These records are the legacy of our Yarbrough family researchers, to whom much is owed. The known family researchers include Jean Baker, Ann Y. Broadbent, Mary Y. Daniel, Frances (Rea) Donohue, Betty Humrighouse, Pauline Gray, Evelyn Goble, Nelle Morris Jenkins, Ophelia Kessler, Frances Lockwood, Karen Mazock Renee Smelley, Dorothy Svec, Jeanette Wilson, Cleveland "Cy" Yarbrough, Edna Yarbrough, George A. Yarbrough, and Robert Price Yarbrough.

No claims of accuracy or authentication of the material herein are made or may be assumed. Many of these records have been superseded by subsequent research. Hence, there are records which are erroneous and unreliable; it would have been a Herculean task to attempt to correct all of them. Fortunately, there are only a few critical genealogical facts that are involved, and which are correctly stated here:


- Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough was never married to Frances Proctor;
- Ambrose Yarbrough did not immigrant from Yorkshire; he is now believed to be a descendant of Richard the Immigrant;
- There are so far only two proven sons of Old Richard John and Richard II;
- There is so far no evidence proving Joshua Yarborough I to be a descendant of Old Richard.
- The "Old Country" referred to in old documents and letters is the Colony of Virginia, not England or the Old World.
- There were not seven brothers who immigrated from "the old country"; in fact, it now appears there were three brothers and four sons of the brothers. Which were the fathers and which were the sons are so far unknown.

In spite of these inaccuracies, these records comprise much of our history and some of our accomplishments. There are pages whose print quality is so poor that word recognition was not possible. In spite of that, at least partial capability for searching these volumes is provided, as well as an index to each volume. Nonetheless, the viewer is cautioned to perform his/her own due diligence in connection with any use of this material.

The various spellings of the Yarbrough surname have never been applied consistently, even within a given family. To the extent possible, the names in the index reflect the names used on the source pages; where it wasn't clear as to which might be the proper spelling, the spelling used is "Yarbrough".

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#### REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS OF HALL COUNTY, GEORGIA

It is practically established through family records, courthouse records and tradition that many veterans of the American Revolution settled in Hall County, Georgia, after the war. It is believed that many of these veterans died in Hall County and are buried here in unmarked graves. A few graves of these "freedom fighters" have been marked by the Daughters of the American Revolution; however, the majority of the graves are unlocated and unmarked.

One such veteran's grave may now be located. Some family records on the Yarboroughs, compiled years ago, state that JOHN YARBOROUGH, a veteran of the Revolutionary War, moved with his family to Hall County, Georgia, prior to 1820. (Hall County was created in 1818) The records also stated that John was buried in the Hopewell Baptist Church Cemetery which is located near Candler.

When transcribing Hall County tombstone inscription a few years ago I found a crude headstone marker with only the name of John Yarborough transcribed thereon - no dates and other information. This marker was located in the Hopewell Methodist Church Cemetery, just off hgwy #60 (Dahlonega hgwy) near Murrayville, Hall County. This is believed to be the grave of the RWB John Yarborough. It is known that this family lived in the vicinity of Murrayville.

John Yarborough, according to family records, died in December, 1926. He was married to Elizabeth Edwards, probably in South Carolina. Elizabeth was the daughter of William and Milly Smith Edwards. She was born January 4, 1786, South Carolina, and died Jan. 27, 1873 in Marietta, Ga. After John's death Elizabeth evidently moved away with some of her children.

Some records were found in the Georgia States Archives on the family of Elizabeth Edwards Yarborough:

William Edwards, father of Elizabeth, was born June 22, 1760. He was the son of Edward Edwards and was married to Mildred "Milly" Smith, daughter of William Smith. Mildred Smith was born Oct. 13, 1764, Virginia, and died June 6, 1839, Spartanburg, South Carolina. The Smith family moved from Virginia to South Carolina when "Milly" was quite small.

#### CHILDREN OF WILLIAM and "MILLY" SMITH EDWARDS:

- Elizabeth Edwards, born Aug. 4, 1786, Spartanburg, S.C., died Jan. 27, 1873, Marietta, Ga. She married John Yarborough.
- 2. Nancy Edwards, born Jan. 9, 1788, married Miles Rainwater in S. C.
- 3. Enoch Edwards, born Nov. 22, 179\_\_
- 4. William Edwards, born Feb. 12, 1793, died June 19, 1891.
- 5. Isaac Edwards, born Jan. 5, 1798, died Oct. 7, 1830.
- 6. Newman Edwards, born Jan. 5, 1801, died Aug. 23, 1863, married Ruth Vice.
- 7. Georgia Edwards, born Feb. 13, 1804.

John and Elizabeth Edwards Yarborough were parents of eight children. Some the children married and reared their families in Hall County. moved elsewhere in Georgia and one son went to California.

#### CHILDREN of JOHN and ELIZABETH EDWARDS YARBOROUGH:

1. Ann Yarborough, born Mar. 30, 1806, S.C., and died April 16, 1875, Hall County, Ga. Ann was married in Hall County on Aug. 10, 1824. Jessie Jay either died or the couple were divorced. Ann Jay was married again in Hall County on Mar. 1, 1828 to Burrwell (Burwell) G. Rives. He was born June 20, 1807, and died 1888. Ann and The Rev. Burwell G. Rives are both buried in the Yellow Creek Baptist Church Cemetery near Murrayville, Ga.

Burwell G. Rives was a brother to the famous Baptist preacher, "Uncle" Jackie Rives of Hall County. Both men are named as sons and executors of the will of Thomas Rieves, Sr., dated May 13, 1838. and recorded in Lumpkin County, Ga. Thomas also named a granddaughter, Angeline Edwards, daughter of Elijah and Susannah Edwards.

#### Children of The Rev. Burwell G. and Ann Yarborough Rives:

- John Francis Marion Rives. He was married to Elizabeth Castleberry. He joined the gold rush in 1849 to California and then returned to enlist in the Confederate Army. He died Feb. 7, 1887. Children of J.F.M. and Elizabeth Rives were: Thursie C., Susie, Amanda, Reuben P., Julia, Janie, and Thomas.
- Reuben P. Rives was married to Susan E. \_\_\_. He also fought with the Confederate forces. His children were: Bartow, Francis, Asena, and Elizabeth.
- Thomas Rives was known as "Shot-Mouth" due to a wound received in the War between the States. He was married first to Carrie Boone. Their children were: Burwell, Annie, Robert, John, Reuben, Elizabeth, and Edward Lee. One son, Webster, was born of the second marriage to Isabella McManus.
- Nancy Yarborough, born Sept., 1808, S.C., and died Jan. 7, 1888, Marietta, Ga. She was married to William Owens. Nancy's headstone in the Citizens Cemetery, Marietta, is inscribed: "Nancy Yarbrough, wife of William Owen, 1808-1876." Buried in the same plot with Nancy are probably her son and daughter-in-law:

"George S. Owen, born Jan. 28, 1849, died May 5, 1925; Sallie R. Owen, wife of George S. Owen, died June 22, 1899."

A William Owen who could be Nancy's husband is buried in the New Hope Methodist Cemetery, Forsyth County, Ga. He died May 17, 1890 at the age of 78 years.

- Sarah Yarborough, born S.C., was married in Hall County on Oct. 25, 1832, to Jordan Griffis. (There was a widow, Nancy Griffice, with a family enumerated in the 1830 census of Hall County.
- Mary "Polly" Yarborough, born May, 1811, was married to William Craw-

- ford Hancock. William C. Hancock, son of William, Sr., was born Aug. 17, 1811, and died July 4, 1877. He left a will recorded in Hall County. Mary "Polly" Yarborough Hancock died April 6, 1897. She and William C. are both buried in the old Concord Presbyterian Church Cemetery, Hall County, Ga. The couple left numerous descendants in Hall and Jackson Counties, Ga. Their children were: William Richardson Hancock, John A. Hancock, William Crawford Hancock, Jr., Samuel Hancock, Burrel W. Hancock, and Sarah Elizabeth Hancock who was married to James Madison Watson.
- 5. John Wesley Yarborough, born May 20, 1813, and died December 16, 1879. He was married to Amanda Lane on December 1, 1836.
- 6. Milly Edwards Yarborough, daughter of John and Elizabeth, was born March 14, 1815. She was married in Hall County, September 13, 1832, to Basil (Bassel, Bazel, Bazzel) Lowrey. Emily "Milly" and her husband are both in Cobb County, Ga., Citizens Cemetery, Marietta.

Rev. Bazzel Lowery, born Jan. 12, 1812, Franklin County, Ga. died Atlanta, Ga. April 13, 1894.

Emily Yarbrough, wife of Rev. Basil Lowrey, born March 14, 1815, died December 3, 1905.

Buried also in the family plot are the graves with the following inscribed headstones:

Sarah Carolina, wife of J. W. Biggerstaff and daughter of Rev. B. and Emily Lowrey, born Oct. 31, 1835, died Dec. 3, 1861.

Rev. John M. Lowrey born Jan. 23, 1842 died Dec. 18, 1898

Mary E., daughter of Basil and Emily Lowrey, born Jan. 20, 1851, died March 15, 1912

Children of Rev. Bazel and Emily "Milly" Yarborough Lowrey were: .
Asbury (died young); Caroline married J. W. Biggerstaff; James Fletcher;
John McPherson Lowry (a Methodist Minister); Martha, married Charles
Shepard; Joseph Tarpley; Elizabeth, married Benjamin Van Dyke; George
Pierce; Mary; Emily Cordelia, married Thomas Veal.

- 7. William Yarborough, son of John and Eltzabeth, went to California and never heard from.
- 8. Elizabeth Yarborough, daughter of John and Elizabeth, according to some records, was married to Welsey Mayne in Habersham County, Ga. One Elizabeth Yarborough was married in Hall County on December 30, 1832, to Charles J. Lowry. This could be the daughter who would be married to the brother of her sister Emily "Milly" Yarborough.
- YARBROUGH YARBOROUGH (English) One who came from Yarborough or Yarburgh (earth fortification), in Lincolnshire. The name has also been spelled as Yerburgh and Yarboro.
- Yarborough or Yarburgh is the name of a parish in the union of Louth Co., Lincoln; also a hamlet in the parish of Croxton, co. Lincoln



# NEWNAN CHAPEL UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

Newnan Chapel United Methodist Church was established because the black population wished to practice their religion in their own churches. As early as August 22, 1824 Rev. George Standing came from Sussex, England, to assist in the establishment of what was to be called the Newnan Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church. The first meetings were held in a brush arbor which was followed by a wooden structure some years later.

As church membership grew, the Newnan Chapel purchased the property used today for the sum of one dollar in September 1840. Church members, working after their day's work was completed, dug clay from the banks of a stream on the property and made bricks of sand, clay and water to use in building the church. Women and children of the church brought food and drink to the men making the brick and carried finished bricks to the church site. A vestibule and steps were added later, and an annex was constructed during the years 1877 to 1892.

These buildings have also served other purposes for the black community, providing space for a public primary school which was sponsored by Clark College for a time, and providing a large auditorium and facilities for educational, cultural, and recreational activities. The buildings have received extensive renovation and improvements throughout the years.

Under the leadership of the Rev. Paul Settles who came in 1982, Newnan Chapel experienced real growth both spiritually and physically. Through the Council on Ministries there was a greater community outreach program developed. Through Settles' foresight and hard work, a new parsonage was completed in 1984 with the support of several Methodist bodies.

Since 1968 when several national groups merged, the church has been known as the Newnan Chapel United Methodist Church.

# GRANTVILLE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH Grantville 1841

Earliest known records indicate that on or before March 26, 1841 the Mount Horeb Methodist Episcopal Church was established in the small community of Calico Corner. That original one-room wooden structure stood on a site which is in the center of the present Grantville City Cemetery. The earliest recorded pastor serving Mount Horeb was J.W. Yarbrough (1844-1846) who also established the Methodist church at Moreland. With the change of the name of the town to Grantville the church had become the Grantville Methodist Church South by June 15, 1857.

By 1891 a new, larger white frame church building had been erected on the site where the parsonage now stands. Construction of the present church building was begun in 1926, a design of Rev. C.M. Lipham, architect and pastor at that time of the First Methodist Church in Newnan. The three-story, brick, Gothic-design church features beautiful stained-glass windows. The new building was constructed opposite the 1891 structure on property given by William N. Banks. Funds to build the new church were subscribed at one church service.

The congregation worshipped for the first time in the new sanctuary on the second Sunday in May 1927. The land occupied by the former church building became the site of the present parsonage which was completed in January 1929.

The Reverend Peggy Little has been pastor of Grantville United Methodist Church since June 1986.

#### WYNN

Glen Owen Wynn b. 8-31-1817, d. 8-27-1890, was the son of John Wynne and Susannah Owen Wynne of Oglethorpe Co. He married Sarah Pope Lumpkin b. 11-17-1822, d. 1-2-1888, daughter of Samuel Lumpkin and Mary Arnold Lumpkin of Oglethorpe Co. #### WILLIAM M. YARBROUGH

In the 20 to 30 years preceding the War Between the States, carpenter-architect William M. Yarbrough built a series of both Federal Period and Greek Revival-style houses in Coweta and Meriwether Counties, some of which are still standing. These fine houses are characterized by the use of Doric columns, delicately carved mantels, and elegant window trim. One house even has a floating staircase.

William Yarbrough was born in Woodbury; the date of his birth is uncertain. He must have started as a very young man as some of the houses attributed to him were built in the late 1840s or earlier. It is thought that he had some education as designs of his houses are similar to those found in pattern books written for the carpenter-architects of the early 19th century. Those pattern books showed builders how to construct houses through step-by-step instructions, even down to interior cosmetic details.

Most of the houses built by Yarbrough are of the Federal Period style, many with central porticos. Several reflect more of a Greek Revival influence, with a broad expanse of massive columns across the full facade of the building.

According to a great-grandson, Herbert Gordy, William Yarbrough made many of the tools he used in building his houses. Structural supports were hewn by hand from local virgin timber. Most likely he was assisted in his work by skilled slaves who were hired out to him when they were not needed by their owners. Elbert Wimbush is said to have been one talented slave who may have worked with Yarbrough in the building of Twin Oaks, just outside of Greenville.

William Yarbrough served in the Confederate Army in Company E, Ninth Georgia Artillery. He suffered a head injury during a battle and it is said that from then on he carried in his head a silver dollar, which was used as a plate to cover the wound. After the war, Yarbrough and his sons operated a gristmill on the Flint River in Meriwether County

Though most of Yarbrough's building days were over, he is credited with building three structures after the War Between the States: a large house with a Victorian-style gable (location unknown), a big wooden frame house outside Gay (exact location unknown), and the New Hope United Methodist Church, which was built in 1886.

William Yarbrough died around 1890 near Haralson and is buried in the New Hope United Methodist Church cemetery.

Many Coweta County hardware stores sold the pottery made by W.T.B. Gordy, his wife Annie, and his sons and daughter. William, D.X., Sara, Herbert E. and Jack learned the craft and began producing "big pots" in their teenage years. Those utilitarian household articles such as jugs, jars, crocks, and churns made by the Gordys are now highly treasured by those Cowetans who have examples of their work.

The Gordy family is descended from the Coweta County carpenter-architect William M. Yarbrough. Great-grandson Herbert E. Gordy is a skilled wood craftsman in Newnan in 1987.

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Yarbrough's houses often contained features of bod Greek Revival and Federal Period styles. For differentiation, houses with central porches will be listed as Federal Period, and those with full porches as Greek Revival. Federal-style houses attributed to Yarbrough are:

# Chapter XXIV Nineteenth-Century Historic Homes

oweta County enjoyed two distinct "boom" periods in the 19th century which resulted in a profusion of fine period homes being constructed during those prosperous times. The great flowering of Greek Revival homes in the 1850s came upon the heels of the railroads (built 1847-53) which carried away cotton and brought back dollars—a "flush" time which ceased abruptly in 1861. The next prosperity came in the 1880s and 1890s. The Industrial Revolution had arrived in Newnan at last, and there were cotton mills and machine-made Victorian mansions to prove it.

Ironically, the two "boom" periods of the 20th century, the 1920s and the 1950s-60s, were in many ways the most damaging to the legacy of the preceding century. A number of white-columned masterpieces were razed to make way for the Tudor mansions of the Roaring Twenties and the shopping centers of the post-World War II years in Newnan.

However, the national historic preservation movement of the late 1960s and early '70s did not bypass Coweta County. The Newnan-Coweta Historical Society was formed in 1972. The cities of Newnan, Moreland, Senoia, Grantville, Sharpsburg and other communities found powerful allies in their activist citizens who formed historical societies, mobilized preservation-minded garden clubs and patriotic societies, sought National Register listings, and individually and collectively restored old homes and buildings.

Newnan, which has been known as "The City of Homes" for more than 80 years, boasts three in-town neighborhoods listed as historic districts on the National Register, in addition to its courthouse.

The Newnan-Coweta Historical Society has published "A Driving Tour of Ante-bellum Homes In Newnan" with the assistance of the City of Newnan, Newnan-Coweta Board of Realtors, and the Newnan-Coweta Chamber of Commerce. The society presents annually or bi-annually Newnan's well-known Hospitality Tour of Homes. This event is held in October, and other private tours are available through advance reservations.

A sampling of 19th century homes from Newnan and Coweta County is included in this chapter. Below is a thumbnail sketch of architectural periods and styles in Coweta County (dates and stylisms approximate; may overlap):

#### 1830-1845: Plantation Plain and Federal

These two-story homes were generally two rooms wide and one room deep. Plantation plain houses had no classical details, were unpainted, had wooden interior walls, and a shed-roof porch. Federal houses had classical columns restricted to the space of the pediment, modified Palladian windows, and carved mantels.

#### 1845-1861: Greek Revival

These homes had central hallways, four rooms over four. often a full third-floor attic. Porches extended across entire front of house often with round fluted columns. Mantels were severely simple in keeping with the feeling of Greek stone temples. Chair rail omitted or else incorporated into full-blown wainscot.

1861-1865: Little or no construction during war.

#### 1865-1875: Reconstruction Cottages

Small, one story houses with very modest classical touches such as colonnettes. Severe timber shortages and financial hardship limited size and luxury of houses.

#### 1875-1900: Victorian Variety

Machine-made wooden decoration adorned asymmetrical houses built with towers, turrets, balconies, bay windows, arched doors. Stained glass, leaded glass, iron roof cresting, colored roof slates, decorative shingles, bargeboards, nooks and crannies. Architectural styles: Gothic, Queen Anne, Eastlake, Second Empire. Curiously, no Italianate apparently built in Coweta during 19th century.



Edward Clinton (E.C.) Beers came to Newnan as a teen ager about 1905 to live with his uncle, Travis Beers, and his family. He was apprenticed at Cole Shop and began work carrying tools to other workers. A talented machinist, he also repaired clocks and guns as a hobby. After his retirement in the 1960's he was often seen standing in front of his home on East Broad Street in the early mornings waving to people passing by on their way to work. Well loved by many, he was alert and active until his death at age 93.

Edward Clinton Beers b. 4-16-1889, d. 12-11-1982, son of James Henry Beers and Josephine Patrick Gordon Hadley of Harris County. Married Lucile Lovelady, b. 10-19-1891, d. 10-24-1973, dau. of W. Green Lovelady and Mary Ida Bevis Lovelady of the Handy community, on 12-31-1912. As most young ladies of that time, Lucile studied speech in high school and was an accomplished elocutionist.

A history of the Beers family would not be complete without including Ziller Nixon b. 4-20-1917, d. 1-16-1982. Ziller was born in Carroll County to Gus and Sarah Dukes, but lived most of her life with her mother and sister, Mary Towns and her family, on Pinson Street in Newnan. She worked for Barney and Ruth Beers when Lyndy was a small child; for Mrs. Bertha Beers for several years until her death in 1955; and then for Lewis and Elizabeth Beers for some 25 years. She was a member of the Newnan Chapel United Methodist Church, where she served on the Usher Board.

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



It is interesting to note that the boundary lines were changed again for both Hart and Franklin, by the Act of March 8, 1868.

Section III of this act applies to Franklin County as follows:

And be it further enacted, That the line between Hart and Franklin, be so altered and changed as to run from the Cross Roads, West of and near Job Bowers, to the former residence of Jeptha A. Bowers on the Carnesville road, thence to the western corners of William R. Poole's land known as Poole's and Burroughs' corner, thence a straight line to the Negro's old store, as described in the act laying out the county of Hart. (Acts General Assembly of Georgia, 1855-56, page 129.)

Banks County was created by the Act of December 1858 from Franklin County and Habersham County (formerly Franklin County) (Lamar's Compilation, p. 416 and 429) as follows:

Beginning at the northeast corner of Jackson County where said corner touches Hall county; thence direct to Crow's Mill; thence direct to where the Athens and Clarkesville road crosses Hall and Habersham line; thence with said road toward Clarkesville to where Wofford's old trail leaves said road; thence with said old trail to where it crosses Jeney's ford road, and thence direct to where the road leading up east of Middle River and Leatherwood Creek; thence along said road to Habersham and Franklin line, thence direct to Kesler's Bridge on Middle River, thence direct to McEntire's bridge, including the same; thence along the Athens road to Strickland's old mill; thence along the Madison line to the corner of Jackson County; thence along the Jackson County line to Hall line; thence with said line to the beginning.

An excerpt from the Franklin County Grand Jury presentments of May 1866 indicates that cutting off land from Franklin County was not always entirely satisfactory. The names of the grand jurors were as follows: James M. Bagwell, foreman; James M. Alexander, James M. McFarland, Asa W. Brawner, Tarpley A.T. Phillips, Jesse M. Payne, William Cawthon, Green B. Sewell, Talmon Harbor, Morgan Guest, Ephraim O. Finch, Benjamin F. Willis, Dennis O. Osborn, Benjamin P. Vandiver, Thomas W. Smith, James A. Moseley, James W. Payne, George Kesler, William W. Bagwell, Lewis Farrow. The presentment follows:

We also recommend that whereas there was a distinct understanding between the citizens of Franklin and Banks Counties that Banks County would keep up Mc-Entire's Bridge, on condition that Franklin County would consent to give up a large portion of her territory for the formation of Banks County, and whereas the Inferior Court of Banks County refuses to have said bridge built, therefore we recommend that if Banks County does not build the bridge before the next session of the Legislature, our Senator and Representative be instructed and required to endeavor to secure the passage of a bill to so alter the line between this county and the county of Banks as to include in Franklin County all the territory belonging to Franklin previous to the passage of the act organizing the county of Banks.

Hart County was created from Franklin and Elbert counties in 1853 (Georgia Laws 1853-54, page 302). The boundaries of the new county were as follows:

Section I. Beginning at Stower's Ferry on the Savannah river, formerly known as Brown's Ferry, and running in a straight line to the residence of Middleton G. Hickman in Elbert County, including said residence in the new county, thence in a straight line to the corner of Madison County nearest to the Little Holly Springs, thence along the boundary line of Madison County nearest to the corner of Elbert, Franklin, and Madison counties, near the residence of Angus Johnson, thence in a straight line to the nearest cross roads to the residence of Job Bowers, not including the residence of Moses and Joseph Manley in Franklin County, between said residence and Carnesville, on the road leading from Carnesville to Ruckersville, thence in a straight line to a place sometimes called Negro's old store place, now owned by Leonard Bonds, Franklin County, thence in a straight line to the mouth of Gum Log Creek, on Tugalo River, thence along the eastern boundary of the State of Georgia.

This act was one of the "unkindest cuts of all." It not only cut off part of the most productive land in Franklin County, it cut off citizens, among whom were leading people of the county. This cut-off also took some of the best schools, churches, and business establishments, such as those along Shoal Creek and the Tugalo River.

At this time when Hart County was created, William R. Poole was a member of the Franklin County Board of Education. He was also the member of the legislature from Franklin County. The minutes of the school commissioner's of Franklin County for 1852 list William R. Poole as Chairman through August 27, 1853, when he was reported absent and on May 19, 1854, Thomas R. Yarbrough was appointed to fill the vacancy of William R. Poole, cut off to Hart County. No doubt, other leaders and valuable land owners were lost from Franklin County when other land and citizens were cut off to create new counties.

Third - A. The president of the Executive Council would then issue to the petitioner a numbered warrant, directed to the county surveyor of the county selected, directing him to admeasure and lay out the stated number of acres as a bounty.

Third - B. For those who desired land in any of the eight old counties the procedure was substantially the same, except that the land court of that county exercised the same functions in steps 1, 2 and 3 - A as exercised by the governor, president and Executive Council with respect to Franklin and Washington counties.

Fourth. The county surveyor, or one of his deputies, would survey the land chosen by the applicant, make three plats thereof, record one copy in a book in his office, and forward two copies, together with the executed warrant, to the surveyor-general; one to be recorded and filed in the latter's office and the other to be attached to the grant.

Fifth. Upon transmission of one copy of the plat of survey and the executed warrant by the surveyor-general to the secretary of state, a grant would be issued by the latter in the name of the governor after the payment of nominal office fees. Both the surveyor-general and the secretary of state would enter on the survey book and on the grant book the notation Bounty, but in no case was the actual classification of the grantee shown.

There was nothing on the governor's numbered certificate to indicate whether the grant was made to a civilian or a soldier. In the 1920's some authorized person created additional confusion by writing the word bounty on many pages of the survey books and grant books because he thought the early clerks failed to do so, even though the dates indicated the grant could not lawfully have been a bounty.

- According to the records there is no doubt that many irregularities and abuses occurred in the issuance of bounties. Many warrants were signed by former officers who then bought the warrants and had grants issued to themselves. There are on file in the Georgia Department of Archives and History, petitions containing the names of 20 or more men, all in the same handwriting, alleged by the certifying officer to have been entitled to a bounty, praying that their bounties be granted to that officer. Several well-known officers were among the worst offenders which included Peter Carnes, Elijah Clarke, Leonard Marbury, Horatio Marbury, John Gorham, Edward Telfair, Ignatius Few, Zachariah Phillips, Micajah Williamson, Richard Call.

It is difficult for a person in 1984 to understand the happenings that occurred 200 years ago or during the following century. Our forefathers were a restless breed. They had come through a bloody war. Perhaps they were dreaming of a permanent home where they could have peace and quiet apart from fear and hunger. No doubt they wanted land as indicated by an incident which occurred on May 29, 1784 only 3 months after Franklin County was created and the land was opened for settlement. The incident is recorded in a letter on file with the Georgia Historical Society at Savannah, from the Secretary of the Executive Council to Governor John Houston as follows.

on May 29, 1784, the day appointed for the numbering and distribution of warrants

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for survey, such riotous and disorderly conduct that the clerks were overrun and the warrants were forcibly removed and scattered outside. Many duplicate warrants were signed to replace those so removed, and afterwards grants were made to the same man on both original and duplicate. Under such confusion, it would not be surprising that the fearful clerks should put through many unauthorized warrants for the most aggressive of the rioters. Read the words of the man who actually received the petitions and distributed the warrants: "Speculation, as I hinted before, has certainly extinguished in many men, passing for gentlemen, every spark of probity and integrity. Many have sworn that instead of 287½ acres of land, for which their warrants were made, they were entitled to 575 acres, and others, on second thought, have deposed that they petitioned or meant to petition for the other Bounty, in both of which cases the warrants were taken up and new ones made out accordingly."

The information about bounty grants is given because the list of grants from Franklin County in Lucien Lamar Knight's book listed as veterans all persons for whom land was surveyed without recognizing any distinction between the various classes of grants. All these grants were made during 1784-1786 before original Franklin County gave land to create other counties. Among the men who received these grants were land speculators and there is some question about the legality of some of the land transactions that were made.

These lists include Revolutionary soldiers recorded as residing in Franklin County when land grants were obtained for service in the Revolution. The source of each list is given as indicated,

The 1934 edition of the Lavonia Times carried the following statement by Editor, Rush Burton:

You will find many familiar names in this list. The Littles, the Pulliams, the Paynes, the Chandlers, the Kings, the Harrisons, the Stonecyphers, the Carnes', the Clarkes, the Jarrets, the Echols, the Shannons, the Waltons, and Walkers and many other names are familiar to our people today in the county can trace their ancestry back to those who fought in the Revolution and who were the recipients of bounties named below:

of the children of the county and, no doubt, did as much as was possible at that time, with the confused situation at the state level and the inability to raise funds on the local level. A copy of the original minutes of the school reports of the Board of Commissioners of the poor/free school fund of Franklin County for the decade 1852-1862, which include, in the last section, reports from the ordinary of the county to the Governor, reflect the situation during those years. Of special significance is the certification of the competencies of teachers by the Board of Education, the increase in funds from the state in the late 1850's and the decline in all areas with the tension and apprehension relative to secession which in 1861 became the Civil War that left Franklin County devastated, economically, educationally, and culturally.

The following information is taken from the reports of the poor/free school commissioners of Franklin County, 1852-1862.

The board of commissioners met May 31, 1852, at the courthouse in Carnesville with Temple F. Cooper, William R. Pool, William R. Wilbourn, William F. Bowers, members present, with William R. Pool presiding.

It was decided that the board meet four times a year on the first Tuesday in October 1852, and in 1853, meet the first Tuesday in January, April, July, and October.

The following resolutions were passed by the Board:

- 1. Resolved that the examination of the teachers of said county be public.
- Resolved that the examination be conducted with the utmost regard for the feelings of applicant teachers.
- 3. Resolved that trustees be appointed in pursuance of the law for every school in the county.
- 4. Resolved that this board deeply regrets the loss of the competency and energy of such men as Calvin Weld, but for the sake of harmony, general satisfaction, and the advancement of a great common cause, this board deems it inexpedient that any person be a teacher and a commissioner at the same time, therefore we recommend that Calvin L. Weld resign and that we tender the said office of commissioner caused by his resignation to John M. Freeman.

On motion the board adjourned to meet at 10 o'clock June 1 in the reading for examination class.

The board met again at Carnesville on June 1, 1852, according to adjournment and adopted the following order of examination.

- 1. Each applicant to furnish the board in writing all the branches he teaches. the part of the county in which he teaches with his name thereto.
- 2. Every applicant will form in one class when under examination in spelling reading, writing, and arithmetic. When this is through, those professing to teach the above only will be relieved and all the others are to be examined in the first named branches together with English, Grammar, and Geography and they will be discharged and all teaching the above named five branches together with Albegra, Natural Philosophy, and Astronomy.

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are NEWCASTHIRD Exast, 63762 when examined, dismissed and the classics will make the last class for examination.

The Board described the Manner of Examination as follows:

- One of the board will (with the prompting of all) examine how they teach, whether silent or open schools, on the letters of the alphabet, their use, nature, and division.
- On spelling, words and whether derivative or primitive, simple or compound.
- 3. On reading, cadence, emphasis, keys and right modulation of the voice.
- 4. The arithmetic, its meaning, the signs, the first five rules.
- 5. On all the higher branches as specified above in classes 2nd, 3rd, and 4th.

On that same day, June 1st, 1852, the following persons presented to the Board their names, location of schools and branches taught by them, who were classed as follows and examined.

The Board then adjourned until July 5.

The next meeting of the Board was July 5, 1852, at Carnesville. Certificates of competency were given to each applicant of June 1, 1852, except C.D. Crymes who had withdrawn on account of indisposition.

The Board met again at Carnesville, October 7, 1852, with Wm. R. Wilbourn, Wm. F. Bowers, and Jno. M. Freeman present. Wm. R. Wilbourn was appointed chairman protem of the Board. The Secreatary was ordered by the Board to give Susan Arundell a certificate of competency to teach orthography, writing, arithmetic, and English Grammar.

The trustees for John Johnson's school were listed: Edward W. Mayfield, Alexander Langston, Leonard Shannon. The teachers to be examined on that day were John B. Estes, J.A. Bowers, and J. Hall.

On July 4, 1853, the Board of Commissioners met in the Academy in Carnesville. Those present were Wm. F. Bowers, Temple F. Cooper. John M. Freeman, having resigned, J.N. Glenn was appointed to fill the vacancy. The class to be examined were Calvin Weld, Thos. H. Yarborough, ———— Chandler, Thos. Pulliam, John Allen, Lewis Osburn, ———— Vandivere, J.P. Ayers, Martin Cheek, Wm. Gardner, Wm. P. Alexander, LaFayette Pool. They were examined in Orthography, Reading, Arithmetic, Practical School Teaching. Adjourned to meet 4th Saturday in August at 9 o'clock A.M.

The next meeting of the Board for which minutes were available was at Carnesville, August 27, 1853. Present were Wm. F. Bowers, Joshua N. Glenn, Temple F. Cooper. Chairman Wm. R. Poole was absent and Wm. F. Bowers acted as Chariman Protem. The following teachers were examined in Orthography, Reading, and Arithmetic: Wm. J. Laird, Wm. Poole, S.L. Poole, J.J. Bowers, Wm. Garner, Joseph N. Sewell, Robt T. Pulliam, Francis M. Cheek, and Thos. H. Yarborough.

The following teachers were examined for the teaching for which they were entitled pay from the public money for poor children: Wm. M. Laird, J.J. Bowers, Francis M. Cheek.

The following teachers were examined in English Grammar: Wm. Garner, S.L. Poole, Joseph N. Sewell, Francis M. Cheek, Robert Pulliam, Thomas H. Yarborough.

The Board directed the Secretary to give certificate of competency to all applicants that were examined at this and the former meeting.

The following persons were handed in as trustees by J.A. Bowers: Wm. Bennett, John Hall, John V. Cheek. Francis M. Cheek handed in John McFarlan, J.A. Grant, George Stevenson. Wm. Garner handed in Thomas Bryan, Wm. Baldwin, Robert Bryan.

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The next meeting of the Board was May 19, 1854, at Carnesville. Present were William R. Wilbourn and Temple F. Cooper. Thomas H. Yarborough was appointed to fill the vacancy of Wm. R. Poole cut off to Hart County. There was no record of minutes written for this meeting.

Some time after the May 19, 1854 meeting, the legislature recommended that the Justices of the Inferior Court take charge of the poor school fund. Four years passed before another meeting was recorded in the minutes available. Evidently, in the interim, the justices of the Inferior Court handled school affairs.

The Board met the 8th of October 1859 to organize under the Act of the Legislature of Georgia approved 21st December 1858. Present were Wm. T. Crow, JIC; Henry Freeman, JIC; Levi Sewell, JIC; James A. Harrison, ordinary. It was ordered that General William T. Millican be appointed on the Board of Education, and that the ordinary notify the teachers of Franklin County to attend a meeting at the courthouse in Carnesville on Saturday, December 20, for the purpose of being examined on their competency to teach the elementary branches of an English education. There were no minutes of the Dec. 20 meeting.

A report from Franklin County was made September 27, 1859, signed by John G. York, ordinary, to Joseph E. Brown, Governor, stating that the information was given in accordance with the provisions of the Act of 11th December, 1858, to provide for the education of the children of the state between certain ages according to the circular letter of March 2, 1859, addressed to the ordinary requesting information for the present year 1859. The report follows:

- 1. The number of free white children between ages 8 and 18 is 1419.
- 2. Free white children between 8 and 18 who have been taught the elementary branches of an English Education is males 624, females 455, both sexes 1079.
- 3. The number of free white children between ages of 8 and 18 who have been taught higher branches of Enlgish education is males 59, females 48, both sexes 107, all 1186 (1079 + 107).
- 4. Tuition in The rates of tuition in Elementary branches is \$8 to \$13.00 average for session of 200 days \$10.50; tuition for higher branches is \$8.33 to \$28.00, average \$17.67 per session of 200 days.
- The grand jury and inferior court have assessed 30 percent upon state tax for school purposes which will probably raise \$620.00.
  - 6. The total number attending school in county within present year is 1330.
  - 7. The number of school houses is 29. (None owned by county.)
  - 8. Number of schools taught this year is 25.
- There is one county academy in this county located in Carnesville and school taught for term of 200 days. Number of scholars taught males 59, females 52, total 111.
- 10. No college or high school in county.
- 11. The Inferior Court of this county has appointed a board of five examiners viz. John B. Estes, Wm. T. Millican, Temple F. Cooper, Groves H. Cartledge, and William R. Welborn, The number of teachers examined and received a certificate of competency to teach and of good moral character is 22 males 20, females 2; as follows: John B. Estes, Sam'l L. Alexander, Nelson Osbern, John W. Holbrook, Wm. N. Martin, Daniel E. Waid, E.M. Bowers, Larken D. Sewell, John W. Varner, H.J. Ash, Robert T. Pulliam, Joseph Garner, W.T. Doyle, John Jaymes, Benj. T. #### Broad River Baptist Church (Black)

Broad River was founded in 1898 on land donated by the J.G.W. Sewell family. It is located on Fairview Road about 6 miles southwest of Layonia Next to the wood frame church was a one-room public schoolhouse. The first pastor was C.B. Johnson who served the church until 1913. The following served as pastors: Green Griffin 1913, B.A.F. Teasley 1915, J.C. Maxwell 1916. A.L. Lowe 1917, W.M. Dansby 1923, C.L. Borders 1934, J.B. Maxwell 1935. C. Clayton 1937, B.H. O'Bryant 1939, J.W. Evans 1940, V.S. Hughey 1951. J.B. Maxwell 1974, Cliff Burch 1978 who is still serving (1984).

The foundation for the new concrete block church was laid May 15, 1967 and it is a beautiful modern building.

There are approximately 300 members and six auxiliaries. The list of deacons who have served the church are: Joe Hogrove, L.R. Taylor, S. Cherry, A.H. Brock, Banks Montgomery, Marcus Burns, Joe Scott, Douglas Tribble, T.R. Brock, M.C. Scott, Ben Simpson, Horace Christian, Owens Thornton and Clarence Thornton.

#### Canon Baptist Church

Canon Baptist Church was organized in 1894 under the leadership of Rev. D.B. Wait, a teacher at the Canon School. In August 1895 the present property was purchased from Mr. W.F. Bowers for \$50. The building was completed in the spring of 1896. Earliest records, dating back to 1903, show a membership of 35 people. The electric lights were installed in 1910. The church complex has had major additions including a pastorium, a Sunday school building and other improvements. A full-time pastor, Rev. Stanley Cole, now serves 392 members.

#### Canon United Methodist Church

The name of Reverend John F. Yarborough marks the beginning of the Methodist Church in Canon, Georgia. A petition was presented to the quarterly conference at Providence on Feb. 5, 1905, and the application was approved to establish a Methodist Church in Canon.

Later in the year the Canon Mission which consisted of Canon, Carroll's and Pennington Chapel, was organized with W.A. Cooper of Avalon, as preacher. This group appointed a committee to secure a lot on which to construct a church. The following men were appointed: George Jordan, Dr. J.H Bowen, Edd P. Burton, W.P. Turman and J.T. Stovall. A lot at the corner of Broad Street and Central Avenue was purchased from Mr. B.C. Jordan for \$75 and a building committee of Edd P. Burton, George Jordan, J.T. Starr, Sr., W.P. Turman, B.H. Burton, J.T. Stovall and L.E. Osborn was appointed. The new church was completed in the summer of 1907.

Reverend Maxwell preached the first sermon and received 35 charter members into the church. Among them were Mr. and Mrs. C.A. Bagwell, Mr. and Mrs. J.R. Johnson, Mrs. L.M. Burton, Mr. George Jordan, Mr. E.P. Burton, Dr. and Mrs. J.H. Bowen, Mrs. E.J. Brown, Mrs. Maggie Dove, Mrs. J.W. Fleming, Mrs. Nannie Fleming, Mr. L.E. Osborn, Miss Bell Starr, Miss Lucy Starr, Mr. Fletcher Starr, Mr. W.D. Fleming, Mrs. M.P. Fleming, Miss Lavie Kelly, Mr. J.T. Starr, Sr., Mrs. J.T. Starr, Sr., Mrs. Rannie Starr, Miss Mattie Strickland, Mr. and Mrs. J.T. Stovall, Mr. and Mrs. A.F. Strickland, Mr. and Mrs. W.M. Turman, Mr. and Mrs. W.P. Turman, Miss Eunice Fleming, Miss Myrtle Fleming and Miss Florence Turman. Of the 35 charter members received into the church, only one survives (in 1984), Miss Eunice Fleming, now Mrs. Eunice Fleming Phillips, at Brown Memorial Convalescent Center, Royston, Georgia.

The church was placed on the Royston circuit in 1908. Pastors who have served include W.W. Gaines, W.A. Simmons, F.D. Cantrell, T.M. Sullivan, Irby Henderson, M.B. Whitaker, S.T. Sherrill, Charles Johnson, Phillip Banner, James Howell and Terry F. DeLand.

#### Canon Universalist Church

William F. Bowers, who was born in the year of 1825 and at the age of 25 was a very active Baptist minister, was very much interested in the youth of that day and constantly admonished them to study the Bible. He held a weekly lesson in his home every Friday night where the youth of the entire community were invited to attend. On the first meeting in January he would begin with the first chapter of the Bible, and arrange the lessons so that they would be through the Bible by the last meeting in December.

During the War Between the States, Marion Cheek, Stephen P. Bond, John M. Bowers, John Manley, Albert J. Owens and many others became very much interested in the Bible and were regular students of Uncle Billy's meetings until they were married and settled in and around West Bowersville, Ga., now Canon, Ga. Here they organized a weekly Bible school and continued to study the Bible. Strange as it may seem, they all began to have doubts as to the destiny of mankind, but were reluctant to mention it for sometime until John Bowers, by this time an active Baptist preacher, and Marion Cheek, who had been a Baptist preacher for many years, began to confide in each other expressing a doubt in the belief of endless torment. Finding themselves very much in accord, they approached Stephen Bond and, to their surprise, found him of the same opinion. In the meantime they, with other members of the old Canon church, which now stands about 3 miles east of Canon, Ga., had built a church house in Canon a few feet from the present church and were holding regular services as a Baptist church.

After prayerful consideration of their version of the Bible they decided to go in a body and consult their old leader and teacher "Old Uncle Billy," who very readily warned them of the dangers of such a step. This slowed them up for a little while; but they continued holding their meeting every week, which

Under the leadership of Deacon Sam Slone, Rev. Mid Cleveland and Brothers Dave Gordon, Juber Merritt, Will Earls, O.W. Frazer, Ben Scott, Crof Norman, Sisters Glara Merritt, Georgia Teasley, Ellen Earls, Francie Sadler, Lucy Bowers, and Laura Allen rented a one-room cabin just below where the church now stands, as a place to worship. Mr. Free Cleveland gave the land and deeds where the present church is located. The Robinson, Scott, Clark and Burke families moved to Lavonia and they all worked together to help organize the church. Rev. George Norris presided at the organization and served as minister for a while. Others who have served were Rev. Buck Johnson, Rev. Will Burrus, Rev. James Long, Rev. W.L. Johnson, Rev. W.L. Fortson, Rev. W.M. Dansby, Rev. S. Sain, Rev. Bryant, Rev. N.J. Walker, Rev. Field, Rev. White, V.B. Higginbotham, F.C. Williams, J.R. Hall, and Rev. Broughton.

The 80th anniversary of the Fairview Baptist Church was observed on June 19, 1977.

#### Fairview United Methodist Church

Fairview United Methodist Church was organized with 34 members in May 1894 under a brush arbor near the site of the church. This was used until the present church was built in 1895. Dedicated in 1898.

On April 19, 1895 Mrs. E.J. Sewell gave the land to be used for the building of Fairview Church and cemetery. The deed for three and six-tenths acres was signed by Mr. E.J. Sewell, J.R.P. From 1895 until 1957 Fairview was on the Lavonia circuit. At present the church is on the Allens-Carnesville charge. This church building was struck by lightning July 1985 and completely destroyed by fire.

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Gaines' Chapel United Methodist Church

Gaines' Chapel church is the outgrowth of a Sunday school conducted in the Dawkins schoolhouse where Andrew Reynolds, Warren Allen, Jeff Addison and George Jordan have served as superintendents.

Early in the fall of 1909, W.W Gaines who served the church occasionally conducted a revival at the school. O.L. Kelley, pastor of Hartwell, was invited to do the preaching. It proved to be a great revival. Soon after, necessary action was taken toward organization of a church, and with the organization of the church many members of Old Carroll's moved their membership to the new church.

W.A. Simmons succeeded Brother Gaines as pastor in 1912. It fell his lot to steer the building of the church which was finished in 1913 and dedicated by T.J. Christian, the presiding elder. It was given the name Gaines' Chapel after the former pastor. Other pastors who have served are Brother Simmons, F.D. Cantrell, T.M. Sullivan, Irby Henderson, M.B. Whitaker, J.G. Davis, F.E. Crutcher, O.E. Smith, G.G. Ramsey, J.V. Jones, Z.V. Hawks, Carl Stanley, G.T. Shell, Hoyt Gurley, J.W. Coffman, W.E. Brown, S.T. Sherrill, O.E. Green, Frank Jenkins, J.W. Woodruff, Jesse Warwick, Turner Taylor, Foster Smith, B.C. Madson (supply), W.L. Martin, Kenneth Deitle, Dean Milford, Larry McIntosh and Terry DeLand.

In January 1941 it was decided to tear down the old church and build a new one. The new church building was completed and dedicated in the late summer of 1941 with the Rev. S.T. Sherrill as pastor.

Complete renovation was completed in September 1963 and the rededication held on Sunday, September 22, 1963. The building committee for this renovation was Nelson Casey, chairman; Hubert Casey, C.L. Vaughn, James Hall, R.C. Hart, Edward Stratton, Lewis Dawkins, Dean Cochran, Delmar Ayers, Jack Graham, Dwight Massey.

#### Franklin Springs Baptist Church

The Franklin Springs Baptist Church was organized in 1866. The first pastor was Rev. Billy Bowers of Cannon, Ga. The church, made of logs, burned and was replaced by a wood-framed church where about 1925, the church held its first Homecoming. The Governor of Georgia, Mr. Hardman, was guest speaker.

It seems that during many years the church just drifted along and did not accomplish much. In 1944 the church was completely destroyed by a tornado. Friends and members worked together and the building began to rise again. For a while services were held in an unfurnished building. Later, money was raised to finish the building. Finally in 1968 the church was completely remodeled into a modern, well-equipped church.

At this time, we have a great pastor, the Reverend Durell Anderson. The church, Fellowship Hall, and a new organ have all been paid for in full. The Lord has been good to us!

#### Lavonia Presbyterian Church

The Reverend Henry F. Hoyt organized 11 members into the Lavonia Presbyterian Church in 1889. Early members listed include S.K. Dendy, R.T. Poole, Jesse LeCroy, Charles A. Allison, J.H. Pullen, Mrs. R.T. Poole, Miss Rosa Poole, Miss Rosa Poole's mother, H.C. Verner, T.W. McAllister, and Mrs. McAllister. Services were held alternately in the Methodist and Baptist churches once a month until the Presbyterian church building was completed in September 1890.

From the time the church was organized in 1889, until the present (1977), the church has had 15 ordained ministers and approximately 25 students serving it well. The 15 ordained ministers are: Henry F. Hoyt, L.A. Simpson, M.E. Peabody, G.N. Howerton, Fritz Rauschenburg, James Bradley, J.B. Nelson, J.M. Waggett, C.E. Bell, Miles C. Wood, James Coad, Eugene M. Musselwhite, James Coad, Joseph D. Renfro.

The first elders were T.W. McAllister and Mr. C.A. Allison. McAllister served as Clerk of the Session until 1912, when he moved from Lavonia. Nineteen others have served the church: H.C. Verner, E.R. McMurry, H.B. Bible, W.J. Freeman, O.L. Freeman, J.N. Telford, R.T. Poole, Dr. J.M. Freeman, R.A. Wilbanks, James McDaniel, C.B. Shirley, W.M. McMurry, H.T. Long, H.H. Broome, Charles Wilbanks, E.M. Foster, Hoke Miller, Louie Reed, E.E. Purcell.

Deacons include: James McDaniel, A. Mason McDaniel, S.A. Verner, J.M. Broome, J.G. Siler, J.G. Siler, Jr., J.H. Pullen, F.P. Ferguson, H.H. Broome, C.B. Shirley, J.A. Matheson, Charles Wilbanks, Same Carnes, Douglas F. Williamson, James F. Little, E.E. Purcell, Hoke Miller, Sam A. Verner, Jr., Pope Yow, Jones Beasley, R.C. Holstun, Bobby McMurry.

Early in the year 1959, the church withdrew from the Franklin County group of churches and joined with the Sharon Church of Hart County. In May of that year, a manse was bought in Lavonia.

The Reverend Claude Andrews became the first full-time pastor of Lavonia Presbyterian Church where he was installed in 1970.

With the installation of the current pastor, the Reverend Joseph D. Renfro, the Lavonia Church became one of the pioneering churches in the new Presbyterian program of "tent-making ministries," wherein the minister is both a fulltime pastor and a full-time employee in a secular position. Current membership is forty-seven.

The present building was completed in the late 1940's. 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#### Melvin Hill C.M.E. Church

One day a group of friends got together and built a brush arbor which was the first Melvin Hill Church. It was in 1871 and the church was organized in 1872. The first building consisted of logs and was on land originally owned by the Mayfield family and donated to the church.

There have been three churches built on this site. Between the years of 1908 and 1911, a lovely white structure was built at the end of the road off Highway 164, on the original site. This was in Bold Springs Community, near Carnesville. Rev. David Teasley was pastor. The building committee was J.C. Goss, and T.M. Haley, The secretary was R.P. Bush.

#### Pleasant Hill Baptist Church

The Pleasant Hill Baptist Church is situated about 2 miles north of Lavonia. It was constituted October 18, 1872 by the following Presbytery: Rev. Jesse Brown, and Deacons: R.C. Burgess of Clarks Creek; L.A. Tribble and Hezekiah Hughs of Pleasant Grove; B.P. Vandiver of Broad River; A.J. York of Poplar Springs; and W.M. Baldwin from Corinth.

The charter members were Solomon Gillespie, Elizabeth G. Gillespie, Mary E. Gillespie, Nancy L. Gillespie, Louise Cassann Gillespie, Henry Pierce and wife, John and Nancy Pierce, Sarah Ann Thomas, W.W. Thomas and Mary F. Thomas. Rev. Jesse Brown was elected pastor. The same day those joining were: Rev. Jesse Brown and wife, Alford Gunyon, wife and daughter, Ann and Sabre Guinn, A.L. Stephenson, Margarette Crawford and others.

About 1860 Billy Smith donated a lot for a cemetery and it was on this lot the first church was built. It was built of hewn logs and was about 20 x 30 feet. It was completed in 1881. In 1931 a building committee was appointed to plan for a larger building, as follows: Rev. E.R. Broadwell, chairman; B.L. Price. G.D. Crawford, Levis Thomas, Ivan Thomas and N.L. Smith, G.L. McConnell was treasurer. The first service in the new building took place March 3, 1932. Many improvements and additions have been made since then. The present building is valued at \$44,000.

The following have gone out from this church as ministers: J.W. Wilson 1875; W.J. Pearman in 1897; Homer Littleton 1940. The Littleton family went to the mission field in Nigeria.


#### Poplar Springs Baptist Church

Poplar Springs Baptist Church was established in 1805 and is the mother church of the Tugalo Baptist Association. Many land owners and slaves were members. The slave cemetery is to the right of the church on the Yow Estate. On September 12, 1818 delegates from 13 churches met there to form the Tugalo Baptist Association of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Some early members were Joseph Chandler, Thomas Wilkins, John Nail, John Mullins, James Jackson, Henry Stovall, James Randall, Jimmy Allen, Sarah E. Allen, Susan P. Allen, Elijah Griffin, Thomas Farmer, Nancy Stovall, Elizabeth Stovall, Heaty Caroline Stovall, G.N. Stovall, Charles W. Randal, A.C. Richie, John T. Whitworth, Cynthia T. Yow.

The church was given a plot of ground adjoining the church on June 10, 1889 by Henry Garner. The congregation voted to build a new "Meeting House." M.A. Adams was appointed to see if he could get a sawmill to locate on the site to saw the lumber for the new "Meeting House." The building committee elected was H.S. Whitworth, G.D. Thomas, F.T. Whitworth, W.J. Patterson, J.M. Morgan, M.A. Adams, J.W. Harrison, W.M. Stovall, A.P. Davile, T.B. Harrison, G.F. Gilbert, J.W. Robertson. The new church building was dedicated May 1897 and Rev. W.J. Purcell preached the dedication sermon.

The ministers who have served Poplar Springs Church have been Lewis Ballard and James Smith in 1822, John Cleveland, Thomas Gilbert and Francis Calloway Jr., supplied the church until 1826. From 1826 until 1855 the church was supplied by David Simmons, Matthew Vandiver, Andrew Cobb, John F. York and Jacob Burruss. The following ministers served: Reverends Isbell, D.H. Payne, Sadlier, William F. Bowers, W.B. Wellborne, W.M. Morton, W.F. Bowers, Jesse Brown, Thomas Crymes, H.M. Barton, Samuel Isbell, Gibson Underwood, Harrison Walters, J.F. Goode, W.J. Purcell, R.M. Marett, E.H. Collins, Joseph R. Lancaster, G.T. Wilson, J.H. Crunkleton, and Austin Crunkleton.

Bro. Robinson having surplus funds which he put out at interests made it his uniform rule never to exact usurious interest; and it was his custom also to dispose of his funds generally to those who most needed them. Deacon Robinson was twice married, his first wife died shortly after their union, by the last marriage he has three surviving children, two daughters and a son; all of them hopefully the children of God. The greatest enconium we can bestow in relation to the character of our departed venerable brother is found in the apostolic injunction respecting the character of those who should be selected by the church to fill the deacon's office, 'a man of honest report full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom,' he was beloved by all his brethren in the church, highly esteemed by all Christians and reverenced by men of the world as an honest, amiable, kind and benevolent citizen. Afflicted with the palsy several years before his death he bore his afflictions with Christian patience and resignation." His prayer that he might see his only son converted and baptised was answered within the last year of his life. He conversed on the subject of death with great composure retaining his reason to the end. This man of God fell asleep in Jesus, "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth, Yea, sayeth the Spirit, for they rest from their labors and their works do follow them!"

In the resolutions on his death are these impressive words: "This church will ever cherish a grateful remembrance of his works of love and mercy and the truly scriptural manner in which he fully employed the excellent traits of the Christian character in all his intercourse with the church and the world. We esteem him a man of God."

From the minutes we learn that:

Cost of keeping the church has risen steadily; for the coming year it is to be \$15.

A sister charged that a brother in the church had repeatedly promised to pay her and had as repeatedly falsified his word, and they took up the matter. Belonging to a church in those days meant right obligations to be rightly kept.

Coke Chapel (named for Bishop Coke or Cokesberry) first at Burt Hill farm in the early 30's, was moved to its present site, a lot 600 x 600 feet, deeded by Mark Smith for \$25, to the trustees, George Glass, Caleb Cook, J. E. Hunnicutt, Joshua P. Shropshire, L. M. Hunnicutt. Dr. J. E. P. Hunnicutt was superintendent of its Sunday School fifty-three years. It was the home church of Dr. George Edward Smith

a beloved local preacher who believed wives should call their husbands Mr. or My Lord and was of the almost puritanic austerity of life that characterized the Methodists of that time that made them turn Mrs. John Ray, senior, out of one of their churches for wearing jewelry.

Three stone steps (in 1927) mark the time when most women of the congregation rode horseback to church and the steps were used to mount and dismount. They were hewn by Mike Costello.

The old church and burying ground are well worth a visit; some of the monuments and epitaphs are most beautiful. One monument is of Carrara (Italien) marble. Captain George Smith, of 1st Regiment Virginia Cavalry, War 1812, is buried here.

"Coke Chapel is in the Sixth district—the garden spot of the county,

Dr. Luther Smith, first graduate of Emory College from Coweta
county and later its president, as boy and young man belonged to this
church to which many of Georgia Methodism's greatest men preached."

From Anderson:

"Willard F. Taft, carriage maker, built a new shop. He had three old sots of drinkers working for him to pay their liquor bills. All got to talking about what they were working for, and how they were spending their money and time—for what was their ruin, and the impoverishment of their families—and they all just quit work and hunted up the officer of the Temperance Society, and each one took the pledge, and returned to work to pay their indebtedness. Some did not, and some did hold out faithfully to the end. All have passed to their long home." (1880.)

Neriah (the light of the Lord) Baptist Church was organized in September; Reverends John S. Dodd, George B. Davis and Berry Holmes were present; George B. Davis was elected pastor—also reelected pastor of Ebenezer; G.W. Yarbrough, of Mount Gilead, Methodist; the Presbyterians retaining J. Y. Alexander, who had served them ten years, and the White Oak Presbyterian church for six. The latter built a new church this year and put a rock wall around their cemetery.

1843

Alexander H. Stephens and Judge Walter T. Colquitt had a debate in Newnan this year that has been famous ever since. Colquitt spoke first and so brilliantly and effectively that Stephens' Whig friends I-Mrs. N. L. Cook, Miss Nora Page, Mrs. T. D. Mobley.

were very much crest-fallen when the frail thin voiced and uninspiring speaker began his reply, but, taking up Judge Colquitt's attacks on him, he began comparing their acts in the Legislature and soon had the audience in a roar of applause, and everything he said from then on to the conclusion of his speech was received with cheers and shouts of victory. It was on this occasion that Stephens is said to have retorted, when Colquitt scornfully declared, "I could pin back his ears, grease him and swallow him whole," "Then you would have more brains in your belly than you have in your head." Of this speech, Honorable John T. Boifeuillet quotes from Henry Cleveland's entertaining book, "Alexander H. Stephens, in Public and Private," "The result of the speech at Newnan was the triumphant election of the entire Whig ticket a few weeks afterward by the largest majority given any party there in years."

Ebenezer Baptist church lost William M. Stokes, its noble deacon, in whose home it had been organized in 1828. He and his second wife, (born Jane Strong, March 26, 1785, in Virginia, married a man named Bridgewater who lost his life in the War of 1812, became Mrs. Stokes in 1815; removed to Coweta county, land lot 25 in the Sixth district, in 1827, )living in a double log-cabin-where Ebenezer was organizedfor a year, then building one of the first framed and weatherboarded houses in the county. Their home for the twenty-eight years of their married life, was noted for its gracious hospitality. But with many well trained slaves, an abundance of supplies from fields, forests, and streams it was easy to be hospitable. The timbers of their house were hewn from trees on the place, the weatherboarding, flooring and ceiling were sawed with a whip-saw. (This building in 1926 continues to be used as a dwelling). A pretty story is: that a child visitor was made so happy by this childless couple that on leaving he looked back and said to his mother, who was with him, "Ma, do you reckon that heaven is any better place than that?" Mrs. Stokes remembered when her brothers returned from serving in the Revolutionary war.

Reverend G. B. Davis was pastor of Ebenezer from 1840 to 1846 and of Neriah church as well.

The Methodists had Reverends J. F. Tigner at Mount Gilead and Harris Stearn at Newnan.

Jonathan W. Lee opened a hotel, on what was Neely's corner in 1880. Dennis F. Hammond came to practice law—as did John B. Willcoxon, H. R. Harrison—and George V. Vaughn a tailor, J. Kent, a saddler were other accessions to the population. James Rollins succeeded William F. Taft, who died, in the saloon business. Major Hugh Brewster and Walter Smith were merchants this year; Daniel Thompson, aged eighty-four died.

1844

In the Second district, six miles south of Newnan, on the left side of the State road a Methodist Church was organized with the name Mount Zion. A Class Leader's book has the date April 8, 1844, J. W. Yarbrough, at the bottom of the first page, with "Tarply Pricket G. W. Bryant (without punctuation). Leaders-at the top, and on the following pages the names: Tarply Pricket, George W. Bryant, Hiram Camp, Edmond Camp, Abner N. Camp, Henry Martin, James and William Hammock, George W. Camp, George W. King, Franklin Colley, J. B. McClure, W. H. Wright, James Z. Brady, John Hammock, Sarah Pricket, Mary, Peninah and Mary A. Camp, Susan, Nancy and Caroline Costley, Mary Hammock, Mary A. Dodds, Catherine Flurrey, Elizabeth and Rebecca Johnson, Lucinda King, Mary Dodds, Matilda Bryant, Nancy Hindsman, Jemima Reynolds, Leah, California A. and Elizabeth A. Pricket, Nancy Holland (Senior and Junior.) Harriet Holland, Frances Colley, Elvira and Martha H. McClure, Jane Wright, and Elizabeth Tomlin.

New business ventures: J. Colen, chair and cabinet maker; Peter Buchan, watchmaker and jeweler; William Fernandez, Morton and Forbs, cabinet and chair makers—Forbs died before the year ended—; Willis Cash, a carriage workman and Harry Goram. In the country O. Linch, Esquire; T. Kirby and some others.

The whole country was in a stir from June to November over the Clay and Polk presidential campaign. There were five barbecues, and an illumination after the election. Polk stalks, ash poles, hickory trees, Clay and Polk poles with banners, were planted about the square. William U. Anderson gives a lively glimpse of that time: "Some men hung Zeak Polk on the hickory. They were afraid to venture high with him; hung him close to the ground, so they could run if they were seen. We had many speeches: Walter T. Colquitt, William H. Stiles, Hugh A. Haralson, Sampford, William B. Pryor, Herschel V. Johnson, Hiram Warner and others on the Democratic side; Alexander H. Stephens, Robert Toombs, William C. Dawson, Judge Floyd,

the writer that certain marks on the outside would convey the word of health and welfare that was all she cared for. The by-stander then thought out the value of the stamp system.

Bowen & Ragland closed their business and Samuel D. Dickson opened a grocery business with Captain J. D. Brown—which may mean what is now called a grocery, or it may mean saloon, which, in those days was often called grocery. The election returned Dr. I. E. Smith to the senate, Sanders W. Lee, Thomas O. Carter and Nicholas Dyer were chosen for the house. Reverend Andrew Neese was pastor at Mount Gilead Methodist church.

An epidemic like "the grip" of 1889-90 and "the flu" of 1918-20, was called the "Tyler grip" by those opposed to Tyler.

Only a few items concerning the schools over the county have been found. Three teachers are named by Caloway M. Webb in the sketch of him in "Memoirs of Georgia;" as he was born in 1835 they must have taught him along in the '40's: William Porch was the first, Mamie Barnes, the second, and William Allen, the third. The log schoolhouse he attended must have been in the neighborhood of the location of the present town of Moreland. J. Y. Alexander taught the Seminary or Academy—friend Anderson gives it both names on the same page—in Newnan, for fourteen years.

July 4 was always enthusiastically celebrated. The Old Virginia Reel was danced and the fiddles gave forth "Arkansas Traveler," "Walls of Jericho," "Hail Columbia," and other tunes older and just as popular.

Reverend Y. F. Tigner preached to the Newnan Methodists this and the following year, Reverend Andrew Neese to those at Mt. Gilead. There were other Methodist churches in the county, but only vague generalizations concerning them, but they must have been supplied by those who preached at Newnan and Mt. Gilead, since both of these were units of circuits.

1842

#### Obituary.

Died on Sabbath evening the 27th of February last at his residence in Newnan, Ga., Deacon Randle Robinson in the eightieth year of his age. Bro. Robinson was born in Granville county, N. C., May 2, 1762. He removed to Edgefield district S. C., where he and his wife united with the Baptists, worshipping at a place on Stephens creek known

as Hardy's meeting house, ten miles N. E., of Augusta. From this he removed to Putnam county, Ga. about 37 years ago. This county was then comparatively a wilderness, but soon he with his wife and others united in forming a church, called at that time, Glady Creek, since known as Tirza. The church, soon after its organization, in obedience to the apostolic command to the church at Jerusalem in looking out among them a 'man of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom,' selected Bro. Robinson to fill the office of Deacon. Here he was an active and useful officer and one highly esteemed as a man and a Christian taking a firm stand in all the liberal schemes for promoting the interest of the church of Christ. In this church he lived nearly twenty years beloved and respected by his brethren and fellow citizens. About the year 1826 he emigrated to Butts county which was then a new section of the country. Here also he and his wife united in organizing a church at Towlaggee where he also discharged the duties of a deacon for about two years. Removed to Coweta county and settled in the woods one mile and three-quarters east of Newnan, about the close of 1827. In 1828 a few Baptists in and near Newnan organized a church which they called Newnan Baptist Church. Bro. Robinson was a man a little above the ordinary size, he was active, industrious, prudent and persevering in the prosecution of his worldly interest and by these means and the blessings of heaven he prospered in the affairs of this life and accumulated an ample competency for himself and children-notwithstanding his devoted interest in things of Religion, and his liberality in the support of the ministry, and that he was the warm friend of and a liberal contributor to the benevolent operations of the church, The Bible, Tract, Missionary, Temperance, Educational and Sabbath School Societies found in him an efficient friend and supporter. About six years ago he distributed the principal part of his property among his children and grandchildren, reserving a mere competency for his own support; he removed to the village in order to be near the church and to enjoy the privilege of devoting himself more fully to the service of God. Soon after his removal, owing to his age and consequent inability to attend conveniently the weekly prayer-meeting of the church, at his request, it was held at his house every Tuesday night up to the time of his death, a period of about five years. This prayer-meeting at the request of his surviving consort is still held there.

#### YARBROUGH

John Yarbrough and his wife, Susan, were very much beloved and honored by their friends and by the citizens of Warren County where they lived and reared their family of eight children, on the farm.

Their son, Wiley Marion Yarbrough, was born in Warren County, Georgia, August 19, 1842, and this was his home until after the close of the War Between the States, when he moved to Hancock County. He served with conspicuous courage in the 48th Regiment Georgia Volunteers throughout the war, and for bravery on the battlefield at Sharpsburg, was offered promotion by brevet which he declined. He was severely wounded in the mine explosion at Petersburg in 1864, losing a leg which terminated his military

Almost at once after coming to Sparta he was elected Tax Receiver, a position held by him with rare intervals until his death. In his very early manhood he joined the church and made that profession of the Christian's faith of which he was a shining ornament to the day of his death. In his modesty and retirement he asked nothing but the privilege of acquitting himself like a man as he stood for duty and righteousness all his days in the church and in the world. With him religion meant fidelity to God and man, and none are found to question that his life was the attainment of that goal.

Wiley Yarbrough married Sarah Elizabeth Williams on December 13, 1877, in Sparta, Ga. She was the daughter of Elijah and Martha Jane Williams of Macon County, and the granddaughter of Dr. Charles F. and Amelia Holt Patillo of Houston County, and niece of Rev. George H. Patillo, a beloved Methodist minister.

So she was descended, on her mother's side, from the Patillo family, a very ancient clan of near Dundee, Scotland. The name was originally "Patulloch" and means in Scottish "The foot of the lake." Two brothers came to this country in 1740. It is said that all who bear the name of Patillo are akin.

Wiley Yarbrough and his wife made their home and reared their family in Sparta. Their children: Mattilu, Susan, William Franklin, Mary (who died in infancy) and John Wesley.
