FORMER ALABAMA STATE SENATOR GEORGE WASHINGTON YARBROUGH DIES AT 96, WAS FAMED FAMILY GENEALOGIST AND EDUCATOR WHO COULD TRACE LINEAGE DIRECTLY IO RICHARD YARBOROUGH THE EMIGRANT TO VIRGINIA IN 1600S

Senator George Washington Yarbrough of Mobile, Alabama, died on Monday, February 29, 1988. He was ninety six.

Senator Yarbrough, famed family genealogist and educator, was the last of his father's family of seven sons and two daughters. He was able to authenicate his family line back to Richard Yarborough the first Yarborough emigrant to America, landing in the Virginia Colony some 40 years after the Pilgrims.

Funeral services and burial for Senator Yarbrough were held March 2, 1988, in Mobile, with burial in Pinehurst Cemetery, Mobile. He is survived by his wife of 64 years, Thelma Stacey Yarbrough, and his daughter, Emilu Y. Gray, both of whom live in Mobile. Senator Yarbrough had lived in retirement with his family many years. He was always happy to talk family and genealogy, but after years of research, public writing and contributions to journals and studies, kindly refused answering queries by correspondence. The late Charles David Yarborough of YARBOROUGH FAMILY MAGAZINE spent an afternoon with the Senator on a southern tour several years ago.

George Washington Yarbrough was born on November 22, 1892, near Woodland, Randolph County, Alabama. He was educated in the public schools of Randolph County, Howard College, now Samford University; the University of Alabama with an MA Degree; and with studies in France. He served in the U.S. Armed Forces in France during the World War. The senator taught school many years, serving as principal of Wedowee High School in Randolph. Before retirement, he served in the Alabama Legislature as Senator from Randolph County.

Senator Yarbrough was the son of Lucindia Abigail Chaffin (1849-1940) and John Thomas Yarbrough (1850-1937), who was the of Eleanor Gentry (1801-1881) and William Y. (1800-1896), who was the son of Martha Harris (1770-1857) and Thomas Y. National Yarbrough Conferences' "YOUR DIRECTORY MARCH 1988" has been completed by Frances M. Lockwood, P.O. Box 722, Comanche, Texas 76442. The new NYC director accepted the directory project at the St. Louis conference last August, with the new booklet coming off the press in early March.

The directory may be obtained by those on the mailing list of the Interim News Sheet for YARBOROUGH FAMILY MAGAZINE by sending \$4.00 to Mrs. Lockwood or to Charles H. Yarbro, INS editor, at Route 1, Box 158 A, Tiptonville, TN 38079. The four dollars includes the envelope, postage and handling, with the reminder that postage rates will be going up in April.

The late Charles F. Yarborough of the YFM had an earlier, unbound version of the directory which listed alphabetically by states family researchers. The current bound directory includes family researches listed by states, their current addresses, their earliest known family ancestor, dates and earliest states. Efforts were made to include all researchers, and the directory will be updated and corrections made year by year. All errors and omissions are regreted.

The direcory has a cardstock cover of "Yarbrough Blue", is eight and one-half by 11 inches, 24 pages of descendants names and addresses listed aphabetically, plus a four page ancestor index.

Purchasers of the directories are urged to buy 1 for themselves and one for a relative for a gift. Also director owners are advised and warned to guard their directory from those unscroupulous outfits that prey on people interested in their family trees. There have been many in the past and another currently working on providing "family data" for a high fee. Usually these offers are outdated city and telephone directory lists, fattened up by general genealogy material and gussied up with an imitation cover with an embossed name.

Yarbroughs, all spelling and all related family members, should contact the National Yarbrough Conference on all offers and books of this nature. Members of the conference can usually verify the authenticty of family publications.

CHARLES H. YARBRO TRANSLATION: ROLL OF THE WAPENTAKE

An interesting article contributed to the same column by Mr. W.O. Massing-berd deals with a translation of a roll to the Wapentake of Yarborough, which is, he says, of a kind unique for Lincolnshire. The roll was found amongst the papers of the Rev. Weever Watler, Vicar of Bonby, a parish on the Wapentake of Yarbrough.

The date of the roll, proceeds Mr. Massingberd, "It's clearly temp. Edward I, and an entry under Stallingborough shows that King Henry was alive "three years past" so that it cannot be later than A.D. 1275. I make, therefore, the suggestion that it contains the original return of the jurors for the Wapentake from which the portion of the well known Hundreds Roll omit and at the same the compilers of the Hundred Rolls must have obtained some of their information from other sources, if I am right in my suggestion.

Lincolnshire was a land of small holdings. This is at once the interest and difficulty of our villages. Few even of the great in capite lords held a whole parish, under the King. As a rule there were two or three or more tenants in chief in a parish and under them a larger number of Knights and Gentlemen holding manors or considerable estates and under them larger number still of smaller freeholders in addition to the villiens. It is easy then, to confuse the different holdings, and very difficult to trace out the history of the different ---esaes.

This roll will helpmuch, if I mistaken not, as far as the large Wapentake of Yarborough is concerned, as for every parish, except I think, four for which the returns are lost. It gives the names of the tenant in chief, usually great barons and the names of those who had under them, and in most cases also the names of some of the smaller tenants."

"THE CHAPELS"

Yarborough is a fairly busy village, at any rate, it was so on the day we were there at an hour when the carriers carts, farmers and others were returning home from LOUTH market, and it was not all a "passing show," because a goodly share of the homing party were Yarborough folk. Yarborough has one little general store where evidently a considerable trade is done and there was a business air all through the village. There are two nonconformist places of worship in Yarborough, one being the Wesleyan Chapel—dating from the year 1818, so that Wesleyan Methodism is deep seated here-and the other-that of the United Methodist, the date of which is 1853. The two of them are active in their work, and the adherants of Dissent are strong in number in the village and parishand energetic in their work. Social functions are rightly given a place, but few of them are allowed to pass without being need forbenefiting the funds of the particular chapel to which the promoters owe ellegiance, and altogether the effort put foward are marked by great enthuiasm and unity furthering the good cause. The church people are also to be commended for their work, and the different sections work side by side very sensibly recognizing (and rightly) that through the paths they are treading are different to some extent they really have much in common, and that, they all lead eventually through the gate into the land of reward. No one who has not studied the work in connection with village churches and chapel can realizethe amount of effort cheerfully undertaken, the burdens bravely borne, the sacrifices uncomplainingly made, and the share of responsibility loyally undertaken for the general good. There are the great secrets of many a brilliant rural success. In Few Words— The Yarburgh family, as already stated, is merged in that of Deramore. Lord Deramore is still lord of the manor. The Silhouette Lady: A Profile

In the days before photography, people who could afford it had their portraits painted to let their grandchildren and future generations know what they looked like.



Ordinary citizens, who could not affort the expensive portraits, were delighted when - in the 1700s - a French paper cutter named Etienne de Silhouette began cutting profile likenesses that cost only a few pennies each. The people called these paper profiles "silhouettes."

Another profile cutter, Augustine Edouart, was so good at cutting the tiniest details in these shadow portraits that he gave the art form a dignity that led to its recognition as fine art.

Today, there is a portrait artist and illustrator, Joyce A. Yarbor-ough, who also cuts for capturing fine details, such as evelashes, ribbons, earrings, glasses and individual facial characteristics that make people so recognizable.

The art of cutting silhouette portraits is one of the most difficult to do, according to JAY, as she signs her pictures. The artist uses only paper and scissors no drawing, no erasing mistakes. The cutter must be right the first time. It takes a certain natural ability to see and cut a likeness freehand without drawing something first. As a result, there are very few people involved in this art form today. JAY, who is known pro-

fessionally as "The Sillouette Lady," travels throughout Missouri and Illinois, as well as in Texas, cutting silhouettes along the way. Maybe you have seen her at Silver Dollar City, or at one of the Famous-Barr stores where she appears almost yearly around Valentine's Day.

This year she will be at several Famous-Barr stores from February 6 through Valentine's Day. cutting Valentine por-traits. It you would like to watch her or to have her make your silhouette, you can learn when she will be at a store near silhouettes. She is known you by calling 444-2667.

They met three Sundays each month. For four years they met at private homes and in an old shed . Gore snares powerful endorsement additions

Democratic presidential candidate Albert Gore forged some powerful new links in his chain of Texas endorsements. Wednesday by announcing the support of former U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, Hispanic activists Ruben, William and Tony Bonilla, and 100 Democratic county judges.

Yarborough, who served in the Senate with Gore's father during the 1960s, announced in Austin, "Texas is the jewel in the crown of the 20-state Super Tuesday. Let us affix this crown jewel to Sen. Al Gore's diadem."

The longtime father figure of Texas liberals. Yarborough predicted Gore could "sweep Texas like a prairie fire."

The Tennessee senator named Yarborough his campaign's honorary Texas chairman and told a clutch of Houston supporters: "No individual in this state is more revered or more respected or more beloved for his willingness to stand and fight for the average working man and woman. That's what my campaign is all about, and that's why he's going to be a very effective ally in this race."

Two volumes to trace Cherokee ancestry

Boy, are we impressed! We just found out that we know somebody who's compiling what will be one of the most important sets of genealogical books of this decade.

Jerry Wright Jordan has Volume I of Cherokee by Blood already published. Volume II is with the publisher, and Jordan has just begun work on Volume IV. Jordan is abstracting the Guion Miller rolls of anyone claiming Cherokee descent before the U.S. Court of Claims from 1906 to 1910.

This material, on 12 rolls of microfilm, is extremely difficult to use, as well as not being generally available at libraries around the country. Each entry (Volume I includes 1,550) includes the name and residence of the claimant and the disposition of the claim.

It may also include several affidavits attesting to the claimant's ancestry by the individual, other family members, or non-family members. That means it includes information about thousands of people other than the claimants. Jordan has included an every-name index so the researcher can find these other people (like a cousin's great-grandfather who was a judge in the Cherokee nation before statehood).

The soil here is clay, with a clayey subsoil, and the chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and beans. Some famous cropping has been produced here.

The public elementary school was erected by a former anoumbent in the year 1813. (Could be 1843) It has accommodations for 45 children and is very well conducted.

The Louth navigation skirts the eastern boundary of the parish and turns again between the parish and that of Grainthorpe beginning to make more directly to the outlet.

The road from here to Louth is a curious one. It is far from straight, and yet it connot be described as winding in the ordinary sense. It rather runs in a zig-zag fashion. 

* * * * * RESEARCHING BURNED COUNTIES By Catherine Mann

While this talk is primarily about Cherokee County, Alabama, almost everything said can be applied to any county that is considered a "burned county". That is, a county whose records have been destroyed.

Cherokee County was formed January 9, 1836. Prior to that date it was part of St. Clair County. There were two courthouse fires--one in 1882 and one in 1895. Most all early records were lost.

No matter how much you know about records and where to find them, there will always be some families that are simply impossible to trace. It is a shame, but it is a fact. However, there are lots of places to look when there are no early records in a courthouse - and before you give up!

- 1. Check court records that are available. If you are told all records were destroyed, check to see what "all" means. Many times people brought their records in to have them re-recorded. A deed dated in the 1850s could be entered with others dates in the 1890s. Also, some records will refer to other counties which might lead to older records or give full estate settlements from the "burned" county. Also, always look in the county records where relatives were left or moved to.
- 2. Check basements! Cherokec County has a basement room called "The Archives Room". It is virtually impossible to get to these records much less to do research; but, it is there! Some of the marriage books of that county are incomplete there is a strong possibility the original marriage certificates are stored in this room. Some counties kept the original certificates after entering the information in books but tossed the certificates into a box which could be stored in some out of the way room. Sometimes these basements will yield a collection of early newspapers.
- 3. Check the Tract Book. Each county is supposed to have one which shows the completed patents of land purchases from the Federal Government. If the original book was destroyed, new ones were copied from the records in the Secretary of State's Office. Keep in mind the newer books will reflect the county boundaries at the time of copying.
- 4. If your county, like Cherokee, has a dam built by Alabama Power Company, you can be lucky. The Power Company had to do extensive research on property it purchased and has recorded some very old deeds.
- 5. Census records for Cherokee County began with 1840. 1840 through 1910 are on microfilm in several libraries. The mortality schedules for 1850, 1860, 1870, and 1880 are in the State Archives. There are many errors on these census records

ranging from misspelling of names to reversal of names to children being listed under the step-father's surname. The mortality schedules are listings of persons who died with the census year. They are only as complete as the census taker made them. Remember, the census year is not the same as the calendar year. Census records reflecting the citizens of Cherokee County are prior to 1840 would be found in the 1820 and 1830 St. Clair County census. The 1820 St. Clair census has been published. The only known state census for Alabama is for 1865 and is in the State Archives.

uncommon to find names and histories written on the back of pictures.

- 15. Talk genealogy. Be persistent! You may not be very popular, but you 11 be remembered when someone finds material they think you would be interest in and that s what its all about.
- 16. Ask at the courthouse for the names of person who might be able to help on family history. Usually there are local genealogy buffs, professional or otherwise, who may have helpful information.
- 17. Always enclose a stamped, self-addressed envelope when writing for information or help, and drop a thank you note when you get a reply even if it contains no helpful information. It takes time to reply to letters and your "thank you" may establish rapport which will lead to information later.
- 18. Consider placing an advertisement in a local newspaper asking for information on the family you are interest in.
- 19. If you are working on families from the Northeast A'abama region, consider sending copies of your records (don't wait until they are "perfect" or you write your book) to our library and/or libraries in the immediate area you are interested in. Don't take a chance of losing your records and having to start over "from scratch". Happy Hunting! (Submitted by Frances Lockwood, Comanche, Texas)







(The following is the conclusion of an old published article, believed written in the early 1900s, and furnished the news sheet by James T. Yarbrough of Atlanta. Cousin James, who has visited the village in recent years, also adds a footnote)

ROAD FROM LOUTH

THE ROAD FROM HERE TO LOUTH is a curious one. It is far from straight, and yet it cannont be described as winding in the ordinary sense. It rather runs in a zigzag fashion. It turns sharpley to the right or the left, in angles, and is much like an eccentric motion at right angles along edges of squares of a chess board. How much of it lengthens the journery to Louth, as compared to with crow-flight, it is not easy to tell.

Letters come to Yarborough by way of Louth, arriving at 7:15 a.m. and are dispatched at 5:20 p.m. Kelly says the Fulstow, four miles away is the nearest money order and telegraph office.

If that is still the case-we wonder that Yarborough people do not agitate for something better and more of an improvement. A village of this importance should not be so far out of immediate touch with the world.

(The two Methodist Churches mentioned are no longer there. The general store is gone. The school building is across the road from Yarborough Church but is no longer used as a school. The children of two village apparently go to school some other place. perhaps bussed. James T. Yarbrough, Atlanta)



We are very proud to be a part of such a wonderful and distinguished family.



My Dear Son

I saw the letter you sent your father and was truly glad to hear from you that you was well and had met with some Old acquaintances who was glad to see you. perhaps you have seen your uncle William by this time. I want you to write me all about him and about your aunt Walls family all of them. When you was in Arkinsaw was you at Mr. Harrisons. You said nothing about your cousin Temperances death. I want you to write to me how you get on in a strange Land. Can you get business to do? We have had a cold winter this fare. Mrs. Roper is a widow again. Her second husband died in Three months after she married him. Maryann McCane is married to a Mr. Wilkerson. My son try to improve in writing. I praise you for what you do but I wish you could spell better. I mean no harm. I take great intrust in your wellfare. You have my watermest affections and I hope you will do well where ever you go. Live in peace with all men. Never keep bad company. Let me hear from you how you get on and how you take Mississippi. I have said nothing about your fathers family. I suppose he has written to you himself. Thomas Yarbroughs health is bad. They have lost Wodson.

I now conclude by Saying I love you truly. Your grandmother Dorothy Herring.

Fredericksburg City, District (and Superior) Court Will Book A (A-3), 1789-1831, p. 137, copied from Virginia State Archives May 1986 by Karen Mazock:

IN THE NAME OF GOD AMEN. I Benj Yarbrough of Caroline County being sick and week but of Sound Memory of mind, do make and Ordain this my Last Will and Testament.

Item. I lend to my Mother one half of Lands During her natural life, and at her Decease to return to my Brother Charles with the other half which I hereby Dovise to him, his heirs and assigns forever.

Item. Everything of what nature or kind soever I leave to my Brother Charles (that is not heretofore mentioned) but in case my Brother Charles should Die without heir then one third of the said Property goes to Pleasant Winston's Child (my nephew) and the other two thirds to Mr. Almonds children which he had by my mother to them and their heirs forever.

In Vitness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal this 10th Dec 1795.

s/Benjⁿ Yarbrough Seal

Signed Sealed Dev. In Presents of us

Barjⁿ Tompkins Elisha Kennedy John Wright Admitted to record May 7th 1800

SAD, SAD, STORY NEEDS A HAPPY ENDING, MAYBE YOU CAN HELP TRACE LINE

Can anyone help Mary Patterson? Her address: 1660 Whites Mill Road, High Point NC 27260. She writes that she has tried census records, has written to every Yarbrough and Reed in the phone books and tried every source known to her to no avail. She is trying to locate records on her father, Roy Yarbrough, b. ca 1899-1900. He did not know his birth date, so July 4th was assumed. He m. 1st Maggie Fisher and 2nd Lola Bleaker Arthurs. He knew only that his father's name was Sam Yarbrough and his mother was Mary Reed. His mother died the day after he was born. Her father's story is reprinted below with her permission. Can anyone help her?

My father was born in or near Chattanooga, Tennessee in the summer of 1899 or 1900. Be was the only son of Sam Yarbrough and Mary Reed (Reid, Read). The day after giving birth, his mother died of food poisoning. His father left him with a family he knew. When he was about two years old, his father married again, a woman with several boys. He brought my father home at this time and soon after the trouble began. My father was made to sleep in a wood shed on a home made pallet. He wore a dog collar around his neck and was chained in the yard. He drank from a bucket and ate scraps from the table in a bucket lid. He was hit with sticks and rocks by his step-brothers while his father watched. This went on for about two years.

When he was about four years old, a peddler passing by saw him on the ground, unable to get up. He sought help from someone and they removed him from the chair and carried him to the doctor. Some type of twine had been wrapped tightly around his legs, from ankles to hips, cutting off the circulation. The doctor kept him for a period of time at his home. He daily soaked his legs and removed as much twine as possible. My father carried twine in his muscles to his grave at the age of seventy-eight. When the doctor allowed him to leave, he was placed in the care of a family nearby. They cared for him well. About the time he went to live with these people, a couple traveling to Pennsylvania had stopped at this farm. They camped by the creek to rest, bake and wash their clothing. They had young sons who became my father's playmates. The couple was concerned about my father's past. After several weeks, the family was told the boy had to be returned to his father. Perhaps there were no laws to protect children.

The family offered to take my father away with them in the wagor. He was put to bed with the other boys and the couple headed north. He has told me how happy he was with these people. But when he was nine years old, they died. Someone sent him back to Chattanooga. He was heartbroken and afraid of his father. Luckily for him, his father had left town. He went to work in a hosiery mill and was self supporting from then on.

My father often told me how he was mistreated by his father, stepmother and her children. I was too young to understand just how horrible his young life was. When I was 12 years old, my father's aunt from Knoxville, Tennessee came for a three week visit. She not only confirmed my father's story, but added some facts my father hadn't known. As I have grown older, I want to trace my heritage.



IMPORTANT YARBROUGH FAMILY DOCUMENT TO AID GENEALOLOGY RESEARCH FOR MANY IN THE U.S.A.

The National Yarbrough Conference's 1988 Query Edition is offered in this October and November double issue of the "Interim News Sheet for The Yarborough Family Magazine."

The Query Edition is believed to be the most important single genealogical document in several decades and maybe longer. The last query section, a brief INS-YFM forerunner, was in May, 1987.

Karen Mazock of Virginia Beach, Virginia, query editor, archivist and historian, has spent over a year and a half researching, compiling, editing and typing the 34 pages of quiries that appear in this edition. She has been assisted by NYC directors and countless family and related family members from all over the United States. An exact query form is being prepared to lessen the difficulty in compiling future collections.

The Query Edition will go out to over 500 family members, all spellings, libraries, and genealogical societies, and is expected to answer many family questions, raise others, and put scores of families in touch with others of their branches of the family. Exciting results are expected, and the news sheet is anxious to share as many of the "new discoveries" with the rest of the family as space permits.
