

**Jottings...** Last year was certainly a banner year, as we now have e-copies of our records. There's a great deal of post-digitizing editing, but all volumes are indexed. With a bit of luck, the few nearly illegible volumes may be reconstituted with improved indices.

The volumes have suffered from the years of pawing and picking by our conference attendees. This is the price paid for providing such access to our records, I suppose, and I have a great deal more sympathy for those who serve as librarians. At the same time, there doesn't seem to be any sort of standard followed by those who prepared the nearly one hundred and sixty volumes. In fairness to those who prepared the volumes, the open access to these records very probably completely masked any sort of logical order that might have existed initially.

One of the chores I hope to accomplish in the coming eighteen months is to put each volume into a uniform format. Where practicable, a family descendants' chart and/or tree will lead off each volume, with the records following in a standardized order. I was able to do this for the last few volumes that were scanned, and the results, in terms of ease of use, are certainly well worth the effort. Merging the multiple volumes of the several individual ancestors (Ambrose, Edmund, George, Henry, John, Joshua, Thomas, William, Zachariah, et al) will be a more demanding effort. The ancestors having the smaller number of volumes will receive first attention, if for no other reason as that will be less effort than dealing with an ancestor with a dozen or so volumes.

A project coordinator for our family DNA project is still needed. I simply do not have the time needed to do the job justice. We were fortunate that the late James Yarbrough/Houston has both the time and passion to pursue the project, and he did a stellar job. By contrast, I have too many commitments to do the job properly. I am reluctant to turn project coordination over to World Families, the host for our project, but failing someone stepping up to the task, I see no other option.

## Let's Get Together!


It's a new year and we are going to get together have renew old acquaintances and make new ones, too!

There'll be seminars, stories and tall tales, sights to see, Association business meetings, good company and good food. What could be better?





### Links to the Past

#### **Peter Yerburgh**

{Editor's Note: Once again we have further information, this time from our faithful British cousin Peter, in collaboration with input from Karen Mazock. This article also is relevant to the following article about our extended families genealogy.}

There's a 'new' inter-net facility offered by Lincolnshire Archives called <u>Lincs to the Past.</u> Once invoked, the viewer can see the actual pages of Lincolnshire Church Registers (if they exist). There is no fee to pay once you have registered and logged in, unless photocopies are purchased. This may be useful for those whose ancestors hailed from the County of Lincolnshire, England.

It takes a little time to get used to the way it works. The viewer must remember his/her user name and password, but if the viewer fails to sign out (at the end the session) the Site remembers them.

To use the site, enter the name of the Parish into the Box on the top right of the screen and then add this: par 1 e.g."Saltfleetby St Peter par 1", which is used below to illustrate the usage of this site.

- 1 The search engine gives a 'drop down' of documents and dates to click on. Select Registers.
- 2 This invokes another drop down with nothing on the screen except hints. However, if you scroll down the screen (by pressing the  $\downarrow$  key) the selection 'Sequence Details' with three options appears.
- 3 DoubleClick on the option "Browse the 7 records at the level below this one". A new screen appears titled 'Sequence Search Results'.
- 4 Choose and DoubleClick on the <u>sixth<sup>1</sup></u> option: (General Register 1607 -1775). A new screen appears with the heading Saltfleetby St Peter Parish Records – Baptisms.... Below this title is a picture of one page of the Register.
- 5 Double click on the right hand side of the register (or wherever the handwriting is clearest) to access the "zoom" feature.
- 5 Double click again and the text becomes even larger; wait until the text sharpens. Notice the small insert (top left) where there is a miniature of the same page. The blue frame indicates where you are on the Register's page. You can drag the frame down, and the lower part of the page appears.

The page may be scrolled, which permits the viewer to select the record(s) that are desired. Alternatively use the 'Jump to' box and type in a number, which might be nearer your desired date.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> \*The 6<sup>th</sup> option was chosen, as the text is easier. If an earlier register which covers the year1615, use the 5<sup>th</sup> option, but be prepared for many blank pages.

The pages are watermarked in the LINCS TO THE PAST pages. This ensures that the provider receives payment for a photocopy without the watermark (about £5).

Using this site, the Register baptismal entries of Threddlethorpe and Saltfleetby St Peter, around 1600 were reviewed. I found baptisms for <u>five sons of Thomas Yarborowe</u> as follows:

1	Thomas	baptised 1596/7	at Threddlethorpe St Helen
2	John (the eldest)	baptised 1601	at Threddlethorpe St Helen
3	Matthias	baptised 1604	at Saltfleetby St Peter
4	'Missing name' Y <sup>2</sup>	baptised 1608	at Saltfleetby St Peter
	Susan & Elizabeth	baptized 1611	at Saltfleetby St Peter
5	Charles	baptised 1615	at Saltfleetby St Peter

Charles, when he was adult, wrote his Will (1642) bequeathing seventy pounds to his brother, Richard. This would have paid for a voyage and land in Virginia'.

Charles's, in his will left money as follows:

"Loving Father My duty to you & my mother. I have a will in my trunke I suppose, if not I will Matthias my brother to be my executor. To John Yarburgh my brother fortie pounds. I gift to Richard Yarburgh my brother three score and ten pounds, to Thos Yarbor, my Nephew<sup>3</sup> three acres and half close called Berrie lands after the decease of Matthias, my brother."

Suddenly it came to me! - Although the 1608 Yarborow's Christian name is 'unreadable' the four letter name must be Rich Yarborowe – the one that I thought went to Virginia. There were only five brothers. There would have to be six sons if Richard was a twin to Charles and born in 1615.

I then saw the consequence. If Richard Y, son of Thomas Y of Saltfleetby, was born in 1608, it would make it impossible for him to be the Virginian patriarch!!!! The latter was born in 1615 (not 1608) according to the age on the Virginian Y's tomb. It wasn't until I saw the Register page for 1608 (via Lincs to the Past) that this truth dawned on me.

Naturally, I asked the Lincoln Archives to check the original register and to see if another document could supply the 'missing' name. To cut a long story short, they were very helpful and looked both at the original register and at the Bishop's Transcript but no joy.

## **Thoughts about Our Family Genealogy**

**Leonard Yarbrough** 

#### Part I. The DNA Evidence

It's long been believed that Richard (The Immigrant) Yarborough was the first of our family to come to the New World sometime in the middle of the  $17^{th}$  century, just as it's believed that all the various Yarbrough branches are limbs of the same family tree. We know that within a couple of generations, there were a number of other Yarbroughs in the early Virginia Colony – these include Thomas, William, Henry, Joshua, Ambrose, Edmund, George, Joseph, and Christian (Yarblow), and perhaps others. So far, there is essentially nothing to indicate what the relationships between these early Yarbroughs might have been. At the beginning of the Yarbrough DNA Project, it was thought that once this evidence was obtained, a clearer picture of what these relationships would be available.

At this time, there are almost 120 DNA records in our project; there are certainly others that haven't yet been submitted for inclusion in the project listings. Hopefully, once we have a dedicated DNA project coordinator, these records and new testing recruits will provide additional insight into some of these relationships.

There are a few things to be learned from extant test results. First is that the so far questionable direct relationship between Old Richard and Joshua Yarborough has been shown to be untrue. This based on having DNA results for a descendant of Ambrose Yarborough, who has been shown to be a descendant of Old Richard. Those results do not agree with the DNA results of known Joshua Yarborough descendants. To date, we do not have DNA results for a known descendant of Old Richard.

One of the oddities that has emerged is the number of non-Yarbrough surnames that have popped up. At the moment, these names include Calhoun, Church, Clayton, Crockett, Floering, Gillenwater, Gray, Hawkes, Howard, Jones, Megginson, Metcalf, Milam Morris, Newman, Pike, Raese, Sheffield, Shott, Sims, Warren, and Winn. There are currently eight identifiable family groups (as defined by Family Tree Labs), and these names are distributed across all he larger groups. No doubt, many of these result from a Yarbrough infant/child being taken in by a family of the surname following the loss of parents to disease and other causes. It is also likely that at least a few simply changed the surname – an whether to make a new start or to avoid the law. Also, there is the occasional occurrence of an "irregular paternal event", of which numerous examples appear in family records.

There is also the matter of the connection to the families is the Old World. Again, the legend is that everyone came from eastern England (specifically the Shires of Lincoln and York). At the same time, there are indications that others may have originated in the Netherlands as well as Ireland and Scotland. We know that some fled from England to the Netherlands to avoid religious persecution during the time of King Charles and Oliver Cromwell, so there being members of our family emigrating from the Netherlands is quite plausible. The same applies to the Scottish and Irish immigrants, although the reasons for their settling in those countries may be different.

A complicating factor with the English lines is that the head(s) of the House of Yarborough is not an unbroken family line. There are rare instances of non-Yarboroughs changing their own surname to Yarborough. Sir George Cooke did this in

1802 - at the request of the Yarborough family whose own line was dying out. In that case, the blood line and the DNA would match with Cooke and not with Yarborough. There may well have been similar occasions, back in the ancient Yarborough lineage, which are not documented. DNA is no help here, and would in fact contradict the well-documented records going back as far as 854 AD.

So, where does that leave us? We have a collection of DNA data that is so far divided into eight family groupings. Three of these groups have only one DNA sample, and one of these is clearly Afro-American. The other two may be mutations of one or the other larger groups. The majority of test results fall within one or the other of the two largest groups. The third largest group of results is in addition to the eight designated groups and is labeled as "Ungrouped". Each of these, with two exceptions, could also be included as a mutation of one or the other of the two larger family groups.

More samples are needed, as it is believed that would help clarify the classifications of the identified family groups, as well as aid in placing the ungrouped test results in one or the other of the identified family groups. Without question, there likely will be additional non-Yarbrough surnames added to the mix as well. Finally, having DNA records that agree only shows a relationship. It does not show the nature of the relationship; i.e., whether the ancestor is a direct ancestor, an uncle, brother, nephew or cousin. Clarity of relationship comes from unimpeachable documentation. This is the crux of the matter.

Nonetheless, a reasoned conjecture can be made from the current Yarbrough DNA database. In Family Group I, there are several test results where the ancestor is of Thomas Yarborough (ca 1785). This is a well-documented ancestor, and there are indications that Thomas may be a descendant of John Yarborough, one of the proven sons of Richard the Immigrant. To date, there is not a test sample from anyone claiming to have descended from either of Richard's two proven sons. There is one sample that claims Ambrose Yarbrough as the ancestor. It now appears that Ambrose was himself a descendant of Richard, so this would seem to confirm that Family Group I is composed of Richard's direct descendants. More test samples are needed to confirm this hypothesis.

#### Part II. The Paper Trail

It was thought that once all the records the YGNHA had amassed over the years were digitized and indexed, that it would perhaps be possible to discern linkages that were not otherwise evident. So far, it is clear that there are a few very well documented branches of the extended Yarbrough families: Thomas, Ambrose John, Joshua, John Swanson, Edmund, for example. They all are characterized by the same mystery: Just who the heck were their respective ancestors? Or did they, as some have jested, simply fall out of the sky?

We have, at the moment, 139 volumes of scanned and indexed books of Yarbrough family records. Many of the volumes are of the same family line – John, Thomas, William, Zachariah, Henry, and Joshua. There are another 19 volumes that have been scanned but not yet indexed and published. The question is, "What have we learned from these volumes?" The first (obvious) observation is that there is considerable duplication of records:

Ambrose Y. – 7 Volumes Joshua Y. – 4 Volumes

Edmund Y. – 5 Volumes Manoah Y. – 6 Volumes

Henry Y. – 8 Volumes Nimrod Y. – 3 Volumes

James Y. – 9 Volumes Thomas Y. – 12 Volumes

John Y. – 10 Volumes Thomas Griggs Y. – 5 Volumes

John Swanson Y. – 10 William Y. – 10 Volumes

John Wesley Y. – 6 Volumes Zachariah Y. – 5 Volumes

That is, these multiple volumes account for 60% of the total number of volumes. Most follow the different lines of the descendants, reflecting the family branch of the family researcher, and thus accounting for the multiplicity of volumes. Of the remaining volumes, some are of "unattached" branches, and some are volumes of specific descendants of one or the other of the 14 above named Yarbroughs.

They all suffer the same limitation – they do not show a direct linkage with Richard the Immigrant. In the earlier days of the YNGHA, it was commonly thought that Ricard was a son of Nicholas Yarburgh, although this was at best conjectural. Then, it appeared that Richard's father might be a Thomas Yarbrowe of Saltfleetby – through a process of elimination, this seemed to fit the facts as they were known and understood at the time. At the moment, the identity of Richard's immediate forebears is unknown. In spite of that, in all these volumes there is a clear trail back to the early colonial period of the New World. They all stop short of making any connection whatsoever with Richard the Immigrant; indeed, many do not get much closer than the mid 1700's.

There is an Edmund Yarborough, who married Sarah Wormley in Lincolnshire and immigrated to Virginia. Some have attributed Old Richard as being his father, but that is (as far as I know) conjecture. AS stated in Part I, above, it may be that Thomas Yarborough – progenitor of the Manoah and Nimrod Y. lines – is a son of John Yo., one of the proven sons of Old Richard. Beyond this, the relationships of the various Yarbroughs extant in colonial Virginia during Old Richard's lifetime to him are simply unknown.

On the other hand, they do show the progression of our extended families as they followed the old Indian hunting trails and wilderness roads, first southerly from the Mother Colony through the Carolinas, across Georgia (and Tennessee and Kentucky), Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, Texas, Oklahoma on further westward. Joshua's family followed these trails, as did the families of Thomas, Edmund, John, and Henry, etc.

The Civil War aided the families' migration westward, for various reasons, and this is clearly evident in most of the records. In the case of Joshua's family, most fought for the Confederacy, although there is one cousin who fought on the Union's side. Indeed, some of the branches apparently appeared from thin air; they leave no records of their origins prior to surfacing east of the Mississippi.

#### Part III. The Age of the Internet

The Internet has been both a boon and a bane for family researchers. On the debit side is there is an untold amount of just plain inaccurate and unverified information/data posted there. Add to that the prevailing tendency to take Internet posting as "true", the amount of misunderstanding that is created is impossible to estimate, other than to say most of it is just plain wrong. At the same time, it has opened up the exchange of family histories and data to an unprecedented level. There are presently three groups of players in the Internet pool: the DNA testing labs (Ancestry, Family Tree Labs, 23andMe, etc.), the genetic exploiters (WorldFamiliesDNA, ySearch, GEDMatch, Family Tree Maker, Legacy, myHeritage, etc.), and the various family associations, including the YNGHA. The testing labs approach to the tests and analyses are similar but not necessarily identical. Overall, the differences appear to be reconcilable, as most test results, no matter the testing laboratory, are accepted by those sites which host and present DNA data.

The group labeled "genetic exploiters", however, are less interested in accuracy than in amassing a large customer base. These entities encourage the posting of ancestral/family lineages and or DNA test results so that others can take advantage of the information – for a fee, of course. There are numerous family "pedigrees" posted, most being repetitious and incomplete. The really bad feature is that these host sites believe that they have no obligation to insure that posted information is accurate. Worse, when provided correct information, their position is that only the original poster can make the changes. To date, the only individual posters I have been able to contact have all been those who posted correct material. The others apparently have disappeared into the ether. "Caveat Emptor" clearly applies.

The family associations, in general, provide accurate family data, as do the websites of various individuals who post their family's genealogy (although there are a very few who are not overly rigorous about their genealogical records).

None of these criticisms negate the usefulness of the posted information, as this may in fact provide clues as to where to concentrate the researcher's attention. However, it must always be remembered that all data must be verified before accepting it, no matter how honest the purveyor may appear.

The Internet certainly facilitates contact with the various family branches. There is no question that more people are interested in their origins and heritage, and at an earlier age than previously. Unfortunately, many of those seeking family information do not seem to understand that in most instances they will be required to engage in a dedicated effort to obtain the information they seek. Thus, they cannot distinguish between records with provenance and those without provenance. Overall, provenance of records has been largely compromised by many of the extant Internet sites offering to provide family descendancy knowledge.

One of the conundrums of the Internet is social media, such as FaceBook. We have an active Facebook group, now with approaching 510 members. It is a fairly active group, and we have gained a few Association members from the group. However, it is not clear that we have benefited as an Association. From my point of view, it has increased the demand upon my time, already limited, and many of the received inquiries want me to do the requestors' work for them.

We do not have a twitter presence, and I do not know whether this medium has any benefit(s) to offer an association such as ours. Overall, it seems that the YNGHA is trying to serve two disparate groups: (1) those who want accurate and verified records about their family ancestry; and (2) those who simply want to fill in missing gaps in their knowledge, and to whom provenance is either irrelevant or unnecessary. This conjecture probably warrants

more investigation, especially if it provides guidance that helps the YNGHA's "growing the family" activities.



# **Descendants of Thomas Yarborough (ca 1785)**

As stated in the foregoing article, Thomas' line is well-documented, so it is appropriate to summarize it. While most of the following information is believed to be correct, it is not guarantted to be, and viewers are advised to perform their own validation of data that pertains to them and their families. A full genealogical report, in either Family Tree Maker or GEDCOM format can be provided upon request; it is 245+ pages in length, not including footnotes.



## What We Are Doing

### **Dewey Yarbrough**

At the age of 87, Dewey Yarbrough finally obtained his high school diploma. He attended Walter Junior High in Cullman County, AL, until he was drafted in 1950 for the Korean War. He returned from his service in 1952 and married his wife Yvonne. He also attended Cleveland High School in Blount County while working at Hays Aircraft in Birmingham. He graduated, even paid \$15 for the diploma, but never received it. Its lack apparently was never a problem.



He transferred to Huntsville where as an electrician, he worked on the Saturn V launch vehicle. Married for 64 years to Yvonne, he retiring to Cullman after owning and operating three restaurants. The diploma, however, came as a surprise. He was invited to the local school board meeting, ostensibly to see his great-grandson Zack Hand, a very talented golfer, receive a golfing award. Instead, Assistant Superintendent Stoney Seavers greeted Dewey with these words, "Mr. Yarbrough, we actually brought you here today under false pretenses. Although Zack is a great golfer, he is not receiving any awards today. We are here today to honor you." Judging by the expression on Dewey's face while accepting his diploma, he was certainly surprised.

## Terry Yarbrough

The Mason Police Department hired retired Shelby County Sheriff's Office Captain D. Terry as its interim police chief. Chief Yarbrough, who started his law enforcement career with the Memphis Police Department one month before Martin Luther King was shot and killed, said he'll bring an "inspired motivation" to Mason in an effort to restore respectability and public trust.



"I submit to you that I am dedicated to delivering law enforcement services with effective policy and best practices," he said. Mason mayor Gwendolyn Kilpatrick said Yarbrough, a native Memphian, projects "a strong sense of commitment" to rebuilding trust and pride in Mason and a mission to deliver effective policing services.

Yarbrough will lead the police department's restructuring effort and said the department will adhere to POST's strict standards. "My staff and I must be accountable to the highest standards of ethical and professional conduct," he said. "The rule of law and the institution of law enforcement must be respected by all, police officers and citizens alike. However, police officers are obligated to a higher standard and constitutionallymandated to uphold their duties and responsibilities as a public trust."

### Cedric Yarbrough

Since abandoning the Twin Cities theater scene for Hollywood, Cedric Yarbrough has enjoyed his fair share of success, getting deputized into the ranks of "Reno 911!"; stealing scenes in "The 40-Year-Old Virgin" and "Meet the Fockers"; and lending goofy gravitas to animated series such as "Family Guy. But in 16 years, he has failed to land a true breakout role. Now, "Speechless," one of the season's most promising network comedies, will almost certainly be his ticket to talk-show couches, commercial endorsements — and a little more love from his hometown press.



Yarbrough was noticed while bouncing from one Minneapolis stage to another, most notably for his role as the puppet master in a 2000 production of "Pinocchio" at Children's Theatre. The attention level will increase after Wednesday's debut of "Speechless," especially since it's sandwiched between "The Goldbergs" and "Modern Family," two of ABC's most popular series. At first, his role as a school groundskeeper who stands up to Minnie Driver's overprotective mom appears to be just the latest in a long line of steady work as a recurring actor on network sitcoms.

But in the series' most gratifying twist, his character, Kenneth, is hired to serve as a mentor to Driver's randy son, who has cerebral palsy and can't speak or walk.

Creator Scott Silveri said he originally wrote Kenneth as just a foil to Driver's character. Then Yarbrough auditioned. Yarbrough was the first actor hired for the series; Silveri jokes that they once considered giving him all six major parts.

# CWO Jonathan O. Yerby

Chief Warrant Officer 5 Jonathan O. Yerby became the 14th Regimental Chief Warrant Officer of the Army Quartermaster Corps during a change of responsibility ceremony Friday, November 24, 2016.

Hailing from Stockton, Calif, Yerby started his Army career in 1986 as an enlisted supply specialist. Since then, he has served with numerous deployment-capable organizations including the 5th Infantry Division, Fort Polk, La.; the 4th Infantry Regiment, Hohenfels, Germany; the 163rd Military Intelligence Battalion



(Tactical Exploitation), Fort Hood, Texas; and the Special Operations and Special Forces groups, Fort Bragg, N.C.; among others. Yerby has a significant amount of deployed experience as well after supporting special operations missions in various locations around the world including Afghanistan and Iraq.

"He is, without a doubt, the right person in the right place at the right time to serve as our (RCWO)," noted Brig. Gen. Rodney D. Fogg, QM General, who presided over the ceremony. "Chief Yerby comes to us with a wealth of knowledge and experience ... and I have no doubt it will be of great benefit to our corps and its warrant officer cohort."

In remarks at the ceremony, Fogg also praised the accomplishments of Figueroa, noting how he lived up to the vision of the 38th QM General, Maj. Gen. Eugene Stillions Jr., who recognized the significance of the warrant officer program and created the corps' RCWO position back in the mid-1980s.

"He knew the (regimental warrant) would be at the fingertips of the QM general with the most current information pertaining to logistics, and he or she would work the progression of the warrant officer career field," Fogg said. "He or she would be involved in the development of new logistical concepts for training and education, and would shape the future of the QM Corps and warrant officer contingent."

Closing the ceremony, Yerby summed up the significance of the moment for him saying, "Gen. Fogg, thank you for this opportunity. I look forward to working together to ensure our QM warrant officers are agile and innovative leaders; that they are ready to fight and win on the complex battlefields of today and tomorrow. I am honored and humbled to serve as the 14th Quartermaster Regimental Chief Warrant Officer."



# The Yarbrough and Drury Families Indiana and Kentucky<sup>1</sup>

In memory of my mother and father and to record the Yarbrough name for future generations.

- Parthena Yarbrough Jones

My mother, Mary Elizabeth Drury (Yarbrough) was born Oct. 22, 1869, Martin Co., Dover Hill, IN, daughter of Washington and Lydia (Walton) Drury. She married Enos Yarbrough, Sep. 25, 1877. He was the son of John B. and Parthena (Morris) Yarbrough, born July 7, 1849, in Floyd County, Jeffersonville, IN. Enos and Mary Elizabeth first lived on a farm northwest of Washington, IN, just west of St. John's Cemetery. The house is located on a knoll, which made a nice view of the surrounding countryside. Mary Elizabeth and Enos exchanged farms with her parents, Washington and Lydia Drury, as they wanted a larger farm. The farm was the homestead where Mary Elizabeth had lived since she was nine years old. The farm is about four miles out west Highway 50 to the Methodist Maysville Church and then south about a mile on the Thomas Bluff Road to the farm. They spent most of their lives on this farm. The farm that Washington and Lydia Drury bought from Enos and Mary Elizabeth was later divided among each of the Drury children. As the children sold their lots, a group of families settled on the farm just west of St. John's Cemetery.

The following sketch was obtained in some papers sent in by Mary Yarbrough Edwards in 1922. It was written be her father, Col. George Yarbrough of Tyler, Texas. This sketch also appears in the family history written by Reuben Littleton Phillips in 1928. In all probability it came from the same source. [This account, while no doubt often told, contains three errors/mis-statements. First, the Yarbroughs were already well-established in England when William the Conqueror arrived in 1066. It is now known that the seven brothers who decamped from Virginia to North Carolina were three brothers and four sons. It is not known which sons belonged to which of the three fathers. Finally, the relationship of the original immigrant(s) to Lord Yarbrough is so far purely conjectural and unsupported by factual evidence. – Editor]]

"The Yarbroughs of America are lineally descended from William Yarbrough who was one of the 60,000 Normans who embarked as vassals to William, Duke of Normandy, in the year 10 66 to conquer England. For the valiancy of the aforesaid William Yarbrough, William the Conqueror gave him the Earldom of Yorkshire, which Earldom still exists. Among the earliest settlers of Virginia were the first sons of the Earl, settling in Amelia County, Virginia. Between the years 1729 and 1775 seven brothers of the Yarbroughs went to Louisbourg, Franklin Co., NC. Their names were Zachariah, Archibald, Manoah, Alexander, Thomas, Henry and John. Before the war of 1775, Zachariah left Louisbourg, NC, and settled in Rowan Co., NC. There he met and married Elizabeth Doud (Dowd). From this union were born Zachariah, Henry, Thomas, Alexander, Manoah, Julia and Elizabeth. Through the influence of the older Yarbroughs' Earldom in England, large tracts of land were given to the Yarbroughs in North Carolina." (This paragraph is taken from a book by Alice J. Cherry, Texas Record 1941-42, Volume 2, pp 72-94).

### A. John M Yarbrough and Sarah Rice

The Reverend John M. Yarbrough was born 1797 in Kentucky. He married Sarah (Sallie) Rice in Bath Co., KY, December 21, 1822. Sarah, born 1799 in Kentucky, was the daughter of Campbell and Elizabeth Tatum Bailey Rice of Willard, Carter Co., KY. Campbell Rice was born November 17, 1778 in Powatan Co, VA, and died October 12, 1846. Elizabeth Bailey Rice, a daughter of Capt. John Bailey, who served in the Revolutionary War. Elizabeth was born January 20, 1781, in Orange Co., NC.

Campbell and Elizabeth owned several hundred acres of land in the southeastern part of Carter Co., as part of which is ow the town of Willard. They were formerly from Bath Co., KY, but later moved to Carter Co., KY, where they reared their family and died. Their children were:

- 1. John B. Yarbrough, born January 6, 1824 in KY, died Jan 10, 1895. He married Parthena Morris, born August 3, 1827, a daughter of Richard and Nancy (Stenson) Morris. John and Parthena made their home near Washington, IN (see the Morris history).
- 2. James Wesley Yarbrough I, born 1825 in Kentucky. His wife, Mary A (?) was born 1835 in Kentucky. Their children, listed in the 1879 census of Shoals, Martin Co., IN, were Elizabeth, born 1850; Ellen, born 1853; William Henry, born 1857; James Wesley (II), born 1858. James Wesley I married a second wife, Louisa Richmond.
  - a. James Wesley Yarbrough, II died April 31 (sic) 1931; married Mary Jane Spousler, Oct. 2, 1858 Apr 1940. Children of this family lived in Shoals and Washington, IN;
  - b. Frank Plummer Yarbrough, Oct. 6, 1884, married Bessie Franklin. Their children were Opal (who married a Poindexter), James, Charles, Alberta, Walter, Thelma (who married James Saunders, and Frank.
- 3. Elizabeth Yarbrough, born ca 1827, married Pern Carr, who was a pilot on a boat from Louisville to New Orleans. They lived in Jeffersonville, IN.
- 4. Walter Yarbrough, who died when young.
- 5. Nelson K Yarbrough, born in Indiana in 1832. He married Eliza Rice, a daughter of Alfred G. Rice, who was a son of Campbell Rice. They lived in Harmony, Owen Co., KY. Their children were:
  - a. Sara Malinda, who married G. W. Wheeler, Breathitt Co., KY;
  - b. Mary Adelaide, who dies when young;
  - c. Mary Russell, who married G. S. Cull, who preceded her in death. One son, Ophir Cull, was a minister. Mary died in Florida after 1929;
  - d. Elizabeth Marcus never married she was a practical nurse in an institution in Tampa, FL. She died after 1929;
  - e. America Alfred married L. C. Stafford. They had sons and three daughters;
  - f. Nancy Ann, never married, and was a school teacher;
  - g. James Nelson, only son of Nelson Y., married Elizabeth Ball and had five children: Lydia, who married Prof. H. E. Glen; Euphrasie Elizabeth, who married Howard McLaughlin; Nelson Kirk; James Edward, and Alfred Greyson;
  - h. Lydia, who married E. C. McLain and separated. Died in Tampa, FL. Nelson K. and Eliza Rice Y. lived on a farm in Harmony, KY. All of their family are

buried in a private burial ground on the farm where they lived.

- 6. Fleming Rice Yarbrough, born 1834 in Indiana; married Elizabeth Wilson born in Kentucky in 1843. (Listed in the 1860 Census of Owen Co., KY. He was listed as a hotel keeper). Their children:
  - a. Mary Elizabeth, born 1859, married Joe Southett (?), lived in Owensboro, KY. Children were Walter, Ora, Fleming, Eva, who married a Jones, and Martin;
  - b. Virginia, who married Dell McAtee. They had eight children: James, Charles, William, Dell, Mary, Bertha, Anna and Vernon;
  - c. Adeline, who married a Barnett. She died in St. Louis. She had one son, Wilbur, a Western Union operator in Chicago;
  - d. Louella, who married a Norris;
  - e. Rosa, who married a Wright. Their daughter married Tom Slater of Louisville, KY;
  - f. William, who married a James and had four children.
- 7. Spencer Yarbrough, born 1836 in Indiana; married Elizabeth Southworth. Spencer was listed in the 1860 census as a farmer, Owenton, Own Co., KY. Their children: Sallie (married Sam Kelly); John S. died when young. Sallie's and Sam's children: Sam, Jr. of Georgetown, KY; Mary Kelly, married Geo. Kelly, Nicholasville, KY.
- 8. Holman, born 1838 in Indiana. Listed with the family at the age of 13, 1850 Census of Clark Co., IN.
- 9. Sarah A. Yarbrough, born 1840 in Indiana, and married Dr. G. R. Lee, Harmony, Owen Co., KY. They had 13 children (3 died in infancy):
  - a. Sam, lived in Corinth, KY;
  - b. Nannie, married R. S. Riddle;
  - c. Robert Morgan Lee, married Adeline Mary Yarbrough, daughter of John B. and Parthena Morris Yarbrough of Washington, Indiana;
  - d. John Alfreda Lee, Baptist minister;
  - e. Amanda Addie Lee, married Wylie;
  - f. Quincy Lee, married Ella Holcraft;
  - g. Samuel Jeff Lee, married Nannie Davis;
  - h. Joe Buchner Lee:
  - i. Sallie Lee, married Charles W. Lewis of Texas;
  - j. Gilba Kelly, killed in St. Louis by a streetcar;
- 10. Rachel, died when young;
- 11. Mary Adeline, born 1843 in Indiana, married Dr. R. H. Sparks, Stamping Ground, KY. Dr. Sparks practiced there 40 years or more. Their children were:
  - a. Alva Nelson, born Dec. 31, 1864. Never married;
  - b. Forest Winnifred, married Charles Duval;
  - c. John W., married Carrie Mann, St. Louis;
  - d. Quincy Lee, born Feb. 17, 1874, never married;
  - e. Elizabeth, married Southworth, no children;
  - f. Lucy, married Howard Triplett, children Winifred Harned and Bona, a lawyer.

In the 1850 Clark Co, IN, Jeffersonville Township, page 3, John and Sarah Yarbrough were listed with the following children:

Part of the history concerning John M. and Sara Rice Yarbrough was given by Bettie Marcus Yarbrough and her sister Mrs. Cull in 1929 when they were living in Tampa, Florida, and were visiting a relative Coney K. Lewis (Mrs. Robert K. Lewis) in Grayson, Carter Co., KY. Also info from Quincy Lee Sparks, from Stomping Ground, KY. The census info was collected by Parthena Yarbrough Jones and took many months of research.

Captain John Bailey, who served in the Revolutionary War, grandfather to Sallie (Sara Rice) Yarbrough settled in Kentucky shortly after the War. The Yarbroughs were listed in the 1790 census of Kentucky.

### B. History of John B. and Parthena (Morris) Yarbrough, Parents of Enos Yarbrough

John B. and Parthena (Morris) Yarbrough lived near Jeffersonville, Floyd Co., Indiana. John B. was born January 6, 1824 in Kentucky, a son of John M. and Sallie (Rice) Yarbrough. John B. married Parthena Morris about 1847. She was a daughter of Richard and Nancy (Stenson) Morris. Parthena was born August 3, 1827, in Clark Co., IN. John B. and Parthena moved to Maysville, Washington Township, Davies Co., Indiana about 1865. Their home was about four and one-half miles west of Washington, Indiana of west Highway 50. About a mile west of the Methodist Church, and then about one square south of road 5 0. John B. died January 10, 1895, age 7 1. Parthena continued to live in the home place with a son Jesse and his family until her death on May 18, 1911. John B. and Parthena are both buried in the Maysville Cemetery. Their g raves are in the northeast corner, straight north of the entrance off of west highway 50. John B. Yarbrough's parents are listed in the Floyd County, Indiana, census of 1820, and Clark County, Indiana, 1860.

The children of John B. and Parthena Morris Yarbrough:

- 1. Enos, born July 7, 1849; married first Frances Catherine Drury. After her death, he married Mary Elizabeth, half-sister of Catherine. Children are listed under Enos and Mary Elizabeth's history.
- 2. Merritt, born 1856, died 1937, married Sarah E. Summitt, born 1862 died 1953. Both are buried in the northwest side of Oak Grove Cemetery. Their children: Mrs. L. D. Jones; Will A. Yarbrough; Fred; Mrs. Katherine Sturgeon; James Yarbrough and Mrs. M. H. McCord;
- 3. Franklin, born June 7, 1857, died Feb. 17, 187 2, buried beside his parents;
- 4. Alexander, born about 1859, married Molly Gaskins, one son Willis. Alexander is buried in Maysville Cemetery.
- 5. Jesse, born April 14, 1863, died about 1940, married Harriett Marmaduke, Dec. 16, 1896. Harriett died Jan. 18, 1938. Both buried in Oak Grove Cemetery, Washington Co., Indiana;
- 6. Adeline Mary, born about 1865, died Nov. 4, 19 21, married Robert Morgan Lee,

born 186 5, died 1901; both buried Oak Grove Cemetery. Their Children

- a. Grant Lee, born Washington, IN, Jan. 25, 1890, died June 9, 1955. Married Lola Parsons, Sep. 20, 1920; one daughter, Mrs. Paul (Marie) Lamon; her children Kay & David Lamon;
- b. Sadie M. Lee, married Harry F. Strange, Feb. 1, 1911. Harry born in Martin Co., IN, Jan. 28, 1884, died 1955, son of Mary & Joseph B. Strange. Children Carl B; Agnes V.; Cecil J.; William; Robert K.; Mrs. Robert (Barbara) Kane. Six other children deceased;
- c. Nannie deceased;
- d. Pearl deceased;
- e. Addie is Mrs. James Stafford;
- f. Kelly Lee, the youngest child lives in California.
- 7. Aaron Yarbrough, born about 18 67 died 1935, never married;
- 8. Nannie, born Sep. 13, 1872, died Feb. (, 1941, married Sep. 1897 to John Alexander and he died 1917. Both buried in Oak grove Cemetery. Their children: Charles Alvin; Mrs. Helen Adams; Mrs. Clarence (Lucille) Mischler; John D. Alexander, and Madonna deceased.

### C. History of Enos and Mary Elizabeth (Drury) Yarbrough

As a young man, Enos was employed as a stage coach driver, making runs between New Albany and Vincennes, IN. His married life was spent on a farm, but he was also interest in the city and state elections and what went on in the nation's capital. Enos Yarbrough died May 23, 1931, aged 82. Mary Elizabeth continued to live on the farm until her death April 23, 1952, at the age of 92. She was known in her community for her kindness and good will. Enos and Mary Elizabeth's teachings were of the Christian way of life. They were members of St. Simon's Catholic Church and were buried in Oak Grove Cemetery. Their graves are beside a driveway starting upon an incline south, about a half square north of the main road coming into the cemetery from Washington, IN.

- 1. Charles Augustus (Gus), born Mar. 27, 1878; married Louise Swartz 1899. Louise died May 16, 1916, buried Mt. Carme Cemetery, Edgemont, IL. Their children: Chester, Catherine, Margaret & Thelma.
- 2. John Washington, born Feb. 7, 1880; married Lou Furcell, May 5, 1904. John died Apr. 1, 1937; their children: Charles John; Helen Glen (Mrs. James Waite), and Robert Burke Yarbrough. Charles J. served in the US Navy and Robert B. served in the US Army Air Corps during World War II.
- 3. Ollie Elizabeth (Ona), born Apr. 27, 1882; married Chester O. Smith, Apr. 26, 1904. She died June 27, 19 54. She was always ready with a helping hand for the family, children and friends. Their children: Zarelda (Mrs. F. W. Brown), and reared Paul Yarbrough from the time he was nine months old, when his mother died. Paul is the son of Seth Yarbrough. Pau served in the US Navy during WWII.
- 4. Thomas Enos (Tom), born Oct. 16, 1883; married (1) Geneva Calloway Sep. 14, 1911; one daughter, Charlotte Morrison Yarbrough.
- 5. William Russell (Will) born Nov. 16, 1885; married Carrie H Stall Feb. 22, 1911. Their children: William Ray (served with the US Army Air Corps, died Aug. 5, 1939); Karl

- Merle (served with the US Marine Corps during World War II.
- 6. Seth, born Aug. 16, 1887; married first Ada M. Reister (sic). Ada was born Aug. 15, 1890, died Mar. 14, 1920. Their children: Clarence Enos; Orval Edward; Seth Sylvan; and Paul Oliver.
- 7. Maudie May (Maude) born Nov. 16, 1889; married Lee A. Greenwall, Apr. 23, 1909. Leo died Jan. 5, 1954, buried St, John's Cemetery, Loogootee, IN. Their children: Paul Leo; Lawrence Enos (Larry), Dorothy Camille; Harold Richard; Donald Andrew; Helen Margaret and Rosemary Ellen. Two children not listed died in childhood. Larry, Harold and Donald served in WWII.
- 8. Laura Ellen born Dec. 14, 1891; married first Marion E. Alford Nov. 6, 1912. Marion died Aug. 11, 1944, no children. Laura married second John Cleveland Feb. 5, 1947. John died Feb 10, 1955.





### Yarbrough Family History Facts and Fiction

Most of us know the following, but as we acquire a broader readership, it's necessary from time to time to review both the lore and the facts of our extended families as we know them. Originally, the over-arching family story was that all American Yarbroughs descend from Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough (1605-1702). Richard's ancestry has never been fully established. The current theory is that he may be a son of a Thomas Yarborowe of Saltfleetsby, Lincolnshire. UK. Thanks to our English family researchers, we are confident that the Yarboroughs of both Lincolnshire and Yorkshire were related, and both descended from Danes who wrested land from the native Saxons in the mid-ninth century, AD.

We know that Richard was never married to Frances Proctor – she did in fact marry a Richard Yarborough, but the two of them spent their entire lives in Lincolnshire. We also know Richard had two proven sons, John and Richard II. An early family researcher, Alabama State Senator George Yarbrough postulated other children but provided no evidence in confirmation. Early Virginia Colony records show Richard as a man of affairs, a land-owner, fur trader and envoy to the Indian nations of the time. About his family, other than the two proven sons, we have no knowledge at all. We also know that shortly after Richard's arrival, there were other Yarbroughs in the same locale as Richard, but the relationships are not known, although the Yarbrough DNA Project – still very much in its infancy – is beginning to shed a bit of light on some of the relationships.

For example, an earlier family myth was that Ambrose Yarbrough was a Kinsman from Yorkshire; it now appears he is a direct descendant of the Immigrant. That being so, we have several DNA test results that show us old Richard's DNA, since Ambrose's (and his descendants') DNA would be that of Old Richard. Another myth was that Joshua Yarborough was descended from Old Richard. No evidence has been found to confirm this. Furthermore, the DNA of Joshua's descendants shows clearly that it does not match that of Old Richard or Ambrose. Close relative, yes, but direct descendant, no. However, DNA results indicates a kinship between Joshua and Edmund (or Edward, as the two names seem to be used interchangeably). There is also evidence, scanty of course, that suggests a relationship between Joshua and Thomas Yo., but that needs more substantiation.

The other known Yarbroughs in early Amelia and New Kent Counties of the Virginia Colony besides Edmundand Thomas, are Henry, James, John, William, and Zachariah. The fact that descendants of these branches share the same family stories indicates that these early settlers were kinsmen; further, the descendants of these original New World settlers seemed to know of, and kept in touch with, these other relatives, as evidenced by their contacting and/or settling nearby when they too decamped to the same locale as the other Yarbroughs. Coincidence – perhaps.

Another factor contributing to the new arrivals settling near other Yarbroughs were the routes utilized by settlers traveling to other locations. These were the Indian hunting trails, which soon became the migration routes as the settlers moved into Kentucky, Tennessee, the Carolinas, and across those states into the southwestern states. These routes were somewhat limited by the geography of the eastern portion of the New World. The Appalachian range was, for the transportation then available, a formidable barrier. The discovery of the Cumberland Trail was a major find and opened up the Midwest and Kentucky. Another major route paralleled the Appalachian Mountains southwesterly into the Carolinas and

across Georgia and Alabama, thence westerly across the Mississippi River.


The Creek-Indian War is credited with the settling of Alabama by Andrew Jackson's men after this war – another myth. Most of the settlers came via South Carolina, and they did so in such numbers that there is a large cemetery in Texas Valley north of Rome, GA, called the South Carolina Immigrant's Cemetery. As stated earlier, the route though North and South Carolina, across Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi followed the old Indian trail, a branch of which also took others into Tennessee. Thus, an experienced family genealogist has only to look at a map to determine where to look for family ancestors of a certain period of time.

There's a story that Old Richard obtained a land grant from the King. That may be true, as the Crown wanted to encourage immigration so as to strengthen the English claim to the lands of the New World. It does not necessarily indicate a close relationship with the Crown, although that claim has been made and keeps cropping up. So far, this probably shouldn't taken as fact.

Another story is that all the Yarbrough's here came from England. There's documentation showing some have come from Europe and also Ireland. However, it should be recognized that during the time that the early American Colonies were being populated, there was a bitter War going on in England, and many fled England, both to Europe and to Ireland (as well as Scotland). Thus, this story is for the most part true; it's just that some took a longer route to get here.

Finally, there are the three family myths<sup>1</sup> so excellently related by the late Senator Ralph Webster Yarborough.

In conclusion, we may never fully understand who was related to whom and in what manner regarding our early New World ancestors. However, the DNA test results so far are beginning to show some connections that previously were at best murky. What is clear is that they braved unknowns to be a part of the formation of a new life and a new country. In so doing, they have proved themselves to be hardy, unafraid, venturesome and persistent. There is no question about our having a very healthy legacy.



### Now What?



We're under a hundred days away from our conference in Charleston, and it seems like only a few weeks ago we were in Dallas. Time flies when one is having fun, I reckon. Our conference are also Association business meetings, and an opportunity for our members to offer suggestions/advice as to what we should be up to. We really want ideas, as well as help.

The Blandford Project is completed, and the books are safely shelved at the Williamson County Library in Franklin, TN. There's still a lot of work required by these volumes. For example, there are thirteen sets of volumes (ranging from four to over ten volumes) of various family lines. These could benefit from

having duplicate pages removed and perhaps a re-ordering of material. In my view, the logical next step would be to accomplish this. Ideally, someone with a very large dining room table or conference room and table and who has editing experience would be the person to take on one of these family sets. The fact is, most of the 159 volumes, with the possible exception of Peter Yerburgh's two volumes, could use the removal of duplicate pages as well as a re-ordering of the included material. So this would be one of my candidate future projects.

Another project would be the family DNA Project. It's been largely neglected since the death of the project's originator, the late James Yarbrough of Houston, TX. Jim was devoted to it, and his accomplishment with the project is a lasting tribute. We owe him much. At this moment, we have some one hundred thirty-odd individuals who have been tested. Their results have been categorized into eight family groups, of which the bulk of the test data fall into one of two major groups. The largest group includes the Thomas Yo., line, Ambrose Y., Joseph Yo., Henry Murray Y., Thomas Yo., James Y., Moses Yo., and Benjamin Y. Given that Ambrose is now believed to be a direct descendant of Richard the Immigrant, this consistent with the belief that many, if not most of us Yarbroughs are descended from Old Richard's family.

The second largest family group consists of the descendants of Joshua Yarborough, and the DNA results clearly indicate the similarity to that of the largest group. Clearly, Joshua's group could use more samples (and family pedigrees) in order to provide a clearer picture of family relationships. Another group consists of an Afro-American family, and the remainder are equally sparse. One group clearly shows a relationship to our British family counterparts (and does not match the data of Richard and Ambrose. More data is needed, which mean more attention needs to be given to re-invigorating our family DNA project. In this case, consideration of earmarking a portion of the annual dues to a testing fund ought to be worthwhile. Obtaining matching funds from donations and/or other sources could be pursued, as well.

Next, it's time to consider the refurbishment/replacement of the marker to the gravesite of Old Richard Yarborough. The first replacement led to the formation of the YNGHA; perhaps another effort might be as significant to our family. Again, an earmark might be worth considering. Also, 2020 isn't all that far off, either.

Another project (or projects) consist of preparing/delivering some family seminars at Historical Society/family reunions. This would be a bit of work to get started, but it's also greatly appreciated by those who benefit from such a seminar. I've had the opportunity to address a couple of such groups this past year, and it's been fun (much to my surprise). Better yet, I found out about a couple of allied families of which I had little knowledge from some of those attending my talks.

At the moment, finances for the YNGHA appear to healthy, not that we couldn't always want more. However, it might be worth considering the impact the dues have on our membership numbers. The other family associations I know of have lower dues and higher memberships. They have the same demographics as we, and that include a number of folks on limited budgets. We talk of getting younger members, and it seems to me, we overlook the fact these younger families have children of school/college age. The difference between \$15.00/\$20.00 and \$30.00 is more of a challenge to them than it is to most of us active in the YNGHA now. From my vantage point, I think dues of \$10.00 would be far more attractive that either \$ 20.00 or \$30.00. Coloring my thinking are the numbers of viewers we now have for our website – over 680 now and for the Facebook Family Group – over 540 now.

Currently, we get around \$2500 annually in dues; if we could attract 20% of the viewer pool at – say \$15.00 – that would just about double our revenue from dues. Personally, I would opt for \$10.00 for annual dues, and charge another \$5.00 for anyone wanting a paper copy of the Quarterly.

This brings the discussion to the elephant in the room – just what is the value of membership in our Association. The Board of Directors have been looking a this for several months now, focusing on "Who do we think we are, anyway?" This question can be parsed into these three questions:


- What value does the YNGHA offer the community of Yarbroughs and it allied families?
- Is this worth providing?
- What does our membership want (or think)?

In nothing else, the YNGHA keeps the extended Yarbrough families' heritage through:

- Collecting and Maintaining the Genealogies of the Extended Yarbrough and allied families;
- Recording Family Stories and Accomplishments;
- Publicizing the Heritage and Accomplishments of Our Families.

So far, we have not had an extended discussion with our Association's user community, which is now quite appreciable. We have over 500 members of the YNGHA Facebook Group; nearly 700 registered viewers, as well as our Association paid members. There is time set aside for this discussion at the forthcoming conference in Charleston, and the Board of Directors expect this will be one of the more successful conference in terms of reaffirmation of purpose, as well as of mission and projects to be undertaken in the coming years.

I am sure there are some other topics worth considering. It would be a great help to hear from everyone about their thoughts about what we should be doing for the next three or four years. Think about it, and maybe drop a line to the <u>YNGHA</u>.



## Edmund Yarbrough (1766 – 1850) and Sophia Gostwick (Gossett) (1768 – 1841)

This is one of the early family lines of whose relationship to Richard the Immigrant is uncertain. Our DNA evidence shows a connection between Edmund and Joshua Yarborough, whereas neither have documentary evidence of direct descendancy from Richard the Immigrant. Given the birth year of Edmund, he could be a son of Joshua II, who is the right age and at the right location to have been Edmund's father. However, there is little other evidence to confirm such a relationship. To make this even more frustrating is the existence of British records of an Edmund Yarborough going back to the mid-fifteenth century, AD. There's just a big gap between Edmund of the New World and the Edmund of the Old World, with a great deal of conjecture and little in the way of provenance.

The following descendants record<sup>2</sup> comes from one of Edmund's allied families, the Fishers, who appear both in West Tennessee and in Texas with the Yarbroughs.

### Some Other Early Yarbroughs

As mentioned earlier, it was originally believed by family researchers that there was Richard (the Immigrant) Yarborough from Lincolnshire, who was followed soon afterwards by Ambrose Yarb(o)rough from Yorkshire. Pauline Gray<sup>3</sup> mentions him as follows:

"Ambrose Yarbrough was born into the Yarbrough - de Bateson family of Yorkshire, England, in the year 1710. At age 22 he immigrated to the Virginia Colony. He went to Prince George County, VA, and joined his cousins, the descendants of Richard Yarbrough, in 1732. (This is no longer valid, although Ambrose may indeed been with his American cousins). He later went to Culpepper County, Virginia, where a 68 acre tract of land was granted him in 1758. In 1776, Ambrose and wife Mary sold their 68 acres and moved to South Carolina. He died in Union County, South Carolina, in 1788. Known children of Ambrose and Ma~are: Jonathan, Ambrose, Jr., Humphrey, Ann, Jeremiah, Mary, and John."

Now, also as stated previously, it appears Ambrose is descendant of Richard. It is my current belief that someone<sup>4</sup> mistakenly took York as a place or origin to mean Yorkshire, England, when in fact the place of origin was York County, Virginia. Accepting this and also the following discussion about Edward Yarborrough and his son, the argument for Richard being accompanied by other members of his families when he immigrated is strengthened. This so far is not sufficient for provenance. It does, however, weakens the argument that Richard was alone when he immigrated. We also have evidence that Richard was accompanied by his son Richard II. There is one other consideration, too. Travel to the New World in the early 17<sup>th</sup> century was a risky venture. Only a foolhardy individual would do that, and enough is known of Richard's subsequent accomplishments to disprove that he was foolish. Thus, it is much more than just likely that he was part of a group of kinsmen who banded together for mutual protection as they undertook the voyage to the New World.

According to Mrs. Gray<sup>5</sup>, Edward Yarborrough appeared ca 1645:

"Be it known unto all men by these presents that I Richard Pasmuch for and in consideration of ... natural love and affection which I ,,, bear unto Edward Yarborrough, son of Edward Yarborrough late of York I do give unto Edw. Yarborrough, Jun. and his heirs and assigns, one pide (sic) black and white cow calf being marked as follows, viz. cross on the right ear, a hole in ye right and so slit out and ye fore part of ye left ear cut out to have & to hold ye cow calf with all her female increase unto ye Edward Yarborrough Jun. or his heirs or assigns forever from and against all men shall and will warrant and forever defend by ye presents ye male increase descending back unto me Richard Pasmuch or my heirs or assigns. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal on ye 25th day of May 1646 and in ye two and twentieth year of ye Reign of our sovereign lord Charles by ye grace of God King of England."

Signed /s/ Rich R Pasmuch

From page 95 of the same record is found a bill of sale whereby Richard Lee sold Edward

Yarrow, son of Edward Yarrow, dec'd, a brown cow and calf in Jan. 1645. The mutilated record was next to impossible to read, but it was evident that it had a provision that if Edward died before becoming twenty-one, something {could not be deciphered} should take place. This proves Edward was a young boy. Another record found on Reel IA, Record 3, Wills, Orders, Deeds 1 Etc., 1657-1662, p. 28, was a court order dated 25 June 1658, stating:


"It is ordered that the sheriff convey Edward Yarbrough son of Edward Yarbrough, dec'd, to the next court to be delivered to the constable and from that constable to another constable until he be delivered to Col. Robert Abrall who is desired by this Court to dispose of him to his Mother or other ways which are fitting. Next Court to be 24 Aug. 1658."

A thorough search of other records of York County turned up nothing else on this Edward or any other Yarbrough. Perhaps Edward was taken to another county to live with his mother. Evidently he had been serving an apprenticeship as was customary in those days to teach children a trade.

There was another immigrant to York Co., Virginia. In Greer's EARLY VIRGINIA IMMIGRANTS 1623-1666, page 374, we find: In 1653 Christian Yarblow immigrated to York Co., Virginia. Thomas Willis was the patentee or party bringing him over.

Mrs. Gray goes on, "For a time I completely ignored him because of the spelling of his surname. In fact when I first started my research, I ignored all spellings except two-Yarbrough and Yarborough--until I found my own Yarbrough ancestors spelled Yarbrow and Yarber. Nell Morris Jenkins in her Yarbrough Quarterly stated that she believed this Christian to be Richard Yarbrough, Jr., son of Richard the Immigrant, his middle name being used to distinguish him from his father. 7

"When you examine the facts, however, this doesn't seem likely, for according to a New Kent County Court record ... Richard Yarbrough, Jr., was born about 1652. A year old child wouldn't likely be coming to America without his mother or father, unless, of course, the mother had died in England and Mr. Willis was bringing him to his father. While searching the York County records, I found no mention of Christian, and I've not seen his name in any other county records."



## Indenture

#### Path to the New World

Indenturing, as a practice, had been well established in England prior to the discovery of the New World. The Ordinance of Labourers, enacted June 1349, required men and women under the age of sixty who did not practice a craft must serve anyone requiring their labor. Parliament updated the law in 1495 and again 1563, with the latter version, the Statute of Artificers being in effect when Jamestown was founded. Between 1520 and 1630, England's population more than doubled, from 2.3 million to 4.8 million, and Parliament hoped its 1563 statute would reduce unemployment and create responsibility of the unemployed. The founding of Virginia itself was partially in response to this problem. It was argued to Queen Elizabeth that new American colonies would energize England's "decayed trades" and provide work for the country's "multitudes of loyterers and idle vagabondes."

An indenture, a contract for labor, was a personal covenant and applied to farm laborers or apprentices learning a trade. An indenture generally lasted a year, after which terms were renegotiated. Men and women willingly became servants in order to improve their prospects. Children, too, were sometimes bound to service by parents who could not otherwise afford their upbringing. There was not necessarily a strong stigma attached to indentured servitude, but the institution nonetheless temporarily transformed free men and women into chattel.

The Virginia Company of London always had more land than labor to work it. At first, the company attempted to entice investors by offering them shares that were redeemable for land. The company soon began shipping servants to Virginia at its own expense and placing them on company-owned land. Once the servants arrived, the company would rent them out to planters for a year at a time, requiring the planters to take responsibility for the workers' food, shelter, and health.

The introduction of marketable tobacco created substantial opportunities for would-be planters, but because tobacco was a demanding, labor-intensive crop, it also required a large number of laborers. At the same time, tobacco's acceptance as a medium of exchange prompted planters to enhance their productivity. Between the 1620s and the 1670s, the annual output of tobacco per hand rose from approximately 710 pounds to around 1,600 pounds; during the same period, shipping costs decreased. Although tobacco prices had begun to decline sharply by late in the 1620s and continued to fall, production remained profitable because planters were able to produce larger crops with fewer hands. Yet even as they technically required fewer servants, planters demanded more. That's because tobacco consumption rose in response to lower prices, and planters, eager to meet that demand, increased their production. Private investors as well as the Virginia Company expense continued to ship laborers while the company rid itself of its role as rental agent. Instead, it sold servants directly to planters at a price based on the cost of passage. Planters, mariners, and merchants then fixed the servants' years of service based on the labor required to recoup their acquisition and subsistence costs.

The servants themselves ranged from convicted criminals to skilled workers, and in time sank to the lowest rungs of the Virginia social ladder. While tenants kept half of what they earned, servants kept nothing, being mostly at the mercy of their masters. Movement up the ladder was limited, even once a term of service had been completed, although servants with marketable skills had a greater chance of success.

The company found it unnecessary to continue incurring the cost of transporting servants. Instead, it implemented a practice that used the prospect of land to entice new colonists, and with them laborers. Headrights awarded 100 acres of land each to planters who had been in the colony since May 1616, and 50 acres each to anyone who covered the cost of bringing in a new immigrant. Many were indentured servants, allowing successful planters simultaneous access to land and labor, with no upfront cost to the company. Merchants and mariners reaped a benefit, too, for they recruited prospective servants, bargained their indenture terms with them, and then sold the contracts to planters in Virginia. Merchants also accumulated the headrights so as to acquire land.

Groups of investors occasionally and collectively absorbed the cost of outfitting and transporting workers to the colony. Virginia Company of London stockholders were entitled to 100 acres per share. High-ranking officials were furnished with indentured servants as part of their stipend. In some instances groups of investors promised to give land to their indentured servants after they fulfilled their contracts. The Society of Berkeley Hundred's

investors offered their skilled servants parcels that ranged from 25 to 50 acres, to be claimed once they had fulfilled their contracts.

There is little question that the difference between indenture as it was practiced and slavery. Servitude in Virginia's tobacco fields was closer to slavery than anything known at the time, so wrote the historian Edmund S. Morgan. "Men served longer, were subjected to more rigorous punishments, [and] were traded about as commodities" beginning in the 1620s. For much of the seventeenth century, those servants were white English men and women—with a smattering of Africans, Indians, and Irish—under indenture with the promise of freedom. By 1705, and the passage of "An act concerning Servants and Slaves," slavery had become ensconced at all levels of Virginia society and was well on its way to completely replacing indentured servitude as the primary source of bound labor in the colony.

Most historians have explained this shift by citing either social or economic shifts in Virginia beginning around the 1670s. Morgan and others, for instance, have argued that Bacon's Rebellion (1676–1677) was, in part, the result of discontent among former servants. By harnessing that discontent and, in the name of racial solidarity, pointing it in the direction of enslaved Africans, white elites could create a more stable workforce and one that was less likely to threaten their own interests. Other historians have observed that the flow of English servants began to dry up beginning in the 1660s and fell off dramatically around 1680, forcing planters to rely more heavily on slaves. Slavery did not end indentured servitude; rather the end of servitude gave rise to slavery.

The historian John C. Coombs has suggested a third possibility: "There was no 'trigger' cause for the conversion." Instead, slavery expanded gradually as the English empire grew, its role in the slave trade matured, and enslaved Africans became more available throughout Virginia. By the 1670s, slaves had begun to replace white indentured servants among the Virginia gentry—before both Bacon's Rebellion and the sharp decline in new servants. By 1690, slaves accounted for nearly all of the gentry's bound workforce but only 25 to 40 percent of the non-elite's. Over time, as the supply of enslaved Africans increased and their prices decreased, farmers and planters agreed that they preferred a slave for life to a servant who had the hope of freedom. Even so, indentured servants—particularly those with specialized skills—and convict servants continued to be imported to Virginia throughout the eighteenth century.

#### **Time Line**

June 1349 - The English Parliament passes the Ordinance of Labourers, declaring that everyone under the age of sixty not practicing a craft must serve anyone requiring their labor.

1520–1630 - England's population more than doubles, from 2.3 million to 4.8 million people.

January 12, 1563 - The English Parliament passes the Statute of Artificers, which compiles and revises 200 years' of indentured servitude law. It is still in effect when Jamestown was founded.

1584 - Richard Hakluyt (the younger) presents a treatise on colonization, the Discourse on Western Planting, to Queen Elizabeth.

November 18, 1618 - The Virginia Company of London issues its "Instructions to George Yeardley," (the Great Charter) which established the General Assembly and the headright system.

August 4, 1619 - The General Assembly passes a law requiring all servants to register with the secretary of state upon arrival in Virginia.

September 7, 1619 - Robert Coopy of North Nibley, Gloucester, England, age unknown, signs a three-year indenture to work as a servant for the proprietors of the Berkeley Hundred plantation in Virginia.

1620–1670 - The annual output of tobacco per hand rises from approximately 710 pounds to around 1,600 pounds. During the same time, shipping costs decrease.

1620 - Fifteen-year-old Robert Townshend arrives in Virginia as an apprentice to Dr. John Pott.

July 18, 1620 - The Virginia Company of London declares its intention to pay to ship 800 new settlers to Virginia, including tenants, apprentices, young women, and indentured servants.

March 30, 1624 - In a petition addressed to the governor and General Court, the indentured servant Jane Dickenson pleads for her release from Dr. John Pott. A former prisoner of Virginia Indians, Dickenson claims that Pott's treatment of her is worse.

October 10, 1624 - The General Court hears testimony concerning the deaths of two indentured servants, Elizabeth Abbott and Elias Hinton, at the hands of their masters, John and Alice Proctor.

January 31, 1625 - The General Court hears testimony in the case of an indentured servant, William Mutch, who allegedly was attacked by his master after he demanded his so-called freedom dues, or the payment servants customarily receive upon completion of their contracts.

1630–1680 - 75,000 people immigrate to the Chesapeake Bay colonies, 50,000 of whom are indentured servants and most are men.

March 1633 - The Dutchman David Pieterson DeVries visits Virginia and makes note of both the high mortality rate among newcomers and the poor treatment of indentured servants.

March 1642 - The General Assembly enacts laws regulating the time served by servants without indentures, requiring servants to carry certificates, prohibiting masters from hiring servants without proper papers, and punishing servants who become pregnant.

July 31, 1649 - The Lower Norfolk County Court considers two depositions that attest to the mistreatment, by Deborah Fernehaugh, of her indentured servant Charetie Dallen.

March 1657 - The General Assembly enacts laws revising the required time of service for servants without indentures; granting servants the right to take complaints to court; and adding time to indentures, in the case of pregnancy and secret marriages, to male and female servants both.

1658 - The Whole Duty of Man, a Protestant devotional work, is published anonymously. Many scholars believe the author to be Richard Allestree.

March 1661 - The General Assembly enacts laws requiring "suffitient" diet and clothing for servants making their transatlantic voyage, prohibiting "cruell" treatment after arrival, and requiring large fines to be paid to the local parish by the master of any servant who becomes pregnant.

March 1661 - In "Concerning Indians," the General Assembly regulates the various interactions Virginia colonists have with neighboring Virginia Indians.

December 1662 - The General Assembly enacts two laws requiring children of pregnant servants should be handed over to the church, and that, upon their freedom, the mothers must serve the parish for two years as reimbursement.

March 14, 1664 - Lott Richards, a merchant from Bristol, England, sells a boy, William Freeman eleven years old and without indenture to John Barnes for a term of eight years.

June 16, 1675 - The General Court orders the black indentured servant Phillip Gowen to be freed, finding that his master cheated him.

February 1676 - The General Assembly directs masters not to make bargains with their

indentured servants in an attempt to trick them into extended terms of service.

1690 - By this year, enslaved Africans and African Americans account for nearly all of the Virginia gentry's bound workforce. Slaves account for 25 to 40 percent of the workforce.

September 1696 - In an act for punishment of fornication and other offences, the General Assembly addresses the perennial problems of swearing, drunkenness, and sex.

October 1705 - In "An act concerning Servants and Slaves," the General Assembly compiles and revises more than eighty years of law regarding indentured servants and enslaved Africans.

August 1755 - Twenty-one-year-old William Buckland, a carpenter and joiner from Oxford, England, signs a four-year indenture to work as a servant for George Mason. Buckland will oversee construction of Gunston Hall in Fairfax County.

#### **Marjorie Foster Yarbrough**








instrumental in forming and naming.


Sawmill. He enjoyed fishing, gardening and hunting. He was a loving and devoted brother, husband, father and grandfather who will be truly missed by all who knew him.

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

Jollings... Wow!!! The conference is Charleston (well, actually Mt. Pleasant, SC, just across the river) went very well. There were several first time visitors, some recent new members, and a couple of guests with them. There are a number of things worth mentioning, the most important being a review

of what value the YNGHA bring to its members. This included a discussion of both what and how it fulfills its mission. The discussion followed the charts (identity.pdf) that outlined the course of the discussion, and everyone participated.

We came away with an addition to the Association's mission: authentication of family pedigrees. We also included the addition of conducting "mini-conferences" or speaking at state and local historical and genealogical meetings in those states with appreciable numbers of our families. This, of course, widens the opportunity for everyone to participate regularly in YNGHA, as we will need more than just a few Board members to do this well.

We also recognized the need to have a coherent operations plan, in order to be more effective in fulfilling our mission. Basically, that will focus how we use our assets wisely as we pursue these activities:

- Restoring/preserving Old Richard Yarborough's gravestone;
- Editing/revising our digitized records;
- Authenticating family pedigrees;
- Recording and publicizing our shared heritage and history.

It was heartening to note that we have in the last few weeks before the conference both a number of new members but also ones who are younger. It would be even better if this turns out to be a trend. Another action taken at the Board meeting was the reduction of dues to \$15.00/year, beginning this December (traditionally, any dues paid in December are credited to the following year). The dues were last raised to \$30.00 from \$20.00 in order to help defray the costs of digitizing and publishing the records now known as the Blandford Series of Yarbrough Family Records. We've met that goal early this year, and we are now in a sound fiscal status. Hence, lowering the dues should help attract more new members, which in turn further helps ensure the financial security of the Association.

"County Library receives large addition to the genealogical

collection" — so reads the headline from the July 20, 2017, community feature of the Williamson County Herald. The Williamson County was selected as the repository of the 159 volumes of the YNGHA's collection of Yarbrough family records. One of the deciding factors was the Library's willingness to let the YNGHA check out the collection for its conferences. As can be seen in the following photographs, the collection makes an impressive display, and both we and the Library are justifiably proud of the collection.

The Yarbrough National Genealogical & Historical Association, which documents descendants of the House of Yarbrough, recently donated more than 155 volumes of family history to the Williamson County Library Special Collections department. About 30 Yarbrough family members from across the country recently attended the biannual Yarbrough Family Conference held in Franklin. During the conference, Special Collections librarian Marcia Frasier accepted the collection. The numerous books are a result of almost 40 years of work that actually started 400 or more years ago. Family member Robert Price Yarbrough came across a grave marker in the Old Blandford Cemetery in Petersburg, Va. The gravestone was in bad shape but family researchers agreed it was that of Richard Yarbrough, a member of the House of Yarbrough - "purportedly the 11th oldest English house" – who was born in

Lincolnshire, England in 1615. He immigrated to the New World in 1643, according to Leonard Yarbrough, a retired engineer and board member of the YNGHA who currently maintains the Yarbrough Family website. Richard Yarbrough was a planter, fur trader and linguist who learned to communicate with the Indian tribes in the area and traded with them. He died in 1702 and was one of the first to be buried in the old cemetery, Leonard said.

Many of Robert's descendants kept records and diaries, and passed down stories of their travels as they immigrated west, as well as of their lives - all of which have become important components in the family's research and provided more than 55,000 pages of documents. Researchers also use DNA tests to confirm lineage. "The bulk of the Yarbroughs live in the Southwestern and Southeastern states," Leonard said.

It took Franklin resident Joan Yarbrough Singlaub working with James Yarbrough of Nashville and Williamson County former Special Collections Librarian Jason Gavin and current librarian Marcia Frasier to work out the parameters regarding the donation of the volumes of Yarbrough family genealogy and United States history. "We wanted to be able to have access to the volumes for generations to come," Jim Yarbrough said. Many libraries wouldn't allow the volumes to be removed for the family's biannual conferences where new family members and information is shared, corroborated, verified and added all of which have become important components in the family's research and provided more than 55,000 pages of documents. Researchers also use DNA tests to confirm lineage.

"We wanted to be able to have access to the volumes for generations to come," Jim Yarbrough said. Many libraries wouldn't allow the volumes to be removed for the family's biannual conferences where new family members and information is shared, corroborated, verified and added to the volumes.
"Marcia and Jason and the Williamson County Library were

so receptive to bringing the volumes here. Franklin is a movie set of history and genealogy. What better setting is there in America?" Jim said. Williamson County was also chosen because of its central location within the United States, which allows easy access to family members researching their genealogy.

"During the conference we have storytelling – we tell stories about the family - that's how information was passed for 25 generations," said Leonard. There are more than 120 family members actively participating in the research, 700 registered on the website and 45,000-50,000 Yarbroughs in the United States at the moment, Leonard said. Although they're not all descended from the House of Yarbrough, "The possibilities are unlimited," Leonard said.

#### Ambrose Yarbrough (ca 1730 – 1740)

One of the founders of the YNGHA was Robert Price Yarbrough, who is one of Ambrose's descendants. At the time that Robert published his definitive book on Ambrose, it was believed that his ancestor was an immigrant from Yorkshire, as well as a kinsman of Richard the Immigrant. The latter is true, but it has since been learned that Ambrose is a direct lineal descendant of the Immigrant. DNA test results are in agreement with this. As is the case with others who were in Colonial Virginia, the connection to our British cousins is still very much uncertain. While we have records of the family going back to the mid-ninth century AD, we can only continue to search for the "missing links".

The following descendants record¹ was compiled from Robert Price's books and various records in the Blandford Series of Yarbrough Family Records. While it is believed that the information is correct, this cannot be guaranteed and the reader should, as always, perform his/her own provenance of the information that appears below. If any errors are noted, please forward to the <u>YNGHA</u>.

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
## What We Are Doing

### **Cody Yarborough**

Cody Yarborough, president of Yarborough Tile, LLC lives with his wife Jaclyn and their four kids in Stephenville. But his company — that includes Daco Group — operates in the Texas and beyond. It does it all: tile-related including manufacturing, sales, distribution, installation and more.

The Whataburger.com website reports that the company, a 700-restaurant chain, spans every state from Arizona to Florida. It's been doing Whataburger since 1991 and it works with other restaurants, hospitals and other medical facilities. Basically, if somebody needs anything related to tile, Yarborough does it.

He's a third-generation tile worker following in the footsteps of his grandfather — the original tile man in the family — followed by Cody's dad, and now Cody. It's in his DNA. Tile work is the thing he likes best, although he does a lot of other things in construction.



## Hattve Yarbrough<sup>2</sup>

As a high school student living with her aunt's family in Paris. Tennessee, Hattye Thomas Yarbrough inherited a room with a bookcase full of books by African American authors. Works by civil rights leader James Weldon Johnson, poet Langston Hughes, writer W.E.B. Du Bois, and copies of magazines and newspapers such as Negro Digest and The Chicago Defender opened up a new world for the teen.



"Out of that experience," she says, "I told myself there would never be a child growing up around me who would not know that we've made a difference as African Americans in this country." Honored in 1989 as one of President George H.W. Bush's Points of Light for her efforts as a black-history advocate in her Covington, Tennessee, community just northeast of Memphis, the 96-year old retired librarian and teacher is adding to her legacy. Her World War II scrapbook is now part of the foundational collection of the Smithsonian's newest museum, the National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington, D.C. Yarbrough and members of her family attended the opening last September.

During the summer of 19113, Yarbrough worked the soda fountain at the Army's Camp Tyson just outside Paris, near the Tennessee-Kentucky border. "I collected pictures, insignias and patches from military men on the troop trains, those who came into our town for recreation or church, and those who came to our house or to Lane College, where I was a student," Yarbrough says. "Wherever soldiers were traveling, I would ask them their names, hometowns, branch of service. It's all written in the scrapbook."


One particular soldier sent her rocks from the Normandy beaches inscribed with the D-Day date of June 6, 1944, along with spent shell casings. These are among the items on display at the Smithsonian. Yarbrough continued to keep the scrapbook, which also

includes photos, newspaper clippings and magazine articles, throughout her time working at the Waynesville Junction USO near Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, after her graduation from Lane. There, Yarbrough, an aspiring artist, helped celebrated painter Samuel Countee create a backdrop for a play by one of the soldiers stationed there: Ossie Davis, who went on to great fame as an actor, director and playwright. "He would tell us he was going to make it big one day, and we'd say. 'Yeah, right. 'We didn't believe him," she says.

Yarbrough earned her Tennessee library teachE certification at Fisk University studying with Arna Bontemps, a noted poet and member of the Harlem Renaissance. When she arrived at Peabody College in 19611 to begin summer courses that would lead to her master of library science degree, it was the first year African American students were allowed to live in the dormitories. "Any time someone invites me to speak about the contributions of African Americans to the history of America," she says, "I always tell them I was taught at Peabody that it isn't the person who knows the most facts who is the best educated. It's the person who knows how to find the facts when they need them."

Yarbrough continues to work to correct American history's omission of African Americans. She is among a group working to open an African American museum in her hometown of Covington. According to the local Covington Leader, she told city leaders, "I'm not getting any younger, and I'd like to see it in my lifetime."



#### **Eddie Yarbrough**

Eddie Yarbrough is a Colorado native. On Sunday he faces his hometown team, the one that cut him in 2016 as an undrafted rookie. And Yarbrough's family will be in attendance to see it.

This Sunday against the Denver Broncos Eddie Yarbrough Jr. will face his former team, the team that cut him and put his NFL career in doubt. Yarbrough is one of the most persevering 24-year-olds you'll meet. From being kicked to the streets by his hometown team, he's now sacking former MVP's for the Buffalo Bills.

Yarbrough is from Aurora, CO, and his high school is about a half an hour from Sports Authority Field at Mile High Stadium. You could say it's pretty fitting his first NFL gig was with the Broncos. He went undrafted out of the University of Wyoming in 2016. Eventually he'd sign with Denver as a rookie. Wyoming's all-time leader in tackles for a loss (39) stuck with the team until the final day of cuts on September 2. He didn't sign with another team for the entire 2016 season.

"Last season at home on the couch and a lot of people said I should start looking for a job and use your degree. Instead I was working out every day, swimming, boxing, working out three times a day. And people were asking me then, 'Eddie why are you doing this? What is this for?' I knew then and I know now it was all for this moment,"

#### Yarbrough said.

His resilience has certainly been worthwhile. It also doesn't go without notice when a pass rusher sets a school record in tackles for loss. He made a huge impact at a small school for the Wyoming Cowboys. Yarbrough credits that school in the high plains for preparing him to compete at the highest level.

"One of the things all of my coaches at Wyoming taught me is, 'What have you done for me lately?' ... How do you contribute, and you need to be consistent. A little Wyoming mantra, shout out to Coach Bohl, is that consistency breeds excellence. It's not you can have one good day or do this one day and oh you're the best in the world, you have to do it on a consistent basis... I definitely feel they prepared me for this moment," Yarbrough said.

With Buffalo's defensive line constantly rotating, he's getting a chance to live in the moment. In his first two regular season games he has tallied four tackles; the biggest of his NFL career came this Sunday when he brought down the 2015 MVP, Cam Newton. That would be Yarbrough's first career sack in the NFL.

"I took my steps, got off good, came to the side and everything immediately slowed down... and all of a sudden I hit him and everything's in slow motion and I get up. You go through all these scenarios in your head, like I'm going to do this I'm going to do a celebration but honestly I couldn't even feel my feet I was so excited. I was floating out there; all my teammates came and supported me, jumped on me and stuff. Definitely a special moment," Yarbrough said.

His milestone moment wasn't only special for him, but for his father also, Eddie Yarbrough Sr. The two share a special bond.

"I'm not going to tell you no lie, I almost cried... I was like 'oh my god that's my baby look at him'," said the elder Yarbrough.

Yarbrough's father paved the way for him. His dad has had the same message for his whole life. "Eddie has turned into a man that his daddy never lied to. I always told him the truth... I never lied to him. I told him if you didn't do good, you didn't do good... I was his hero first and then he became my hero," Yarbrough's father said. "He listened. He never was a bad kid, he never wanted to be in trouble. He always wanted to be perfect for his daddy. He went hunting with me, he fished with me. He did everything with me."

Talking with Yarbrough and his father, it was fascinating at how seamless their conversations were.

"My dad is my number one role model. He always knows what to say... such a service he did to me growing up, this is coming from the first time I stepped on a football field. My dad never sugarcoated anything and he never lied to me. He always let me know how it is and again that's such a service that he did for me," Yarbrough said.

Yarbrough Sr. has been there for the whole ride, even when his son was young and had aspirations of playing in the NFL. Yarbrough's father deserves a lot of credit for his son's success, but he was adamant to have Yarbrough's first coach mentioned in shaping his son.

"His first coach was named Bruce Reilly... he's passed on now, but Bruce Reilly was his first head coach and he had a lot to do with Eddie's personality," Yarbrough's father said.

Now Yarbrough is here, in Buffalo, thanks to Reilly and Yarbrough Sr. It's still going to take some time to set in for Yarbrough's father.

"It's almost like it's bigger than a dream. It's almost like a football angel or something, I don't know how to describe it. It still hasn't really soaked all the way in," said the eldest Yarbrough. "But to see him out there and I'm the first one to teach him the three-point stance, showed him how to swim and swat... oh my God I don't even know how to explain it. It's unbelievable, man."



### Marion Palmer Yarborough<sup>3</sup>

Deputies now say a man stole guns from his girlfriend's Gastonia home and then pretended to sell them in an attempt to rob people of their money.

The man who answered the door at his Painter Lane residence outside of Lincolnton around 2:45 p.m. on Saturday, May 6, believed Marion Palmer Yarborough and another man were there to sell him weapons, Lincoln County Sheriff David Carpenter said. But after he showed interest in paying, the resident realized this was not a typical transaction.

"It was determined to be a robbery by the people that came from Gastonia," Carpenter said. "Once they got there they attempted to rob the folks of the money they were going to pay for the weapons."

The Gastonia men had the male resident drop to the floor at gunpoint, when a woman emerged from a back bedroom firing her handgun. Gunshots sprayed from both those in and outside the mobile home, and the 51-year-old Yarborough was shot to death in the crossfire.

The other Gastonia man, a black male, fled the scene with a black woman. Deputies are still trying to locate them.

Charges are not expected to be filed against the shooter as this appears to have been a case of self-defense, but District Attorney Mike Miller will make the final decision, Carpenter said.

The stolen guns in question came from Yarborough's girlfriend, deputies say. Vickie Currence filed a police report after the shooting, telling Gastonia law enforcement that two pistols and a shotgun were swiped from her Arrowhead Circle home the previous Monday.


If the Sheriff's Office version of events is true, this wouldn't have been Yarborough's first brush with armed robbery. In 2009, he and another man teamed to rob the foster mom of Yarborough's nephew, who was originally charged for arranging for the robbery to happen, WRAL reported.

Yarborough, then of Raleigh, spent nearly seven years in prison for the Zebulon home invasion. He was released in Gaston County back in March, according to Department of Public Safety records.

He was also convicted of common law robbery in 2001 and 2008 and of robbery with a dangerous weapon in 1990. He spent five separate stints in state prisons.

Yarborough is the first person to have been shot to death in Lincoln County this year.

"It's very relieving that many more people weren't injured," Carpenter said. "I'm sad that it ended as it did, but it's a relief there weren't more folks hurt."



### Terrence Eugene Yarborough<sup>4</sup>



A former principal at an Alexandria middle school has been arrested after authorities said he smacked a female student on the buttocks.

Mount Vernon police said 53-year-old Terrence Eugene Yarborough of Woodbridge was accused of hitting a 12-year-old girl on her buttocks at Carl Sandburg Middle School on April 4.

The student was in the cafeteria with friends when Yarborough asked the girl to pick something up from the floor and she declined, according to police. After she refused a


second time, police said Yarborough smacked the girl on her buttocks. Authorities said the student left the cafeteria and reported the incident to a teacher. Former Carl Sandburg Middle School Principal Terrence Eugene Yarborough was charged with misdemeanor assault and battery on July 10, 2017.

An investigation was launched and Yarborough was removed from the school and placed on administrative leave.

Yarborough was charged with misdemeanor assault and battery on July 10. He was released and was scheduled to appear in Fairfax County Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court on Aug. 4.

Fairfax County Public Schools released the following statement to FOX 5:

"FCPS takes all allegations of staff misconduct very seriously. After these allegations were first referred to FCPS investigators, Mr. Yarborough was immediately placed on administrative leave on April 4, 2017. FCPS cooperated with police and child protective services during the course of the investigation. Mr. Yarborough did not return to the school and subsequently resigned from his position, effective June 30, 2017. Following due process, FCPS will pursue the revocation of his teaching and administrator licenses as appropriate, once the criminal case against him is adjudicated. FCPS is committed to ensuring that all students attend school in an environment that is respectful, safe, and where they feel a high degree of trust with the staff who serve them."



#### **Steve Yarberry**

A man called 911 early Saturday morning saying he was the target of gunfire after he said he asked another man to stop using racial slurs at a west Wichita restaurant, Wichita police say.

Sgt. Steve Yarberry said the 31-year-old man made the request but was shot at twice, possibly in retaliation, as he was driving away from the International House of Pancakes – IHOP – at 515 S. Ridge Road around 2:30 a.m. The restaurant is between Kellogg and Maple.

"One of the rounds struck the tailgate of his vehicle," Yarberry said. The man was not hurt. He did not know the shooter, Yarberry said.


### William O. (Billy) Rainey<sup>5</sup> (11/11/1939 - &/22/2017)






being the logo. He living a life in service to those who were less fortunate than he & had a genuine sense of empathy for person in need.



#### Jerry Yarboro, Sr.


