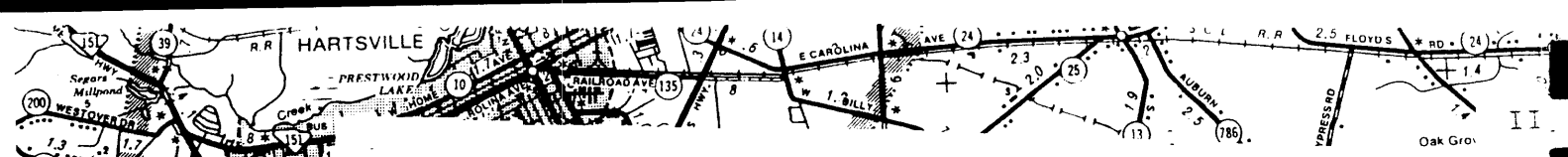

I. Lawson Grove Road and Sansbury Road (W. T. Yarborough place).

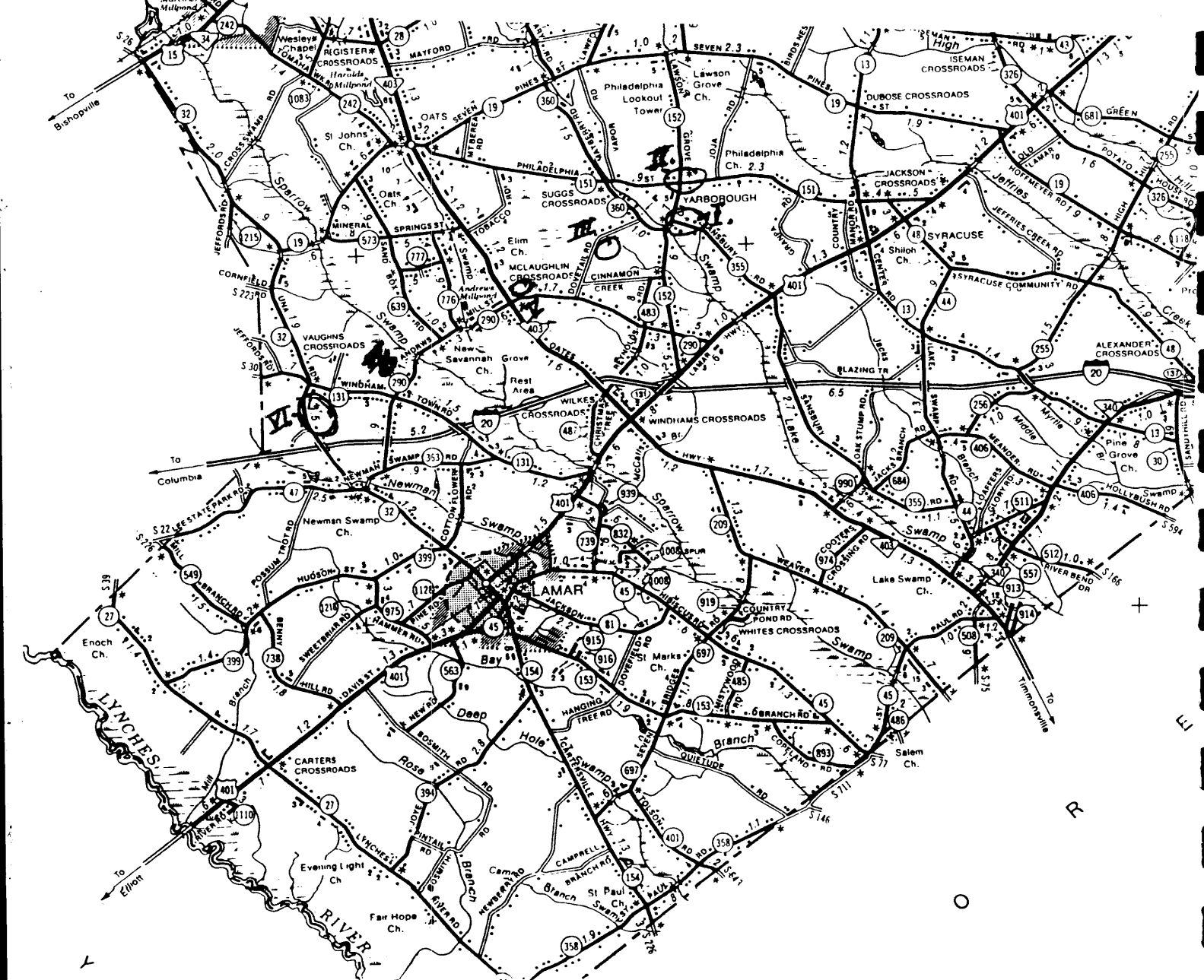
II. Lawson Grove Road and Philadelphia Street (Yarborough Crossroads and Otis Yarborough place).

VI. Una Road (site of Thomas L. Yarborough place and later area of Roland Buddy Yarborough place).



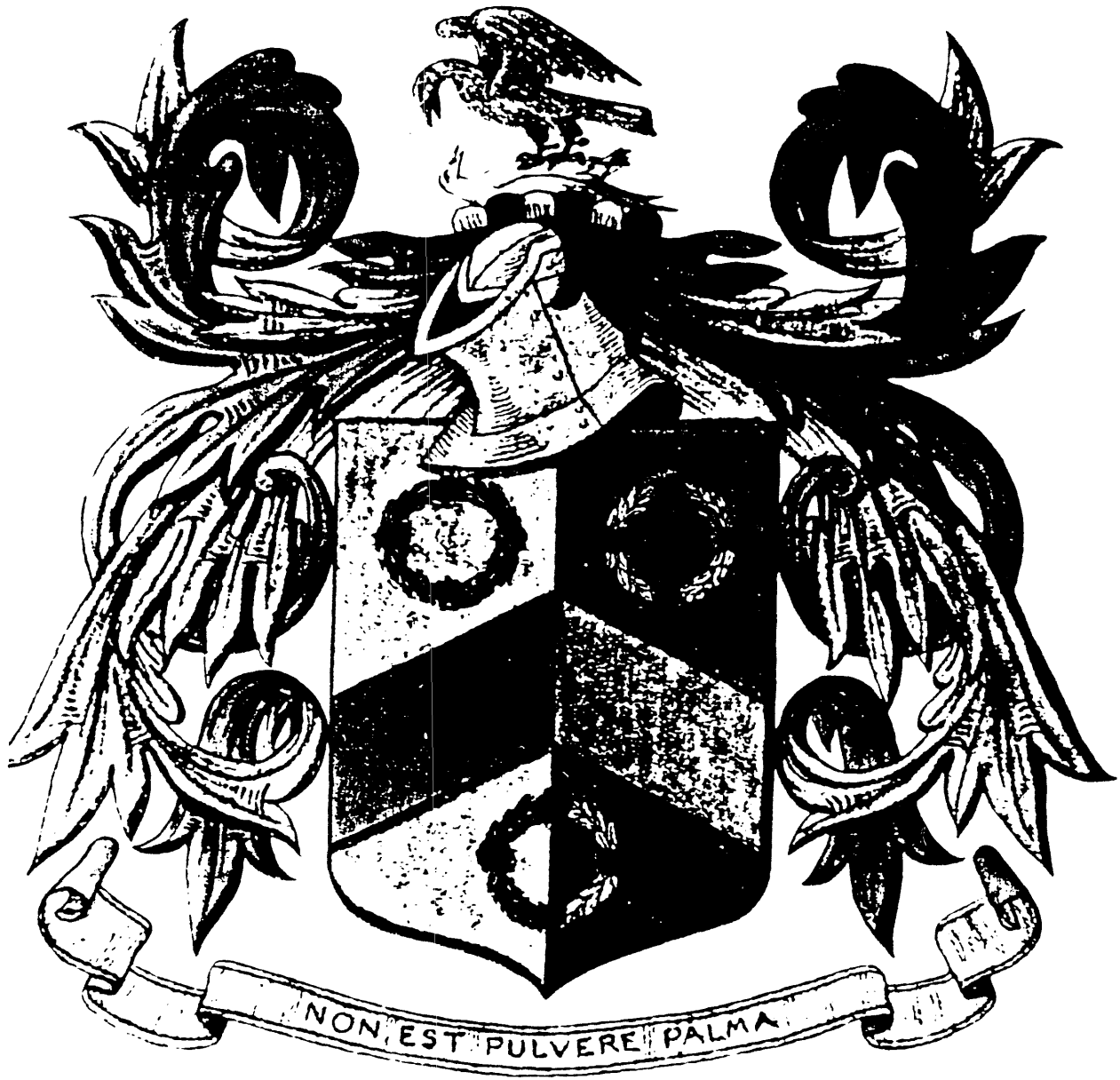
YARBROUGH/YARBOROUGH COAT OF ARMS

The next page is a copy of the official Coat of Arms which was obtained from the late Robert P. Yarbrough.

Bob advised that this Coat of Arms was extensively researched by himself, by Mr. T. F. Thomas of Heraldic Studios, and by F. S. Andrus, Esquire, Herald of Lancaster, College of Arms, London, England. It is interesting that the College of Arms lists three coats of arms for Yarbroughs (Yarboroughs), two in Lincolnshire, and one in Yorkshire, and all are almost identical. One Lincolnshire crest is a falcon preying on a pheasant, the other the same with a crescent; the Yorkshire crest is a falcon preying on a duck. Only kinsmen would have symbols so near alike. The Yarbroughs of England were a close knit clan, and the comradeship continued even into America.

Bob assured me that this picture is authentic in every detail, and indeed the proud coat of arms of all Yarbroughs of the Yorkshire clan.

An explanation of the arms colors and symbols follows on the page following the Coat of Arms.



Harborough

Arms: Per pale argent and azure, a chevron between
three chaplets, all counterchanged.
Crest: A falcon or, belled or, preying on a cock
pheasant proper.
Motto: Non est sine pulvere palma.
(The palm is not obtained without toil).

Colour Meanings:

Argent: (silver) The metal argent represents
peace and security. It also signifies
everlasting charity and clear conscience.
Azure: (blue) The colour azure denotes loyalty
and truth and also signifies divine con-
templation and Godliness.
Or: (gold) The metal or is the emblem of
generosity and elevation of mind.

Character Meanings:

Chevron: The chevron is significant of protection,
and was awarded to one who had achieved
some notable enterprise. It represents
either the saddle of a war horse or the
roof-tree of a house, and has sometimes
been given to those who have built churches
or fortresses, or who have accomplished
some work of faithful service.
Chaplet: An ancient ornament for the head, granted
to gallant knights for acts of courtesy. It is
frequently borne as a charge in a shield of
arms. The chaplet signifies the crown of joy,
the award of admiration.
Falcon: The bearing of the falcon was awarded to
those who had by great service earned the
right to hunt on the royal preserves.

THOMAS L. YARBOROUGH FAMILY HISTORY (Roots In Newman Swamp
and Philadelphia Sections of Darlington County, South
Carolina).

Background Notes

Thomas L. Yarborough (b. ca. 1832 - d. 4-28-1865) was the third son of John H. Yarbrough (b. ca. 1805 - d. 12- 6- 1865) and we believe his mother to have been a King. Since this will be read by some in search of family history we have included information on as many connections as could be developed.

Of the several Yarborough family branches in this section of South Carolina, the Thomas L. Yarborough branch is not traceably connected to them. John H. Yarbrough and all his children except Thomas L. Yarborough and Nancy Yarbrough Privette (in 1860 Census wife of W. R. Privette) left South Carolina between 1854 and 1859. John H. Yarbrough's family (his father, mother, several brothers, and probably his sister) had migrated to Western Tennessee by the late 1820's (in what is now Decatur County).

In this material you will note spellings of Yarborough, Yarbrough, and Yarbrow. There are many spellings of the name (said to be more than 20) but the name spelling that came over from England was Yarbrough. Other spellings that are familiar are Yarber, Yarbrow, and Yarbree. Note that John H. spelled it Yarbrough and Thomas spelled it Yarborough.

The descendants of Thomas L. Yarborough began an annual Family Reunion about 1957 at the urging and leadership of Bernice L. Yarborough (son of William T. Yarborough). The reunion roll is kept in the names of the five children of Thomas. They are: William T. Yarborough, John Murray Yarborough, Evelyn Yarborough Windham, Thomas Albert (Buddy) Yarborough, and Mary Alice Yarborough Jeffords. First reunion meetings were at the Philadelphia Community Grange Hall and moved to the Philadelphia Southern Methodist Church when the Grange Hall was lost in a fire. Early records of these reunions are not available.

About 1979 it was realized that many of our family who knew about the family's early times were passing on and we should make an effort to bring together as much information as we could. Mary Jeffords (daughter of Jim and Mary Alice Yarborough Jeffords) had Martha Harrell Yarborough Windham's Bible and in it was a letter from Joseph T. Yarbrough (second son of John H.) to Nancy Yarbrough Privette and to Martha Harrell Yarborough addressed to 'Dear Sisters'. Mary also had an obituary of W.R.A. Yarbrough (first son of John H.). We knew that Thomas's father was named John.

The Charlotte Observer newspaper around this time had an article about the Public Library on Tryon Street in Charlotte having a 'Carolina Room' devoted to North and South Carolina history. With the information in hand that we had developed, most of a Saturday was spent in the 'Carolina Room' checking census records and generally trying to find background information. It pays to be lucky and that day was one lucky day. We also found that family researchers are people who are very generous in sharing their knowledge.

The lady at the Charlotte Tryon Street Library desk asked me about my research and when I told her about the family name she said there was a Yarbrough gentleman in Charlotte who regularly did research there. She telephoned Robert P. Yarbrough (1911-1987) and fortunately he was home. He told me a number of things on the phone and it was quickly apparent he had a lot of knowledge but we could not establish a connection with any of the family branches with which he was familiar. Two things he did prove to be of tremendous help and they were to suggest contact be made with the first editor of Yarborough Family Magazine who was Charles D. Yarborough (1943-1985) in Bedford, Texas. Charles D. Yarborough was the nephew of Senator Ralph Yarborough who was in office in the 1960's and was in the parade when President John F. Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas. We were also put in touch with Charles H. Yarbrough of Tiptonville, Tennessee who later was second editor of Yarborough Family Magazine following the death of Charles D. Yarborough in 1985. Charles H. Yarbrough proved to be our distant cousin (third cousin once removed of your compiler). Edmund Yarbrough was a Great-Great Grandfather of Charles Yarbrough and Great-Great-Great Grandfather of your compiler. These contacts were of tremendous help in our search.

An annual national Yarbrough meeting was begun in 1982 and we now have an eleemosynary association. In addition to annual meetings this group continues publishing 'Yarbrough Family Magazine Quarterly' which is a good source of information. National Meetings are normally held the last weekend in July.

We are at least six generations since Thomas L. Yarborough and it may be seven. We know we are all cousins but it seemed in order to bring (based on The World Book Encyclopedia) how first, second, third, cousins, etc. are counted. Thomas's grandchildren were first cousins. The children of the first cousins are second cousins. The children of the second cousins are third cousins and so on. Now comes the various 'removed' cousins. Simply, the children of the second cousins are our second cousins once removed. The grandchildren of the second cousins are our second cousins twice removed and so on.

Chapter 1 - Thomas L. Yarborough (1832-1865)

Our first information on Thomas is in the 1850 census in which he is listed as the third child of John H. Yarborough. The listing is:

Your researcher believes Thomas's age 16 listed is incorrect based on the 1860 census records stating T. L. Yarborough's age was 28. Thomas as head of the household would have given the 1860 census information which is more likely accurate and would put his birthyear to be 1832.

The Harrell Family Bible in the possession of Mrs. Frances (Major) Thomas records that Martha Catherine Harrell married Thomas Yarborough in 1856. Mrs. Frances Thomas is descended from the Harrells and lives just north of the Oates community on Highway 403 and about one mile east of Wesley Chapel United Methodist Church (founded in 1789 and in earlier times known as the Gully). The Harrell family dates back to the church's beginning.

In the census records of 1860 Thomas Yarborough lists his occupation as farmer. Other details are: wife Martha, age 21, and two children (Willie T. 3 and John Murray 1).

Our next records of Thomas are 14 Confederate muster reports recording that Thomas enlisted as a private on May 19, 1862 in Company B, Twenty-First Regiment (Infantry), South Carolina Volunteers. These reports follow at the end of this chapter. He was enlisted by Captain Wilds for a period of one year but by the time the July, August 1862 muster was written the enlistment was for the duration of the War. (Wonder if he received the \$50 enlistment bounty?).

In 1909 Henry Kershaw DuBose published a book titled "The History of Company B, Twenty-First Regiment (Infantry), South Carolina Volunteers". This book is on file with the Darlington County Historical Commission in Darlington. Company B was organized in August and September, 1861 and consisted almost entirely of men from Darlington District (now county).

The only mention of Thomas was of his capture and death. From the book we note that the unit was in a major battle July, 1863 on Morris Island near Charleston and fought off

and on through August and September, finally evacuating from Morris Island to Fort Sumter to continue defending Charleston. They remained there until about April 20, 1864 when they were sent to Petersburg, Virginia. Arrived there May 5, 1864 and went into a battle as part of a 1500 man force from South Carolina that helped save Petersburg from capture. The fighting continued and Company B suffered about one-third killed or wounded of its people involved. Later in heavy fighting June 24th the skirmishers led an advance but were cut off and surrounded (Thomas was not in this group). The rest of Company B was held back and not committed to the action. They were in the trenches June, July, and August, 1864 in very miserable conditions.

Fort Fisher, North Carolina was trying to keep Wilmington open (the most important port left to the Confederates to ship cotton and receive goods that had run the blockade). Remnants of Company B as part of the 21st SC were sent to help with the defense and they got there just in time to be captured on January 15, 1865.

There was a book published in 1912 titled "The Elmira Prison Camp" by Clay W. Holmes. From this book we learned the camp functioned from July 6, 1864 to July 10, 1865 and was a converted Union training camp. The book defends the North for the death rate as out of 12,123 prisoners, 2,693 (24%) died. Thomas's record shows his arrival on January 30, 1865 (one of 501 prisoners). The 1864-1865 winter is described as one of the coldest in 50 years. On February 7 Elmira had the heaviest snowfall of the winter, 18 inches in the flats and snow was 30 inches deep on hills. The night of February 15 was the coldest of the season, 18 degrees below zero. In March, there were floods with water coming into the buildings. (Note the camp layout with the Chemung River along one side--follows at end of chapter).

Thomas died April 28, 1865 of pneumonia. The old Archives record states that Thomas was buried in Grave No. 2756 while the modern records (and confirmed by a visit) give the Grave No. as 2728. This was explained in the Elmira Prison Book by a renumbering when the wooden markers were replaced with marble markers in 1907 (a few families had moved the remains of their loved ones shortly after the War which changed the numbers).

On the visit, noted it was a peaceful place and well maintained. Thomas's grave had beautiful shade trees nearby. One other item; nothing exists of the old prison. It was torn down not long after the War, and the area is a residential area.

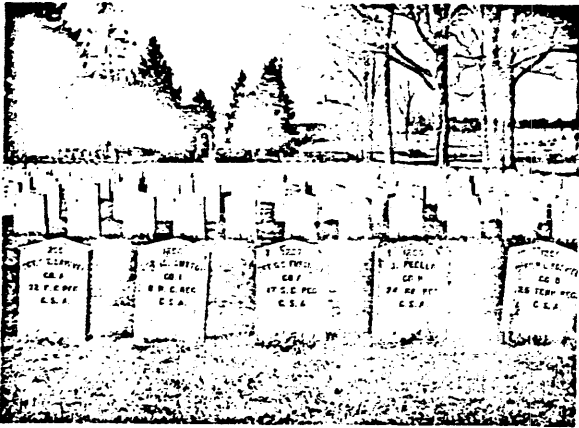

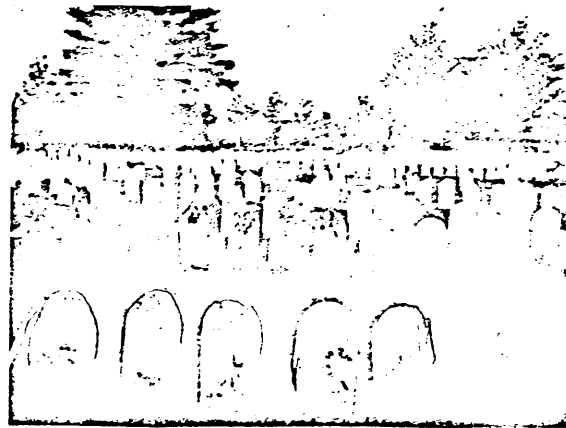

In 1861 Elmira was a training and marshalling center for Union Soldiers. There were three camps with two hospitals and a large warehouse. As the barracks emptied it was decided to make use of the buildings as a prison camp. Here between July 1864 and August 1865 about 12,000 were confined at different times. Of these about 2,950 died. Many were in poor condition when they arrived. The first winter in camp was unusually severe which added to the large loss of life.

At first the United States Government made no provisions for the burial of prisoners so the city officials of Elmira gave the Commanding Officer permission to use one half acre in the city cemetery, known as Woodlawn. The half acre plot was soon filled and before the close of the camp two and one half acres had been used for the graves of Confederate soldiers.

As far as the records show, the Federal Government did nothing in the matter until 1877 when it paid the City of Elmira Fifteen Hundred Dollars for the two and one half acres, and named the plot Woodlawn National Cemetery. Since then more land has been added and many other veterans of United States wars are now buried there.

At the time of the Confederate burials, John Jones, an escaped slave who had found freedom in Elmira, was sexton of Woodlawn. He kept a meticulous record of each Confederate burial so that when, in 1907, the Federal Government erected a small marble marker at each grave, it was possible to mark each stone with the soldier's name, company regiment, date of death, and grave number.

Among the men whom John Jones buried was one from the household in which he had lived as a slave in Virginia.

An excellent book giving a complete history of the Elmira Prison Camp was written by Clay W. Holmes and is called "The Elmira Prison Camp" and was published in 1912.

Union's Elmira prison camp escaped death camp notoriety

EDITOR'S NOTE — The Confederacy's infamous Andersonville prison camp in Georgia marks its 125th anniversary this year. So does the Union's Elmira prison in New York. While Andersonville remains a symbol of the inhumanities endured by prisoners in the Civil War, Elmira and other Northern prisons escaped that notoriety. But there is little evidence that one was any better than the other.

ELMIRA, N.Y. (AP) — Like some rusty bayonet or tattered battle flag hidden away in the attic, the Elmira prison camp is an all-but-forgotten relic of the Civil War.

Considering the human suffering involved, maybe memories of the prison, which opened 125 years ago this month, are best left undisturbed.

Except for a flagpole, a small monument and two stone markers there's nothing in the quiet Elmira neighborhood where the prison camp once stood to mark its presence. But buried beneath tidy rows of white headstones and shade

trees at the Woodlawn National Cemetery are the remains of 2,973 Confederate soldiers who died at Elmira, many from starvation.

The Confederacy's Andersonville prison in Georgia is remembered as the most infamous example of the inhumanity and deprivations of the Civil War, even though records show that a soldier imprisoned in Elmira stood little better chance of surviving than did one in Andersonville.

Questions linger over whether those 2,973 Rebels died mainly because of the primitive state of medicine and sanitation during the Civil War, or whether they were victims of the Lincoln administration's retaliatory neglect of some prisoners of war.

"Can one say that, by design, this was a death camp?" asks J. Michael Horigan, an Elmira history teacher who spent much of the last year researching records from Civil War prison camps in Washington, D.C., and in the South. "I think one can say it, but you can't document it. The records on this camp are very incomplete. But cir-

cumstantial evidence certainly makes it look that way."

Union officials ordered in May 1864 that a complex of barracks at Elmira that had been used for three years to house Union soldiers be converted to a prison camp for captive Southerners. A 12-foot high fence was immediately thrown around a 30-acre portion of barracks.

There were 35 wooden buildings in the complex, each about 100 feet long and 16 feet wide. Union officers in Elmira wrote the War Department that the barracks could accommodate 3,000 men comfortably and 1,000 more in a pinch.

Orders came back from Washington that 10,000 men were to be housed in the camp. Men not lucky enough to get places in barracks would sleep in tents. Wooden barracks weren't constructed for all the men until well after winter had set in.

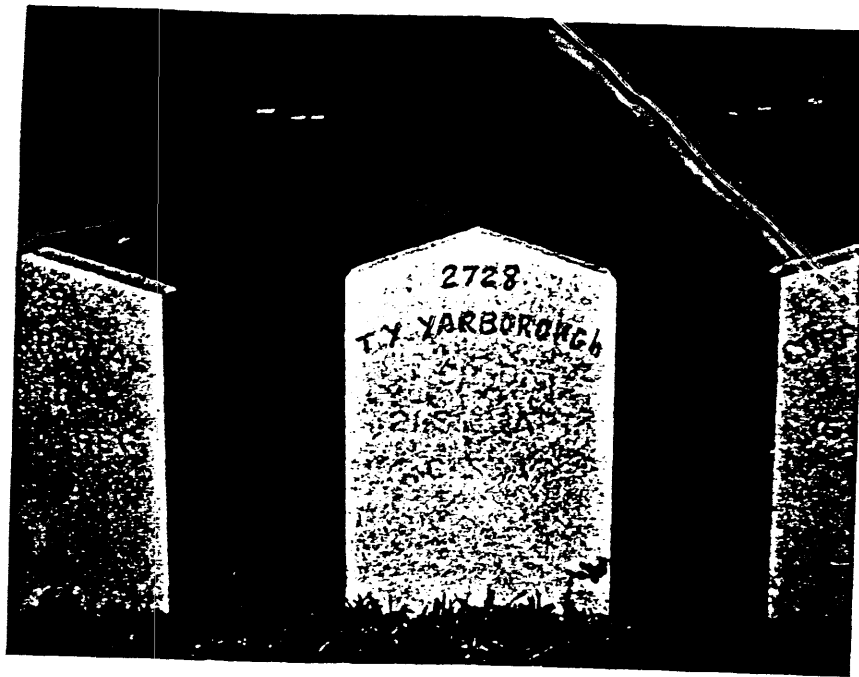

*Chapter 2 - Martha Catherine Harrell Yarborough Windham
(1838-1912)*

Martha entered into a second marriage with a John W. Windham (date unknown) sometime during Reconstruction after the War Between the States. Kenneth Yarborough reported that there were three children of the Windham union and so did Corinne Yarborough Reynolds. They were Nannie, Ashby, and Nettie. The old Harrell Family Bibles in the possession of Mrs. Frances (Major) Thomas (descended from Tarpley Harrell) mentions only Ashby and Nettie. Corinne Y. Reynolds said that Nannie and Ashby died young. Have found in Newman Swamp United Methodist Church Cemetery a stone for Ashby Windham (b. May 16, 1876 - d. November 8, 1896) and also a stone next to Ashby's for Nannie E. Windham (b. 10-10-1870 -d. 7-30-1904). Nettie is buried at Windhamtown Cemetary near Lamar - born May 19, 1877 and died October 8, 1939. Nettie's husband was Abram J. (Jack) Windham (b. 7-13-1881 -d. 9-10-1940). They had one son - Ernest H. (b. 8-27-1906 - d. 2-14-1947). Ernest's wife was Rilla W. (b. 9-23-1904 - d. 3-28-1989). Both are buried at Newman Swamp. Understand they had a daughter named Rachel but she has not been contacted.

A survey compiled by Horace F. Rudisill on March 22, 1956 reported a John W. Windham Cemetery in the southeast corner of the intersection of Highways 401 and 403 (Windham's Crossroads). Only one stone was found in Rudisill's survey and this stone was moved to Lamar Cemetery in 1963 and was still there om August 8, 1993. This says :

WINDHAM, John W. b. d.
CO A 14 SC INF CSA

As this is compiled have not attempted to check him out through his CSA war record. John W. Windham was dead by 1901 since Martha C. Windham is in State of South Carolina records as receiving a Confederate Widow's pension due to the death of her first husband in the War Between the States.

William T. was already married with two children (see Willie T. Yarborough chapter 5). Alice was listed elsewhere as visiting.

Martha's father was Tarpley Harrell who was born April 28, 1810, married Nancy Beasley January 25, 1832, and Tarpley died April 10, 1845. He was the first person to be buried in Wesley Chapel United Methodist Church Cemetary near Lydia.

Tarpley Harrell's parents were Spencer and Sophia Pipkin Harrell and both are buried at Wesley Chapel. Spencer was born December 1, 1775 and died November 24, 1846. Sophia was born July 29, 1781 and died June 2, 1861. Horace Rudisill told me that Spencer Harrell's father was a John Harrell who came from North Carolina.

John Lennell Andrews, Jr. in his book on "History of Wesley Chapel United Methodist Church - Lydia, SC - 1789-1989" states that:

"Spencer Harrell was a devout Methodist, a member of the Gully Meeting House. On August 26, 1809 was one of three signers of a deed of gift executed by Stephen Thompson, a Methodist preacher who was dying. Spencer Harrell was an exhorter and a class leader."

Spencer Harrell was active in the Methodist Church until his health failed shortly before his death. Since Spencer's son, Tarpley, had died the previous year he willed his son's widow, Nancy Beasley Harrell, 250 acres.

Martha Catherine Harrell Yarborough Windham was born May 11, 1838 and died December 21, 1912 and is buried at Newman Swamp Cemetery near Lamar.

James E. was the first born of the union with Martha Mancill.

The Old Darlington District Genealogical chapter publishes quarterly information and in the Fall 1994 issue they listed slaves from 1850. Information dated 4 November 1850 lists John H. Yarbrough as owning one male slave. Since there were over 20 people owning 50 or more slaves, we wonder if John H. was not very well off or restricted his ownership for other reasons.

Who was John H. Yarbrough and what was his background? John H. was born in North Carolina, the last child of Edmund (ca. 1760-1845) and Sophia Gossett Yarbrough (1761-1841). John H. Yarbrough apparently lived in Mecklenburg County, NC until about 1831 (this is based on the 1830 Mecklenburg census and both William R.A. and Joseph T. being born in North Carolina); Thomas and all his other children being born in South Carolina.

From Charles Henry Yarbrough of Tiptonville, Tennessee we know that Edmund Yarbrough moved to what is now Decatur County, Tennessee in the 1820's. Edmund did not acquire any land but his sons Henry and William did. William was one of the areas largest landowners. The history of Tennessee in the World Book Encyclopedia states that Western Tennessee was purchased from the Indians in 1818 and probably the offer of free land is what enticed them there.

R. P. Yarbrough wrote your compiler January 27, 1981 that he had found that Edmund's sons; to wit, Henry, James, William, John, and Joseph acquired land near the North Fork and headwaters of Waxhaw Creek (south of Charlotte, NC). R. P. Yarbrough was of the opinion that Edmund was the son of a Henry Yarbrough who shows up in Mecklenburg County in 1770 but we have no proof. The land transaction of Edmund's sons was in 1823. Therefore, it could be John H. never went to Tennessee but stayed in Mecklenburg County until he moved to Darlington District, SC.

John Lennell Andrews, Jr. in his book; "History of Wesley Chapel United Methodist Church, Lydia, South Carolina 1789-1989"; reports that camp meetings began at the Gully Church (now Wesley Chapel) in 1802. A parallel to this is William R.A. Yarbrough wrote the Southern Christian Advocate on June 28, 1900 as follows:

"I was raised in Darlington District, SC. I left there in 1854. I give a list of preachers still fresh in my

memory whom I heard preach on Darlington Circuit and Wesley Chapel camp meetings for 35 years."

For complete letter reproduction see Chapter 4.

Another note from W.R.A. Yarbrough's Advocate letter is that in a list of preachers he cites W.W. King as "my grandfather" and of the local elders J.H. Yarbrough (father). Therefore William R.A. Yarbrough may have been named for William W. King. "The History of Wesley Chapel" notes three William Kings: William W. King, the preacher; William (Big Billy); and another William (Factory Billy). William W. King, the preacher, shows up in South Carolina Methodist records as being appointed in 1825 to Reedy River in the Columbia District and was reappointed in 1826. William W. King served appointments in South Carolina until 1836. He served Lynches Creek in 1828 and 1829 and the Gully Church (now Wesley Chapel) was part of this charge. Accepting that John H. Yarbrough's first wife was the daughter of William W. King it gives us several possible reasons for John H.'s move to Darlington District. Not knowing William W. King's church background, we must assume he was a very religious man prior to his coming to South Carolina and must have been in North Carolina for John H. to have met and married his daughter. It is also assumed that William W. King participated in the Gully Camp Meetings and John H. along with his wife and children also attended. With William W. King's preaching in this section of South Carolina and John H.'s people now located 600 miles away in Tennessee, it is readily apparent that John H. located to Darlington District, South Carolina to be close to his wife's kin.

Horace Rudisill reports John H. as renting land in Darlington District about 1834. John H. made land purchases between November 10, 1840 and June 21, 1854.

John H. is mentioned four times in the "History of Wesley Chapel". First, as an official present at the third quarterly conference on September 20, 1839. Second, John H. is listed as a local preacher in September, 1841, and; third, his license to preach was renewed as well as that of his father-in-law Edmund Mancill at this quarterly conference. The fourth reference was at the fourth quarterly conference of 1853 at which John H. was appointed to serve on a committee to examine charges of drinking and drunkenness against a local deacon and steward. Lena Watford Fields (grandaughter of Willie T. Yarborough) had a Newman Swamp Methodist Church record showing John H. was licensed to preach December 7, 1839 (John H. was a member at Newman Swamp).

Since we have accepted that William W. King, the preacher, was Thomas L. Yarborough's maternal grandfather, we must include some of the warts we have learned about him. Keep in mind, for the great grandchildren of Thomas L., William W. King is one of sixteen great-great-great grandfathers and for the great-great grandchildren of Thomas L., William W. King is one of thirty two great-great-great-great grandfathers. William W. King's last year of preaching in the South Carolina Conference was 1835. He did a mid-life career change in 1836 and served as Darlington District Sheriff from 1836-1840. His church function in 1840 and 1841 is listed as a local elder in Wesley Chapel Church.

John Lennell Andrews, Jr. in "History of Wesley Chapel United Methodist Church, Lydia, SC 1789-1989" on page 85 writes that as old leaders passed on a new group emerged to guide the membership toward new growth. Andrews says:

" In Spencer Harrell's death Wesley Chapel lost its most pious leader. On the negative side William W. King's departure came in the midst of scandal."

The scandal Andrews refers to is on page 70 and we quote:

"William W. King, former elder from Wesley Chapel and itinerant minister of the South Carolina Conference, was the subject of some concern at the Third Quarterly Conference. Three years earlier King was involved in some difficulties with the civil authorities of Darlington District. A notice published in a Cheraw newspaper advised:

*\$300 REWARD
Will be given for the apprehension of
WILLIAM W. KING*

LATE SHERIFF OF DARLINGTON DISTRICT, WHO ESCAPED FROM JAIL ON THE MORNING OF THE 11TH INSTANT WHERE HE WAS CONFINED BY VIRTURE OF SUNDRY BAIL WRITS. SAID KING IS ABOUT FIFTY YEARS OF AGE, ABOUT 5 FEET 8 INCHES HIGH, HAS KEEN BLACK EYES, DARK HAIR RINGED WITH GREY. SOMEWHAT ECCENTRIC IN MANNER. HAS FOR MANY YEARS PAST A CIRCUIT RIDER OF THE METHODIST CHURCH...

King apparently left the State of South Carolina and continued to use his talents as a minister.

J.F.A. Elliott offered a resolution to the conference concerning the actions of William W. King.

WHEREAS WM. W. KING, FOR MANY YEARS AN ITENERANT MINISTER OF M.E. CHURCH IN THE SO.CA. CONFERENCE; & LATE A LOCAL PREACHER OF DARLINGTON CIRCUIT; HAS LEFT THE DISTRICT & STATE, CARRYING HIS CREDENTIALS WITH HIM, & IS NOW PREACHING AS WE HEAR, IN OTHER STATES AS A MINISTER OF OUR CHURCH.

THAT THE CHURCH AT A DISTANCE MAY BE APPRISED OF HIS TRUE CHARACTER...

RESOLVED, THAT THE SECRETARY OF THIS CONFERENCE BE REQUIRED TO PUBLISH IN THE S.C. ADVOCATE (WITH A REQUEST FOR THE PAPERS OF THE CHURCH TO COPY) THAT IT IS THE DELIBERATE OPINION OF THIS CONFERENCE, THAT THE SAID W.W. KING IS WHOLY UNWORTHY OF THE CONFIDENCE & PATRONAGE OF THE CHURCH, WHERE EVER HE MAY GO.

The resolution was unanimously adopted by the conference present. A notation in the record book of the Darlington Circuit gives an indication of the problems encountered by William W. King. In the space beside his name, in a listing of local preachers, is this remark, 'RUN AWAY & LEFT DEBTS UNPAID.'

Letters written by John H. Yarbrough dated August 28, 1856 and July 30, 1858 with interpretations by our Tennessee connection follow this chapter. Also there is a typed excerpt without a photocopy of the original in which John H. mentions 14 living children (have found only 13).

Following the letters is the oldest document in our family line that we are aware of and it is a photocopy of the marriage bond of Edmund Yarbrough and Sophia Gossett dated December 5, 1789.

Since at some point it may be of interest and value we have included a chart of Edmund and Sophia Gossett Yarbrough's children and those of Henry. Charles Henry Yarbrough of Tiptonville, Tennessee is of Henry's line. Also see Joseph T. Yarbrough letter and Joseph Gallatin Yarbrough's letters in chapter 4.

Joseph Gallatin Yarbrough describes Edmund Yarbrough as "a little short snubby size man with blue eyes." Sophia Gossett Yarbrough he described as "a long tall grey eyed woman never take a dose of medicine in her life." He further wrote that the following "sleep" on the hill of Lost Creek on the Bill Yarbrough place: Edmund and Sophia Gossett

Yarbrough and their children; Joseph Yarbrough, William Yarbrough, James Yarbrough, and John Yarbrough.

John H. is described by Joseph Gallatin Yarbrough as "moving there the last year of the War from Alabama and was on his death bed when he arrived and died soon. I never saw him."

Joseph T. Yarbrough in his May 18, 1866 letter to his "Dear Sisters" states that "Paw moved to Tennessee last November, died the 6th of December. He lived only two weeks after he landed here. His illness was consumption that caused his death." Joseph T. also said "I have all of Paws family with me except James and Elizabeth. They are in Alabama."

On a trip to Decaturville in April, 1983 I was shown the landing where boats stopped as they came up the Tennessee River which flows northward from Alabama. This explains the phrase concerning John H. "landed here." Note that consumption is an old name for tuberculosis.

Chapter 4 - W. R. A. AND JOSEPH T. YARBROUGH
(Older Brothers of Thomas L. Yarborough)

These men are important for the facts they left behind which proved so valuable in our search. This chapter will give them some identity.

On the next page is an excerpt from the "Southern Christian Advocate" entitled "An Old Man's Memories" dated June 28, 1900 from W.R.A. Yarborough, a very important letter because:

- 1 - Went to Wesley Chapel camp meetings for 35 years.
- 2 - In list of preachers he gives W. W. King as "my Grandfather."
- 3 - Left Darlington District in 1854.

Following on the next pages are the obituaries of W.R.A. Yarborough. The "Our Dead" was probably in a church publication and the other was found in the "Yarborough Family Magazine" issue of April, 1967 on page 116. Also included is a letter written by W.R.A. Yarborough found in the Family Bible of Bernice Yarborough (probably written in 1901 to Willie T. Yarborough).

Thanks to Nell Palmer Martin, a cousin of Van, Texas we are able to include a picture of the W.R.A. Yarborough family (following the 1901 letter).

And now to move on to Joseph T. Yarborough. We do not have much on Joseph T. but please refer to copy of letter written by Joseph T. to "Dear Sisters" (Nancy Yarborough Privette and Martha Harrell Yarborough) on May 18, 1866 and our interpretation of it. Following that is a typed copy of the Joseph Gallatin Yarbro letter of September 13, 1912 and a letter written to Charles Henry Yarbro on March 14, 1980 by Edwin T. Yarborough comparing a match up of the facts in both.

On a visit to Decaturville, Tennessee in April, 1983 searched for traces of Joseph T. but found none. It is noted in the 1880 census that he had married again:

From a Texas cousin we were contacted by (see chapter 13) we learned that there was an exodus from Decatur County, Tennessee to East Texas in 1884. It is possible Joseph T. moved with his kin at that time also but we have not developed proof.

An Old Man's Memories.

Dear Brothers of The Advocate: I was raised in Darlington District, S. C. I left there in 1854.

I give a list of preachers still fresh in my memory, whom I heard preach on Darlington Circuit, and at Wesley Chapel camp-meetings for 35 years. In 1849 at the camp-meeting I joined the church, giving my hand to the preacher. I then was received on probation. There are but few now living of these preachers, if any. Itinerants of the South Carolina Conference: J. C. Chappell, William Tarpley, W. W. King (my grandfather), James Jenkins (great power), sainted Gamewell, William Cook, Hartwell Spain, Joel Townsend, Nicholas Talley, Leonard Rusa, William Capers (became bishop), Lewis Scarborough, W. C. Coleman, Dr. Charles Taylor (missionary, to China), John Legget, Jacob Nipper, Rev. North, Allen McCorquodale, Rev. M. A. McKibbin, Rev. McPherson, Bond English, Simpson Jones, Rev. Patillow, Rev. Kilgo.

Local Elders: William Brockington, Nathan Byrd, Joseph Hendrix, J. F. A. Elliott, Josh. DuBose, Ella DuBose, Spencer Atkinson, James Windham, Robert Campbell, Edmund Mansfield, J. H. Yarbrough (father), William Gardner, John Joseph, Ephriam Hendrix (exhorter), James Andrews (exhorter), William Williford, Asa Skinner, Milbray Mixon.

If there is one of this list, now living, please answer. (We think all have passed away.—Ed.) Now as I wait to go hence I remember these men, who were baptized daily by the Holy Ghost, and knew how to point out the way to heaven to sinners.

Our Dead

W. R. A. YARBROUGH was born in Charlotte, N. C., October 24, 1828; and died in the Confederate Soldiers' Home, near Nashville, June 21, 1907. When a young man Brother Yarbrough located at Montgomery, Ala., and there remained until the opening of the War between the States, when he enlisted as a soldier in the service of the Confederacy. During the four years and more of that Titanic struggle he was faithful to his duty as he saw it, remaining in the ranks and enduring hardships and facing danger along with his comrades until honorably discharged at the close of the war. Returning to his home, in Montgomery, he engaged in business and prospered until failing health compelled him to seek a more favorable climate. About twenty years ago he moved to San Antonio, Tex., and a few years later joined in with Mr. W. J. Yarbrough, in Nashville, Tenn., where he remained until his death. Prior to entering the army he was married to Miss Lydia Sweet, a beautiful Christian woman, who was faithful to him through all the years of their pilgrimage together, caring for him as a child during the long illness that preceded his death. She still survives, making her home with their only son, Mr. Walter S. Yarbrough, of Nashville, Tenn. In his early manhood Brother Yarbrough was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in whose fellowship he lived until the end, serving for many years in various positions of official responsibility. He was an earnest and zealous Christian. It was the custom of his life to allow no opportunity to witness for his Lord to pass by unimproved. The writer was his pastor in three different Churches—an aggregate altogether of ten years—and can therefore bear personal testimony to the constancy of his devotion. During his three years' residence in the Confederate Soldiers' Home he used his utmost endeavor to induce his old comrades to give their hearts to the Master. His end was not only peaceful but triumphant. For months he looked forward with eager anticipation to the time when the Master should speak his welcome: "Well done." God still keeps his promises. "He that trusteth in the Lord, loving-kindness shall compass him about."

W.R.A. YARBROUGH

"The death of W.R.A. Yarbrough occurred near Nashville June 21, 1907. He had been in failing health for the past ten years, incident to infirmity of age and exposure during the war of 1861-65.

"Mr. Yarbrough was born in Charlotte, N.C., October 24, 1828, and was seventy-eight years and eight months old. He located in Montgomery, Ala., when a young man. When the tocsin of war was sounded between the North and the Southern States, he enlisted in the Confederate service in Company K, 22d Alabama Infantry Regiment. He served in the Army of Tennessee, commanded by Gen. A.S. Johnston, Braxton Bragg, and General Joseph E. Johnston, until the close of the war. He was detailed by General Bragg for special secret service, and made several trips to Nashville and other places inside Federal lines and procured medicine and surgical instruments, etc., for the Southern army. He often related interviews he had with Federal officers and soldiers while on the hazardous duty. After peace was declared, Mr. Yarbrough entered business in Montgomery, and was a successful coal merchant for twenty years. His health failing, he sought a change of climate in Texas and later in Nashville.

"He was a consistent Christian gentleman, a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. He had been an inmate of the Confederate Soldiers' Home for the past three years of his own choice. He is survived by his wife and devoted son, Walter S. Yarbrough, of this city. The body was taken to Montgomery, Ala., attended by the son and widow."⁴

I am well and the family are doing as well as heart could wish so far as this world can seem. I have all of Paws family with me except James and Elizabeth. They are in Alabama. Also Hester is all in Alabama. Paw moved to Tennessee last November, died the 6th of December. He lived only two weeks after he landed here. His illness was consumption that caused his death. I think of Paw and Thomas and feel lonesome. Martha I would be the gladdest in the world to see you and Sister Nancy. O the satisfaction it would give me to see you both once more in lifetime cannot express the joy. I had rather see Willey and Hariet tiny children living. THREE BROTHERS ONE OF THEM NEVER MARRIED AND LEFT NO OFFERING HIS NAME WAS WILLIAM YARBRO HE HAD A TRAGIC DEATH WAS RIDING ALONG THE ROAD HE WENT ON ONE SIDE HIS HORSE ON THE OTHER AND WAS KILLED THERE.

THE OTHER BROTHERS HAD FAMILIES AND TIS SAID BY GRANDFATHER ALL THE YARBRO FAMILYS IN THE U. S. SPRANG FROM THEM AND ALL THE NAMES ARE AKIN.

GRANDFATHER EDMOND WENT TO MECKLENBURG COUNTY, NORTH CAROLINA AFTER HE WAS MARRIED AND HAD TWO CHILDREN, AQUILLA AND OUR PAP HENRY.

MY GRANDMOTHER'S NAME WAS SOPHIA GOSSETT. SHE ORIGINATED FROM THE STATE OF MARYLAND, I DON'T REMEMBER OF EVER KNOWING THE DATES OF GRANDFATHERS AND GRANDMOTHER'S BIRTHS.

THEY RAISED THE FOLLOWING AS FAR AS I KNOW -- AQUILLA, HENRY, JAMES, WILLIAM, NANCY, JOSEPH, JOHN H. ALL LIVED TO BE GROWN. THEY ALL MOVED FROM NORTH CAROLINA TO TENNESSEE, PERRY COUNTY FROM 1818 TO ABOUT 1832 AND NEARLY ALL OF THEM SLEEP ON THE HILL OF LOST CREEK ON THE BILL YARBRO PLACE.

TO WIT GRANDFATHER (EDMOND) AND GRANDMOTHER (SOPHIA) --UNCLE JOE AND UNCLE WILLIAM, UNCLE JIM AND UNCLE JOHN WHO MOVED HERE LAST YEAR OF THE WAR 1864 FROM ALABAMA WAS ON HIS DEATH BED WHEN HE ARRIVED AND DIED SOON. I NEVER GOT TO SEE HIM.

PAP WAS BURIED ON HOME PLACE. AUNT NANCY IS BURIED AT OLD MT. ZION PLACE BY SIDE OF HER FIRST HUSBAND SILVANUS FISHER WHO DIED IN 1833. THEY WAS A NOBLE FAMILY OF PEOPLE.

LOUIS. HAD JUST LEFT NEW ORLEANS AND WAS BURIED ON BLACK ISLAND JUST ABOVE GRAND GULF, HE DIED 8TH DECEMBER 1848. PAP WAS BORN ANSON COUNTY , NORTH CAROLINA ON TUESDAY DECEMBER 18, 1790. DIED IN DECATUR COUNTY, TENN. OCTOBER 23, 1866 OF MALARIA FEVER WAS BURIED IN THE OLD APPLE OCHARD NEAR WHERE HE AND MOTHER LIVED ALL OF THEIR MARRIED LIFE. MOTHER DIED MAY 10TH, 1886 AT HOME BURIED BESIDE PAP.

UNCLE JIM YARBRO WAS BORN IN 1792 DIED AT PAPS MAY 2, 1864 BURIED AT MASTER BILL YARBRO'S. HE WAS A DRINKING MAN, HAD NO FAMILY MARRIED MOSE RICHARDSON'S DAUGHTER. SHE DIED EARLY. HE RAISED BOY JOHNSON, HE DIED IN MISSOURI OR ARK, A FEW DAYS AGO UNCLE JIM SAID HIS TROUBLE HE REFUSED A CALL FROM GOD TO PREACH HENCE HIS DRINKING FOLLOWED.

I MUST GIVE A HISTORY OF MY MARRIAGE. I MARRIED MARY ELIZABETH FISHER DAUGHTER OF JACOB F. AND SOPHIS FISHER ON 16TH OCTOBER 1854 ON WHITES CREEK AT CEDAR GROVE. SHE WAS MY 2ND COUSIN, WAS A NOBLE HELPMATE FOR ME HINDERED ME NOT WAS LARGELY THE THE CAUSE OF MY SUCCESS SHE WAS A GOOD HOUSEKEEPER A FINE COOK SAID TO BE THE BEST COFFEE MAKER IN THE WHOLE COUNTY, WAS HIGH TEMPERED IN HER YOUNG DAYS BUT SHE OVERCOME ALL OF THAT AFTER SHE PROFESSED RELIGION WAS A GOOD BENEVOLENT WOMAN AS I EVER KNEW HAVE HEARD HER GIVE AS GREAT EXPLORATION IN CHURCH AS ANY MAN I EVER HEARD. SHE GOT UP ON SEAT AND TALKED A LONG TIME IT WAS REMARKABLE OTHERS SAID. I LOVED HER DEARLY. OUR HONEYMOON LASTED AS LONG AS SHE LIVED. WE RAISED FIVE CHILDREN TO BE GROWN, LOST TWO BY DEATH WHEN YOUNG. SHE DIED 10TH DECEMBER 1882 WAS 43 YEARS 5 DAYS OLD WAS AILING FOR 2 YEARS WITH CONSUMPTION. I MISSED HER GREATLY.

I WRITE THIS TO RUFF AND SUSIE. MY HEALTH IS GOOD. I ENJOY EATING AND SLEEPING AS WELL AS EVER DID IN LIFE. ALTHOUGH AM NEARLY HELPLESS OWING TO KIDNEY TROUBLE. AM STOUTER AND BETTER OFF THAN 20 YEARS AGO. AM WELL SATISFIED WAITING THE CALL FROM THE MASTER. WOULD LIKE TO SEE YOU BOTH AND HAVE A GOOD TIME TOGETHER. I PRAY GOD THAT WE MAY HAVE A PART IN THE RESERRECTION. GIVE MY LOVE TO ALL OF YOUR CHILDREN-- GRANDCHILDREN AND FAMILIES. WAS GREATLY GRIEVED TO HEAR OF THE DEATH OF BERTHA. ONE SO YOUNG AND FULL OF LIFE.

WANT YOU TO WRITE ME ABOUT EVERYTHING CROP'S AND ETC. OUR CROPS ARE POOR NOT NEAR SO GOOD AS LAST YEAR. BEEN DRY SINCE 17TH OF AUGUST. HARDEST YEAR TO MAKE A CROP HAVE EVER EXPERIENCED, WE HAVE A FINE MAST IN WOODS. NO HOGS HARDLY TO USE IT HOGS HAVE DIED OF DISEASE. BUT A FEW LEFT. GIVE THIS TO ELIZA MAE AS IT IS FOR HER. DID NOT KNOW IF SHE WOULD BE OFF.

Many thanks for your letter of March 4 and its enclosures. It sure made for an exciting weekend studying the old letters and matching the facts from yours and mine. Have typed the May 18, '66 letter from Joseph T. Yarbrough except for a bit I can't make out and enclose copy. Joseph T.'s letter and the family history outlined by Joseph Gallatin Yarbrow check out.

Joseph T. letter

"Paw moved to Tennessee last November, died the 6th of December. He lived only two weeks after he landed here."

"I have married since I seen you but I have been unfortunate. My wife only lived eleven months to a day after we married. She died in '62, the 21st of July, married the 21st of August, '61."

Joseph G. letter

"Towit Grandfather and Grandmother Uncle Joe and Uncle William and Uncle Jim and Uncle John who moved here last year of the War 1864 from Alabama was on his death bed when he arrived and died soon I never got to see him."

"Mary Ann(3rd) girl was born on October 29th Fri 1837 and died on the Pabalt farm about 1st of July 1862. She had married South Carolina Joe Yarbrow."

There is no doubt the reference^{to} his marriage by Joseph T. and Joseph G.'s Mary Ann are the same. There appears to be a year's difference regarding the death of John H. but I am sure he is the same man.

I plan to check out the Darlington County land records as soon as I can get a weekday off from work. The local Darlington County Historian told me John H. had bought land on November 10, 1840 for \$1,000. John H. supposedly had rented land for about 6 years prior to the purchase. Believe the next move should be to check out when John H. left this area and where he went if possible. I do not have the Media Research report. Is there more to the address and what is the charge? Would like to get a copy. Will stay in touch.

Chapter 5. WILLIAM TARPLEY YARBOROUGH FAMILY BRANCH.

This branch of the family is the largest today and could be attributable to Willie being the oldest with his first child being born in 1874 and his last in 1908. There is a total of 11 children and 44 grandchildren. This branch of the family has produced two Medical Doctors, the late Dr. Lewis Yarborough and Dr. Kimberly Sansbury (daughter of Jerry F. and a great-great granddaughter of Willie).

Wendy Yarborough Green holds the distinction of being one of the first women members of the South Carolina National Guard, having been a Staff Sergeant in the late 1970's and served in the Hartsville Unit along with your compiler.

This family branch is unique in that four sets of twins are counted beginning with Fred Yarborough, and includes Pamela Jane Yarborough Polhemus's, Earl Yarborough, Jr.'s, and John H. Browning's.

We hope we are not slighting anyone but feel mention of Robin Browning being a graduate of The United States Air Force Academy and that Scott Howell is currently enrolled in the United States Army's West Point Academy should be mentioned. Also the late Dr. Lewis Yarborough was a member of the Citadel's Honor Guard at President Eisenhower's inauguration and Robin Browning was in the Air Force Academy's Honor Guard at President Nixon's inauguration.

There are two ministers; The Reverend James M. Dowling and The Reverend Dr. George D. Fields (George is currently serving as President of Spartanburg Methodist College).

Willie's old homeplace still stands today at the corner of Lawson Grove Road And Sansbury Road in the Philadelphia section of Darlington County. It is just above a small creek named Lake Swamp. There is a room in the house called the 'music room' and this is because Willie acquired the old music room from an early Philadelphia School House that was located across Lake Swamp Creek on the hillside above where Lawson Grove Road and Mayberry Road come together. (The last Philadelphia School House was built south of the John Murray Yarborough place).

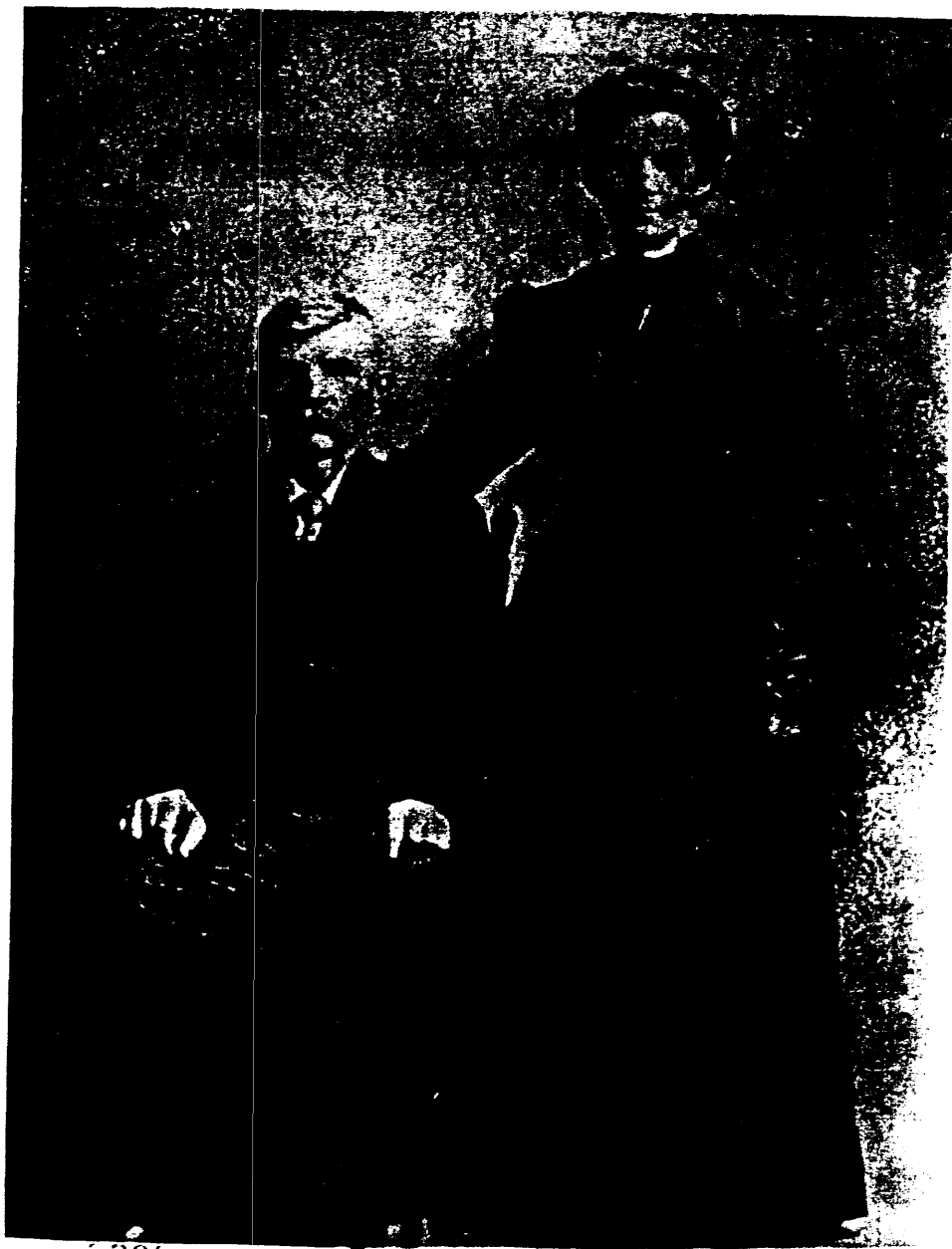
Your compiler remembers going there when a small boy and being impressed with the grape vines and other fruit trees. We are unaware today of the existance of any of the baskets Willie made from split oak but he was skilled in this craft.

The crossroads at the intersection of Lawson Grove Road and Philadelphia Street is named Yarborough's Crossroads and Bernice Yarborough told me that this is named for Willie

Yarborough. I had assumed and I am sure others have also that this crossroads was named for Otis Yarborough (the old Cora and Otis Yarborough homeplace is at the crossroads and was restored by the late Dr. Lewis Yarborough and his wife, Anne).

Willie was a farmer all his life. Son Baron operated a saw mill and also had a small store; Josey was in the saw mill business; Otis farmed, had a cotton gin, a saw mill, and did some automobile mechanical work and his wife Cora had a small store (Otis was described as having the ability to do anything he wanted to); Alton farmed and was a forest ranger for 28 years; and Bernice farmed and for many years was a production supervisor in the Spiral Department at Sonoco Products Co.

Willie, Garon and Martha Yarborough are buried in Newman Swamp Cemetery and Sally Yarborough is buried in Philadelphia Cemetery (Bernice Yarborough told me this was due to there being no more room in the plot at Newman Swamp).

William Baron (Baron) Yarborough (b. 12-25-1879 - was killed when he was hand cranking a Model T Ford and it slipped into gear and ran over him 12-25-1916) married Margaret Gibson (b. 12-11-1879 - d. 8-29-1960).

Josey C. Yarborough (b. 1-30-1883 - d. 1-24-1935) married Sue Gibson (b. 6-16-1884 - d. 3-30-1969) September 10, 1910. Baron and Josey married sisters.

Chapter 6. JOHN MURRAY AND LUCY ANN ODOM
YARBOROUGH FAMILY

John Murray and Lucy Ann Odom Yarborough had 11 children beginning in 1884 and the last was born in 1906. There are 21 grandchildren.

THE DARLINGTON COUNTY TRIBUNE, a local newspaper published in Hartsville during the 1970's, carried in the March 17, 1977 issue an article by Horace Fraser Rudisill titled "The Methodist Conference of 1891". Among the ministers mentioned was a Reverend John Wesley Murray and I quote Mr. Rudisill:

"Reverend John Wesley Murray was known to residents of Darlington County, having served the rural churches of the county prior to the War Between the States (it was during this first tour of duty in Darlington District, and while serving as pastor of Newman Swamp Church, that his namesake, the late John Murray Yarborough was born in 1858). In 1887, Reverend Murray was again assigned to "Lower Darlington Circuit" composed of Philadelphia, Cypress, Newman Swamp, New Hope, Lamar and Zion Churches, and it was on this field that he was serving when the Conference of 1891 began."

The old homeplace is gone but it was on Dovetail Road (still unpaved today) about a half mile west of the junction of Dovetail and Mayberry Roads. The drive up to the house was on the left just after crossing a wooden bridge over a small stream.

Your compiler's understanding is that the land was mainly from Lucy Ann Odom Yarborough's inheritance and Lucy's sister's (Alice Odom Parnell) family still owned land on westward of the Murray Yarborough place until just prior to World War 11.

Your compiler's father told me that Murray had to buy a house and lot in Oates so that, (I believe), John, Cuyler and Kenneth could go to school there. The house is still there and is well maintained (it was sold in 1942 for \$1250).

Murray Yarborough was blind the later years of his life and Rudelle Dowling White is certain both her father, Samuel P. Dowling and her grandfather, John Murray Yarborough's diagnosis for their blindness was glaucoma (Rudelle was concerned about her own eye problems and came up with this information). Elizabeth (Lizzie) Yarborough once told me that Murray had fallen off a ladder when he was about 70 years old and she thought this was to blame.

There has been only one minister in this branch of the family, and that was The Reverend Charles Murray Yarborough. He served in the United Methodist Church and was assigned to Green Street United Methodist Church in Columbia 14 years. About the time he was slated to leave, the church experienced a major fire and the Bishop told Charles Murray that the fire had just burned him in and the rebuilding program contributed to stretching out his time there. Some of the stained glass in the church is dedicated to Charles Murray's Memory.

This branch of the family also has the only Funeral Director and he is John F. Dowling, Jr.

John Murray Yarborough farmed all his life. Loren, Sr. farmed and worked on the tobacco markets during the season and in his later years he worked security for Darlington County. Alger farmed and was a good carpenter but the only big outside work was at Fort Jackson in the buildup of 1940-41 and he also worked on the tobacco markets during the season. John farmed all his life. Cuyler along with his wife, Eugenia, owned and operated a grocery store in Darlington for about 40 years. Kenneth farmed, worked in the tobacco market, measured land, and in later years was on the security team at Carolina Power and Light's Lake Robinson Plant.

John Murray and Lucy Ann Odom Yarborough are buried in Newman Swamp Cemetery.

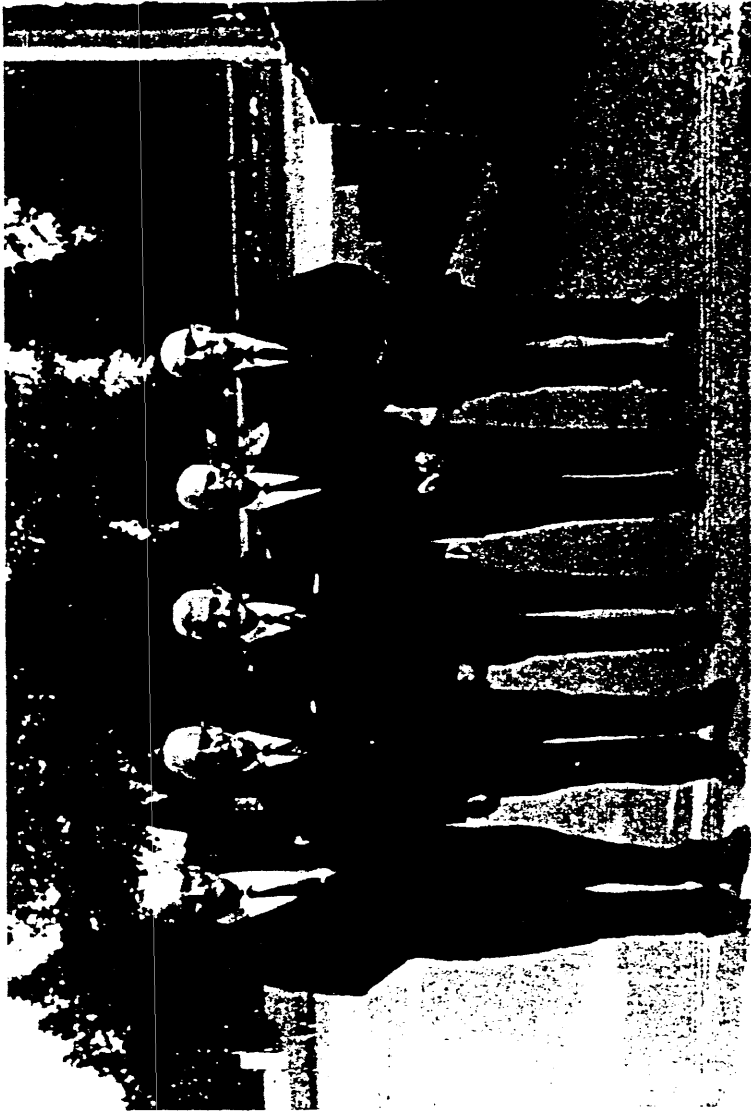

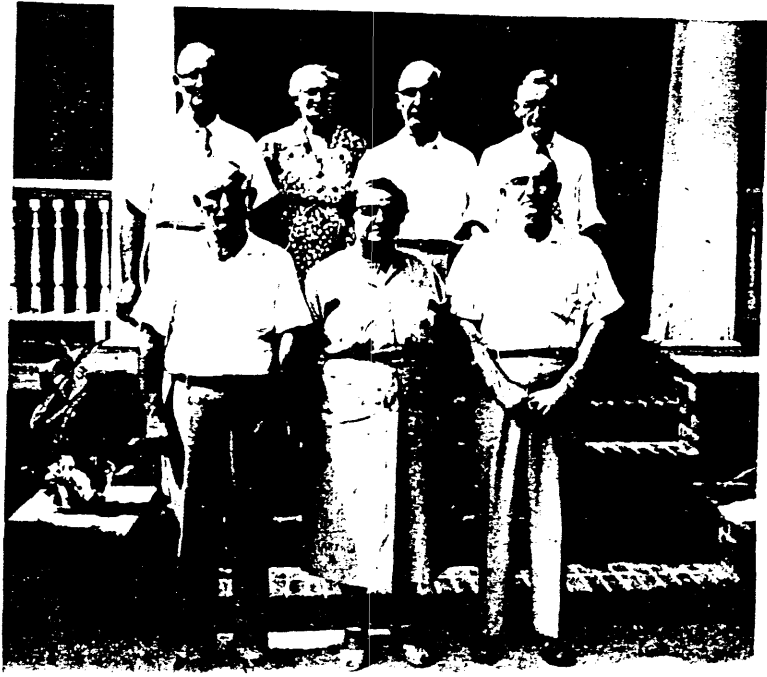

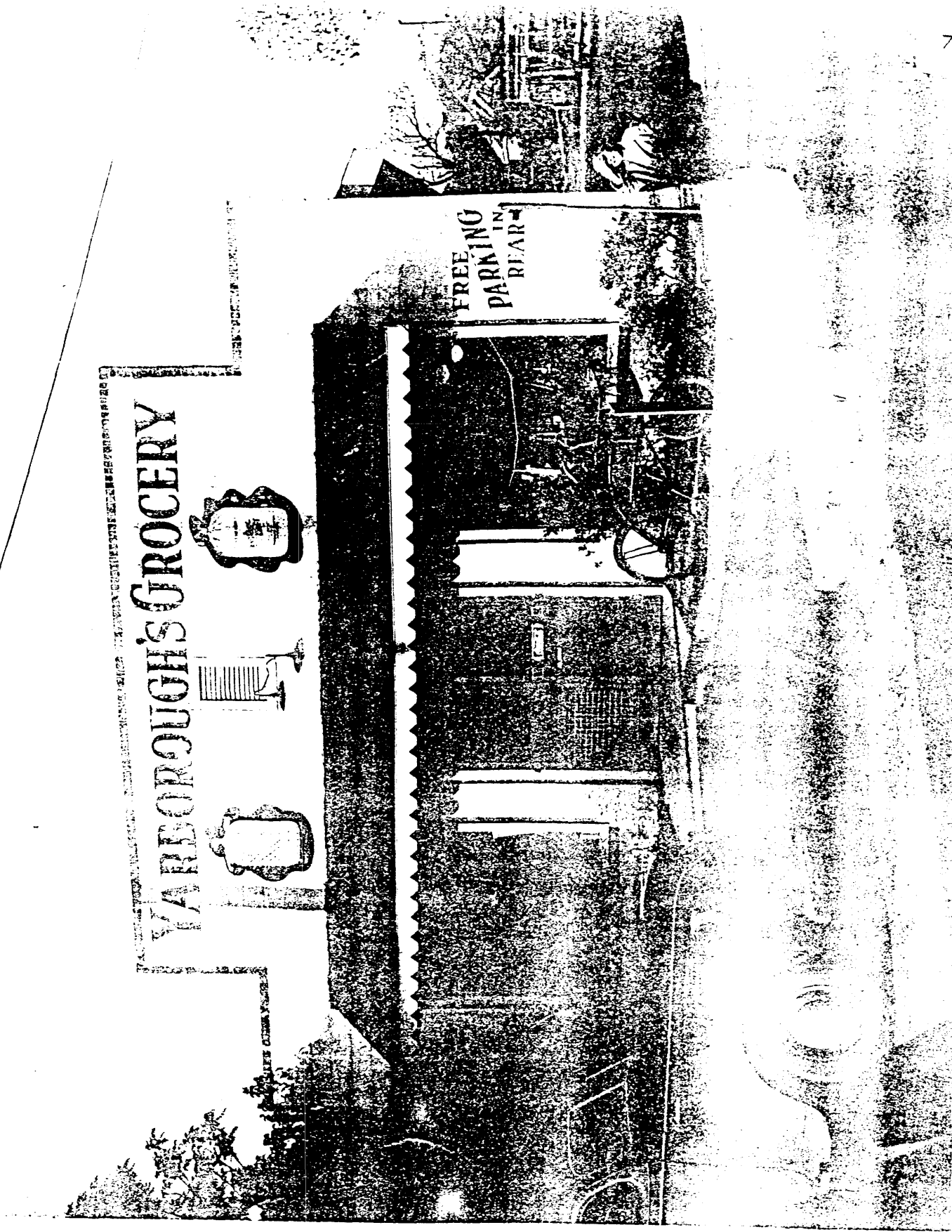

Chapter 7. The Evelyn Yarborough Windham Family Branch.

Evelyn Yarborough and James R. Windham had 2 children and 10 grandchildren. Their old homeplace was west of Andrews Mill Pond on Andrews Mill Street and not very distant from the Windhamtown Cemetery.

Their daughter, Geneva, married Charles B. Windham and they had 6 children. Geneva and Charles B. lived on the northeast corner of McLaughlin Crossroads where Andrews Mill Street crosses Oates Highway. This old homeplace burned back in the 1960's and there is nothing there today but cultivated fields. In the time when life was much slower and visits were frequent, the older people took great delight in having gatherings of their kin and friends and one of your compiler's fond memories was a dinner in the yard of the Geneva and Charles B. Windham place about 1939 or 1940. There were tables with gleaming white cloths on both sides of the yard and the food was magnificent. There must have been over 100 people there including T. C. Kistler's family (T. C. has mentioned to me on several occasions his memory of this dinner). T. C. Kistler's father founded the Kistler Funeral Home in Darlington.

The other daughter of Evelyn Yarborough and James R. Windham was Bessie and she married a Lide Windham and they had 4 children but none of their descendants live in this area today and contact with them cannot be made.

Evelyn's great-great-great granddaughter (Dr. Martha Parker) and granddaughter of Claudia Windham Parker is a medical doctor.

The old Jeffords home stands today in the historic district of West Broad Street in Darlington and still after more than 60 years is numbered 250 West Broad Street. It is now owned by Kat and Oby Lyles. At one time about 1946 to sometime after the 1950 time period it was the home of Gerry Gardner Dowling Kirby's family (Gerry's first husband was Frank Dowling).

Your compiler's family had an upstairs apartment in this home about 1933 to 1935 and The Reverend Charles Murray Yarborough was born there.

The strongest memory your compiler has of this house while we lived there, is being bitten on the face by a rabid dog while playing on the front sidewalk when I was about three years old.

Jim Jeffords was skilled in making flues for use in the old wood fired tobacco barns but died a premature death from diabetic complications. His diabetes was before insulin and Mary Jeffords told me that Alice Yarborough Jeffords had to cook Jim's food separate because of his diabetic diet.

Alice Yarborough and Jim Jeffords are buried in Grove Hill Cemetery in Darlington.

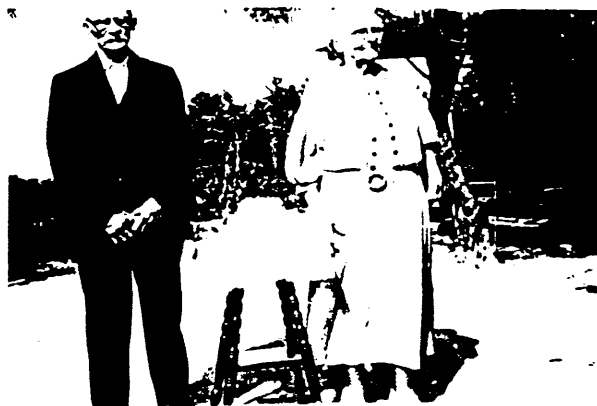

True, the three daughters of William and Mary Reynolds who are in our line married Windhams (don't know if any of these Windhams were related) and many other Windhams show up also, but your compiler has not found enough Windham information to put together other than what we comment on in Chapter 11.

CHAPTER 11 - THE WINDHAM CONNECTIONS

When making outline plans for this book your compiler was aware of many ties to a number of Windham families and it seemed prudent to plan for this chapter. The Windham name has been in the area quite a long time as evidenced by Newman Swamp Methodist Church originally having been named Windham Meeting House (as early as 1822).

Usually someone, somewhere has compiled a record of a family and is very willing to share their information but inquiries to date have not produced anyone from the Windhams. Therefore, this will be a summary of the various ties of the Windhams and Yarboroughs.

Just as this is being completed to meet our date with the printer, Sidney "Sam" Windham of Lamar called me about his Windham research. "Sam" says all Windhams in this area are descended from two branches of the family. The tracing of the Windhams will remain an open project for future revisions.

The Reynolds Ancestry connections in Chapter 10 begins our known Yarborough/Windham kinships. Three of the four children of William and Mary Reynolds who are our ancestors married Windhams but we have no information on these Windhams being related.

The first marriage of a Yarborough and Windham was of Thomas L. Yarborough's widow (Martha Harrell Yarborough) to a John W. Windham about 1869 or 1870.

Next was the marriage of William T. Yarborough to Garon Windham around 1874.

Although we have no dates, the next marriage was that of Evelyn Yarborough to James R. Windham. Their daughters both married Windhams; Geneva to Charles B. Windham and Bessie to Lide Windham.

Nettie Windham married Abram J. (Jack) Windham. Nettie was the daughter of John W. and Martha Harrell Yarborough Windham and was the half sister of William T., John Murray, Evelyn Yarborough Windham, Thomas Albert (Buddy), and Mary Alice Yarborough Jeffords.

Vannie and Esther Yarborough, daughters of Thomas Albert (Buddy), married Grover C. Windham and Theron Earl Windham. Nannie Rogers, daughter of Felder A. and Frankie Yarborough (daughter of Thomas Albert 'Buddy' Yarborough) Rogers married Fred Windham.

Jane Windham on page 17 is only child listed from John W. Windham's first marriage.

Mary Frances Dowling married Cuyler L. Windham. Connie Rogers (daughter of Frankie Yarborough and Felder Rogers) is listed as marrying a Windham. Ronald Cleve Parnell (son of Mildred Windham and Robert Wilson Parnell) married Ruth Windham.

There may be others we have not picked up on.

Chapter 12 - The Dowling Connection

Robert Dowling's arrival just prior to the Revolution from Virginia into what is now the Darlington County area established the Dowling family here. This was about 60 years prior to John H. Yarbrough locating near Newman Swamp.

The Darlington County Dowling line comes through Robert, his son John, and on through grandson Allen (b.2-10-1795 - d. 4-8-1873), and it continued through great grandson Francis Asbury Dowling, Sr. (b. 5-12-1823 - d. 9-26-1906). Allen was the only son of John Dowling who did not emigrate from South Carolina (most went to Alabama). For more information, suggest the Darlington County Historical Commission office be consulted and "A Dowling Family Of The South" (copywrited 1959 by R. A. Dowling of Dothan, Alabama) be reviewed. The Old Darlington District Genealogical Chapter publishes information quarterly and in the Spring 1994 issue they published a list of slave owners. In a 14 September 1850 survey Allen Dowling owned four slaves.

Today, the Philadelphia Southern Methodist Church is the cohesive force in the Philadelphia community. Philadelphia Church may have been known as Jeffries Creek Meeting House early on but was known as Dowling Meeting House about 1839 when it became Philadelphia. The Dowling Family has been strong supporters and loyal to the church from its beginning. It is said Robert Dowling gave the land where the first church stood.

Your compiler has made the Dowling connection a separate chapter because the Dowlings cross with the Yarboroughs five times.

Muldrow, Samuel, John C., and F. A., Jr. ("Dorsey") were brothers and sons of F. A. Dowling, Sr. Muldrow Dowling was the last postmaster for the Philadelphia Post Office and Margaret Dowling Clayton told me that the Post Office stood very near the Sam and Mary Dowling home site. I recall going with Uncle Alger Yarborough over to see Uncle Sam and Aunt Mary and they showed me a small building that was used for a commissary where they furnished items such as tobacco products, sugar, and various sundry items to the people who lived and farmed the Dowling land. This building fits the description of the Philadelphia Post Office and is said to no longer exist.

James Muldrow Dowling, Sr. (b. 9-29-1873 - d. 12-31-1951) married Agnes Yarborough (b. 1-20-1885 - d. 7-24-1953).

: Samuel Pinckney Dowling (b. 8-16-1878 - d. 9-17-1960) married Mary Alice Yarborough

(b. 10-8-1888 - d. 1-28-1964). At the end of this chapter is a copy of the letter Samuel wrote John Murray Yarborough asking for permission to marry Mary.

Marie Dowling Norwood (b. 4-22-1896 - d. 12-3-1976) was the daughter of John C. and entered into a second marriage with Philip Alger Yarborough (b. 12-21-1898 - d. 10-18-1973). Her first husband (Claude Norwood) was killed in World War I.

F. A. "Dorsey" Dowling, Jr. was the father of Sudie and Lattie Mae.

Sudie Dowling (b. 5-7-1907 - d. 5-4-1991) married John Worth Yarborough (b. 2-2-1901 - d. 4-6-1972).

Lattie Mae Dowling (b. 6-2-1905) married Alton Ray Yarborough (b. 9-20-1905 - d. 7-4-1981).

The children of:

and Samuel and Mary

are first cousins through their Dowling connection as well as second cousins through their Agnes and Mary Yarborough Dowling connection. Sudie and Lattie Mae are also their first cousins.

Sudette Yarborough Goodson (daughter of John W. and Sudie Dowling Yarborough) is a first cousin of Samuel and Mary Yarborough Dowling's children through the Yarboroughs and a first cousin once removed through the Dowlings. Sudette is also a first cousin of Doris Yarborough Howell (daughter of Alton and Lattie Mae Dowling Yarborough) through the Dowling connection and a second cousin through the Yarborough connection. She is a double second cousin of Muldrow and Agnes Yarborough Dowling's children.

Doris Yarborough Howell through the Yarborough connection is a first cousin of the children of Muldrow and Agnes Yarborough Dowling as well as a second cousin through the Dowling connection.

Dear Cousin Nell,

Yes, you, Charlie Yarbro, and I are kin as we are descended from Edmund and Sophia Gossett (spelled Goswick in some places) Yarbrough--- you and I through their John H. (the Methodist preacher) and Charlie through John H.'s brother Henry. (See enclosed chart I prepared). Also enclosed is copy of Edmund and Sophia's marriage bond I obtained from the North Carolina archives.

First this letter may ramble, but I will try and tell you all I know and how I was able to confirm what I will tell you.

In the late 1950's a small group of Thomas Yarborough's descendents (he had for some reason added an extra O) started having a reunion annually and for many years it was just a time to enjoy good food and family fellowship. I did not attend much during the 1960's but became more closely involved when we moved back from Richmond, VA in 1973 (we had moved away from here in 1969). The Reunion began to realize that many of our older people were passing on and since I had some information on which to begin, they asked me to see what I could develop. A cousin who had my Great Grandmother Merthe Harrell Yarborough's Bible found in it a letter from Joseph T. Yarbrough of Yarbrough's Landing, Decatur County, TN, dated May, 1866 which he had written to my Great Grandmother and his sister, Nancy. A copy of the letter and a copy of our interpretation is enclosed.

I had learned earlier that the Charlotte, NC library had an excellent collection of history items as well as census records. My wife and I spent a Saturday up there and did we get lucky. When I asked the Librarian for guidance in finding data, she picked up immediately on my name and was gracious enough to put me in touch with Mr. Bob Yarbrough of Charlotte who had done considerable research on the Yarbrough history. Bob and I established that we were no traceable kin but he put me in touch with several people who had written him including Charlie Yarbro. I sent a copy of the Joseph T. letter to Charlie and he sent me his Joseph Gallatin letter (copy enclosed). We matched up enough facts to prove our relationship. Also, Charlie has tried for years but cannot get any further back than Edmund (so have many others). However, we are convinced we are descended from Richard Yarbrough who came to the Petersburg, VA area about 1642 from England.

In my Great Grandmother's Bible was also an obituary of W. R. A. Yarbrough (the same as your "Our Dead" by E. B. Chappell). Later in my Great Uncle Willie T.'s Bible I found a letter from W. R. A. Yarbrough (copy enclosed) written around 1901. Later in the Darlington County Historical

Commission files I found a copy of an item written to Southern Christian Advocate by W. R. A. Yarbrough (copy enclosed). I report this to give you my theory about why my branch of the family is here in Darlington County and the rest so far away. The Wesley Chapel United Methodist Church is one of the oldest in the area and they held camp meetings there beginning about 1800 and continuing for nearly 50 years. John H. was living in Mecklenburg County, NC (W. R. A. and Joseph T. were born there) and apparently made trips to these camp meetings. John H. evidently liked the people and they him and he moved into Darlington County about 1832 or 1833 (just before my Great Grandfather Thomas was born). John H. was active in the Methodist Church (verified by records in the County Historical Commission office) and remained here until 1859. His first wife (mother of W. R. A., Joseph T., Thomas, Hester, and Nancy) died about 1837 and his second wife was Martha Mancill. John H. and Martha's first child was James and the names on my chart were taken from the 1850 census. From two letters I obtained copies of from the late Charles D. Yarborough (publisher of Yarborough Family Magazine) John H. stated he had 14 children. Copies of these letters are enclosed. I think there was a Frank but have not verified this. John H. left here in 1859 with all his children except Nancy who by then was married to a Thomas Privette and my Great Grandfather Thomas who was married and had at that time two children. W. R. A. had left here in 1854.

I do not know where John H. went in 1859 but have guessed it might have been Alabama or Tennessee but have not enough research to determine any facts. Since Joseph T. stated in 1866 it had been 7 years since he left Darlington County it could be John H. went to Tennessee and moved to Alabama. I know nothing about Joseph T. except in the 1880 census he was in Decatur County, was married and had 3 children. I went to Decaturville in April, 1983 to visit when they had their Spring Yarbrough Family Cemetery clean up and found no trace of Joseph T. or any of his descendents so he must have moved on.

My late Uncle Kenneth Yarborough told me that the family had written letters back and forth to Mary Fisher in Mineola, TX and thought that another sister of Thomas's had married a Walker and had lived in that area also.

One or two things about Edmund. Apparently they left Mecklenburg County (Charlotte area) NC about 1820 and settled in Decatur County, TN. The history of Tennessee in the World Book Encyclopedia states that Western Tennessee was purchased from the Indians in 1819 and apparently the offer of free land is part of what enticed Edmund and family to Tennessee. John H. must have returned or stayed in Mecklenburg County to marry a childhood sweetheart. I did note that W. R. A. said that W. W. King was his Grandfather but research on W. W. King has turned up nothing.

One or two more things. Thomas died in the Yankee prison at Elmira, NY. A copy of a picture of Thomas and Martha taken about November, 1863 is enclosed.

On the trip to Decaturville, we walked over the old cemetery at Lost Creek but there are no grave markings for Edmund, Sophia, or John H. Oh yes, about Timmons ville. For years the mail came to my Father's old home place to Route 2, Timmons ville, SC but the family lived in Darlington County (about 10 miles from Timmons ville).

I did not mean to get this wound up but wanted to tell you all I could and I would like to hear more about the Texas connection.

Excerpts From A January 14, 1990 Letter From A Sara
Grace To Nell Palmer Martin.

"...sending a picture of Benjamin Franklin Yarbrough and family. There were four children born to the union of Benjamin Franklin Yarbrough and Ann Minerva Yarbrough. They were Robert Franklin Yarbrough, Elmer Yarbrough (had 1 son - stillborn), Ernest Yarbrough (wife Bess) (1 son stillborn), 5 girls Rebecca Ann, Phylis Bess, Emily, and Edna Ruth) Laura Ella (husband Virgil Stone {1 son - John}).

All of the children are deceased and one of Ernest's girls and Robert's two sons are deceased.

I can't tell you a great deal about Granddaddy Benjamin Franklin, but I will tell you all I know.

He was a tall slender man with a beautiful head of white hair. He always wore a black suit with a white shirt and black string tie. He was a drummer of sorts. He sold fruit trees. I can remember he had a black leather book with beautiful pictures of different fruit and nut trees and pictures of their fruit. It was so fun to get to look at his black book. He drove a buggy and had a pretty horse. He was in and out at our house. This sounds like childish prattle and it is, really because it's as I remember him when I was a child. He liked his liquor and Mother didn't allow it so he would stay for awhile, without, and then go where he could get it for awhile and then he'd come back. In 1933 we moved to Longview and Aunt Laura Ella Yarbrough Stone and her husband Virgil and son John moved into our house in Lindale. Granddaddy moved in with her. She took care of him until he died in 1935. He died from tuberculosis - The house burned not long after that and Aunt Laura Ella and Uncle Virgil moved back to the farm. Daddy had re-worked her old house for her. She lived there until she died in the late 40's. She died of cancer.

I have found many surprizes in the family history. I did not realize that my grandmother was a Yarbrough, a Boudoin and then a Yarbrough again..(SEE YOUR COMPILER'S NOTE ADDED AT END). I knew about the Boudoin because of the halves and first cousins I can't remember.. I had heard of Zenethia all my life but did know she was Uncle Will's daughter by his first wife. Didn't really know about the first wife until now - really exciting reading -

I don't know where in Tennessee B. Franklin was born. If Daddy had any records they burned with the house in the late 1930's. Seems as though I can remember Mother saying something about Frankie Bell being named for Granddaddy.

Wish we had known to ask all these questions earlier. I have rattled long enough-...."

COMPILER'S NOTE - Benjamin Franklin married the granddaughter of William Yarbrough who was an older brother of B. Franklin's father, John H. Yarbrough. The wedding was January 8, 1884.

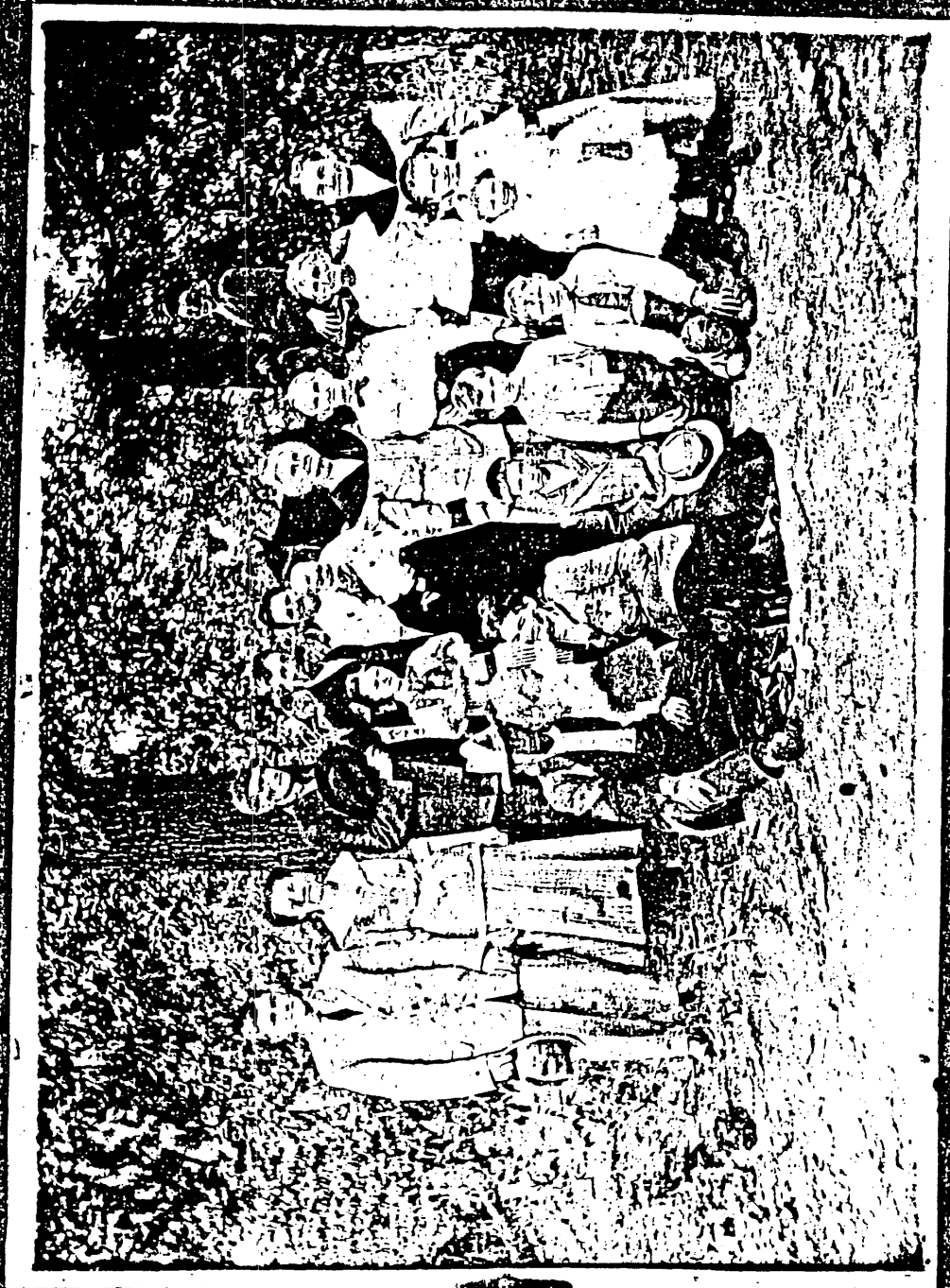

Chapter 14 - The Tennessee Connection

We descendants of Thomas L. Yarborough have quite a number of cousins in Western Tennessee but this chapter is not an attempt to identify them. However, mention should be made of Frances Ann and Charles Henry Yarbrow of Tiptonville and Peggy and Billy Guy Yarbrow of Decaturville, who invited me to their annual cemetery clean up and showed me around the Decaturville area. The material in this chapter is largely due to their hospitality.

This chapter to some extent will expand on the information reported earlier in chapter 3.

Our relationship with Decaturville and Decatur County, Tennessee are tied to the graves of Edmund and Sophia Gossett Yarbrough (Thomas L. Yarborough's grandparents) and John H. Yarbrough (Thomas L. Yarborough's father) who are reported to 'sleep' on the hill at Lost Creek in a private family cemetery on the Master Bill Yarbrow place.

On the trip to Decaturville in April, 1983 noted that the town is small, only about 1000 population and the county 11,000 population. There did not appear to have been much growth since World War II. The countryside was breaking out in the rich green of springtime and with its rolling hills and many creeks presented quite a lovely sight.

The major feature of the Decatur County area is the Tennessee River which forms its eastern border. The world Book Encyclopedia reports that the Tennessee River begins at Knoxville (formed where the Holston and French Broad Rivers meet) and is the largest tributary of the Ohio River. The Tennessee River is unique in that it flows southwest through Tennessee into Alabama and then turns northward back into Tennessee and then on north to Paducah, Kentucky to empty into the Ohio River.

To understand the relocation of the Edmund Yarbrough family (except John H.) to Tennessee we must look at the history of the region. Tennessee became a state in 1796 but the western half was essentially in Indian hands. The Chickasaw Indians owned nearly all of Western Tennessee until 1818 when they ceded their land to the Federal Government. The Cherokee Indians still held a large area of middle Tennessee and were not forced out until 1838. Our Yarbrough kin went into what must have been an uncertain situation but we have not found any "Indian" stories recorded in any family history.

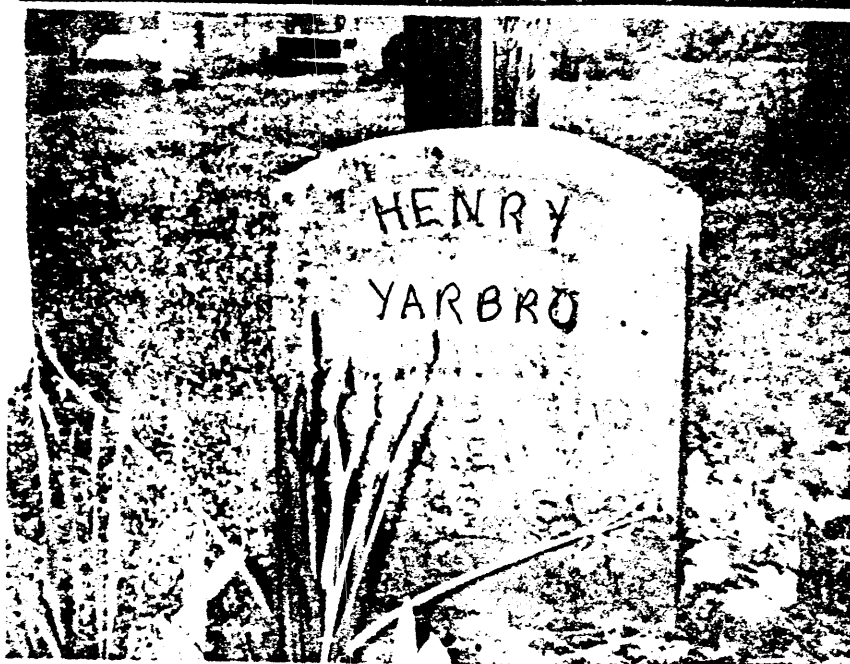
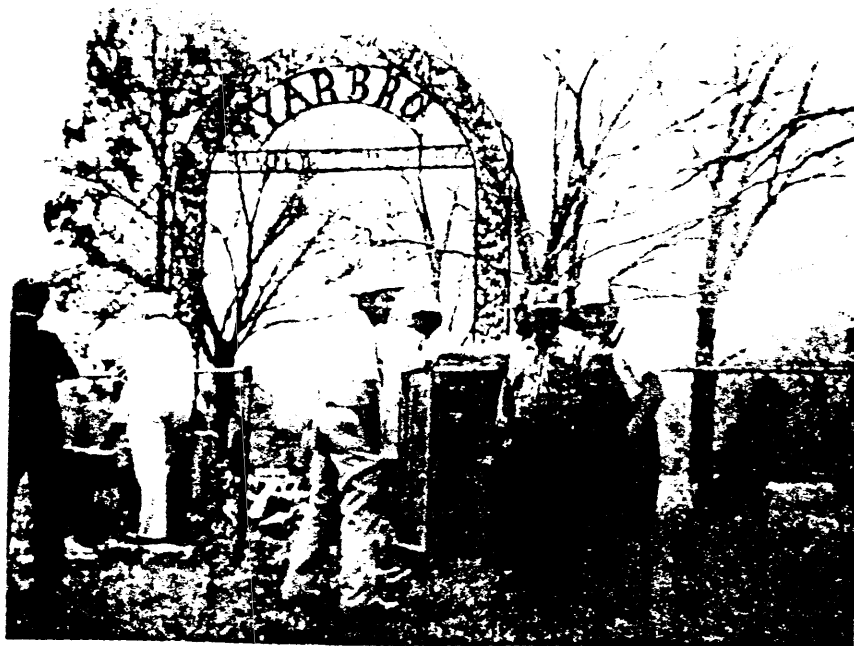
It is assumed that the River was their highway for many, many years as the term 'landed' here is used in the Joseph T. Yarbrough letter of 1866. In 1983 Ross Yarbrow (now deceased) told me that as a small boy in the early

1900's he remembered the steam boats blowing their whistles to announce their arrival at the landing. Ross was an older brother of Charles Henry Yarbro of Tiptonville, Tennessee.

Also on the 1983 visit was told that the Tennessee Yarbro's had heavily intermarried (usually third and fourth cousins) and part of this was to hold the land.

The Yarbro Family Cemetary is on a hill with a pond at the bottom of the hill to the rear with the front looking across a rolling meadow to a creek. It is a peaceful and beautiful place. The oldest Yarbro buried there is Henry (1790 - 1866) who was the second son of Edmund and Sophia Yarbrough and older brother of John H. Yarbrough.

On the following pages are pictures taken at the 1983 annual cemetary day, map of Decatur County, and a map of a portion of the Tennessee River showing Yarbro's landing.

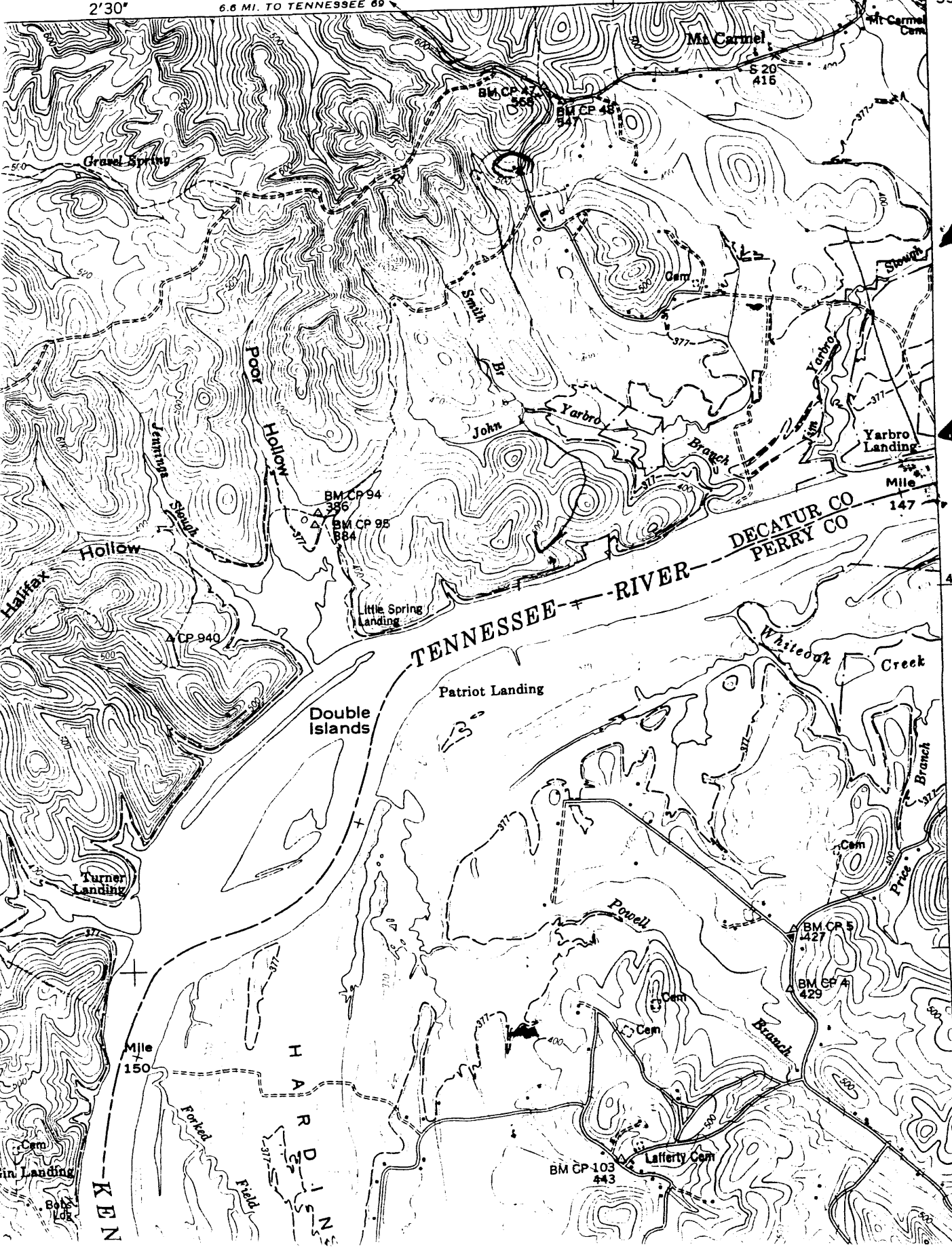

Chapter 15 - Early Yarbrough History
With The Ties To England

Most Yarbrough Family reseachers have generally agreed that only two Yarbroughs came from England; Richard Yarbrough (1615 - 1702), called The Immigrant, into the Petersburg, Virginia area circa 1642 and Ambrose (1710 - 1788) who came into Virginia about 1732 and joined his cousins, the descendants of Richard. Ambrose migrated to Union County, South Carolina about 1766 (it is believed he followed two of his sons who had migrated there earlier).

Ambrose is not an ancestor of Thomas L. Yarborough but it is believed to be very possible that Richard Yarbrough (The Immigrant) was Thomas's ancestor but unfortunately no one has ever found any proof. We believe Edmund Yarbrough (Thomas's grandfather) was born circa 1760 and this leaves us a 100 year gap between the approximate birth of Richard's children and the birth of Edmund. Robert P. Yarbrough (1911 - 1987) of Charlotte, North Carolina was the first to suggest to me that Richard was probably our ancestor.

The names of Richard Yarbrough's children have been listed by researchers as follows: William Williams, Edmund, John, Henry, Richard III, James Charles, Thomas, and three girls that are not named.

Note how many of these names show up in our branch of the family and this is strong evidence pointing to Richard Yarbrough (The Immigrant) as our ancestor.

We quote from the book by Robert P. Yarbrough titled "YARBROUGH, A Branch through Ambrose the Emigrant":

"The Yarbrough family is regarded as one of the oldest families in England, the name being derived from the parish of Yarburgh in Lincolnshire, and they have held lands continuously in the direct line from Saxon times until the present day. Eustachius de Yarburgh was Lord of Yarburgh at the time of the Norman conquest, and from him descended the family.

The history of the Yarbrough (various spellings) family began in England during the Viking Age, and the Vikings invasions of England. They were years of bloodshed, of discovery, of colonization; years of epic heroism, epic poetry, and epic tragedy; years when Danes, Swedes, and Norwegians surged out of their frozen vastness at the top of Europe. Born merchants as well as warriors, they traded as often as they raided; and with increasing frequency as the age waned, they settled where they conquered.

: The patriach (Eustachius) of the Yarbrough family, along with his fellow Danes, settled in the area

now known as Lincolnshire and Yorkshire. Fabled Sherwood Forest lies along the border between the two shires. So many Danes settled in this conquered land that the area became known as the Danelaw.

In the beginning the name was Yarberg, then Yarburch. Other terminations are the 'burgh' endings from Old Norse 'berg', often spelled 'brough', 'borough' usually means a fortified place, as in 'Yarborough'.

The spelling "Yarburch" continued unchanged in England for almost five hundred years. The first appearance of the spelling "Yarbrough" on the family chart (prepared by F. S. Andrus of the College of Arms) was the entry concerning Sir Thomas Yarbrough, Snaith Hall, Yorkshire, Knight. Sir Thomas was born in the late 1500's. Two of Sir Thomas's sons adopted the spelling "Yarbrough". The chart reveals that the majority of the English family have held fast to the spelling "Yarburch". Here in America we Yarbroughs tend to believe that those who spell their name Yarburch, Yarborough, Yarber, Yarboro, etc. are of a different vine - not true. Until the late 1800's people in America spelled surnames every way imaginable. It is not unusual to find a name spelled two or more ways within the same document, or discover that a man spelled his name different on different occasions."

The Media Research Bureau in Washington, DC compiled a brief rundown on the Yarbrough/Yarborough Family in 1939 but the only thing to add to Robert P. Yarbrough's material is the following:

"Generally serious-minded, quiet, and intelligent, the Yarbroughs and Yarboroughs of America have been prominent in Professional pursuits. Many have shown themselves capable in educational, medical, and ministerial endeavors, while others have succeeded as lawyers."

REFERENCING OUR YARBOROUGH BRANCH TO THE ABOVE, WE COUNT THREE MINISTERS, AT LEAST FIVE MEDICAL DOCTORS, A NUMBER OF NURSES, MANY TEACHERS, BUT HAVE NOT IDENTIFIED ANY LAWYERS.

Searching for Indexed Terms¹

First, find the name or phrase (search term) in the index. Then, from the menu bar, select “Edit”, and then “Find” or press CTRL+F. A search field will appear in the upper right corner of the page. Enter the search term into this field and press ENTER. If the search term is not found, nothing will happen; otherwise, the search term will be displayed on the first page in which it occurs. Repeated pressing of the ENTER key will high-light other occurrences within the file. Use the left and right arrow buttons to the right of the search field to look ahead or to look backwards for other occurrences of the term in the document

A directory (folder) or even an entire hard drive may also be searched². First, high-light the selected folder or drive and then press SHIFT+CTRL+F to obtain a listing of all the files in which the search term appears. Next, select and open an individual file to find the first occurrence of the search term(s) in the file, as described in the preceding paragraph.
