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HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL NATIONAL YARBROUGH CONFERENCE HELD IN ST. LOUIS
DEDICATED TO ROBERT PRICE YARBROUGH, FOUNDER OF FAMILY GROUP,
1988 MEETING TO BE HELD IN MEMPHIS, TENNESSEE

Missouri, Tennessee and Texas led the delegate count at the high-
ly successful National Yarbrough Conference held in St. Louis on
August 7, 8 and 9, 1987.

Other states represented in the 168 total attendance included
Alabama, Arizona, California, Georgia, Illinois, Iowa, Florida,
Kentucky, Louisiana, Michigan, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Penn-
sylvania, Utah, Virginia and Washington.

The 1988 NYC will be held in August in Memphis, TN, with Phil and
Mary Yarbrough, 2023 Leichester, Zip 38134, as hosts.

The St. Louis conference was dedicated to the memory of Robert Price
Yarbrough of Charlotte, NC, founder of NYC, who died in July while
planning this year's session. Charles H. Yarbrough eulogized "The Father
of the NYC" at the Saturday night Family Banquet.

Former U.S. Senator Ralph W. Yarborough of Austin, TX, addressed the
banquet on "three family myths and their explanations." As chairman
of a new Yarbrough Historical Monuments and Places committee, Senator
Yarborough discuss Yarbrough Inlet which was about to be dropped from
maps of the north shore of Alaska. Also on the new committee is Lt.
General William Yarborough of North Carolina.

Others on the program were Allen Yarbrough, board chairman; Frances
Ann Yarbrough and Alfred Yarbrough, of Memphis, TN; Karen Mazock, Virginia;
and Arlene Weidinger, who with her mother, May Y. Sidney, were con-
ference hosts.

The board of directors were re-elected with Mrs. Jane Yarbrough named
to the post of her late husband. Mrs. Frances Lockwood of Texas and
Roger Yarbrough of Illinois were elected as new voting board members.
John H. Yarborough of Texas joined his uncle, Senator Yarborough, his
father, Donald Y., and brother, Bill Y., as honorary board members.
Alfred Yarbrough was re-named board secretary.

Genealogy workshops and research sessions were held around the clock
Friday and Saturday. A hospitality room enjoyed by family members and
children and a well attended farewell breakfast Sunday were also fea-
tures.

ernor and Speaker of the House.



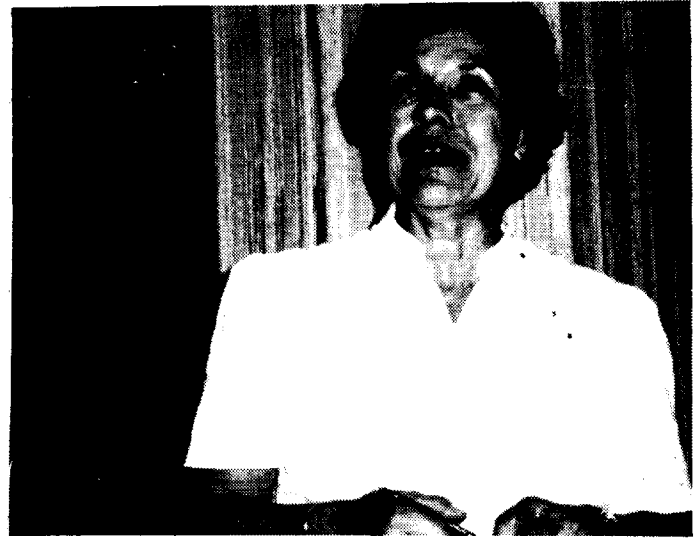

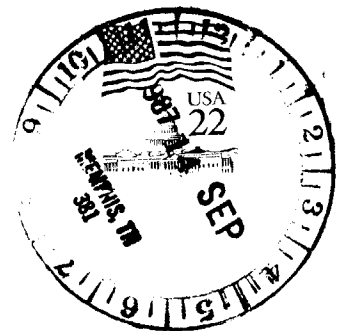

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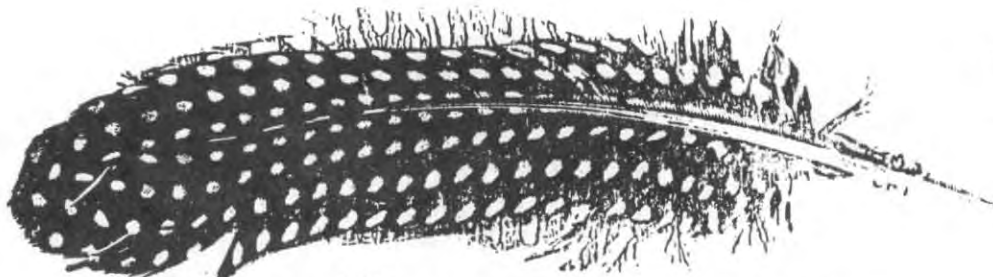

EULOGY FOR

ROBERT "BOB" PRICE YARBROUGH
 31 October 1911 - 10 July 1987

It is with great sadness and heavy hearts that we dedicate the 1987 National Yarbrough Conference to Robert Price Yarbrough, known affectionately to us all as "Bob".

Bob was born 31 October 1911, in Meridian, Mississippi, the son of Robert Earl and Susie Bell (Price) Yarbrough. He died in Charlotte, North Carolina 10 July 1987. Bob married the former Jane Bair, a marriage that was filled with love and laughter for 45 years. To this union were born three children: Robert Ted Yarbrough and daughters Pat Beckner and Linda McCannell.

It is no secret that Bob was a favorite of the Yarbrough family ... a "cousin" to all of us. And, each of us carries within our heart a special memory.

He always had a compliment for the ladies and could be called a southern gentlemen in the truest definition of the word.

He was an entertainer. His family remembers well his attempt to clog-dance at an office Christmas party. His larger family gathered here at the conference remembers well his jokes and entertaining talks.

He was a rescuer. Even though he didn't like cats at all, he climbed up a ladder, maybe 30 feet, resting on a tree to rescue his mother-in-law's cat --- only to have to bring the darned thing down with its claws firmly planted in his chest. More importantly, he was a rescuer of people. Anyone who ever turned to Bob with a problem knows

Mr. Robert Price Yarbrough, age 75, of 3358 Willow Oak Road, Charlotte, died Friday, July 10, 1987, at Presbyterian Hospital, due to heart failure.

Mr. Yarbrough was born October 31, 1911 in Meridian, MS, son of the late Robert Earl Yarbrough and Susie Belle Price Yarbrough. Mr. Yarbrough served in the United States Navy during World War II. After moving from Atlanta to Charlotte, he became associated with Wearn Lumber Company, where he worked for 38 years, retiring in 1977 as General Manager. He



helped organize the Carolinas Chapter of the National Architectural Millwork Association, of which he was an honorary lifetime member. He was a member of the Dilworth Rotary Club. After retirement, he wrote a book on the Yarbrough genealogy. Mr. Yarbrough organized the first National Yarbrough Conference in Petersburg, VA, and hosted the Fourth National Conference in Charlotte in 1986. He was a charter member and Deacon of Park Road Baptist Church and later transferred his membership to Avondale Presbyterian Church. Mr. Yarbrough was married to the former Jane Bair of Atlanta, GA, for 45 years. Surviving, besides his wife, are one son, Robert Ted Yarbrough; two daughters, Pat Beckner and Linda McCannell; three grandchildren, Rob Yarbrough, Lisa Yarbrough, and Scott McCannell, all of Charlotte. A memorial service will be at 11:00 AM Monday, July 13, from Avondale Presbyterian Church, conducted by Dr. C. Frank Jacks, Interim Minister. Interment services will follow at Sharon Memorial Park. Friends may send memorials to the American Heart Association, 1300 Baxter Street, Charlotte, NC 28204, or to Avondale Presbyterian Church, 2821 Park Road, Charlotte, NC 28209. Members of the Dilworth Rotary Club will serve as honorary pallbearers. The family will receive friends at their residence, 3358 Willow Oak Road. that it was met with sympathy and empathy. He was the kind of friend you didn't have to ask for help -- he knew what you needed and was there with it before you called. Anyone who needed genealogical information on the family received immediate responses and he shared all he had gladly. When a missing link was discovered, no one shared the joy with you more than Bob.

He was hopeful. He never gave up. During his last days he vowed that he would get to this conference if he had to "walk barefooted over broken beer bottles." It was Bob who was putting the program together; Bob who saw that the "clans" stayed together after Charles died; Bob always encouraging, smiling, and letting the rest of us know that this wonderful family would always be a unit.

He was fearless. His family tells of a time at the beach when the whole family was gathered on the porch, watching him walk along the shore with lightning touching down all around him. Nothing would keep him from something he wanted to do.

As a son, Bob was devoted and caring. As a husband, he loved and was loved. As a father he was gentle and proud. As a grandfather -- well, he bragged a little! But, it is his role as a "cousin" to all of us for which we pay special tribute to him tonight.

In the Spring of 1980, while researching for his book, Yarborough, Bob discovered that our earliest immigrant, Richard Yarborough, was resting beneath a tombstone that had been erroneously corrected to read Richard "Scarborough". Now, Bob was proud of his name and heritage and this was enough to incite a year long battle to get this corrected. In the process, he got the Yarboroughs all across the nation active in the battle. The late Charles David Yarborough, Editor of Yarborough Family Magazine, kept everyone abreast of this battle. Cousins contributed to the fund for the correction. Other cousins, Edwin Yarborough, Charles Hill Yarborough, and Allen Yarborough, to name just a few, joined the battle ... and in June, 1981, a corrected plaque was placed at our immigrant's grave.

But, all across the nation Yarboroughs wanted to gather to have a dedication ceremony. It came together ... it was held in Petersburg, Virginia August 14 and 15, 1982 ... and this was the first Yarborough National Conference. As you know, it was such a success, that it is now held annually.

Bob's love for all the Yarborough "clans" (as he always called us) and his selfless devotion to the correction of a tombstone were the very basis and roots of our National Yarborough Conferences. So, we say:

Kneel before us, Robert. Price Yarborough, in your spirit presence and in the memories within our hearts. With not the royal sword in the ways of our ancestors, but rather with the gentle touch of family love, we dub thee Sir Robert Yarborough, father of the National Yarborough Conferences -- those past, this one tonight, and those yet to come.

We miss you, our very dear friend. We miss you.



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POSTAL SERVICE FILES AGAINST BOGUS GENEALOGY MAIL OFFER

The National Genealogical Society reported that the U.S. Postal Service filed a complaint against American Genealogies Inc. and a number of associated companies and individuals.

The complaint focuses on the mailing of computer-generated post cards offering "your last opportunity" to purchase a family history, \$29.95. The Postal Service is accusing American Genealogies of misrepresenting the service it provides.

During the inquiry, it was determined that many of the people involved in the company also were part of Beatrice Bailey Inc. which was closed last year by the Postal Service. 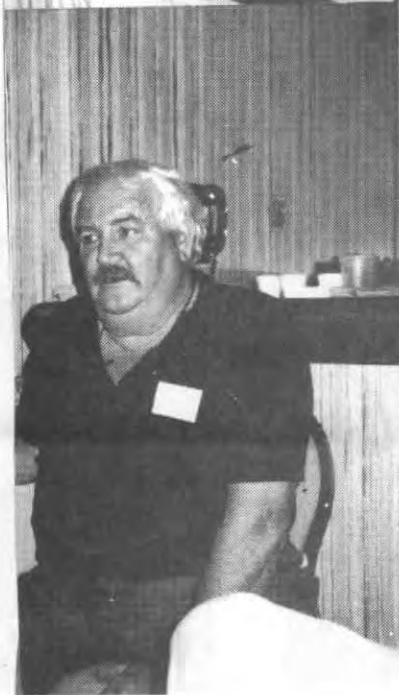

A new 1988 Yarbrough Family Directory is being prepared by Mrs. Frances M. Lockwood of Comanche, Texas. Frances is a new National Yarbrough Conference director and a longtime family genealogist.

Mrs. Lockwood took on the directory assignment at the St. Louis NYC in August of this year and has completed work sheets on the first phase of the important and helpful document.

The current work sheets include all known Yarbrough researchers (all spellings) listed alphabetically by states. The listing permits each state member to know of others in the same locale.

The "by-state" listing will also include the researchers latest mailing address, earliest authenticated ancestor, his or her birth year and state, and death year and state. Ancestor marriages are also noted when known. "As with all directories," Mrs. Lockwood writes, "it will be difficult to keep the data current, so this one is dated January 1988 and when the need arises for revision a new date should be added."

An alphabetical listing of names and address will also be included in the directory. Other cross reference features are being considered. Information for the director can be sent directly to Mrs. Lockwood, P.O. Box 722, Comanche, TX 76442, or included in correspondence to news sheet editor Charles H. Yarbrough. Early action will assure inclusion of information in the directory sections.

The price of the directory will be determined by publication and distribution costs. It will be offered everyone either by mail or in person at the yearly family conferences. Any proceeds will be used toward conference related expenses and to help defray costs of the news sheet publication.

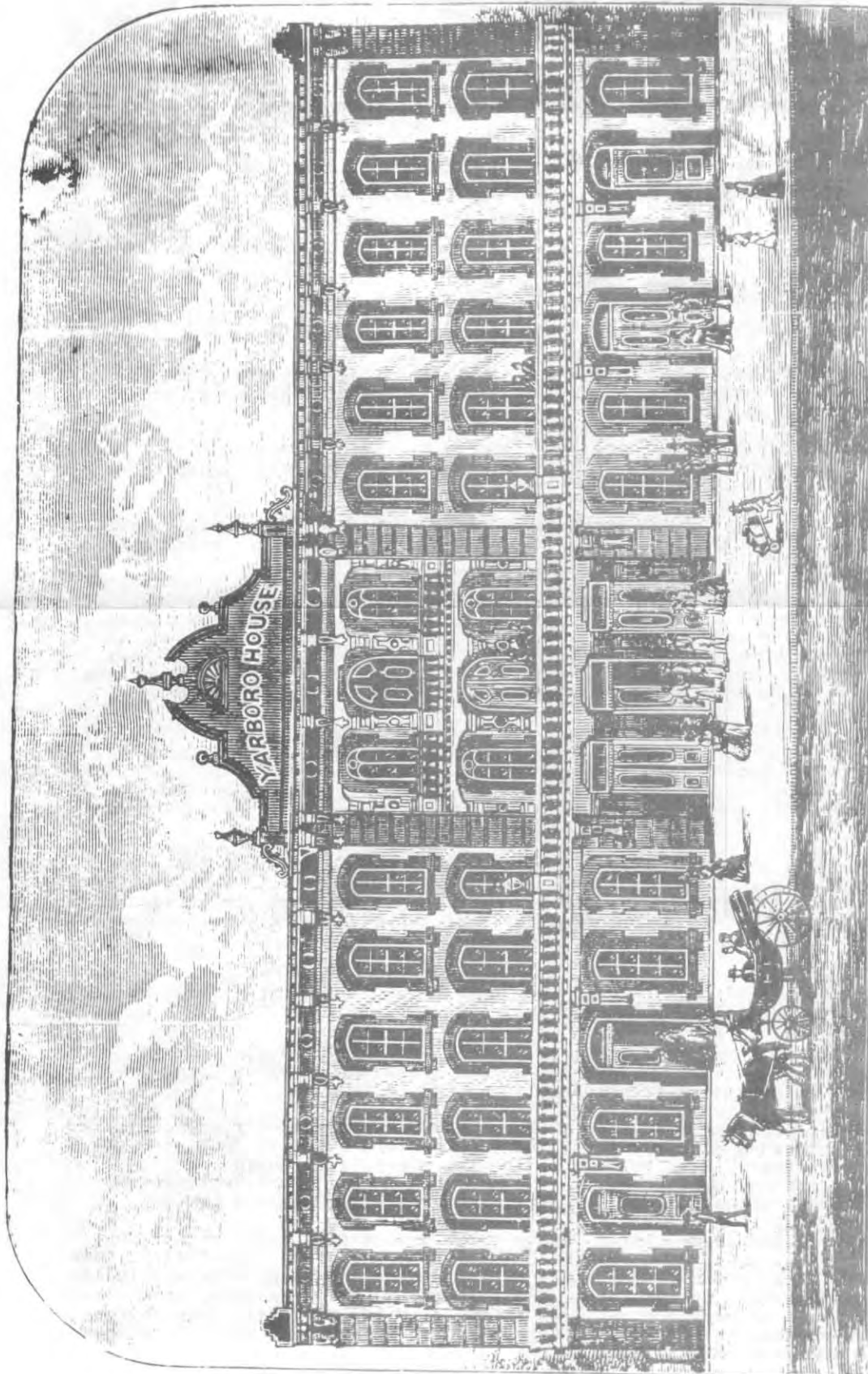
MORMAN LIBRARY COMPUTER SHEETS INCLUDED TO HELP

Computer print-out sheets relating to information on Yarbroughs placed in the Church of Latter Day Saints, Mormon, Salt Lake City, Utah, are presented in this edition to help family members in research.

The sheets appearing include the states of North Carolina and Virginia and include keys to what descendants of these early Yarbroughs in America have provided the library. Keys to interpreting the sheets also appear. It is assumed that if the name, numbers and codes on the sheets are provided the Mormon library a print-out could be obtained. There is likely a charge.

The sheets were provided Charles Yarbrough by an independant hired researcher, Lola L. Sorensen, A.G., 5518 Revere Drive, Salt Lake City, Utah 84117. (Her 1980 address.) Mrs. Sorensen may still be for hire or could provide researcher names. Kinswoman Mrs. Evelyn Goble, who with her husband, Kenneth, have devoted many years of research and work at the library, might also advise family members seeking to hire a Salt Lake City researcher. The Gobles' address is 3053 S. 800 West, Magda, UT 84044.

A tile dressing room floor in a Belk's store is said to be all that's left of the Grand Hotel.

YARBORO HOUSE of Raleigh, North Carolina, had a history of outstanding hostelry service to national, state and military leaders of the country. Owned and operated by a Yarbboro family associated with public houses and inns in Colonial Days, the Raleigh house was built before the War Between the States and was in continuous operations until 1928 when it was destroyed by fire. The House was host to many Confederate States

TYLER, TEXAS, SETTLED, PLANNED AND STILL HOME OF MANY YARBROUGHS

Smith County Historical Society's Newsletter, Tyler, Texas, reports that, "Another early Tyler division was platted by George Yarbrough in 1885. The Yarbrough addition consisted of 28 blocks bounded by Houston, Broadway, Rusk and Augusta Streets. The lots were larger in size and more expensive than other subdivisions of the day and encouraged a wealthier neighborhood." The article also related "George Adams platted a small addition of 28 lots in 1887, and in 1888 H.H. Rowland platted his first addition of 21 blocks" Gerry Weyer of Route 1, Morgan, Utah, a descendant of famed Texan Swanson Yarbrough, who submitted the Tyler sheet, writes: "George Y. was descended from Zachariah Y. b. 1729 Davidson Co. NC, d. 1775, m. Elizabeth Dowd. Believe he was in the California Gold Rush, also a silent partner in a Confederate munition factory at Tyler. You know they had a Confederate POW Camp at Tyler."

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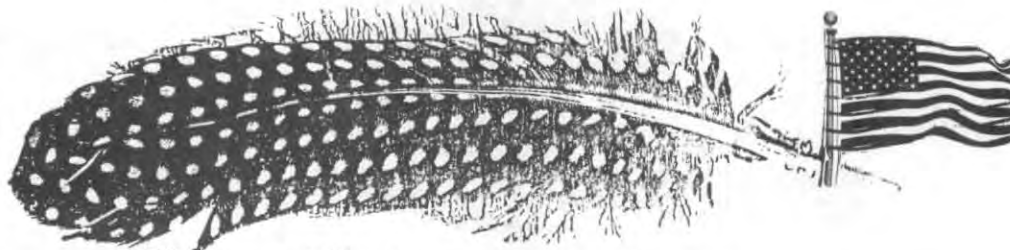

Tentative and near confirmed dates for the 1988 National Yarbrough Conference are for the last weekend of July, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, July 29, 30 and 31, 1988.

Memphis, Tennessee, hosts and directors of the '88 NYC, Phil and Mary Yarbrough, announced that the dates are almost a certainty, permitting family and related family members who plan to attend to set vacation times. The earlier date will not conflict with the many family educators' school schedules as the August dates of the past had.

**KINSMAN AND FORMER SENATOR RALPH W. YARBOROUGH IS RECUPERATING AT
AUSTIN, TEXAS, HOME AFTER EXTENSIVE HEART SURGERY AT CHRISTMAS TIME**

Yarbrough kinsman, patriarch and former U.S. Senator Ralph W. Yarbrough is recuperating at his Austin, Texas, home after extensive heart surgery on December 22, 1987. He was dismissed to his home at 2527 Jarratt AV, Austin, TX, 78703, on Tuesday, January 5.

The three-hour operation, performed by Dr. John "Chip" Oswalt of Austin at the Seton Medical Center, included an aortic valve replacement and a quadruple cardiac artery bypass. By Christmas Eve Senator Yarbrough was reported in stable condition and breathing on his own without mechanical assistance. On Sunday, December 27, Texas State Radio News Network and Comanche (Texas) TV reported "Yarbrough making steady progress and up walking about his room."

Frances Lockwood of Comanche, TX, kinswoman and NYC director, and John Yarbrough of Irvin, TX, nephew and honorary director, kept the news sheet editor advised. The editor learned of the illness through the nationwide broadcast of Paul Harvey, famous radio commentator of Chicago. Members of the Texas family gathered at the medical center in Austin during the operation and hospitalization.

The 84 year old Democrat seemed in vigorous health at recent appearances. His dark hair had finally turned silver, but he was ready to launch into a stam-winder at a moment's notice. Called "a true gentleman of the old school" by a kinsman, he had been the most welcomed and appreciated principal speaker at all five National Yarbrough Conferences, beginning with the first at Petersburg, Virginia, where the family honored the immigrant Richard Yarbrough. Conferences have been held at Nashville, TN, Fort Worth, Charlotte, NC, and St. Louis, with the 1988 session set for late July in Memphis, TN.

On December 17, Senator Yarbrough had attended Christmas parties given by the Texas AFL-CIO and the Texas Trial Lawyers Associations. He and his wife, Opal, had planned on going to Washington to spend Christmas with their daughter-in-law, Mrs. Ann Yarbrough, widow of their only son, Richard, and their grandchildren. The former senator usually works at his law office in Austin on Saturdays. Saturday the 19th he told his wife he didn't feel like going to the office, and at 1 p.m. she called the emergency vehicle to take him to the hospital. A spokesman was quoted saying "There was a question of whether he would pull through on Saturday night."

Yarbrough, a native of Chandler in East Texas, was the fiery leader of the liberal wing of the frequently feuding Democrats. He served in the U.S. Senate from 1957 to 1970, when he was defeated by Lloyd Bentsen Jr. He was the only southern senator to vote for the 1964 Civil Rights Act and was a champion of national food assistance programs.

Senator Yarbrough was chairman of the Senate Labor Committee and author of legislation that created the Padre Island National Seashore. He rode in the second car of the Dallas motorcade in which President John F. Kennedy was struck down by an assassin's bullets in November 1963. Yarbrough might have been riding in the car with Kennedy but for a long standing feud between Yarbrough and Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson and the Democratic Governor John B. Connally. The senator and his wife are affectionately known as "Uncle Ralph" and "Aunt Opal", endearments stemming from their nephew, the late Charles D. Yarbrough, founder and publisher of YARBROUGH FAMILY MAGAZINE, and a founder of NYC. "Uncle Ralph" loves his conference banquet subject, the Yarbrough Family. He is well versed in our English heritage, studying history and relics and having been a guest in the halls of the present day family English descendants. Too, he likes to explore and interpret the many myths and legends of the American Yarbrough Family as passed down by grandfathers and fathers.

The Yarbrough Family of the United States wish "Uncle Ralph" and "Aunt Opal" well.

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TRAVEL ALONG ON A VISIT TO HISTORIC YARBOROUGH, NOW YARBURGH, NEAR THE
MOUTH OF THE RIVER HUMBER IN ENGLAND'S LINCOLNSHIRE COUNTRYSIDE

An Atlanta Yarbrough "cousin" has generously shared his travels to historic Yarborough in Lincolnshire, England, with the Yarbroughs of America.

James T. Yarbrough, 180 N. Mill Road, N.W., Atlanta, GA 30328, visited "Yarburgh", modern day spelling, in 1986 and again in '87, and relates his findings in a letter to the editor, photographs, and copies of publications relating to the namesake village. He is a sales representative for Reed and Barton silversmiths in Atlanta as indicated in his interest in the Coconut cup from the Yarborough Hall at the Yarborough church. The cup story, photos and other material will appear in the News Sheets as space permits.

In way of introduction and explanation, James T. Yarbrough, writes:

"My first cousin, Thomas Curtis Yarbrough of Huntsville, AL, sent me copies of two maps of Lincolnshire that he obtained in England. Both of them show the location of the village bearing our family name. On Saxton's 1576 map of Lincolnshire the name is spelled "Yarborough". Current maps show it as "Yarburgh".

"I was in England in April of last year and again in May of this year and on both trips I paid a short visit to Yarburgh. Today, there isn't much there—a very old church, a few gravestones and perhaps a dozen houses. Yarburgh is located about 10 or 12 miles from Grimsley a city of 90,000 or 100,000 population that is near the mouth of the Humber River. Grimsley is the nearest train station to Yarburgh. While in Grimsley I had lunch in the Bull Ring Pub located in the basement of the Hotel Yarborough. It was interesting to note that the sign on the front of the building identified it as Hotel YARBOROUGH while on the rear of the building it is identified as the YARBORO Hotel.

"The Church in Yarburgh is the St. John the Baptist Church and is considered by the Church of England a redundant church. Although regular services are not conducted, they did have Easter Services there last year. The vicar in charge of the church apparently has several churches in the area. He is Rev. Ross Buckman, The Rectory, 27 Tinkle St., Grimsby, Lincolnshire, England, U.K. LN 11 87 SW. He also took me around the Church of Yarburgh (in Alvingham). Inside the church is a listing of all its Rectors. The fourth name on the list was Richard of Yarborough who was rector in 1335. The Yarborough coat of arms is on an interior wall of the church.

"I've enclosed a (poor) copy of an old newspaper or magazine article that was sent to me by Mrs. Evelyn Spall of Grimsley (whose mother was a Yarbrough) that may prove interesting if you can decipher it. Mrs. Spall's daughter Tracey works in the Grimsley public library and apparently found the article in the library's records. With regards to the Coconut cup mentioned in the article, it is no longer in the church at Yarburgh but is in the Treasury of Lincoln Minster. Rev. Buckman arranged for me to see it.

"Although there is not a single Yarbrough (all spellings) in the London telephone book, the name appears often in Lincoln and throughout Lincolnshire. In addition to the Yarborough Cup, Lincoln Minster has a Yarborough window. In Lincoln there is a Yarbrough School, Yarborough Street, etc. While in Lincoln, I stayed at the White Hart and noticed a brass plaque that identified the Yarborough Room where Winston Churchill conceived the idea for the battle tank during World War I.

"I've enclosed prints of some of the photos I took while in the area near Yarburgh. You are more than welcome to use any or all of them. Why I failed to take a picture of the Yarborough Cup, I don't know. I have, however, enclosed a copy of a photograph of a similar cup. The Yarborough Cup has a rather crude engraving of the family arms on its base. If there were assay marks, makers marks or a year mark, I couldn't find them. The absence of these marks is unusual for English silver. Perhaps it is of provincial origin.

"My wife and I hope to be at the Memphis NYC and will be looking forward to seeing you at that time. Yours truly, Jim."

The Story of the Marsh

TWIXT THE WOLDS AND THE SEA

VII - HISTORIC YARBOROUGH

Coming up towards Yarborough from the direction of Grainthorpe and entering on the last half mile of straight road of that stretch, the writer, with shades of evening fast gathering around saw this picture. There had been heavy rains and the long ruts in the roadway were filled with rain water which was lighted in a pearly grey by the rays of the weak December sun that was setting over the wolds, hardly piercing the clouds that rode high above the hills. Near at hand, on the left in a half ploughed field rested a deserted plough, and far ahead on the road there toiled toward the village and its old sandstone tower the bent figure of an aged man in a grey slop, the only human being in sight with the exception of the writer of these lines. The picture might have been typically called by the name of "Eventide" were it not for the fact that countless paintings and sketches have already received the same title. Wending their way overhead and seaward bound were a party of white broad-winged gulls, away to the left, an easy five miles off, the slender spire of Louth Church tapered toward the sky and to the rear that of South Somercotes was melting in the night, as was the high tower of Granthorpe, further away still and just clear of a picturesque farmstead. Across the great expanse overhead, and at a considerable height, were many black specks and the ear, rather than the eye of the observer proclaimed these to be rocks making westward the only swiftly moving creatures in "all nature's wonderland of evening and of the darkening sky and earth. Aloft and above peace was settling upon everything like a balm. The falling light hid nothing that was beautiful, while it softened or blended into harmony many harsher features of the near landscape. Toward the setting sun and the venerable tower of Yarborough Church the old man was still toiling. It only needed the curfew to toll to realize Longfellow's poem. And yet it was a poem—a Lincolnshire poem, a Marsh poem—in itself.

THE OLD CHURCH

The church at Yarborough stands boldly at the corner of the road which, coming from Louth or from Alvingham, as you chose, goes straight ahead to the Covenham or turns sharply to the right for Grainthorpe. Its great tower is green hued in places and all around are evidences of its age, adding to the character and effect of the exterior. The dedication is to St. John the Baptist and the church which is of stone in the perpendicular style consists of a chancel and nave with a north aisle and a south porch with old embattled western tower on which (... might be ivy thrives chy) The church has numerous interesting features. On the spandrils of the west door are representations of the "Fall of Man" incased by shallow lines in the stone. The arch has a hollow moulding with a wreath of foliage and flowers running through it— a very beautiful piece of work. The church, which was restored in the year 1855, has seating for 180 worshippers. The register dates from the year 1516, and the living is a discharge rectory, of the net, yearly value of 180 (pounds?) derived from 235 acres of "Glebe" with residence according to Kelly and held since the year 1906 by the Rev. Robert Willan, M.A. of Lincoln College, Oxford.

Next the Coconut Cup and other Yarborough Church "plate" from the 13th to the 17th centuries.
