Preface

These records are the legacy of our Yarbrough family researchers, to whom much is owed. The known family researchers include Jean Baker, Ann Y. Broadbent, Mary Y. Daniel, Frances (Rea) Donohue, Betty Humrighouse, Pauline Gray, Evelyn Goble, Nelle Morris Jenkins, Ophelia Kessler, Frances Lockwood, Karen Mazock Renee Smelley, Dorothy Svec, Jeanette Wilson, Cleveland "Cy" Yarbrough, Edna Yarbrough, George A. Yarbrough, and Robert Price Yarbrough.

The originals of these volumes are being kept for the benefit of future generations by the Williamson County Library, Franklin, Tennessee.

No claims of accuracy or authentication of the material herein are made or may be assumed. Many of these records have been superseded by subsequent research. Hence, there are records which are erroneous and unreliable; it would have been a Herculean task to attempt to correct all of them. Fortunately, there are only a few critical genealogical facts that are involved, and which are correctly stated here:

- Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough was never married to Frances Proctor;
- Ambrose Yarbrough did not immigrant from Yorkshire; he is now believed to be a descendant of Richard the Immigrant;
- There are so far only two proven sons of Old Richard John and Richard II;
- There is so far no evidence proving Joshua Yarborough I to be a descendant of Old Richard.
- The "Old Country" referred to in old documents and letters is the Colony of Virginia, not England or the Old World.
- There were not seven brothers who immigrated from "the old country"; in fact, it now appears there were three brothers and four sons of the brothers. Which were the fathers and which were the sons are so far unknown.

In spite of these inaccuracies, these records comprise much of our history and some of our accomplishments. There are pages whose print quality is so poor that word recognition was not possible. In spite of that, at least partial capability for searching these volumes is provided, as well as an index to each volume. Nonetheless, the viewer is cautioned to perform his/her own due diligence in connection with any use of this material.

The various spellings of the Yarbrough surname have never been applied consistently, even within a given family. To the extent possible, the names in the index reflect the names used on the source pages; where it wasn't clear as to which might be the proper spelling, the spelling used is "Yarbrough".

This time there were only two of them -one young; one older. The young one raised
his tomahawk but the older one stepped in
front of him, frowing at the girl. In an
action that mercifuly caused her to faint, the
older man threw his coat over her body and
carried her off.

When she awoke, her first realization was that the terrible pain had gone. Slabs of a sort of mud had been applied to her bloody head. Her stomach was wound tightly with cloth. Her mouth felt fuzzy as if she had swallowed some drug; and for the moment she did not even feel panic.

Days passed with her waking, sleeping, having double vision, screaming, nausea; light as painful as splinters, blackness that terrified, now and then a rough hand on her forehead, chills, consuming heat ... and constant nightmares of being chased by yelling wild men waving knives chasing her down an endless stretch of sand.

When she was finally fully conscious, she sat up and could see across from her a few women sitting, eating with their fingers out of small bowls. They brought her a bowl and to her surprise, the taste was delicious and she realized she was starved. She was cramming the food into her mouth so fast that it ran down her hands and arms, but she didn't care. She was out of pain and didn't seem to be in any apparent danger.

Suddenly she looked up and all the fear returned. Standing before her was a wild man ... and she realized it was one of the wild men from the beach and she drew in her breath to scream. But before this could happen she realized the man was speaking to her and she was somehow able to understand him. "I save you. I Chief. You stay here." The memory of her tutoring came flooding back. He was speaking English! She wanted to thank him for saving her life -- but she fainted.

It was dark when she awakened again. All of a sudden she remembered all that had happend to her and put her hands to her head. She was completely bald! She was a widow,

She was sent one day to gather clamshells. With her heart in her throat, she searched the bushes at the edge of the woods not knowing what would happen to her if she were caught. She found a canoe pushed up into the thicket. Escape by day was impossible as she was always watched ... she promised herself that on the next moonless night ...

The very day after the discovery of the canoe, the younger brave who had wanted to finish her off as she had huddled in the hollow tree appeared in the longroom she shared with the other unattached squaws. He grinned at her evilly, and deposited a large gray-white fish at her feet. At this the other squaws burst into shouts of laughter. Penelope, frightened, ran to the Tisquantum told her that this was the same man who had scalped and killed her husband; who had been with him when she was found alive; since she had survived, he felt "possessive" toward her. He had brought her the fish, a type of salmon, for her to eat because it aroused sexual desire. Penelope was horrified. As though of you who have been fortunate enough to listen to him in the past know, we will always be proud to listen to him in the future. It is my great pleasure to introduce our next speaker, Senator Ralph Yarborough.

SENATOR RALPH YARBOROUGH

I have given this talk before but they say that each time I talk that fifty percent of the people here have never heard it and we want to go ahead and say this as this is Yarbrough family history so we will know these instances. So we have only this great realistic story of what these people who were responsible for the present generation of Yarbroughs endured. I'll give you some background, most of it from England so you will just fill that in on the duller pages

where you have blank pages in your book --just fill it in with this. There are some facts in here, dull in comparison to what you have just heard but interesting in the context of history.

You know where you study history in school, after all, history is my favorite subject but I thought most of it was dull. I read all of it to get those chapters I enjoyed most. So, tonight you are on the program for that part that does not have this great emotional feel to us as we think back on people who were scalped and lived.

history there were several and In Texas one of the most famous ones was a surveying party that was out near what is now Austin, Texas but was then the frontier. The indians attacked the surveying parties the vicious of all -- the Comanches had a word for for compass -- the thing that steals the land. They knew when the surveyors came the whites wouldn't be far behind and they were the most vicious attacks. They attacked one surveying party and one, named Will Barker, a famous case in Texas, was scalped and left for dead under a tree and he survived and was, I think, able to crawl, despite some wounds, to a spring of water where he could drink. wife, at the very hour he was scalped, in the town down the river, dreamed that she saw her husband scalped lying there and the others that got away came back and said that her husband was dead. They went back and couldn't find him because he had crawled away. said that he was dead and there was no use She said, "I saw him lying there scalped" and she insisted that they go back. About two or three days later they went back and found him. He lived but wore a cap the rest of his life. It was a big scalping. Shawnees of took a little strip; Comanches took the whole hair off the whole scalp of the head. So, these stories are moving and touching to all of us and that is part of our actual history there, so knowing kinsmen and descendants of those people, it teaches us something about what those who went out on the frontier risked to settle it to reclaim it for the rest of us.

But let me get back to some of the aspects of English Yarbrough family history because ,that is what you are studying; you are looking for your roots to go to the background and I stand here with a great deal of humility after seeing the starting of this after seeing Charles, my nephew Charles, stated his research on our family history. He was a student at the Law school at the University of Texas, already married and trying to rear a family. That is a very tough law school...Harvard and Texas are the two largest in numbers in the nation and that means that the competition is so keen, it is very tough to pass it. Charles told me he was starting this little magazine. I thought "how on earth can you pass those tough law courses and print this Yarborough Family Magazine"..but he did. And he started this work and it spread and spread and tonight you have the largest meeting we have ever had, the most successful and after we lost Charles and then a few weeks ago we lost Bob and I thought, "My goodness, two of the most active workers, two from the very start on having the conference are gone -- how can it last now?" Now we see how it will last. For scores are beginning to arise and will carry forward their work and expand it into many new fields beyond what they had envisioned and the plans that Allen, your chairman, has here are looking forward to greater things -- not merely just to learn what happened then, but an inspiration for the future because we need that -- times are hard. They are going to get harder for this nation and we are no longer top dogs -- we are not the only ones with atomic bombs. Even small nations have the atomic bombs now and our lives are going to get rougher because we have been rough on little nations -- so rough that a good part of the world doesn't agree with us on the way that we treat them and when we alienate the world, we are in trouble and we have alienated a majority of the world and we will have to pay that penalty and we are going to have to be determined as a nation to survive and undergo great hardships. ,

But back to what our ancestors suffered -- nothing equalled the hardships that they had and they survived. I am glad we had the opportunity to listen to what people could

survive and then do and accompish.

Growing up as a boy in east Texas, a little country town on Nueces River, a wonderful little river where the Cherokee moves in there. They surveyed it and picked that river to settle on -- the Spanish gave them permission to pick any tract of a limited area of Texas to settle that they wanted to -- that is before the anglo settlers came to Texas -- they picked the Nueces because they found there were more species of edible fish in in than any river in Texas. I grew up a mile from that river in a little town of 500 people and interested in family history. Yarbrough I've ever known is interested family history. That is one attribute of the Yarbrough blood. I think it is just in the blood.

I asked my father about it and I'd get interested and I'd want to hear something great and there wasn't any George Washington or Thomas Jefferson in our family .. or Benjamin Franklin. We didn't have a glamerous ranger captain in our family. But, my father told me what he could and I picked out three of the things I thought were the biggest and for one of those he told me that there were seven brothers that came over from the old country together. That was the beginning ... Seven brothers came from the old country and I took by "old country" he meant settled. England. Well, the Yarbroughs had been in Virginia about a hundred years and he had heard the people talk about the old country during the middle of the 1700's - seven brothers with families -- I learned this I thought that was a myth... that later. there was nothing to it at all. But seven brothers with families moved from Virginia into North Carolina and to them the old country was Virginia because they had been there about a hundred years. My father's My father's thought that by old country they meant England through me off some. I found that wasn't a myth... that was reality.

The second myth I grew up on, I was disillusioned. Finding no seven brothers had ever come from England -- not only not together on the ship but in the entirety of

migration insofar as I could find out from talking with colonial experts.

The second thing that he told me that was inspirational was that it was handed down in the family that our ancestor in England was a great judge in England. I lived on that until I got in the law school at the University of Texas and found a book "The Judges of England". it had every judge listed in England from 1066, the Norman Conquest, up to 1888. There wasn't a single Yarbrough in there and they had the trial as well as the appellate judges. I thought, "Well, that is a myth, that is a goner." That was before I found out about the seven brothers being a myth.

He then told me of one about the family where when all the men died out they had a provision that the woman who had considerable estates, the women, if they married, they had to have a covenant that the husband would take the family name to preserve that. He thought that was in the United States. I couldn't find any such record in the United States. I thought that was myth number three.

Now on the myth number 2, on the famous judge, in research I found the answer to that I think, I found it in a book published less than 30 years ago by the University of Texas Press and the Press of Oxford Joint Venture. It was about John De Yerdebeurgh -- that was the teutonic spelling of Yarbrough. French spelling was Yerbrec. That was in what was called the Daneland of England on the east coast on the Umber River that the Danes had settled in and lived there for 400-500 years. So there grew up there grew up there a man, a son of a king, he was son of king and called John of Ghent. His name through life was John of Ghent, Duke of Lancaster, King of Castille. Spain was divided into two nations at that time and Castille and Aargon and he married the daughter of the king of Castille so he called himself the King of Castille because the King of Castille died, his wife when (John's) was the oldest child and she claimed the right to rule Castille as Queen. John of Ghent went over and fought two wars there but the Spanish would not put up with an Englishman as the King of Spain so he lost and could

not win that kingdom. But he had a man on his staff, John De Yerdebeurgh, who was keeper of royal and keeper of the royal seal That royal wardrobe, the Lord of wardrobe. the province in England was the only one who had a bunch of fancy enough clothes to wear to a wedding of nobility. When they had a great wedding, the keeper of the wardrobe would issue that out -- it was kept under lock and key -- issue costumes out for all the kinfolks to wear to this wedding of nobles like you can see in those processions in the movies with all the people with the glamerous costumes on. And the royal seal meant that he was virtually secretary of state -- he warrants, he signed for pay, he kept the signed the rolls, he was a clerk -- some would call it a clerk now but it was really about the power of a secretary of state. But John of Ghent did one very unusual thing -- this was along in When his father died, a younger the 1300's. brother was succeeding to the throne. He was What they normally did at that time was just strangle that kid and he would get to be king. That happened a lot of times in English history. He didn't strangle him ... he swore a fieldry to him. He protected him, and as a result, as he grow up with the regents they gave him, though he couldn't be king of Castille, a lot of the attributes of royalty. He carried the revenue with him the rest of his life in England like he was a king to and they gave him patronage. appointed a certain man a notary public. That man was a brother-in-law of John of Ghent. His name was Chaucer. He wrote the Canterbury Tales. He lived on those grants from John of Ghent, his brother-in-law, and then he promoted him and made him a customs collector for the port of London. A notary public paid right well for that time. You had to pay a pretty stiff fee for deeds to be acknowledged and so forth and that collector of port customs got a cut out of everything they brought through there. That was really a lucrative job. That kept Chaucer going while was writing the Canterbury Tales which scholars tell us are really the item that when England was hanging on the brink; they had been speaking (all the court people) French since the Norman conquest of 1066, and this was 1300, and it was about to go French as the

real language of the people of England that the Canterbury Tales — that was before printing but they were copied and read all over England — that turned the people for the English Language. But John De Yerdebeurgh was signing those warrants and the most they know today is that the warrants that he signed — he was the ancestor of probably all of us here — there were so few Yarbroughs then, so few people in England. He signed the warrants on which Chaucer wrote the Canterbury Tales and made English the language of England. And that is the distinguished judge — he had certain attributes of a judge. And that was a legend handed down in our family that I learned from my father. The legend was true.

Now, to the other legend about the giving lands and seeing that certain people took the title of the Yarbrough family -- that is in fairly modern times. I have the names and dates right here and I will read them. The Yarbroughs up in Lincolnshire and Yorkshire had considerable lands. The lands use system that they had there made it hard for the widows to save the Yarbrough name. So they moved in ways -- and this is the third myth -the third myth began operation in 1852. male line of the Yorkshire Yarbroughs became extinct with the death of one Yarbrough. That was in 1852 and he died unmarried. His sister had married John Graham left issue of Yarbrough Graham. and named their son Yarbrough Graham and the father died and he immediately had the right under succession there to take the Yarbrough He took the Yarbrough name to save the Yarbrough name and he, in turn, died in 1856 without issue and the representation they called it then went to his sister, Elisha Marie. On her death it went to her eldest Marie. son, George John Lloyd, itself a distinguished English name. He assumed the Yarbrough name. In order to keep it alive, he assumed the Yarbrough name. So that is two cases where they assumed the name to keep it alive...they got the lands on the side, too. He died in 1868 leaving a daughter and the eldest one was married to a George de Bateson in 1862. Now George De Bateson became the second Lord Deremore and he then moved over ... he could be

Lord Deremore but they had the other name under it. He assumed the name of de Bateson of Yarburg. He took the name. That is the third one in 1884. And then the representation of the Yorkshire Yarbroughs evolved upon the Robert Winfred de Bateson Yarbrough Lord Deremore. The present Lord Deremore (and I am skipping two or three here in the interest of time) still lives -- not that one of 1880 -- there have been two more in between. He has no issue. He is the last of the When he dies the Lord Deremore title will die. Lord Yarbrough name today is a Pellham -- he is not a Yarbrough. The Yarbrough title had died out so the Pellham became entitled to a title for great service to the crown and they gave him a choice as to what he wanted to be and he wanted to be Lord Yarbrough. It shows the esteem in which that name was held in England. The fact that these men would give up their own name -- and in some instances they didn't have to in order to get that land -- they willingly gave it up to assume the name of Yarbrough. It shows the great esteem in which that name was held without any great crimes. There is no instance in English history of any great crime being committed by a Yarbrough.

The Yarbroughs were serving in the British Parliament as early as the 1300's. looked that up in the Library of Congress while I was in Washington. They had their revolutions and civil wars and their records burned and they do not have complete records of who served in the Parliaments but have separate ones. Others served a hundred years later in the Constitutional Parliament -- that is the one that kicked out King Charles over the religious issue and brought over William Mary of Orange to reestablish prostestant succession in England. The last one was the brother of this man right here who wrote this book about the Yarbroughs "Some Notes on our Family History" by E. R. Yarburgh. They just published about 100 of these and I was fortunate enough to find a copy in a bookstore in Boston and he gave this to his daughter, Mary Yarburgh in 1912. At that time he dedicated it to his brother who was a member of Parliament and that brother, he tells us in the back, had served in the

completely mapped it. He mapped over into their territory.

I was in Washington in May and went to the National Archives. You can't see it with light, but the reason I have this scratching part of this which is in blue and part which is in green because I wanted to show the difference between the ocean and where the land was. They didn't know at that time that he was the first man ever to map the north slope. I am marking this with a heavier line so you can see out here to this side -the blue is the Artic ocean and over here is Alaska. They didn't know where all of it was. And out to the furtherest point that he got, John Franklin, was Yarbrough Inlet. He named an Inlet there for a Yarbrough. We don't know why -- probably a great supporter of his in England. It could have been an officer on one of the ships. He named some of those bays -he named all the bays, islands, places to pass. The biggest ones were for English Royalty and others for captains of ships or people who had helped him or gotten his expedition together. I have a copy here I got out of the rare book room (I couldn't even get in there when I was in the Senate) and I picked the books off the shelves to look at them and then this copy I made there from the London account written by John Richards, the medical doctor they took with them on that trip. was printed in London in 1828 and he says in there "and steered it to the westward across mouth of Yarbrough Inlet, soundings varying from 5 feet to 2 fathoms (5 feet to 12 feet).

Now I wrote the proper two or three bureaus in Washington trying to find the one that named these places in America and they couldn't find it in a directory -- it was kind of hidden away somewhere. I got the word back that the Yarbrough, that name has been taken off the map. We couldn't find a reason; he wasn't a captain of a ship; he wasn't important enough. They left all those other names on it. I think I know the reason they took it off, they were leaving that for some crony -- wanted to name one of their cronies for that inlet. Well, I have just been recommending to

the chairman that we have a committee on geographical and historical names and places and I think we ought to blow the roof off of that committee up there. That name was put there by Sir John Franklin who, as you know, lost his life in Artic exploration.

These are British Admiralty maps. copies I got from the Map Archives of the Library of Congress. I made those there in research. Here is another one on a little bit bigger scale. That was a reprint by the British Admiralty. They were doing lobster surveying maps of the oceans at that time. Yarbrough Inlet they say is non-existant. you were up close enough to look at this map, the Inlet is three times as wide as any river flowing into the Artic Ocean. They said they couldn't find it. Three times as wide! map is dated in the 1850's. We have got to fight to save our heritage. That is the point I want to bring up. There is more than finding out what they did, but seeing that they get credit for what they did and that we get credit for what they did.

Now, here is something that has come within the past year, found by the man who made the dedication speech for the Yarbrough monument in the cemetery at Petersburg from North Carolinia -- Charles Yarbrough. He was in the Republic of Baliese, former British Honduras. A while back he called me and said that there was a Yarbrough Lagoon in Baliese, named for Yarbroughs in the port there, the port city which was the capital city subject to great overflows in tornadoes, hurricanes, etc. so they have moved it inland and are building them a new capital inland, kind of like we did with Washington or the Australians with Canberra. Now that Lagoon is a big lagoon so I went to the map archives in the Library of Congress while I was there and got maps of that area and that Lagoon is on there just as big as all outdoors and somewhere I have a picture of it to show you.

That lagoon -- I talked with the Baliese Embassy and they wouldn't encourage me to do anything about it because the city is divided into eight areas, precincts we would call them -- and that is down on the old waterfront, the

earliest area settled. They indicated it was a very poor district and wouldn't be very enthusiastic about the appearance of things there. They thought it wouldn't elevate their image any to illustrate that area. But, that is the original area and it has a very interesting history because the British were in there as early as 1640 with ships and I'don't know what that cutting diewood. diewood is used for. It was selling on the London market from \$90 to \$120 a ton which was paying even better than raiding Spanish gold ships because they didn't always capture them. They took African slaves in there with them and pretty soon there wasn't anybody there but those planters and their slaves and I think that they are the descendants of them are about the only people left there. The Spanish sent fleet after fleet into there to wipe them out but they would retreat into the mountains where the Mesquito Indians were and indians would let them come on in because the Spanish had never conquered those Mesquito Indians along that coast.

In looking at these maps, right by this Yarbrough Lagoon, it is wide. Right by it is the Yarbrough Playing Field. I figured that was probably a soccer field or a polo field but I saw that the street that leads down to it is the Race street. So, it must have been horse racing. Next to that is the Yarbrough Cemetery and Charles Yarbrough of NC told me the Yarbrough cemetery was adjacent cathedral. So we have a lot of research to do down there. So, we find that the Yarbroughs were not only here in our South 48 states (as they call it in Alaska), they were on the rim of America to the north; they were in the deep Central America in the tropical areas. when we get the full data on that we can take a map of North America and stretch a line from up there to Point Barrow (that is close to where the Yarbrough Inlet is today) to down in the southeastern part on the Carribbean and say that the Yarbroughs got from North to South.

So, it is an interest subject, this Yarbrough research. So, if any of you are down there in that area, look that lagoon over, that racetrack, that cemetery, what leads up to the cathedral, see who is buried

there and find out. You can find very little. I have found that very little has been written about British Honduras. I've been to the Library of Congresa and there is very little said. They just don't know anything about it. The people down there weren't writing. They were cutting trees; they were raising the crops of that area and some they claim were practicing some piracy up and down the coast ... they might have been for a little money on the side. But anyway, they survived. They were survivors and they survived.

You will find all kinds of interesting experiences whatever your interest is in studying this Yarbrough family. You have heard this thrilling story of the grandmothers that endured being scalped and then rearing great families, living over a hundred years -got tough enough from that indian experience that I guess the other events in life were mild after that if you could endure that and I promise you that from what I have learned the last two years thinking I'd learned a little about the Yarbroughs, why it qets exciting every year and wider spread and more interesting.

Thank you for your kindness and waiting till we could wade through that first part that I know is old hat to most of you here. It is a great pleasure and a thrill to come and meet with the Yarbroughs. I used to, growing up as a boy, hear the old folks talk about Alabama. Alabama sounded like the promised land where they came from. They talked about the great days in Alabama and I wondered what the Yarbroughs were going to be like if I ever got to see them back in the old states. Well, we know what you are like. You are wonderful people and it is a privilege to have this organization; to meet with you; to met over and over and I want to congratulate all this committee that have had this chairperson here to put on this wonderful national conference. .It has made this year the biggest and best ever and I wish for all of you many more to come and a greater discovery; greater explorations and much pleasure out of what you will learn and that we will learn more about what we need to do for survival for the future.

ALLEN YARBROUGH

For those of you who are here for the first time, you can understand why so many of us continue to come back. You never tire of hearing the fine things that we are a part of history. Most of you have shown that by getting into the research area you like history, and history is what made us what we are today and this country what it is today. I hope that we will always pursue that.

We had one interesting conversation and Senator Ralph and I talk about a lot of Every once in awhile a little polithings. You know I had to get that joke in It is amazing how many male and female, out of all of those who have been participating in the years that we have had this organization are school teachers. Male and female. And if you stop to consider what they have done to educate the people in this country, not about Yarbroughs necessarily, but rules still apply, whether you are teaching any part of the history of this country or any subject that you may teach in this country, if it wasn't for the mothers, the grandmothers, the school teachers and I married one, thank goodness, somebody had to look after me ... that this wouldn't be much of a country. If you can't walk down the streets of this country with pride, then you don't belong. To me, I have yet to find anybody who has really contributed anything to this country who didn't carry that since of pride. You go back and look at the wars, from the very earliest and biggest one that we had as far as the beginning was independence in 1776 and we have fought somebody ever since We like to get in pretty good scrap every now and then, but we aren't going to give it up. This is just one part because we have contributed, this family, members to every war that has ever been fought in this country. We are pursuing the list of all of those who have participated in all military actions in this country and we hope we will have that available one day in the not-toodistant future. All the historial aspects of this country where our family, whether it be directly as a Yarbrough or an offspring of a Yarbrough with Yarbrough blood has sacrificed to this country, for this country and those who carry on and teach about this country will be here forever. Until such time as it comes to an end, I hope everyone will pursue it with the amount of vigor that has been shown in the past few days.

This has been the fastest and shortest Yarbrough National Conference that attended, regardless of the fact that I have been here more days. There aren't enough hours yet. When you keep the room open until 2:00 A.M. and you get back up and open up again 6:00 and there is always somebody bumping on the doors ... when are you going to open again? Keep it up. Let's make a bigger and better organization because it is your organization, not mine, it is all of ours and I am proud of it and I want all of you to be equally proud.

I am looking forward to seeing you in Memphis next year. In the meantime, any suggestions that you may have to make it bigger, better, and more enjoyable, your Board of Directors would appreciate very much hearing from you. Anyone who wants to serve on any committee of any aspect to lend your talent, and believe me, we have some extremely well qualified talent among all of you and throughout the country. So, let's put it to good use and make it a bigger and better organization for the betterment of our country and of our family.

This being the biggest that we have had so far, and I look back and I tell you -- for a little lady sitting on my right over here, she has got as much stamina -- she has really put forth the effort -- not only that, her mother, her sisters and other contributions by members are very long and I won't try to go over the names again, but one who left us right in the middle of it -- we will miss him because he contributed an awful lot, too. But to you and your family, Arlene, thank you very much, we enjoyed it and you have done a remarkable job.

I am reminded of a little story about one of the researchers that was discussing some of the activity and their find today and everybody likes to have pictures to go along with the research that they have and so this one

lady came over and looked up the local artist and wanted to commission him to do a portrait so that she would have something to put in the front of the genealogical book that she was writing on her family history. She did successfully meet this young fellow and he said, "Well, lady, I'll have to be honest with you, my fee is \$4,000."

She said, "Well, that sounds reasonable enough -- I have paid almost that much in xerox paper trying to copy down all these things that I have found so far. There is, however, one special request that I would like to make in the painting of this portrait in as much as you have been recommended as being the best in St. Louis, I would like to have this done in the nude."

To my knowledge there are currently three Yarbroughpublications that are available. There are others coming out and we hope there will be many more soon. If you get any advertisements in the mail, don't hesitate to run it through your organization so that we can help you research the matter. The last one -they had changed their modus operandi a little bit and have been substituting the name that they are trying to sell a book to with the socalled maiden name of the author ... I believe it was Elizabeth Yarborough Ross that was coming out with one who wanted to sell you a \$32.00 and I received one in the mail and so far they have failed to respond to any correspondence because I told them that we had a national organization and if their book was all they claimed that we would be glad to help sponsor or to endorse their book ... and then I didn't hear from them anymore. Then my neighbor brought me the same card only it was Elizabeth Williams Ross --- I don't know how many times she has been married. about every time there has been a name to come up on the list -- it becomes her maiden name. So, be careful. Spend your time and energy with the organization. We are trying to keep this thing going to where it will give you good bona fide research.

The Board of Directors meet this afternoon and we have two new members of the Board. I'd like very much if we could to have Mrs. Frances Lockwood to stand up please. And, Roger Yarbrough would you please stand. Hopefully we will continue to grow to where we will have more people on the board. It is more than any two or three people can do at this point in time. So, if you will bear with us and give us some input -- we would like to

make this even better. I know that the man that is most responsible for this, I guess probably the two most responsible people for this organization, were Charles D. So, we will just keep looking and we will have every Yarbrough recorded because I would hate to go away just leaving one out there that is not recognized or that nobody knows who he is.

The next speaker on our list that I would like to introduce to you is Frances Ann Yarbro and she is from Memphis, Tennessee and all of those who have come more than once knows old Frances and Tennessee Charlie over there and so we would just like for her to come up and tell you a little bit about her research.

FRANCES ANN YARBRO:

The first thing I would like to tell you all about -- I meant to get this out earlier and I failed to. This is the Yarbrough House that was in Raleigh, NC. It was a hotel and it was more like a palace. I have a glossy print of it and some of you I have been able to get copies. But, if anybody is in the workroom tonight and wants a copy of it I will provide it. I have it in five stages. This pictures shows it in the most grand stage and I think it is worth having because it was very impressive. It was the place to stay at the time. If anyone wants to know more about it, I will let you know after this meeting.

THE PERSON NAMED IN TAIL OF TH

The Yarbrough family has something infectious about it that inspires one to search for their roots. Some of the Yarbrough family's most dedicated, active researchers have married into the family. For the last seven years I have been working with my husband, Charlie, and my son, Alfred, on Yarbrough research and have wanted to trace my ancestors, too. I had a very big problem. I was adopted when I was two years old and did not know who my parents were. My search started when I was in college and at one time Charlie had held my sealed record in his hand. At first there was a local judge who blocked every effort I made to find out about who my parents were. When he finally retired, it gave me a new ray of hope that the new judge would allow me to see my records. really excited the day he gave me permission to see them. Then a new snag! They could not find my papers. The court clerk let Alfred and I go down in the basement and search. spent two whole days looking through everything. Nothing. At this point I virtually gave up. Last year the Memphis Commercial Appeal had a story on adoptives who had found their their parents through the Department of Human Services. They gave all the information and even who to contact, so I didn't even wait to get a letter out, I called immediately one of the ladies that was listed in the article. I was really surprised to find out how nice they were. She told me exactly what to put in a request and exactly how to word it. only were they very helpful, they were very concerned and really interested in it. only did they give the information needed, they also make every effort to find the people for you. Through their help, I not only found out who my parents were, but my mother and sister had been trying to find me. So, in trying to find my roots, I got a bonus. My whole new family. My mother even got the letter from the Department of Human Services on my birthday. Since then they have visited me and are coming back to see me again this month.

I just want everyone who is doing a search not to give up because they run into a snag. Keep trying everything you can and you will find something and may even get a wonder-

ful surprise you are not expecting like I did. Now I have two lines to work on.

(NOTE: While Charlie Yarbro was aware of his wife's search for her family, he did not know until his wife's talk that she had found them. It was a wonderful surprise that was shared with the whole family.

ALLEN YARBROUGH:

So, that is first hand and I know that each of you that even found just one generation further back than you had to begin with when you start searching can appreciate a lot of that feeling although you may know who you are looking for -- you just can't find them and she knew she had a mother, too, and kept the search going until she finally found out. So, let's don't give up and once we find who we are looking for, turn around and help your cousin over there because all of us are kin no matter how you spell it. Like it or not, you are stuck with me from now on, honey, let me tell you! But, I love it.

We have even discussed the idea, in addition to research seminars and conferences like we have, we are getting to be such a family now that I miss all you guys from year to year and it would be nice to get together somewhere just for a weekend or if you have a Yarbrough living close to you, get over and see them. None of us have guarantees for tomorrow. didn't realize how close that came to home on a couple of occasions and a lot of you know better than I ... but I had no idea that I would ever be standing here before you tonight. My time, I thought, had come three years ago. Fortunately, I have been given a reprieve and I will continue on and I hope they have to knock me in the head on judgment

Our next speaker is Tennessee Charlie, Charles Henry Yarbro.

CHARLES YARBRO:

This is not actually a speech but is a rememberance of our dear friend and cousin, Bob Yarbrough, and each of you have a copy in your program. We wanted everyone to have a copy.

It is with great sadness and heavy hearts that we dedicate the 1987 National Yarbrough Conference to Robert Price Yarbrough, known affectionately to all of us as "Bob".

Bob was born the 31st of October 1911 in Meridian, Mississippi, the son of Robert Earl and Susie Bell (Price) Yarbrough. He died in Charlotte, NC, 10 July 1987. Bob married the former Jane Bair, a marriage that was filled with love and laughter for 45 years. To this union were born three children: Robert Ted Yarbrough and daughters Pat Beckner and Linda McCannell.

It is no great secret that Bob was a favorite of the Yarbrough family because he was a cousin to us all and each of us carries within our heart a special memory.

He always had a compliment for the ladies and could be called a southern gentlemen in the truest definition of the words.

He was an entertainer. His family remembers well his attempts to clog dance at the office Christmas party. His larger family gathered here at the conference remembers well his jokes and entertaining talks.

He was a rescuer. Even though he didn't like cats at all, he climbed up a ladder, maybe 30 feet, resting on a tree, to rescue his mother-in-law's cat -- only to bring the thing down with its claws firmly implanted in his chest. More importantly, he was a rescuer of people. Anyone who ever turned to Bob with a problem knows that it was met with sympathy and empathy. He was the kind of friend you didn't have to ask for He knew what you needed and was there with it before you called. Anyone who needed genealogy information on the family received immediate response and he shared all that he had gladly. When a missing link was discovBut, all across the nation Yarbroughs wanted to gather to have a dedication ceremony. It came together ... it was held in Petersburg, Virginia August 14 and 15, 1982 ... and this was the first Yarbrough National Conference. As you know, it was such a success that it is now held annually.

Bob's love for all the Yarbrough "clans" (as he always called \(\mu^2 \s) \) and his selfless devotion to the correction of a tombstone were the very basis and roots of our National Yarbarough Conferences. So, we say:

Kneel before us, Robert Price Yarbrough, in your spirit presence and in the memories within our hearts. With not the royal sword in the ways of our ancestors, but rather with a gentle touch of family love, we dub thee Sir Robert Yarbrough, father of the National Yarbrough Conference; those past, this one tonight, and those yet to come.

We miss you, our very dear friend, we miss you.

ALLEN YARBROUGH:

Now, how can you follow something like that?

Our next speaker is someone that all of us should be proud of. Those who know her are, without a doubt, extremely proud. Karen Mazock has given that extra touch, walked that extra mile, pounded the typewriter that extra hour, to make a lot of this possible and she will be our next speaker so let's have one of the warmest welcomes for our sister.

KAREN MAZOCK

When Bob and I were discussing the program for the banquet, we discussed previous programs and the topics discussed. Somewhere in the conversation it was mentioned that while we had heard about the Yarbrough lords

wife, caring mother and active in the Community and church. It is important that you know this so you can understand how her life changed completely and forever in less than one month's time.

As you know from history, taxes were unmercifully hight in the colonies. The Regulators were formed to try to bring relief. You will recall how they met Governor Tryon at Alamance in an attempt to find a solution ... and received an answer written in their own blood. After the battle at Alamance, Governor Tryon marched his men westward, arriving at the Jersey Settlement about two weeks later, Saturday, June 1, 1771 ... the night that turned Jemima's dreams into nightmares.

Let us turn to the North Carolina State Records, Vol. 29, page 849, for an account of that night:

"June 1, 1771. Tryon's army camped on Benjamin Merrill's plantation, a valuable tract of well cultivated land in the Jersey Settlement, near the Yadkin River. The horses belonging to the army had been turned loose that night to graze, each animal having a bell tied to its neck to aid in finding any which might stray. In the immediate neighborhood was the residence, gardens and grounds of Benjamin Merrill, a planter, who owned and took a great deal of pride in an extensive apiary which was located in the gardens. A foraging party from Tryon's army were attempting to steal honey from this place and in the darkness, several beehives were overturned and the bees began stinging both men and horses. The horses thereupon began to run pell-mell at a full gallop around and through the camp, ringing several hundred discordant bells, the sound of which made the night hideous. The sentinels, guards and pickets fired off their pieces, and the cry 'stand to your arms' run thoughtout the camp. Tryon no doubt thought all the regulators in the world had suddenly swooped down upon him. However, the cause of the tumult was soon ascertained and quiet was restored."

Captain Merrill was arrested that Saturday, put in chains with the other prisoners and dragged through the country to Hillsborough. These prisoners were to be tried from June 4 through June 8. Governor Tryon made it known that he would listen to the petitions of the prisoner's wives and mothers. Jemima Merrill, with her children, went to the Governor, she knealt at his feet and made her plea ... only to be told that it was now beyond his power to pardon anyone (though six of the twelve men tried were later pardoned). Benjamin Merrill received no pardon.

Jemima Merrill and her children attended Benjami's trial. Turning to Vol. 8, page 6423 of the North Carolina Colonial Records, we can read the words of the Chief Justice:

"I must now close my afflicting Duty, by pronouncing upon you the awful sentence of the law: which is that you, Benjamin Merrill, be carried to the place from whence you came, that you be drawn from thence to the place of Execution, where you are to be hanged by the neck; that you be cut down while yet alive, that your bowels be taken out and burnt before your face, that your head be cut off, your body be divided into four quarters, and this be at his Majesty's Disposal, and the Lord have mercy on your soul."

On June 19, 1771, Jemima and her children were in Hillsborough ... not because they wanted to see the execution, but in the hopes that they might have a few more moments with their beloved Benjamin. As he was led to the gallows, the guards allowed him to stop and say a few words with his family. From the gallows he was allowed to speak to the crowd. The full text of his gallow's speech is recorded in the North Carolina Colonial Records, Vol VIII, page 42. I just want to share with you here the ending to the speech:

"Believe me, I would not change stations with any man on the ground. All you who think you stand, take heed lest ye fall. I would be glad to say a few words more to you before I die. In a few moments I

shall leave a widow and ten children. I entreat that no reflection may be cast upon them on my account; and if possible, shall deem it as a bounty should you gentlemen petition the Governor and Council that some part of my estate may be spared to the widow and fatherless; it will be an act of charity ..."

He then sang a Psalm very devoutly, stepped forward and died like a Christian and soldier.

It was very silent. Captain Merrill had the support and sympathy of the entire crowd .. including Governor Tyron's men; one of whom was overhead to say, 'if all men went to the gallows with a character such as Captain Merrills' then hanging would be an honorable death.'

Jemima and the children heard this, and saw the execution. The memory etched itself into her very soul. In <u>A History of the Libery Baptist Association</u>, Rev. Henry Sheets wrote:

"Mrs. Jemima Merrill remained faithful and active religiously after the death of her husband. She was blind. Whether the blindness was caused by some natural defect or from excessive grief at the sad and untimely death of her husband was not known. She was never herself after the death of her husband -- she never recovered from the cruel fate which befell her in thus being bereft. She suffered great mental distress and spent much of her time walking to pass off the melancholia which clung to her only to darken her days of grief and bitterness. Her mind was scarecely ever free from her affliction while awake."

Jemima lived 30 years after Benjamin's death ... Because she could not keep up the plantation alone (it was restored to the family), she married one of the elders of her church and lived to see him try to take her children's rightful inheritance.

Jemima (Smith) Merrill - born 1730, d. 1803.

Jemima's son Samuel was a Revolutionary War soldier. He married a girl named Susannah -- her maiden name seems lost to us -- and they had a daughter named Jemima who married Thomas Yarborough of Davidson County, North Carolina, making Jemima Merrill a grandmother to most of the large line of Yarbroughs in (or from) the Davidson County, NC area.

PENELOPE (THOMPSON) VAN PRINCES STOUT 1622 - 1732

In 1634 Penelope Thompson was a pretty girl of twelve living in Amsterdam, Holland. She wore ribbons in her cap over yellow ringlets and her eyes sparkled --- everyday an adventure to her. Not far from her home lived a young portrait painter, Rembrandt Van Ryn who was surrently the rage of Amsterdam. Penelope had a tutor who, besides teaching her French and English, told her how proud she should be of her small country's history of expansion ... especially now that the dutch West India Company was carrying on a thriving trade with the wild men -- the Indians -- of the northeastern parts of America ... how these Indians could be dealt with if one observed a strict policy of fair and open terms. So, by the time she married Ken Van Princes, both of them age 20, she must have carried in her mind a pleasantly colored picture of the Dutch settlement in the new world. When Kent proposed that they leave Holland and set forth for New Netherland to see if they could make a home there, Penelope 'went with willingness.' There is little on record of Kent, but it comes down to us of that time that Penelope herself was a woman blossoming into beauty with a cheerful and loving disposition.

Kent was ill from the day the ship set sail; growing steadily worse; delirious with fever. On the 58th day in the murky gloom of a stormy afternoon, the ship made landfall of a sort -- it crashed into the rocky shoals off the coast of Sandy Hook. In fright and confu-

sion, the settlers shinnied down hand- burning lengths of rope into life rafts, some of which capsized in the heaving surf. Penelope, aided by sailors, managed to get her unconscious husband off the ship and most of the passengers and crew managed to reach the shore. They found themselves on a barren expanse of beach, lined with dense words. They held a short conference and decided to press on toward their destination, New Amsterdam, that very hour. Fear of the wild men decreed that no one spend a night on the unprotected beach. They urged the young Mistress Van Princes to come along and Penelope pleaded with them to help her carry Kent. Stern, pitying faces denied her; carrying Kent would slow down the party on their way to the safety of the town and surely she realized he was all but dead She refused to leave him and they anyway. left, promsing to return as soon as possible with help.

The night came on. Crouched beside Kent she slept fitfully. With the morning came events more terrible than this pretty, sheltered young bride from Holland could have possibly imagined. For, in the morning the wild men came.

She saw little -- three or four men with feathers sticking up from shaved and coppery heads. Then their arms were swinging down upon her with knives and with something she was later to learn was a tomahawk. One blow and the dying young man was dispatched. Penelope was deftly scalped, a knife slashed into her shoulder and another stroke drove into and across her abdomen. They left her for dead.

She crawled to the edge of the woods; found dew in the hollow of leaves; ate fungeous excrescense and the gum growing on the trees. The emotional and phyusical pain can only be imagined. On the 4th day she saw a deer run by with arrows sticking in its flanks. she hid in a hollow tree. But a dog came racing across the beach and stood barking att her -- baring its rotten teeth until the wild men came up.

WILLIAM K. KULBETH (1765-1835): KYPOWN HISTORY:

William K. KULBETH (also GALBREATH & KULBREATH) was born c1765, probably in Virginia. He married Mary (Polly) ROBINSON c1798, probably in Montgomery County, North Carolina. Parentage for William K. KULBETH is unknown at this writing.

Mary (Polly) RGBINSON was born in Montgomery County, North Carolina c1780 and was the daughter of Tyree ROBINSON (1738-1815) and Mary (Polly) ADAMS (1740-1833) both born in Virginia.

William & Mary are believed to have lived in Montgomery County, N. C. until about 1806 when they moved to Rhea County, Tennessee with the Robinson, Kirksey, Taylor & Powell families. They were in White County, Illinois by 1816 where William purchased land in the name of his son, John Alexander KULDETH. Illinois census records for 1818 & 1820 indicate as many as ten (10) children in the household by that time.

William & Mary lived in White County, Illinois until about 1823 when they moved to Fipton County, Tennessee. They were located there in the 1830 census. William is presumed to have died in Tipton County by 1835. Nary was located in the 1840 census in Fayette County, Tennessee living next to her son, John. At this time, three other persons, believed to be son, Fanoy and two unidentified females were living in the nousehold. The KULBETH and related families lived near the town of Braden, located near the Tipton & Fayette County lines.

fary moved to Nacogdoches County, Texas (prior to 1850) with her daughter, Nancy D. Mrs Asher BRANCH). Mary died in that county prior to 1870. To date the exact ocated for either of them.

ensus records indicate William & Mary may have had as many as twelve (12) children t is possible that some of those believed to be children were in fact grandchildren r.daughters or sons in law. Of the children of William & Mary only five (5) have een identified to date:

John Alexander KULBETH: born c1804, probably in Montgomery County, N. C. He married Julia TROUSDALE in Gallatin County, Ill., on 15 April 1827.

Nancy D. KULBETH: born 1807, probably in Tennessee. She married Asher BRANCH in White County, Illinois on 22 April 1822.

Jane P. KULBETH: born 6 Feb 1808, probably in Tenn. She married Edward YARBROUGH in Tipton County, Tenn. on 19 March 1826.

Elizabeth KULBETH: born c1810, probably in Tenn. She married Amaziah TREAT in White County, Illinois on 10 July 1824. Disappeared after 1838.

Cornelius Fanoy KULBETH: born c1819 in White County, Illinois. Married Mary Ann BEAVER in Fayette County, Tennessee on 26 June 1840. Moved to area of Drew County, Arkansas prior to 1850. Left many descendants.

arly records indicate this family spelled their surname CULBREATH, KULBREATH, CALBREATH, ILBREATH, etc. The signature of William K. KULBETH was found in 1816 and the spelling as KULBETH. That spelling has not been found on any record earlier than 1816. At this citing it is presumed William K. KULBETH descended from the numerous GALBRAITH families hat settled in Virginia and North Carolina in the 1700s. The occupation or exact hereabouts of William K. [This document goes on to give power of attorney to John Robinson, heir of Tirey Robinson, deceased, by the other heirs of Tirey, to settle his estate in the best way possible. This document is also filed in Rhea County, Tennessee, where the John Robinson above resided at this time. Tirey Robinson, Sr. was also a resident of Rhea Co., TN at the time of his death.]

The book and page number at the top of this document may be the file number in the records of Rhea Co., ${\tt TN}$?

The signatures include;

Polly Kulbeth (seal) Wm K. Kulbeth (?)

The signature of Wm K. Kulbeth does not appear to match the signature on the land purchase above. A seal may have been used in place of his signature, but I cannot tell by my copy.

This document also mentions three hundred acres of land in White Co., TN, purchased by Tirey Robinson, Sr. from Anderson Wade, which tract of land was lost by reason of the conveyance not being sufficient to enable him to hold said land.

From these records, the marriage of William K. Kulbeth and Mary "Polly" Robinson can be determined, along with the name of her father, brothers and sisters.

The purchase of land, signed by William K. Kulbeth, for John Alex. Kulbeth, could be the purchase of land in his son's name. We later find a John A. Culbreth sold 80 acres of this land in 1817, and a John A. Kulboth sold the remaining 80 acres in 1827. (see land records, page 8) + 4. July 1827.

The John Culbeth, shown in the 1818 Census as the head of household, has not been determined. If this was the same John Alexander, he would have been approximately 14 years old. And, the land purchased in his name would have occured when he was only about 12 years old.

If these events happened this way, the mystery of why William K. Kulbeth would buy land in his son's name and also list him as the head of the household in the 1818 Census, need to be examined.

Several theories have been discussed about the different possibilities, or reasons, for these events, but no definite proof can be offered at this time.

From the information I have received from the other researchers previously named, plus the records shown above, the following tenative conclusions have been reached.

William K.KULBETH, (also known as William K. CULBREATH and KULBREATH), was born between 1760 and 1770. His birthplace is unknown at this time. He is known to have married Mary "Polly" ROBINSON, ca 1798 ? Probably in North Carolina. Parentage for William is unknown at this time. Since William was several years older than Mary, it is possible he was married previously.

Mary "Polly" Robinson was born in Rowan County, North Carolina, ca 1780, and was the daughter of Tyree Robinson, (1738-1815) and Mary "Polly" Adams, (1740-1833), both of them born in Virginia.

William and Mary are believed to have lived in North Carolina until about 1810, when they possibly moved to Tennessee and then on to Gallatin and White County, Illinois.

The relationship between these families with similar names, the Culbreth, Kilbreath and Kulbeths, has not been determined. The family members that have been identified at this time as shown on the 1820 White County, IL census, gives us the following data;

William and Mary "Polly" Kulbeth lived in the Gallatin-White County, Illinois area from at least 1816 to about 1823. Sometime in 1823, he moved to Tipton County, Tennessee.

In May 1979, Edwin D. Kuykendall spent a week in Tennessee researching this family. He examined courthouse data in Tipton and Fayette Co.'s and discovered William Kulbreath arrived in Tipton County, TN in about 1823. By the year 1825, Asher and Nancy D. (Kulbeth) Branch had moved there and Asher was Justice of the Peace, Tipton County, 1834 and 1835.

These families lived near the present town of Braden, TN, which is located near the Fayette and Tipton County lines.

The census records for Tipton County, TN show the following families in 1830;

Asher Branch, (I need the information on him)

William is presumed to have died about 1835 in either Tipton or Fayette County, Tennessee. Mary was located in the 1840 census, Fayette County, TN, living near her son, John A. Kulbeth. At this date, one of her other sons, C. Fanoy, was living with her, plus two females, names unknown. One of them could have been Mary Ann (Beaver) Kulbeth, who married C. Fanoy, 26 June 1840.

Nancy D. (Kulbeth) Branch died at Linn Flat, (Nacogdoches) Texas on 1 April 1880.

Edwin D. Kuydendall has extensive information on the Asher Branch family as he is descended from this line.

Amaziah Treat appears in the records of White County as a Justice of the Peace as early as 1828. He married Elizabeth County in 1830 as shown above.

Only Elizabeth Treat was found in the 1840 Census, Wayne Co., Illinois, as the head of household with two sons and one daughter.

John A. Kulbeth of Fremont, CA reports that a lot of research has been done on Amaziah Treat and only the following information has been found;

Apparently, Amaziah Treat left a wife and family in Pennsylvania when he came to White County, Illinois. He supposedly had someone write and tell his family he had died. It was not until about 1838, his father found out Amaziah Treat was

still alive. In 1838, Amaziah was the postmaster in Kendal,
(Wayne) Illinois. By 1840, he had been replaced by Tyra Taylor, a
cousin.

The Treat family has tried in vain to trace them, as has John A. Kulbeth.

Research in the National Archives has revealed some information on these Military Land Warrant Certificates as follows;

Susannah Kilbreth's Warrant was issued as to her being the widow of Thomas Kilbreth, alias Thomas Culbreath, Jr., deceased March 1845. Service in the Black Hawk War. His Military Record has been found in the Illinois State Archives and the Application for Bounty Land has been requested from the National Archives.

Rachel Kilbreath's Warrant was issued as to her being the widow of Thomas Kilbreath, (Senior), deceased August 1833. He served in the War of 1812 from Sumner Co., Tennessee. Included in her Application for Bounty Land was a record of their marriage, 30 August 1811 in Smith Co., Tennessee. The TN Militia unit of Thomas Kilbreath (Culbreath) has now been identified and his Military Service Records have been ordered from the National Archives.

The records of Luther Stoddard have not been found and the connection or purchase of this Bounty Land Warrant of the land entered by James Kilbreath has not been determined.

The 1850 White Co., IL census, showing this family, was taken 14 September 1850. They were married in July 1850 and the daughter, Elizabeth, was shown as two years old.

Perhaps this is the daughter of Rachel, who possibly died and James Mears then married Margaret.

I haven't located this family on the 1860 White County census.

In one of Yvonne's letters, she said Benjamin Mobley married (1), a Rachel Kilbreath or Culbreath. We know he married (2), 15 October 1851, Sarah Culbreath, daughter of Thomas and Susannah (Harvey) Culbreath.

Does anyone have any other information on this?





Yarbro event set for St. Louis

Yarbrough of Southern Pines, N.C., will be principal speakers at the Saturday night family banquet, NASCAR race car driver and crew chief Cale Yarborough of South Carolina, and rock and folk singer Glenn Yarbrough of California, are scheduled to appear.

Also on the memorial program, Charles H. Yarbro of Reelfoot Lake will eulogize Robert Price Yarbrough of Charlotte, N.C., who died almost a month ago, July 10, 1987. Mr. Yarbrough, a native Mississippian and retired specialty timber mill manager, is being remembered as "Father of the National Yarbrough Conference," spearheading all the sessions and hosting the first and last year's conference. He was working on the program for the St. Louis meeting when he died. He led the movement to permanently mark the grave in Blandford Church

Karen Martin Mazock of Virginia will talk on the role of Yarbrough women in the family history and conduct a "red rose" ceremony honoring the wives and daughters of family leaders who have died recently.

Mr. Yarbro of Route 1, Tiptonville, is editor of the "Interim News Sheet for the Yarborough Family Magazine," publishing nine editions yearly. He is also a member of the NYC board of directors. Alfred Yarbro serves the board as secretary.

The Missouri meeting, hosted by Ms. Arlene Weidinger and her mother, Mrs. May Y. Sidney, of St. Louis, will also feature genealogy workshops Friday and Saturday, board meetings, entertainment, and a "farewell" breakfast Sunday.





WILLIAM HARRISON YARBROUGH3

11 November 1849 - 4 April 1922

Our father, William Harrison Yarbrough, was born and reared on the Cotton Grove Road just south of the city limits of Lexington, North Carolina. Incidentally, he was named after the oldest president ever inaugurated, William Henry Harrison, 68 years old when he took office and died 31 days later.

Colonel George Yarbrough, originally from Alabama, was a dry goods merchant here in Tyler [Texas]. On one occasion when he was either going to market in New york City or returning from there, he stopped in Lexington, North Carolina to visit William Yarbrough's father, Charles Yarbrough, and his family. Colonel George Yarbrough advised the sons, of whom our father was one, not to marry and settle down until they had traveled some. That inspired our father who set out to go to Missouri where an older brother, James K. Yarbrough, lived. After visiting with the brother's family in Springfield. Missouri, he taught school in Bolivar, Missouri for awhile. He travelled over much of the United States as a drug salesman and, at one time, sold quilting frames.

He came to Tyler, Texas in the late 1800s and lived in the home of Colonel George Yarbrough. During his stay there, he rallied to the cause of that early day in history and, by using his team, helped to construct the I. & G. N. railroad track between Tyler and Mineola, Texas.

Upon his return to North Carolina to visit his own folks, he attended a spelling match, or spelling bee, at the Yarbrough School House near their home where our mother's sister, Miss Rebecca Kindley, was the teacher. Mother was there and took part in the spelling match without missing a word. That impressed our father. Mother taught at Center Hill School some distance from Lexinton and stayed in the Charles Owen home. He was a distant cousin of our father. During that stay in North Carolina, he visited the Owens and met up with mother again.

In the course of the conversation one evening, Grandmother Owen said, "Billy, you ought to look you up some girl and marry and settle down." He replied, "I have been thinking about finding me some rich girl and marrying." In response to that remark our mother replied, "Oh, you're going to marry for riches and work for love." From then on [1894] they kept in touch with each other and in February 1897 this 48 year old suitor and his 25 year old lady love were married at her home in the Holly Gove Community south of Lexington. They had not lived too far apart in childhood and early adulthood, but their paths had never crossed until in the late 1880s.

Their honeymoon was a rail trip to Tyler, Texas, in March 1897. Our mother had never been inside a train before in her life. That year the Mississippi River was flooded and all out of bounds for miles. The only way that the train could roll along was for a crew of workmen to go ahead and place sandbags to reinforce the tracks. The bride said that she wondered if she would ever see her folks again.



THE YARBOROUGH FAMILY

1255

Few families have such a rich history nor can be traced back so far. The Yarborough family is reportedly the 11th oldest recorded family in England.

Genealogical studies and records reveal that there were at least 3 main Yarborough immigrants to America from England before 1800. Richard came to Amelia Co., Va. in 1635; his death occured in 1671. Ambrose came in 1732, and between 1750-1760 Guy came. Our family are descendents of Richard. From the time of their coming to America, Yarboroughs have served their country faithfully and well.

Zachariah Yarborough was the first to come to old Rowan Co. (now Davidson Co.) at the close of the Revolutionary War. Zachariah m. Brabeth Dowd. Their son Thomas m. Jemima Merili who was the granddau. of Captain Benjamin Merrill.

Since 1934 they have held a Family reunion yearly except during WW II. Mrs. Lillian Y. Sink was instrumental in organizing this reunion and was the first president.

Carl Yarborough assisted her in this endeavor and served as president also. It was held for several years at the Sheets Memorial Bapt. Church, then South Lexington Fire Dept. until last year when it was moved to the Fellowship Hall of the Center Hill Bapt. Church. My earliest rememberance was one held at the late Charles Oscar Sink's home. Oscar was a cousin and very accomplished in music. Baxter Yarborough, who was a C.P.A. living in Kannapolis, allowed the family to meet at his home on Brown St.

Reverend Aaron Yarborough was b. 5 Oct. 1813, the son of Thomas and Jemima Merrill Yarborough, the grandson of Zachariah and Elizabeth Dowd Yarborough, and Samuel and Susannah Merrill, and the great-grandson of Capt. Benjamin Merrill.

His siblings were Susannah, b. 1799, m. 20 Aug. 1820 Reinhart Ratts, later migrated to Washington Co., Ind.; Zachariah, b. 15 Mar. 1801, d. 29 Feb. 1843, m. 7 Dec. 1826 Hannah Stout; David, b. 26 Nov. 1803, m. Susan McGuire 12 July 1826, migrated to Tipton Co., Tenn.; Samuel, b. 11 Dec. 1805, m. 11 Dec. 1820 Elizabeth (Betsy) Bowers; Thomas. b. 1806, m. 26 Nov. 1829 Sarah (Sallie) Burkhardt, migrated to Tipton Co., Tenn.

In 1833 Aaron and his bride-to-be, Elizabeth Womack, b. 12 Sept. 1815, were converted at Jersey Bapt. Church. They were m. 4 Feb. 1834. Elizabeth's sister, Polly, m. Aaron's bro., Charles. Elizabeth and Polly were the daus. of James and Polly Wiseman Womack. Their maternal uncle, James Wiseman, was the 1st sheriff of Davidson Co. Aaron and Elizabeth became the parents of 13 children:

Their 1st, Pleasant Addison, was b. 31 Oct. 1834, d. 25 June 1862 in Richmond, Va. of

federate Army. His valuables, a pair of shoes and a gold ring, were sent to his father, who also applied for and received the pay that was due Pleasant at his death.

Rickard; Jerusha, b. 16 Sept. 1838, d. 14 Oct. 1839; Susan Jane, b. 6 Nov. 1840, d. 26 Aug. 1853; Sarah Samantha, b. 18 Oct. 1842, d. 2 Sept. 1856; Thomas Alexander, b. 18 Nov. 1844, d. 25 Aug. 1856; Frances, b. 8 Sept. 1846, d. 6 Dec. 1846; Meredith Newbern, b. 20 Oct. 1847, m. 6 Sept. 1869 Sarah Hunt, d. 25 Jan. 1916; John Wilson, b. 25 Aug. 1849, d. 28 Sept. 1853; Alphaus Aaron, b. 10 Aug. 1851, d. 13 Sept. 1929, m. 18 Mar. 1883 Fannie Wheeler; Lucy Elizabeth, b. 25 Nov. 1853, d. 3 Feb. 1928, m. 22 Nov. 1874 Bob Jones; Walter Winfield, b. 17 Jan. 1856, d. 6 Feb. 1922, m. 11 Aug. 1878 Mary Alice Leonard; David Edwin, b. 21 Nov. 1862, d. 25 Oct. 1944.

Though his father owned numerous slaves and left a slave named Angelene to Aaron in his will, census records indicate that he owned no slaves. He was a Bapt. minister, having been licensed to preach July 1853 and ordained to the ministry June 1862. He became a deacon of Reeds Crossroads Church Mar. 1843, and was Pastor to Pines Meeting House 1862-63-64, Holloways 1863-64, Reeds Crossroads 1866-67 and 69, and Marion 1868. He was alternately serving Jersey Bapt. Church and Reeds Bapt. Church at his death. He was snown as a gentle, kind, and loving man who truly lived his religion.

Grandmother Elizabeth served their community, also. She was a midwife licensed to practice medicine. It is believed she learned midwifery from her mother, because in her mother's will she received several medical books. She was often away from home for days at a time, tending the ill and delivering babies. Even when pregnant herself, if called upon, she mounted her mule and went where she was needed. During one of her absences, one of her children (believed to be Jerusha) choked to death on a piece of chicken. She is remembered by her grandchildren as a cold, hard woman, whom they hid from when they saw her coming because they feared her. Perhaps losing 6 of her 13 children in childhood, and her oldest dying in the War only months before her youngest was born, caused her to be that way.

Reverend Aaron d. 30 Dec. 1897 at 85 and on 18 July 1898, Elizabeth joined him. They are bur. in Reeds Bapt. Church Cem. Abigail Yarborough Irish of Iowa City, Iowa, dau. of his bro., Zachariah, read of his death in the 5 Jan. 1898 issue of the *Dispatch*. She wrote a dowing tribute to him that was later published the *Dispatch* and ended it with a poem she wrote about him.

Dear Uncle Aaron: "Green be the turf above thee, None knew thee but to love thee, None named thee but to praise thee."

Grandmother d. suddenly from a stroke of Easter Sunday 17 Apr. 1938, when Rober was only 7. Granddaddy never remarried, rai ing his family with help from his older childred He was a loving but firm father. Children ar grandchildren alike knew better than to "taback"; but it was not fear that held their to gues; it was respect. Raising a family of trequired a lot if patience and ingenuity, but have equal to the task. He built furniture: dresser now owned by Lula, and a bench, no owned by Hilda. He half-soled his children shoes, doing a better job than a profession cobbler.

The homeplace was built in 1913. About 1920 (several children later) he raised the root to add an upstairs. His brother-in-law, Jir Aaron, came to help, and declared the stair case could not be built the way Granddadd wanted it. Granddaddy said it was going to built that way; whereupon, Jim retorted that he insisted on doing it that way, then he would take his tools and go home. Granddaddy replied, "Take your tools and go home." The staircase was built Granddaddy's way.

He once owned a 1925 Chevrolet touring car with isinglass windows and an "Ooga" horn. I remember snuggling under a lap robe with Roberta and my bro. Buddy, and grand daddy would squeeze the "Ooga" horn for us The car is long gone, but the horn now belongs to Hilda, my mother.

A Christian gentleman in every sense of the word, he was a member of Sheets Memoria Bapt. Church, where Grandmother taught Sunday School until her death. He was knowledgeable and could tell interesting anecdotes about people, places and things. It was an education to simply go for a ride with him because he could make local history come alive, not with dull dates but with intriguing stories about the people who lived it. He was always willing to share his reminiscences and laughing, never boisterously but with a quite chuckle at the memories. Although truly a gentlemen, he had his faults; his penchant for

he remarked he was tired and ready to join my Grandmother. He d. peacefully at 94 on 24 Apr. 1979, surrounded by the love of his 10 children leaving 22 grandchildren, 36 great grandchildren, 4 great-great grandchildren. He was bur, beside his beloved Ada in the Center Hill Bapt. Church cem. At sunset on the day of his burial, with family gathering around the grave, his grandson John Menius blew taps on a bugle that had belonged to Granddaddy. The greatest tribute to his memory came during the year following his death. His estate was settled amicably and lovingly among his 10 children with no discord, only love and respect for each other and the father who raised them.

The 3 daus. by Joseph's second wife, Sally larried as follows: Sophia married Clark lust; Sally married Joseph Doby; Mintie marad James Newsome. After his death, she arried Sampson Owens. Mintie inherited the arrick homeplace and lived there until her bath.

Joseph Carrick taught school in the Silver ill Twp. In those days the school term was ily 3 to 4 months since the children were seded for farm work at home. Joseph also vned a general store. His record book which is been kept in the Carrick family, recorded taught school in District No. 10 in 1857 for 20 per month, a total of \$80 for the 4 month rm.

Some interesting accounts in his record ook which dates from 1857 to 1861: John ook indebted to Joseph Carrick for 15 lbs. of icon at 15¢ per lb. — \$2.25; 52 lbs. of flour 2½¢ per lb. — \$1.30.

Also listed in the book is a record of sales in 161, apparently an auction sale: (1) tub to ristian Beck — .20¢; (1) bed to Henry Paler — \$1.50; (1) buggy cushion to J.T. Bean ..25¢; (1) saddle to Sampson Owens —

1) bed to Mrs. J.F. Carrick — \$5.00;) word to Clark Faust — \$3.00; (1) axe George Smith — .10¢; (1) looking glass to T. Bean — .20¢; (1) candle stand to Jacob okabill — .50¢; (1) smoothing iron to John okabill — .20¢; and (1) writing slate to Sol lover — .30¢.

Stephen Carroll was one of 3 brothers, naes of Ireland (Scotch-Irish) who reached ilmington, N.C., via London, c. 1750. He ttled in Orange Co., N.C. where he was a ge land owner. His will of 1827 left all land d other property to his wife Elnor for her time, then to a son Benjamin.

Benjamin lived in Orange Co. m. Nancy eler (1785), dau. of Christian Peeler of ake Co. He was a Revolutionary War veter. The record states he went into the war in Fall of 1780 in battles of 99 S.C. near y Yadkin River and Guilford Court use under the command of Gen. Green. He rved until the end of the war. His children re Eli, Alsey, Archibald, Charles, Benjamin, ment, Stephen, Ilai, Luvice and Decy. Two ns, Eli and Benjamin, came to Davidson Co. Eli Carroll (1785-1846) m. 1809 Catherine rrage (1788-1872). He acquired 500 acres

on Cabin Creek near Jackson Hill. In addition to farming, he operated a water powered grist mill and saw mill. He was a Missionary Bapt. preacher of distinction at Lick Creek Bapt. Church 1817 to 1839, a moderator for 8 years of the Liberty Bapt. Association. Leader and organizer of the Association (1832).

His children were, (1) Benjamin (b. 1810 married Noah. He had one son, W. Jessie, who fought in the Civil War and moved west; (2) Nancy m. Matthew Varner: their 2 children are Eli and Catherine; (3) Sarah m. Jacob Hoffman; (4) Rebecca m. Rev. A.D. Stoker, a Bapt. preacher who served a number of churches in this area; (5) Catherine m. Zachariah Coggins; and Eli, Jr.

Benjamin (1796-1884) m. 1st 1822 Nancy Riley, dau. of Peter and Elizabeth Riley. He m. 2nd 1864 Rachel Thompson. He acquired 590 acres on Lick Creek a mile from High Rock. In addition to farming he operated a tobacço press and a large blacksmith shop where he made farm equipment and wagons. In 1858 he gave the land for Lick Creek Bapt. Church. His children were: (1) Eli (1825-1895) m. in 1846 to Matilda Rush (1825-1907). Their children were, Nancy (1849-1900) m. Pinkney Kinney; Dora m. David Kinney. Pless moved to High Point. Rubin (1857-1904) m. 1st 1876 Elizabeth Bean (1858-1891) they have 1 dau. Minnie (1890-1957), 2nd m. Jane Garner (1859-1904) Their children were: Julis and May who moved to High Point; Burrel (1866-1940) m. 1904 Jane Garner; they moved to High Point; Rebecca (Becky) (1823-1900) m. Andrew Smith (1817-1885); Peter (b. 1826) m. Mary A. Bean. He was a Veteran of the Civil War. He moved west with his family after the war; Stephen (b. 1830) m. Sarah A. (dau. of James Cameron). He was a Veteran of the Civil War, was captured at Little River, Va. in 1864 and was an exchange prisoner in 1864. After the war he sold his land in 1870 and moved to E. Tenn.; Nancy (b. 1835) m. Wyatt Davis; Elaine (1837) married Jessie Newsom also b. 1845 and did not return from the Civil War. Lunda (b. 1847) married Harris Morris; Benjamin (1840-1920) in 1862 m. Mary Newsom (b. 1839-1919). He was veteran of the Civil War and was captured 3 June 1864 near Cold Water Harbor, Va. He was prisoner of war at Elmira, N.Y. until the end of the war. He was released there, walked home to his wife and 2 sons, one of whom he had never seen. His father gave him 100 acres of land in 1866. He built a log house which is still standing. In addition to farming, he had the first thrashing machine in this area.

Benjamin's children were, Cicero (1862-1931) m. Louise J. Hodge (1867-1946); they lived across the river from High Rock. He was a farmer and builder. His children were: Sallie m. John R. Small, lived in Thomasville and had no children; Anna m. Emanuel Holler, they have one dau.; W. Van m. Ina Hasting. He is a prominent Missionary Bapt. preacher. He pastored a number of churches over N.C. and retired in Forrest City. His children are Van J. and Jamie; Olan m. Anna Wyatt, he worked for Alcoa at High Rock Dam, served on Denton town commissioners. Their children are: Dewey C. m. Louise Snider, who live in Atlanta,

and have Michel and Gregory. Their other child Thomas G. lives in Denton. He has no children.

Benjamin John (1863-1944) m. 1885 Sarah Peacock (1864-1944), dau. of Willaim Peacock who owned a 240 acre farm. John bought 11 acres of the land south of Peacock Ave. and sold it to Hub Land Co. which developed what is now the south part of Denton. He was also the first Police Chief of Denton. Their children are Nora m. Lee Ward, no children; Maie (b. 1898) m. Melvin Surratt, lives at their father's old homeplace, their children are: Murris, Wilma, Joanne, Katherine, Mary and Clyde R. William (1895-1956) m. Mada Loflin (1899-1974) a veteran of World War I, in the lumber business, traded land and organized Carroll's Corner Oil Co. Their children are: Francis m. James Bailey, Doris m. Wade Kepley, Betty Lou m. Charles Trexler, Sara J. m. Bobby Elliott, W. Donald m. 1st Dortha Russell, they had a son, Gregory. He 2nd m. Rhonda Miller, their children are Danna. Donell and Eric. They operate a large farm south of Denton; Ralph B. m. Patrica Morris, their children are Pamela, Julie and Ralph, Jr. (Bo). Ralph, Sr. is operator of Carroll's Corner Oil Co. and other businesses; E. Betty (1866-1955) did not marry.

The fourth child, Leach (1867-1941) m. 1886 Jane Bean (1852-1919). Their children are Alice, Della and Jeanie. In additon to farming they sold produce in Salisbury. Alice did not marry. Della m. Ernest Snider and lived in Winston-Salem. Ella (1874-1899) m. Jim Davis, their children are: Bertha (b. 1896) m. Ed Henderson, Roy (b. 1898) m. Emma Grubb; Dora (b. 1875) m. Frank Davis (b. 1865), their children are: Kearney, Walter, Mary, Maude and Dewey. Mary L. (b. 1902) m. 1st early 1920's Grady C. Cagle (1900-1934) their 2 children, Wayne (b. 1924) m. Valeria Kivett and Dorothy (b. 1927) m. 1949 John M. Pollard. Mary L. m. 2nd c. 1940 Col. Thomas Boyles, they had 1 dau., Maureen (b. 1944) m. in 1966 Berry A. Huckabee. Maude Z. (b. 1902-1978) m. Leland G. Grogan their

SAMUEL LAFAYETTE CECIL

235

A veteran of the Civil War, my grandfather, Samuel Lafayette Cecil, was born to Richard Ijames and Sevilla Evans Cecil 25 Aug. 1845. They lived in the Mt. Olivet Methodist church section of the county where, as a young teenager, he farmed with his father until he was about 17 and entered the Civil War. He was a Private in Company K, 21st Regiment of the N.C. Infantry.

During the war he was captured by the Union Army, as a prisoner, was abused by the Yankees while they were trying to get information from him. When he was telling this to his allow years later, he told them of being tied up by his thumbs and suspended there with all his weight being supported by them, with his toes just clearing the ground. My mother asked why he didn't tell them so they would let him down. He said, "Honey, I didn't know anything to tell them."

The camp where they were held prisoner was on a river; after the Yankees found that their prisoners really didn't know anything to tell, they said those who could swim the river could go free. The Yankees thought all the "Rebs" would be drowned, and that would be the end of that. What they didn't know was that those rugged men from the South had been swimming in the creeks and rivers since they were little boys, so all swam to their freedom. Somehow they managed to find their way back to their company, much to the relief and amazement of their company.

Sam was discharged from the Confederate Army in Va. when the war was over and walked back to Davidson Co. When he reached his father's home, he walked slowly past the house to see if anyone would recognize him. No one did, for he had changed so, and his clothes were different. He turned around and walked back down the road in front of the house. This time someone did recognize him and yelled to the others, then they all started running to meet him. However, he waved them back and told them not to come near him because he was covered with body lice. "Go put on a pot of water so my clothes can be boiled to kill the lice," he said, "and put on another one so I can have hot water to bathe, but don't touch me or my clothes until we are sure the last of the lice are dead." As soon as he was clean and had on clean clothes, there was rejoicing such as they had never seen before.

Sam resumed the duties of running the farm, but he also learned to make brick, run a sawmill, and build houses. He taught his younger brother, David King Cecil, all these things, and they became proficient at the art of making brick, carpentry, and bricklaying. So great was the need for houses and buildings that Sam married, left the farm, and moved to Lexington to become a contractor.

On 5 Jan. 1871 Sam married Cornelia Rosette Burke, dau. of John and Caroline Spach Burke of the Friedburg Moravian Church community. He built a 2-story house in Lexington, on what is now E. Center St., and there he and his wife settled down to the task of making a living and rearing their 9 children: John Richard, b. 18 Nov. 1871, d. 2 May 1958, married Mary Eliza (Molly) Yarbro; Henry Lafayette, b. 19 Feb. 1874, d. 22 June 1951, married Amanda Jones; Fannie Catherine Elizabeth, b. 14 Aug. 1876, d. 3 Jan. 1877; Eliza Clementine Rebecca, b. 25 Jan. 1878, d. 12 Apr. 1969, married Thomas Shell Eanes.

Ida Magdelene, b. 17 July 1880, married Walter W. Poole; Minnie Lee, b. 24 Dec. 1882, married Vander J. Yelvington; Samuel Grover, b. 3 Mar. 1885, d. 1902; Sally Victoria, b. 19 Sept. 1887, d. 3 Aug. 1890; Susan Ellard, b. 2 Jan. 1890, married Ed Troy Miller.

Grover died of small pox at age 17. He was placed in a pesthouse located not far from where the Lexington Senior High School is now. Snow was on the ground, but Grover managed to get out of the pesthouse and crawled to his father's home on E. Center St. He was taken back to the pesthouse where he died shortly afterward from exposure and smallpox.

When my grandfather moved to Lexington from the Mt. Olivet church community, he and his wife joined the First Methodist church. He sang in the choir, was a great supporter of the church, and brought up his children in it.

My grandmother died 20 Aug. 1894 after a long illness.

Grandpa was a big, strong, hard working man. He ran a brickyard, a sawmill, farmed, and built houses. Not at different times, mind you; he did this kind of work every day. The lumber he sawed and the brick he made went into the houses he built, plus selling to other builders. Two kinds of brick were made: a soft, unfired brick baked by the sun and used for the inner walls and a hard brick fired in a kiln and used on the outside of the houses.

Not only was Samuel L. Cecil a big man in stature, he was big of heart as well. A man of integrity!

My great grandfather, George Koonts, Sr., 9 Jan. 1806, was the son of Michael Koonts nd his 1st wife. He m. 7 Apr. 1830 Mary Polly" Leonard and had 9 children, the 4th eing my grandfather, George Koonts, Jr., b. 2 Aug. 1945.

At the age of 19, Grandfather Koonts George, Jr.) fought in Gen. Robert E. Lee's rmy in the Civil War. He was captured and eld prisoner on an island for a year. He was escued 6 months after the war.

He m. 4 Dec. 1866 Elizabeth Lanning, and schildren, the third being my father, Mack m. You Mary Bessie Sink and had 7 boys and 2 irls. I am the oldest girl.

Life was not easy as we know it today. The seople lived mainly off the land. Farming was lone with horses and mules. A reaping nachine and cradle were used for grains. Ither tools used were scythes, axes, crosscut

saws, which was a long saw with 2 wooden handles for 2 people to push and pull back and forth.

Homes were heated and meals cooked by open fires, and later, wood heaters. Straw and hay were stacked on piles with a pole in the middle, known as hay stacks. Milk and butter were kept cool in a spring house, which was a covering over a spring, with a box, letting the cool water run around the milk crocks. They hunted wildlife for meat until cattle and hogs were domesticated. The mode of travel was walking, unless it was too far, then, horse and buggy. Wagons were also used. Later, came the Model-T Ford.

The people believed in education as is indicated by all the schools built. Some of the schools I remember my father naming, were the Michael or Livengood School, the Durham Schoolhouse, the Fords School — later known as the Berrier Schoolhouse — Beaver Dam and Shiloh Academy. About all the books used in the one room log schoolhouse were the Blue-Back Spelling Book, and Reading and Arithmetic. Later the people of Reeds formed a new district and the Beaver Dam School was moved to the north side of Indian Grave Branch. About 10 years later (1903) 2 districts, Happy Hill and Turpentine, combined and built a new school near the center of the district. It was a 1 room school, with another room added later. It was called Happy Hill School and is where I remember attending school.







RICHARD YARBOROUGH b. 1615 England - d. 1702 Virginia

Richard Yarborough, the earliest known Yarbrough immigrant, was born in England. Unite his place of birth has not yet been established by records, it is believed that he was from Lincolnshire.


"Richard Yarbrough, an Englishman" is listed as one of the founders of Bristol Parish In-1642. It is believed that Richard came to Virginia sometime between 1635 - 1640.

Pamunkey Neck Claims show that between 1677 - 1679 Richard Yarborow leased a tract of land from the Pamunkey Indians. The exact quantity is not listed, but he sold over 3,450 acres to various people shortly thereafter and records prove that he still held several large tracts.

Tradition says that Richard had the following children: Richard, Jr., John, Thomas, William, Charles, Edward, Henry, James, Ann and Frances. Only two, Richard, Jr. and John have been conclusively proven by records.

During his life, records prove that Richard was a successful tobacco farmer, served his country as an interpreter for treaty negotiations with the Indians, and was an able seamen on Yarborough's Ferry located on the Mattapony River.

The exact date of Richard's death is unknown. His tombstone shows the year as 1702. A land patent granted to William Morris on April 1, 1702 describes the land as "bounded by said William Morris and Mr. Richard Yarbrough." This indicates Richard's death was after April 1, 1702.

The first Koonts to settle in this community was John Koonts. He came from Penn. and lived in Monkey Bottom West of W. Center St. Ext. He fought in the Revolutionary War and had an honorable discharge. John had a son Mike Koonts; Mike had a son George I, who had a son George II. George II fought in the Civil War and received an honorable discharge. George II was b. 12 Aug. 1845, d. 22 Aug. 1931. He m. Elizabeth Koonts, and both are bur. in Beulah UCC Cem.

To this union 6 children were born: John, Ross, Mack, Bertie Koonts Sink, Virginia, and Bannie Koonts Koonts. George Koonts II lived in the Happy Hill community in a 2-story log house, the kitchen separate from the main house. They had a well and an ice house and a pond that froze over in the wintertime, and they would cut chunks of ice and put in the ice house for summer use.

Jacob Ross Koonts was b. 28 Feb. 1874, d. 12 Feb. 1928, m. 17 Mar. 1898 Celia Leonard, b. 4 Oct. 1878, d. 29 July 1969. Both are bur. at Shiloh United Meth. Church.

Ross Koonts was a hard-working farmer raising a variety of crops: tobacco, cotton, corn and sweet potatoes. His wife Celia, dau. of Casper (Cap) Leonard, was reared in the Happy Hill community. Casper was b. 16 Dec. 1839 and met with a tragic death 4 Jan. 1896. He was killed by runaway horses.

Casper Leonard was m. 1) 13 Feb. 1866 to Susannah Myers and had a son Robert (Bob). He was m. 2) to Susan Bailey Hill of Davie Co. who had 2 children by a former marriage: John Hill and Eliza Hill Cope.

Casper and Susan Baily Hill Leonard had 5 children: Lucy Leonard m. Phillip Koonts; Annie Leonard m. Charles Lanning; Celia Leonard m. Jacob Ross Koonts; Jackson Leonard m. Laura Frances Koonts; and Lindsay Leonard m. Celia Koonts.

AUGUSTIN WASHINGTON MINOR

Augustin Washington Minor, b. 26 Nov. 1818, in the vicinity of Reed's Meeting House, was the middle of the 15 children of Paschal Minor and Mary "Polly" Helmstetler. He was n. 18 Aug. 1842, in Davidson Co. by Andrew Swicegood, JP, to Elizabeth Trantham, dau. of loseph Trantham and Sarah "Sallie" Michael.

Less than a year later this young couple, along with her parents and several other families from Davidson Co., left Lexington on 18 April 1843, arriving at Springfield, Mo. on 4 luly.

The trip west has been described as hard and dangerous at best. Three of Elizabeth rantham Minor's young brothers and sisters lied being bur, at some point on the trail. The irid of Augustin and Elizabeth Minor, Mary, was b. 10 June 1843, in the one-horse wagon. Other members of the wagon train had continued on their journey after the Minors had stopped for the birth but waited for the young amily in III. and all crossed the Miss. into Moogether.

On 4 July they arrived at Springfield, Mo., and after a brief stop came to Sand Springs in Vebster Co., camping in a tent until a house

floor, no nails being used in its construction. The boards were held on the roof by weight poles. Door shutters were made of boards as long as the door was wide and fastened on frames with wooden pins, edges of boards lapped weatherboard fashion. Nearly all implements of industry were home-made and very clumsy and crude looking.

Pitchforks were only forked sticks, dirt shovels were broad boards cut at one end so as to make a handle while the other was left broad. Augustin made a "truck wagon" by cutting wheels from a large sycamore log. He did a great deal of hauling with this primitive vehicle. Almost every article of clothing was manufactured at home. Game was plentiful and the range unbounded.

A family history written by Franklin A. Minor, son of Augustin and Elizabeth Minor, states that his father was "a man of great nerve, possessing all the characteristics of a

pioneer.'

Greene Co., Mo. was divided leaving the Minor family in that portion which became Webster. Augustin was justice of the peace for some years before the Civil War and was elected Co. Judge following that conflict. The Minors were members of Timber Ridge Bapt. Church, near Marshfield, Mo. from its founding and contributed land for Minor School which stood in Ozark Twp. for many years.

Augustin Minor and his sons Franklin, Wesley, and William were members of the Union Army during the War and one of the sons, William, was killed at the Battle of Pine Bluff, Ark. After the War, "Gustie" Minor came back to Webster Co. where he d. 10 July 1903, blind and full of years. Elizabeth, his wife, had preceded him in death, on 20 Jan. 1900. Both are bur. at Timber Ridge Cem., near many of the other pioneers from Davidson Co. who went west.

The Minors were the parents of 9 children: Mary, William H., John Wesley, Franklin Addison, Sarah L., Henry M., Emily C., Ellen C., and George Washington Lafayette Minor.

Paschal Minor arrived in Rowan Co. from Va. c1807. Family records indicate that he was b. there, and the Davidson Cò. census of 1840 indicates that he was b. between 1780 and 1790. Tradition is that he was indentured after the death of his parents, that he ran away from his master, and that he was later given a liberal education by a kind aunt. One extant letter written from Davidson Co. in 1844 to his son Augustin Minor in Pleasant Prairie, Mo. shows him to have been a polished writer of English, perhaps tending to confirm the tradition that he was a man of more than average education for the time.

Paschal m. Mary "Polly" Helmstetler, eldest dau. of Peter Helmstetler and Nancy Vannoy, by 1808. To this marriage were b. 15

children: William, Nelson, Elizabeth, Mary "Polly", Matilda, John, Zebulon, Augustin Washington, Rachel, an unnamed infant, Emily, America, Phoebe, Susan, and Paschal Jr.

The Minors lived near Reed's Meeting House, and all the children were b. there. Paschal Minor, Mrs. Polly Minor, Polly Minor Jr. (sic), Zebulin Minor, and Matilda Minor were among those who were converted and granted membership at Reed's Bapt. in 1834. Shortly thereafter Rachel Minor joined the church "by experience."

An interesting incident involving one of the Minors was recounted by Garland A. Hendricks in Saints and Sinners at Jersey Settlement. "Robert Durham accused Zebulin Minor of saying that Durham kept a disorderly house. The charge was investigated and discussed in church conference each month until in Mar. 1839 Mr. Minor admitted 'that he did speak words which, if true, would reflect disgrace on Brother Durham's house.' The following month, after a committee of five had investigated further, Zebulin Minor was excluded from the fellowship of the church." Zebulon Minor was possibly the Z. Minor on the 1850 Randolph Co. census.

By 1850 Paschal Minor had d. and Mary Minor, age 63, b. in N. C., appeared on the Rowan Co. census. With her were her youngest children: Phoebe, 23; Susan, 19; Paschal, 18. By 1860 Mary "Polly" Minor was no longer on the census and was apparently

dead.

The 3 youngest Minor children m. in Rowan Co.: Susan J. m. 17 Apr. 1856 Bernard Connelly; Phoebe m. 28 Aug. 1869 George A. Hoffner; Paschal R. m. 1) 3 May 1853 Mary Lentz, m. 2) 2 May 1857, Catherine A. Hill. He d. 9 July 1858 in Salisbury and is bur. with his first wife at the Lutheran Cem. His widow, Catherine H. Minor, m. 21 June 1859, Henry Caudle in Rowan Co.

Elizabeth Minor m. Richmond Matteau of Fork Twp., Davie Co. He was half Cherokee and d. 1843/4 of pleurisy. They had 2 children: Franklin Matteau, who d. of scarlet fever about the same time as his father; and Susan Matteau m. Pleasant Helfer who was killed in the Civil War. Following his death she m. a Mr. Waitman and had 4 sons. After Helfer's death, Susan lived with David Gobble, although they apparently never married. Susan, David Gobble, and her mother, Elizabeth went to Mo. after the war. They were in the same household on the 1870 Ozark Twp., Webster Co. census. Both Gobble and Elizabeth d. before 1890, the year in which Susan Matteau Helfer was murdered and her house burned with the corpse in it at Ozark Twp. The murder is still remembered there, and some elderly residents remember their parents blaming it on a son-inlaw who was disliked by Susan.

🖟 daddy, Robert Franklin (Rob) Snider, b. 20 Sept. 1886 in Davidson Co. to John Henderson and Sarah Jane Lomax Snider, was a bro. of William Lindsay, Henry Lee, Charles Henderson, James Anderson, Amanda Jane (Mrs. Albert) Yarbrough and Mary Elizabeth (Mrs. Lindsay) Beck. The homeplace and land is presently owned by direct descendants.

Daddy was a self-educated man and was a great asset and inspritation in helping his children achieve their education. Daddy, his parents, his 4 bros. and 1 sister are bur. in Davidson Co. at Churchland. His sister Mary still survives.

Daddy was a farmer but in early marriage did sawmill work. This took him away from home, leaving mother to take care of the children and grow vegetables to peddle and help with home expenses. The money Daddy made was used to pay the mortgage on the farm.

In June, 1921 Daddy and Mother lost their home by fire. They lost everything in the house except a few items. A piano was saved when 2 neighbors carried it from the house. When they rebuilt, it took 6 men to carry the same piano into the new house. Mother had 30 beautiful quilts that burned. She had always so it the best for guests, but the fire taught

Sweet potatoes were grown on the farm and as 3000 bu. a Daddy would grow as many as 3000 bu. a year. He would bed several hundred bushels to sell potato plants in the spring. The money from the plants was used to purchase tractors and other equipment for the farm, pay expenses, and help to supply furnishings for the home.

vegetables and animals were raised to feed the family. Vegetables, fruit, and meat were canned and dried for winter use. Quilts were made for our beds and most of the clothing for the family as very few clothing items were bought. Daddy even put new soles on the children's shoes.

Our delight, expecially in summer, was stopping the ice truck on Saturday evening for ice to make ice cream. We had a 2 gai. freezor and would sometimes make 2 freezors and none would be left. We played lots of games that Daddy taught us. Our parents often joined us in playing, thus enabling them to teach us to prepare ourselves for future years. Every summer Daddy would take us camping. One year we went to the Atlantic Ocean which was really a treat. Our lives revolved around church, school and farm, leaving me with many preclous memories of my childhood.

Needless to say, Idalia was right there with her support and hard work.
